Dr. Goldstein, Noted Eye Surgeon, Dies

New York—Dr. Isadore Goldstein, 58, ophthalmic surgeon of Mount Sinai Hospital, died last week in his home at 275 Central Park West. Dr. Goldstein wrote numerous papers and articles on the pathology of the eye, and made several contributions to plastic surgery of the eye.

He invented a technique for relieving protrusion of the eyes in exophthalmic goiter, and a method of reconstructing the socket so as to retain an artificial eye. With Dr. Carleton Simon he originated a system of criminal identification through the pattern of the retina.

In this a special camera photographs the network of blood vessels in the retina, which the surgeons, after thousands of tests, found was different in every person.

Prospectors Seek Oil in Beersheba

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Speculation as to the possibilities of oil resources in the vicinity of Beersheba was stimulated with the publication in the Palestine Gazette of an oil mining bill which details new regulations governing the prospecting, exploiting of oil sources.

Jewish financiers interested in oil indicated the belief that the regulations were announced in connection with prospecting for oil now going on in the Beersheba area.

Arthur J. Levy was re-elected president of the Jewish Family Welfare Society at the annual meeting of the organization held this week at 100 North Main street.

Dr. Hugh E. Kiene, director of the psychiatric department at Charles V. Chapin Hospital and principal speaker, discussed the relation of mental hygiene to social work. He explained that the services of social workers in helping to rehabilitate maladjusted families is equally as important as financial or material relief. "There is much that is more fundamental in a happy family life than material luxury," Dr. Kiene said.

Isadore Gandal, new executive director, said "relief may be demoralizing," and warned that

Prodigy Musician Epidemic Appals Hortense Monath

New York—Hortense Monath, distinguished American young pianist is appalled by the prodigy plague now epidemic in this country. "They are a menace," she says, "—menace to musical education, a menace to proper music appreciation and a menace mostly to their own futures as musicians and human beings."

More often than not these children, at a sacrifice of youth and career are victims of the frustrated hopes of musically inclined parents, aunts, guardians who are starved for a bit of reflected glory.

"Chained to their pianos and fiddles like miserable midget slaves—rather they should be permitted to develop in the sun and fresh air so essential to children, and I mean that in both a physical and spiritual sense," says

Palestine Gangsters Murder N. Y. Couple

Jerusalem — British police searched today for gangsters who broke into the home of Samuel Lewis, 78, in the all-Jewish city of Tel-Aviv, critically wounded him and killed his wife, Hanna, 70. Mr. Lewis, a member of a wealthy New Zealand Jewish family, was at one time a resident of New York.

Repeated sniping attacks were reported today on Jewish busses plying between Tel-Aviv and Jerusalem. Most of the attacks occurred in the suburbs of Jerusalem.

Scores Proposals Of Arab Agreements

Congress to Decide At Next Session

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—David Ben Gurion, chairman of the Jewish Agency Executive, branded as a deliberate effort to confuse the rumored proposals from the Arab side for agreements involving a Jewish minority status in Palestine. The Jewish people will never consent to a ghetto Palestine, Mr. Ben Gurion declared in addressing a press conference here on behalf of the Executive.

Answering questions as to the status of the establishment of the Jewish State, Mr. Ben Gurion pointed out that the decision will be made by the next Zionist Congress and that, in the meantime, the responsibility rests with the Executive to preserve Jewish rights as guaranteed under the Mandate.

Mr. Ben Gurion said: "The Zionists are always ready to accept a fair agreement with the Arabs. But rumors emanating from certain Arab quarters that the Jews will assent to a minority status represent political blackmail and are intended to confuse both Jews and Great Britain."

Italians Seek Arab Staff in Palestine

Hope to Extend Arabic Radio Hour

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—According to Arab circles, invitations have been addressed to Arab sheikhs and preachers in Palestine to join the staff of the wireless station at Bari, which has been a source of discussion in the House of Commons on numerous occasions.

Singers of the Quaint Arabic melodies, who have to be specially trained in the high-pitched octaves, and readers from the Koran, another specialist vocation, are particularly sought.

It is believed that the Bari broadcasting authorities may be planning to extend the Arabic hour for Near East listeners in view of the decision of the British Government to use the British Broadcasting Company wireless transmitter at Daventry for broadcasting programs and news in languages other than English.

Reich Frees 1,000 In Yule Amnesty

Berlin—More than 1,000 political prisoners have been released under the Christmas amnesty.

No official announcement was made, but it was known that the releases have been proceeding for ten days and include persons now considered "politically reliable" as well as some Confessional pastors.

This year, for the first time, criminal prisoners whose terms would end shortly after Christmas were also released in time to spend Christmas with their families.

NAZIS BAN JAZZ

Berlin (WNS)—Nazi censorship over culture was extended to imported musical scores in a new decree against jazz and the works of Jewish composers and modernistic music.

Center to Launch Membership Campaign

Annual Drive Will Begin Wed., Jan. 5

Josolowitz Named Campaign Director

Next Wednesday, January 5, the Jewish Community Center will launch its annual membership enrollment, this year with plans made to carry the Center membership to record numbers. Samuel Lazarus has undertaken the task of enrollment chairman, and Mrs. Ruth Markoff will serve as associate chairman. Louis Hurwitz will act as treasurer and Robert I. Cohen, Executive of the Center, as secretary. Arthur J. Berman will act as chairman of publicity with Samuel H. Workman as associate chairman.

The campaign director is Samuel Josolowitz, field secretary in New England for the Jewish Welfare Board. Serving ex-officio upon all enrollment committees is Milton C. Sapinsley, president of the Center. The committees met on Thursday evening, December 30 to complete plans for the details of inviting to membership in the Center many of the Old Guard who have held membership during the past twenty years or more and many who have never partaken in the activities of the institution.

According to Mr. Josolowitz, dues in the Jewish Community Center in Providence are the lowest in the United States for hundreds of similar institutions, ranging from \$1.00 per year for young boys and girls to \$7.50 for husband and wife.

Necessity of Dues

"The question is sometimes raised," said Mr. Sapinsley, "why the Jewish Community Center requires dues to be paid in view of its membership in the Community Fund. The answer is that self-respecting members of a democratic Jewish Community will not avail themselves of the communal character of center activities unless they 'belong,' whatever their personal financial status may be. To eliminate dues and open the center to contributors only means that they will not partake, the Center becomes a settlement house, and the fundamental objective which is its reason for existing is lost. Perhaps in very large cities, settlement houses are needed in Jewish neighborhoods. We do not need or want such an institution in Providence. We do want—and we have—a truly active 'Center' for the prosecution of all common communal objectives related to living happily and harmoniously in this community.

Temple Ousted Members if Business Open Yom Kippur

Cincinnati (WNS)—When Congregation Beth-Or of Montgomery, Alabama was founded 8 years ago it incorporated in its constitution a provision for the fining or expulsion of members who failed to close their place of business on Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur, it is revealed in The Synagogue.

The constitution provided a fine of from \$2 to \$20 and also declared that a member who failed to pay his dues shall either be sued in a court of justice or expelled.

Other regulations in the constitution provided for a tax on any

member according to his circumstances in the event the congregation needed money in its treasury. Members having a Christian partner were excused from closing the High Holidays but were forbidden to enter the establishment. The same applied to members employed as a clerk in a store owned by a Christian.

The blackhaired young choreographer said a booking agent tricked her into becoming a stripper, but that "the ballet is really where my interest lies."



The eve of a new year is always the season for good resolutions. Individuals pledge themselves to do this or that and to refrain from doing that and this. Often these good resolutions are honored chiefly in the breach.

But each year they are made just the same. This new year would be unique, at least so far as good resolutions are concerned, if a few good resolutions were made by certain nations.

Poland, for example, might resolve to put some teeth into its reiterated promises to protect its Jewish citizens from violence.

Italy might resolve to keep hands off Palestine.

Rumania might resolve to do something about the Iron Guard.

It would be expecting too much to hope that Germany would resolve to get rid of Hitler in 1938 but we'll compromise if the Nazis agree to do something about throttling Julius Streicher.

It's also being unduly optimistic to suggest that the Palestine Arabs call off their terrorism during 1938, but it's an idea, anyhow.

And to all countries where Jews are suffering from one form of discrimination or another, we suggest a pledge to try and treat Jews as human beings.

The world bids adieu to 1937 with no regrets. It was a year of suffering and tragedy and disappointment. War and threats of war were most distinguishing characteristics.

In welcoming 1938 we can only express the hope that the men who rule and reign will resolve to bring to the peoples of the world relief from the fears and anxieties of the last few years through resolving to maintain peace and restore international sanity and understanding.

Nazis, Facing Crisis, Now Squeezing Rich

Dodd's Daughter is Lined Up With Fascism

To Tell All in Book on Germany

A picture of German Fascism leading up a blind alley—"now they've started to squeeze the rich, because the rest of the population is already squeezed dry"—was brought back to the United States by Martha E. Dodd, 29, blue-eyed daughter of William E. Dodd, the retiring United States ambassador to Germany.

When I went to Berlin with my four and a half years ago I wasn't much concerned about "Fascism," she said. "I had been a literary editor of the Chicago Tribune for two years, and was mainly interested in writing short stories. Two of my stories had been published in Story Magazine, and I thought that writing was to be all and end all.

"In Berlin I was simply a diplomat's daughter. I helped my father entertain. I can't say I was pleased with the life. However, I traveled a lot. I saw almost all of Europe except the Balkan countries. Also, I saw a lot of Fascism, and I made up my mind about it. I am opposed to Fascism in all the forms it takes."

As soon as the holiday season is over, she will start work on a book about Germany. "Fascism is going up a blind alley in Germany," she said. "The industrialists are beginning to complain bitterly about getting a taste of Nationalization. In Berlin a crisis can be sensed. There is opposition through Germany, but it is underground. Leaflets are sent through the mails. They appear mysteriously on the street.

Evidence of Disintegration
A mysterious radio station broadcasts news about the rest of the world. Their programs are hard to get, but the few who hear scatter the news around. General life has disintegrated in many. There are no good writers left, except those in concentration camps.

Weizmann Seen as Head of Jewish State

That is, If and When Partition Materializes

Spokesmen Silent; In Transition Period

Jerusalem—If a Jewish state is established in Palestine under the British partition scheme it generally has been conceded that Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Zionism's foremost personality would be the first head of the state, Webb Miller, United Press European News Manager stated last week in one of a series of articles on the Jewish-Arab struggle in Palestine.

Prospects of the first independent Jewish state in the world since the year 65 B. C., when Pompey stormed Jerusalem, has stirred the imaginations of Jews to intense discussion and political speculation on the form of government.

Dr. Weizmann is recognized for his great services to the allied cause in the World War by its discovery of a method of extracting acetone from horse chestnuts.

The discovery undoubtedly had great influence in prompting Britain to promise the establishment of a Jewish national home.

Cannot Talk

When Dr. Weizmann invented the process Britain was suffering from a very critical shortage of acetone, a necessary chemical in the manufacture of explosives.

I visited Dr. Weizmann at the beautiful modern chemical laboratory which he had established near Rehovot, but he declined to make a statement.

"We are in a state of transition," he said. "I feel that I cannot talk for publication."

Dr. Weizmann, who resembles Lenin, was dressed in an old suit which was riddled with acid burns. He was busily directing a staff of chemists studying agricultural and industrial problems.
