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## Nazis Dedicate Camp In N. J.

### Is 21st of Kind Established Here

Andover, N. J. (WNS)—Brown-shirted Nazis and black-shirted Fascists paraded side by side and exchanged mutual compliments here to the accompaniment of "heil Hitlers" and much waving of the swastika, as some 10,000 German-Americans and Italian-American participated in the dedication of Camp Nordland, the 21st Nazi camp to be established in this country by the German-American Bund, the official Nazi organization.

Welcomed to Sussex County by State Senator William A. Dolan, the Nazis and Italian Fascisti engaged in a day of singing, parading and heiling of Hitler and Mussolini.

Principal speakers were Fritz Kuhn, Nazi leader; August Klapprott, head of the New Jersey branch of the Bund; and Dr. Salvatore Caridi, Italian American Fascist leader of Union City, N. J.

Kuhn and Klapprott vigorously denounced "aliens" and "a certain minority" while Caridi said "Germany and Italy can teach the world something about how to live, something about order and discipline."

## Sunday Closing Drive Scored

New York (WNS)—A city-wide drive by the Retail Grocers and Food Dealers Association and the Lord's Day Alliance to close all food stores on Sunday has drawn a sharp protest from Dr. Bernard Drachman, president of the Jewish Sabbath Alliance of America.

In a letter to Police Commissioner Lewis J. Valentine, Dr. Drachman protested the fact that police were aiding in the drive which was forcing Jewish Sabbath-observing storekeepers to lose two days of business since they already kept their shops shut on Saturday.

Dr. Drachman pointed out that existing laws do not require food stores to close all day Sunday.

## Germany Bans Candy Soldiers

Berlin—Chocolate storm troopers are not wanted in Germany.

The official Gazette disclosed today the Nazi prohibition of the manufacture or sale of molds designed for making confectionery figures of the brown shirts.

It also barred weather vanes and wine bottles decorated with the swastika and alarm clocks which play the Horst Wessel song.

## American to Provide Jobs for Polish Girls

Warsaw (WNS)—Several thousand Jewish girls will find employment here as the result of a deal completed by a prominent American Jewish sweater manufacturer. The manufacturer, whose name was not made public, arranged with his agents in Poland to supply him with a large order of sweaters.

Mrs. Saul Abrams and Dr. and Mrs. Ilie Berger represented the R. I. section of the American Jewish Congress which assembled in Washington to protest the inhuman treatment of Polish Jews. A memorandum, presented to Secretary of State Hull, outlined the tragic consideration.

Secretary Hull assured the delegation of his interest and signified intentions of voicing his opinion after the memorandum had been studied.

## Anti-Semite Identified As Would-be Assassin

Warsaw (WNS) — Polish Jewry breathed an almost audible sigh of relief as tentative identification of the remains of the would-be assassin of Colonel Adam Koc, head of the pro-government Fascist party, the Camp of National Unity, indicated that he was Wajciech Bietanek, a member of the illegal anti-Semitic National Radical Party.

Although Bietanek was torn to pieces by the bomb which he intended for Colonel Koc, identification was made by the remains of a railway ticket found near the scene of the attempted assassination.

The National Radicals were bitterly opposed to Koc's party because it was seeking to organize nationalist youth, hitherto the backbone of the Radicals.

Establishment of the fact that Bietanek was the would-be assassin eased tension in Jewish circles, which had feared attempts by the anti-Semitic press to blame the Jews.

## Bravery of Christian Averts Pogrom Tragedy

Warsaw (WNS)—Thanks to the bravery of Stachek Bonorovitch, a Christian Pole, a pogrom like those which terrorized Brest-Litovsk and Czestochowa Jewries was narrowly averted in Otvotzk.

During a street brawl between M. Rosenberg and M. Rosenblum, Jewish butchers, Rosenblum sought to escape Rosenberg's blows by seeking shelter in Bonorovitch's house. Enraged at this, Rosenberg drew a knife and slashed the Pole.

In a few minutes the town was in an uproar over the rumor that a Jewish butcher had slain a Christian. The Endecks lost little

## Britain Won't Consult Allied Powers on Plan

### Will Confer With League

#### Partition Requires Consent of League

London (WNS-Palcor Agency)

—The British Government will not take any steps to ascertain the views of the United States, France, Italy, Japan, the British Empire Dominions and other countries who signed the Versailles Treaty and selected Great Britain as Mandatory before submitting its proposals for the partition of Palestine to the Council of the League of Nations, it was announced in the House of Commons by Viscount Cranborne, under-secretary for Foreign Affairs.

Viscount Cranborne declared that since Article 27 of the Mandate provides that the consent of the Council of the League is required for modification of the terms of the Mandate, the Government would not consult any of the Allied Powers prior to placing its decision of policy before the League.

Viscount Cranborne made this statement in reply to a question by the Honorable R. D. Denman, National Laborite, who inquired whether the Government would consult any of the great powers regarding its contemplated creation of Jewish and Arab States in Palestine.

In his reply Cranborne said that the Allied Powers and other countries mentioned in the preamble of the Mandate were members of the League and their status was defined under the terms of the Mandate.

He pointed out that the Mandate was accepted under these conditions by the American Government through the American-British Convention of 1924.

## Poles Set Date for Conference

New York (WNS) — Benjamin Winter, Z. Tygel and Abraham I. Kandel, ranking leaders of the Federation of Polish Jews in America, will head the American delegation to the second biennial world conference of the World Federation of Polish Jews Abroad, which will be held in Brussels from August 21 to 24.

Organized two years ago in London at the first international meeting of representatives of Polish Jewish groups abroad, the conference will deal with the question of Polish Jewry's plight and the efforts need to conduct a world-wide movement to relieve their distress.

## Jewish Training Ship Is Hailed in Greece

Saloniki (WNS)—Sara 1, the first Jewish training ship to sail the seas in modern times, received a tumultuous welcome on her arrival in this port. Chief Rabbi Koretz headed the reception committee.

## Palestine Labor Wins 85 Seats

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Official figures on the elections for Palestine delegates to the World Zionist Congress in Zurich were announced with Labor receiving 85 of the total of 124 representatives in the voting that was participated in by 117,480 Jews throughout the country.

The other parties will be represented at the Zionist Congress as follows: Mizrachi, 5; State Party, 1; Union of General Zionists, 7; Yemenites, 2; Hapoel Hamizrachi, 15; Confederation of General Zionists, 4, and Progressives, 5. The number of votes cast represented eighty-three per cent of the total of those Jews eligible for voting.

### Mosely Receives Stone Barrage

London — Sir Oswald Mosley, British Fascist leader, was struck in the face by a stone before police could rescue him from a crowd of 20,000 to whom he had tried to sell his ideas on British Government from the top of a loud-speaker truck. Bobbies hustled Sir Oswald away in a street car with seat cushions barricading the windows against a barrage.

## Notables Organize Friends of University

Stockholm, Sweden (WNS)—Selma Lagerloef, world famous Swedish authoress and Nobel Prize winner, A. Lefgren, former Swedish foreign minister, and Dr. Martin Lam, professor of Swedish literature at the University of Stockholm, and a descendant of one of Sweden's oldest Jewish families, have taken the initiative in organizing a Swedish branch of the Friends of the Hebrew University.

## "Bad Odor" Machine Comes from Germany

Dresden, Germany—Some awful smells are being prepared for a journey to the United States, along with a gigantic glass ear and a transparent man who speaks English.

They are part of a big exhibit made in the German Museum of Hygiene for the Oberlaender Trust and the Carl Schurz Memorial Foundation.


The big glass ear is so constructed that one can see clearly how the membranous labyrinth operates to maintain the equilibrium of its owner.

One of the oddest displays is the "smell table," equipped to demonstrate the six basic odors perceptible by man. Compressed air atomizing and mixing devices enable the operator to produce any desired (or undesired) smell at a moment's notice.

Beth-Israelite to Match \$5000 Quota of Temple

A prominent members of Temple Beth Israel Congregation has promised to contribute \$5000 to the Temple if the members of the Congregation are able to raise a similar amount, it was learned today from a reliable source.

Plans for the high holidays, which come unusually early this year, are rapidly being completed, Dr. Ilie Berger, president of the Congregation stated last week. He announced the appointment of Morris Chusmir as chairman of the high holidays arrangements committee.

Russian Emigrant Becomes Scotchman

Glasgow, Scotland (WNS)—How Simon Levi, a one-time Russian Jew became a Scotchman, was told by the Glasgow Weekly Herald in reporting that the Edinburgh Police permitted him to make his home there because as a man without a country he could not be deported.

Levi fled from Russia after the 1917 revolution and settled in Germany. In 1933 he fled once more and has since sought refuge in several countries until he found sanctuary in Scotland.

Nazis Press Church Drive

Berlin—The secret police pressed their drive against the anti-Nazi confessional synod of the Lutheran church today with the arrest of four religious leaders accused of making "unauthorized collections" in rhuirhes.

A decree by Church Minister Hans Kerri a week ago established a church financial committee and forbade pastors from collecting funds.

Among those arrested was Dr. Karl Hildebrandt, of Berlin's Dahlen Church who substituted for the Rev. Martin Niemoeller, leader of the confessional movement who is in Moabit Prison awaiting trial.

Dentists Discover New Pain-Killer

Atlantic City, N. J. (WNS)—The beginning of an era of real painless dentistry was visioned by America's leading dentists at the 79th annual convention of the American Dental Association after hearing Dr. Harold A. Osterman, New York Jewish dentist, announce the details of his newly discovered dental pain killer.

Developed in collaboration with Professor A. Taub of the Columbia University school of pharmacy, the pain desensitizer is applied in either liquid or paste form to the sensitive dentin where the outer enamel has been cut through or worn through by decay.

In 371 cases the pain killer gave 80% perfect results, 15% partial results and only 4% failures. The anesthetic contains a new chemical, thymol aminobenzoate or tabesthin, developed by Drs. Osterman and Taub.

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# Urge "Breathing Spell" for Palestine

## Jabotinsky Asks World Vote on Partition Plan

LONDON, July 20.—Vladimir Jabotinsky, 56, president of the New Zionists, appealed today for a "breathing spell" in Britain's move to partition Palestine so he might be able to solicit the opinion of 16,000,000 Jews throughout the world.

"If the partition scheme is put into effect," he said in an interview, "it will mean another Armenia, so far as Jews are concerned."

Jabotinsky announced efforts to gain a cross-section of opinion throughout a world Jewish assembly on the eve of House of Commons debate. The partition scheme was published July 7 by a royal commission.

Tomorrow William G. A. Ormsby Gore, Colonial Secretary, will ask government approval of the commission's plan to divide Palestine between sovereign Jewish and Arabian states with a new British mandate over the holy cities of Jerusalem, Nazareth and Bethlehem.

The proposal was scheduled for discussion in the House of Lords today. Both Jews and Arabs have expressed bitter opposition to the division.

"This is a matter of life and death to hopeless Jewish masses in Eastern and Central Europe who constitute a reservoir of distress numbering from eight to nine millions," Jabotinsky said.

"Thus we protest against the haste and hurry with which this scheme is being rushed through Parliament, the Mandate Commission and the Council of the League of Nations.

"There are three reasons why we reject the partition scheme. First, the area in question offers no room for any considerable Jewish immigration.

"Second, it is a fallacy to assume that this Jewish state would be a first step . . . of the Jewish destiny to expand. Once prematurely formed, it would never expand either by peaceful penetration or by conquest.

"Third, on the contrary, that Jewish state would be destined to eventual capture by the neighboring Arab state—a conquest which would probably be accompanied by destruction and massacre."

Jabotinsky, a Polish Jew who fought for Britain in the World War and was decorated for bravery, has been president of the New Zionists, or Revisionists, as identified from the Old Zionists, since the organization's inception two years ago.

A special highway system on Yerba Buena Island will link the San Francisco-Oakland Bay bridge with Treasure Island, site of the 1939 World's Fair.

Hollywood, Calif. (WNS)—Rumors that Universal Pictures made last minute changes in the ending of "The Road Back," the screen version of Erich Maria Remarque's novel of the same name, which glorify Hitler, were vigorously denied in a statement here by R. H. Cochran, president of the producing company.

Repudiating charges that the changes were motivated by fear of a boycott of Universal films in Germany, Mr. Cochran said that the changes were in the form of additional romantic scenes which were made after the picture had been shown to the public.

## Modern Barnum Tells All

A Master Showman Tells How He  
Obtained What He Wanted

There's nothing very unique about my childhood—it was spent in typically New Yorkese style—dirty tenements, poor neighborhoods, often hungry, often cold, always fighting.

I think I've lived in every East Side neighborhood from the Bronx to Brooklyn. Our family was constantly moving. We discovered that it was cheaper to keep changing our address than it was to pay rent. And we changed addresses so often that irate landlords couldn't keep up with us.

Father was a non-persuasive salesman who talked a great deal and earned very little. He was always trying to sell something no one wanted. Mother, on the other hand, was a person of tremendous energy.

While her own family was struggling to keep one jump ahead of the wolf she organized and brought over sixty-eight Jewish refugees from the Czarist pogroms in Russia. She always was after the wealthy Jewish aid societies, trying to raise money for this or that cause. My mother was a splendid woman, intensely conscious of her Jewishness and always fighting for her people. The result, of course, was that she didn't have much time for her own family.

I remember that as a cook she fell far short of Jewish tradition. My favorite dish was—and still is—gefillte fish, but I always had to drop in on our neighbors around supper time if I ever wanted to enjoy a piece of it. You see, she was always so concerned with her people's problems that there wasn't much of her energy left when it came to taking care of her own noisy brood.

She died only a few weeks ago. Her funeral was completely Orthodox. It was an elaborate affair and very Ziegfeldian—as she would have liked it.

As a kid I attended Hebrew school, but, frankly, I wasn't very interested. A dead language didn't have much appeal for me.

While my particular branch of the family were intensely Jewish, we were not as Orthodox as the rest of the Rosenbergs. Somehow we just didn't have time to be—always moving, mother always fighting for a cause, me always fighting in the streets, and father always fighting to sell something. We were, however, very proud of the fact that not very far back in our family history there had been a Tzaddik of the old Orthodox school.

I remember when we lived in Washington Heights 25 years ago. At that time we were the only Jewish family in the neighborhood, and I had to do plenty of scrapping with the other kids to keep my two sisters, Polly and Miriam, and myself in good standing. As a kid I was always fighting. If not in defense of my being a Jew, then because of my shortness, which gave the other boys a chance to bully me. But I was lucky. I had to learn how to protect myself, and I learned well. I came out of most fights badly messed up—black eyes, bloody nose, etc. But the other fellow often didn't come out of it at all!

When we lived on East 116th Street I used to hang out with a gang of Jewish boys. We were always holding conferences of war and preparing attacks on the tough Italian kids who came from the "Little Italy" colony. They were mostly bigger than we were and would start taunting us as soon as they saw us coming. Their vocabularies were very colorful, and the names they called us, with various versions of the typical "sheeny" and "kike", wouldn't bear repeating. One day, after we had been pretty badly beaten up, we lay in wait for them after school and dropped bricks down on them from the low roof tops. Yes, we were tough—not at all in good Jewish tradition. But we had to be tough. If we weren't those East Side gangs would have beaten all of us to a pulp.

New York—Gabriel Klein, 7, of 318 E. Eighth street, in attempting to get over his fear of animals got himself some undeserved credit for bravery in pulling a lion's tail as it dozed peacefully in the Bronx zoo.

# Polish Press Warns Against Meddling

## To Hold Polish Jews Liable

### Resent Protests of American Jews

Warsaw (WNS)—Taking a leaf from the Nazis, who have never failed to revenge themselves on German Jews whenever Jews abroad took some particularly militant anti-Nazi step, the anti-Semitic press here served notice that henceforth the Jews of Poland will be held strictly to account for what their co-religionists do or say about Poland abroad.

Enraged by the recent visit of a Jewish delegation to Secretary of State Hull, who was urged to intervene in behalf of Polish Jews, *Gazeta Polska*, mouthpiece of Foreign Minister Beck, said "Jews must be warned against using such methods."

Jewish politicians must be blind if they expect diplomatic help from Poland in the Palestine affair while they simultaneously slander Poland abroad.

ABC, militant anti-Jewish paper, declared "Jews in Poland will be held responsible for the machinations of American Jews. The Polish government must answer Wise's (Dr. Stephen S. Wise, who headed the delegation received by Secretary Hull) in such a way that Jews will realize that slandering Poland abroad will only worsen the life of Jews in Poland."

## Fears for Minorities if Court Reform is Made

New York (WNS)—Governor Herbert H. Lehman's sensational announcement that he is opposed to President Roosevelt's Supreme Court reform plan because he believes it would establish "a dangerous precedent which could be availed of by future less well-intended administrations for the purpose of oppression or for the curtailment of the constitutional rights of setting a precedent which of our citizens" is due to his fear would impair the Supreme Court's



powers to protect Constitutional guarantees of religious liberty. Such is the opinion of Doris Fleeson, Washington correspondent of the New York Daily News.

Miss Fleeson reports that Washington explains Governor Lehman's strong feeling in the matter on "the theory that as a Jew, sorrowful witness of the persecution of his minority, race in Germany and Poland, Governor Lehman is afraid of the precedent created by the President's frontal attack on the Supreme Court, because it has consistently protected minority rights where cases involving race and religion arose."

### Resent Inclusion In Jewish State

Berlin (WNS)—Foreigners here with a sense of humor are chuckling over the discovery that the plan to partition Palestine into Arab and Jewish states would incorporate into the Jewish state the German colony of Sarona, outside of Tel Aviv.

Nazi leaders here are reported to have expressed great resentment over this and there is talk of filing a formal protest with the British authorities.

In November, 1936, the residents of Sarona protested to High Commissioner Wauchope and the Ger-

man consul against a new administrative plan which would join the German colony to the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv.


### LAST SUNDAY'S RESULTS

## American Jews Tell of Imprisonment in Germany

New York (WNS) — Charging that American consular officials in Germany had not accorded him and his daughter the protection they expected as American citizens, Samuel Goodhart, naturalized American of Polish-Jewish extraction, and his daughter Jennie, 24 years old, told how he and his daughter were arrested in Karlsruhe on July 11, 1935 on trumped up charges of "currency smuggling".

Mr. Goodhart, who went to Germany in June 1934 on a combined business and pleasure trip, said he was in prison for nearly two years and was fined \$3,200, while his daughter served five months in prison on the charge of being her father's accomplice.

Miss Goodhart was released last year and returned to America but

kept silent until her father's release and return to this country on July 10th.

The Goodharts told how Nazi officials threatened them with death wherever they were if they opened their mouths after being released.

Intimidation and torture were employed to force him to confess to a crime he never committed, Goodhart said.

He is now awaiting for the State Department to fix a date when he and his daughter can appear for an official investigation of their case.

## Yiddish Used Most by Papers

Vilna (WNS)—The majority of the 580 Jewish periodicals registered with the Yiddish Scientific Institute in 1935-36 are published in Yiddish, according to a report by the Institute.

For that same period, however, the Institute found that Hebrew journals were published in Palestine, Latvia, Austria, Poland, Switzerland, Roumania and the United States.

The countries in which Yiddish papers appeared were the United States, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Danzig, South Africa, Dutch East Indies, Chile, Czechoslovakia, Lithuania, Latvia, Mexico, England, France, Poland, Finland, Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Canada, Cuba, Russia, Roumania and Peru.

## Many Injured in Revisionist Parade

Warsaw (WNS) — Scores of persons were injured and many others arrested following a clash between Bundists and Revisionists during a parade of 10,000 Revisionists through the Jewish quarter of Warsaw in protest against the Palestine partition scheme.

Black flags and signs bearing the words "we want the Jewish faith on both sides of the River Jordan" were carried by the marchers.

## "We Saved Art" Boasts Goebbels Naziland Freed from "Degeneracy"

Berlin (WNS)—Post-war German art "experienced a diseased period with disgusting symptoms in the shape of these horrible specimens of so-called art found in our museums and galleries" because of "the tyranny of Jewish art criticism", but Nazism rose wrathfully to oust these "false modelers of artistic taste," Dr. Joseph Goebbels, Nazi minister of propaganda, said in an address at an art festival staged to dedicate Munich as the "art capital of German art."

Proclaiming the end of "these examples of bolshevistic atrocities" which were "imposed by Jewish taste in art," Goebbels revealed that some of "these degenerate products" are being preserved "so that our people today may contemplate the horrors inflicted on an art-loving nation and come to realize how low German art had fallen under the influence of Jewish critics."

## Suicide Told Mother is a Jew; Attempt Fails

Budapest (WNS) — Interrupted by a fellow deputy with the cry "your mother was a Jewess," John Golonfi, member of parliament, stopped in the middle of a violent anti-Semitic tirade, in the course of which he had demanded the exclusion of Jews from all phases of Hungarian life, and tried to kill himself.

Falling in his attempt at suicide, he recovered his poise and resigned from parliament to avoid further embarrassment.

First elected to the Z. O. A. presidency in 1932, he held that office until 1936 when he was succeeded by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Mr. Rothenberg is now chairman of the administrative committee of the Z. O. A. He is a lawyer by profession.
