## League Authorizes New Palestine Committee

### Poland Mobilizes Extra Police to Guard Against Pogroms

#### Disorders Flare Throughout State

##### Armed Endek Mob Raids Synagogue

Warsaw (WNS)—Following appeals to the minister of the interior by Senators Jacob Trockenheim and Moses Schorr to protect the Jews against the continuing anti-Jewish disorders, extra police details were ordered on duty in Warsaw, Lodz and Cracow to check new excesses which swept over the country during the first two days of Succoth.

More than a score of Jews were injured in Warsaw when armed Endeks raided a synagogue and beat Jewish pedestrians strolling in the parks.

Street demonstrations were held at which Endek mobs shouted "Death to the Jews."

The most serious disturbance occurred in Czestochowa, a Catholic holy city, where 60,000 Catholics gathered for a pilgrimage.

After numerous Jews were injured in street riots, anti-Semitic members of the city council introduced a resolution calling for the expulsion of all Jews from the city.

#### Quakers Urged to Fight Anti-Semitism

Swarthmore, Pa. (WNS)—Quakers throughout the world must take action to help prevent the spread of anti-Jewish propaganda, it was declared, in a report presented to the Friends' World Conference, which is being attended by delegates from 23 foreign countries and the United States. The report, drafted by a commission studying methods of achieving racial justice, termed Germany's attitude toward the Jews "menace to the world," and declared that "its effects are being felt in France, where there is a definite rise in anti-Semitic propaganda, and in Great Britain, where the so-called British Fascists are deliberately using anti-Semitic propaganda and are stirring up feelings of race discrimination."

#### Henrietta Szold Coming to U. S.

Jerusalem (WNS)—While visiting Kfar Szold, the settlement named after her, Miss Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah, announced that she would shortly visit the United States. She is expected to reach America in time for the silver jubilee convention of Hadassah.

#### SENTENCED TO PRISON

Buenos Aires (WNS)—Found guilty of being the ringleader of a series of outrages against synagogues and anti-Fascist newspapers here two years ago, Hans Wilhelm Linke, Nazi agent and clerk in a German bank, was sentenced to prison for three years and nine months. Lesser terms were given to six of his associates.

### Mosley Hints at Link With Social Group

London (WNS)—A possible link between Major Douglas' Social Credit organization and Sir Oswald Mosley's British Union of Fascists was hinted at when Action, the Blackshirt organ, published an article by Sir Oswald in which he declared that both organizations combat the "financial oligarchy."

In view "of these essential similarities," Mosley wrote, "the social creditors and the National Socialists should regard themselves as belonging to the same front."

Sir Oswald's overture was rebuffed by Mr. Bardsley, secretary of the Social Credit group, in a statement to the Jewish Chronicle, in which he said he disapproved the individual persecution underlying Fascism.

### Ban on Refugee Jewish Doctors Fought by Samuel Untermeyer

New York (WNS)—A test case to determine whether the New York State Department of Education is within its rights in refusing licenses to practice medicine in this state to fifty German Jewish refugee physicians unless they take a medical examination, has been started here by Samuel Untermeyer and Samuel Leibowitz as counsel for Dr. Benno Leigner, noted German gynecologist.

Papers in the case have been served on Ernest E. Pole, deputy commissioner of education, and

the case is expected to be heard in October before Supreme Court Justice William J. Collins.

Counsel for the plaintiffs maintain that the department of education is discriminating against the fifty refugee doctors by demanding that they take a medical examination despite their obvious qualifications.

They have already passed a required examination in English.

It is also argued that discrimination exists since 350 other German refugee doctors were given licenses up to September, 1936, without medical examinations.

All of the 50 doctors have taken out their first citizenship papers.

The Providence Symphony orchestra, Dr. Wassili Leps, conductor, announces three concerts for this winter, its seventh season. On Nov. 16 the orchestra will have Prof. Arthur B. Hitchcock, of the Department of Music at Brown University, as soloist. Prof. Hitchcock will play a piano concerto to be announced later.

The popular two-piano team of Fray and Braggiotti, will return to this city for the second concert Feb. 1, while the closing concert on March 22 will feature Hans Wiener, Viennese dancer, and his complete ballet company.

### Mandate Remains In Full Force

#### Avoids Comment on Partition

Geneva (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The League of Nations Council unanimously adopted a resolution on Palestine presented by a sub-committee entirely reserving its opinion and decision on the Palestine Mandate, and deferring consideration of the question of partition until the Council is in a position to deal with it as a whole.

The resolution, meeting British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden's request for power to name a new committee to proceed to Palestine for further negotiations, reads as follows:

"In view of the United Kingdom's Government's statement of July 1937 concerning the conclusions of the Royal Commission on Palestine; in view of the preliminary opinion given to the Council by the Mandates Commission; in view of the statement by the representative of the United Kingdom at a meeting of the Council on September 14, 1937 and the discussion on the status of Palestine at the same meeting; having a regard to the intention expressed by the United Kingdom Government of pursuing a study of the problem of the status of Palestine while concentrating on a solution involv-

### Shift 16 Million Marks to Palestine

Jerusalem (WNS)—Transfers of German marks to Palestine by German Jews amounted to 16,000,000 reichmarks during the first half of 1937, 57 per cent more than for the same period last year. Mark owners are losing 40 per cent on these transactions because of the low valuation of the mark.

This explains why Germany leads all other countries, even England, in the value of exports to Palestine. With 90,000,000 marks already ear-marked for transfer purposes, dumping by Germany in Palestine is expected to continue for some time to come.

### Report Discovery of Terror Groups

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The existence of an organized terrorist group in Tel Aviv which had affiliations in other parts of the country is purported to be revealed in documents found by the police in the homes of the men seized in connection with the hold-up which startled the all-Jewish city two weeks ago.

### Canadian Radio Bars Abuse of Race, Creed

Toronto (WNS)—Abuse of any race, creed or religion over the air was forbidden in Canada when the Canadian Broadcasting Commission issued an order effective November 1st, decreeing that "no one shall broadcast any abusive comment on any race, religion or creed."

## Legion Cheers Lehman As He Raps European Persecution

New York (WNS)—Twenty-thousand members of the American Legion jamming every corner of Madison Square Garden cheered and applauded as Governor Herbert H. Lehman, himself a Legionnaire, told the opening business session of the 18th annual convention that "America gasps with horror when it sees great groups of people abroad persecuted solely because of race or religion."

Reminding the World War veterans that "their responsibility is not less today than it was 20 years ago" because "we still have a great principle of democracy and liberty for which we must fight," New York's chief executive said that "in the past few years we have had a rude awakening."

"In the wake of the World War has come maelstrom of new-born ill will and intolerance. Dictatorships have, in many countries, superseded democracies. Freedom of thought and conscience has frequently been stifled. No longer

## Murder Mystery of Revisionist Puzzles Palestine Police

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A murder mystery whose details become more complex every day surrounds the identification of Ben Amram Frankel, the young Jew whose bound corpse was washed ashore on the Yarkon River September 8th, after being in the water an undetermined number of days.

A week passed before his identity became known and then only his mother, still confined in Jaffa jail, recognized his clothing by photographs. Mrs. Frankel was seized when police, looking for her son in connection with the shooting of an Arab in northern Tel Aviv, failed to find him home

Police charge that Frankel was linked with various terroristic

acts and are seeking his companions and acquaintances. Frankel's name was found on a list of Revisionists in the possession of the men charged with the holdup on a bank clerk here early last week. A witness named Emil Stessel, who told police that Frankel's shirt belonged to him and was stolen two months ago, was detained for questioning.

The police are also trying to establish a connection between Frankel and a threatening letter sent to a Tel Aviv lawyer demanding 250 pounds "for the society for the defense of the honor of the homeland."

Frankel had been sought by the police in connection with the shooting of an Arab in northern Tel Aviv on August 30th. When the police came to Frankel's house after the shooting they did not find him but discovered a loaded revolver. They then arrested his mother.

# Adventure in Newfoundland

Walter Nelson Relates Experience of Winter in Far North

"Memoirs of a trip to Newfoundland" might easily be the name of this story . . . It's all about a local D.D.S., who, seeking experience and adventure, mostly adventure, I think, spent close to eight months way up there in the north. . . .

Walter Nelson's been so busy since he returned that it's been practically impossible to get him to stay in one place long enough to hear an account of his trip . . .

One day I met him on an elevator, of all places, and before I got off at the ninth floor, he'd promised to do a sitting act for a few minutes the following day, and tell me all about his trip . . . And this is how the story goes:—

### Started for Newfoundland

The wanderlust got him in November of last year, so taking his toothbrush and lots of clothes to keep him warm, he started from New York on the steamship "Fort Amherst," which took him all the way up to St. Johns, Newfoundland . . . From there he boarded a tiny mail boat that made the trip up to St. Anthony, arriving about November 22 . . . "Sn'anthony", as Walter very Englishly slurs it, is a town of about six hundred people, pocketed between two high hills . . . The inhabitants are of Britannic ancestry, with some French, Indian and Eskimo blood in their veins . . . "They're very hospitable," said Walter, "and as a matter of fact, save all their delicacies expressly for visitors" . . . The major occupation is fishing, with lumbering a close second . . . The town has a modern hospital, with up-to-date facilities, that accommodates about eighty-five people . . . It's the pride of the people, and is rated very highly by physicians and surgeons . . .

### Winter Begins Early

Ponds and lakes around St. Anthony freeze up in October and don't open up again until the late Spring . . . During this period there is absolutely no navigation, and all travel must be done by dog sleds . . . And while on the subject of dog sleds, Walter told me of the time he fell off the sled while they were crossing a lake . . . As he describes it, he landed with a "soft plop," and before he could say "Everything happens to me" he was down some place in water that was not exactly tepid, through the ice and all . . . But you have to be quick-witted enough to struggle up out of the water, and run like the very devil after the dog sled, because it seems that "Time and dog sleds wait for no man" . . .

### Weather Very Cold

The maximum distance you can cover by sled in the severe part of the winter is thirty miles per day . . . But if the sledding is good, as it is in the Spring when the

snow begins to loosen up a little, it is possible to cover seventy miles in a day . . . Winters here in our little state are comparatively warm, alongside those we hear tell of up there . . . Walter said casually that the lowest temperature recorded while he was there, was a mere 45 degrees, below the zero mark . . . Guess one never need worry about having a nice time, shall we say?

### Lost in Blizzard

Then there was the time when he and a companion were lost in a blizzard. They'd gone on a snow shoe trip, visiting in various sections of northwest Newfoundland . . . All in all, they were lost for about seven hours . . . "At first," Walter put in, "naturally I was scared, but as time passed,—and Lord, it passes slowly when you're lost—I began to sort of stop caring about anything, and felt that I might just as well lay down and call the whole thing quits" . . . But, being lost is an adventure in itself—er, at least if you can return to tell the tale . . .

### Standard Diets

Foods they live on mostly up there, are dried fish, seal meat, wild duck and whale meat . . . However, during the winter, most of the people eat dried bread and tea, with molasses for sweetening . . . Bread becomes so hard during the winter that it has to be cut with an axe . . . And, that's not an item for Ripley, either . . . Mail delivery is quite independent . . . It's delivered in relays from Deer Lake, which is about 400 miles from St. Anthony . . . There was a time when Walter hadn't received mail for fourteen weeks and that's enough to worry a man in any country . . . For excitement? Walter did musical work with natives, and at night they sang hymns . . .

On the whole, and life there is very fascinating, about returning Mr. N. had mingled feelings of regret and anticipation . . . Nevertheless, "going native" is good for everyone, and having had his share of it, Walter has willed and seriously settled down to his chosen profession . . .

## Legionnaires Try to Identify Shell-Shocked War Veteran

New York (WNS)—A veteran of the World War who enlisted in 1917 at Fort Slocum, New York, under the name of Abraham Groman, and then deserted in April, 1918, while serving in France with Company M, 18th Infantry after having been shell-shocked, was the subject of kind attention by the thousands of members of the American Legion here for their annual convention.

Groman, now on relief as an indigent veteran, doesn't remember his name, address or any of his war-time buddies.

His record shows that after the War he enlisted in the U. S. Army five times under the names of Harry Goodman, Abraham Groman, Harry Silver, Albert T. New-

man and Albert Newman. Four times he deserted and the last time he was honorably discharged. The Legionnaires were asked to try to identify the Jewish veteran who is not really a deserter but a war casualty.

## Mexico to Probe Fascist Parties

Mexico City (WNS)—Aroused by the growth of Fascist and quasi-Fascist parties and organizations in Mexico, some of them with Nazi affiliations, the Mexican parliament appointed a three-man commission to investigate the Fascist groups and to report on legal means of dissolving them.

Parliament acted after many members had called attention to the revived Fascist and anti-Semitic activity since the dissolution last year of the anti-Semitic Gold Shirts.

## Ghetto Benches Attract Tourists

Berlin (WNS)—The ghetto benches in many of Berlin's public parks have become a mecca for tourists from the German provinces as well as foreign visitors. Hundreds of persons visit the parks containing the benches marked "for Jews only" to see for themselves the examples of the modern ghetto.

Some visitors have even taken photographs of the benches.

### REFUGEE HECKLED

Stockholm, Sweden (WNS)—Nazi demonstrators created a disturbance at Stockholm University when Dr. David Katz, German-Jewish refugee professor, opened his first lecture in psychology. Police dispersed the crowd which had assembled outside the university.

## Link Jewish Education Week to Constitution Celebration

New York (WNS)—Emphasizing the democracy of Judaism and its harmony with the ideals of American institutions, hundreds of Hebrew schools throughout the country are combining the observance of the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States with the celebration of the second annual nation-wide Jewish education enrollment month, which is to be climaxed by national Jewish education week beginning October 9th.

According to a report by Bernard Semel, chairman of the laymen's committee of the National Council for Jewish Education, which is sponsoring Jewish education week and month, and Dr. Mordecai Soltes, national chairman of the observance committee, scores of communities are utilizing every available means for awakening Jewish parents to the necessity of giving their children a religious education.

Registration literature and posters prepared by the Jewish Education Association of New York have been distributed to local

committees throughout the country.

Parents' meetings are being organized and radio programs are being organized to focus attention on the problem of Jewish education.

## Parents Save Son; Call Him Illegitimate

Berlin (WNS)—To save their son, a convert to Christianity, from a long term in prison on a charge of rassenschande a Jewish couple in Frankfort-am-Main appeared in court and publicly branded him as the illegitimate son of a Christian German.

The mother testified that her son had been born out of wedlock and the father confirmed the mother's testimony, declaring he knew of his wife's so-called affair with the Aryan.

Despite the obvious falsity of the testimony the court accepted it and freed the accused Jew.

## Education Week

Regardless of their differences on other questions, most Jews are in accord on the vital importance of Jewish education. No matter what else a Jewish community has to sacrifice, the Talmud Torah and Sunday School are maintained to the last. . .

Yet, it is an undeniable fact that tens of thousands of Jewish children are not getting a Jewish education. Where the blame rests is beside the point. What matters is that a large portion of the future Jewry of the country is growing up without the advantages of a Jewish cultural and religious background.

To remedy this situation is one of the principal objectives of the second annual National Jewish Education Week, which will be observed throughout the country from October 9th to 16th.

Launched last year by the National Council for Jewish Education, Jewish Education Week, which climaxed national Jewish enrollment month, proved of inestimable value in stimulating wide communal interest in the paramount question of Jewish education.

The ambitious but practical program carried out last year with the cooperation of the Jewish Welfare Board and other agencies served to bring to the attention of American Jewry forcefully and dramatically the idea that Jewish education is Jewry's "first line of defense."

It is to be hoped that this year national Jewish Education Week will be even more successful. If the local Jewish communities realize its importance and grasp the opportunity that is theirs they can render invaluable service to the cause of Jewish education, and, in the long run, to Jewry itself.

## Voice of the Legion

It would be extremely unfortunate if the carnival atmosphere that surrounded the annual convention of the American Legion in New York obscured the report of its retiring commander-in-chief, Harry W. Colmery.

Long regarded as a potential reservoir of American Fascism, the Legion heard from its plain-spoken chief some unusually strong and direct language concerning the threat of alienisms to American democracy.

He reserved his bitterest attack for Nazism, assailing hyphenated Americanism and the attempts of Nazi agents to undermine American institutions.

He also called for an investigation of the network of Nazi camps and gave unmistakable proof that the Legion, long the nation's leading exponent of Americanism, has at last been aroused to the menace of Nazism at home.

If Commander Colmery's words have the effect they should we may expect during the coming year to find the Legion standing shoulder to shoulder with other forces committed to unrelenting opposition to Fascism and Nazism in this country.

The Legion has always been a militant foe of Communism.

It now realizes that Fascism and Nazism are as great, if not greater, threats to the ideals and institutions for the preservation of which they fought abroad twenty years ago and then organized the Legion for their defense here.

### Providence Jewry Not Supporting Home Carnival

To the Editor of The Jewish Herald.

I have taken considerable interest in the Home for Aged Carnival, which began about a week ago and ends tomorrow (Saturday night). I also realize that the Home for Aged must be self-sustaining, as it does not receive any portion of its budget from the Chest, city or state funds.

A carnival, therefore, is a necessity. It enables the Home to get a goodly portion of its budget in a painless manner. But, the success of such an endeavor depends on the attendance of our Jewish citizenry, who have the necessary funds to spend on the booths and raffles. Whether it is beneath their dignity to attend such a "public event" or if their apathy has dammed up the realization that the Home requires their support, is beyond my comprehension. But the people attending the carnival during the past week have not been Jewish. Our Gentile friends and their children have monopolized the Carnival, and while their support is gratifying and welcome, the real success of the Carnival depends entirely on money contributed by those who can afford the expenditures. Not only are their contributions necessary, but they also help to boost the morale, and furnish definite proof that Providence Jewry is anxious to see the Home progress, and unwilling to see its progress curtailed by lack of funds.

There is a parallel to these circumstances. Recently the Jewish War Veterans ran their carnival, the receipts of which were to reduce the mortgage and swell the relief fund, from which money is donated to the poor. Surely a worthy project! Yet, here again the support of city Jewry was negligible and deplorable.

There still is time for Providence Jewry to get behind the Home Carnival and give it the impetus required to send it "over

the top." I sincerely hope that those who read this letter will take this final opportunity to support THEIR Home for Aged.



## Freedom in the Dark

### Germans Still Believe in Liberty

By DOROTHY THOMPSON

I am taking my text from the works of Friedrich Schiller, for a very interesting and dramatic thing is happening in Germany right now in connection with the production of one of Schiller's plays.

For years, for generations, for over a hundred years, the plays of Friedrich Schiller have been an important part of the literature of the German theatre, and an earlier play of his, "Don Carlos," has always been a favorite of German students. It is a very well-known play written in blank verse, which seems a little turgid sometimes.

**An Amazing Demonstration**  
Well, something has happened in Germany: An amazing demonstration at a performance of "Don Carlos" that seems to bear an unmistakable significance.

A few weeks ago in Berlin a new production of "Don Carlos" was put on, and the "Minister of Enlightenment", Mr. Goebbels, sat in the loge of the theatre crowded with its first night audience. Suddenly there came a moment in this long, turgid classic and noble melodrama when the entire audience rose and burst into cyclonic applause.

Perhaps you read about it in the newspaper.

It is some years since I read "Don Carlos" (I read it in college); and it occurred to me to find out what the passage was that had evoked such a spontaneous outburst of applause by people in a theatre in a land under the domination of a Hitler. It was with difficulty that I was able to obtain a copy, here in New York, of Schiller's play in English.

#### Idea of "Don Carlos"

The main idea of "Don Carlos" is this: The scene is laid in the time of the Renaissance; Elizabeth is on the throne in England, and all Europe is beginning to flame with the Renaissance; Shakespeare is writing great new nationalistic dramas, breathing not a spirit of mysticism and narrow nationalism, but bringing new concepts of freedom and liberty. All over Europe the Renaissance is spreading.

Only Philip's Spain remains the Rock of the Middle Ages, and there its King, surrounded by intriguers and self-seekers, yet wields an absolute monarchy, fancying himself the sole representative of God on earth. Posa, a Grandee of Spain, who has travelled all over Europe, becomes imbued with the ideas of the Renaissance.

At that time Spain had undertaken the conquest of Flanders, and Philip ruthlessly wages war there to bring that country under the domination of the only representative of God on earth. Posa hopes to imbue Don Carlos with modern ideas of freedom. And in the third act of the play the King summons Posa to him, and asks: "Where is this Grandee of Spain who has served me well, but asks no favors of me?" Posa is brought to the King; he stands before Philip and tells him what he thinks of his country. This is what he says:

#### Posa's Reply

"Your Majesty, I lately passed through Flanders and Brabant. So many rich and blooming provinces filled with a valiant, great and honest people. To be father of a race like this I thought must be divine indeed, and then—I stumbled on a heap of burnt men's bones . . . True you are forced to act so, but that you could dare fulfill your task—this fills my soul with shuddering horror. O 'tis pity that the victim slaughtered in his blood must

choose to chant the praises of his sacrificer . . . Soon a milder age will follow that of Philip, an age of truer wisdom; hand in hand the subject's welfare and the sovereign's greatness will walk in union. Then the careful state will spare her children and necessity no longer glory to be thus inhuman" . . .

The King interrupts him to say: "Behold my Spain. See here the burgher's good blooms in eternal unclouded peace. A peace like this will I bestow on Flanders."

#### Cannot Halt Progress

Posa says: "The churchyard's peace! Do you hope to end what you have now begun? So do you hope to check this ripening change of Christendom, the universal spring that shall renew the earth's fair form? Would you alone in Europe, placing yourself before the rapid wheel of destiny while rolls its ceaseless course, and seize its spokes with the human arm? Vain thought! Thousands have your kingdom fled in joyful poverty; honest burgher, thankful exile, was your noblest subject! See! With a Mother's arms Elizabeth welcomes the fugitives, and Britain blooms in rich luxuriance from our country's arts. Bereft of the new Christian industry, Granada lies forsaken, and all Europe exulting sees his foe oppressed with wounds by its own hands inflicted."

#### "Sow Seeds of Death"

Then he steps nearer the King and says: "You would plan for all eternity, and yet the seeds you sow are the seeds of death! This hopeless task with nature's laws at strife will ne'er survive the spirit of its founder. And he turns to the King and adds, earnestly: "By the Almighty power! Restore us all you have deprived us of and, generous as strong, let happiness flow from your horn of plenty—let man's mind ripen in your vast empire. Give us back all you have taken from us and become, amidst a thousand kings, a king indeed!"

Posa gazes at the king and continues, with enthusiasm: "O that the eloquence of all these myriads whose fate depends on the momentous hour could hover on my lips and fan the spark that lights thine eyes into a glorious flame! Renounce the mimicry of godlike powers which level us to nothing. Be, in truth, an image of the Deity himself! Never did mortal man possess so much for purpose so divine. The kings of Europe pay homage to the name of Spain. Be you the leader of these kings. One pen stroke now, one motion

Paris (WNS)—The thousands of German Jewish refugees in France are to be placed under strict police surveillance and will be required to carry identification cards bearing photograph and fingerprints, as a result of a tightening of curbs on aliens.

Stirred by the mysterious bombing of the headquarters of two employers' federations, the government appointed a special commission to draft new control legislation for all foreigners.

of your hand can new create the earth! Grant us liberty of thought!"

#### Outburst Significant

In Hitler's Germany today, in that land where there is no freedom of thought, no freedom of conscience, no freedom of expression, a land given over at present to a mystic conception of blood and race elevated into the place of God, elevated into the place of all morality, it is indeed significant to note the demonstration evoked by such sentiments as are expressed in this play.

After all, it is a great and classic German drama, an old German drama written for another day. But in Berlin, Leipzig, Hamburg and Frankfurt—wherever the play was presented—audiences rose to their feet and applauded in unmistakable fervor the utterance of these declamations for freedom and liberty.

#### Audiences "Cowardly"

The Frankfurter Zeitung, deprecating these outbursts of enthusiastic approval, in a recent issue suggests that "it is very cowardly for audiences to demonstrate in this fashion in the darkness of the theatre"! As if they could demonstrate their feelings anywhere else! The same publication also suggested that Schiller "became older and wiser" and eventually "became a Nazi, in his old age". Of course it was not the Schiller who "became a Nazi in his old age" that those audiences applauded—they applauded one of the greatest apostrophes to freedom in their literature.

#### Race—Nationalism Struggle

I believe that there is a real struggle in the world today—a real struggle not only between ideas of freedom, but the idea of morality, the Christian idea, if you wish to call it that. That on the one hand there are abstract principles of morality, justice and freedom that we feel should be accessible to all men of all races, irrespective of creed or conviction, while on the other hand there is this new doctrine (and it is not so new—it has occurred before) that opposes those ideals, this Nazism, built on race and narrow nationalism.

In my view these two ideas cannot long survive together; one or the other will win—either the light will illuminate the darkness, or the darkness will blot out the light. And since I believe that this nation as a whole is standing in the light, I believe it is the duty of this nation, not only for humane reasons, but from pure self-preservation to stretch out a hand to all the people in Germany who are applauding these ideals. All over the world, wherever those ideals that once animated Friedrich Schiller still have validity, there is sympathy, understanding and willingness to help this great cause. I feel that there are hands around the world, and a spirit around the world which must stand with those people in Germany who do not believe—as I do not believe—that this is the final phase of Germany.

## Jewish Dance Mime Sails for Europe

Miss Lapson will appear in recitals of her Jewish dance repertoire in Paris, London, Warsaw, Tel Aviv and Jerusalem.

In Poland, she will make an extensive tour of the leading Jewish communities, and will visit all the important centers of Chassidic life and tradition. Miss Lapson will gather material for her new dance compositions and for a book on the history of the Jewish dance.

## Discover Missing Jewish Community

New York (WNS)—The existence of a previously unknown community of 3,000 Jews in a region known as Jurdistan, who still use Aramaic, language of the Talmud, and regard themselves as descendants of the Ten Lost Tribes of Israel, was reported by Dr. Walter J. Fischel, professor of Islam history at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, on his arrival in this country for a series of lectures.

Jurdistan is a region shared by Persia, Iraq and Turkey.

Professor Fischel also reported the discovery of Islamic Marranos in Persia, who though converted to Islam a century ago secretly adhere to Judaism.

## Resort Towns Suffer From Anti-Semitism

Carlsbad, Czechoslovakia (WNS)—Suffering from declining business as a result of anti-Semitic agitation by members of the city councils of Carlsbad, Marienbad and Franzbad, hotel keepers of those resort towns held a conference here and appealed to the officials of their towns to take steps to silence the anti-Semites.

#### RACIALISM RAPPED

Rome (WNS)—Nazi neo-paganism and racialism are the most eloquent testimony of the substitution of a morality of race and blood for the ethics of Christian religion, misrepresenting the principles which are the basis of every moral law. Cardinal Alberna Geri told a congress of the Catholic Union of Liberal Professions at Florence.

## Providence Artist Dies in Accident

Albert Potter Falls from Rock

Funeral services were held last Tuesday afternoon from the Max Sugarman Funeral Home for Albert Potter, 34, Providence artist.

Mr. Potter had been missing from his camp at Keech Pond, Gloucester, since he went there to sketch on September 17, and his body was found in the pond last Sunday morning by searchers who were dragging, under the direction of State police.

Expressing belief that the man, subject to sudden attacks of illness, had fallen into the water while sketching on a rock, Medical Examiner Edward A. Ricci, of North Providence, found death due to accident.

An honor graduate of the R. I. School of Design in 1927, Mr. Potter won the trustees' post-graduate scholarship for further study. He went abroad in the summer of 1927 and spent several months sketching in England many of the places made famous in Dickens' novels. He leaves a widow, Marion (Silver) Potter, and his father and mother, Max and Bessie Potter of 55 Warrington street.

## Adventure in Newfoundland

Walter Nelson Relates Experience of Winter in Far North

By EDYTHE JAY

"Memoirs of a trip to Newfoundland" might easily be the name of this story . . . It's all about a local D.D.S., who, seeking experience and adventure, mostly adventure, I think, spent close to eight months way up there in the north. . . .

Walter Nelson's been so busy since he returned that it's been practically impossible to get him to stay in one place long enough to hear an account of his trip . . . One day I met him on an elevator, of all places, and before I got off at the ninth floor, he'd promised to do a sitting act for a few minutes the following day, and tell me all about his trip . . . And this is how the story goes:—

### Started for Newfoundland

The wanderlust got him in November of last year, so taking his toothbrush and lots of clothes to keep him warm, he started from New York on the steamship "Fort Amherst," which took him all the way up to St. Johns, Newfoundland . . . From there he boarded a tiny mail boat that made the trip up to St. Anthony, arriving about November 22 . . . "St. Anthony", as Walter very Englishly slurs it, is a town of about six hundred people, pocketed between two high hills . . . The inhabitants are of Britannic ancestry, with some French, Indian and Eskimo blood in their veins . . . "They're very hospitable," said Walter, "and as a matter of fact, save all their delicacies expressly for visitors" . . . The major occupation is fishing, with lumbering a close second . . . The town has a modern hospital, with up-to-date facilities, that accommodates about eighty-five people . . . It's the pride of the people, and is rated very highly by physicians and surgeons . . .

### Winter Begins Early

Ponds and lakes around St. Anthony freeze up in October and don't open up again until the late Spring . . . During this period there is absolutely no navigation, and all travel must be done by dog sleds . . . And while on the subject of dog sleds, Walter told me of the time he fell off the sled while they were crossing a lake . . . As he describes it, he landed with a "soft plop," and before he could say "Everything happens to me" he was down some place in water that was not exactly tepid, through the ice and all . . . But you have to be quick-witted enough to struggle up out of the water, and run like the very devil after the dog sled, because it seems that "Time and dog sleds wait for no man" . . .

### Weather Very Cold

The maximum distance you can cover by sled in the severe part of the winter is thirty miles per day . . . But if the sledding is good, as it is in the Spring when the

snow begins to loosen up a little, it is possible to cover seventy miles in a day . . . Winters here in our little state are comparatively warm, alongside those we hear tell of up there . . . Walter said casually that the lowest temperature recorded while he was there, was a mere 45 degrees, below the zero mark . . . Guess one never need worry about having a nice time, shall we say?

### Lost in Blizzard

Then there was the time when he and a companion were lost in a blizzard. They'd gone on a snow shoe trip, visiting in various sections of northwest Newfoundland . . . All in all, they were lost for about seven hours . . . "At first," Walter put in, "naturally I was scared, but as time passed,—and Lord, it passes slowly when you're lost—I began to sort of stop caring about anything, and felt that I might just as well lay down and call the whole thing quits" . . . But, being lost is an adventure in itself—er, at least if you can return to tell the tale . . .

### Standard Diets

Foods they live on mostly up there, are dried fish, seal meat, wild duck and whale meat . . . However, during the winter, most of the people eat dried bread and tea, with molasses for sweetening . . . Bread becomes so hard during the winter that it has to be cut with an axe . . . And, that's not an item for Ripley, either . . . Mail delivery is quite independent . . . It's delivered in relays from Deer Lake, which is about 400 miles from St. Anthony . . . There was a time when Walter hadn't received mail for fourteen weeks and that's enough to worry a man in any country . . . For excitement? Walter did musical work with natives, and at night they sang hymns . . .

On the whole, life there is very fascinating and about returning Mr. N. had mingled feelings of regret and anticipation . . . Nevertheless, "going native" is good for everyone, and having had his share of it, Walter has willingly and seriously settled down to his chosen profession . . .

According to a report by Bernard Semel, chairman of the laymen's committee of the National Council for Jewish Education, which is sponsoring Jewish education week and month, and Dr. Mordecai Soltes, national chairman of the observance committee, scores of communities are utilizing every available means for awakening Jewish parents to the necessity of giving their children a religious education.

Registration literature and posters prepared by the Jewish Education Association of New York have been distributed to local

committees throughout the country.

Parents' meetings are being organized and radio programs are being organized to focus attention on the problem of Jewish education.

## Parents Save Son; Call Him Illegitimate

Berlin (WNS)—To save their son, a convert to Christianity, from a long term in prison on a charge of rassenschande a Jewish couple in Frankfurt-am-Main appeared in court and publicly branded him as the illegitimate son of a Christian German.

The mother testified that her son had been born out of wedlock and the father confirmed the mother's testimony, declaring he knew of his wife's so-called affair with the Aryan.

Despite the obvious falsity of the testimony the court accepted it and freed the accused Jew.

## Legionnaires Try to Identify Shell-Shocked War Veteran

New York (WNS)—A veteran of the World War who enlisted in 1917 at Fort Slocum, New York, under the name of Abraham Groman, and then deserted in April, 1918, while serving in France with Company M, 18th Infantry after having been shell-shocked, was the subject of kind attention by the thousands of members of the American Legion here for their annual convention.

Groman, now on relief as an indigent veteran, doesn't remember his name, address or any of his war-time buddies.

His record shows that after the War he enlisted in the U. S. Army five times under the names of Harry Goodman, Abraham Groman, Harry Silver, Albert T. New-

man and Albert Newman.

Four times he deserted and the last time he was honorably discharged. The Legionnaires were asked to try to identify the Jewish veteran who is not really a deserter but a war casualty.

Some visitors have even taken photographs of the benches.

## REFUGEE HECKLED

Stockholm, Sweden (WNS)—Nazi demonstrators created a disturbance at Stockholm University when Dr. David Katz, German-Jewish refugee professor, opened his first lecture in psychology. Police dispersed the crowd which had assembled outside the university.

## Education Week

Regardless of their differences on other questions, most Jews are in accord on the vital importance of Jewish education. No matter what else a Jewish community has to sacrifice, the Talmud Torah and Sunday School are maintained to the last. . .

Yet, it is an undeniable fact that tens of thousands of Jewish children are not getting a Jewish education. Where the blame rests is beside the point. What matters is that a large portion of the future Jewry of the country is growing up without the advantages of a Jewish cultural and religious background.

To remedy this situation is one of the principal objectives of the second annual National Jewish Education Week, which will be observed throughout the country from October 9th to 16th.

Launched last year by the National Council for Jewish Education, Jewish Education Week, which climaxed national Jewish enrollment month, proved of inestimable value in stimulating wide communal interest in the paramount question of Jewish education.

The ambitious but practical program carried out last year with the cooperation of the Jewish Welfare Board and other agencies served to bring to the attention of American Jewry forcefully and dramatically the idea that Jewish education is Jewry's "first line of defense."

It is to be hoped that this year national Jewish Education Week will be even more successful. If the local Jewish communities realize its importance and grasp the opportunity that is theirs they can render invaluable service to the cause of Jewish education, and, in the long run, to Jewry itself.

## Voice of the Legion

It would be extremely unfortunate if the carnival atmosphere that surrounded the annual convention of the American Legion in New York obscured the report of its retiring commander-in-chief, Harry W. Colmery.

Long regarded as a potential reservoir of American Fascism, the Legion heard from its plain-spoken chief some unusually strong and direct language concerning the threat of alienisms to American democracy.

He reserved his bitterest attack for Nazism, assailing hyphenated Americanism and the attempts of Nazi agents to undermine American institutions.

He also called for an investigation of the network of Nazi camps and gave unmistakable proof that the Legion, long the nation's leading exponent of Americanism, has at last been aroused to the menace of Nazism at home.

If Commander Colmery's words have the effect they should we may expect during the coming year to find the Legion standing shoulder to shoulder with other forces committed to unrelenting opposition to Fascism and Nazism in this country.

The Legion has always been a militant foe of Communism.

It now realizes that Fascism and Nazism are as great, if not greater, threats to the ideals and institutions for the preservation of which they fought abroad twenty years ago and then organized the Legion for their defense here.

Whether it is beneath their dignity to attend such a "public event" or if their apathy has dammed up the realization that the Home requires their support, is beyond my comprehension. But the people attending the carnival during the past week have not been Jewish. Our Gentile friends and their children have monopolized the Carnival, and while their support is gratifying and welcome, the real success of the Carnival depends entirely on money contributed by those who can afford the expenditures. Not only are their contributions necessary, but they also help to boost the morale, and furnish definite proof that Providence Jewry is anxious to see the Home progress, and unwilling to see its progress curtailed by lack of funds.

There is a parallel to these circumstances. Recently the Jewish War Veterans ran their carnival, the receipts of which were to reduce the mortgage and swell the relief fund, from which money is donated to the poor. Surely a worthy project! Yet, here again the support of city Jewry was negligible and deplorable.

the top." I sincerely hope that those who read this letter will take this final opportunity to support THEIR Home for Aged.



### Reduce Jail Terms Of Pogrom Victims

Warsaw (WNS)—Concluding the re-trial of three Jews accused of the murder of a Christian who was killed during the Przytyk pogrom of March 9, 1936 in which three Jews suffered fatal injuries, the court of appeals at Lublin upheld the original trial court's finding that the Jews' guilt had been proved but ordered a reduction in their prison terms. The court sliced a year from the eight year sentence of Sholem Lesko, a year from the six year term of Eleizer Kirshenzweig and 18 months from the five year term of Isaac Friedman. Counsel for the Jews have filed an appeal to the highest court in the land.

### Life Not All Honey For "Nutzi" Dictator

#### Constantly Afraid of Assassination

Berlin.—It seems that life is not so simple these days for a dictator. His life must be constantly watched, and his abode carefully guarded, lest some unknown enemy be plotting against him. From one traveler came the following story about Hitler's palace:

"I have just returned from a little town high in the Bavarian hills, which years ago I knew as a pleasant spot, where a stranger could always find a welcome. But a hearty greeting no longer awaits the traveler who arrives in Berchtesgaden, where Hitler has what the Nazis call his country home. Fortress is a more apt description.

"Before a stranger is invited to sign the hotel visitors' book, he is ordered to fill in a document detailing his life's history. Berchtesgaden has been thoroughly purged of all "undesirable elements." There places have been taken by a small army of peasants, none of whom speak the local dialect.

"Their function is to watch strangers, and particularly to see that no one sets out in the direction of the Berghof, home of Der Fuehrer. The Berghof, once a typical Bavarian chalet, is today the most highly fortified palace in the world. There are forty bedrooms. The palace stands on Obersalzberg. An area of 2,500 acres around the mountain is girdled by an electrically charged fence 10 feet high. On the heights are camouflaged anti-aircraft guns. Somewhere near the Berghof cellars have been built, stocked with food and wines of all kinds. From these cellars lead passages. Where they go to, nobody knows.

"In the surrounding forests are a number of small buildings, which would pass as peasants' cottages. They house Hitler's bodyguard. Machine guns are trained from the windows. Within this ring of men and guns, Hitler rules Germany for a few hours every morning. The rest of the day he devotes to studying architecture, despite the fact that the Vienna Academy of Arts refused him admission as a young man.

### Nazi Backing May Act as Boomerang

New York—The pronouncements of Nazi leaders, especially the Stuttgart speech of Propaganda Minister Goebbels, concerning German intentions to maintain their hold upon Germans living abroad, drew the fire of the New York Herald Tribune, which in an editorial last week, asserted that they were acting against the Germans living in other lands by attempting to claim authority over their countrymen.

"The more Nazis try to stir up the Germans in other lands," the editorial stated, "the more they fix in the minds of the surrounding peoples that German minorities are a menace, and that they must be dealt with as quickly as possible before their demands are reinforced by German arms."

### Polish Jews Vexed by American Inheritance

Warsaw (WNS)—The traditional tale of the millionaire Jew in America or South Africa who bequeathed his fortune to his poverty-stricken kinsmen in Poland has cropped again here.

This time it concerns a certain Jacob Pollak of Chicago who is said to have left \$6,000,000 to his Polish relatives.

Press reports indicate that the bequest was confirmed by the American consul but Pollak's relatives are not yet convinced. They are sending a delegation to Chicago to check.

### Arab Who Plotted Against Emir Abdullah's Life is Put on Trial

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The trial of an Arab accused of an attempted assassination of Emir Abdullah of Transjordan opened at Amman, with some of the testimony believed to be so sensational as to necessitate in camera hearings for part of the time.

The court action brings into the open a series of alleged murder attempts on the life of the Emir by foes antagonistic to his relations to Great Britain.

The man brought to trial is the sub-manager of the Arab bank.

Testimony thus far developed indicates that he was a member of an Arab group in Jerusalem which organized the unsuccessful attack upon the Moslem sovereign. Two members of the Hussein family of Jerusalem, which is headed by the Mufti, were arrested at the same time as the bank sub-manager, but were later released for lack of evidence linking them to the plot.

The Arab paper, Al Carmel, of Haifa, reports the discovery of a new conspiracy against Abdullah. A bomb is said to have been found inside his car.

## Eight Arabs Get Jail Sentences for Shooting at Jewish Colonies

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Moving to stamp out terrorism, the police secured the sentencing of eight Arabs to varying prison terms after they had been charged with participation in shooting at Jews.

Four of the Arabs were arrested in Safed in connection with the shooting of a Jewish ghaffir, Perlmutter. K. W. Blackburn, Assistant District Commission for the North, took administrative action in sentencing each of the four to one month's imprisonment at Acre Jail under the emergency regulations.

A well-known Arab agitator of Safed, who escaped sentence when arrested six months ago, has been seized and sent to Acre. Three other Arabs were arrested at Kafr in connection with the shooting at a Jewish house in Rosh Pina. They were also sentenced to Acre.

Subhi el Khadra, notorious Arab agitator, escaped one police charge but was immediately thereafter sentenced, under another provision of the law, to a year's detention at Acre prison.

He was tried as a result of a search made by the police on the headquarters of the Arab Higher Committee in Jerusalem on July 17th. He was acquitted when police withdrew charges against him.

But now the Prevention-of-Crime Ordinance was invoked against him and he was sentenced to a year at Acre. Khadra was one of the leaders of the 1936 general strike and was charged with being the ringleader of the massacre of Jews in Safed in 1929.

## May Refuse Food Or Shelter to Jews

Berline (WNS)—Jews may legally be deprived of food and shelter by Aryans, the Nazi Party Korrespondenz ruled in a statement upholding the right of Aryans to refuse to sell food or rent rooms to Jews.

"Any German can, if he is so inclined, refuse to sell to a Jew any food supplies or objects of common usage, or to rent him rooms to live," the news agency declared.

The party organ also declared it to be "a duty" to exclude Jews from vacation resorts and recognized the right of Aryans to post signs that no Jews were allowed.

## Street Named For Him



JUSTICE BRANDEIS

Boston (WNS)—As soon as Mayor Mansfield signs a bill passed by the city council Blue Hill Avenue, in a heavily populated Jewish district of Dorchester and Roxbury will become known as Brandeis Avenue, in honor of Supreme Court Justice Louis D. Brandeis, who started his great career in this city.

## Venezuela Reduces Fees for Refugees

Berlin (WNS)—A 50 per cent decrease, from 1,000 to 500 bolivars (\$125) in the amount of deposit required of immigrants to Venezuela was reported here by the Hilfsverein, German Jewry's central relief agency.

This reduction is expected to lead to an increase in immigration to Venezuela which is regarded as offering good prospects for agriculturists and artisans with limited capital. Only German Jews stand to benefit because Venezuela bars the entry of East European and stateless Jews.

## Anti-Fascist Vets Of England Disband

London (WNS)—Having accomplished a major job of combatting Fascism in England, especially in the East End of London, the Ex-Servicemen's National Movement, founded early in 1936 to mobilize war veterans against Fascism, has disbanded in order to eliminate friction with the British Legion and other older veterans organizations.

The movement had a membership of over 5,000.

In announcing the dissolution, Mr. Harris, president, said that the movement had attracted the most active supporters of democracy from the British Legion, thus leaving the field comparatively free in the Legion to advocates of Fascism. It is understood that most members of the Ex-Servicemen's Movement will join the Legion:

## Arab Found Dead Near Jewish Colony

### Arab Trespassers Cause Shooting

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—An Arab was found dead and two others were reported wounded near the Jewish settlement of Hassadeh at the western end of the Beisan Valley.

A police report states that two Arabs, who trespassed with their flocks on Kvutzath Hassadeh lands, were fired upon by ghaffirs and were both wounded. Later, two Jewish ghaffirs were arrested for allegedly firing upon the Arabs.

An investigation into the death of the Arab and the wounding of the others is still in progress. The colonists report that the guards fired only after a heavy barrage of stoning from Arab shepherds when they had been ordered not to trespass upon the colony grounds. Hassadeh was established in January, 1937.

ing partition of the territory; recalling the assurances given in that connection by the representatives of the United Kingdom on the subject of immigration, The Council agrees on the outcarrying by the United Kingdom Government of the aforesaid study and the taking of such steps as it may force until such time as otherwise decided, defers consideration of the substance of the question until the Council is in a position to deal with it as a whole; and, in the meantime, entirely reserves its opinion and its decision."
