### A Place in the Sun

"Germany is a major power, and as such deserves a place in the Sun." These words express the policy of Neville Chamberlain and in part, explains the Munich Pact; and we can expect now that England will concede the major portion of the colonies that Germany lost after the war.

The Nazi contention that her present position was adversely affected by foreign exchange and raw material lost through the colonies is easily refuted.

In 1911 a typical pre-war year, the exports from all German colonies to the Homeland were \$10,525,000. In that same year, Germany imported raw materials to the enormous sum of \$1,350,000,000.

The following are items a few of the African colonies produce: The leading product of Southwest Africa—6/10 of 1 per cent of the world's copper production; 1.3 per cent lead; 1/10 of 1 per cent tin. In former German East Africa there is 1/10 of 1 per cent of the world production of gold, and the same proportion of cotton. From the paucity of these figures it is evident, therefore that Germany's demands for colonies is to satisfy the imperialistic desires of her leaders and to throw more dust into the eyes of the German nation. By the time Hitler and Chamberlain complete their negotiations one obvious fact will be discernible—that Germany won the World War.

### Economic Security

A frontal attack on economic insecurity has just been announced by General Motors.

Backed by the vast resources of this giant industrial organization, the General Motors Security Plan, in brief, guarantees to all hourly-wage employees with five years' standing that their income shall never fall below 60 per cent of normal.

The company does this through a loan setup. But these loans bear no interest and are to be repaid in work not cash.

The American people are not content to remain insecure. General Motors sets an example to all industry by showing that it is prepared to risk a substantial outlay in the name of security and the common good.

### "Planned Incident"

When Hitler was considering methods of how to obtain control of Austria, it was suggested to him that an "incident" be created, in which Vop Pappen, the Nazi Ambassador to Vienna, would be murdered by a member of the Dolfuss party. This would provide an excuse for Hitler to invade Austria; and secondly, rid the Nazis of Von Pappen who had become a thorn in their stride. Von Pappen, fortunately learned of the plan and managed to escape. As the Nazis could not decide upon another victim, they had to drop that line of attack.

But, the recent murder of Vom Rath by the seventeen-year-old Polish Jew, following the registration of all Jewish property, recalls this incident of three years ago. It is very possible that this "incident" was created, for the method employed is similar to that in the Von Pappen case, even to Vom Rath's being an "undesirable."

Considered in this light, the Nazi retaliation is more shameful and deplorable.

Suspicion that the assassination of Vom Rath was not an accident but a planned "incident" was expressed this week by Ludwig Lore in his column "Behind the Cables," which appears daily in the New York Post.

"The German Government was determined from the start" says Mr. Lore, "to use the death of Vom Rath for extortion purposes from the Jews. Everyone must see it clearly now. Indeed, one wonders whether this was really an afterthought or whether Goering had just an 'incident' in mind when he ordered the registration of all Jewish property six months ago."

"There are those who believe," Mr. Lore continued, "who believe that the assassination was a second Reichstag Fire. They argue that a seventeen-year old Polish Jew under ordinary circumstances would hardly have been admitted into the presence of any man of importance in a Nazi embassy. That there are Jewish Nazi agents in all European refugee centers is well known and

### Demand Reprisals On Foreign Jews

Nazis Suggest Confiscation

BERLIN. — Das Schwarze Korps, organ of the Nazi SS (Blackshirt Elite Guards), has an article urging that the savings of Jews be confiscated as reprisal for what it termed world Jewry's fight against Nazi Germany.

The article also takes the position that all Jews, irrespective of what passports they may hold, should be treated as "subjects of a power conducting war against us."

This would make Jews holding American or other foreign citizenship subject to Nazi anti-Semitic decrees while in Germany.

"We must compensate ourselves with the hoardings of Jews for the economic injury inflicted upon us by world Jewry and for the harm we sustain due to the fact that Jewry's incitation to war compels us constantly to increase our armaments," is the SS organ's argument.

German Jews, the article declares, have been treated too liberally.

### 'Kansas Hitler' Appointment Arouses Anti-Nazi League

LOS ANGELES. — Her appointment of Dr. Gerald B. Winrod, the "Kansas Hitler" as a guest preacher involved Evangelist Aimee Semple McPherson in a controversy this week with labor circles, the clergy and the Anti-Nazi League, who accused Winrod, recently defeated in the Kansas Republican Senatorial primary, of being anti-Semitic, a Nazi and a religious bigot.

Evangelist McPherson announced to her flock that Winrod, "an internationally known Fundamentalist," would take her place while she recuperated from an illness.

The Hollywood Anti-Nazi League, over the signature of Donald Ogden Stewart, telegraphed her asking that she gets another substitute.

### Streicher Suggests Old Testament Ban

BERLIN. — Julius Streicher, leader of the extreme anti-Jewish element in the Nazi Party, intimated in a speech at Nuremberg this week that at Old Testament might be excluded from schools as a religious instruction.

"Germany's teachers will cease immediately to recount the untrue Jewish hero tales, as they have heretofore been forced to do, and will now preach Christ's true word's," he said.

### Mexico Bars 21 Hitler Refugees

MEXICO CITY. — Twenty-one German and Austrian Jewish refugees, refused admittance to Mexico, sailed for Germany from Vera Cruz in the German steamship Orinoco last week after they had been shuttled back and forth between Vera Cruz and Tampico awaiting a decision.

Only one refugee, Adalbert Anholt, a political refugee, was permitted to land.

It was reported in reliable quarters that the government also sent back in the same ship about twenty Jews who arrived here a month ago, ostensibly as tourists but actually indigent refugees.

### Einstein to Teach Math. at Princeton

J. — A 500,000 School of Mathematics, with Prof. Albert Einstein to be a member of the staff, is to be built on the outskirts of Princeton as the first building of the Institute for Advanced Study, founded in 1930 by Louis Bamberger and his sister, Mrs. Felix Fuld, with an initial endowment of \$5,000,000, according to an announcement by Dr. Abraham Flexner, director of

## Highlights of the Week's News

### Humpty-Dumpty Rides to a Fall

HONOLULU: — A suppressed desire to fly one of the Navy's big bombers became reality this week when Ben Feigelman of Brooklyn, a mechanic attached to the squadron at Luke Field, climbed into a plane, and despite its many intricate gadgets, took off safely.

Surrounding the field were a number of hills, one of which refused to duck when Feigelman came by. After the pieces were picked up, it was discovered that Feigelman suffered only minor cuts on the face. He will face court martial at a later date.

### Catholics Deny Taxation Charge

MUNICH. — While 5,000 Catholics celebrated the tercentenary of the erection of Mariensaule column, erected in honor of the Virgin Mary, a group of hooligans interrupted the ceremonies, and knocked down candles and trampled floral decorations.

In Vienna Cardinal Innitzer denounced a "malicious invention," the rumor that a new tax was to be imposed on the church. He charged that Nazis were campaigning, to persuade children under fourteen years of age to register against religious instruction.

### Pawt. GOP Ask for Registration Lists

Enlarging their investigation, members of the Republican Party's Committee on Election Frauds, this week continued their attempt to obtain a certified copy of the registration lists of voters on the books of Pawtucket, and requested Secretary of State Louis Cappelli for a list of lathmen and voting machine inspectors, throughout the State during the last election.

### Safety Drive In High Gear

Throwing the safety guide into

higher gear, members of the Providence Police Department this week announced that all motor vehicle laws would be strictly enforced.

While the fatality figure since the first of the year stood at nine today, as compared with 36 at the same period a year ago, the police are exerting their efforts to reduce accidents during the coming dangerous weeks to the same proportion.

### Lion of Judah Shorn of Mane

Haille Selassie, lion of Judah, was notified this week that Britain no longer recognized him as king of Ethiopia. This was the first action of Great Britain in recognizing Ethiopia as part of the Italian Empire. Members of the exiled king's staff, who through the Pact became Italian citizens, were offered an opportunity to become British subjects.

### Present City Charter Scored

Stressing the features of "proportional representation," Edward S. Brackett, Jr., secretary of the Charter league, told members of the American Association of the University of Women this week, that the set-ups advocated by the Charter League of a smaller council of nine members, a city manager, and a civil planning and budgeting council, would give the government of the city back to its citizens. "The present status of the city Charter," Mr. Brackett said, "is riddled with weaknesses."

### General Motors Security Project

NEW YORK. — Security for its workers was assured this week under a plan announced by Alfred P. Sloan, chairman of the General Motors Corporation.

Effective in 1939, it will be available for workers, having a record of two years or more work for General Motors. By the plan, each employee is assured that in each week, during the year, his income will not be less than 60 per cent of a standard weekly earnings. The plan assures greater security for those who have been employed for five years or more by General Motors.

### Adler Reports R. I. Camp Surplus

A surplus of \$429.38 was reported at the annual meeting of the Rhode Island Camps, Inc., by Ernest L. Anderson, treasurer. Receipts totaled \$4,113.45 and disbursements were \$3,648.07 for the summer season of 1938.

Walter Adler, president, reported that 280 children attended the camp in two-week periods from July 10 to September 4. The camp has facilities for 96 children.

## World Opinion Seen As Hope For Jewry

At an Inter-Faith Conference, held last Sunday night at Temple Emanuel, hope was seen for Jewry in a strong array of world opinion against Hitler.

More than 300 persons, attending the conference, heard both Rabbi Morris Schussheim of Temple Beth-Israel, and Rev. Robert H. Schacht, Jr. of the First Congregational Unitarian Church, denounce the latest persecution by Nazi leaders.

"As Christians, as Jews and as plain humanitarians and believers in democracy, we are shocked, dismayed and horrified," said the Rev. Schacht. Rabbi Schussheim, however, cautioned the listeners that the "situation is not so hopeless as might be indicated. The sphere of action," Rabbi Schussheim said, "is to conserve the ideals which have made civilization possible."

## Paris Expect Rise In Anti-Semitism

## Epistle To Jehovah

Dear Jehovah:

You will pardon this informal greeting, but You see, the Ryskinds—Your records will confirm this—have been Jews for goodness knows how many centuries, and I will always think of You as one of the family.

Your name has been a byword in our household for generations, and although You haven't been around lately, they still talk of the times You used to come and visit the Mespocha. My late grandfather, one of Your fervent admirers, never got tired of telling me of the days You went walking with Noah, and the long talks You had with Moses; and many is the laugh (Reverend understand me) we had together over the time Abraham beat You down with fifty righteous to ten. Of course, I realize that Abraham didn't really get anything out of it, because, if I recall the story, You went right ahead and destroyed the cities. Nevertheless I like the principle of the thing.

### JUST AN OLD STORY

I could go on like that forever, but it would just be an old story to You. I just want to make it clear that Your works have left a distinct impression on the Ryskinds. And when I say Your works I mean Your works, and none of this new testament stuff. Oh, I'm not denying that occasionally one of the boys would turn agnostic. But—so far, at any rate, there hasn't been a reformed Jew in the bunch. And that is a pretty good record for the Chosen People, if I do say it.

### ABOUT CHOOSING SOMEONE ELSE

And, speaking of the Chosen People, that is what I wanted to talk to You about. What I mean is, I'm wondering if it wouldn't be possible for us to keep on being Jews, and still not be the Chosen People. Please don't misunderstand me, Lord. I'm deeply appreciative of the honor You conferred on us. And, it would be alright if You alone had chosen us.

But, You know what happened. After You chose us, it got to be the vogue. The first thing we knew, everybody was choosing us. There was that time in Egypt when the Pharaohs needed more slaves—so they chose us. And then the Babylonians and the Greeks and the Romans all chose us. And the Spanish Inquisition—and the Russians—and now—it's Hitler.

### INTERFERE WITH WORK

Of course, we don't mean to be rude, and we are deeply grateful to all these people, but all these social functions cut into our work terribly. There is always so

much to be done—especially in these days—and a fellow simply can't do his best work when he's been out late to a pogrom the night before. I don't want to be narrow-minded about it; I'm not saying that a pogrom once in a while isn't a good thing. But, right now, it's two and three pogroms a week and how long can anybody keep that up? So, if You could find it convenient to just lay off us for a little while—say for a century or two—we would be very much obliged. If You could choose some Goyim for a change, we could probably get some things done in this cockeyed world. And when I say Goyim, I don't mean just Schwarza, either. They've got it tough enough now.

Such a moral might give Einstein a chance to work out something in science. Furthermore, it might stop Ludwig Lewisohn from writing about the Jewish problem. Ludwig is a brilliant writer, but we all have begun to wish he would find himself a new theme song. If that is all we got out of it, it would be worth while.

"We are gratified over the abandonment of the partition plan which we have always regarded as fantastic, dangerous and impractical," he said.

Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American-Jewish Committee said: "I have been steadily of the opinion that there ought to be a conference of Jews and Arabs under the auspices of the British Government."


### Graded Curricula Arranged in Schools

**50,000 ARRESTED**  
Fifty thousand Jews have been arrested in Germany in the Nazi campaign of persecution, it was estimated this week.

**NAZIS WARN U. S.**  
The German press sternly warned the United States against expressions of indignation, emphasizing that Propaganda Minister Goebbels' threat of reprisals was meant "damn seriously."

**"EYE FOR EYE" WITH HOSTAGES**  
The official organ of the SS Guards declared the Jewish hostages would be subjected to the principle of an eye for an eye "no matter how shocking some people may find it."

**AMBASSADOR RECALLED**  
United States Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson leaves Berlin on the urgent order of the State Department to report on Nazi outrages against Jews and Catholics.

In Washington, Wilson's summons home was interpreted as an official manifestation of the Government's disapproval of the Nazis' persecution of minorities.

**U. S. LEADERS PROTEST**  
Senator King of Utah demanded that diplomatic relations with Germany be severed if the oppression continues. He joined former President Hoover, Alfred M. Landon and church leaders in protesting the German anti-Semitic program.

**NAZI-FRENCH ACCORD**  
A French Government spokesman announced that a basis had been reached for an accord with Germany by which the two countries would renounce war against each other.

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass.—Pro-Nazi sentiment among the students of Williams College, on the campus of which has been held the famous Williamstown Institute on Human Relations, was revealed when the Liberal Club sent a letter to Fritz Kuhn, leader of the German-American Bund, inviting him to address the club November 20, or December 5, but offering him any date "you might have free."

Signed by the president of the club, the letter said that "our use of the word liberal (listen to all sides in search of the truth) is not to be confused with the word 'liberal' (radical.) Because of this very fundamental principle, we would like to hear you and your side of the picture.

A goodly number of students here went to Europe this summer and returned much impressed by the ideals and efficiency in the Greater Germany. We know that at present our government isn't run efficiently as possible. Could you help us to know the way out? Or even clear up some matter which you think might be imperative." The club offered to pay his expenses and "any nominal fee."

## U. S. Leaders Join Protest Against Nazis Spur Refugee Relief Work

A wave of indignation at Nazi Germany's latest and most savage persecution of Jews swept the nation this week, led by clergymen and laymen of every denomination.

Official action by the United States Government was demanded by many of these spokesmen for the public, and organizations formed to aid refugees from Nazi terrorism planned expansion of their work.

Leading the condemnation of the German Government were Herbert Hoover, Sinclair Lewis, Norman Thomas, Bishop William T. Manning, William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, and Bishop G. Bromley O'Znam of Omaha, spokesman of the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Under the leadership of the National Conference of Jews and Christians, leaders of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant churches issued calls for a special day of prayer to be held next week end.

A number of organizations, including the Social Democratic Federation of the United States, asked President Roosevelt to protest to Germany.

The American Society for Race Tolerance demanded that the President follow the example of President Theodore Roosevelt, who recommended abrogation of a trade treaty with Czarist Russia as a protest against the 1904 pogroms in that country.

## Jewish Underground To France Detected




