Austrian Jews Alarmed; Fear Restrictions

*Marjorie Hillis, Writer,
To Speak at Center Sun.*

Marjorie Hillis, famous exponent of the theory of "Live Alone and Like It" will appear at the Jewish Community Center, Sunday evening, February 27 at 8.30 o'clock in the eighth of the major programs for this season.

Only a little more than a year ago, Marjorie Hillis stepped into country wide prominence as the woman who lived alone and dared to tell about it. And now she has come forward with a new book "Orchids on Your Budget," which tells women how to get along smartly on what they have.

This book was written as a direct result of "Live Alone and Like It." Letters from Miss Hillis' readers were numerous, and many of them contained the same note: "What do we use for money?" Accepting the challenge, Miss Hillis wrote her new book designed for every woman, wives and mothers as well as the unattached.

The slender volume "Live Alone and Like It" appeared on the first of August, 1936 and immediately stepped into the best seller class. It has aroused great interest in the problem of the "extra woman" which a more glamorous term that the "old maid" of yesterday.

From her former position on the editorial staff of Vogue, Marjorie Hillis has had ample opportunity to study women from every angle. She herself has lived alone for several years and can speak from her own experience.

NEW YORK — The withdrawal of Arturo Toscanini from this year's Salzburg Festival, because of "unsettled conditions in Austria," and a change in beneficiaries of the concert he was to have given for the festival were announced this week.

A major drawing card of the last four Salzburg Festivals, Toscanini was to have conducted five operas and several concerts.

"Owing to the unsettled conditions in Austria as reported in the American press this week," he said, in a statement issued through the National Broadcasting Company, "I have decided to abandon my plans to go to Salzburg for this year's music festival."

Only Beginning For Hitler, Says Dodd

Austria Only Step in Program

Rochester, N. Y.—William E. Dodd, former United States Ambassador to Berlin, foresees further "bold strokes" in Hitler's program.

Speaking here Dr. Dodd asserted that Nazification of Austria and Hitler's demands for return of pre-war colonies "are only steps in the program."

"Austria," he declared, "is substantially annexed by Germany as another advance of the Nazi program."

Dr. Dodd warned that "the Nazi program is not a passing political fad," and continued:—

"The Nazis think they have the greatest system ever devised, and they believe in twenty-five years they will have 85,000,000 people,

German Refugee Dentist Found Murdered in Chicago

Chicago — Authorities dug thru a trunk of documents, Nazi and anti-Nazi literature in an effort to solve the murder of Dr. Max Sammet, said to a Jewish refugee from Germany.

Dr. Sammet, formerly a wealthy dentist, was found shot to death under steps leading to a gloomy, unoccupied residence on the West Side. Two bullets entered his skull. It appeared also he had been slugged on the head.

Temple Group Bans Browder's Speech

CEDARHURST, L. I.—The Men's Club of Temple Beth-El canceled an invitation to Earl Browder, general secretary of the Communist Party, to address it on March 13 after hearing an address by Martin W. Littleton, former District Attorney, who suggested that free speech be denied to those "who try to overthrow the Constitution by violence."

Littleton did not refer directly to Browder, who was to have presented the Communist viewpoint on "Present Clashing Political Philosophies."

Members of the club said Littleton's address had convinced them they should not permit Browder to speak.

The trunk containing German political literature was found in Dr. Sammet's room in a neighborhood hotel not far from the scene of the slaying.

The doctor's wife, Mrs. Inga Sammet, a dental assistant, was reported to have said in New York:

"I can't understand it. He was a peaceful man and avoided trouble of any kind.

The victim, a war hero and a practicing dentist for 15 years in Germany, came to Chicago last September and had been studying dentistry at the University of Illinois Dental School to acquaint himself with American methods.

Dr. Sammet still wore his expensive fur-lined overcoat when his body was found and a wrist watch, ring and wallet containing \$14, had not been touched by his assassin.

Ban Placed on Demonstrations

Vienna—The gaiety of old Vienna has been dampened. Vienna streets are patrolled by hundreds of police. Six Jews have committed suicide. Hospitals have admitted many others, suffering from nervous collapse. All this, since the Viennese learned the significance of the Berchtesgaden pact of February 12, which admitted Nazi influence to the government of the republic.

Police, acting firmly under new instructions from Chancellor Kurt Von Schuschnigg, closed the university building this week as the result of noisy, though minor clashes between Nazi and anti-Nazi students. A four-week ban has been imposed by the chancellor on political demonstrations, after giving Nazis three days in which to celebrate the new agreement with Germany.

It was expected that this week would show whether, as more and more people believed, the Chancellor had won a diplomatic victory or must leave office. It was predicted that his ban on demonstrations might decide his fate as Chancellor.

Seven Nations Sign Nazi Refugee Pact

Geneva—Seven European governments meeting here in convention signed an agreement for the regulation of the legal status of German refugees, concluding a five-day intergovernmental conference. The agreement goes into effect in March.

The signatories are Britain, Spain, Belgium, France, the Netherlands, Denmark and Norway. Reservations were made, however, in reference to the sections dealing with social relief and regarding the application of the agreement to colonies and protectorates.

Good Will Service at Temple Beth-Israel

In accordance with the national brotherhood week, Rabbi Schussheim invited Rev. Richard W. Seebode, minister of the Westminster Unitarian Church to occupy the pulpit of Temple Beth Israel, Friday night, February 26.

Rev. Seebode succeeded Rev. Everett M. Baker, former pastor of the Westminster Unitarian Congregation, who spoke at Temple Beth Israel several times and was one of the leading liberal ministers in Providence. Rev. Seebode's topic was: "Brotherhood Between Jew and Christian."

Jewish Students Ask Il Duce for Protection

Rome—Repeated attacks on Jewish students at the University of Pisa have led the Jewish undergraduates to appeal for protection directly to Premier Mussolini. For several weeks, Jewish students have been subjected to insults and physical violence. One

Question Kuhn on Aims of Nazis Here

NEW YORK—American war veterans, labor and other organizations are dealing vigorous blows against the spread of the Nazi influence in the United States.

In Buffalo, N. Y., members of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Jewish War Veterans engaged in a free-for-all when angered by display of the swastika on the speaker's platform at a Nazi meeting.

In Rochester, plans for a Nazi meeting were abandoned when Nazi leaders were frightened away by the appearance of 50 American Legionnaires. In Syracuse, more than 100 members of the American Legion, headed by Commander Dwight C. Dale, marched into a meeting at which Kunze presided and subjected him to grilling concerning his political beliefs and the aims in America of the Bund.

Organized labor in Reading, Pa. through George M. Rhodes, president of the Federated Trades Council, announced it would fight any attempt to establish a Nazi camp in its area, as proposed by Fritz Kuhn, national Bund leader.

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Trojan Horse in Vienna

The capitulation of Austria to the amazing demands of Germany is a striking demonstration of the failure of the League of Nations' policy. Hitler's reunion with Vienna might have been avoided, with its dangerous implications, if the League had not so obstinately, before Hitler's advent, refused to permit Austria and Germany to unite.

Here we have an independent nation being told by Germany that she must include in her government men notoriously friendly to Germany on pain of inviting a Nazi coup d'etat. And rather than invite bloodshed the Schuschnigg government accepted the ultimatum and turned the ministries of the interior and foreign affairs to Hitler's men.

In exchange Germany is supposed to have agreed to discontinue Nazi propaganda in Austria. Knowing something of the value of Hitler's promises, the public will question the value of his latest pledge.

All that Austria has done, it is quite generally agreed, is to open its gates to a Nazi Trojan horse. Ultimately Germany will completely swallow Austria despite its pledge to respect her independence. Already there is talk of coordinating German and Austrian armies and foreign affairs.

To the Jews of Austria this bloodless Nazi coup spells danger. Nazi propaganda against Austrian independence may be curtailed for a time but with Nazis in key places in Vienna the Jewish position, already undermined by a cold pogrom, will inevitably become worse.

In effect, the Jews of Austria will now be governed by decisions reached in Berlin. Austro-German anschluss is in the offing but it has already been achieved so far as the Jews are concerned.
