Jewish Radicalism Denied at Conference

Propaganda Tells Paradoxical Tale

Pittsburgh.—Problems confronting Jews were discussed in study groups at the fifteenth triennial convention of the National Council of Jewish Women.

Whether Jews have a predilection toward radicalism was discussed by a group led by Dr. Herman Hailpern, Rabbi of the Tree of Life Synagogue of Pittsburgh, who declared "it is just as easy to 'prove' that the Jews are conservatives as it is to 'prove' that the Jews are, in the main, radicals."

Shows Paradoxical Picture

The paradoxical picture to be found in current anti-semitic literature paints the Jew on one hand as the international banker and on the other hand as the international Jewish Communist and radical, Dr. Hailpern said.

Berlin—Jews in possession of passports have been ordered to visit police stations so that the words "valid for travel inside and outside Germany" may be cancelled and the words "valid for inland travel" substituted, it was announced today.

Under new rules Jews will be authorized to travel abroad only for specific purposes, mainly emigration.

Junior Hadassah Meets Monday at Biltmore



New York—Catholic nuns and Jewish rabbis are teaching their respective religion simultaneously to 7-year-old Mario Alexay, son of a Jewish father and a Catholic mother, while he is in the custody of the Children's Society, pending the outcome of a legal battle over his custody.

His father, Alexander Alexay, a musician, divorced the boy's mother, Elvira Maria Alexay, and remarried. Mrs. Alexay complains she was not advised of the divorce.

B'nai B'rith President Will Address Local Jewry Wed.

Alfred M. Cohen, world president of B'nai B'rith for the past twelve years, will address Providence Jewry next Wednesday evening, February 9, at Temple Beth-El.

A former United States Senator, Mr. Cohen served two terms in the Ohio Senate and two terms as President of the Ohio Electoral College. He has been a member of the Board of Governors of the Hebrew Union College for thirty-five years, and for nineteen years has also served as chairman of the Board. A few years ago he was awarded a Bachelor of Hebrew Laws degree by the Hebrew Union College.

Committee Delegates Pledge Co-operation

A resolution opposing the plan for partition of Palestine as recently proposed by a British Royal Commission, and pledging cooperation, in bringing about a "just, equitable and workable solution of the Palestine problem," was unanimously adopted last week at the thirty-first annual meeting of the American Jewish Committee in New York. The all-day session was attended by 350 delegates from all over the country.

The Committee also urged passage of a resolution introduced into the United States Senate by Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania, calling on the government to employ its good offices to prevent the threatened execution of proposed anti-Jewish measures in Roumania.

Yale Janitor Admits Pro-Nazi Activities

Southbury, Conn.—While petitions to Governor Cross and national officials were pouring in from all sections of the state protesting against the establishment of a pro-Nazi camp here, it became known this week that Heinz Greis, chairman of the German-American Bund in this area, is employed as a janitor at Timothy Dwight College of Yale University.

Greis readily admits his pro-Nazi activities and his connection with Yale University.

To Hold Annual Boy Scout Sabbath Feb. 11

Dr. Allen E. Claxton, Minister of the Trinity Union Church, and former president of the Rhode Island Minister's Association, will be the speaker at the Annual Scout Sabbath of Temple Emanu-El, to be held on Friday evening, February 11. The Jewish boy and girl scouts of the city of Providence will be the special guests.

78,000 FREE MEALS

New York — A total of 78,716 free meals and 26,404 packages were given to needy Jews in Berlin through the Judische Heimspesung (Jewish Home Food Service) in Berlin during 1937, partly with the aid of funds sent from America, according to a report received this week by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee.

Nazis Suppress Streicher's Paper

Anti-Semitic Sheet Banned Indefinitely

Berlin.—The Propaganda Ministry said that Der Stuermer, newspaper of Julius Streicher, anti-Semitic leader, has been banned indefinitely and that a special number which was to have been issued was confiscated. No explanation was given.

The last regular issue of the newspaper Wednesday also was confiscated. This issue announced that the special number would deal with the problem of laws affecting Jews.

In the regular issue the newspaper criticized the Foreign Exchange Control Office, charging that it granted foreign exchange to Jews so that they could study at a religious school at Basle, Switzerland.

An advertisement for the special issue said that it would be entitled "Death Penalty for Race Contaminators," and promised an expose on "the studied violation of German women and girls by Jews."

Dickstein Maps War on Nazi Bund

Washington — Representative Samuel J. Dickstein (Dem., N. Y.) prepared to press for a Congressional investigation of the activities of the German-American Bund in the United States, climaxing a nationwide investigation of the organization by the Department of Justice.

Dickstein said he thought that an investigation was necessary. He charged that, according to his own evidence, the members "have been using guns in target practice."

Hoover Supplies Data

A comprehensive report on the organization was submitted to Attorney General Homer Cummings by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Protest Anti-Reich Exhibit in Paris

Berlin — It was asserted semi-officially that the Government had protested to the French Government against an anti-Nazi exhibition opened in Paris in connection with the fifth anniversary of the Nazi accession to power.

Rabbinical College Has Committee Meeting

A committee meeting was held last week at the home of Mrs. Morris Dlutny on Taft avenue for the Rabbinical College of Lithuania. Guests for the afternoon were Rabbi Teitz and Rabbi Mail of the Rabbinical College, who gave addresses on activities of the college, and the need for supporting it. During the past month, the local group has sent \$125. to the college.

*that Yiddish has influenced American speech in a number of surprising ways, and in proof of his thesis he cites such widely used expressions as **YOU'RE TELLING ME, GO AND DRESS YOURSELF** and also such colorful words as **SCHNORRER, SCHMALTZ, MAZUMA, GEFILTE FISH, NEBICH, FINIF** and **GUNIF**.

Jimmie Durante's **SCHNOZZLE**, which is undoubtedly a great American institution, **BETTER ENGLISH** points out, is a combination of the Yiddish word **SCHNOBLE** and the English word **NOZZLE**. The distinctly American slang

Derivation of Words Given

phrase "son of a gun" has its origin in the Yiddish-Oriental curse "son of a thief"—gun is derived from "gunif", the Yiddish word for THIEF.

Other flavorsome Americanisms that are of distinctly Yiddish origin are: **KIBITZER, SHOFUL, BELIEVE ME, AND HOW, SO WHAT, DON'T ASK, GIVE A RUN, KOSHER, ZAPTIG** and many others. Which only goes to show that American speech and folklore are enriched from many alien sources,

Demand Whalen Lift Horrors Ban

Boycott Council Sponsors Protest

New York—New York's 1939 World's Fair will open with a gigantic picket line around it unless officials remove their ban on a "Chamber of Horrors" exhibit portraying conditions in Nazi Germany.

Formation of the picket line was pledged last night at a "Peace and Democracy Rally" at the Manhattan Opera House under auspices of the Joint Boycott Council of the American Jewish Congress and the Jewish Labor Committee.

Hitler's Fifth Anniversary

The occasion for the meeting was the observance of the fifth anniversary of the Hitler regime. Mr. Tenenbaum said that there would have been no Hitler in 1934 and no armament race in 1938 "had the Catholics, the Protestants and the democratic countries in general joined labor and the Jews in a worldwide boycott of Nazi Germany in 1933."

"It is time," he added, "after five years of suffering and dilly-dallying to call the Hitler bluff in a manner so decisive and uncompromising as to leave no doubt as to our intention."

Fire Enlivens Directors Meeting at Orphanage

More excitement than had been anticipated was provided last Wednesday evening at the Board of Directors meeting of the Jewish Orphanage, when fire broke out in the office of the Summit avenue building, destroying a desk, a rug and several wooden filing cabinets.

Meeting in an adjacent room, the board was hearing the annual report of Maurice Stollerman, superintendent, when Mrs. Stollerman rushed into the room crying, "Fire!" Behind her billowing smoke and flames which leaped to the ceiling, brought the twenty-five board members to their feet.

President Walter I. Sundlun, Mrs. Stollerman and most of the board members raced upstairs to the dormitory, where they began to awaken and dress the children. Smoke was filling the entire build-

ing. Mrs. Stollerman, the board members and other officials of the home reassured the sleepy-eyed children, helped them don their bathrobes and gather personal belongings and guided them down the rear stairway to the fireproof recreation room. The children moved without panic, and remained in the recreation room until the fire was brought under control.

Meanwhile, three alarms had been turned in. Windows were opened to allow the smoke to escape from the home, and the children walked happily upstairs again and were tucked into their beds.

The board resumed its meeting. Mr. Sundlun praised the members for their quick action and "cool-headed efficiency." The estimated damage was small.

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Propaganda at Our Back Door

A propaganda invasion of South and Central America by Italy and Germany was revealed this week by Dean Carl W. Ackerman of the Columbia School of Journalism in his annual report.

Italian and German news agencies, he says, offer all newspapers daily cable news from Europe, regular photographic and features services, free of all expense.

In addition to press and cinema, the most influential form of foreign propaganda comes by radio from Rome and Berlin. In this manner Mussolini and Hitler have outranked all other world statesmen in the daily volume of public information regarding totalitarian philosophies.

It is significant to note, Dean Ackerman concludes, that no nation where the press is free from government control is today directly involved in the war in Spain or in China.

It is welcome news, indeed, that the democratic nations are cognizant of the danger and have taken vigorous steps to combat the fascist boa-constrictor. In the United States frequent broadcasts are being made from Pittsburgh and Schenectady. And England, too, has entered the field; for many of her propaganda broadcasts are now directed to South American fields where she has much at stake.

Fighting fire with fire is the only method whereby we can remove this danger at our back door.

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Anti-Nazis' Boos Drive Rep. Fish Off Air

Blast at Communists Starts Demonstration

"Send Aliens Back" Ignites Audience

New York—Boos and catcalls from an audience of 3,500 anti-Hitlerites in Carnegie Hall drove the chief speaker, Representative Hamilton Fish, Jr. from the air last Sunday night when he included Communists in a denunciation of alien radicals.

The meeting, sponsored by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League went on the air over Station WMCA at 11 P. M. and the broadcast was scheduled to continue to midnight.

Mr. Fish started speaking at 11:30 and the storm broke seven minutes later after he had said:

"There is and can be no compromise with these foreign and dictatorial forms of government, whether of the right or the left, in our country. There is no room for such autocracies and despotisms as Fascism, Nazism or Communism in America."

"Back Where They Came From"

As he proceeded to suggest that Congress enact drastic laws to send alien propagandists, including Communists, "back home where they can enjoy the lack of freedom of speech, pitiful wage scales and oppressive laws they have been accustomed to in the past" and "give their jobs to loyal American citizens," the demonstration reached such proportions that the microphone was cut off.

Nazis' "Molly Pitcher" Defies N. J. Legion Men

New Milford, N. J.—An American housewife of Irish stock, married to a native-born factory operator of German descent, declared her determination to continue as hostess to German-American bund meetings in the face of a threat from the local American Legion post commander that "it looks as though we'll have to take matters into our own hands."

"Our members are indignant," said Post Commander C. I. Johnston as he denounced the display of Nazi flags with the Stars and Stripes.

We are determined to get members of this organization out of New Milford, or else make them prove they are all Americans and not anti-American. We believe all citizens should respect the American flag—and only the American flag."



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
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Temple to Present Schatz Palestinian Art Exhibition
