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England Increases Immigration Quota; Weizmann Attacks "Assimilationists"

Reviews World Jewry Position

States Partition Now a Certainty

London:—The Zionist Action Committee, consisting of approximately 100 leaders, assembled here this week from various parts of the world to analyze the most critical situation now confronting the Palestinian movement, heard their leader, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, deliver a fiery attack on the "Jewish Assimilationists" whom he accused of impeding the political work of Zionism and thereby injuring the cause of Judaism.

In a slashing 90-minute speech, Dr. Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, presented to the opening session, held in the strictest secrecy, a world picture of the political situation affecting Zionism, and from reports expressed in reliable circles, a tremendous impression was made on his listeners.

Tracing the political situation, beginning with the agreement of the Zionist organization to negotiate with Great Britain for the purpose

of clarifying its proposal to create a Jewish State, Dr. Weizmann stated that the Peel Royal Commission which recommended a three-way partition of the Holy Land, intended to proceed with the partition. Regarding the delay which then fol-

A Nazi Austria Sways British

New Rule Adds 300 to Quota

London:—Due to the plight of the Jews in Central Europe, particularly accentuated by the recent adverse events in the Austrian situation, the British government announced this week that an increase of approximately 25 per cent in the Jewish immigration quota for Palestine, which is now limited to 8,000 persons annually, will be granted.

The new schedule, effective on April 1, admits the following classified groups above the 8,000 quota:

A maximum of 2,000 persons of independent means, possessing a capital of \$5,000; a maximum of 1,000 laborers; 200 dependents and an undeclared number of students.

The High Commissioner of Palestine is authorized to approve or reject the applicants.

Suggest Libya For Settlement

Rome, March 16—Premier Mussolini is planning to issue a formal invitation to the Jews to settle large numbers of Polish and Rumanian Jews in Libya, Italian North Africa, it was reported in usually well-informed circles here.

It is understood that Il Duce has sent one of his confidantes, General Terruzzi, to Libya to prepare a colonization plan and to win the support of the Libyan Arabs.

The proposed Jewish colony in Libya is intended to show, it is said, that Mussolini is not unfriendly to the Jews, and at the same time to win the support of Poland and Rumania, which are seeking outlets for their "surplus" Jewish populations.

Probe of Boston Nazis Asked by Legion Post

Boston.—A sweeping investigation of Nazi activities in Boston was called for by officials of the local American Legion posts after the city had been flooded with circulars inviting "all Aryan white Gentiles" to attend a meeting of the German-American Bund at the Deutscher Fortbildungsverein in Roxbury. The Legion spokesman asked that the probe be undertaken by the legislative committee appointed last year to investigate all subversive activities in Massachusetts.

Jews Must Consent To Palestine Solution

Jerusalem — "This represents my first address since the World Zionist Congress last summer to a Jewish audience on a major political problem." Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, declared this week before a plenary session of the Vaad Leumi.

"I shall inform Britain," Dr. Weizmann stated, "that there can be no solution of the Palestine problem without the consent of the Jewish people."

Black Legion Chief Changes His Name But Not His Tactics

Lima, Ohio—Unity of American-born Catholics and Protestants against Jews, Negroes and aliens is the cardinal aim of the Patriotic Legion of America, incorporated in Ohio on January 11th as successor to the former Black Legion, it was revealed here by Virgil H. Effinger, former national commander of the Black Legion and commander-in-chief of the new order.

Describing his fighting organization as patterned after the Ku Klux Klan, Effinger, who is still fighting extradition to Michigan, where he is under indictment for terroristic activities by the Black Legion, said "if you have the proper qualifications, you can join the Patriotic Legion in Toledo or any other community which has real Americans living in it."

"We have been in existence for a long time. The fact that we were incorporated on January 11th doesn't mean necessarily that we're

new. The Patriotic Legion welcomes Catholics. We exclude Jews and Negroes. We are a secret society as far as our ritual is concerned, but when it comes to the purposes of our organization, we have nothing to hide. We stand for what is written in the Bible and the Constitution of the United States."

Effinger admitted that he is a former grand titan of the K. K. K. in Ohio.

Cardozo Gives Vendor Start

New York. — Associate Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo, of the Supreme Court of the United States, helped an elderly nurse to start a newsstand in 1931 when he was Chief Justice of the State Court of Appeals, it was disclosed when Borough President Stanley M. Isaacs licensed a newsstand for Mrs. Alice Williams.

Mrs. Williams, employed in the Cardozo home from 1927 to 1929, had to quit because she was suffering from arthritis. Judge Carpenes, then assisted, with cash and influence, to establish her in business with an old-fashioned stand.

Members of the Providence section of ORT will stage a concert Sunday night in Plantations Auditorium in observance of the organization's drive to raise \$450,000 throughout the country. Cantors Mordecai Hershman and Magascivitz will sing and Boris Jabotinsky will speak.

The ORT is more than 50 years old. During its existence it has established many trade schools throughout Europe where Jewish youths may learn to become skilled laborers. Schools are now located in Russia, Poland, Roumania and Lithuania. B. Vladeck is national chairman in charge of the campaign.

Israel Fine is local chairman. He is assisted by Louis Strauss, treasurer; Mrs. Eva B. Cohen, secretary; and David Isenberg, N. E. director.

Gay Old Vienna Losing Its Soul With Racial Purge in Full Blast

"If you cannot spend your life in Paris, then by all means spend it in Vienna."—Patin, French physician, 1873.

If the Nazi commissars go at it with their usual thoroughness, gay old Vienna, now in the throes of a full-blast racial purge in entertainment circles, is losing its soul.

Everybody connected with screen, stage, opera and concert—let's not go into the rest of the dismal business—will have to pass the acid test of Aryanism, and when it is all over, the jobs vacated by "undesirables" will run up an appalling total. The Austrian capital will probably be a long time catching its artistic breath.

Of course we read a line or two in foreign dispatches about the pro-

minent "non-Aryans" swept out of office, but we can only speculate on the fate of hundreds of others in the arts who too fall under the Semitic ban. In music, for example, a recent estimate gave the percentage of those connected with Jewish blood among assistant conductors and stage directors at the Staatsoper as eighty. The famous Vienna Philharmonic was said to include at least fifteen Jewish musicians, and ten to fifteen per cent of the chorus belonged to the same race.

In short, Vienna has owed no small proportion of its musical life to Jews, not to mention the international Jewry supplying soloists and "guest artists." A non-Jewish Viennese official recently estimated that from sixty to seventy per cent

London—After drifting 24 hours at sea in a small sailboat, which aided their flight from Germany, Mr. and Mrs. Franz Nurvinski were picked up by the steamship Meta and brought to Brixham.

Nurvinski, 22, said he fled Nazi Germany with his 21 year old wife to escape army conscription. They wandered through Austria, Switzerland and France. It was at Cherbourg, he said, that their boat broke its moorings, while they slept, and drifted into the Channel.

Jews Allowed Rural Settlement in Australia

Melbourne — The Federal Government granted an application of the Jewish Welfare Society to permit a number of German Jewish youths between the ages of 16 and 18 to enter Australia to be trained as rural workers. A similar application for domestic was refused until the society provides positions for the prospective immigrants. It is believed that this sympathetic consideration marks a definite policy toward Jewish applications.

Wise Indignant With England

Blames London In Austrian Coup

New York—Rabbi Stephen S. Wise returned to America from London on the Queen Mary incensed at what he termed England's "dilatatoriness" in Austria.

Eyes flashing, his every gesture voicing indignation, Rabbi Wise said:—

"I can't describe the shock to decent public opinion in Europe over the rape of Austria. It is a grim commentary upon English dilatatoriness that the King and Queen of England were at lunch with Ribbentrop (Joachim Von Ribbentrop, German Ambassador) while Hitler was issuing a series of brutal ultimatums on Austria.

Misery Widened

"The area of Jewish misery widened, while the area of Palestine is being increasingly limited. Jews have lived in Austria since the third century, and Vienna was the home of the noblest and greatest community in Jewish history."

He sounded a warning that Fascism will "take the world over" if democracies continue "to muddle as they have since 1933."

of Vienna's concert-going public was Jewish. Previous to Hitler's entry into Vienna, any introduction of Nazi policy at the opera house would have meant a disastrous drop in subscription. Incidentally, perhaps one-half of Vienna's music critics were partly or wholly Jewish.

As for the Viennese stage, a reliable local source offers the statement that "sixty per cent of Vienna's show business was in hands of the Jews." And of course, stage

managers and theatre operators showed an even greater proportion. Jewish actors and actresses, however, had been slowly dropping out of the picture—for Pan-German reasons—and stars like Lili Darvas, a Max Reinhardt find, had begun to feel the racial taboo. Ferenc Molnar's plays always have enjoyed Viennese production, and the operettas of Emmerich Kalman and Oscar Straus were no less Viennese mainstays. But chances are Vienna has seen and heard the last of them.

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Forbid Jews Tobacco Sale

Poland Will Not Renew Licenses

Warsaw.—Thousands of Jewish families in Poland this week lost their source of livelihood, when the government, which holds the monopoly on tobacco, refused to renew the licenses of over 95 percent of the Jewish tobacco merchants. All the appeals and entreaties on the part of prominent Jewish leaders were of no avail; the Polish government remains obdurate. With the exception of an insignificant few, no Jew will be permitted to sell tobacco or cigarettes.

In the city of Grodno, where previously 150 Jewish merchants handled tobacco and cigarettes only two were granted renewals.

Chester, Pa.—A boy who has been asleep fifteen days was pronounced on the way to recovery from a rare disease which his physician said had been fatal to every other case—a combination of sleeping sickness and measles.


Arthur Levy, 6, who fell asleep March 2 with "measles encephalitis," rallied after injections of serum made from the blood of children who have recovered from measles.

Noted Violinist Plays at Orphanage Meeting

Gardner Plays Impromptu Concert

It came as a complete surprise to almost everyone last Sunday afternoon, when Samuel Gardner, native son of Providence, and now a touring concert violinist, unobtrusively slipped into the auditorium at the Jewish Orphanage annual meeting... Walter Sundlun, president of the Orphanage, quite without warning, halted the business of the meeting, and with a great measure of pride, announced that an old classmate of his from Doyle-Avenue-School-days, had made a quick trip from his adopted New York, to appear on the program...

The audience was not only surprised, but also delighted, and there was a sudden buzz and hum that could be distinguished into the words, "Of course I remember Sam Gardner... Why, he was brought up on this side of the city!"...

Without the benefit of accompaniment, (even for tuning the singing strings of his fiddle), Mr. Gardner presented three selections, including concertos of Chreisler and Brooks... Rarely, does a large gathering remain in thorough silence... But, honestly, there was neither sound nor movement... And by no means, had they gotten their fill, after the last strain of his third selection... With demands for more, by their applause, the audience was quieted when Mr. G. said charmingly, "I'll play two more favorites, and then,"—smilingly—"We'll let it go at that."... Followed "Humoresque," which someone in back of me couldn't refrain from humming, and then one of his own compositions "The Cane Break"... The latter was lovely.

With much reluctance, the audience let Mr. Gardner go, and as he quietly hurried out of the auditorium, (for he was taking a six o'clock train,) I grabbed my pad and pencil and did a mild hop, skip and jump right after him... Upstairs, in the room adjoining Maurice Stollerman's office, I found Mr. G. with an impenetrable circle of friends around him, shaking his hand and firing questions at him much too swiftly to get them all answered...

I felt that another person asking him questions about himself and his family would be kind of on the pesty side, so I started for downstairs, somewhat disappointed, but considering myself very fortunate in having at least heard him play... However, charming Mrs. Walter Sundlun whom I met in the hallway, gave me an understanding glance, saying, "Just a moment, I'll call him out here."... Whereupon my disappointment suddenly sprouted wings and vanished...

The two-minute interview was all very impromptu... A more unassuming person than Mr. G. I've never met... Standing in the door-

way of the anteroom, he told me, "It's very nice every so often coming back to a place that was 'home'... It's been a great many years since I left, but I always have a certain feeling for my friends here and for the city itself... If I didn't love Providence so much, I should never have made this special trip."... I learned that he appears as guest artist at concerts all over the country, and that he has a very talented wife, who often acts as his piano accompanist... They have two grown children—a boy and a girl... Their home is in New York.

At this point, from one of his friends came, "Sam, I meant to..." and I knew this would have to be my exit... expressing appreciation for his graciousness, I added this appendage to my notes:—It's very gratifying to reflect that a fine artist like Samuel Gardner, with his varied interests and connections in cities all over the country, has pangs of nostalgia where Providence is concerned... I guess it's got something to do with the fact that whenever he returns, the particular niche he has carved for himself in our community, is always reserved for him...

At the meeting which preceded Mr. Gardner's concert, Walter I. Sundlun was re-elected for his tenth successive term as president of the Orphanage. In his address Mr. Sundlun cited recent European events as a lesson to all adults that

it is their duty to teach any children coming under their care "the ideals of tolerance."

Dr. James L. Hanley, superintendent of Providence schools, as guest speaker praised the work of the orphanage and indorsed the child guidance principles employed in the care of the children.

Mr. Sundlun, who was given a gold wrist watch by the board of directors hinted that the orphanage name may be changed as it is felt "that the present name does not truly describe this fine home."

The annual report of Superintendent Maurice Stollerman revealed that 38 children were cared for in 1937.

Judge Philip C. Joslin presided as temporary chairman during election of officers. The list of new officers was published in a recent issue of the Herald.

Masada Plans 5th Convention

New York.—Rounding out five years of Zionist education and propaganda among American Jewish youth, Masada, Youth Zionist Organization of America, will hold its 5th national convention beginning May 28th at Cleveland, the home-city of the first chapter of Masada to affiliate with the national organization.

The organization is dedicated to the furthering of the Palestine up-building, the defense of Jewish rights, and the strengthening of traditional aspects of Jewish life by associating the daily life of Palestine with Jewish secular as well as traditional activities, reports the executive office.

Congress Hits Nazi Persecution

Geneva—The World Jewish Congress, condemning Jewish persecution in Austria, said that 140 Jews had been buried in the last four days as compared to a normal death rate among Jews of four daily.

Concurrent with publication of Germany's note that Austria no longer is a member of the League, the Congress alleged that anti-Jewish persecution in Austria had resulted in a "formidable increase" in suicides.

The Congress protested that the alleged persecution violated the treaty of St. Germain which established complete equality for all inhabitants of Austria under a guarantee to the League.

The Congress said that "authentic information" had been received that not only had Germany's Aryan laws been made to apply to Austrian Jews, but that they had been subjected to the "cruel and barbarous treatment of which Jews in Germany have been victims for years." According to private information arriving in Geneva the methods employed in Austria are even more cruel than in the Reich.



lowed, Dr. Weizmann credited this to the many difficulties which since then have appeared on the scene of international politics; this delay having adversely affected Jewry.

Menachem Mendel Ussishkin, chairman of the Council, opened the meeting by outlining the work of the session, and paid tribute to the Zionists, who have recently died. He demanded that the opponents of Palestine Partition be given a hearing before the Palestine Partition Commission, recently formed. Mr. Ussishkin attacked Dr. Weizmann's proposal to extend the London Executive of the Zionist Organization by maintaining that this means the inclusion of more pro-partitionists.

Guardsmen Ordered To Shun Nazis

Albany, N. Y.—National Guardsmen were forbidden by Governor Lehman "to further or promote any so-called nationalistic group or non-American political or racial cause."

The order was issued to Adjutant General Walter G. Robinson in a letter after it was disclosed that uniformed officers and enlisted men of the New York National Guard had attended a ball given by a Russian anti-Soviet newspaper at which Nazis were also reported to have been present.

Largest Lake

London Ignores Palestine Nazis

London—Evidence of Nazi propaganda among the Arabs of Palestine and the native populations in other British colonies was brushed aside by Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden when he told the House of Commons that this propaganda is not of a nature to warrant representations to the German government.

The question of Nazi propaganda had been raised by Geoffrey Manders, Liberal, and by the Labor members, Watkins and Fletcher. The latter told of moving pictures depicting fake scenes of Jews killing Arabs which are being secretly circulated by Nazi agents in Palestine.

Tries to Forget Nazi Camp Life; Rejoices at \$12 Job in N. Y.

New York.—Travel note: David Schneider has arrived in New York after a three years' stay at Dachau, near Munich, where he was a 'guest' of the German government. Schneider is an unemotional man of 30. He has eyes like a frightened child. Dachau is a concentration camp, with accommodations for 10,000. To be exact, "I was three years and one month in Dachau," Schneider said.

Today he is very jubilant. He is working at his new job, an electrician in a 25th street Manhattan shop at \$12 a week. Four years ago he was a business man in Cologne, proprietor of two radio stores. He was good for \$100,000 a year.

The story of Schneider is a simple tale which he relates calmly, as though he were talking of a summer vacation at the seashore. His monotone voice betrays no feeling.

Meets Old Friend

Translated from German, Schneider told the reporter: "In September 1934, I went to Paris on business. It happened by chance that I met a certain Max Brown and talked to him for five minutes in the street. Brown was an anti-Nazi. I knew he was in self-exile, so I did not talk to him long—just a greeting to an old friend from Cologne. Coming back to Germany, I was arrested at Kehl, on the border. In a prison train I was taken to Cologne. The secret police asked me where Max Brown was. I was frightened and told them I didn't know. An officer reached in the drawer of a desk. He put a photograph before my eyes. It showed me greeting Max Brown in Paris! This was my doom."

It was a network of espionage that clicked with greater efficiency than Schneider had counted on. Three days in a prison train took him to Dachau, where, in the preliminary examination of new prisoners, he lost two teeth without benefit of dentist.

"Slugging prisoners with fists and rifle butts is important," he said scientifically. "It gives a chance to shoot the ones who resist. For this purpose, the prisoners are intentionally not tied."

Schneider, who was learned to love lemon pie, recalls that meals at the camp consisted of black coffee for breakfast, potatoes and cabbage for lunch, sausage and tea for dinner. Each man got one pound of bread per day.

Influential friends in England negotiated Schneider's release last October. He came to America eight weeks ago. Today he has his first citizenship papers, studies English, and—"I try to forget Dauchau."

Marked Bread

Hospital Agrees to Purge Smokestack of Swastikas

New York.—If some one will put up \$1,000, those two big black swastikas on the New York Hospital's white smokestack at Seventieth Street and East River will be taken down.

There have been complaints, hospital authorities admitted and they are quite willing to have the emblems removed. But they lack the money to do it.

Designed in the pre-Hitler days of 1927, the stack was ornamented with two swastikas (and two Greek crosses as well) to break the lines of the square 335-foot chimney.

Fashioned of dark-colored brick inset among the white bricks the emblems, which are near the top of the stack, are clearly visible from both the driver and the street sides of the hospital.

Murray Sargent, administrator of the hospital, exhibited today a letter from Henry R. Shipley of Boston, architect for the hospital, saying the emblems had been used simply as architectural devices to

break the stack's monotony.

It was pointed out by members of the hospital staff that swastikas often have been used as modified forms of the caduceus, the entwined serpents symbolic of the medical profession.

The hospital's board of directors, moved by recent oral and written objections to the presence of the stack swastikas, has voted to have them removed. It does not favor, however using hospital funds for that purpose.

Acquit American In Bombing Trial

Jerusalem—George Katimy, 37-year-old American-naturalized Christian Arab, was acquitted of complicity in the bombing of a Jewish workers' cafeteria here January 16. Katimy was the first foreign citizen to be tried by one of the four-month-old military tribunals.

The court also acquitted Addieh Haddad, Arab carpenter.

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Pieces of Irony

Mexico grabs the properties of foreign oil companies—and sends a self-righteous note to the League of Nations declaring Germany's grab of Austria "illegal" and therefore "inadmissible."

The Nazis, trampling ruthlessly over minorities in Austria and elsewhere, fire an ultimatum that Germany just will not tolerate suppression of the German minority in Brazil. The reply of Brazil's Foreign Minister Aranha, an eloquent shrug, is understandable. He hasn't forgotten, though apparently the Nazis have; that the North and South Atlantic oceans roll between Germany and Brazil.

And, as a prize touch of irony, the Nazi chief censor proposes that other nations negotiate "press non-aggression pacts" with Germany, under which they would censor all public expressions of opinion about German affairs. That gives us, for example, a chance to get on good terms with Hitler. All we have to do is abolish our Bill of Rights.

Jail Inmates Hope for Quiet — That is, if Baby is Released

New York—The walls of a four-month-old baby girl issued from a cell in Bronx County jail, but today the prisoners whose sleep was disturbed had hopes that the disturber will be removed.

The noise-maker, youngest inmate in the history of the prison, is the daughter of Mrs. Rae Leiter of 1949 Brook Avenue, The Bronx, and was the center of a legal battle because she happened to catch cold in the swatched in a heavy blanket.

Her presence in the jail was publicly revealed in Bronx Surrogate's prison while sleeping in a chair Court yesterday when attorneys for Mrs. Leiter asked that the mother be released because of the baby's condition.

Cries Nightly for Week

The baby had been here since March 11, sleeping in the chair beside her mother's cot in the daytime and crying loudly at night.

The prison attendants were about crazy. After all, the nursery facilities of a prison are limited. There was the worry of keeping milk bottles heated, and diapers, and all that.

Mrs. Leiter took the baby to jail with her when she was committed for contempt of court following her

refusal to surrender \$4,000 in bank accounts and securities to the estate of Jacob Leiter, her common-law husband and, she said, the father of her baby.

Health Held Endangered

Sidney J. Levine, her counsel, argued before Surrogate Albert H. Henderson that her stay in jail was menacing the health of Mrs. Leiter and the baby.

And over the jail grapevine the prisoners said, "Yeah, and she's menacing our beauty naps."

Consider Plans For Aid to Austrian Jews

Jerusalem — Palestine Jewish leaders considered plans for aiding Jews forced out of Austria by Adolf Hitler, while the swastika flag was raised by the Austrian consulate here.

Jewish leaders discussed the advisability of sending a delegation to the United States to raise funds for the rescue of Austrian Jews, and also the possibilities of facilitating their immigration here by an arrangement similar to that previously in effect with Germany, under which Jewish emigrants are permitted to withdraw part of their capital as goods.

Canada to Admit Matzoh Duty Free

Ottawa—Up to and including April 23rd, the last day of Passover, Canada will admit duty free matzohs, matzo products and other Passover foods under the terms of a special Order-in-Council promulgated by the cabinet. Instructions have been issued to all customs officials to allow the free entry of these foods from the United States.

APPROVES LOAN

Tel Aviv.—Mayor Israel Rokach announced that William G. A. Ormsby-Gore, British Colonial Secretary, has approved a \$250,000 loan for Tel Aviv. An additional loan of the same amount to be used for more extensive public works programs, was declined, the mayor reported.

Jascha Heifetz and his wife, the former Florence Vidor, while traveling in Europe left Austria the day before Hitler entered Austria. They left in order to go to London where they arranged to meet Sue Vidor, Florence's daughter.

New York—Dr. Phoebus A. Levene, Russian-born Jewish chemist, received the coveted William H. Nichols medal for chemical research at a dinner tendered by the New York section of the American Chemical Society. Dr. Levene, who is on the staff of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, received the award for his study of the "configurational relationships of the simpler optically active organic compounds."
