## Center Day Camp Program new Innovation, says Director

The Center Day Camp, scheduled to open July 18, will permit parents of children an opportunity to bring them to a place where they know there will be trained supervision and where the children can enjoy themselves with boys and girls their own ages in a pleasant atmosphere, J. I. Cohen, executive director of the Center, stated this week.

Although the Community Center has conducted an out-door program for children the past 13 years, this year's Camp has been styled along that of a camp rather than a playground.

A group of counselors, Mr. Cohen said, are now being recruited who have had camping experiences to assure thorough supervision. Children from the ages of 7 to 14 inclusive will be accepted in the Center Day Camp. They will be allowed to bring their own lunch and stay from morning until late in the afternoon. Free milk and cookies will be supplied by the camp.

In addition to the program in the Center building and in the spacious grounds, children will be taken on outings, will tour

places of interest, will go swimming and will engage in many other pleasant activities.

The five week camp period has been divided into two parts: the first period July 18, to continue for two weeks and the second, beginning August 1 and continuing for three weeks.

In order to give as many children as possible a chance to take part in this activity the rate has been fixed as \$10 for the entire period of five weeks; \$4 for the two week period; and \$6 for the three week period. Children, whose parents are members of the Center, or are members themselves, can attend at lower rates.

## Jewish Doctor Treats Head Nazi's Daughter

AMSTERDAM.—The noted Jewish brain specialist, Dr. Ignaz Oljenick, was reported here to have treated for the second time the daughter of German Foreign Minister Jochim von Ribbentrop. As in the previous instance, in April, 1937, when Herr von Ribbentrop was German Ambassador at London, the patient used a pseudonym, this time "Freulein Schmidt," to conceal the fact that the daughter of a high Nazi official was being treated by a Jewish physician.

Fraulein von Ribbentrop, who is 15, is suffering from a brain inflammation brought on by an injury sustained in an automobile accident in 1936. Dr. Oljenick, whose treatment last year is credited with having saved her life, is rated the greatest living brain specialist in Europe. He

## Browder and Kuhn Linked; "7 Deadly Parallels" Listed

NEW YORK.—After investigating Communism and Nazism for two weeks State Senator John J. McNaboe (D., Manhattan) declared that his joint legislative committee considered both movements in this country "what might be called rackets."

Mr. McNaboe declared a "seven-point deadly parallel" appeared in the testimony of Earl Browder, Communist leader, and Fritz Kuhn, head of the German-American Bund.

Here are Senator McNaboe's seven "deadly points" of similarity:—

"1. The German-American Bund has a Youth Movement. The Communists have the Young Communist League. Both admit preparing youths for future membership in the senior organizations.

"2. Both movements admit spreading propaganda and publishing newspapers.

"3. Kuhn visited Hitler in Berlin. Browder visited Stalin in Moscow.

"4. Kuhn says the Nazi salute is to be the coming salute for America. Browder includes in the new constitution of his party in this country a pledge to the Communist party, omitting any mention of allegiance to the

## Dr. Wise Warns Refugee Conference Will be Failure

New Z. O. A. Head Says Mass Emigration To Palestine Solution

DETROIT.—The Zionist Organization of America elected Dr. Solomon Goldman of Chicago to the presidency to succeed Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York.

It was the first time in the forty years of the organization that more than one candidate was nominated. Dr. Goldman defeated Dr. Israel Goldstein of New York 330 votes to 237. Dr. Goldman is national co-chairman of the United Palestine Appeal and Rabbi of Congregation Anshe Emeth, Chicago.

DETROIT.—Laying down his office as President of the Zionist Organization of America, Dr. Stephen S. Wise told more than 2,000 delegates and guests of the organization's 41st annual convention assembled at the first public session at the Cass Technical High School here that the forthcoming conference in Evian, France of the International Re-

## Dickstein Assails Dies Group Delay Charges Bund Burned Records

WASHINGTON.—Representative Samuel Dickstein (Dem., N. Y.) charged that procrastination by the House committee, investigating un-American activities is permitting leaders of Nazi Bunds to destroy vital records and flee the country.


Dickstein, chairman of the House Immigration Committee, described the committee, headed by Representative Martin Dies (Dem., Tex.) as "deader than a ram's horn."

Dies refused to comment. He said that hearings will not start until July or August. He has asked the Department of Justice for the Federal Bureau of Investigation report on its investigation of the German-American Bund led by Fritz Kuhn of New York.

"I am greatly disappointed by failure of the committee to act and act promptly," Dickstein said. "I have received numerous complaints from over the country."

## Commits Suicide over Jewish Persecution

PHILADELPHIA.—Temporarily deranged, according to his physician, "by worry about persecution of the Jewish race," David Kirschbaum, retired clothing manufacturer, who was prominent for years in civic and philanthropy, committed suicide last week by hanging himself with a dog chain. He was 72 years old.

## Arrest Nazi For Threat to Roosevelt

NEW YORK.—Trial by a military court martial faced Andrew Gimlen, confessed member of the German-American Bund and private of the 1st Battalion, 244th Coast Artillery of the New York National Guard after he was arrested on a charge of threatening President Roosevelt.

Gimlen was taken before Magistrate Capshaw in Yorkville Court on the complaint of Dick Voss, a crippled world war veteran, who testified he heard Gimlen, in full uniform, cry out "kill the Jews. Roosevelt is a Jew, and we'll get him too."

The alleged remarks were made in Union Square, a few blocks from the 244th Coast Guard's armory, when Gimlen and another Nazi guardsman who escaped charged into a group of people swinging his fists.

## Dr. Jack to Press Suit on Nazi Bund

YONKERS.—The Rev. Dr. Emanuel Jack, former United States Army chaplain, announced he intended to proceed with his \$3,000,000 damage suit against Fritz Kuhn and the German-American Bund despite the resolution passed by the Jewish Federation of Yonkers stating the federation was "not in sympathy with the suit" and considered it inadvisable at this time.

"I am astounded at the action of the Jewish Federation," said Dr. Jack. "I can only say that I am a native-born American and I have served my country both here and overseas, and I feel that I unquestionably have the right to resent by every possible means any slanderous attack upon my citizenship.

"In this spirit I have instituted these proceedings to compel, if possible, a retraction of the dastardly insult to my faith and to my birthright."

## Refugees Begin Learning American Ways at Camp

WEST PARK.—An experiment in the Americanization and spiritual readjustment of German and Austrian refugees is being conducted here by the American Friends Service Committee in a thirty-six-acre estate on the Hudson, opposite Hyde Park.

The idea, explained Dr. Arthur Charles, director, is to enable a small number of refugees to learn American ways and views, the language and the country's literature amid peaceful surroundings.

The estate, a rather shabby place, is owned by Miss Hilda Smith, who lives nearby.

Named Camp Aberdeen, it was opened last week. A few Americans, including Bryn Mawr college student, a professor from Moravian College, South Bethlehem, Pa.; his wife and a couple of others, constitute the teaching staff to date.

### More Expected Soon

The refugees are only a handful so far—three or four half-

grown boys, a former student for the Rabbinate, three German women and two little girls.

But others are expected soon, though the number is not expected to exceed thirty, all hand-picked after investigation by the committee or interested allied organizations.

They live on a co-operative basis, with regular schedules on which everyone is assigned to do something—work in the kitchen, in the garden or on the lawns.

Two rooms at one end of the house are lined with bookshelves, mostly works on civics, history, sociology, economics.

### Schedule of Activities

The master schedule of activities accounts for every minute of the day—work, rest, study, meals, discussions, music. An acre, already seeded and kept free of weeds, is expected to supply produce.

On the lighter side swimming, tennis, hiking and instruction in the arts and crafts are scheduled.

The refugees, if able to do so, pay a slight fee and exchange their own ideas on culture and other subjects.

"It's a small beginning," said Dr. Charles. "The camp will be operated until September 15. Next year, perhaps, the work will be extended."

## Jobless and Sick Held as Wife Killer

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J.—Albert Goldstein, 28, an unemployed clothing worker, who says he is suffering from tuberculosis and has been given five years at most to live, was under arrest here charged with the murder of his estranged wife, Lee, 21.

Goldstein, police said, shot his wife five times in the office of Lewis F. Mezey while discussing the terms of a divorce. He waited quietly until police arrived and arrested him.

Goldstein told detectives they were married two years ago, and that they separated last November after he told his wife he was tubercular. She kept their child, Sandra Jean, now 11 months old, he said, and he went to a sanitarium in Denver.

Goldstein told police he shot his wife because she told him she wouldn't let him see their daughter after they were divorced.

"I planned to blow my own head off," the husband added, "but I lost my nerve."

## Cold Program Hits Roumanian Jews

## 'Idiot's Delight' opens Legitimate Season

It is a strange combination of bitter, trenchant irony and passionate pleading on the one hand and of light and gay-hearted comedy on the other that Robert E. Sherwood has molded together in his Pulitzer Prize play, "Idiot's Delight," which inaugurates the legitimate season at the Albee Theatre the week beginning Monday, July 11th, with Lenore Ulric and Oscar Shaw co-starred in the roles created by the Lunts. It is very much to Mr. Sherwood's credit that the two moods never clash and never interfere.

The scene of the play is a tiny hotel in the heart of the Alps and the time, indeterminate, is the future, on a day when the war clouds have settled heavily over Europe and the nations are straining at their leashes, anxious to be at their neighbors' throats. Stopping at the quiet little resort are a strangely assorted group of visitors including, as it does, a wealthy munitions maker, his mysterious mistress, an American athlete, a French communist, a vaudevillian from the Kansas cornbelt with his troupe of chorines, an English honeymoon couple and a German scientist.

## Heifetz, Goldwyn Differ on Pictures

HOLLYWOOD.—Jascha Heifetz is burning while Sam Goldwyn fiddles with the story for the great musician's first picture. The producer had wanted him to be a refugee from Austria who comes to this country and becomes famous. Heifetz wants no fictitious role, though, he insists upon being himself in the same way that Stokowski was Stokowski in the Deanna Durbin film.

Their differences probably will be patched up, though. Heifetz once was signed by Henry Ford for one radio performance at \$9,000. The motor mogul suggested that he play "Humoresque," and the violinist refused—said it was a composition suitable only for amateurs.

"I'll give you \$3,000 more if you'll play 'Humoresque,'" said Ford.

And Heifetz played "Humoresque."

## Luxembourg Returns Jews to Germany

LUXEMBOURG.—A large group of Austrian refugees including many Jews were deported by the authorities here. These refugees were temporarily admitted to the Duchy of Luxembourg after deportation from Belgium and Holland. The refugees were immediately arrested upon their return to Germany and were given a short time to leave the country or be interned in a concentration camp. Frontier guards have been reinforced to prevent an influx

## 4,500,000 Austrians Anxious to Emigrate

### Oppose Nazis Parley Informed

EVAIN-LES-BAINS, France.—An Austrian refugee leader told American delegates he believed 4,500,000 Austrians would flee Nazi rule if a thirty-two-nation conference, could find them a new homeland.

The spokesman, Arthur Rosenberg, representing the Federation of Austrian Exiles at the meeting inspired by President Roosevelt to try to help German Jews and refugees, said about 75 per cent of Austrians would leave their country if allowed to take a substantial part of their property with them.

(The Austrian population in the 1934 census was 6,760,233. Various estimates put the number of Jews in Austria at the time of the Austro-German union at 200,000 to 300,000, and the total number of persons with some Jewish blood at 600,000—roughly 10 per cent of the population.)

## Rabbi Fears Evian Will Fail Refugees

BELMAR.—The political refugees world conference at Evain-les-Bains, France, will fail "if it will act from political motives," according to Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, president of the Rabbinical Council of America. Rabbi Goldstein spoke at the opening session of the council's three day conference.

"If it will act from spiritual motives, it must succeed," he said. "It is a humanitarian and religious problem, not a Jewish question."

Turning to labor problems at home, Rabbi Goldstein expressed belief that labor was "overplaying its hand" here.

## Seminary to Seek \$100,000 for Deficit

### Hope to Prevent Restricted Work

TANNERSVILLE, N. Y.—The Rabbinical Assembly of America planned a campaign to raise \$100,000 to end a threatened closing of "one or more" departments of the Jewish theological Seminary.

Discussion of the budget deficit occupied assembly delegates. Dr. Louis Finklestein, of New York, said the Board of Directors of the seminary "have come to definite conclusions that they could no longer carry on their work on a deficit basis."

"Unless sufficient funds are raised during the coming year," he added, "the activities of the seminary will, of necessity, be curtailed." He said approximately \$100,000 would be needed to continue the work at its present scope.

Dr. Ben Zion Bokser, of Forest Hills, urged establishment of an information service at the seminary to "expose the fabrications of anti-semitic pseudo-science."

## Problem Solved; Liquidate Comzet

PARIS.—Considering the Jewish problem in the Soviet Union solved, the Soviet Government has begun liquidation of Comzet, Government commission for settlement of Jews on land, which in its fourteen years' existence directed the greatest Jewish colonization work in history, according to reports reaching here.

## Assault Hairdresser for Working on Sat.

### Lithuanian Press Issues Objections

KOYNO.—An incident which had unpleasant consequences has been provoked by zealous Sabbath observers in the Lithuanian town, Telz, which is famous for its great Yeshivah.

Two local Rabbis, accompanied by a group of students of the Yeshivah, on finding open on a Saturday the hairdresser's shop owned by a Jew, Zalmanovitch, despite repeated warnings issued to him by Sabbath observers not to desecrate the Sabbath, assaulted Zalmanovitch and severely thrashed him.

The police had to intervene to protect the Jewish hairdresser, who, it is understood, pleaded that he himself did no work on Saturdays and that only a Christian employee was in charge of the shop on Saturdays.

The incident has created a very unfavourable impression in Lithuanian circles, and the Lithuanian press published strong comments on the conduct of the two Rabbis and the group of students of the Yeshivah, who were all fined for assaulting the hairdresser. The official Government organ even published a demand that the Government should impose a strict control of the activities of the Sabbath observers who were trying to force Jews to observe the Sabbath against their wishes.

## Reich Jews Await Fate of Property

### Anxiously Wonder On "Utilization"

BERLIN—Registration of property in excess of 5,000 marks (\$2,000) held by Jews has been completed, it was learned today, and in consequence Jews waited anxiously for the next step—definition of the "utilization" which Field Marshal Hermann Goering is authorized to make of their registered property as dictator of the four-year plan of economic self-sufficiency.

It was reported that there was a plan to "pool" Jewish registered property as necessary, the owners receiving state bonds in exchange.

Declaration of Jewish property proved most difficult. Under the decree ordering registration and

authorizing Goering to "utilize" property registered, prison sentences may be prescribed for violations. But it proved difficult to obtain estimates of the current value of such things as family heirlooms, paintings and furniture. Jewelers had been kept busy in recent days estimating the value of gems owned by their Jewish patrons. Experts in paintings and period furniture likewise were rushed.



"In proud and most dear remembrance of Ernst Roeham, captain, June 30, 1934," There was no signature.

Roehm was a lieutenant of Adolf Hitler from the early days of Nazism. He was charged with plotting against Hitler and was erased in a manner that would put our American racketeers to shame.

Ghosts, indeed, from the past.

## Wanted - A Leader

Dr. Alexis Carrel, famed scientist, has made a suggestion that the world establish "institutes of psychology" to produce leaders who are equipped to cope with modern social, economic and political problems.

Nervous fragility, intellectual weakness and moral corruption, Dr. Carrel says, has made it impossible for the general run of men today to assume their communal responsibilities.

Dr. Carrel's remarks are pertinent to the situation in the Jewish community here.

With more than a hundred organizations actively working, many at cross-purposes, there is a lack of co-operation and unified action. Dictators, on the penquin style, rule each unit and believe themselves capable of assuming leadership. The results have been deplorable and chaotic.

While it is too utopian to expect the ideal leader that Dr. Carrel describes, a move should be made to replace our present delittantes in leadership with men who can command respect and action.

## Report Bulk of German People Aroused by Anti-Jewish Drives

LONDON.—The Times reports from Berlin that large sections of the bourgeoisie and the working class have been aroused by the ruthlessness of the current anti-Jewish drive. According to the dispatch, diplomatic quarters believe the drive was started to distract attention from the nation's economic difficulties and perhaps also divert foreign interest from the increasing tempo of rearmament.

In another dispatch, the Times diplomatic correspondent reports that British Jews in Germany are not under legal obligation to submit a declaration on their property under the Goering decree and may count on the full diplomatic support of the British Government.

Italy, it is stated, urgently needs, a supply of highly qualified chemists, engineers and geologists in Abyssinia and Mussolini has great confidence in the Jewish experts in Germany. It is believed here that the German Government will consent to Italy's demand, as Nazi Germany is not making use of its Jewish experts.

It transpires that all German and Austrian Jewish refugees now in Italy have been provided with employment by the Italian Jews and that the refugees have thus been enabled to obtain permits from the Italian Government to remain in that country.

## Billy Rose Signed To Stage Fair Show

NEW YORK.—The World's Fair has finally signed up Billy Rose to present something super super super colossal.

The show, Mr. Rose said with restraint, will have a cast of 1,000 to perform in the 10,000-seat Meadow Lake amphitheater.

## Urge Swap of One Aryan For Every Jewish Victim

LONDON.—Wickham Steed, noted journalist, proposed that the United States and all "civilized nations" in Europe return one "Aryan" German to Germany for every Jew that country expels and plunders.

Addressing an all-party meeting at Friends House, the former Times editor prefaced his proposal with sharp reproval of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax for failing to attend the rally, held under the auspices of the British section of the World Jewish Congress, or to send a message on the "abominable persecution" of the Jews.

"Will Outlive Oppressors"  
"The Jews," he said, "have outlived oppressors in the past and

will outlive their present trials. There is one thing that could be done and that is for every Jew sent away and robbed by Germany the civilized nations in Europe and the United States should send one Aryan German to Germany, deducting from his wealth the proportion needed to help the Jewish destitute. How long will free, civilized men and women go on sitting and watching helplessly the greatest abomination of the twentieth century?"

Urging opening of the British dominions, Steed declared he looked forward to the day of emancipation for the Jews and the belief that Britain could render no greater service to humanity than to take the lead in "this great work."

## Permanent War will Result of Partition, says Revisionist

Jerusalem.—Palestine will become a hotbed for international intrigues and a continuous state of warfare between Jews and Arabs will result if the Peel scheme for partition of Palestine is executed, Dr. B. Azkin, acting president of the Revisionist-Zionist Organization, declared last week in testimony before the Technical Commission on Partition at its first public hearing.

Scoring the partition scheme submitted by the Peel Commission, Dr. Azkin asserted that it made no allowance for immigration because the areas were inadequate for additional coloniza-

tion. The Revisionists, Dr. Azkin said, oppose the compulsory transfer of Arabs from one proposed State to another. He hoped that the Partition Commission would not recommend such action. Furthermore, he did not believe that Arabs would voluntarily quit the Jewish State.

The Jewish State, he continued, would have no economic self-sufficiency and would be able to exist only on foreign contributions. He was doubtful whether foreign countries would allow to collect funds for the arming of Saud of Arabia.

A large section of Jewry opposing partition will try to reunite the country if it is decided, Dr. Azkin warned. Even the "Jasagers" (proponents of partition), he asserted, say that partition is merely the first step toward later expansion at the expense of the Arab State.

Instead of Today's Arab gangs and the Jewish semi-official Hagana (self-defense corps) there will be a real war and each State will be seeking outside allies and creating a hotbed of international intrigues in the Eastern Mediterranean, he predicted.

## Family Welfare Unit Seeks Foster Homes Temporary Haven Need Stressed

The Jewish Family Welfare Society today announced that it finds it necessary on occasions to place children whose homes are either temporarily or permanently broken up as a result of illness, desertion or other difficulties which may arise in a home. More often these situations involve a temporary placement of one or several children while a mother is recuperating from an illness, for periods ranging from several weeks to several months. For these reasons it is imperative to find foster homes for the children, the Society stated.

This service is part of the general family guidance service of the Society, Mr. Gandal, executive director said. "It has two important objectives; (1) to give proper care of the child in a period of great stress and (2) to relieve the parent or parents of the fear that the child will be neglected while, for example, the mother is in the hospital.

"Underlying these objectives is a preventive aspect. Children who are neglected, even for short periods, are likely to develop difficulties which later on will hamper them and will be an additional burden on the community.

"The community must participate in this service since it is something which the Society alone cannot do. Homes selected may be those which can afford to keep a child without cost and those for which a subsidy must be provided. Homes selected will be visited by the Society's representative and will be strictly confidential.

## Jewish Influx Bars Peace In Palestine, Sheik Warns

NEW YORK.—The Jews give up the idea of a Jewish Palestine before there can be peace there, according to Sheik Hafiz Wahba, minister in London to King Ibn Saund of Arabia.

Until the Zionist movement arose after the World War, Sheik Wahba said in an interview here, there was no trouble between Jews and Arabs in the Near East, and for centuries Jews had held high positions in Arab States.

"But as soon as the Jews began to flock to Palestine in great numbers the Arab population became alarmed. There is no place

in Palestine for the millions of Jews that wish to go into it from eastern Europe, especially Poland and Rumania.

"Will Not Be Pushed"  
"Palestine is a poor country and all that number of Jews could not possibly find a livelihood there. Furthermore, the Arabs will not give up their lands to the Jews. They will not be pushed out into the desert."

The Jews, he concluded, must concede limitation of Jewish immigration and accept the status as a minority in an Arab country before there will be peace in the Holy Land.

# "Mein Kampf" Sequel Has New "Religion"

## Promises Italy Half of Europe

LONDON.—The Daily Herald reported that Adolf Hitler is completing a new book, amplifying his "Mein Kampf" by laying down a new form of religion embracing all people of "pure Nordic," stock, of which he would be the spiritual founder.

Without giving authority for its report, the Daily Herald said that the implications of the new book were tremendous since it would contain a broad hint regarding the division of spheres of influence in Europe between Italy and Germany. All other countries in Europe, it was said, would have to subordinate themselves to the two "leader nations" of Latins and Nordics.

According to the newspaper the new book stigmatized Russia as an Asiatic Power which must be kept out of Europe.

It was asserted that the appearance of the book probably would mark a new turn in Germany's foreign policy and that therefore the date of publication would be chosen carefully in relation to international affairs. Hitler began the book some time ago, it was said, on realizing that the principal aims of the Nazis as laid down in his "Mein Kampf" had been achieved.

The Daily Herald said that millions of copies of the book would be published and that publication would be made throughout Europe.

## Jewish War Dead Honored at Dedication in France

PARIS.—The memory of the 8,200 Jews who laid down their lives fighting for France during the World War and the thousands of others in American and British armies who were killed in France was honored at Douaumont, near Verdun, with the dedication by the French Government of a monument to the Jewish war dead.

The dedication ceremony was presided over by Minister of Marine Cesar Campinchi and was attended by representatives of the American, British, Belgian, Czechoslovak, Polish, Italian and Yugoslavian Governments, the

American and British Legions and the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish clergy of France. The monument was dedicated as part of the exercises featuring the 22nd anniversary of the Battle of Verdun.

The monument to the Jewish war dead, which is close by the the Catholic war monument and stands in the shadow of the great French memorial tower, is a wall-like structure intended to represent the Wailing of Jerusalem, and has reproductions of the two tablets of the Ten Commandments in the center.

## Refugee Conference To Fail, says Wise

fugees Commission will be a "dismal failure" unless Great Britain, at the instance of the United States, is prepared to open the doors of Palestine to mass immigration of Jewish refugees from Germany and Austria.

In an impassioned plea for special action by the Refugee Conference with regard to opening the gates wider to Palestine settlement, Dr. Wise said: "To other Jewish refugees may go as welcome or half welcome guests. To Palestine they must be free to go as of right and not on sufferance. This is the time for England to take the ampler view and to return once again to the standards and ideals of Balfour and Lloyd George." (The Balfour Declaration pledging Great Britain's aid for the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine was issued on November 2nd, 1917 when Lloyd George was Prime Minister.)
