Jews Banned from Danzig Dispensary

DANZIG. — One of the city's largest dispensaries, operated by the Public Health Office, posted on its windows a notice that Jews were not admitted. Numerous private chemist shops also displayed "Jews not wanted" signs.

The well-known wholesale textile firm of Marcus and Company is among the concerns "aryanized" in the past few days.

Doctors Besiege Embassy for Visas

BERLIN. — The embassy and the consulate of the United States were besieged here last week by scores of Jewish physicians and surgeons to obtain visas to emigrate to the U. S. as a result of a decree saying that the licenses of Jewish doctors will expire on September 30.

Many applicants were men of international reputation who presented credentials of extraordinary character and stood hours in the now overcrowded visa line, only to hear that the quota for German immigrants had been exhausted for the next two or three years.

Fired for Favors To Fascist Head

BUCHAREST. — Zolea Codreanu, Iron Guard anti-Semitic leader, who is serving a ten-year prison sentence, refused to allow a Jewish prison doctor to treat him for anemia and succeeded in getting the prison officials to provide him with an Aryan physician, it was revealed here when Petru Vasilia, assistant director of Deftana Prison, and eight prison wardens were dismissed for showing preferential treatment to Codreanu and other Iron Guard prisoners.

Bar Jews From Austrian Streets

PRAHA, Czechoslovakia. — The authorities in small towns of Austria are not permitting Jews to leave their houses without a permit. A copy of a permit received here bears the stamp "NSDAP" (National-Sozialistische Deutsche Arbeiter Partei, or the Nazi Party) with the signature of the town's Nazi leader.

In one case the "Aryan" wife of a Jew was denied permission to visit her parents in a nearby village. In another case a Jewish woman was not permitted to leave her house unless her child was left as hostage.

Arrest Rabbis in Russia as Saboteurs

MOSCOW. — The arrest of a number of rabbis in Berdichev, White Russia, on the charge of maintaining a rabbinical seminary allegedly for training anti-Soviet propagandists is reported in Bezboznik, organ of the Union of the Militant Godless. The paper denounces the rabbis as saboteurs and accuses them of officiating in 16 synagogues in Berdichev.

Lone Jewess Defies Bund At Its Convention Session

NEW YORK. — "Shame on you," shouted a Jewess at the convention of the German American Bund at the New York Turn Hall. "You are not Christians. You are ruining the whole world."

The woman, who said she was Lily Tomkins of 925 Park Avenue, had become incensed as Hermann Schwinn, the Bund's Western leader, attacked Jewish executives and actors in motion pictures. She had risen to her feet and called called out defiance from her chair near the front of the hall.

Arabs Protest Arming Of Jews for Defense

Jews Order Tax Plan for Arms

JERUSALEM. — A vigorous protest against the arming of Jews was submitted to High Commissioner Sir Harold MacMichael by Ragheb Bay Nashashibi, former Mayor of Jerusalem. In a memorandum dealing with recent violence, Nashashibi also objected to the Kofar Yishuv campaign which is the self-defense drive recently launched by the Jewish community.

He also protested against the sending of volunteers to the villages, a new measure recently instituted by the Jewish authorities for the purpose of strengthening weak and isolated Jewish colonies. The memorandum concludes with a demand that the Government permit the arming of Arabs and all steps which the Jews have taken.

The determination of Palestine Jewry to provide adequate self-defense funds was emphasized when a special tax plan was announced for the Kofar Yishuv campaign. A tax is to be levied on all passenger fares on Jewish buses and on all tickets for entertainments.

Weizmann Hints At No Partition

ANTWERP — Declaring that a Jewish commonwealth cannot be firmly established in Palestine merely as the result of an indifferent type of good will on the part of American Jewry, Dr. Solomon Goldman, president of the Zionist Organization of America, told the delegates to the Palestine Extraordinary Conference that American Zionists must completely transform their attitude and that the Jewish educational system in America must endeavor to create a type of Jew possessing a burning passion for the rebuilding of Palestine.

Speaking in Yiddish, Dr. Goldman said that American Jews must be brought into the fold of supporting Palestine upbuilding not merely as a haven for a few persecuted Jews but because its reestablishment involves the

Presbyterians Lend Church To Jews for Holy Holidays

NEW YORK. — A Jewish congregation, newly-formed and without a synagogue, will observe the Holy Days in a Christian church.

Rabbi Gabriel Shulman, who organized the Brith Shalom Congregation six months ago, said today the congregation has received permission to use the auditorium of the Second Presbyterian

Church, 6 West Ninety-sixth St. for its services on September 26 and 27, and October 4 and 5.

"It is refreshing and reassuring to see a break in the clouds that have darkened the outlook with so many 'isms and petty divisions,'" Rabbi Schulman said.

"It is an inspiration to hear the transcendent harmony of unity in the religion of all good men." The lending of a church between Jewish and Christian groups has not occurred in New York for several years, he said.

Since its founding, Brith Shalom Congregation has been holding its services in a private apartment.

Rabbi Schulman, who was head of the Park Avenue Synagogue from 1927 until 1933, was rabbi at the Jewish Community Center at Teaneck, N. J., until he was persuaded to return to New York to organize the congregation early this year.

Ludwig Borchardt Dies in Germany

BERLIN. — The Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung this week announced the death of Professor Ludwig Borchardt, 74, famous Jewish Egyptologist, whose wife's family founded the New York financial firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Co. Professor Borchardt was founder and director of the German Institute of Egyptian Archaeology in Cairo, and was noted for his Egyptian research.

Professor Borchardt's theory of the lost continent of Atlantis was that it lay in what is now the Sahara desert, and sank in an earthquake in 1250 B.C.

Loyalists Favor Jewish Repatriation

BARCELONA. — Loyalist Spain is anxious to bring back the descendants of those Jews who were expelled from Spain in 1492, Segunda Blanco Gonzales, minister of cultural affairs, told foreign newspapermen here.

"We appreciate the enormous contribution of the Jews to the cultural, commercial and economic progress of the country before they were unjustly expelled," he said. "The frontiers have been open since the establishment of the Republic, but the expulsion has never been formally recalled. The government welcomes the cooperation of Sephardic communities throughout the world in effecting the repatriation."

Criticize First Lady As Zionist Friend

JERUSALEM. — Mrs. Elias Moghannom, wife of the Palestinian Arab leader, has sent a letter to Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, with whom she is personally acquainted reproaching America's First Lady for her sympathies with Zionism.

The letter was written in connection with a scheduled address by Mrs. Roosevelt this fall to a dinner in New York to raise funds for establishment of a Leon Blum colony, in Palestine.

Ask Relaxation of Immigration Curbs

BUENOS AIRES. — Resolutions urging the relaxation of immigration restrictions in Latin-American countries and denouncing anti-Semitism and Nazi propaganda were adopted by Argentine Congress against Racism and Anti-Semitism at the close of a two-day session.

The congress also went on record as favoring a boycott of German, Italian and Japanese goods.

Can Providence Jewry Afford to Have The Home For Aged Carnival Fail?

About fifty old men and women ranging from 70 to 90 years in age, are living at the present time in that beautiful building on Hillside Avenue. They are provided not only with food, shelter and a roof over their heads, but they are provided with a Home in the full sense of the word, and with all comforts that are humanly possible to provide.

About eighteen of these men and women are bed ridden. Medical care is provided for them. Trained nurses are taking care of them. Everything possible is done for them, so that these old people should have a blessing for our Community.

To provide for such is the duty of the Jewish Community, and no one can shake its responsibility. The income from such a Carnival now in progress must cover not less than 40 per cent of the expense which actually means not less than \$10,000. Furthermore should this year's Carnival be a failure, not only will it discourage those that run the Home in such a beautiful way at the present time, but it will affect the success of the Carnival for the coming year.

The truth must be told at this time that the attendance of the first three or four nights were very poor. Our Community must wake up and make good the remaining nights of which the Carnival will be open. We must continue to take care for those old people living in the Home and also of those who are waiting to be admitted into the Home.

Let us all do our duty to the Jewish Home for Aged by attending the Carnival and help make the success that it so deserves to be.

preservation of the Jewish spirit and, eventually, of the Jewish people as a whole.

The recently elected president of the Z.O.A. promised more help from American Jews for Palestine when he said that intensification of Zionist propaganda in the United States would result in increased funds for Palestine. He criticized recent activity of the Zionist organization when he said it had been to preoccupied with Palestine and Zionist ideology and failed to embrace and influence the whole of Jewish life.

Dr. Goldman said that the tragedy of the Jews of today is not so much the destruction of their homes and communities, but their seeming acknowledgment

of defeat.

A previous highlight of the conference, was a reverse of Dr. Chaim Weizmann's earlier stand in favor of Britain's proposed scheme for the partition of Palestine when he indicated a possibility of rejection of the partition scheme. He asserted that Jews of the world would not countenance any solution that would rob them of the hope of large-scale immigration.

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MEAT should be carefully examined every day in summer, wiped dry, and such parts as are beginning or seem liable to taint, particularly kernels, removed. In hot weather it may be kept for several days more than it otherwise would, by wrapping around it a linen cloth moistened with vinegar, or equal parts of vinegar and water; the acid vapour keeps off flies, and the moisture causes cold by evaporation. Fresh charcoal bruised to powder has also the property, spread over the meat, of preventing it from spoiling for some time. Meat, when but slightly tainted, may be recovered, by boiling it for some minutes with several pieces of fresh charcoal.

Ten Years Truce

The latest of the quack remedies which have been suggested for the solution of the Palestine problem, is that there should be a truce for a period of ten years. Rumour has it that this idea has the backing of King Ibn Saud, and that, indeed, it was he who suggested it for the consideration of His Majesty's Government. The obvious comment on the whole scheme in its present rather vague form is, of course, that it solves nothing, because it means nothing. For, whether by accident or design, the proposers of the ten year truce have not given a clear version of the exact terms under which the truce would become operative. Will there be free Jewish immigration during the period of the truce, as Jews have suggested, or will there be a prohibition of immigration, as Arab nationalists have suggested? Surely until this point is established, the whole scheme of a truce is hopelessly vague and meaningless.

But talk of a truce between Arabs and Jews in Palestine implies that the situation in that country to-day is one of war between Arabs and Jews. He would be a bold man who would attempt to find proof for such a suggestion. The position in Palestine to-day is one in which Jews and British, not to mention the vast majority of the Arab masses, are being attacked by a comparatively small number of Arab bandits, well supplied with money and ammunition, who have not scrupled to use the foulest methods of warfare against those who uphold the forces of law and order. What is needed to-day in Palestine is not a truce, but the rigid application of the law against those who are breaking the peace of the country in an attempt to make ordered government and economic progress impossible.

The ten year truce, however, is no new idea. Its origin dates back to the proposals which have been made now for many years to the effect that Jewish immigration should be prohibited, and the Jewish population of Palestine crystallised at its present level. Under a new guise, the proposal amounts to the imposition on the Jews of Palestine of a permanent minority status. For that reason, it is a proposal which the Jews have consistently opposed. Its acceptance would mean a death blow to the very essence of the Zionist idea. Those who seek for a solution to the problem of Palestine would do well to accommodate their plans more closely to considerations of justice and of practical politics.

Its purpose has always been to bring harmony in the community as a whole and not to favor a section or group of individuals. Under the leadership of Rabbi Schussheim there have been conducted a Hebrew and a Religious School, adult classes, social and religious activities which have been the model for many similar organizations in New England. 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Propose Boycott of Italian Goods

Paper Warns of Retaliation

LONDON. — The Jewish People's Council against Fascism and anti-Semitism planned this week to boycott Italian goods.

A resolution adopted protested persecution of Italian Jews and suggested that other Jewish bodies co-operate in the boycott.

It was understood that the Jewish Board of Deputies, which represents the entire Jewish population of Great Britain, might be consulted later.

The Burial Society of the Federation of synagogues in a letter to Jewish stone masons requested them not to use Italian marble or granite for memorials.

Warns of Retaliation

ROME. — Commenting on the proposed boycott, the Giornale d'Italia today said the "venture is inadvisable and the situation of Italian Jews could become much graver."






