

Sour Milk

The ways of anti-Semitism are similar but the circumstances differ. Recently letters were received from four farmers by the N. Y. Milk Board charging that all their troubles could be traced to the Jewish milk dealers. These letters were from widely separated parts of the state and their sudden appearance indicates that someone has been authorized to create racial prejudice among the farmers in the state.

Now, as we all know, Jewish milk dealers are no different from other milk dealers. They have no corner on milk profits and are a small factor in the business compared to the operations of Bordens, Sheffield and the League. There must be a purpose behind this sudden stirring up of the "Jewish question."

This present campaign is another link in the chain of events to bind the nation's opinion. It will distract the farmer's attention from the real issues involved and provide a whipping boy who can be blamed for everything from small milk checks to excess tax rates.

It is obvious that pressure groups working on behalf of the milk monopoly interests in New York have created this diversion to provide a smoke screen for their selfish activities.

This manifestation of propaganda among the farmers should be neutralized; for the farmers must be made to realize that anti-Semitism is a flank attack against democracy. If they listen to the arguments of these Jew-baiters, they will be the losers in the final reckoning.

## Expect 600 Delegates At Zionist Conclave

Sessions Begin On August 16

GENEVA. — The Arrangements Bureau for the 21st biennial Zionist Congress is completing plans for the accommodation of about 600 delegates and nearly 1000 guests at the first session, which will be held the evening of August 16 in the spacious hall of the Municipal Theater.

One of the largest delegations will be the American with 115 members. Special measures have been taken to facilitate the work of some 150 representatives of Jewish and non-Jewish newspapers and agencies from various parts of the world who are expected to attend the sessions.

For the first time the German language will not be used in official publications of the congress. The Congress Bureau announced that the official newspapers of the sessions will be published in Hebrew alone, whereas in previous years it has been published in Hebrew and German.

## Quebec Boy Whips Jewish Women

STE. AGHATHE DES MONTS. — Quebec, A police investigation disclosed this week that an 11-year-old boy in a milk wagon had lashed at a group of Jewish women with a whip while the driver, 17, charged his horse into them. It was the first violence since anti-Jewish placards were posted last week end in this resort village.

Miss Mina Weinstein of Montreal told police that the whip struck her shoulder as she ran to avoid being run down.

Last Sunday, the Catholic priest of the village, commenting on anti-Jewish feeling, warned his parishioners against violence, but urged them to remain masters of their own community.

## Women's Colleges Show Effect of Nazi Propaganda

Exchange Students Have Successful Year Influencing College Opinion

At the close of the 1938-39 college year in this country, a survey reveals, Nazi officials had reason to rejoice, for their infiltration of Reich propaganda into U. S. Women's Colleges had been more successful this year than any other. Nazi officials were especially pleased with the results in New England and East Coast schools. Upon reviewing the state of affairs at Vassar, Barnard, Smith, Goucher, Bennington, Wellesly and Union, they warmly thanked Herr Dr. Rettig of the German University Service for a job well done. The fact that loyal Nazis, teaching German in American colleges, are actively boycotting textbooks written by anti-Nazi refugees, was recently discovered.

At Smith College, the head of the German Department, Summerfield, a Jew, has resigned because of the pressure his Nazi-inspired subordinates applied to him. Summerfield went to Queens despite the efforts of liberal-loving President Nielsen who did what he could to squelch all the talk and

NEWPORT. — The Jewish Congregation of Newport, first established in 1658 when 15 Jewish families settled here, will present to the city on August 20 a monument dedicated to the founders of religious liberty, first established on the continent in the State of Rhode Island.

W. Selden Washington and Edward Jonas Phillips, direct descendants of George Washington and Rabbi Moses Seixas, will read the exchange of messages between the first president and Seixas, leader of the Jewish congregation on the occasion of Washington's visit to that city. The re-enactment will take place on the steps of the ancient Newport Touro Synagogue.

## Butchers' Attempt to Settle Religious Dispute Ineffectual

Members of the Providence Retail Kosher Butchers Association last week attempted to arbitrate the dispute between the Waad Hacashruth and the Congregation Sons of Abraham but were unsuccessful. H. Bloom, president of the Association announced today. Their efforts were futile, Mr. Bloom said, because the Waad Hacashruth refused to attend the scheduled meeting.

When advised of the Butchers' statement, a spokesman of the Waad Hacashruth denied that the Waad Hacashruth was unwilling to have the dispute arbitrated. "When we were invited to the meeting," the official said, "we asked that we meet the butchers alone for a discussion of the mat-

ter. When we learned that representatives of the Sons of Abraham were to be present we decided not to appear for the disagreement is religious and only an impartial rabbinical tribunal is authorized to settle the dispute. We are, at any time, willing to arbitrate our differences before such a tribunal."

The Butcher Association statement in part read:

## Britain to Halt Illegal Entry

LONDON. — During the debate in the House of Commons on Monday of this week, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, R. A. Butler declared that the British Government has contacted a number of European governments with a view toward securing greater cooperation in preventing illegal immigration into Palestine.

## Prague Bans Jews From Public Baths

PRAGUE. — The authorities this week prohibited Jews from using public baths here under penalty of a fine or imprisonment. A police communique said a special pool had been set aside for Jews in the outskirts of the city. The alleged reason for the order was that "the presence of Jews in public baths disturb peace and order in the city."

## Quezon Restricts Aerea For Refugees

MANILLA. — President Manuel L. Quezon said this week he had told the Jewish refugee committee there was no land available in the Lanao section of Mindanao Province for such settlers.

He said the committee also inspected an isolated portion of Catabato Province which he thought suitable for refugee settlement. He said any refugee settlers would be asked to limit their efforts to cultivation of citrus fruits, rubber, vegetables and other crops which would not compete with Filipino agricultural products such as hemp and cocoanuts.

### PLAN ALIEN CENSUS

BRUSSELS. — A census of foreigners is expected to be taken immediately by the government, acting on a recommendation by the Interior Minister, to ascertain the role they play in the nation's economic life and to detect immigrants residing in Belgium.

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**Find Jewish Doctors Prefer Eastern U. S. Survey Report Reveals Status**

NEW YORK. — Although more than 47 per cent of the Jewish physicians in the United States practice in New York State, with the bulk concentrated on the Atlantic Seaboard between Baltimore and Boston, there are over 400 communities in the country with a population of 10,000 or more which have no Jewish physicians, according to a preliminary survey of the Medical Committee on Research released last week by the Conference on Jewish Relations.

The survey represents some of the findings of a committee which has been engaged for the past three years in a study of Jews in medicine in the United States.

**Religious Leader Clubbed to Death**

NEW BRUNSWICK. — Benjamin Levine, sixty-five, was clubbed to death in his dry-goods store last week. The slayer then wrapped the merchant's body in a bolt of cloth, laid it beside a counter and fled.

Levine, vice-president of Congregation Ahavas Achim, had \$65 in his pocket. The money was untouched. The shopkeeper had ten children. One is Mayor Hermann Levine of Ellenville, N. Y. Two daughters, Mrs. Marion Schlosser and Mrs. Annette Fritz, live in Brooklyn.

**Hebrew Is Revealed Fast-Growing Tongue**

NEW YORK. — Hebrew is the fastest growing language in the high schools of New York City according to the annual report by Dr. Theodore Huebner, acting director of foreign language. The annual report showed that Hebrew registration in the day high schools had increased from 2,007 in 1938 to 2,565 in 1939, a gain of 28 per cent.

**CHANGE CURRICULUM DANZIG.** — Lessons in Nazi ideology will replace religious courses in Danzig schools, it was officially disclosed this week, and only book stores with special permits will henceforth be allowed to sell religious books.

**Urges Cold, Practical Deals With Germany**

LONDON. — Advocating a firm attitude toward Germany on refugee problems, Robert Peet Skinner, former American publisher and diplomat, urged that interested nations inform Germany that her refugees would not be admitted unless they were provided with all expenses and had at least part of their property restored to them in Germany.

Writing in the Times, Mr. Skinner declared that "We should stand up to Germany in a cold, practical manner, and in this way we will render a better service to the suffering Jews." Such notice, he said, would force Germany to revise her policy and deal with the countries willing to accept refugees.

**Says Hes Made Comedian Success**

LOS ANGELES. — Harry W. Conn says he made Jack Benny what he is today, and he thinks it's worth \$65,000.

Conn, a writer of jokes and sketches, sued the radio and screen comedian for that amount, charging breach of contract.

He declared he became Benny's principal gag-writer in 1932 and remained with him for four and a half years, during which time he developed the characters and situations which popularized Benny and his program.

Since leaving Benny's employ in 1936 Conn contended, the comedian has continued to use the Conn characters, quips and sequences. The writer added that while he had been paid nothing, Benny had earned \$1,170,000 from radio programs and \$140,000 from motion pictures.

NEW YORK. — End of buttlegging across the river is anticipated hopefully by city and state officials as Jersey legislative leaders propose a 2-cent-a pack there too.

### He's Ag'in It

SAN FRANCISCO. — It's news to Bridges if the Communist Party advocates overthrow of the Government, he testified at his deportation hearings. And if it's true, then he's emphatically ag'in it.

### Must Correct Faults

MONTREAL. — Dr. John Manion, Canadian Conservative Party Leader this week said: "If the faults in the social and economic system are not corrected within ten or fifteen years, the capitalist system will be wiped out and the substitute will be some form of dictatorship."

### Coughlin Says So

NEW YORK. — Father Coughlin sounded off again in a reported interview appearing in Liberty magazine. "It is ridiculous," he said, "to say that I have any bias against the Jews as Jews. As a matter of fact I have repeatedly asked the Jews—the good, honest, religious, patriotic Jews—to join me in the fight against Communism."

### Hope to Unionize Chinese

NEW YORK. — Workers in Chow Mein and chop suey restaurants have incredibly bad conditions and unbelievably low wages, but a comprehensive effort is being made to unionize the 10,000 Chinese in the New York area.

### Pope Peace Appeal

VATICAN CITY. — The keynote to peace lies in sacrifice, without which the tenets of fascism or even of legality will fail, says Pope Pius in a letter which Cardinal Maglione has written to Canada and which is being hailed in some quarters here as the Pope's most important doctrinal pronouncement to date.

### Believe Dispute Ended

MOSCOW. — Reports from the Far East said this week that a Russian-Japanese dispute regarding Japanese oil and coal concessions in Russia's half of Sakhalin Island was believed to have been settled when the concessionaires granted Russian workers a 15 per cent wage increase.

### Bad Batting Average

WASHINGTON. — The seventy-sixth Congress had a bad batting average of .069 in bills passed during the session just ended. Of 10,515, bills introduced in both the Senate and the House only 725 were enacted. The cost of the legislative establishment for the year ending June 30 was about \$20,000,000.

### Red - Hunting Season

WASHINGTON. — The red-hunting season is set to open about Labor Day here. Die's un-American Committee will try to take up where it left off, and a new group will track down bogeymen in the NLRB.

### New York Retaliates

NEW YORK. — Westchester supervisors have definitely decided to scalp a 10-cent toll on Hutchinson River Parkway. Officials say it isn't retaliation for Connecticut's levy on Merritt Parkway — but everyone's skeptical.

### Labor Heads Meet

ATLANTIC CITY. — American Federation of Labor heads are meeting here to complete preparation for the annual national convention. The C.I.O. has been nominated for this year's scapegoat and it's to be blamed for everything, including Tory reactionaries.

### New Air-Mail Service



other for seven months.

They wore swastika charms on bracelets, and they both correspond with Nazi youths. When asked to attend a tea given by a faculty-refugee, they went only under protest.

Members of the German Department at Bennington, finding Nazi political cartoons clandestinely drawn on blackboards, have steadfastly refused to give in to pressure applied by Goebbels' agents.

**New Nazi Techniques**

A canvass of the pro-American German teachers from Maryland to Maine, in an attempt to disclose new Nazi techniques being employed in U. S. colleges, revealed:

- (1) German Exchange Students, of the masculine sex, are picked for physical charm and beauty; in the case of females, for brains and oratorical prowess. In one college town, the Nazi Adonis was so handsome as to attract scores of adolescent girls to the cause of the Fuehrer, almost overnight.
- (2) Pressure on German teachers by threatening to harm relatives still unable to leave the Fatherland.
- (3) Offers of free textbooks discount tours during vacations, "immunity" when "Der Tag" comes.
- (4) Intimidation of Jewish refugee students, pointing out that dire injury will befall their kin in the Reich should they fail to speak a good word for the Nazis.
