TWENTY-TWO NEW HEBREW Day Schools, including 14 primary schools, were opened in the United States for the current academic years, bringing the total of such Orthodox-oriented schools throughout the country to 268, according to a report issued last week by Samuel C. Feuerstein, president of Torah Umesorah, the National Society for Hebrew Day Schools. The new schools included five junior high schools and three high schools, Mr. Feuerstein said. PRIME MINISTER DAVID BENGURION is of the firm conviction that sooner or later the Soviet authorities will have to permit Jews to leave Russia to settle in Israel. He told members of the United Jewish Appeal study mission at a banquet last week that he was sure the time would come, "next year or five years from now," when the Soviet leaders would have to let the Jews go.

MARK CHAGALL, THE NOTED Jewish artist, was presented the 1960 Erasmus Prize by Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands at a ceremony attended by King Frederick of Denmark and Prince Philip of Britain. Sharing the \$15,000 prize was Oskar Koloschka.

ISRAEL'S BAR ASSOCIATION is not averse to any of its members becoming associated with Dr. Robert Servatius, German lawyer, in the defense of Nazi Adolf Eichmann. However, the association said it would not name any attorney to assist in the defense.

THE UNITED STATES NATIONAL Institute of Health announced that a \$100,000 grant has been made to Professor Leo Sachs of the Weizman Institute of Science in Rehovot, Israel, for research on the role of viruses in cancer.

THE QUEBEC ATTORNEY general has been instructed to investigate the activities of Henri Bellefeuille, the avowed Canadian Fascist. Premier Jean Lesage told the 35th Canadian Zionist Convention in Montreal last week. Bellefeuille, a Sorel Quebec draftsman, appeared last week on a Canadian national television program, which also featured George Lincoln Rockwell, the Virginia self-appointed leader of the so-called American Nazi Party. The Sorel draftsman claims to be the leader of a group of 400 to 500 native Canadians who meet in Montreal each month. Bellefeuille has been quoted as declaring, "I am anti-Semitic and proud of it."

A BROCHURE CHARGING THAT 51 of the 69 high echelon officials in the West German Foreign Ministry had served as diplomats under Joachim von Ribbentrop, Hitler's Foreign Minister was released in Frankfurt last week by the Association of Persons Persecuted by the Nazis. A left-wing group, the Association charged that 51 of West Germany's embassies are directed by former Nazi diplomats and that 80 percent of the higher echelon civil servants had previously served under Ribbentrop.

Unauthorized Man Reported Collecting Money For ADL

An unauthorized man who identifies himself as Daniel and has been collecting funds supposedly for the Anti Defamation League of B'nai B'rith in Connecticut has been reported to the Providence office of the ADL by Mort Feigenbaum of the Connecticut Regional office.

According to Mr. Feigenbaum, the only authorized agency to raise funds for the ADL is the Joint Defense Appeal and the J.D.A. does not normally engage in door-to-door solicitation.

The man is described as being five foot, one or two inches tall, 52 to 55 years old with whitening-yellow hair cut long in back and balding on top. He is called thin, fast-moving, spry, sounding like a "New Yorker" and using some Jewish words, and has nails noticeably polished although his hands are not well-manicured.

Although he has not been reported in Rhode Island as yet, Mr. Feigenbaum says that if he is seen he should be reported at once to the police and B'nai B'rith officials.

First Informed Eichmann Alive In 1953 Letter

JERUSALEM — Simon Wiesenthal, an architect from Linz, Austria, who played a leading part in the search for Adolf Eichmann, has disclosed that he was first informed of Eichmann's presence in Argentina in a letter written in 1953. He said it was from a German who then was an adviser to the Peron regime.

Wiesenthal, 52, who came to Israel for consultations on the forthcoming Eichmann trial on charges of mass slaying of Jews under Hitler, said that it was an Austrian contact man—a baron—who showed him the letter.

The letter stated: "All sorts of Nazis are now moving about in Argentina — among them Adolf Eichmann who has a job with some water workers. I have seen him several times myself and there are others who spoke to him."

Shields His Informant

Wiesenthal told a news conference last week he was not ready to disclose the name of the German informant.

Sinai Launches Building Campaign

Philip Segal, president of Temple Sinai, Suburban Reform Temple, has announced that at a recent meeting of their congregation it was decided to launch a campaign to raise \$125,000 to erect a building to house their temple and religious school on their site at the Meshanticut Interchange.

Dr. Albert Goodman, a Warwick dentist and one of the founders, was appointed Building Fund Campaign chairman. Dr. Goodman, in accepting the chairmanship, said, "our Jewish community is a new one: our congregation just barely three years old. However, the population explosion to the suburbs has caused our community to grow very rapidly. As a result, this has presented us with problems in our religious organization. We need a religious edifice in which to worship and a school structure wherein our children may learn their Jewish heritage and practice.

Campaign offices have been opened at 340 Budlong Road in Cranston.

Coalition Teeters At Breaking Point Over Lavon Affair

NEW YORK — Israel's ruling coalition teetered on the breaking point as the cabinet met to try to smooth over the Lavon Affair. Three left-wing members of the ruling Mapai party had walked out of the last meeting called to settle the dispute, and the minister from the extremist Ahdut Avoda labor party was reported ready to join them last week. The split came when Premier David Ben-Gurion, who had consented to allow investigation of the affair to continue with a ministerial committee he proposed, refused to accept a minister from the left-wing Mapam party as a member. A Mapam leader had called the Lavon affair a Dreyfuss affair, a reference to the Dreyfus affair in France at the turn of the century. The cabinet sought still another compromise late today before the Knesset convened to hear a speech by Ben-Gurion. He said he would not mention the Lavon Affair, but he promised to defend the Israeli army against comments made in discussion of the case. His ministerial committee is to decide if a full-scale inquiry is needed to establish the circumstances of a "security mishap" of 1955.

The dispute reportedly originated with an Israeli attack on the Egyptian army's headquarters in the Gaza Strip. Diplomats said Pinhas Lavon opposed the attack.

Cuban Jews Migrate To Miami

MIAMI—Between 500 and 1,500 Cuban Jews have migrated to this city in recent months and the potentials of a new Jewish refugee problem may be shaping up it was revealed here last week.

Leaders of the Jewish community are quick to point out, however, that the Jewish migration from Cuba has not been caused by any signs of official anti-Semitism on the island, or by any Cuban governmental actions that affect Jews specifically.

The Jewish community is on the alert, against the possibility that a further influx of Cuban Jews may in the near future have an impact upon the facilities of the various local and national Jewish organizations concerned with immigration, resettlement, and vocational guidance.

Sam J. Heiman, president of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, and the organization's executive director, Samuel Cohen, have confirmed that one of the first tasks facing the Jewish community is the ascertainment of the exact number of Cuban Jews who have come here.

The 500-1,500 figure is an "educated" guess within a wide range, while some Jews here believe that the number of Cuban Jews who have arrived in Miami and vicinity recently may run to as high a figure as 2,000.

United Hias Service, Inc., the international immigrant aid society, has sent two department heads from its national headquarters in New York to look into the situation. The executives, Ann S. Petluck and Harvey M. Friedman, agreed with the local leaders that the influx of Cuban Jewry needs careful watching. "We are concerned with the possible emergence of future problems," Miss Petluck stated, "and we wish to ascertain what existing agencies can do now to assist those Jewish Cuban refugees who may need service."

One of the immediate problems concerning the Cuban Jewish refugees is their status as immigrants. The majority are here with tourist visas, and most of them do not seem to know how to extend their stay in the United States.

Cuba's Jewish population, at the time the Castro regime took over the government of that country, was about 11,000. Of the total, about 7,000 lived in Havana. About three-quarters of the Jews in Cuba were in small retail trade, about 15 percent were connected with larger merchant establishments, and approximately 10 percent were in various consumer-goods, professional or service categories.

Most of the Cuban Jews here

seem to have brought along enough money to meet their immediate needs for some time, Jewish leaders here believe. But many of them need direction and guidance, not only in regard to their immigrant status but also about business and job possibilities and about Jewish religious facilities available to them.

The program will consist of reports of the president, the chairman of the budget committee, the Ladies Association, and the executive director.

**Expresses Regret For Killing Jews**

**HAGEN, West Germany** — A former concentration camp officer accused of the murder of hundreds of Jews in Holland during World War II tearfully told a court here:

"I want to express my regrets about the death of the innocent people whom I have shot by order."

Paul Thomanek, 51, added: "Today I know that the extermination of the Jews was a horrible crime."

The prosecution earlier asked for hard labor for life for Thom-

anek, saying evidence showed he was guilty of 575 cases of murder of Jewish forced laborers in Poland during the war.

But Tomanek told the court last week he did not commit most of the killings.

He said when he shot people he was only carrying out orders and, "At that time they said: 'Who does not follow us is against us.'"

# The Funny Side Of Israeli Elections

Although Israel's general and municipal elections are a deadly serious business to professional politicians and political parties, they provide an inexhaustible supply of jokes, true anecdotes and hilarious mix-ups.

Here is a selection of funny things which actually happened during the last election campaign.

In Jerusalem, professional beggars and shnorrrers discussed organization of an overall union to back a certain political party in elections to the Knesset and the Jerusalem City Council. Mapai, the beggars decided, was out of the question as the Mapai regime, they said, squeezes all citizens dry of taxes, so that people don't have anything left over for alms.

A religious regime would be a real calamity, they pointed out, because while the rabbis may know every single letter of the Torah, they are quite ignorant about economic affairs, industrialization and agricultural development. More and more people would be unemployed under a religious theocracy, and there would be more beggars on the streets. And who needs competition?

For the same reasons, a Herut government would be disastrous, the beggars stressed. Herutniks would go to war against the Arabs, and with people getting killed and bombs falling, who has time for beggars?

The best way out of the balloting dilemma, they finally decided, would be to vote for the General Zionists who are a party of shopkeepers, businessmen, capitalists and rich people. While workers and kibbutzniks would suffer under a General Zionist government, the rich people would be even richer and the shopkeepers will always be good for a fast shnor. Since there are about two thousand beggars in and around Jerusalem, other parties tried to persuade them to vote for different tickets, promising not to enforce any anti-begging laws (proposed by some politicians, who said that many beggars, some of them hideously disfigured, disgrace Jerusalem's streets).

All political parties sent special teams of door-to-door agitators to ring bells of private apartments and persuade housewives to persuade their husbands to vote in a certain way.

Applying high-pressure sales techniques, they promised the housewives an easier life, more benefits for their husbands and children, and real heaven on earth.

The door-to-door teams varied with each party's program. The General Zionists sent solid-looking and confidence-inspiring citizens, who talked with the housewives about grocery prices and household articles, told her what, when and where to buy at bargain rates and gained her confidence before getting down to business.

Mapai sent an honest-looking man and woman, who told the housewives how they would help their husbands get bigger salaries by voting for Ben-Gurion, how their children would get free high school education, and so on.

Herut teams consisted of two lean, handsome and tough-looking youths who asked the housewife right away if she wanted to be raped and tortured by the Arabs, see her husband perish in an Arab slave camp and have her children taken away from her and brought up as Moslems. After the poor woman nearly fainted from panic, the agitators shouted: "Well, if you don't want these things to happen, vote for Herut! We'll know how to handle the Arabs..."

Religious parties sent two elderly men, who adopted a fatherly attitude. They did not ask the housewife if she kept a kosher kitchen or observed the Sabbath, but instead asked her if she knew that most Israeli school children turned out to be juvenile delinquents (which is not true) because their studies at school are divorced from the spirit of religion and that they are taught that there is no God. If the housewife failed to be convinced by this argument, they asked her if she had a daughter and pointed out that under the present "regime of immorality" most young Israeli girls are great sinners. Does she want to keep her daughter nice, clean and pure? Well, vote for us then...

Communist agitation teams varied according to their area of operations. In Arab districts, two handsome Arab warriors went from house to house, and asked the voters if they wanted to live under bloodsucking Zionist Jewish oppression in an imperialist anti-Arab Jewish State, or if they prefer to live in free Arab Palestine? Since all Arabs prefer to live in free Arab Palestine, rather than under Jewish rule, they were told

to vote for the Reds and see how fast Jews get kicked out of "our Arab Palestine."

In Jewish areas, two pretty Jewish girls, members of a Communist youth organization, were assigned to agitating teams. They helped the housewives with their chores, offered free baby-sitting services, etc., and asked the housewife if she wanted her husband to earn more and work less, if she wanted an atomic war and destruction of her family, if she wanted a resurgent Nazi Germany with Gestapo and concentration camps, if she wanted free university education for her children, etc. The overall panacea to everything, it appeared, was to vote the K ticket, K standing for Communists.

One housewife in Haifa, getting sick and tired of bells ringing on her door from early morning to night and of being nagged and cajoled, wrote the following declaration on a foolscap sheet of paper, which she pasted on her front door:

"To all political parties: I love the Gestapo, I want to be raped by the Arabs, I adore Nazi Germany, I support nuclear warfare, I don't think my children need any education, I would like my husband to work longer hours, I want my son to be a gangster, I am in favor of racial discrimination, I think my husband earns too much, I want to be alone and in peace and I DON'T WANT to be bothered by stupid agitators!" No one knocked at her door after that.

Since not all Israeli voters can read Hebrew or understand the political issues involved, all political parties agreed, as far back as the first Knesset elections, to use letter symbols for each party's balloting ticket. Thus, the Communist ticket is marked with the letter K. Instead of reading the list of 120 Commie candidates (each party has the right to put up 120 candidates, i.e., as many as there are seats in the Knesset, even though it is known in advance

(Continued from Page 3) that no more than three or four will be elected), Communist voters drop the K ticket into the ballot box, thus voting for the party.

The Progressive mark their tickets with the letter P, Herut with H, and so forth. Mapam and Mapai have the same initial letter M, but since Mapai is the bigger party, it was given the choice of picking the letter M for itself, leaving the rival Mapam to look for another symbol. Mapam politicians were already worrying during sleepless nights which letter to choose. They already believed their party was through, because the only free letters left in the Hebrew alphabet were D, T, L and S. Of these, T was picked by a very orthodox religious party (because T stands for Torah) while L was grabbed by another religious group, because L stands for Limudim (education).

Mapam was left with D and S, and its politicians were frantic with worry. What shall we do with letters like that? they asked each other. Who will ever associate D or S with our party or our Programs?

Just when things looked blackest for Mapam, all for the lack of

a suitable letter, Mapai handed Mapam the Letter M on a silver platter.

As it turned out, Mapai out-smarted itself. Top experts of mass psychology advised Mapai leadership to drop any idea of adopting the letter M as its symbol, and take the letter A instead.

"A is the first letter of the alphabet," they pointed out, "and easiest to remember. It is symbolic of superiority and great strength, best quality and highest standards. 'Vote A for an A-A standard of living', for instance, is the best election slogan you can have," they continued to argue.

Mapai party chiefs were convinced and took A, giving M to Mapam. The joke was on them, however, because thousand of people who wanted to vote for Mapai, but did not listen to election campaign propaganda, thought that Mapai is M, and voted for Mapam, believing that they boosted Ben-Gurion's party into superior power...

It is estimated that Mapam received a free windfall from the letter mix-up, worth thousands of pounds in election propaganda costs.

Mapai's Central Bureau of Statistics published a top-secret survey of Israel's most popular surnames. It appears that Israel's most common and frequent name is Cohen, or derivations thereof (like Kohn, Cohn, Kagan, Caplan, Cogan, Kahan, Katz, Katzenstein, Cohana, etc.).

It is followed by Levy and derivations thereof (like Levi, Levine,

Dear Friend:

What a great privilege we have just experienced! As members of the 7th UJA Study Mission--our work has concluded and tomorrow we leave Israel heading for home.

Before leaving I have felt an urge to write many of our friends in Providence--to tell them of the great Paradox of Israel.

Fantastic is too mild an adjective to describe all we have seen. From all four corners of this country--come the unbelievable. To the eye all is gold--housing - farming - building - culture. But, alas, "all is not gold that glitters."

All phases of development and growth cannot be described in words--they must be seen to be appreciated. From all corners it looks like the most thriving, booming, growing country and it is. But the Mission, from early morning till late evening for two weeks, went below the surface to look directly to the heart of Israel's problems. If the word for development is fantastic, then too, that word must apply to their problems. They are unbelievably numerous--and they must be met head on.

But I do want to add in closing--that the most crucial thing we have seen, the one we gave most attention to--and the one on which you can help immediately is the plight of 130,000 immigrants living in 485 new farm settlements. Lack of funds to bring water to irrigate their land, lack of equipment to till the soil still leaves them unable to support themselves. I must report to you that if help isn't forthcoming - soon - Israel's hopes for developing an economically stable society rooted in a productive farm population will suffer a fatal setback.

This, therefore, is TOP PRIORITY. The need for cash funds is urgent and I most earnestly appeal to every contributor to our Providence Campaign to honor his pledge as soon as he can - before the end of the year - if possible. I know that if Providence can remit the largest sum it ever has at this time of the year, we shall be making a tremendous plus contribution toward this urgent problem. Please pass the word along and get your friends to do likewise.

## Foods To Remember

And here's an attractive way of serving Veal, especially some cold evening.

### VEAL PIES

(6 Individuals or 1-9 inch round)

- 1 1/2 pounds shoulder or breast of veal, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/4 cup flour
- Salt, pepper and paprika to taste
- 3 to 4 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1 onion, diced fine
- 6 small whole carrots scraped
- 1/4 cup diced celery and leaves
- Water as directed below
- 3 medium potatoes, diced fine
- Flour and cold water for thickening
- 2 cups cooked rice

Dredge the cubed veal in flour to which salt, pepper and paprika has been added. Heat shortening in frying pan and saute meat cubes till lightly browned on all sides. Add diced onion and enough hot water to prevent scorching. Cover tightly and let simmer for 30 minutes. Add celery and carrots and continue to cook for 15 minutes or till whole carrots are tender enough to pierce with a wooden toothpick. Pour off cooking liquid and thicken with flour and water, cooking separately till clear and thick enough to add as gravy to the cooked meat and vegetables, including the diced potatoes. Cook again till diced potatoes are tender. Turn into individual round or square ovenware serving pie plates, or use a round pie plate. Arrange cooked rice in a border and slip under the broiler flame of oven for 3 to 5 minutes before serving. If using a 9-inch pie plate, cut into wedges and serve.



man, who never was a Nazi and who still is living in Argentina.

Wiesenthal said that during the Nazi rule he was interned in no fewer than 13 concentration camps. After the war he joined the Allied War Crimes Commission, searching for wanted Nazis.

He also founded the Jewish Central Committee for Austria, an organization of concentration camp survivors. When he started the search for Eichmann he had few clues to build on and no photograph, but was able to intensify his search after SS fuehrer Willie Hoette testified at one of the Nurnberg trials that he had seen Eichmann alive on May 2, 1946, in Altaussee, Austria.

### Blocked Official 'Death'

By the end of 1945, Wiesenthal established that Eichmann's wife, Vera, still lived in Altaussee. He said he succeeded in thwarting her attempt to have her husband officially declared dead.

She had produced an affidavit by a German soldier, Karl Lucas, who testified at a district court in Bad Ischl that Eichmann fell in the battle of Prague.

Wiesenthal said he proved to the court that Lucas was married to Vera Eichmann's sister.

### A Letter to Wife

Wiesenthal described his efforts to get a photo of Eichmann and said finally, in 1947, someone discovered one belonging to a former girl friend of Eichmann. Another photo was found at about the same time, but both dated from 1934 or 1935.

At that time, however, there was no trace of Eichmann himself, who had spent a time as a woodcutter in northern Germany.

However, on Dec. 31, 1949, he was almost captured when searchers got hold of a letter from Eichmann to his wife in which he said that he would visit her on the last day of the year "somewhere in upper Austria," Wiesenthal said.

But someone must have given Eichmann a last-minute warning. He was believed to have been only several hundred yards from the group waiting for him when he was alerted and disappeared in the night.

It was immediately afterwards that Eichmann must have decided to leave Europe for good, Wiesenthal said.

NEW YORK — A Queens rabbi said last week he would appeal directly to Police Commissioner Kennedy for protection following a Halloween raid on his synagogue by 30 young vandals.

"They have gone too far this time," said Rabbi Abraham Ginsberg, 30. "We have been averag-

ing a broken window a week for the last year."

Last week's raid on the Kessel St. Synagogue, broke about a dozen windows and eggs were thrown into the hallway and the rabbi's office.

The synagogue, branch of the Rabbinical Seminary of America, houses students. For seven years, according to Rabbi Ginsberg, it has been the target of youthful anti-semites.

"I've asked the precinct for protection and they promised to have a radio car keep an eye out," he said. "But this doesn't seem to do any good."

**Scribbled Word In Notebook Helps Build African Aid Program**

ACCRA, Ghana—From a scribbled word in a black notebook the Israeli Government has built an aid-to-Africa program that has broken down some political barriers and made the Israelis possibly the most welcome strangers in West Africa, according to a New York Times article by A. M. Rosenthal.

The word was "shiplines." It was jotted down by an Israeli official here three years ago when the new Ghana Government was showing its assistance "shopping list" to foreign missions. Six months later the Ghanaian flag was flying over vessels of a Ghanaian-Israeli shipping line.

For the past two years the line has been showing a profit. Now the Israelis are selling their 40 per cent interest back to Ghanaians. Until the Ghanaians can take over entirely, Israelis will manage the line on a contact basis.

**Speed Important Factor**  
That first venture showed the factors that have made Israeli assistance popular in Ghana. These are speed, economy, no talk about charity, and understanding by both sides that the Israelis are ready and eager to move out of a program as quickly as they moved in.

In Ghana and in other West African countries such as Mali and Senegal, Africans give other reasons for their interest in assistance from Israel:

"We have no fears of getting involved in a power struggle," said a Mali politician.

"It seems logical to us that since we are small we can learn more from a small, efficient country than from a big, efficient country," an official in Senegal said.

For the Israelis, the program has brought political benefits. Chief among them is that it has helped Israel establish diplomatic relations with virtually every new African state. This was a prime Israeli motivation — to prevent the Arab states from building boycott walls around her in Africa.

The Israelis do not pretend that their assistance program has given them any great political leverage in West Africa. At the United Nations, Israel and the African states are often on opposite sides of the

voting sheet. And the African states are being wooed by great powers.

**26 Nations Represented**  
There was a time in Ghana when Israel might have had more political influence simply by being one of the first nations on the spot. But there are twenty-six foreign nations represented here now.

The Israelis make it clear that they think one of their chief attributes is the fact that they are not pushing too hard for influence. Their political goal was to break out of political encirclement and they feel they have achieved it.

Some Westerners in Africa feel that the Israeli program could serve as a model for their own activities. But as far as the United States is concerned, the Israeli aid program is built on two essentials that Washington might find difficult to copy.

The first is quick action. The Israeli Embassy here does not have to refer every request for a specialist home for judgment. The Embassy can make up its own mind on the merits of the appeal and get the man here in two weeks. The United States program is a complicated, slowly moving affair. Washington usually makes the decisions.

**Joint Ownership Key Factor**  
The Israelis are also convinced of the importance of joint stock companies formed with Governments of African nations. As a Socialist-minded country, Israel has no objections to spreading the base of publicly owned industry and trade.

The Israelis make it a point of emphasizing that although they have technical knowledge, they are from a small country with limited resources. Thus, they say, the African states will have to participate in the program themselves — by contributing funds for joint companies and by paying salaries of experts. This seems to sit well.

The Israelis have created water development and construction companies with the Nigerians and have experts in several African countries. However, their main effort so far has been Ghana.

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

### ELECTION WILL HELP SHORTEN RECESSION

Just the fact that the election is over will help moderate and shorten the 1960 recession.

It could be that the 1960 downturn will be among the mildest, if not the mildest, and shortest of recent history. It could be that fairly soon we'll start to glimpse the beginning of its end.

We put one plus into the economic picture this week when we eliminated the uncertainty about the election, for uncertainty is always a disturbing factor. Now we have a President-elect and we know he is committed to policies to speed up our economic expansion.

We know that for months this Administration has been spending increasing amounts of money to help curb the downturn (which it hasn't yet admitted exists) and it is going to continue doing so between now and Inauguration Day.

We know that in the current rolling readjustment, lots of heavy industries already have been rolled quite a bit.

Most important, we know that two forces which played a crucial part in causing this recession have now been dramatically reversed.

This last point is vital, and it has been astoundingly underplayed. To get to its heart, let's ask and answer the question, "Why did the economy suddenly falter in early 1960?"

The two major reasons for the timing are:

(1) The spectacular, unprecedented swing in the Federal budget from deficit to surplus-- which placed the government in the position of subtracting billions of dollars from the national income and put an abrupt brake on demand. In the last three months of 1959, the Federal budget was \$4.5 billion in the red, meaning the government put that much more into the economy than it took out in taxes. In the first three months of 1960, the budget was \$4.4 billion in the black, meaning the government took that much more out than it put in. That's a sensational switch in spending of almost \$9 billion in a few months! There is no switch comparable to it on record and it explains in large part why the economy began slowing down at precisely that time.

(2) The massive clamp down on credit in 1959 by the Federal Reserve System to curb inflation-- which slashed the availability of loans to businessmen, states, cities, homebuilders, homebuyers, etc. This forced the shelving of countless projects which otherwise would have helped make jobs, pad paychecks and prop our economy.

These two powerful depressing forces-- coming into an economy "tired" after a two year advance, squirming under the impact of fierce competition from abroad as well as at home, loaded with goods, not inspired by any new invention or breakthrough-- did it.

But now, instead of operating billions in the black, the government is barely covering its outgo, and it easily may be back in the red in 1961. At every level now, government spending is on the rise and additional flow of money into the business stream is a spur.

Now, instead of clamping down on credit, the Federal Reserve System is pumping funds into the banking system, making credit widely available, trying to encourage borrowing. The Central Bank is making sure that there's plenty of cash for mortgage and business loans.

Add to these dramatic reversals the fact that industry has been cleaning its shelves through most of the year, that the total of personal incomes is being maintained, that the stock market drop has discounted much bad news and stock prices are on a much sounder basis, that corporations across the country are really working hard now to control costs so they can price goods more attractively, that we have a new Administration which will concentrate on accelerating our growth-- and it's reasonable to believe that 1960's recession will not be sharp or prolonged.

If it does turn out this way, we will have given convincing proof to the world of the fundamental strength and vitality of our nation.

## ONE MAN'S OPINION

### After A Thousand Years

In the turmoil of world events, with harsh words being exchanged between East and West, with Cuba, and the Congo, and Algiers, and other points of trouble very much in the news, let us talk about the Bible. About a particular Bible, which is over a thousand years old, and which has traveled from Israel to Egypt, from Egypt to Syria, and from Syria to Sweden, and now is back in Israel. Let us talk about the Keser Torah, the Crown of the Torah, copied by Ben Asher who lived in Tiberias over a thousand years ago, and of the search for it ever since the outbreak of the Arab-Israel conflict, and of its redemption.

Let us begin at the beginning. About two years ago, in the magazine Sinai, in Israel, President Ben Zvi announced with glee: "I have some good news today for all Jews and for students of the Bible everywhere. The precious manuscript, the Keser Torah, was found again, and is now in secure hands."

The "secure hands," it now appears, were the hands of a Swedish antiquarian. President Ben Zvi negotiated for over two years for the purchase of the manuscript, and using the Israel consulate in Sweden, completed the transaction. The manuscript is now in Israel, where it belongs.

The Keser Torah is written on parchment, but is not in scroll form as are the Torahs used in the synagogues, but is in the form of a book. In other words, it is not a Torah to read from in the Synagogue, but a Torah for study. It was written by Ben Asher of Tiberias, a city known for her scholars and scribes. Ben Asher was the head of a Yeshiva, an Academy in Tiberias, and a great grammarian.

The Rambam (Maimonides) writes in his book Yad Hahzahak, among other things, the following:



## The Lyons Den

THE CONDUCTOR: Dimitri Mitropoulos had been warned he would die if he continued working, but that was the way he wanted it, the way it came to him during a rehearsal at La Scala last week. La Scala was home to him, as was the Met, Carnegie, Covent Garden, Minneapolis and even the Roxy Theater-- wherever there was music and men to play it.

Mitropoulos occupied a sentimental niche at our home: He conducted the Met, Opera performance of "Carmen" in which a son of mine made his debut. The conductor's own debut on Broadway was in "On the Town" when, one night, he and Leonard Bernstein sat among the "customers" in the show's nightclub scene. He'd always "advise" younger musicians who interested him, but warned them: "Advice can never be a substitute for experience."

Mitropoulos had his own gauge in determining the popularity of

"Since I found many mistakes in all the scrolls that I have seen, I therefore copied the Bible correctly. The Book on which I relied in these matters is the famous Bible which is now in Egypt, but was formerly from Jerusalem. We can rely on this Book because it was revised and corrected by Ben Asher."

A great recommendation by a great scholar. Since we follow the Rambam's laws of writing a Sefer Torah, and since the Rambam himself copied the Torah after the manuscript of Ben Asher, it follows that our Torah scrolls in use today, are the great grandchildren of this Ben Asher manuscript.

And now the original of Ben Asher's manuscript is redeemed and in Jewish hands. A great occasion for rejoicing.

In the thousand years of its life, the Manuscript has wandered from Tiberias, where it was written and painstakingly corrected, to Jerusalem. In the days of the crusades, in 1070, the book Keser Torah fell into the hands of robbers who brought it to Egypt. The Jews of Egypt redeemed the Book and deposited it in the "Jerusalem Synagogue" in Cairo. It was there, in that Synagogue, that the Rambam saw the manuscript and used it.

After five hundred years, the Keser Torah was stolen from Cairo. That was under the Turkish rule. But the Jews of Aleppo, Syria, bought the Keser Torah, because of its great value. They knew this to be the Book which the Rambam used. They guarded it with their life. They kept the Book in an iron box. They put two locks on the box, and the keys to the locks were entrusted to two different elders. No one could open the box and look at the Book unless the entire Communal council was present. They would not allow

scientists to photograph it or to study it. That was until 1948. In that year, the Arab-Israel conflicts began, and the Jews of the Arab countries suffered greatly. Their synagogues were destroyed, and the synagogue of Aleppo among them. The Keser Torah was gone.

No one knows by what routes the Book made its way to Sweden. But the news about its discovery in Sweden reached Israel. The search began, and it ended with the redemption of the Book and the announcement of President Ben Zvi.

The Keser Torah has finally returned home.

I am telling about the Keser Torah, and about Ben Asher, and about President Ben Zvi, while the West hurls invectives to the East, and Cuba defies the United States, and in the Congo the confusion grows greater and greater, and Algeria in on the point of rebellion again. Who knows whether anyone will remember these things a thousand years from now? But Keser Torah wandered, and suffered, and was remembered, and was redeemed a thousand years after a humble man, Ben Asher, sat over its pages and corrected them, going over every word, every dot, every punctuation, three times.

Therein lies the mystery of the Torah and the mystery of the people of the Torah.







# Bridge

## Logic In Defense

by Revoke

In the following hand, declarer failed to press home the advantage of a good opening lead on this hand:

North

♠—K, J, 7, 3  
♥—Q, J, 10, 8, 5  
♦—K, 3, 2  
♣—Q

West

♠—9, 8, 6  
♥—K, 9, 2  
♦—A, 9, 5, 4  
♣—A, 7, 3

East

♠—Q, 10, 2  
♥—7, 6  
♦—10, 8, 7  
♣—J, 10, 9, 8, 2

South

♠—A, 5, 4  
♥—A, 4, 3  
♦—Q, J, 6  
♣—K, 6, 5, 4

North had opened 1H and South's response of 3NT ended the auction. West led the nine of spades and dummy's king held the trick. East playing the two and

South the four. The queen of hearts was led at trick two and allowed to win, the next lead of the jack of hearts being taken by West with the king. West now switched to the ace of clubs, on which East played the jack and South the four. He continued with the seven of clubs, on which East played the two and South the five.

At this point readers may care to put themselves in West's position and take stock of the situation. On the one hand your partner has played the two of spades—the most discouraging card. On the other hand he has played the clubs in a most encouraging manner—the jack followed by the two. Is there anything to contradict the first impression that partner would like a club continuation? West thought not and led a further club. South won and made four heart tricks, two spades, two diamonds, and one club to land his contract. In fact, West's faulty bridge logic had led him to the wrong answer.

It was true that East had encouraged heavily in clubs, but West knew him to hold the 10, 9, 8, since he had played the jack to the first trick and West's seven had been allowed to hold the next. Had East wanted a third club it was open to him to assure it by overtaking the seven with the eight to lead a club himself. Only one conclusion could be drawn from his failure to do so, and that was that West was now required to lead some other suit. The other suit could not conceivably be a red one; therefore, in spite of having played the two to the first round, East must want his partner to play a spade. Having reasoned thus it is not difficult to realize that the one spade holding consistent with East's play is Q, 10, 2.

At the other table South had no trouble after an initial diamond lead, for although the defense were able to find the club switch they could only take two clubs and one trick in each red suit.




