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### Organization Asked To Advertise And Back Jewish Newspapers

BOSTON — Joseph G. Weisberg, editor of the Boston Jewish Advocate and president of the American Association of English-Jewish Newspapers, declared that national Jewish organizations, "which spend thousands of dollars each year for publicity," rarely think of advertising in the English-Jewish press.

Some organizations "have even entered into advertising competition with the weekly Jewish papers by actively soliciting ads for their own house organs in territories served by the weeklies from customers developed by the newspapers," Weisberg said.

"Organizational heads, who would not hesitate to pay enormous fees for a guest speaker," he wrote, "get apoplexy at the thought of buying advertising space to go along with the free publicity they demand."

### Debate Brings Arab Anti-Israel Blast

UNITED NATIONS — Another bitter exchange between Israel and one of the Arab delegations took place here last week, when Ambassador Arieh Eshel, Israel's deputy permanent representative and his country's representative in the General Assembly's Special Political Committee, clashed with Lebanon's Ambassador to Washington, Nadin Dimechkie.

The committee is currently discussing the South African Apartheid issue, but this is the same group before which, later this month or early in December, the Arab refugee debate is scheduled to develop. Speaking in condemnation of South Africa's discriminatory practices, Mr. Dimechkie told the committee that Israel, too, practices discrimination, allegedly directing its policies against the Israeli Arabs "in subtle and disguised" fashion.

### Remains of City Found Buried Near Ein Gev

JERUSALEM — The remains of a great city built at the end of the reign of King David or at the start of that of King Solomon were reported last week to have been uncovered near Ein Gev during recent excavations in the area.

A team of archaeologists found the city and reported that one of the most remarkable excavation findings was a large jar bearing the inscription "leshakya," which was interpreted to mean "belonging to the wine steward," in Aramaic.

### Arrest Three Jewish Leaders In Leningrad

NEW YORK — Three leaders of the Jewish community in Leningrad have been arrested, and one years' imprisonment, after closed trials on charges of being "secret agents" and carrying on "treasonable" activities. The New York Herald Tribune reported this week.

The report was written by Rowland Evans, Jr., a Washington correspondent for the Herald Tribune, who returned recently from an 8,000-mile tour of the Soviet Union. The arrested men are reported to be Gedalia Rubinovich Pechersky, former lay chairman of the Leningrad Jewish Community; and Jews named Dynkin and Kagnov, whose first names could not be established by Evans.

According to the correspondent, Pechersky was put on trial on or about Oct. 9, his trial lasting four days. He had been arrested in June, accused of "crimes against the State." Pechersky was four years "the outspoken advocate of Jewish religious life," the report said. He was elected to the leadership of the Jewish religious community of Leningrad in 1953 immediately after the death of dictator Joseph Stalin. Leningrad has a Jewish population of 250,000, but not all of them are "practicing" or religious Jews.

#### Election Approved

The head of the Leningrad State Committee for Religious Affairs approved the election of Pechersky to the Jewish religious leadership, the report emphasized. However, according to Evans, Pechersky's "stubborn and public battle for Jewish rights apparent-

ly forced his demotion in 1956 to the post of deputy chairman."

Between 1953 and 1956 Pechersky, according to the correspondent, "had succeeded in repairing the premises of the Leningrad synagogue, establishing the ritual slaughtering of fowl, and gaining official approval for the baking of matzot."

In 1957, Evans continued, Pechersky was demoted still further, being stripped of his deputy chairmanship, but "he continued his public pressure for reforms." Evans reported that Pechersky "was a prominent figure, not only

## Detroit Center Approves Sabbath Program Plan

DETROIT — The board of directors of the Detroit Jewish Community Center unanimously approved this week proposals for Sabbath programing aimed at ending a two-year controversy over the issue.

The recommendations were proposed by a Committee for Sabbath Programing, organized five weeks ago by Max M. Fisher, president of the Detroit Jewish Welfare Federation. The plan for the committee and the selection of its members was undertaken by Fisher as an interested citizen and not in his capacity as head of the Federation, which provides a subvention for the center's budget.

The committee began its task by eliminating such "un-Sabbath-

like" activities as smoking and handling of money. They also endorsed the curtailment of such center functions as its snack bar, shoe shine facility, massage room and vending machines.

The committee then developed and endorsed Sabbath activities of informal clubs, assembly-type mass activities, older adults programs, story-telling for children. Among the activities urged as proper for the Sabbath were swimming and informal recreation and athletics.

The committee also proposed that a representative committee of religious leaders, educators and laymen should re-evaluate its proposed program within the year.

Rabbi Eliezer Levine, named to represent the Detroit rabbinate, on the Fisher committee, objected to the proposals drawn up by the committee and on that basis refused to participate in the final deliberations.

The Jewish News of Detroit, in an editorial commended the agreement on the Center programs. It pointed out that although it is doubtful whether any proposal for Sabbath programing could enroll the endorsement of all elements in the Detroit Jewish community, the agreement "ends a controversy" which aroused deep feelings in the community.

### Mother Told She Must Teach Judaism To Son

NEW YORK — A Jewish divorcee who became a Christian Scientist was fined \$250 by a New York Supreme Court justice this week who held she had failed to live up to a separation agreement to allow her 12-year-old son to be raised in the Jewish faith.

Justice Thomas A. Aurelio ruled that Mrs. Sylvia Gluckstern Glas, former wife of Philip Gluckstern, owner of a kosher restaurant in New York City, was in contempt of court. The couple was married in 1934, lived together as Orthodox Jews, and had three children.

The youngest, Lewis Jay Gluckstern, was awarded to the mother in a 1959 separation agreement, on conditioned that the father "shall have full charge of the religious education" of the boy "and may bring him up in the Orthodox Jewish faith, notwithstanding any different religion which the mother may have."

In his ruling, Justice Aurelio said that each had since remarried and that Mr. Glasser "has converted to Christian Science." He cited the separation agreement by Mrs. Glasser that she would not try to teach the boy any other religion. At a trial of a suit brought by the father, Mrs. Glasser testified she took the boy to Christian Science services every Sunday. The boy testified that he wanted to become a Christian Scientist.

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## Two Jewish Scientists Become 1961 Nobel Prize Winners

LOS ANGELES, Calif. — Two Californians, Dr. Robert Hofstadter and Dr. Melvin Calvin, were winners of the 1961 Nobel Prize. Dr. Hofstadter, professor of physics at Stanford University, was awarded his prize work in physics, to be shared with Dr. Rudoff Mossbauer of Germany. The other Jewish scientist, Dr. Calvin, is a professor of chemistry at the University of California, and won his award in chemistry.

Born in New York City, Dr. Hofstadter was educated at the College of the City of New York where he later was an instructor in physics. He also served as an assistant professor of physics at Princeton University, where he earned his advanced degrees. He joined the staff of Stanford University in 1950 and became professor of physics in 1954. In 1959, Dr. Hofstadter was named California's "scientist of the year."

Dr. Hofstadter was cited for his work in determining the most precise measurement of the structure of the neutron and proton. He is 46 years old, married and the father of three children.

Dr. Calvin is the son of a Jewish immigrant, who came to this

country from Lithuania 60 years ago.

His father, Elias Kalvarisky, settled in Detroit where he later became the manager of an A & P food store. His widowed mother, Rose Calvin, now lives in Los Angeles. She visited Israel last year.

The Nobel prize winner was born in St. Paul, Minn. in 1911 and received his scientific training at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology and the University of California, where he began his academic career as an instructor in chemistry in 1937, when he was 26 years old. He was in Israel several years ago, visiting the Weizmann Institute and the Technion at Haifa.

### Lebanon To Exile Jews And 'Foreigners'

JERUSALEM — Preparation for the expulsion of Jews and "other foreigners" from Lebanon are now being made by the Lebanese Government, according to a report from Beirut carried last week by the Arab News Agency. Other "special measures" are also being contemplated, the report said attributing the information to "official sources." The steps will be taken in order "to prevent subversive action against the State," the report stated.

Lebanon has 10,000 Jews, according to some experts, while other Jewish sources maintain that the population there has dwindled to between 7,000 and 8,000 Jews. Through the years since the re-birth of modern Israel in 1948, there have been various official actions against Lebanese Jews, accused of being members of pro-Israel "spy rings" or violating the anti-Israel economic boycott.

### 'Atlantic' Prints Israel Articles

NEW YORK — The Atlantic Monthly features a 67-page supplement on Israel in its November issue, with essays, stories, art and poetry sharing the editorial spotlight.

Lead article in the supplement is entitled "The Secret in the Cliffs: The Discovery of the Bar Kochba Letters," and is written by Gen. Yigael Yadin, of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.

Education Minister Abba Eban; military analyst, Gen. S. L. A. Marshall; Dr. Jacob Fine; Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, and 14 other writers have written on subjects ranging from "Israel in 1965" to a story, "The Sabbath."

**U. S. Dept. Says Boycott Free Of Religious Bias**

WASHINGTON - The State Department indicated that it has no plans to act in the Arab boycott against American Jews and American business firms unless it was shown on religious discrimination and not on affiliation with Israel.

The statement was made by John S. Houghland, Acting Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations, in a letter to Rep. Leonard Farbstein, New York Democrat, who had asked for State Department comment on the latest Arab League boycott action against Eddie Cantor and six American business firms.

The State Department official reiterated earlier statements that the United States did not recognize or condone the boycott of Israel, "particularly as it affects American citizens or firms." But, he added, the boycott, "as it has been represented to us by the Arab states, does not use race or religion as a basis for restricting trade with the Arab states, but rather is applied to individuals or firms who have particularly close relationships with the State of Israel."

As examples of activities which were considered "grounds for blacklisting" by the Arab states, the State Department official listed "establishing a factory or branch office in Israel, aiding Israel causes, investing capital in Israel products and providing technical assistance to Israel." He added that the blacklisting of Eddie Cantor and the six American firms "has been applied because the individual and firms concerned violated boycott principles."

"Should evidence be presented to the Department that in the cases which you have cited there has been discrimination against the individuals or companies concerned on the basis or religion, you may be assured that the Department would take action appropriate to the situation and in consonance with our national interest," the State Department official concluded.

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# Auschwitz: A Portrait of Hell

(Continued from Last Week)

Such, very briefly, is what life in Auschwitz was like. This was the world, it must be remembered, which Rudolf Hoess created, over which he presided, in which he had absolute power. It was a place of madness.

The inmates of the concentration camps, and particularly of Auschwitz, were, in the over-whelming instance, guilty of nothing whatsoever. They were transformed into objects to be starved, mishandled, murdered and burned, not because of anything that they had done, but because of what they were. Furthermore, the majority had no reason to believe that what they were, or had been when free, was in any way inferior to the average of society; and it was certainly superior to the nature of the Kapos and SS men whose objects they now became.

The Nazi concentration camps fulfilled a number of functions of varying importance, and sometimes mutually contradictory, not all of which were primarily concerned with the inmates themselves. In the first place, and particularly in the early days of the Nazi revolution, they were places of segregation, torture and, to a very limited extent, re-education.

The Nazis always pretended that their demagogic vote-catching was somehow a military campaign, and that their political enemies, in particular the Communists, were military ones, too. As soon as they had achieved power, they proceeded to round up, intern, and torture or kill such

enemies. They could and did pretend that these were dangerous men who had to be segregated lest their machinations overthrow the Hitlerian regime. However, their prime motive, in so far as the prisoners went, was undoubtedly revenge. It was to house these enemies that the first concentration camps, Dachau, Columbia-hau and Oranienburg, were created.

But into them they also put men who could politically not be regarded as dangerous: homosexuals, professional criminals, even alcoholics and men who would not work. These were there, as were many of the politicals, technically to be "re-educated."

The Nazis, however, made no attempt to educate their prisoners in the generally understood meaning of that word, let alone to cure psychologically unbalanced cases. What they did was to subject their prisoners to such appalling ill-treatment that, once released, they would take very good care not to fall into the hands of the Nazi authorities again. A far more important function of the camps from the very beginning was the terrorization of the population outside the camps.

How much did the mass of the German people know about what was going on in the camps, and to what extent were they therefore accomplices in crime? The answer is that everybody in Germany knew about the camps as places of brutal imprisonment and maltreatment, but that very few of them knew what actually hap-

pened there. This, I must remind the reader, is for the period before the mass exterminations, which began in 1941.

The Nazi Government wished the people to know that any disobedience would be cruelly punished. But, being in some respects excellent psychologists, they realized that by leaving the exact details vague, in fact by giving the imaginations of the people a free rein, the terror would be increased even beyond that which could be aroused by revealing the truth of what went on in the camps. Whenever, therefore, a man was released from a concentration camp--and at least a million Germans passed through them in the 1930s--he had to swear never to divulge what he had seen. Should he break this oath, he knew the fate that awaited him. He usually kept his mouth shut. Furthermore, this policy of quasi-secrecy permitted the Nazi Government to pretend abroad that the camps were simply places of internment or enlarged prisons. But the Germans knew; they did not know quite what, but they knew, and those who might have resisted were frightened and obeyed. Another result of this fear, of this playing on the imagination and of their seeing the silent, broken men released from the camps was that they knew it was wiser not to know too much. That is terrorism in action.

A secondary purpose of the brutality inside the camps, and again one in which the prisoners were only a means to an end, was the demoralization, in the first sense of that word, of their SS guards. By making the SS men into accomplices in

crime, into damned souls, Himmler and Reinhard Heydrich and Theodor Eicke believed that they would bind them forever to the Nazi chariot. They were successful.

One other prime purpose of the camps, of all the camps, was degradation. The Nazis talked a great deal about being supermen, perverting in their usual fashion the complex ideas of Nietzsche and Stefan George. But superior to what? The answer came back: the Jews. So far so good, and a well-fed member of the lower middle-class who had joined the SA or SS might well regard himself as superior to a Jewish old-clothesman from Ruthenia who could barely speak German. But could he really believe that he, the half-educated man in the brown or black shirt, was absolutely better than the well-dressed Jewish doctor who lived up the street, that his tow-headed wife was absolutely the superior of the beautiful Jewish actress he had seen at the cinema, that his boring beer-hall acquaintances were supermen compared to Einstein or Heine or Freud or even the Jewish lawyer or journalist he had once met? It was hard, even for the SS.

Therefore, their prisoners, whether Jews or political enemies, must be degraded to the point at which they almost ceased to appear human to their tormentors, who would then feel all the more free to torture and degrade these inhuman objects even further. A man's humanity is what distinguishes him from the animals. Starve him, beat him and terrify him down to an animal level and, saints and other such fantastic and admirable exceptions apart, he will, temporarily at least, cease to appear a man. His torturer has thus proved that he is "superior" to the object he has created out of what once was a human being. Then, as at Auschwitz, drive this captive to perform on his fellow prisoners those same tortures he has learned to suffer at the hands of his guards--which most men will do, to save or prolong their lives--and the degradation and consequent sensation of superiority are almost or entirely complete.

A friend of mine, an extremely sensitive and kind-hearted American, was put in charge of one of the concentration camps liberated in 1945. He told me that after a few days, he came to hate the starving, dying, filthy inmates. It was all too repulsive for pity and charity.

These wretched people were, in their degradation, an insult to humanity. He had a complete nervous collapse, this healthy young man who had undertaken his duties with a real desire to help the victims of Nazism, a breakdown from which he has never entirely recovered. And it was into camps containing scores of thousands of these degraded human beings that men and women from all over Eu-

They said the present total represents a substantial increase over the amount pledged last year by the same contributors.

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



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
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## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

### ISRAEL — IN THE COMMON MARKET

Jerusalem -- We were six, sitting around a luncheon table in this capital city of Israel and discussing the economic future of this brave, young nation which lies at the western tip of the continent of Asia on the eastern shore of the Mediterranean Sea.

Earlier, we had agreed that if Israel is to survive economically, she must sharply boost her industrial production and exports of goods, for she is importing far more from abroad than she is selling abroad and is deep in the red in her trade accounts with other nations. We had deplored the fact that the hostile Arab nations are not only boycotting Israel, but also threatening to boycott any company or country which does business with her. We were up to the point of listing what industrial products she might develop to sell abroad and where.

"If, despite the Arab threats, foreign investments do help you raise your industrial production for export and if a boom in tourism brings in increasing millions, is there a chance you might have your trade books in balance by 1965?" I asked one of the Israel officials.

"Only if we can get into the European Common Market," he replied matter-of-factly and so quietly I wasn't sure I'd heard him.

"Israel into the European Common Market? Why, you're 3,000 miles away from France!" My astonishment surely would have been yours.

"Yes," and his voice was louder and grim. "We sell most of the products we export to the six countries now in that market and to Great Britain, who's applying for membership. As the common market nations erase the tariff walls among themselves to make their products cheaper, and as they maintain the tariff walls against outsiders, we'll be at a terrible trade disadvantage -- if we continue an outsider."

"Have you tried to get in yet? Become an associate member?"

"We have -- informally," was his equally frank reply, and he went on to reveal that Israel officials have been taking every opportunity to talk with leaders of the European Common Market to test the attitude toward Israel's admission. (As was the case with Britain, Israel wants to be assured first informally that she won't be turned down before she makes a formal application.) "They're sympathetic to us, but they're listening to the Arab threat 'If you let Israel in, we'll not sell to you or buy from you.' It's a paper threat, but so far it has barred us."

"If you don't get in, then what?"

"Then we're in trouble. While it's a political problem for the European nations, it's a problem of economic survival for us."

The simple statistical facts dramatize this latest of Israel's challenges. Of her total agricultural exports, 90 per cent goes to the present common market members and those applying. Of her industrial exports, 35 per cent goes to these nations. Of her top export -- citrus -- half is taken by England alone. Not only must she maintain these sales; she must also greatly enhance them, for she is still importing twice as much as she is exporting, is staying alive economically only because the deficit is being covered by Germany's reparation payments, earnings from tourism, loans and contributions from the United States.

Actually, Israel would be on the threshold of association with the common market countries now -- were it not for the Arab threats. Will Israel get in, share in the common market's benefits?

There's no obvious basis for optimism -- except, well, except what Israel already has achieved against fantastic odds and the oft-quoted comment of her first president, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, that he who does not believe in miracles is not a realist.

Meanwhile, let the implications of this tale not be missed by us. Israel's vest-pocket-sized problem is going to be ours on a gigantic scale unless we wake up now to the fact that we too are outsiders looking at the walls of a growing, booming market and take action in time to adjust ourselves to this shining new economic fact of life.

## Mapai Suffers Many Heavy Losses

TEL AVIV — For the first time in the 40-year history of union of the southern division of the Israel Electric Corporation, the Mapai representation was reduced to the status of a tiny minority.

### Hassidic Group Wins Court Fight

NEW SQUARE, N. Y. — After a prolonged court battle, the Hassidic community here, honoring the Skvirer Rebbe, will become officially an incorporated village this week, to be known formally as the Village of New Square. The village was founded in 1954 by 530 followers of Rabbi Jacob Joseph Twersky who was born in Skvir, a town near Kiev in the Ukraine.

The Orthodox residents, who built 69 one-family homes on the 130-acre tract near Spring Valley, N. Y., voted unanimously in August to incorporate. They filed the incorporation papers with Ramapo Township, of which the area is a part. When the Ramapo Township Board of Supervisors failed to send the incorporation papers to the State capital, the followers of the Skvirer Rebbe petitioned the State Supreme Court, requesting that Ramapo be forced to act on the incorporation.

Last July, Supreme Court Justice John P. Donohue ruled in favor of the Skvirer. Ramapo threatened to appeal the judge's ruling. On Sunday, Town Supervisor Edwin E. Wallace announced that the incorporation papers were sent to Albany last week.

New Square plans to enact an ordinance closing all streets to all but emergency traffic every Sabbath, from sundown Friday to nightfall Saturday. Other ultra-Orthodox practices will become local law in New Square. At present, television is forbidden — although nearly every home has a radio. Women may not wear slacks in public.

### WRATH ON RICH

TEL AVIV — Commenting on Nasser's confiscation of property and the arrest of the rich, Hatzofo, the religious newspaper, writes: "As a result of his bitterness and despair at his 'betrayal' by his Syrian associates and his loss of prestige in the world, Nasser has turned to the last retreat of all failing dictators and is venting his wrath on 'the internal enemy.'"

## Claim Egypt Has Rocket That Can Blast Israel

TEL AVIV—A report that Egypt has successfully tested an Egyptian-made rocket may lead the Israel Government to proceed with the firing of its second sounding rocket it was reported here last week. The Egyptian rocket is said to be similar to the German V-2 rocket which the Nazis used to "buzz-bomb" London.

Israeli sources, however, indicated skepticism about the report which appeared in the Times of London. The skepticism was based on the belief that if the report had been true, President Nasser, whose prestige in the Arab world has suffered greatly in recent months, would not have passed up such an opportunity to elevate his status both in Egypt and in the rest of the Arab world. Both radio Cairo and other channels of Nasser's propaganda apparatus were silent about the reported launching.

Nonetheless, Egypt, according to the reports, has already constructed the new V-2 rocket with a 250-mile range, capable of reaching almost any part of Israel.

According to reports reaching Israel, Nazi technicians, who worked in secret German plants producing the V-2 rocket under Hitler's regime, proposed to President Nasser that they produce a similar rocket for him. When Nasser supported the proposal, the Nazis approached Prof. Eugene Saenger, head of the Jet Propulsion Research Institute at Stuttgart, West Germany, who provided them with necessary technical and scientific data.

West German authorities, learning of Prof. Saenger's aid to the Nazis working for Nasser, have suspended the professor from his post, according to information reaching here.

Israel created a worldwide stir last July by launching a sounding rocket 50 miles high and later indicating that a second more sophisticated launch was in preparation. It was indicated that

BONN — Informed political sources here asserted last week that rehabilitation of former members of the SS, Hitler's elite guard, was one of the demands of the Free Democratic Party in the current coalition talks with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Christian Demoratic Union.

The demands, it was reported, include an amendment to a pension law and a bill for general amnesty of nazi crimes "with the exception of those perpetrated for personal, deliberate individual criminal motives." A draft for such a bill, offered by Free Democratic deputy Ernst Achenbach, has been circulated among Bundestag deputies for the past two years.

Otto Eisenmann, another Free Democratic deputy, told a meeting of the HIAG, the SS aid organization, that it was "about time" former members of the regular SS were fully rehabilitated.

VIENNA — Preparations have been completed to make advance compensation payments before certain groups of aged and needy victims of the Nazi period in Austria.

The statement was made in reply to moves by the Socialist Party in the Finance Committee. Discussions had been held on the possibility of such advance payments to victims entitled to such payments, under the Twelfth Amendment to the Victims Restitution Law. Parliament approved the law

last year but so far it has not been implemented.

Socialist Deputy Rosa Hochman noted that the new law cannot go into effect until the West German Bundestag ratifies an Austrian West German agreement which provides a substantial West German contribution to the Austrian fund for such payments. The deputy added that since West German ratification cannot be expected in the near future, the Austrian Government should proceed with advance payments.

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**'Babi Yar' Hit As A 'Cheap' Sensation'**

MOSCOW — The Literary Gazette, which published Evgeny Yevtushenko's controversial poem, Babi Yar, was charged here recently with "irresponsibility" and "systematically publishing cheap sensations," according to a Reuters report. Babi Yar is an attack on Soviet anti-Semitism.

The accusation was leveled by Nikolai Gribachov, editor of the monthly international journal, Soviet Russia, in an address before the 22nd Communist Party Congress. The speech was published in the party newspaper, Pravda.

In reminding Soviet writers that the party line comes first in Soviet literature and that they cannot write what they like, Gribachov said, "It is high time to stop advertising scandals which are the result of low intellect."

He said some Soviet writers fell under the influence of "western soul-catchers a couple of years ago," and had demanded an end to party influence in literature. He said these writers had demanded that everything should be printed, however bad, because, as one had said, "A writer has a perfect right to write nonsense."

**Israel-American Oil Quits Prospecting**

TEL AVIV — The Israeli-American Oil Corp., which incorporates the "Miami group" of investors in Israeli enterprises and which has invested more than \$3,500,000 in unsuccessful prospecting for oil in Israel, announced plans to drop prospecting and become a general development corporation.

Yekutiel Federman, president, said the revamped firm will have the name of Israel-American Industries. It will finance a new hotel and textile factory in the Arad section, a new development area. The project, he estimated, would cost 3,000,000 pounds (\$1,680,000).

### Await December Eichmann Verdict


JERUSALEM — Israel's three-man court which tried Adolf Eichmann for crimes against the Jewish people and crimes against humanity, is expected to hand down its verdict about Dec. 15, it was learned here last week.

The four-month long trial of Eichmann ended Aug. 14. The judges were reported last week to be completing their deliberations. It is expected that the court's verdict will be handed down in a document running to about 500 pages.

Correspondents from news services, newspapers, radio and television are expected to flock here again from most parts of the world to cover the culmination of the trial. The verdict will be read in Hebrew and will be translated, simultaneously, into French and German. The reading of the verdict is expected to take six days.

Stenographers and translators working for the court in the preparation of the final verdict are being held incommunicado, and all precautions have been taken against revelation of the verdict prior to its delivery in court.

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
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
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# Two Jewish Leaders Murdered In Algeria

PARIS — Two prominent Algerian Jews were killed and a third was shot and seriously injured last Saturday, culminating a week of high terror during which more than 20 plastic bombs were exploded in Jewish homes and shops in the capital of Algiers and in other sections of Algeria.

The deaths were attributed to the OAS, the French underground which opposes Algerian independence as proposed by Pres. Charles de Gaulle.

The dead were David Zermati, 54, president of the Jewish Community of Setif, a provincial city of about 42,000 population; and Dr. Joseph Cohen, 32, a well-known Algiers physician. The injured man, who is in serious condition after having been shot through the neck, is Yossef Perez, warden of the synagogue in the Casbah at Algiers.

The shooting of Perez was attributed to his recent refusal to turn over his apartment to a Moslem who had insisted on taking over the Perez home. The attacks against Zermati and Dr. Cohen were laid to OAS terrorists.

**Shot In Back**

Zermati was known as an ardent Gaullist. He had held high posts in the Algerian Ministry of the Interior and, for two terms, served as president of the Setif Bar Association. He was shot in

the back while picking up his mail in the Setif post office.

Dr. Cohen was not known to be active in any political movement, but was considered a liberal. He was widely known in Algiers particularly for his work among the Moslem poor, whom he had been serving since his graduation from medical school.

During last week, at least 20 plastic bombs of 50 exploded in a single day were aimed at Jewish shops in the Bab El Oued district in Algiers. The bombs were of a type used both by the OAS and by Algerian rebels.

**Nazi Control?**

The Jewish community, its morale shaken by the recurrent attacks, is wondering whether Nazi elements had obtained control of the OAS, although efforts have been made of late by the OAS to enlist the sympathies of Jewish residents in Algeria.

Dr. A. Zaffran, a member of the administrative council of the Zionist Federation in Algeria, made hasty plans Sunday to leave the country after receiving murder threats from the OAS.

Dr. Zaffran was a close friend of Police Commissioner Goldenberg who was assassinated recently. The aggravation of the general conditions in Algeria has resulted in an increase of Jewish emigration to France.

# The Nazi-Hunters of Ludwigsburg

"Excuse me, sir, how do I get to the prison?" I asked a passerby at Ludwigsburg, the little township near Stuttgart, with its beautiful palace and stately gardens, once the residence of the dukes of Wurttemberg. The man stared at me but directed me expertly. Everyone in Ludwigsburg knows the district prison.

It is a rule with prisons that it is easier to get in than to get out. Not so in Ludwigsburg. I had to prove at length that I had an appointment with state attorney Schuele, and when I had passed a complicated system of gates and controls, one of his assistants came to take me up to the wing where the Center for the Investigation of Nazi Crimes has its spacious offices.

Herr Schuele, a tall and lean figure with greish hair and the air of an army officer, came to greet me. His name is feared and hated among the Nazis in Germany, those who have gone into hiding and have shed their identity, and those who just hope that their crimes will remain anonymous.

This Center is unprecedented in Germany's history. When, four years ago at the great Nazi-trial in Ulm, it became evident that many of the Nazi crimes committed outside Germany had gone unpunished, a conference of the ministers of justice of the German "Laender" decided to unify all investigations under one authority. This Center was set up and charged with the task of investigating Nazi war crimes in the countries under German occupation and to search for the guilty. Once the criminals were identified and arrested, the Center was to hand them over to the competent German courts.

When state attorney Schuele showed me round his offices and introduced me to his team of young and keen collaborators—attorneys, each of them responsible for a certain area—I had the impression of being at an army headquarters. And, indeed, at the Center an unrelenting war is being waged against the Nazi criminals. Each room is dominated by a huge wall map demarcating the area of inquiry. All criminal acts committed in such an area fall within the competence of one investigation unit. Special units have been assigned to the concentration camps—Auschwitz, Mauthausen, Ravensbrueck, Sachsenhausen. Others cover the former territories of the special SS commandos in Estonia, Minsk, Latvia and Lithuania, and of the extermination camps that were set up in the "government general" of Poland; again, others cover the domain of the security police in Cracow and Warsaw and those areas which at one time were incorporated in the Reich—Bialystok, Lodz and the eastern provinces of Germany during the war. A special department deals with countries such as Bulgaria, Denmark, France, Greece and Italy.

The Center's task is to collect all obtainable material, to sift and evaluate it, and ultimately to present the evidence to the prosecutor for criminal indictments.

How do the Nazi-hunters of Ludwigsburg obtain their material? A principal source are the orders of the Reichsfuehrer of the SS and chief of German police. But no less important are the many incidental pieces of information, picked up from talks and quarrels among the one-time comrades in crime and sometimes even from ordinary trials. The divorce proceedings of a former member of one "Einsatztruppe," for instance, led to the arrest of its commander,

Dr. Otto Bradfisch, who was found guilty as an accessory to the murder of 15,000 persons and who was sentenced to ten years' penal servitude. Two of his accomplices—Wilhelm Schulz and Oskar Winkler—were sentenced to seven and three years respectively.

In many cases, such arrests cause chain reactions—each accused dragging others with him and opening up new possibilities for the prosecution. Herr Schuele himself takes charge of the actual arrests when the culprit in question was "a big shot." Many such persons are living under false names and are respected citizens and even leaders in the German economy. Altogether there are 291 cases pending, in different stages of preparation, involving thousands of people. The Auschwitz trial alone has a list of 950 accused, of whom so far only 27 are under arrest. In two years' time, so Herr Schuele hopes, the Center will have completed its task.

Naturally, our talk turned to the ever recurring question of how many Germans were more or less active accomplices in the mass murders, and the figure of 80,000 is brought forward as the nearest approximation. When I raised the subject of the activities of the German army in Poland and Russia, the state attorney rang for his secretary and asked for a certain file. Instead of an answer, he produced the copies of two letters—one written by General Ulex, commander of infantry in the southern sector of the Eastern Front, to the commander-in-chief of the East, General Blaskowitz, and the other one by General Blaskowitz addressed to Hitler.

I read this in General Ulex's letter:

"The acts of violence of the part of the police forces... show an incomprehensible lack of human and moral feeling, and bear the mark of bestiality... the only remedy to this undignified situation which defiles the honor of the German people is the transfer of all police forces, including all superiors and all civic authorities at the General Government who for months now have been onlookers of those ghastly crimes; their places should be taken by honorable units."

Four days later, General Blaskowitz wrote this to Hitler about the killing of 10,000 Jews:

"With high authorities of the SS and police encouraging violence and terror, and even praising them publicly, the beast will reign in no time. People of doubtful character whose minds are diseased, flock together, as happens here in Poland, and let their animal and pathological instincts run amok..."

He added that the army was shocked and disgusted. "Its attitude to the SS and police was one of aversion and horror."

After I finished these letters, a secretary brought clippings from the morning newspapers. The state attorney pointed to the headlines on the "Einsatztruppen" trial being conducted in Dortmund. This case against Dr. Hermann Jahr, head of the Staatspolizei in Tilsit, and two of his assistants, is the outcome of investigations of the Center. At the beginning of next year many more cases will be brought to court.

Not a few of the trials will take place in Hesse whose attorney general, Dr. Bauer, working hand-in-hand with the Center, has long been Germany's chief expert in prosecuting Nazi criminals. I called on him at his offices in Frankfurt-on-Main.

"Of course, we have been closely studying the Eichman trial," Dr. Bauer said. "They have told us nothing that we did not know before. All the names that were mentioned have been in our files, and proceedings are in various stages of preparation against those criminals we were able to find. From the viewpoint of history, the trial did a good job; its legal aspects were not always equally revealing."

Dr. Bauer told me that he had posted a 20,000 marks reward for information leading to the apprehension of Dr. Josef Mengele, the infamous Auschwitz physician. But he is rather skeptical about the chances of success. "Mengele is a man of great resources," he explained. "His family are wealthy industrialists with worldwide connections. Therefore, shelter for this fugitive will not be lacking." Reprinted from Congress bi-Weekly

## Histadrut Plans Large Israel Development

TEL AVIV — The Histadrut, Israel's Labor Federation, plans to raise 500,000,000 pounds (280,000,000 dollars) during the next three or four years for large scale development projects, Aharon Becker, general secretary reported.

He made the announcement at the opening plenary session of the Histadrut's 107 member executive. He said the projects would be located in the new settlement regions of Arab, Habsor and Carmel. The first two are in the Negev and the third in the upper Galilee.

He reported that half of the development fund would be raised in Israel and the other half with the help of European and American labor movements.

He also disclosed plans for numerous projects through which the Histadrut will advance workers' education and living standards. "These," he said, "would include a 'broadcast university' through Kol Israel, the Israeli radio construction of three more educational centers and home courses."

Joshua Levi, Histadrut treasurer, submitted a 1962 budget of 34,000,000 pounds (\$19,040,000). He said this represented about one-fourth of Histadrut's income since the other three quarters goes to the Histadrut sick fund, Kupat Holim. He also reported that the Federation now has 177,000 dues paying members.

Two factions of the Histadrut, the Mapam and the Liberals, were expected to vote against the budget reflecting their opposition role in Israel's new government. However, the Mapai majority plus the votes of the religious workers and Achdut Avodah were believed adequate to approve it with no difficulties.

## Israel's UN Delegation Rebukes Russians

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — Israel lined up last week with many other delegations here in demanding that the testing of nuclear devices be discontinued and in rebuking the Soviet Union for breaking the nuclear testing stalemate.

Israel's position was outlined by its representative Gideon Rafael in an address before the General Assembly's Political and Security Committee. A member of this year's Assembly delegation, Rafael is assistant director-general of Israel's Foreign Ministry.

Rafael told the committee that Israel would vote for several pending resolutions which call for cessation of nuclear testing.

## Many Former Nazis Win

BONN — The names of some former Nazis appear on the official list of deputies elected to the new West German Bundestag published by the Government Information Office last weekend. Hermann Conring, a member of Konrad Adenauer's Christian Democratic Union from Lower Saxony who was a war-time Nazi provincial commissioner in Groningen, Holland, charged with helping to break the strike of Dutch workers against deportations of Jews.

Two of the former Nazis are deputies of the Free Democratic parties. One is Siegfried Zoglmann, of Dusseldorf, who was a Reich Hitler Youth Leader. The

other is Ernst Achenbach of North-Rhine Westphalia, who has been accused of aiding in the organization of the deportation of French Jews, was associated with the neo-Nazi Naumann underground movement after World II, and is the initiator of a bill for general amnesty for Nazi crimes.

### Four Drop Out

Among the deputies who had served in the last Bundestag, who were associated with the Nazi regime, and who dropped out in the most recent election were four Christian Democratic party members. They are former Refugee Minister Theodor Oberlaender, who was eased out of Chancellor Adenauer's Cabinet after a lengthy campaign by the opposition Social Democrats; Waldmar Kraft, former SS agricultural expert in occupied Poland.

The judge ruled, however, that "this infant should not be permitted to abandon so easily the faith he was born in. He has not reached the age of discernment and understanding to fully appreciate the significance of this momentous

decision." In imposing the fine, the Justice suggested that the father consider instituting a separation suit to gain custody of his son. The father said that Lewis had attended classes at a synagogue in New Rochelle, N. Y., until about six months ago but that since then, the boy had refused to attend.

## Ecuador Jews Find Way To Educate Their Youth

NEW YORK — The 1,200-member Jewish community of Ecuador has devised plans to fly children from one town that has no Jewish educational facilities to another which does, for three months of intensive Jewish education, a leader of the community revealed here this week.

Herbert Gedalius, president of

the Association de Beneficia Israelito, said Ecuador Jews live in Quito, which has Jewish educational facilities, and in Guayaquil, which does not. The two cities are 300 miles apart. He said the plan is to fly the 12 Jewish children in Guayaquil to Quito for the three summer months. He added that a number of Jewish families in Quito had indicated they would accommodate the children during their stay.

Gedalius came to the United States to confer with officials of the World Jewish Congress, of which the Beneficia is an affiliate. Current arrangements, he said, have provided for the teacher, who came to Ecuador from Israel to visit Guayaquil occasionally.

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
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
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
