

## Rabbi Sees No Need For Clemency, Pity In Eichmann Case

NEW YORK — A Brooklyn rabbi took sharp issue last week with some of his colleagues who have urged clemency for Adolf Eichmann, a former Nazi official accused of murdering millions of Jews in World War II.

In his sermon at Congregation Tilfereth Israel, 2025 Sixty-fourth Street, the Rev. Dr. Kurt Klappholz said the Eichmann case "cannot be an occasion of pity, clemency or any ethical consideration whatsoever."

"In the interests of international justice," he said, "this horrendous crime must be punished with the utmost severity."

"Invoking ethical thought in this case," Rabbi Klappholz asserted, "would make a sham of justice and be an open invitation to genocidal maniacs to be rampant all over the globe."

Last week the journal American Judaism quoted several rabbis who, in essence, held that the crime of genocide, with which Eichmann is charged, is of such cosmic proportions that only God can mete out adequate punishment.

"If America's ethical conscience is outraged — and rightfully so — by the brutal killing of a 4-year-old child," Rabbi Klappholz observed, "then humanity must be outraged by a crime of dimensions never known heretofore in the annals of human history."

His reference here was to the recent slaying of Edith Kiecorius in Manhattan.

"As one who has personally witnessed the Hitler terror," the rabbi said, "and has lost his entire family in the planned Nazi extermination of millions of Jews, I must categorically reject as senseless any consideration of ethical principles in the Eichmann case. What is needed here is the application of basic justice, which has no connection with revenge or recrimination."

## Nazi Victims Given 10.1 Million In Aid

The Conference on Jewish Material Claims against Germany announced last week that it had allocated \$10,102,154 for programs of relief, rehabilitation and cultural and educational reconstruction in thirty countries.

Jacob Blaustein, senior vice president of the organization, said the allocations for this year brought the total paid out by the conference since 1954 to \$80,000,000.

The claims conference, composed of twenty-three national and world-wide Jewish groups, obtains its funds for allocations under a special agreement it reached with the West German Government in 1952. By that agreement, \$107,000,000 is being turned over to the conference in twelve annual installments to aid Nazi victims.

Mr. Blaustein said more than three-fourths of the allocations, amounting to \$7,789,617, were earmarked for relief and rehabilitation programs.

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## Achieve Integration Without Protests From Segregationists

NEW YORK — New Orleans accepted a State Supreme Court ruling in favor of integration recently without protests, demonstrations or a single shrill peep out of the mouths of segregationist matrons according to David Gelman, New York Post correspondent.

But there was no color issue involved in the decision which affected only the small Jewish community of 10,000.

In an opinion handed down the court ruled against the ancient tradition of segregated seating for males and females in Orthodox synagogues.

### Majority Vote

The case arose out of a suit against the board of directors of the Orthodox Chevra Thilom, which built a new synagogue in 1939 without providing the usual balcony for women members. A majority of the congregation had voted several times since then in favor of mixed seating, but integration of the sexes was not actually instituted until the vote became overwhelming in 1956.

The minority group brought suit the following year and the case had been in the courts ever since. The state court decision reversed earlier rulings in the lower courts upholding segregated seating. Normally the courts do not rule on religious disputes, but in this case the conditions of a trust under which the synagogue was built were involved.

### Rabbi Left

One member of the board of directors, Gus Singerman, told The Post the rabbi had left the 325-member congregation while the case was still in litigation "because he couldn't bear the pressure."

Singer said the synagogue was continuing as Orthodox, with no regular rabbi.

## PRICE ON NAZI INCREASED

FRANKFURT, Germany—West Germany put a top price recently on the head of missing Dr. Josef Mengele, accused of having killed Jewish children with chemical injections at the Auschwitz concentration camp.

Rumor has placed him in Brazil, and the West Germany Embassy in Rio de Janeiro is holding an arrest order for him.

The prosecutors increased the reward for Mengele to 20,000 Deutsche marks (\$4,475), twice the reward offered for Auschwitz commandant Richard Baer just before his arrest last December.

## Publish Genealogical Survey Of Jewish Settlers In America

NEW YORK — The first genealogical survey made of Jewish families who settled in America between 1654 and 1840 was recently published by the Hebrew Union College Press of Cincinnati according to a report made by George Dugan.

The massive eight-pound volume, entitled "Americans of Jewish Descent," contains genealogical tables listing 26,000 names. It is regarded as the most important single research tool to be made available in the field of American Jewish history for many years.

The author of the volume, Rabbi Malcolm H. Stern of Ohel Shalom Congregation in Norfolk, Va., genealogist for the American Jewish Archives, spent eight years on his research.

Much of his information came from a systematic examination of yellowed family papers, ancient synagogue records, old tombstone inscriptions and courthouse documents.

The volume is being distributed by University Publishers of New York in a limited edition of 600 copies. The "popular" edition of 550 copies can be purchased for \$40 each. Fifty copies printed in a "de luxe" edition can be had for \$150 per copy.

In a foreword Dr. Jacob R. Marcus, director of the American Jewish Archives, hails the volume for "shedding light on obscure references that up to now have

baffled the most skillful of researchers."

### Peddler to Ambassador

"Here, most graphically," he wrote, "one can trace the assimilatory influence of intermarriage and notice not without irony, the unbroken line that leads from a Polish Jewish immigrant peddler to an American Ambassador to one of the great powers."

His reference here was to Haym Salomon, among whose lineal descendants were William Bullitt, former Ambassador to France.

The volume shows that 15 per cent of the marriages recorded before 1840 were marriages between Jews and Christians.

One study based on the book demonstrated that in the period before 1840, the Sephardic (Spanish-Portuguese) Jews in North America intermarried freely with the Ashkenazi (Germanic) and almost the entire early Sephardic community became absorbed by the Ashkenazi.

Rabbi Bertram W. Korn of Congregation Keneseth Israel in Philadelphia, an eminent Jewish historian, said yesterday that while no Jews came over on the Mayflower they were among this country's earliest settlers.

Among them, Rabbi Korn observed, were "pioneers who tamed the wilderness, opened the frontiers, initiated trade, built cities and fought for freedom."

## \$250,000 To UJA

NEW YORK — The Felix M. and Frieda Schiff Warburg Foundation contributed securities valued at \$250,000 to the "Adopt-a-Project" campaign of the United Jewish Appeal of New York.

The gift will provide scholarships and fellowships in social work.

BEERSHEBA, Israel — Several years ago a group of Frenchmen attracted attention here by moving into a block of modern apartment houses and driving off to the east in a procession every morning and returning at night.

The world learned about it only recently. But virtually all of the residents of Beersheba knew about the construction long before.

About a year ago a delivery truck drove up to the Arava Cafe on the main street of the town. The man beside the driver jumped

## Eban Says Crisis Will Make Israel Stronger Nation

MIAMI BEACH — Abba Eban, Israel's Minister of Education and Culture, declared last week that his nation would emerge "stronger and more resilient" from the "parliamentary crisis" that led to the resignation of Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion.

Addressing 2,000 delegates at the dinner session of the national inaugural conference of the Israel bond organization at the Fontainebleau Hotel, Mr. Eban emphasized that the primary task of the Israeli people in the coming months was "to restore our democratic life."

Referring to the political upheaval that resulted from the Lavon affair, he asserted that "it would be dishonest to deny that we have fallen unexpectedly — perhaps unnecessarily — into a parliamentary crisis; democracy is the noblest, but also the most difficult and complex, of political cultures."

Mr. Ben-Gurion, as leader of Mapai, Israel's ranking political party, has failed in several attempts to form a new government. As a result Israel now faces the prospect of new national elections.

In his address Mr. Eban asserted that his nation's institutions and leadership "have lived under the pressure of constant and heavy tensions" and that "these have taken a certain toll."

He commented that these tensions "are but the growing pains of a young democratic organism" and declared that "we shall overcome these tensions."

He asserted that Israel's relations with the United States "are the keystone in the arch of our international relationship."

He emphasized the significance of Africa in the world scene, declaring that Africa "may well be the arena in which the fate of free institutions — and therefore of America and of Israel alike — will be determined for the coming generation."

This was one example of how the secret leaked.

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# Israel, Galut And Anti-Semitism

 Some years ago, when I was lecturing before a Rehovoth audience on Toynbee, anti-Semitism and related subjects, an incident occurred which sank into my memory as the index of a problem which has been haunting Jews since the founding of the State of Israel. In essence it existed, and was discussed, almost from the beginnings of the Zionist movement, but it acquired actuality with and because of the State.

During the question period after the lecture, an excitable young man launched into a speech, as questioners are liable to do, and asked me, in Hebrew, why I was lecturing in English instead of Hebrew, and why I was living in America instead of in Israel.

He then went on to state vehemently that only a yehudon (a Yiddle, or if you prefer, a kike, or sheeny) was bothered by anti-Semitism, and this part of my thesis was of no concern to real Jews, that is, to Israelis.

There were cries of protest from the audience, the loudest coming from Moshe Sharett, the then Foreign Minister. Part of the protest was undoubtedly directed at the man's choice of words, but it would have been impossible to say how the audience as a whole felt about the views expressed by my interlocutor as distinguished from his manner of expressing them.

The answer would have depended to a large extent on the respective proportions of Sabras and immigrants and tourists in the audience. It is for this reason that the incident established itself in my mind as the index and symbol of the problem I shall discuss briefly.

## TALKING OF ANTI-SEMITISM TO ISRAELIS

If you dwell on the subject of anti-Semitism in the presence of a Sabra, who has never experienced anti-Semitism at first hand and knows nothing either about one's affection for galut Jewry or about the difficulties of uprooting oneself from it, his instinctive reaction, uttered or repressed, is: "If you don't like the galut, why don't you get out?"

It is on the surface a reasonable reaction, the more so as the founders of the State of Israel were in fact galut Jews who did tear themselves away from those they loved, and did remake their lives in a tremendous display of character. (Here I ignore those Jews who came to Israel from necessity

rather than choice. They have always been a matter for wry merriment among certain Israelis.) The fact remains that it does seem absurd of a Jew to complain of anti-Semitism when the remedy for it, at any rate for himself, is at hand.

On closer inspection it will be seen that the answer resembles, in curious ways, the one which usually comes from the assimilationist, who says: "If you're miserable about anti-Semitism, why don't you stop being a Jew?" In both cases it is tantamount to: "Shut up or do the necessary thing."

## PROBLEMS OF THE ASSIMILATIONIST

There are differences, of course. It is presumably easier to stop being a Jew than to pull up stakes and begin life again. I stress presumably.

There are certain discomforts for the programmatic assimilationist, humiliations, emotional slipbacks, especially in old age; there is the possibility of being repudiated by one's children who occasionally turn up with perverse atavisms.

But all in all it is the resemblance between the two answers which is the more striking. A still closer scrutiny strengthens the resemblance from the group, or impersonal, point of view.

The overwhelming majority of galut Jews must remain where they are because the absorptive capacity of Israel could, at the ideal best, take care only of a small minority.

And the overwhelming majority of galut Jews must remain Jews because the Jew-absorptive capacity of the non-Jewish peoples, that is, of the world at large, can, similarly, take care only of a small minority.

To what may this be likened in each case? To the wealthy man who tells the poor that all of them could have been rich if they had done what he did (whatever it was).

The fact is, of course, that the rich minority can be rich only as long as the majority is poor—a tautological statement. A number of Jews can assimilate precisely because the others can't or won't. If all Jews made the same effort in that direction they would remain on the same level, a truth which was already evident to Herzl.

A number of Jews can migrate to Israel precisely because not all Jews claim the privilege. The fact that more could become rich than actually do, or, to transpose the terms, could assimilate, or migrate to Israel, does not invalidate the argument.

## THE THREAT OF PERMANENT DIVISION

The members of a successful minority, the success of which, as we have seen, implies the comparative failure of the majority, always preen themselves on their superior merits.

And apparently with justice. The millionaire does have those special qualities which are needed for the accumulation of wealth, the assimilated Jew those needed for the appropriate change of personality, the Israel pioneer those needed for a violent break in his life.

The moral order of the groups of qualities is irrelevant here; it is the goal which determines. To be sure, as the Preacher reminds us, chance enters into every man's life; but the overall character of a man, itself a matter of chance, decides what he does with his chances.

Most Israelis—and here I class settlers with Sabras—are proud not to be in and of the galut. The former point to their own merits, the latter, like the children of millionaires, claim the merits of the fathers. I do not begrudge them their sense of individual and personal superiority. What troubles me is the result of the group analysis.

For here we encounter a further resemblance. We have seen that, as the assimilationist Jew says to his obstinate, unassimilating fellow-Jews: "It's your own fault for remaining Jews," the Israeli is inclined to say, "It's your own fault for remaining in the exile." The former adds: "There would be no anti-Semitism if there were no Jews." The latter agrees, with the rider: "In the galut."

But if it is true, as I think it is, that the large majority of Jews can neither get into Israel nor assimilate, the group relationship between Israeli Jewry and galut Jewry must not be allowed to develop on lines of better and worse, of higher and lower.

Differences there will have to be, and regionalist differences have always existed among Jewries. There have also been hierarchies and snobberies, but these have been transient and relatively minor. What threatens now is a permanent and major division.

Referring again to the incident with which I opened, I wish to make it clear that it is impossible to say what proportions of Israelis transfer the personal attitude to the group. During my frequent visits to the yishuv and Israel over the last thirty-six years, I must have had such discussions with hundreds of proto-Israelis and Israelis.

My impression is that, in its extreme form, the rejection of the galut is consciously accepted only by a minority. Shadings of it, hard to determine in their degrees, exist among larger numbers; and the most unfortunate feature is that the extremist forms are to be found among Sabras.

But it is also natural. It is insufficient to say that the children of millionaires claim the merits of the fathers; they are almost invariably bigger snobs.

## TWO WAYS OF "CURING" ANTI-SEMITISM

Many consequences have to be considered, much self-searching, much thinking and writing will have to be done on the subject. Here I confine myself to the effect on the evaluation of anti-Semitism.

One cannot but have an ambivalent attitude on anti-Semitism if one believes that one's fellow-Jews are responsible for it. This is not to say that either assimilationist

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

Astride the mouth of the Canton river, 90 miles below the Chinese Communist city of Canton is an area of 398 square miles into which U.S. industrialists and traders are now pouring capital at an unprecedented pace in search of fabulous profits taxed at insignificant rates.

This is the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong. So free of restraints are its 3,000,000 residents and so accustomed are they to crime and intrigue that a voyager who ferries between the nearby Portuguese province of Macao and Hong Kong will hear over the loud-speaker the admonition, "Please throw your dope or dead bodies overboard." So dependent is Hong Kong on Communist China for food stuffs and so sure is it that the colony will revert to the Chinese government that the probable life of Hong Kong as it is today is estimated at not beyond this decade.

Yet, Hong Kong is now in a boom which has few parallels around the world. In this area more than 4,000 companies are now operating, of which over 400 represent foreign enterprises, and the list is skyrocketing.

Nearly every day in the financial and trade press, America's great international banks advertise their eagerness to advise and service those entering this focal point for the Orient. From a poor ninth place as recently as 1956, the United States has jumped to No. 1 among the countries to which Hong Kong exports -- with sales to us up from \$116.6 million in Hong Kong dollars in 1956 to over \$591 million in 1959.

Why is this happening in the face of the obvious lack of permanency of the present Hong Kong setup? Why hasn't Communist China already grabbed the colony, as it easily could do in a matter of hours?

To get the answers, the non-profit American Institute of Management has been studying the area intensively for over a year, will release next week to its 15,000 members a 15-page audit of Hong Kong similar to the audits it has restricted to corporations with only one previous exception (the Catholic Church). It is an extraordinary analysis. In fact, claimed AIM's board chairman, Jackson Martindell, when he gave me the report exclusively, "Nothing like it has ever appeared in print before."

Before I submit the details, here's a summary of AIM's explanations of the fascinating puzzle.

First, while unquestionably the area won't survive as a British Colony beyond the expiration of the New Territories lease in 1997, a maximum life of 36 years "is a long time in terms of manufacture and trade."

Second, because of the high profits possible from operations, the low taxes and the convertibility (free exchange) of currency, manufacturers and traders can get back their investments in two or three years.

Third, they can expect to get back profits equal to their capital investments "in the next two or three," to double their stake by 1967.

Fourth, it's likely that the Colony will exist at least until then because, says AIM, Red China won't dare grab Hong Kong until she has the power to protect herself against massive retaliation and that can't "possibly be expected before 1967 or perhaps as late as 1969."

In short, "The medium term potentialities are staggering" for the businessman. . . . "No wonder the rush is on . . ."

It may strike you as a shockingly cold-blooded approach, but that's the way international businessmen calculate their risks. In its audit, AIM offers an "evaluation table" for Hong Kong under which the Colony gets an analysis rating of 8,100 points against an optimum rating of 10,000 and a minimum for excellence of 7,500 points.

Below the minimum for excellence it places three factors -- Hong Kong's geographical location, its sociological framework, its administrative potential.

Well above the minimum, though, are the area's population -- "cheap and capable labor" -- its production and distribution facilities, its tax and budget structure, its leadership, its plants and services,

In conclusion, AIM's audit gives the Western traveler, trader and manufacturer "six years, and possibly more, in which to enjoy the privileges and opportunities" of Hong Kong. It's as fascinating a financial audit as any I've ever seen.

### AWARDS

Do not underestimate the power of public opinion. The public senses what is ridiculous, pretentious, and it is laughed off the stage of our life.

Remember the time when no Jewish banquet or community drive was complete without the presence of a non-Jew?

At one time, he was the Governor. The poor man ate chickens until they literally came out of his ears. The Governor had to be present at every gathering.

At another time, it was the Senator who was the victim. He had to occupy the seat of honor at the head table.

When these were not available, the committee of arrangement provided at least a Judge to grace the meeting.

No matter who it was, the presence of a non-Jew at Jewish affairs was a "must."

The theory was that the presence of a Governor, a Senator or a Judge will add stature to the campaign or to the banquet. We will flock to see and be seen at such affairs. We will give more generously when urged to give by such celebrities. We will, in general, be on our best behavior in the presence of such important people.

But the trouble is that people began to sense the incongruity of it all. Why should the Governor, the Senator, or the Judge be subjected to this torture? They were very uncomfortable in their yarmulkes. They did not know what to do and when to do it. They were not very brilliant in their speeches. Very often they were an insult to the intelligence of the so-called "common people" for whose sake they were invited. People shrugged their shoulders at the whole business. They were wondering who started it all, and they did not come. What is more, they ridiculed it, as something affectatious, forced, and the thing died a slow death.

No one thinks of inviting non-Jewish people to such purely Jewish affairs any more.

It seems to me that the time has come when another custom of ours deserves the same treatment. This custom is just as ridiculous, pretentious, and in poor taste as the invitation of Governors, Senators and Judges to our drives and campaigns.

I mean the business of awarding "good" Christians, for being good, by our organizations. This is usually done on Brotherhood Week, or on Man-of-the-Year Week, and on similar occasions.

Last month, we saw in the papers how two Jewish organizations gave awards to Mrs. James Gabrielle, formerly of New Orleans, and at present a resident of Johnston. Mrs. Gabrielle, as you probably know, defied the boycott by her neighbors of a newly integrated school in New Orleans, and was spat upon, punched, and cursed by a mob of women in that city. This was a heroic thing to do. She deserves to be awarded. These awards will come from the schools, the councils of Christians and Jews, the Urban Leagues, and such groups. But these two Jewish groups, what business had they to award Mrs. Gabrielle? The groups are purely Jewish. Their membership is Jewish. Their functions are Jewish. And their programs are by definition Jewish. Why go into work which is of concern to the whole nation, to the government and to the liberal forces of America in general.

Now, there are many projects in town that await the interest of Jewish organizations, especially women's organizations.

We need scholarships. Whether we know it or not, there are many boys and girls deserving of a college education but unable to afford it. This same Gabrielle

Then there are so many national and overseas projects that can keep organizations busy the year around.

Leave the giving of Awards for good behavior to others. It is pretentious, affected, and in very poor taste. Now we are only uncomfortable when we see these pictures in the papers. In time, we will come to laugh at them, and in that way sweep the whole award giving business off the stage.

### Innsbruck Bias At Standstill

INNSBRUCK, Austria — A U.S. medical student says anti-Semitic acts against Americans at Innsbruck University have stopped.

Jack Scharo, 25, of Flushing, New York, said Austrian authorities are doing everything they can to prosecute the guilty.

He and Irwin Lichtenstein, 34, of Brooklyn, told authorities last month they had been victims of anti-Semitic insults from right-wing fraternity students since they came here to study.

Otmar Huber, 26, an Austrian student, has been charged with "agitation against racial groups" as a result. A university disciplinary investigation also is pending.

"Many Austrians, students and professors, have come to me to say how sorry they are about the whole affair," said Scharoff.

Barton Levy of Brooklyn, representing a group of American students at the university, told the rector name-calling and ill feeling toward Lichtenstein and Scharoff were of purely personal nature. Devy said such things are common in the U.S. according to an official account of what he told authorities.



Mr. Stevenson said he was sending Senator Keating's letter to the State Department "with a request that the subject be followed carefully with a view to possible new initiatives in the United Nations."

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
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## Koch Not Called For Eichmann Trial

TEL AVIV — Attorney-General Gideon Hausner recently described as "fantasy" any suggestion that he intended to ask the West German government to produce Ilse Koch at Adolf Eichmann's trial.

A West German foreign ministry spokesman indicated that the Bonn government would permit the imprisoned Mrs. Koch, 53, to testify at Eichmann's trial for the alleged mass murder of Jews during World War II.

The Bonn spokesman said Israel had not brought up the matter.

Mrs. Koch was given a life term in 1951 by a German court on a conviction of inciting the staff of Buchenwald concentration camp to murder, attempted murder and severe ill treatment of internees.

She is the widow of the commandant of the notorious Nazi extermination camp.

He wrote his first song, "Agala Ve Sussa" (A Horse and Carriage) when he was only 15. It was an immediate hit in Israel and is still a favorite song of the children. Cohen also wrote "Hasavta Banegev" (Grandmother in the Negev); "Mechol Hakerim" (vineyard Dance); "Luna Park" (Amusement Park); and "Al Hof Elar" (On the Sea of Eilat). These songs were all recorded in Israel and the United States by Yaffa Yarkoni and Hanna Ahroni. Cohen first came to New York in May, 1955. He entertained in New York, studied music at Julliard on a scholarship and taught Hebrew. The talented musician moved to California in 1959 where he teaches and also entertains with his original compositions and other folk songs.

Previn was also musical director for last year's Oscar Awards as well as the 26th and 28th annual ceremonies. Not only that, but Previn won two Oscars himself. Last year, teamed with Ken Darby, he won the Oscar for the Best Scoring of a Musical Picture, "Porgy and Bess." In 1958, Previn was handed the Oscar for the scoring of the musical movie, "Gigi."

To clarify the names Potash and Perlmutter, let it be known that Abe Potash and Morris Perlmutter were NOT the names of two real people, as imagined by many. The Jewish author Montague Glass wrote a series of short stories about two cloak-and-suit

Now the question is, and perhaps I didn't make myself clear originally: "What were the names of the Jewish actors who portrayed Potash and Perlmutter on the stage?"

Next time you watch the television show "Bonanza," pay special heed to young Mike Landon who plays "Little Joe Cartwright." His real name is Eugene Orowitz. His mother was the original Peggy O'Neill (no, that wasn't her real name). His father was Eli M. Orowitz, veteran theater manager. But young Eugene wanted no part of show business. He was interested chiefly in sports and made quite a name for himself as a javelin thrower. So much so, that scholastically he was graduated second from the bottom in a class of 301 students. When he injured his left arm and shoulder, and he realized his sports career was at an end, Orowitz made his bid for acting. He's a success at 23, is married and has two sons.
