**JEWS IN DETROIT** will be permitted to use absentee ballots in the forthcoming state primaries, which coincide with the Rosh Hashona holiday, it was reported. The Detroit Election Commission ordered the printing of 30,000 absentee ballots. In the 1950 primary, which also fell on Rosh Hashonah, more than 10,000 Jewish voters in Detroit used absentee ballots.

A **RADICAL METHOD** of pinpointing brain tumors has been developed through the joint effort of the Weismann Institute of Science and the Israel Atomic Energy Commission. The method is said to be an improvement over those used in the United States.

**GEORGE LINCOLN ROCKWELL**, notorious anti-Semite and founder of the American Nazi Party, infuriated the Arlington County Board with a brazen defense of nazism when he was called to appear at a meeting that was considering a resolution urging strong legal action to curb his local activities. The resolution was submitted by the Arlington chapter of the U. S. Veterans of Foreign Wars.

**PRESIDENT NASSER OF THE** United Arab Republic is holding Jews as living hostages in the event of a war with Israel, it was declared in London, England by a Jewish refugee who has just arrived there from Egypt. The Jewish refugee said Jews in Egypt are discriminated against and that Nasser's police are even keeping an eye over Jewish synagogues. The status of Jews in Egypt is that of fourth-class citizens, he added.

**AFTER FUNCTIONING AS AN** Orthodox congregation for more than 63 years the Tree of Life Congregation in McKeesport has decided to join the Conservative movement and been accepted to membership in the United Synagogue of America. The trend toward Conservative Judaism began to manifest itself in the congregation in 1950 with the institution of changes in the services, mixed seating arrangements and partial services in English.

**THE NEW KRUSHCHEV MANIFESTO** to be presented to the forthcoming 22nd congress of the Soviet Communist Party contains a reference to anti-Semitism, but not in the Soviet Union, where Jewish culture and communal life is completely suppressed. The document merely says that "imperialist reaction makes extensive use of chavinism to incite national conflicts, persecute entire national groups through anti-semitism and racial discrimination against Negroes".

**ANCIENT HEBREW TOMBS** have been found buried in a Greek Orthodox Church in White Russia, it was reported in Paris by the Yiddish communist paper "Neue Presse".

**Syrians Return Tourists To Israel After Kidnapping**

**TEL AVIV** — Two tourists, one American and one British, who were kidnaped by six Syrians a week ago, were returned unharmed to Israel this week through United Nations observers.

Israeli officials are still hunting for another American tourist, Mark Goldmann, who is missing and possibly held by the Syrians.

The American, 19-year-old Philip Janovsky, and the British tourist, 18-year-old Elizabeth Weil, who are both at the Yavneh Kibbutz on a one-year training program, left the Kibbutz for a tour of northern Israel. While touring ein Gev, they said, they were surrounded by arms-carrying Syrians, who fired at them. Bullets hit their knapsacks but not them.

They said they were blindfolded and taken to a site they could not identify. There they were questioned for hours at a time about Israel military movements, the economic situation and the forthcoming general elections. They were not ill-treated.

**Egyptians Approach U. S. Concern About De-Salting Process**

**TEL AVIV** — A Cabinet minister said last week that the United Arab Republic had approached a United States concern about acquiring a new Israel process for recovering water from the sea, according to a N. Y. Times report.

The United States company, the Fairbanks Whitney Corporation, has sales rights for the equipment in the Western Hemisphere.

Development Minister Mordechai Ben-Tov said Fairbanks Whitney had advised the Egyptians who approached them to negotiate directly with Israel, which has retained marketing rights for the Eastern Hemisphere.

The Minister strongly indicated that Israel would be prepared to sell the equipment to Cairo after production was started in three years. "I have no doubt that this invention will ultimately turn out to be an instrument for peace," he said.

The desalination process was invented by Dr. Alexander Zarvin, a Russian refugee now living in Israel.

"Our American partners are already tooling for mass production of these machines for the Western Hemisphere under our license," Ben-Tov said.

**U. S. Administration To Stop Grant To Israel This Year**

**WASHINGTON** — The State Department has officially informed Congress that for the first time in a decade American grant-in-aid will not be allocated to Israel because of her "impressive economic development."

The House Foreign Affairs Committee made known this development last weekend in its formal report to the full Congress on the foreign aid legislation now under consideration. Last year the administration sought similarly to deny granting aid to Israel, but administration officials surrendered to Congressional protest and reinstated Israel in the grant program. Israel was granted \$7,500,000 as an immediate result of the furor over its omission from the countries receiving grant-in-aid.

**ARABS DENY STORY**

**WASHINGTON** — A report by an Israeli Cabinet member that the United Arab Republic approached an American firm about obtaining the new Israeli process for desalting sea water was denied last week by a spokesman for the UAR Embassy here.

The UAR spokesman said that "upon contacting Fairbanks Whitney to ascertain their alleged UAR contact, we were told that no overtures by the UAR for the acquisition of this process have ever been made in the United States." However, a spokesman for the corporation in New York City confirmed that its Washington, D. C. office had been approached by representatives of the UAR.

In its report the Committee on Foreign Affairs said: "The Committee has been informed that aid to Israel will in the future stress loans and food for peace. Under difficult circumstances, Israel has achieved impressive economic development so that for the first time in 10 years, grant assistance has not been programmed for Israel. The Committee is of the opinion that Israel should continue to receive development loans and other forms of economic aid to levels high enough to insure continued development."

The Committee stressed that "should circumstances arise in which Israel again would be in need of grant aid, the Committee believes that the Administration should deal sympathetically with any such request."

**NEW YORK** — A six-year-old Israel-born motherless girl was reunited with her father last week after a strenuous custody battle by her Catholic foster mother to keep her and raise her as a Catholic.

**Jewish Community In Calcutta Dwindles**

**CALCUTTA, India** — A 160-year-old Jewish community with a New York-trained rabbi is gradually dwindling toward extinction here according to Paul Grimes of the New York Times.

It is dwindling voluntarily. Its members have complete religious freedom in India. Many feel, however, that Britain offers better economic opportunities or that Israel is a more logical homeland for followers of their faith.

At the end of World War II, more than 2,000 Jews worshipped in Calcutta's three synagogues and two prayer halls. Today there are only about 1,000. Their spiritual leader, Rabbi Ezekial N. Musleah, predicts that in five years there may be only 500.

Rabbi Musleah, 34 years old, was the first Indian-born Jew to be ordained.

**Chaplain Inspired Him**

He traces his interest in the rabbinic to a World War II friendship. He says he was inspired by Rabbi David J. Seligson, then a United States Army chaplain in Calcutta and now spiritual leader of the Central Synagogue at 652 Lexington Avenue in New York.

Rabbi Musleah, a graduate of Calcutta University, went to the United States in 1947. Five years later he was ordained and received a master's degree in Hebrew literature at the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York.

When he returned to Calcutta in 1952, he found it difficult to convince the Jews here that they should have a rabbi. Non-ordained scholars were performing rabbinical duties. Today, however, the dwindling community feels that it could not do without him.

"Who would read the Torah (scriptures) on Saturday?" the rabbi asked a visitor recently. "Our old Hebrew scholars are all dead or in Israel. We don't even have a mohel any more to perform ritual circumcisions. Our last one emigrated to the United States."

The Calcutta community consists primarily of Sephardic Jews who trace their origin to the Middle East, particularly Baghdad. They are distinct from the 18,000 Bene Israel Jews of western India, a community that dates back more than 2,000 years.

**Advocates Settling Of Arab Refugees Outside Of Israel**

**WASHINGTON** — The House Foreign Affairs Committee, in an official report made public last week, said that it believes that "the vast majority of the Palestine Arab refugees will eventually have to be settled on land where there is room and opportunity for them."

In its discussions of the Arab refugee problem, the Committee was given facts by a Committee member, Rep. Leonard Farbstein (D., N. Y.) differing from the State Department's presentations on this subject. Farbstein stressed resettlement in Arab lands as an important part of any effective solution.

In its formal report on the foreign aid bill, the Committee said, "The Committee regrets that only limited progress has been made to solve the problem of the Palestinian Arab refugees. Some progress has been made within recent years because refugees who have acquired skills have found employment and have been absorbed in the local economy."

"The United Nations Relief and Works Agency," the report continued, "plans to now expand the vocational training program in order to stimulate employment of the refugees and part of the funds included in this year's authorization for the United States contribution to UNRWA are to be used for this vocational training program. Nevertheless, progress toward a final solution remains regrettably slow."

The Committee stressed that the only favorable developments during the past year were 1) real progress in the rectification of UNRWA relief rolls, and 2) the

community were Shalom Cohen, a jeweler who came from Aleppo, Syria, in 1798, and his son-in-law, Moses Dwek Cohen, who came here in 1806.

The first synagogue was opened in 1831. The second was opened in 1836. The third, established in 1884, is Magen David, where Rabbi Musleah officiates. Its steeple and clock tower are landmarks of the financial district.

Some leading members of the community have been the late Sir David Ezra, one time sheriff of Calcutta; Sir Victor Sassoon, an industrialist who now lives in London, and N. B. Elias, a leading business man and industrialist who now is president of the synagogue.

The first of two Jewish schools in Calcutta was opened in 1881. It is now primarily for girls.

A free school for boys was started in 1886. Still privately supported, it now has about 100 pupils from kindergarten through high school.

The Calcutta Jews officially profess orthodox, although many of them do not practice it in their

homes. Rabbi Musleah considers himself a conservative.

He says that about 10 per cent of the Jews here are wealthy and about 30 per cent are middle-class office workers or small merchants. The rest, he says, are poor peddlers or unemployed who live largely on charity.

Most Calcutta Jews have Western habits. But after India be-

came independent in 1947, job-seekers whose habits pleased the former British rulers were no longer at a premium. Also the rigid import controls instituted by India to conserve foreign exchange severely affected Jewish merchants.

Israel encouraged the Indian Jews to immigrate there. Britain welcomed them as residents of a member country of the British Commonwealth. The outflow resulted.

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# Goldmann Remarks For A Neutral Israel Stir Many Protests

TEL AVIV — Dr. Nahum Goldmann's initial plunge into Israeli politics, keyed to the theme that Israel should adopt a neutralist policy between the Eastern and Western blocs, and should also seek integration in the region, sparked widespread discussion throughout Israel this week.

In the first two of a series of scheduled election addresses for the Liberal Party, Goldmann described Israel's foreign policy as no policy at all. Declaring that Israel's foreign policy had not changed in the past decade, he said it was "shortsighted" for Israel not to seek some sort of integration in the region because all present world policies were based on regional groupings.

Goldmann charged that Israel was neglecting Red China, which, he said, within a few years would become a major factor in the world. Presently, he said, there was hatred toward Israel in Red China. He attacked the attitude in Israel of "wait and see and don't do anything, of staying put, of being afraid to try anything new."

He urged the neutralization of the Middle East through having both major blocs ensure the peace of the region. He warned that time was not working in Israel's favor and expressed the opinion that neutralization of the Middle East would finally compel the Arabs to give up their dreams of destroying Israel with communist aid and create the chance that the Arabs might accept Israel as an established fact. He denied that he had ever favored territorial concessions to the Arabs or acceptance of Arab refugees by Israel.

### Angered by Goldmann

The Goldmann speeches galvanized the Mapai Party, principal architect of the foreign policy he was so strongly criticizing.

Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister, irritated by Goldmann's attack on the foreign policy for which she is responsible, asked for a clear-cut decision of approval for a Mapi speakers to attack Goldmann. She was seconded by Agriculture Minister Moshe Dayan. However, Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion and Labor Minister Giora Josephthal urged a moderate reaction.

The absence of a formal decision not to attack Goldmann was taken by Mrs. Meir Dayan, Education Minister Abba Eban, Finance Minister Levi Eshkol and Deputy Defense Minister Shimon Peres as a green light. They fiercely criticized Goldmann's peace suggestions and his neutralization proposals, which they said would mean putting Israel under the influence of the communist bloc.

While the Mapai speakers did not deny the right of any Jew to come to Israel and discuss major issues, they argued it was improper for a non-Israeli Jew to come and "belittle" Israel in the eyes of the world.

### Claims Right

Earlier, Goldmann declared that there could be no separation between Israel and Jews elsewhere and that therefore the partnership between the two Jeweries was not limited to philanthropy but included the right of the non-Israeli Jew to advise, comment and express views on the key problems of Israel.

Commenting on his American passport, Goldmann added later

that if he had an Israeli passport, he would not have succeeded in obtaining "those millions of dollars for the survivors of the nazi regime." The question, he remarked, was "how many millions for the Jewish nation is my passport worth?"

Mapai sources meanwhile indicated they were dissatisfied about Dr. Goldmann's participation in the Liberal party election campaign, claiming that his post as president of the world Zionist movement had been entrusted to him as a non-party personality. They asserted that his action in joining the Liberal party was done without consulting the Zionist Actions Committee and that he had sent letters to Zionists in the U. S. asking donations for the Liberal Party election fund.

### Arab Acceptance

In another major election effort, Goldmann suggested in a full-page article in Maariv, an Israeli daily, that President Nasser of the United Arab Republic might be sold on accepting Israel if Israel were willing to cooperate in an Arab regional policy.

Among the reactions to Goldmann's entry into Israel's election campaign was that he had injected into the election debate the issue of an Israel-Arab settlement from a point of view other than the standard Israeli position on how best to safeguard Israel against Arab attack.

### British Painting Assured by Gift

LONDON — A gift of 100,000 pounds (\$280,000) from a foundation set up by a British Jewish philanthropist assured that a famous Goya painting will remain in Britain.

The painting, a portrait of the first Duke of Wellington, was purchased last June by Charles B. Wrightsman of New York, who paid 140,000 (\$392,000) for it at an auction at Sotheby's Gallery.

When the painting was sold to the American, some conservative members of Parliament urged withholding of the export license needed for shipping the painting from Britain. Mr. Wrightsman then offered to sell the portrait to the British National Gallery for the price he paid for it, but the Gallery did not have enough money to buy it.

**WANTS ROCKWELL ON LIST**  
NEW YORK — Senator Kenneth Keating, a member of the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee called for designation of George Rockwell's American Nazi party as subversive on the U. S. Attorney General's list. "We are prone to overlook these extremist right-wing groups in our investigations of subversion," said the New York Republican.

### Policy Decisions For Fund-Raising

Joseph W. Ress, General Jewish Committee president, and Merrill L. Hassenfeld, general campaign chairman, announced that policy decisions for the annual Fall fund-raising drive which starts next month will be made at a meeting of the campaign cabinet and Initial Gifts leaders Monday evening. 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

## Draftees May Request Holy Day Deferments

NEW YORK — The National Jewish Welfare Board's Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy has been officially advised by the Selective Service Commission that all draft boards have been asked to give "favorable consideration, whenever possible" to requests from Jewish registrants for postponement of their physical exam-

ination or induction into the Armed Forces during the fall Jewish High Holy Days.

This official word was received by Rabbi Aaron Blumenthal, spiritual leader of Congregation Emanu-El, Mt. Vernon, N. Y., and Commission Chairman, from Brig. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the Selective Service System, in the form of Operations Bulletin No. 81, amended as of June 30, and addressed to draft boards throughout the country.

Bulletin No. 81 applies to Rosh Hashanah (Sept. 11 and 12), the Jewish New Year; Yom Kippur (Sept. 20), the Day of Atonement, and Sukkoth (Sept. 25- Oct. 3) the Feast of Tabernacles. Since all the Holy Days commence at sundown of the day previous to these dates, Bulletin No. 81 states that "normally, the registrant's physical examination or induction should be postponed to a date following the religious holiday involved."

JWB, the government-authorized agency for serving the religious, welfare and morale needs of Jewish personnel and their dependents in the Armed Forces, said that Jewish registrants seeking postponement of physical examination or induction during the High Holy Days, should make their requests directly to their local draft boards. JWB is a member agency of USO.

### TO HEAD ROYAL SOCIETY

## "We Are Not Jews, We Are Israelis"

TEL AVIV — A great and growing schism exists between youth in Israel and Jewish youth elsewhere, according to a recent report in the Jewish Chronicle of London. "Young Israelis have grown up in an atmosphere of self-defense by aggression," the article states.

Self-confident, uninhibited, and greatly influenced by Ben-Gurion, they cannot understand why, if Jews can be subjected to the kind of treatment they have heard about during the Eichmann trial they hesitate to come to Israel.

These sabras often say, "We are not Jews, we are Israelis." The bond between them and Jews abroad is becoming weaker. The introduction of "Jewish consciousness" into school curricula is an acknowledgement of this trend, the reporter surmises.

She finds it ironical that at the very moment when young Israelis were learning for the first time the extent of Jewish martyrdom at the hands of the Nazis, the conflict over the meaning of Jewishness — whether it means race only, or race plus religion, or religion only — evoked such anger that many of them refused to describe themselves as Jews in the population census.

## U. S. Corporation To Up Investment

TEL AVIV — A five-year plan has been prepared by the Israel Investors Corp. which calls for a 500% increase in the corporation's \$10,000,000 capital stock, Sam Rothberg, of Peoria, Ill., head of the corporation, reported here last week. He said the plan included a multi-million dollar investment in a chemical industry to be constructed in the Arad area near the Dead Sea and in the Rosh Zohar gas pipeline to the Dead Sea.

The American corporation, which has invested large sums in such enterprises as the Dead Sea Works and Chemicals and Fertilizers, Ltd. also is concluding negotiations to join present oil companies in Israel in the six-inch oil pipeline and in the present oil terminal near Tel Aviv.

Julian Venetzky, corporation secretary, said, "We want to keep pace with the rhythm and growth of Israel's development. We do not want to live off the country but to plough our profits back into the economy, after deduction of dividends to stockholders."

## JWB Will Meet GIs' Requirements

NEW YORK — The National Jewish Welfare Board last week reported to President John F. Kennedy that it is remobilizing all its resources and manpower to meet additional demands for religious and welfare services to Jewish military personnel and their dependents resulting from the emergency build-up of Armed Forces strength requested by the President and approved by Congress.

JWB is the Government-authorized agency for meeting the religious and moral needs of Jewish military personnel and of Jewish patients in Veterans Administration hospitals, and represents the Jewish community in the United Service Organizations. The actor liked it and wished to buy it. Mr. Schifrin refused money but said he would accept instead two tickets to the show.

And this, Mr. Schifrin says, is what started a hobby that has enabled him and his wife to see about forty Broadway hits in the last two years — without ever buying a ticket.

After "Fiorello," Mr. Schifrin designed gold musical notes — symbolic of "Do Re Mi" — and received two tickets from a member of the cast. On another oc-

**Early Struggles Recalled**

The pamphlet tells of the bitter struggle of the Jewish pioneer in the early years as he began farming and tried to adapt himself to manual labor. The Palestine swamps swarmed with mosquitoes.

There was insufficient food and in adequate housing. These coupled with the hard work, made the settlers easy prey to such diseases as malaria, dysentery and trachoma. Many died.

The sick lay unattended in squalid huts. The dangerously ill, needing hospitalization, had to make a two-day journey over tortuous roads to reach a hospital.

These pioneers realized that it would be impossible to continue without organizing mutual aid in case of illness. Kupat Holim was established. Its first stage consisted of medical care administered by one physician and one nurse.

**Sixteen Hospitals Built**

From that modest beginning, the records show, Kupat Holim developed a network of sixteen hospitals, including nine general medical institutions and seven engaged in medical specialties. It has more than 10,000 employees, including 2,000 physicians and 4,000 nurses.

Kupat Holim requires employees in industry to undergo regular examinations. Particular attention is paid to the detection of occupational diseases. The organization provides every industrial enterprise with first-aid stations and with physicians and nurses.

**Ex-Nazi Under Inquiry For Aiding Eichmann**

HANOVER, Germany — The Hanover state attorney announced Wednesday that he was investigating to see whether Dr. Erhard Wetzel is the man who was accused of co-author, with Adolf Eichman, a program recommending the gassing of Jews.

Ernest Wetzel was identified at the Eichmann trial in Jerusalem as the official who helped prepare the so-called "gas chamber letter." Dr. Erhard Wetzel, 58 years old, is a former Nazi party official who was released from prison in 1955 after serving part of a fifteen year sentence.

Dr. Wetzel, who received a monthly pension of 1,600 marks (\$400), came to the attention of the authorities when an investigator in the Lower Saxony Interior Ministry checked.



## Hitler's Second Book Sparks Few Sales

MUNICH — There has been little demand for "Hitler's Second Book," a sequel to "Mein Kampf," which was placed on sale here last week.

The book, written before Mein Kampf was published and kept secret during Hitler's lifetime, was found in manuscript form hidden in a vault in the central Nazi publishing house in Munich until it was seized by the United States Army in 1945 and sent to Washington. It was forgotten until a few years ago when it was traced and authenticated by Prof. Gerhard L. Weinberg of the University of Michigan, who wrote a forward to the volume.

Two themes mark the second book. One is an idealization of constant war as "the highest driving force for the development

of mankind." The other is Hitler's psychotic anti-Semitism, exhibited in constant references to the "Jewish parasites" and the dangers to the world from "racial bastardization."

As in Mein Kampf, the principal theme of Germany's expansion was toward "the east," meaning the Soviet Union, which Hitler asserted, would fall apart with the destruction of "its Jewish leaders." The second Hitler book ends with a tirade against Jews, using such expressions as "wiping out" and "annihilating" — a forecast of what the Nazis were to do to Jews.

## Roaring Blaze Wrecks Chicago Synagogue

CHICAGO — A roaring blaze whipped through the three story synagogue building of Agudath Achim of South Shore, 7933 S. Yates, early last week, destroying the sanctuary. Arson is strongly suspected.

Estimates of damaged ranged from \$50,000 by John G. Scalan, deputy fire marshal, to \$200,000 by Rabbi Harold P. Smith, spiritual leader of the congregation. The rabbi's figure includes loss of religious articles.

Four torahs in the arke were burned beyond recognition, despite attempts of a group led by congregation president Nathan Waldman to save them before the fire engulfed the brick building. Rabbi Smith and several members of the congregation managed to save some religious articles, including Torahs in the Beth Midrash.

The fire was reported around midnight by a building janitor, according to first unofficial reports from Rebbetzin Smith. A Fire Department investigation revealed that the fire started around the ark. High flames were immediately visible. Just a week ago a Baptist Church at 80th and Crandon was also gutted by fire, leading to the suspicion of arson.

## Destry Rides Again At Warwick Tent

Hugh O'Brien, veteran Broadway and Hollywood actor who skyrocketed to fame in his television role as "Wyatt Earp", will star in "Destry Rides Again" at the Warwick Musical Theatre starting Monday.

In addition to O'Brien's multifarious activities in TV, the films, and personal appearances, he also has managed to find the time to star in the title role of the Broadway production of "Destry" and to appear in stock productions of "The Rainmaker" and "Two for the Seesaw".

Appearing opposite Mr. O'Brien are Libi Staiger as Frenchy, and Tim O'Connor and Don Tomkins.

"Destry Rides Again", which closed recently on Broadway after a highly successful run, received rave notices for its exciting Whip Dance and lively Western songs. The Warwick production is directed and choreographed by Peter Conlow and the orchestra will be directed by Gershon Kingsley.

Following "Destry" into the Warwick Tent will be Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Flower Drum Song," the last production of the season.

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

by Sylvia Porter

### SOPHISTICATED 'YOU'

The tale about the New York grocer who bottled quart jars of water, labeled them "Instant Water--just add hot coffee" and did a fine business at 85 cents a jar, has started the pundits pontificating anew about what a mysterious, capricious, hysterical creature are you, the U. S. consumer.

Reflecting the new befuddlement about you is the fact that economists are now divided into two opposing opinion groups on how you'll spend in coming months. One group is using this tale to illustrate how easily "hysterical you" can be stampeded into a buying spree which will set off another inflationary upsurge. The opposing group is using retail sales and other statistics to suggest that "mysterious you" will hold back on buying and by so doing curtail the infant business advance.

What loose thinking about us this is!

In defiance of this tale about Instant Water, we, America's consumers, have demonstrated over and over that we are rarely hysterical or mysterious or capricious creatures.

Most of the time we are much saner in our spending activities than businessmen. Businessmen usually are organized into groups, constantly talk about each other's hopes and fears, tend to become over-exuberant in times of business upswing, over-pessimistic in times of business slowdown. Not us, though. We're disorganized and as Dr. George Katona of Michigan University and one of the nation's top experts on consumer behavior emphasizes, we "are influenced to a much lesser extent by the opinions and behavior of other consumers." While we may at times "become the victims of rumors and propaganda," most of the time "consumers do not lose their sanity."

Contrary to the folklore about consumers' ignorance, we have demonstrated over and over that we are knowing, often astute, buyers.

We are aware that prices are stable now and we're not responding to scare talk of inflation. We are aware that supplies of goods are ample and we are refusing to be stampeded into buying. To quote Dr. Ralph Barnes of Prentice-Hall, today's is "a sophisticated buyer's market--one that knows how to take advantage of such price-weakening factors as widespread excess capacity, tough foreign competition."

In the face of widespread and stickily high unemployment, we, as a nation of consumers, are financially better off than ever before and we are fully conscious of our power to fill our needs for goods.

There is no doubt that real incomes--meaning incomes adjusted for price rises and thus reflecting the actual buying power of the dollars in our pockets--are at an all-time high. Fortune Magazine estimates that real income per person is now 3 per cent higher than at the start of the year, 1 per cent above the previous peak reached last summer. There is no doubt that we have leeway to expand our on-the-cuff buying when we decide to. We have been preparing for this by paying off our installment debts at a strikingly fast pace.

Finally, despite repeated statements that we are saturated with goods, there is no such thing as "saturation" in this sense. When we have that raise, that house, that car, that appliance, etc., we soon "want a little more income, a few additional goods, and a somewhat better house than we have." But here too, Katona's studies underline, we are realistic about our desires, not hysterical.

What, then, does this suggest about us in the near future?

It suggests that we'll be expanding our buying steadily across the board--and new surveys signal that we'll be major buyers of cars and houses as the months roll on.

It suggests that just as we were the crucial stabilizing force in the recent recession, we'll be the crucial stabilizing force in this new advance--and that's as much as any one should ask.

(P.S. About that Instant Water--maybe those who did buy it have been having such poor luck brewing tasty coffee recently that they figured it was worth the money to find out what a change of water would achieve. Makes sense to me.)

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## The Lyons Den

DEFINITIONS: -- Words are not always what they seem to be. Events, custom and odd experience sometimes add an extra, illuminating meaning to the words. For instance:

Nunnally Johnson, the producer-writer, defined an actor as someone who wants to work desperately--until you need him... On the other hand, Sidney Phillips, the veteran MGM talent scout, defined an actor as someone who will pay to act a role, if the producer can hold out against him long enough.

The late Albert D. Lasker maintained a farm in upstate New York, but insisted that he was an agriculturist rather than a farmer. He defined both words: A farmer is one who makes money on the farm and loses it in the city. An agriculturist is one who makes money in the city and loses it on the farm.

During the war, I heard Gen. William S. Knudsen, of the War Production Board, define status quo as Latin for "the fix we're in." And he defined a priority as something which gives you an option to ask for something you know you won't get... Sen. Kefauver, who ran for the office in 1956, defined a Vice President as the man who presides over the Senate each day and inquires after the President's health each night.

Mayor Jimmy Walker, one of our foremost speechmakers, gave me his definition of adjectives, when used by politicians in speeches: "They're like the towel a waiter wraps around a bottle of wine he's serving. In both cases it makes the customers and listeners forget the inferior quality of the product."

Umbrage, Jackie Gleason told me, is something a man should take only when he's sure he can lick the other guy... Louis Marx, the toy manufacturer, defined a hit show as one to which you can unhesitatingly send buyers... Norman Thomas, who was the Socialist Party's perennial candidate for President, was amused at being referred to as an elder statesman, and said: "An elder statesman is a politician who can't get himself elected."

Dean Coffman of UCLA cautioned a freshman class about the habits of college students who merely try to achieve passing grades. "Education," he said, "is the only commodity whose buyers insist on getting less than they pay for."

Hollywood has been defined by countless people in varied ways. Cedric Hardwicke told me: "Hollywood is the place where writers don't really write, actors don't really act and agents don't really age." Peter Ustinov told me, after his first visit there: "Hollywood is the remnant of a huge wedding cake, prepared for more guests than came." And Gregory Ratoff, embittered, said: "Hollywood was invented by Reds to destroy capitalism."

"Hollywood," said an anonymous social critic, "is a place started by a man who went west with a cliché." Alfred Drake defined Hollywood as "The place where, by the time you get something you can sink your teeth into, they're no longer your own teeth." Elmer Rice described it as a place where maximum money is paid for exercising minimum mentality.

Sir Alexander Korda, the movie producer, sighed to me one night in London: "After 40 years in this business, I've finally come to the conclusion that an American lawyer can best be defined as a frustrated novelist."... Abe Burrows defined charm as "that indefinable something possessed by all women who have ample bosoms."... And Clifton Fadiman said: "Critic and author bear the same relationship as that of the knife and the throat."

George Jessel, who has worked in Hollywood as actor, producer, studio aide and publicist, defined a state of flux as a spot where you don't know if tomorrow Howard Hughes will want you to direct a movie for him or to wash his windows.

George Murphy defined the awkward age in Hollywood as the age where an actor is too old to get the girl, but too young to play the father. It was Shelley Winters who defined the modern, independent, intelligent woman as someone who can't get a fellow. And Ben Hecht defined book-writing as akin to keeping a mistress: "In both cases, you ought to have a lot of money to stay involved."

Sarah Palfrey Cooke, the one-

time tennis champion, defined sports as "an activity where, if you make one blunder, you find that you live within a stone's throw of everybody." Leo Lindy, the restaurateur, defined a race track as a place where "the windows clean the man." And Helen Tamaris, the dancer-choreographer, defined a show-angel as someone who, for 5,000 clams, can get 5,000 quahms.

Judge Ferdinand Pecora, the one-time candidate for Mayor, disliked being referred to as "distinguished," and said: "Distinguished" means I'm not having a good time."... It was also Pecora who once said that the mayoralty is a job good only for the Mayor's friends. He defined a reactionary as "someone who sits in an easy chair on Sunday, never thinking that tomorrow is Monday but only that yesterday was Saturday."

Miss de Havilland hasn't as yet made any films in French. "In French, I could only play a foreigner. I have an accent, but they don't know what it is." She asked her son Benjamin--who was born in California but whose accent and gestures now are like Charles Boyer's. "You have an English accent, Mame," he said.

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**Museum At Dachau Depicts Concentration Camp Horrors For Persistent Tourists**

DACHAU, Germany — This small residential town, a suburb of thriving, driving Munich, has two points of interest for the American traveler. The first is the Dachau Concentration Camp Museum, all that remains of the Nazi Germany death camp in which so many thousands of men, women and children were dispatched in the crisp efficiency of the crematorium. The second is the United States Army base at Dachau.

It is easier to find the second than it is the first, although the military base appears to be one of less than major importance. There is a big sign on the main highway from Munich pointing to the turn-off to the direct road to the Army installation. But nowhere on that sign, or anywhere else on the route to Dachau, is there a sign indicating that the old concentration death camp now stands as a museum open to the public, a permanent reminder of what happened hereabouts when Germany was threatening the world in the Thirties.

**In the Army Base**  
 The tourist has to be quite determined to search out the place, for he will have trouble finding someone in the town or along the road who can remember where the Dachau camp was and where the museum now stands. This is difficult to comprehend, since the museum lies deep within the Army base.

One checks casually with the uniformed attendants at the entrance gate to the Army base before driving through on a mile or more of roads to the museum. And, once inside the base, one must ask directions to the museum, for again there are no signs or directional markers.

When found, the Dachau museum is an abrupt change from the businesslike military roads and buildings all around it. The road turns at right angles through a foliage-covered fence and into a neat, but modest, graveled parking lot, which is big enough for about thirty automobiles. There were one car and a motorbike there when we drove up on a weekday afternoon, and there were a half-dozen men and women and two children soberly walking around the museum grounds.

A graveled walk leads through beautifully landscaped grass and flower beds to the museum, which is actually the crematorium of the Dachau camp. The newer, bigger crematorium, that is, for on one side of the grounds stand a building labeled "Old Crematorium." This small structure contains only one furnace.

It is difficult to accept the significance of such signs before entering the larger museum building. This is because the sun shines on grass and flowers, birds flit and sing through the trees and the scene is one of pastoral beauty and peace.

**History Revived**  
 However, once one walks to the rear of the building and enters it to start the slow walk through to the front an exit of the museum, history comes rushing back with a vehemence that kills idle conversation, compels those who must talk to do so in whispers and drives some visitors to hurry out of the museum overcome by what they have seen.

A visit to the Dachau museum is not a trip to give the sight-seer pleasure, but this tourist must recommend it to anyone within reasonable distance of the place. An even better recommendation is the guest book, which is slowly being filled with comments that reveal the impact of the museum.

The visitors come from all parts of the world, a surprising large number from South America. Their comments reveal a sense of shocked surprise that what they

saw — the preparatory rooms, the gas chamber with the deceptive sign, "Brausebad" (showerbath) over its entrance and the crematorium with its big furnace flanked by two smaller ones — were built and used in their lifetimes.

Perhaps the entire gamut of visitor comments was expressed most succinctly by a Midwestern American woman. She wrote "GOD!" in big bold capital letters and signed her name in a wavering hand. Repeatedly, tourists asked, via the guest book, "How could people do such things to other human beings?"

**Society of Survivors**  
 The Eichmann trial was in its final days of testimony at the time of this detour to Dachau, and the sunlit remote museum, seemingly unknown to its neighbors now as well as in its heyday, had a front-page pertinency. The crematorium furnaces were still draped with faded floral wreaths deposited there ceremoniously a few days earlier by members of a Society of Dachau Survivors who had met there in sad reunion.

We left the museum about 4:30 P.M. to drive back to Munich and through it to its airport, catching the crowds of factory workers pouring out of the bustling industrial centers that ring that city. A pedestrian just outside the Army base had no difficulty when it came to showing us the direct route back to Munich. It proved to be the straight-as-an-arrow road leading from the American base and joining the main road right where the sign points to the military establishment.

It seemed strange that no one had thought to put an addendum to the United States Army's sign

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**Reveal Secret U.S. Efforts  
For Arab-Israel Peace Talks**

JERUSALEM — Details of a secret United States mission sent by former President Eisenhower to Jerusalem and Cairo for the sole purpose of bringing about

peace talks between Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion and President Nasser of the United Arab Republic were revealed in the press here after five years of strict secrecy maintained by the Government.

This was the most serious mediation effort undertaken so far by the U.S. Government. It was conducted personally by Deputy Secretary of Defense Robert Anderson, whom President Eisenhower entrusted with the mission. The visit of a high American official has since then been mentioned several times by Premier Ben-Gurion in support of the Israel position that Nasser has never had any intention of seeking a peaceful solution of the Arab-Israel conflict. However, Mr. Ben-Gurion never disclosed the name of the official, nor the time when the visit took place.

The reports published in the press here reveal for the first time that the official was Deputy Secretary Anderson and that he arrived in Israel shortly before the 1956 Suez campaign. In line with the requests for absolute secrecy asked by the White House, only three people knew about his arrival and his mission. They were Mr. Ben-Gurion, his political secretary Mr. Navon and Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Foreign Minister.

noting that those persistent tourists who insisted upon visiting the concentration camp museum could find it simply by driving up to the front gate of the base.

It seemed equally strange to be driving through the thronging, clashing happy traffic of Munich, whose streets are jammed with automobiles and well-dressed pedestrians reflecting the prosperity of this part of Germany, with the mind still occupied with the oppressive images that filled it in that trim, little neat, almost precisely set up and fully isolated museum.

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## Ben-Gurion Opposed To Church-State Separation For The Present

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion declared last week that he did not favor complete separation of state and religion in Israel at the present time.

The Prime Minister gave his views on the issue to members of the Rabbinical Council of America attending a special conclave in Israel. He said his stand was based on the premise that national unity had to be preserved in an Israel beset by enemies.

Reports described the dialogue as sharp, lively and largely un-diplomatic on both sides. The dispute developed during a question-and-answer session following a ninety-minute talk by the Premier on ethnic integration of culture and security.

The Premier showed the first

signs of irritation when he was asked why he was opposed to halachic law and why he was resentful of criticism that had been voiced against his attitude and position toward Orthodox Jews. Mr. Ben-Gurion was particularly perturbed over a charge by one of the rabbis that he was discriminating against Orthodox Jews in Israel who refuse to work on the Sabbath. The Premier chided the rabbis for not teaching their young rabbis not to be impudent.

When he was asked whether he observed kashruth and other mitzvahs, the Premier retorted that that was a personal matter and that it was "chutzepeh" on the part of the questioner to ask such a question. At the same time he rejected the charge of alleged discrimination against Orthodox Jews in Israel, calling it a libel and a distortion.

He stated that while he was a non-observant Jew, he favored the continued rabbinical control in Israel on questions of personal status until the bulk of the newly-arrived Sephardic Jews became integrated.

At the final session of the convocation, Rabbi Israel Miller of New York, a vice president, warned that any effort by Reform or Conservative Judaism to enter the Israeli religious scene would "not strike roots but will divide and serve as a divisive influence," just as it had "plagued the American Jewish community."

It was disclosed meanwhile, on another front of the struggle between Jewish religious sects in Israel, that work will be resumed on a Reform synagogue in Jerusalem after two years of arbitration and court struggles. Dr. Nelson Glueck, president of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, said he hoped the synagogue would become the first real "bridgehead" of Reform Judaism in Israel.

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
