## Arab Leaders Determined To Thwart Israeli Diversion Of River Jordan

CAIRO — The Arab Technical Committee for the River Jordan opened its first session in the Arab League building last week with 11 of the 13 member states of the league present. Syria and Jordan were absent. No explanation for their absence was immediately available.

All sessions were private and without a definite time-table.

The committee was formed in 1954 to draw up a plan to counter an Israeli plan for diversion of Jordan River waters to irrigate the semi-arid Negev region. The committee presented a final technical plan at a meeting of Arab

leaders Jan. 13.

The Arab leaders have declared their determination to thwart the Israeli diversion pro-

ject, which is expected to begin this month.

The Arabs have a choice of military action — a move there has been some talk of here — or of carrying out a plan to divert Jordan River waters at their sources, which are in Arab lands.

Percentages Cited

Technical calculations have indicated that 77 per cent of the sources of the Jordan are in Arab lands and 23 per cent in Israel. Based on these calculations, the Arab plan proposes a project under which Israel would get about 23 per cent of the annual flow and 77 per cent would be allocated to Arab lands.

The plan in brief is this:

Construction of two storage dams on the main Jordan River source, the Yarmuk River rising in Syria, this would divert water into Syria and Jordan.

Construction of a storage dam on the Hasbani River source in Lebanon and diversion of waters through a canal for irrigation of Lebanese land.

Construction of canals eastward and westward from Baniyas River sources in Syria to divert irrigation water into Syrian areas.

The Arabs charge that of 1.25 billion cubic meters of annual Jordan River flow available for power and irrigation, Israel's plan would give her 700 million cubic meters or 56 per cent.

The Arab Approach

The Arab project would control and divert Jordan River waters rising in Arab lands so that Israel's share would be no more than the percentage equal to the water rising in Israel.

The Arab plan rejects proposals for storage reservoirs in Israel, or power-generating stations that would benefit both the Arab countries and Israel.

The committee members represent the United Arab Republic, Syria, Jordan and Lebanon.

### Israel's Irrigation Plans Undisclosed

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — Israel is preparing a test run of the first stage of her Jordan River irrigation plan, but is keeping the date secret because of Arab opposition.

The project involves the withdrawal of water from the northwest sector of Lake Tiberias. The water is to be carried by pipeline, open canal and tunnels about 100 miles to the south to irrigate the Negev.

Part of the flow will be used also to replenish coastal plain waters that have been over-used to meet increasing demand in the region around Tel Aviv.

The main conduit from Lake Tiberias will link up with the headworks of the Yarkon-Negev project at Rosh Ha'ayin, east of Tel Aviv, and from there the water will be carried farther south by the two Yarkon-Negev pipelines.

Israeli officials insist that the project in no way conflict with the United States-sponsored regional plan for the Jordan Valley, which was blocked by the Arab Governments. They could be integrated someday in the regional program if political conditions made that a possibility.

### Experts Feel Arabs Will Not Cooperate To Stop Israeli Plans

TEL AVIV — Israeli experts consider it unlikely that the mutually distrusting Arab rulers will be able to coordinate any practical venture to prevent Israel from using the Jordan River's waters.

Finishing touches are being applied to a network of pipes, tunnels and open canals to tap the Sea of Galilee. The project, due for completion early this year, will begin without fanfare for security.

Proposals to dam rivers rising in Syria and in Lebanon, to the Jordan, have also been shrugged off here.

## Discovery Reopens Debate On Compilers Of Scrolls

TEL AVIV — An archeological discovery has reopened the debate about the identity of the sect that compiled the Dead Sea Scrolls.

It associates the sect with the Jewish zealots who resisted the Roman conquerors of Palestine in the first century.

The new evidence is a scroll similar to those found by an Arab shepherd in 1947 at Qumran near the Dead Sea. It was discovered at Massada in northeast Israel. Prof. Yigael Yadin, a noted Israeli archeologist, is leading an expedition there to unearth the fortress that was the last to hold out against the Romans. It fell after 900 Jews committed mass suicide to avoid surrendering to the enemy.

The scroll deals with Jewish Sabbatical sacrifices and is based in the 364-day calendar kept by the Qumran sect. It is a solar calendar, based on the earth's course in relation to the sun, whereas the Orthodox Jewish calendar is lunar, based on revolutions of the moon.

Briton Halls Confirmation Prof. Cecil Roth, a Briton who is an authority on Jewish history, hailed the discovery today as a confirmation of his view that the Dead Sea Scrolls represent the literature of the zealots.

In a letter to the Jerusalem Post sent from Oxford University, Professor Roth said it was "obvious that the defenders of Massada used the same unorthodox calendar and therefore followed the same unorthodox religious system, i.e. that they belonged to the same sect."

But Professor Yadin declined to concede that his new discovery undermined his own theory.

He believes that the Scrolls were compiled by Essenes, a monk-like Jewish sect that lived near the Dead Sea before and during the life of Jesus. The early Christians are believed to have been influenced by members of the sect.

Professor Yadin, who served as Chief of Staff of the Israeli Army from 1949 to 1952, said the latest discovery showed that fighting groups of Essenes took refuge in Massada in 70 A. D.

### Shriver Delivers Johnson Message To Levi Eshkol

TEL AVIV — Sargent Shriver, director of the United States Peace Corps, delivered a letter from President Johnson to Premier Levi Eshkol in Jerusalem this week. Secrecy was maintained by both sides on its content.

Mr. Shriver, who conferred for more than an hour with the Premier, said later that his meetings with Pope Paul VI, King Hussein of Jordan and Mr. Eshkol produced satisfactory responses to the matters raised by the Premier. He said he had already communicated oral reactions to Mr. Johnson and would not carry written replies home.

**World Maccabiah Games To Be Staged In 1965**

The World Maccabiah Games in Tel Aviv, Israel will be staged from August 23 to 31, 1965, according to Haskell Cohen of New York, president of the United States Committee sports for Israel.

Cohen, recently returned from a London meeting of the International Maccabiah Games Committee, said that 32 nations are expected to be represented, six more than in 1961. He also said that the program of the Games will be expanded to 20 sports. New additions are golf and judo.

Cohen was accompanied in London by Max J. Lovell and Robert E. Rosenberg, both of New York. They are a vice-president and treasurer, respectively, of the U.S. Committee Sports for Israel, which is the traditional sponsor of United States teams in the Maccabiah Games.

"Five continents sent representatives to the International meeting," said Cohen. "It was a wonderful meeting with many problems settled. For example, we arranged for venues for competition. Beginning in 1965, all competition will be located in and around Tel Aviv, instead of throughout Israel."

Cohen said that Russia will be approached to permit a squad of Soviet Jewish athletes to compete in the Games. He also noted that the mammoth Ramat Gan Stadium just outside Tel Aviv, site of the opening and closing ceremonies, will be furnished with a running track. The stadium holds 60,000, and henceforth will be the site of the track and field competition. The old Maccabi Stadium, built in '35, accommodated 6,000 for track.

"The United States probably will field a team of between 175 and 200 athletes," Cohen said. "In 1961, we took 135 athletes to Israel."

One of the reasons for the increased size of the United States team in 1965 will be the planned inclusion of a soccer squad.

Cohen also noted that the U.S. Committee Sports for Israel is now considering the possibility of sending a representative team to the first Pan-American Maccabiah Games in Buenos Aires this August. "There are many problems involved in this project," he said, "but we're working on them."

The next meeting of the International Maccabiah Games Committee is scheduled for this July in Tel Aviv.

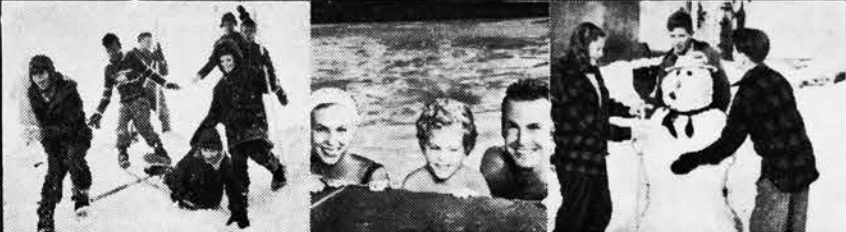

## The Pope In Israel

The world continued to hang in wonder and breathless interest on Pope Paul VI's voyage to the Holy Land. Emotions on the spot, especially in the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem, were exalted to the point of hysteria. It was a weekend whose range and depth of history not only included long hours in Israel, but a meeting with Patriarch Athenagoras of the Eastern Orthodox Church, resuming a dialogue on unity that ended five centuries ago.

The day spent in Israel will strengthen the hopes that the next session of Vatican II will again take up — and this time act favorably upon — the two chapters, or schemata, on relations between the Roman Catholic Church and Judaism.

Among other things, the Church would declare in dogmatic form that all mankind and not only the Jews shared the blame for the crucifixion of Christ. There was much disappointment among Jews and among liberals in and out of the Roman Catholic Church that the second session of Vatican II ended without acting on these chapters. It was widely believed that Pope Paul, personally, favored acceptance of the drafts, and his friendly sojourn in Israel seems to bear that out.

In any event, the day was a reminder that Jesus Christ was a Jew and that Christianity, like Mohammedanism, had its origins in Judaism. When President Shazar of Israel went to meet the Pontiff, he said that he and other members of the Government had made "our way down to Megiddo, the city Solomon built, so that we might welcome him as soon as he stepped upon the soil of our land, this holy land."

It is, indeed, holy for Jews, Christians and Moslems alike, but it is not at peace. The extraordinary political and diplomatic complications that accompanied Pope Paul's journey from Jordan to Israel and from the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem to the Israeli sector and back to the Jordanian part, were an acceptance of how unpeaceful the Holy Land is today.

It almost seemed symbolic that the Pope was so unceremoniously and dangerously shoved around by spectators in the Jordanian sector on Saturday. Jordan's security arrangements were, to say the least, inadequate. The Pontiff must have thought he was on the field of Armageddon (Megiddo) a day ahead of time.

Pilgrimages to the Holy Land have, by tradition and throughout history, been hazardous. Each age provides new types of hazards, like today's jet planes, automobiles and over-friendly mobs. There was a global sigh of relief when Pope Paul was safely back in his Vatican apartments.

## FROM FRIDAY TO FRIDAY An Orthodox Rabbi Looks At The Bible

A question often asked of every speaker on a Jewish subject is about the difference between the three so-called "denominations" in Jewish religious life. Orthodox, Conservative and Reform.

Oh, they know the obvious difference. No organ music and no sitting together of male and female worshippers in Orthodox Shulen. English in the prayer books and late Friday night services at the Conservative Temples. Very short service and very little Hebrew in the Reform prayers, and observing only one day of Rosh Hashonah. They know all this. But they want to know deeper differences between them. Where do they agree and where do they differ?

Well, I came upon a problem that points out more than anything else the wall that stands between the Orthodox and the Jews of other convictions.

The story of the new translation of Torah.

A few weeks ago I wrote about the new translation published by the Jewish Publication Society of America, and the work of Rabbi Saul Leeman, of the Cranston Jewish Center, on that translation. I also said that the New Translation is presented as the most accurate, more readable text, and is supposed to be in greater conformity with our present-day knowledge of the Hebrew language and the Land of Israel, as well as familiarity with other sources bearing on the Bible and the days of the Bible.

Now comes an Orthodox Rabbi and says:

"No. The New Translation is full of misinterpretations and is an abomination to the Orthodox Jews."

The Rabbi is Hershel Solnica of Congregation Shaare Zedek, and he speaks for the Orthodox opinion in America.

Rabbi Hershel Solnica is a graduate of City College of New York and the Lakewood Yeshiva. He was ordained to the Rabbinate by the famous Rabbi Moses Feinstein. He came to Providence and assumed the leadership of Shaare Zedek where he has distinguished himself as a teacher and a spiritual leader.

Rabbi Solnica points out many "flagrant Alikoreses," as he calls them, in the translation. I shall not go into details because the examples cited by Rabbi Solnica are too involved and are of interest to scholars only.

What interests us is the following statements by Rabbi Solnica to support his opposition to the heresies of the translators of the Torah:

"Rabbi J. B. Solowitchyk denounced the new translation as did the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, the Rabbinical Council of America and the Rabbinical Alliance of America.

"Dr. Belkin (of the Yeshiva University) after re-evaluating the new translation withdrew his name from any association with such a false and heretic misrepresentation of the Holy Bible.

"Finally, of the committee who sat and wrote this translation, close to 80% of them have not kept one observant Sabbath in their lives. Some of them are not discriminating as to what they eat and where they eat. It seems odd that a non-Sabbath observer could and should interpret the laws of Shabbos."

And Rabbi Solnica concludes: "The New Translation is entirely unacceptable." And here is the difference between the Orthodox and his fellow Jews in America.

The Jews of America will ask themselves these questions concerning the New Translation of the Torah:

1. Are the translators competent?
  2. Is the translation accurate?
  3. Will I, living in the twentieth century, benefit by the translation?
- The Orthodox Jew inquires into the kind of men who were sitting on that committee? Are they observant Jews? Where and what do they eat? Do they pray three times a day and where do they go to Shul?

There are, to be sure, many among the Conservative and the Reform Rabbis who do not sing the praises of the New Translation of the Torah. Each one has a reason of his own. But not so the Orthodox Rabbis. They are unanimous in their condemnation of the translation, and for definite reasons, the reasons given by Rabbi Hershel Solnica.

And therein lies the difference, one of the differences, between the Orthodox and the other Jews. It is much more subtle and fundamental than the arrangements of the seats in the Synagogue or the amount of Hebrew in the Prayer Book.

The Orthodox will always examine the man and his motives, no matter what his work may be. To the Orthodox a man whose life is a repudiation of his work is not fit to do the work of God.

## YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

CLIP AND SAVE ON TAXES  
 Your 1963 Return  
 (In collaboration with the Research Institute of America)

As you fill out your 1963 tax return, pay no attention to the massive tax reduction bill on which Congress is working right now. When this bill becomes law, it will apply, with rare exceptions, to 1964 and later, but NOT to 1963.

Even though we're now into 1964, you're preparing your 1963 tax return and that return is controlled by the law as it was in 1963, not as it will be in 1964. The tax changes to be voted this year will affect your 1964 return — and that return you won't file until 1965.

But while you shut out of your mind all you have been reading about lower tax rates and other tax changes to apply to 1964 and on, you must not ignore signifi-

cant developments in 1963 which will affect the income and deductions you show on your 1963 return. I'll report the most important 1963 decisions, cases and Treasury rulings which will help you fill out your 1963 return properly and hold your tax to the legal minimum.

As far as the 1963 return itself is concerned, it has little difference in content from the 1962 return — except for some major changes for businessmen to be explained in a later column.

For the vast majority of us, the most interesting difference will be not on the return itself but rather in the flood of information statements we will receive from banks, savings organizations, corporations, etc., which paid us interest or dividends of \$10 or more in 1963.

### What Is A 'Bris'?

A very disturbing and destructive tendency has arisen in the Jewish community of Providence through ignorance.

We regret that many young parents have permitted their sons to be circumcised by a physician, usually before the child is eight days old. Such children may have the circumcision, but they have not had a "bris." The word "bris" means "covenant." It is the "covenant" which makes the child a

Jew. A "bris" is not simply a surgical operation; it is far more. It is a means of bringing the child into the Jewish fold. The "bris" is performed by a Mohel, certified by the religious community. This man is also highly skilled.

Parents who deprive their children of a "bris" are robbing them of their heritage and creating a great doubt for the future, as to whether, in terms of Jewish law, their children may be regarded as members of the Jewish faith.

We urge parents to adopt this religious standard. When in doubt please consult your Rabbi.

As we have discussed before we know that in families the parents must guide their children and so adults should also help young people in thinking and acting about good community living.

lems and to understand what needs to be done. Children tend to take on the strengths of their parents.

Helping children and young people understand the problems of community living removes the mysteries and uncertainties and gives them confidence to think clearly. In addition if parents and community leaders will provide young people with something definite to do, such as discussion groups, classes, or general meetings, these young persons will have a purposeful activity that adds to their understanding and gives them assurance that they too are facing up to hard facts. Doing this with adults wherever possible enables them to feel they are sharing a grown-up process and adds to their maturity.

A next step could then be to help the young people with the knowledge that the trouble is not necessarily frequent or may not last if these various activities are utilized to meet the difficulties being faced.

Any one or a combination of these actions may be required to help young people to meet a specific communal emotional emergency. However this is a long time process and overcoming these troubles takes time. A young person's world where he is loved and protected from undue strains, yet given freedom to adventure and to expand his powers as fast as he is able. He should know of the hardships of life but also what is to be gained even more from joys, beauty, courage and devotion.

your 1963 return as you do with one copy of the W-2 wage statement from your employer. The dividend and interest statements are strictly for your information — to tell you the specific amounts the banks, corporations, brokerage houses, etc., reported to the Treasury that they paid you.

I'm positive there will be many discrepancies between these statements and the amount your records show you received. If you find a discrepancy, be ready to prove, if necessary, with your own deposit slips and other records what you claim to be the correct amounts of your dividends and interest.

You are, however, not entitled to deduct the average figures just because they are averages. You can deduct only what you actually spent for these expenses.

The Treasury generally is willing to accept your state sales tax deduction without further proof if your deduction is no larger than the estimate on its own official list of estimated sales tax deductions (this list will be in a later column). It views the above averages differently — but they obviously are important guides for you.

**TAX BREAKS FOR EMPLOYEES**  
 Employees received important tax breaks through little known Treasury rulings and court decisions last year. Be sure you don't overlook any of these more liberal deductions on your 1963 income tax return.

(1) The hundreds of thousands of us who travel away from home on business can now deduct for the first time the reasonable costs of our personal laundry, cleaning and pressing expenses during our trips. For the first year too, the Treasury will allow you to deduct the cab fares from your hotel or motel to your customers while on your business trips.

(2) The Treasury also has agreed to allow a deduction for car commuting expenses in certain situations — although as a general rule commuting expenses continue not deductible. A deduction is now permitted when you use a car to carry heavy or bulky tools and would not otherwise use the car. For instance, a musician who uses his car to transport bulky musical instruments and who otherwise would not have used his car, can deduct his car commuting expenses.

(3) Here's good news for you if you are asked to travel to a job interview away from home and are reimbursed for your travel expenses by your prospective employer. The Treasury in 1963 said that the reimbursement paid to a job applicant for travel to and from the interview and for living expenses at the place of interview is not taxable income to the applicant — whether or not he gets the job. Of course, if you're paid more than your actual expenses, you owe tax on the excess.

Offsetting these liberal changes was the Treasury's announcement that it will continue to bar deductions for meals on one-day business trips despite a Circuit Court of Appeals decision which allowed this deduction. The Treasury insists that a business traveler must be away from home at least overnight (or its equivalent) to get a deduction for the cost of meals on the trip. As an illustration, suppose you're a New York businessman and you go to Washington for a business conference, stay overnight and take the first plane home the next day — you can deduct all your travel, lodging and meal costs under the Treasury rule because you were away from home overnight. But if you flew to Washington, had your business conference and flew back the same

To give you a key tax guide at the start, here is a list of the average deductions taken by persons in different tax brackets for contributions, interest, taxes and medical expenses.

If you are claiming deductions well above the averages, the chances that your return will be examined and questioned will be increased simply by the fact that you stand out.

If you are claiming deductions well below the averages, presumably you are spending less than other taxpayers in your bracket. Or perhaps you are overlooking some deductions which this series will help you remember.

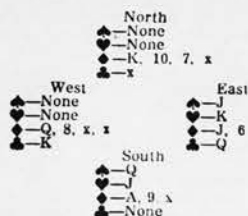

## Bridge

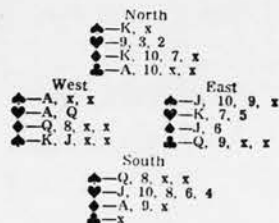
To me rubber bridge is a kind of release. I feel free and enjoy the fact that it is only money I am playing for. When you play in an important competition, you are responsible to your partner or team mates and you are bound to feel hemmed in. I often have to restrain an urge to make a wild bid. But when I am playing, I can take liberties; that is part of the pleasure. I can disregard all the restrictions imposed by team discipline. Very few partners object and many of them do not notice what has happened. Here is a success story:

clubs, and a small spade ruff in dummy. West had made the ace of spades and two trump tricks and was on lead facing this position:



If West now led a club I would make my last trump, two diamond tricks and the queen of spades; in fact, East would have to trump my losing diamond with the top trump at trick 13. The same would happen if West led a diamond.

The main point of this hand was not to cash the queen of spades earlier, because West could have discarded a club on the small spade which I had to ruff in dummy. I had to make all the club



With both sides vulnerable and 60 to East-West the bidding went:  
West North East South  
INT Pass Pass 2H(f)  
Pass Pass 2S Pass  
Pass 3H(f) Double Pass  
Pass Pass

Whether East bid 2NT or 2S mattered only because of the opening lead, and even the opening lead was not all that important so long as I could prevent East from taking a trick, for East's natural return would have been a trump. West, in fact, led the ace of spades and continued with a spade, taken by the king in dummy. I counted five top losers — three trump tricks, the ace of spades, and one diamond. So I tried to find a way to make my nine tricks before opponents could come to their five. I played the ace of clubs and ruffed a club into my own hand, entered dummy by trumping a small spade and came back with another club ruff. I then played a small trump and West cashed the queen and ace of trumps. I had by then made two ruffs in my own hand and the king of spades, the ace of

# In Hollywood . . .

Like soldiers standing stiffly at attention, a pair of Jack Daniels fifthly silently wait on the Coconut Grove reserved table. Overtime shooting at Warner Bros. for "Robin and the 7 Hoods" has delayed Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin. The group arrives just as Sam Donahue's down beat for the new "Tommy Dorsey Orchestra" opens the show. They file in: Frank, Dean, May Britt (Mrs. Sammy Davis, Jr.) and Dean's wife, Phil Harris joins them.

Two tables separated, Nancy Sinatra sits with the Prince Romanoffs. Friendly, but apart Nancy and Frank are here to celebrate the local singing debut of their 19-year-old, Frank Sinatra, Jr.

Martin and Sinatra soon will be seen in Warner's "4 for Texas." It's their first film together since "Ocean's 11." Currently, they're winding up "Robin and the 7 Hoods." Someone with a penchant for numbered titles finds them more fun than alphabet soup.

Audience members strain their necks to catch a glimpse of Sinatra. Many fail to recognize him. He's wearing horn-rimmed glasses. Junior starts to sing. Dear old dad beams like any proud parent in Slippery Rock or Broken Bow. Two tables away, Nancy smiles. Parenthood in separate goldfish bowls.

A white-haired, bespectacled, bent little lady hobbles past on a cane. Sinatra grabs Phil Harris' arm. "That's Tommy Dorsey's mother. She's 89," Harris: "Ain't that somethin'?" Sinatra: I'd give eight million dollars to see Tommy

walk out on that stage." Harris: "What I'd give to see both Tommy and Jimmy."

The show ends. Harris climbs onstage for an epilogue, southern fry style. He relates how he used to be a compulsive candy eater until he first tasted bourbon. "My friends," he says with convention, "whisky saved my life."

Sinatra roars and beats the empty seat alongside with the flat of his hand. When he laughs, he augments. His buddy Sammy

Davis, Jr., has the same habit. He accompanies his laughter with toe-and-heel rolls.

Harris introduces Mrs. Dorsey. She stands in the spotlight. "When I came in, I saw my boys' names," she says in a firm voice. Then she sobs, "My poor boys." Handkerchiefs suddenly appear all over the Grove.

Harris continues, "Seeing Sinatra, Jr., up here reminds me of the day I first met his dad in Hoboken, N. J. He was standing on the corner eating pizza made out of mahtzoh. Even then he was playing both ends. I think he was a lookout for a floating crap game.

"I know how to raise kid singers," Harris boasts. "Put me in a room with young Sinatra, a case of Jack Daniels and three broads, and if he comes out uttering a sound, he's a singer. Even if he yells 'Taxi!' he has it made.

(Continued from Page 8) day, the Treasury would bar you from deducting any meal costs on your trip because you weren't away from home overnight.

If you're an employee whose employer requires you to change job locations, you got a valuable help from the Tax Court last year. The Treasury's view is that an employee who lays out his own money for the moving expenses because his employer requires the move and then is reimbursed by his employer need not pay any tax on the repayment.

But what if you're not reimbursed at all, or only partly, by your employer? Can you deduct your out-of-pocket expenses? The Treasury says no, but the Tax Court held that the Treasury is wrong because its rule discriminates between the employee who is repaid and the one who is not reimbursed and they both should be treated equally for tax purposes. Equal tax treatment would let you,

the employee, deduct the unreimbursed part of your moving expenses. The Treasury, though, hasn't yet agreed that the Tax Court is correct; so if you deduct the unreimbursed moving expense on your 1963 tax return, the Treasury may disallow it.

Not all the court news was good for employees on the move. A common problem faced by many employees who are shifted to new job locations is that they are forced to sell their old homes at a loss. Employers often will reimburse a transferred employee for loss on sale of his home as well as for moving expenses.

While the employee need not pay tax on the reimbursement he receives for his moving expenses, the courts in 1963 agreed with the Treasury that he owes a tax on the reimbursement he gets from his employer to make up the loss on sale of his house.

**Assistant Testifies Unaware Of Use Of Gas At Auschwitz Camp**

**BONN** — A former assistant to the commander of the Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland testified last week that he was unaware that the Nazis used gas chambers to kill people.

"I had no idea that Auschwitz was an extermination camp; I never saw gas chambers," Robert Mulka, a former SS (Elite Guard) lieutenant told a Frankfurt Assize Court trying 22 former camp guards.

Mr. Mulka, 68 years old, who went into the export business after he was cleared during denazification proceedings, also denied he ever participated in selecting people to be gassed.

"That's a downright lie," the defendant told the court. Describing his duties as adjutant to the camp commander, the Hamburg

businessman said he looked after the guards' welfare and camp economy.

The gray-haired defendant, who is fee on bail, conceded that he has "suspected that terrible things" were happening
