Olympic Committee Moves to Weed All Policy Foes

Proposed Purge Will Exclude Unsympathetic Members

NEW YORK (WNS)—After accepting the resignations submitted by members opposed to American participation in the Berlin Olympic Games, the American Olympic Committee voted unanimously to take measures to weed out of the committee all those not wholeheartedly in accord with its policies and decisions. As a means of eliminating from the committee luke-warm supporters, the committee adopted a resolution introduced by its treasurer, Gustavus T. Kirby, asking all members not in sympathy with American participation in the Berlin Olympics to withdraw. This withdrawal is to be accomplished by a questionnaire to be sent to every member of the committee asking him to state his position unequivocally. Those manifesting even luke-warm support will be dropped.

The proposed purge of the Olympic Committee was raised when the members were informed by Avery Brundage, chairman, that "the anti-Olympic campaign has set us back six months" in raising the \$400,000 needed for financing the American Olympic team. Mr. Kirby declared that elimination of non-cooperative members was necessary and cited the case of William Kenney of Boston, chairman of the Olympic Boxing Committee, which is expected to raise \$100,000 despite the fact that its chairman is opposed to American participation in Germany. As the first step in weeding out the opposition, the committee accepted the resignations of Jeremiah T. Mahoney, secretary; A. U. president; Louis di Benedetto of New Orleans, secretary of the Southern A. A. U.; and Miss Charlotte Epslein, chairman of the women's swimming committee.

Roosevelt Confers With Freiberg on Infantile Paralysis

WASHINGTON, D. C. (WNS)—In response to a summons by President Roosevelt, Dr. Albert H. Freiberg, prominent Cincinnati Jewish physician and orthopedic surgeon of national reputation, was closeted with the President for half an hour in a private conference at the White House. They discussed the Warm Springs, Ga., foundation for the treatment of infantile paralysis. Dr. Freiberg is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

Noted Russian Refugee to Speak at Men's Club

Dr. George E. Leiken, Jewish historian and international lawyer will be principal speaker next Wednesday night when the Men's Club of Temple Beth-El holds its annual meeting.

Officers to be elected for the ensuing year are Dr. James C. Krasnoff, president; Bert L. Bernhardt, vice-president; Dr. Morris L. Biderman, treasurer; Abraham L. Avel, recording secretary; Perry Bernstein, financial secretary; and directors for two year terms, Manice Feinberg, Sol Feinberg, Irving L. Shein and Milton C. Tucker.

Dr. Leiken who will give the main address following the election of officers was born in Russia. At the age of 18 he was ordained an orthodox Jewish Rabbi. He then went to Germany and studied law at the Heidelberg University. Later he returned to Russia and was appointed Professor of Law in Kazan and had the unique distinction of being the only Jew in Russia to occupy such a position.

In 1916 he was appointed by the Government and elected by the people as chief Rabbi of Kazan, in the Volga District. He was then the representative of the Hoover Relief Commission. It was at this time that he appeared before the Czar on behalf of the Jewish people.

He is the author of many books on general jurisprudence and on Jewish philosophy and history. The most exciting one of his books is one dealing

Committees Are Chosen Local Appeal Goal is Set at \$10,000

Before 200 delegates from Rhode Island Jewish organizations Dr. Stephen S. Wise last Sunday struck the opening note in the United Palestine Appeal with a vigorous attack on Nazi policies and with a plea that Rhode Island give to Palestine, "for God knows," he said, "what Palestine may yet have to give to our children and our children's children."

Goal of \$10,000 Dr. Ilie Berger in his meeting that preceded Dr. Wise's talk, was elected campaign chairman. One of several resolutions placed the appeal's goal locally at \$10,000. Opening Sunday, January 12, with a showing at the Carlton Theatre of the motion picture, "Land of Promise," the campaign will go on until its objective is obtained. A second resolution called upon Dr. Wise to accept the national chairmanship for the campaign. Dr. Wise said

later in the evening that he is "thinking seriously" of accepting the chairmanship.

Dr. Wise told his audience of Rhode Island Jews that while they have been reading accounts of events in Germany and Central Europe, they do not, he thinks, "realize exactly what is happening in the Jewish world." (Continued on Page Six)

Picket New York Stores Handling German Goods

Mrs. Stephen Wise Heads Boycott Movement

New York (WNS)—Taking the offensive against violators of the anti-Nazi boycott, the American Jewish Congress and the Anti-Nazi Minute Men are planning to picket every store in New York that fails to heed the plea for cooperation with the boycott movement.

The picketing began when Mrs. Stephen S. Wise, president of the women's division of the American Jewish Congress, headed a group of six members of the Congress who paraded in front of the toy and novelty store of B. Shackmat at Madison avenue and 94th street. The pickets carried signs reading "Shackmat Buys From Hitler" and "Boycott Shackmat."

Mont Shackman, president of the firm, called the police to disperse the picketers but the police did not disturb the picket. (Continued on Page Two)

Arab Cigarettes Named After Jewish Leaders

Jerusalem (WNS)—Palcor Agency—All's fair in love or war—and business, too, it would appear. An Arab cigarette factory of Bethlehem has been produced (under the name of "A. Klemoff, Jerusalem" boxes of cigarettes named "Arlonoff" and "Herzl" in the hope of attracting Jewish clientele. Other brands put out include "Geulah," "Habimah," "Hatikvah," and "Adin." The names refer to historic figures and to purchase the tobacco because it is not clear whether Jewish laborers are employed at the factory. Efforts to ascertain the proportion of Arabs and Jews have hitherto been unsuccessful, owing to the refusal of the owners to allow entry into the works of representatives of the Council.

N. J. Authorities Avoid Test of Anti-Nazi Law

Plaintiff Reported Influenced by Outside Groups

ELIZABETH, N. J. (WNS)—Authorities of Union County and the township of Union have avoided a test of the constitutionality of the New Jersey anti-Nazi law by dropping the case against Wallace A. Vick, a member of the anti-Nazi religious sect, Jehovah's Witnesses, who was arrested on November 5th in Union on a charge of inciting, advocating and promoting "hatred and hostility" against Jews and Catholics, it was announced here by the American Civil Liberties Union.

L. E. Migatz, a drug clerk, who had brought the charges against Vick when the latter offered him some literature of the sect, withdrew his complaint, allegedly under pressure from some of the group responsible for the enactment of the law the Union said.

James McDonald Resigns as League Commissioner

Political Intervention With Germany Will Solve Refugee Problem

New York (WNS)—In a lengthy letter to the Secretary General of the League of Nations, announcing his resignation as League High Commissioner for German Refugees, James G. McDonald declared that the League and its member states must make efforts to remove or mitigate the causes which create German refugees because the refugee problem calls for political as well as philanthropic solution.

Asserting that "the growing sufferings of the persecuted minority in Germany and the menace of the growing exodus call for friendly but firm intercession with the German government, by all pacific means, on the part of the League of Nations and other members of the community of nations," Mr. McDonald warns that "only and reason alike must inspire the hope that intercession will meet with response" because "without such response the problems caused by the persecution of the Jews and the non-Aryans will not be solved by philanthropic action, but will continue to constitute a danger to international peace and a source of injury to the legitimate interests of other states."

Predicting that "desperate suffering in the countries adjacent to Germany, and an even more terrible human calamity within the German frontiers, are inevitable unless present tendencies in the Reich are checked or reversed," the retiring High Commissioner, who has directed the refugee work since October, 1935, declared that "the moral authority of the League of Nations and of states members of the League" (Continued from Page Two)

Hear Turkey Will Send Troops to Palestine to Aid England

GENEVA (WNS)—From well-informed sources here it is learned that during the recent conversations between Anthony Eden, new British Foreign Secretary, and Tewfik Ruzhdi Bey, Turkish foreign minister, the Turkish minister agreed to furnish two divisions of Turkish soldiers to Great Britain in the event of an Anglo-Italian war. One of these divisions would be sent to Egypt to help control the Suez Canal and the other would be dispatched to Palestine to reinforce the British garrison there.

New Decree Pauperizes Jews Leaving Germany

LIMIT EMIGRANTS TO 1000 MARKS WORTH OF GOODS

BERLIN (WNS)—Virtual pauperization of Jews planning to leave Germany was decreed by the Nazi regime when it forbade prospective emigrants from sending out more than 1,000 marks (\$400) worth of goods to be turned into cash abroad. This prohibition was part of the decree banning the importation into Germany of German banknotes. The object of this decree was to check the practice of foreign purchasers of German goods from paying for such goods in German banknotes smuggled abroad and acquired outside of Germany at a large discount.

The effect of this practice has been to deprive Germany of much-needed foreign exchange. The same decree, however, made a special dispensation for Jews emigrating to Italy by allowing them to take with them 30,000 marks in cash.

Kosher Noodle Supply Destroyed by Fire

NEW YORK (WNS)—American Jewry's supply of kosher noodles will be seriously impaired as the result of a spectacular fire which destroyed five stories in the six-story East Side noodle warehouse of Horowitz Brothers & Margareten, one of the leading matzoth manufacturers of the country. The company's matzoth supply was unaffected as the matzoth are stored in another warehouse. The fire which did damage estimated at \$100,000, ruined 50,000 pounds of noodles.

Community Center Will Hear Nicholas Roosevelt

Hebrew Training School St. Louis (WNS)—A Jewish teachers college for training Sunday school and Hebrew school teachers is to be opened here, with Hebrew and Hebrew literature courses for credit being given at Washington University.

Nicholas Roosevelt, diplomat, journalist and lecturer, who is making an extended tour, will appear at the Jewish Community Center next Sunday evening at 8:30 o'clock to speak on the subject "Ethiopian Woodpile."

Mr. Roosevelt, whose articles on America's international relations have been widely published in newspapers and magazines for the last fifteen years, was for years one of the editorial writers of the New York Times and is now on the staff of the New York Herald-Tribune.

To hear world problems discussed by leading men of his time was no new experience during the childhood days of Mr. Roosevelt. His father had the keenest interest in public affairs and it was natural for Mr. Roosevelt to choose a diplomatic career after he was graduated from Harvard.

Since that time Mr. Roosevelt has become increasingly prominent in international circles. In 1930 President Hoover appointed him Minister to Hungary and he returned again to the midst of the recent European turmoil. He watched from that close vantage point the emergence of Adolf Hitler upon the scene of world politics, he saw the beginnings of the present Austrian situation, and the foundations of the Austro-Italian treaty laid. There is, in short, no vital international question on which Mr. Roosevelt is not authoritatively informed and which he cannot competently discuss.

Palestine Rabbi Becomes Fire Insurance Chief

JERUSALEM (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A proof that rabbis may become good businessmen is given in the fact that Rabbi Meier Berlin, Mir-rachi (Orthodox Zionist) Organization leader, has just been elected to the presidency of the local fire insurance agents' committee.

This committee, which consists of Englishmen, Arabs and Jews, meets periodically and fixes the different tariffs and commissions for fire insurance. All agents are bound by these regulations. It is known as the Committee of Representatives of Fire Insurance Companies Operating in Palestine. Rabbi Berlin, who was given the presidency at the annual luncheon, represents the Palestine Lloyd Insurance Company, local underwriters.

British Empire Mourns Death of Lord Reading

Brilliant Barrister Dies at Age of 75 After Great Career

London (WNS)—The whole British Empire is mourning the death here of the Marquess of Reading, who was born as Rufus Daniel Isaacs in London 75 years ago, the son of a Jewish merchant, and who became the first man to be Viceroy of India, Lord Chief Justice and British ambassador to the United States. His death was not unexpected as he had been ill since last October when he suffered an attack of cardiac asthma. Shortly before Christmas he took sick again and his condition had given great concern.

Gifted with one of the most brilliant minds of his era, he ran away to sea as a boy, but returned to England when his parents agreed to let him study law. Before the turn of the century he had become one of the greatest barristers in England, commanding fabulous retainers. He made his political debut in 1904 when he was elected to the House of Commons as a Liberal from Reading. He was re-elected successively until 1913. When Lord Asquith became Prime Minister in 1910 Reading was given the post of attorney-general. In the same year he was knighted. A year later he was appointed Lord Chief Justice, a post he retained until 1921.

During the World War he was one of the most influential British diplomats although not a member of the government. Prime Minister Lloyd George sent him to the United States as special ambassador to raise a loan of \$500,000,000. It was at this time that he was raised to the peerage, taking the title Baron Reading of Leleigh.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

PLASTIC VALUATION

The subject discussed today is probably one of the most important to anyone who aspires to be a "letter than the average" bridge player, yet one that is too often overlooked as being inconsequential. Some players never get beyond that stage wherein they can visualize the powers of the combined hands other than by the process of adding Honor Tricks. We have seen many a hand fail to respond to an opening bid because of lack of the 1½HT or give insufficient raise to portray the actual power of the hand only because that player failed to learn his lesson on PLAYING TRICKS.

In the table of Honor Tricks mentioned in the first lesson, we deliberately omitted the qualifying word "defensive" in order not to confuse the beginner. Now, please bear in mind that we taught you a table of defensive honor tricks; i.e. tricks you can expect to take with your hand if YOUR OPPONENT'S partner obtains the contract. However, your Playing Trick value will be greater than your Honor Tricks. In other words, as the bidding progresses around the table, your hand fluctuates in value depending on the bidding; and on the one who finally gets the contract.

Should you get the contract at your suit, your hand is worth more playing tricks than if your partner gets it at a different suit, unless there is phenomenal distribution. Should your opponents get the contract then your hand, defensive, is usually worth about the value of your Honor Tricks. We shall, therefore, discuss playing tricks and ask you to bear in mind the changing values of your hand each time you or your partner bid.

An opening one bid usually denotes that the bidder expects to take at least five tricks with his contract, and his partner is normally expected to have about one-third of the balance, namely at least two playing tricks. Partner should therefore raise one for each playing trick over these expected two. You can see by that statement how important it is for one to know their playing trick values.

COUNT OF OPENING HAND

The opening bidder counts his playing tricks as follows:

1. All honor cards and solid suits at their full value. You may remember that we taught the AKQJ had only TWO HONOR TRICK value. This is correct if you now place the word "defensive" before the HT. Obviously AKQJ has, at your bid though only, FOUR PLAYING TRICKS. Certain combinations are then of greater value offensive than defensive due to their possibility of being ruffed after second round, when defending.

Now KQJ has defensively only 1½HT value, because, on the average the suit will go twice the first time and three another before being ruffed by declarer, thus giving you one trick the first time and two the next. But, offensively, you can always count KQJ two playing tricks. (We assume, of course, that the declarer usually knows when to draw opponent's trumps (we shall discuss that subject in detail later). To determine then the playing trick value of honors, merely

eliminate all higher cards than those held and you readily arrive at the playing trick value of honors.

1. Long card suits (both trump suits and side suits).

Length Value in In side suit or
of suit down suit partner's suit
4 cards 1 1 1
5 cards 2 2 2
6 cards 3 3 3
7 cards 4 4 4

Note suits must be headed by at least Jack, and suits bid by opponents do not count. The above table may be made easier to remember, if you read, by memorizing 4, 3, 2, 1 cards alongside 1, 2, 3, 4 (in arithmetic progression) and in side suits 1, 2, 3, 4 (a geometric progression) or does that confuse all the more?

3. That is all that opening bidder has to count in his own suit. Please, on our banded necks, we implore you, NEVER, NEVER, NEVER count short suits as ruffing tricks in your hand when you are valuing it at the suit you mentioned. A common error among thousands (we've counted them) of bridge players is to think that short suits (doubletons, singletons or voids), are signs of strength. NO, SIR! IT AIN'T SO! A short suit is only strength when your partner secures the bid at another suit so that he can take advantage of your shortness for ruffing purposes. Please remember this.

IN SUPPORT OF PARTNER'S BID

The value of your hand to your partner is determined as follows:

1. Honors and solid suits at face value as above. Also you can count as one winner, either the Ace, King, or QJ of your partner's suit.

2. Long cards in partner's trump suit and side suits as per above table, except that long side suits in your hand have no value when partner has bid two suits.

3. Ruffing tricks. Count ruffing tricks only when partner is to play the hand. (Will you be sure to remember that forever and aye?) when you hold

3 trumps	more trumps	Size of suit
4 winners	2 winners	Doubleton
5	3	Singleton
6	4	Void

Of two short suits, count only the shorter. The above tables may again be memorized as geometric and arithmetic progressions.

SUMMARY

The playing trick value of your hand is then the sum of (1) honor, (2) long suits, and (3) ruffing tricks.

must be directed towards a determined appeal to the German government in the same "of humanity and of the principles of the public law of Europe. They must ask for a modification of policies which constitute a source of unrest and perplexity in the world, a challenge to the conscience of mankind, and a means to the legitimate interests of the states affected by the immigration of German refugees."

Political Intervention Necessary

Emphasizing that "when domestic policies threaten the demoralization and exile of hundreds of thousands of human beings, consideration of diplomatic correctness must yield to those of common humanity," Mr. McDonald pointed out that "the problem must be tackled at its source if disaster is to be avoided," since the efforts of the private organization and of any League organization for refugees can only mitigate a problem of growing gravity and complexity.

Urging the League to make the Refugee Commission a part of its organization, working directly under it, rather than as a separate unit as it has been during the past year, Mr. McDonald said that "this is a function of the League, which is essentially an association of states for the consideration of matters of common concern. The Covenant empowers the Council and the Assembly to deal with refugee matters within the scope of activity of the League or affecting the peace of the world.

The effort of the League to ensure respect for human personality, when not grounded on express provisions of the Covenant or international treaties, has a sure foundation in the fact that the protection of the individual from racial and religious intolerance is a vital condition of international peace and security."

by Lenin to get the Soviet Constitution into legal order. He is an opponent of Communism and as such has had to undergo many sufferings. He was arrested on several occasions and sentenced to die, but only by a miracle was he saved.

He was lent by the Russian government to the Lithuanian government to draft its Constitution, and was to return to Russia. He fled, however, and has been wandering ever since.

Dr. Leiken is an excellent speaker, colorful and picturesque. In spite of his sufferings he still retains a splendid sense of humor. He speaks 10 languages, including English. Since his sojourn in America Dr. Leiken has addressed and was enthusiastically received by distinguished audiences. As Prof. Nathan Isaacs said of him, "His talk is rich in classic Latin and Hebrew illustrations, and his experience in Russia under the Czar, under Kerensky and under the Bolsheviks, form an unique episode in modern Jewish history."

Germany to Blame for Bolshevism, Says Cyrus Adler

Kaiser's War Measures Forced Revolution

NEW YORK (WNS)—Germany itself is responsible for Bolshevism, Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee, declared in a copyrighted interview with the United Press, in which he replied to Hitler's charge in a recent United Press interview that the Nazi regime's anti-Jewish laws were designed to protect Germany and the world from Communism.

Pointing out that Hitler was attempting to justify his anti-Jewish program as a defense measure against Communism only because science has blasted the racial theory, which was the previous excuse, Dr. Adler said that "Hitler is quite old enough to remember, if he wishes, that it was Germany which made possible the Bolshevik revolution in Russia."

"The Kerensky revolution had declared itself on the side of the Allies and proposed to continue to fight on their side. But it was the Germany of the Kaiser, of Von Hindenburg, of Ludendorff and the other great generals of Germany's army, that Hitler is now trying to restore, which actually brought about the Bolshevik revolution. The object was to break down the Eastern Front so that Germany's strength could be concentrated on the Western front, against the armies of France, of England and of the United States."

Jews Flee from Saar; Fear Anti-Semitic Laws

SAARBRUECKEN (WNS)—Anticipating the extension of all anti-Semitic legislation now in effect in Germany to the Saar district on March 1st, when Germany's pledge of full guarantees against persecution or reprisals for one year after the 1935 plebiscite expires, the Jews still living in the Saar are already beginning to leave. Because they are free to take out their money, Jewish residents of the Saar are rapidly liquidating their interests here. All of the large Jewish business establishments have already changed hands.

PRAGUE (WNS)—Many Jewish families from the Saar district are arriving in Czechoslovakia in order to save themselves from Nazi wrath when the anti-Jewish laws are applied to the Saar in March.

Welfare Society to Elect Officers

The annual meeting of Jewish Family Welfare Society, to be held next Monday evening at 8:00 o'clock at the Carpenter Memorial Building of the Providence Community Fund, 100 Brown Main street, will be marked by a graphic presentation, in non-technical terms, of the real situation as it has affected approximately 200 Jewish families in greater or less need since 1935, as well as an interesting address by the annual speaker.

The nominating committee has nominated Arthur J. Levy as president of the Society for the eighth year and has also placed in nomination the following additional officers: Mrs. Moses Einstein, first vice-president; Alter Boyman, second vice-president; Dr. Joseph Smith, secretary; Abraham Gluckman, treasurer; Jacob S. Temkin, counsel.

Directors for three years: Charles C. Brown, Mrs. Max A. Cohen, Morris Feinberg, Mrs. Milton Fuld, Mrs. Harry Gray, Dr. Louis I. Kramer, and Samuel H. Workman.

The annual address will be delivered by Joseph Hagan, Chief of the Division of Probation and Criminal Statistics of the State Department of Public Welfare. His subject will be "Crime and the Family Fireside." Mr. Hagan, prior to holding his present office, was Chief United States Probation Officer in the Rhode Island district for five years. He is a graduate of Georgetown University School of Law and has carried on further studies at Harvard and elsewhere.

Other reports to be given at the annual meeting will include those of Miss Jessie Jaskolowitz, Executive Director, and Mrs. Milton Fuld, chairman of the clothing center operated under the auspices of the Society in cooperation with the League of Jewish Women's Organizations.

Nazi is Arrested for Raid on Anti-Nazi Clubhouse

NEW YORK (WNS)—Violence by New York Nazis against their opponents was renewed in Yorkville, the hotbed of Nazi activity, when Gustav Bagi, 35 years old, was arrested in the Bronx as an aftermath to a raid by uniformed Nazi storm troopers on a meeting of the Anti-Nazi Workers Club, Inc., which is affiliated with the German American League for Culture, an organization of anti-Nazi Germans.

The complainants against Bagi were August Steubert and Herman Pries, members of the Workers Club, who charged that Bagi led them with a blackjack when he and 20 other uniformed Nazis were denied admittance to the Club's weekly dance. The Nazi invasion of the Club's headquarters in Yorkville created a free-for-all which almost degenerated into a riot. Eugene Griffl, vice-president of the League, declared that "these outrages must stop. Uniformed Nazis must be taught that they cannot use these tactics against peaceful German societies and United States citizens." Bagi was paroled in his own custody pending trial.

Ask Stiffer Punishment for Polish Anti-Semites

WARSAW (WNS)—A demand for more severe punishment for those convicted of anti-Semitic rioting is voiced by Gazeta Polska, semi-official organ of the Polish government. The paper declares that a few days' imprisonment is not enough for those who cripple Jews for life. This plea to the courts to deal more firmly with the anti-Semitic hooligans coincided with the organization of a movement among Christian intellectuals to combat the wave of anti-Jewish terrorism. Under the leadership of Madame Suikowski, wife of a professor at the University of Warsaw, the intellectuals are mobilizing their forces for a counter-campaign against the anti-Semitic agitation.

Although the government has reopened the universities in the belief that the worse phase of the riots is over, isolated anti-Semitic incidents were reported from Radom, Kielce, and Poznan. In Radom a three-year-old Christian child was badly wounded when a bullet intended for a Jew struck the youngster. Windows in Jewish stores and houses were smashed by hooligans and in Poznan Jews were assaulted in the university. Eight of the leaders of the illegal National Radicals have been arrested by the police.

Brown Lauds Services of Anglo-Jewish Press

Believes Fund-Raising Campaigns Owe Success to Cooperation of Jewish Press

NEW YORK (WNS)—Expressing the thanks of the ORT and of himself to the Anglo-Jewish and Yiddish press of America for its splendid cooperation with the \$500,000 American ORT campaign, David A. Brown, national chairman of the drive, thanks the Jewish publishers for presenting the ORT story to "the large number of Jewish families who receive their Yiddish or Anglo-Jewish papers" and declares that without this co-operation "we would not have been able to build up an understanding attitude on the part of American Jewry toward our organization." In an open letter to the publishers entitled "A Thousand Thanks to You, Anglo-Jewish and Yiddish Press," which appears on the front

page of the current issue of the "American ORT Journal," Mr. Brown says that "as one who has had much to do with fund-raising activities of many organizations, I have always realized the power and strength of the Jewish press and have never failed to extend to them their share of credit."

"I sometimes wonder, though," he says, "if the Jews in those cities that have an Anglo-Jewish newspaper appreciate their debt to it for the important part it plays in the American-Jewish scene. If one is interested in the Jewish news of the world, one must read the Jewish press, for it is well known that the secular press carries a minimum of Jewish News."

"Wonder Worker" of Ger to Settle in Palestine

Following of 100,000 Orthodox Polish Jews

JERUSALEM (WNS)—Palestine Agency—The Rabbi of Ger, known to Jews the world over as "the wonder working rabbi," and one of the outstanding rabbinical leaders of his age, having a following of more than 100,000 orthodox Jews in Poland and other countries, has applied to the Palestine Government for permission for himself and his eldest son to become permanent residents here.

The *Gerer Rebbe* arrived here from Poland on September 12th, for his fifth visit to Palestine, accompanied by his wife and three of his sons. Rabbi Arje Loeb ben Abraham Mordechai Alter (the full name of the Rabbi of Ger) is the outstanding Chassidic Rabbi in Poland, having inherited his leadership of this mystic religious group from his grandfather, Rabbi Isaac Meier ben Israel, one of the foremost Talmudic scholars of his time.

A varied program was presented at the second meeting of the Cultural Study Group of Hadassah which took place at the home of Mrs. Alfred Fain last Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Nathan Temkin reviewed the life and work of Theodore Herzl.

Sophie Braslau, Metropolitan Opera Star is Dead

Born of Russian-Jewish parents in New York, Miss Braslau, was one of the first American singers to be heard at the Metropolitan Opera House. She made her debut at the Metropolitan in 1913 when Gatti-Casazza engaged her for the role of Princess Feodor in "Boris Goudonov." Until 1920 she was one of the featured stars of the Metropolitan. In the last 15 years she has appeared on the concert platform throughout the United States and also in England, Holland and Scandinavia.

THE ANGLO-JEWISH PRESS

Although the Anglo-Jewish press continually furthers every constructive Jewish movement, it is a fact that it seldom receives credit for the part it plays in the American Jewish scene. More often it is criticised for its limitations, real or imagined, despite the fact that these limitations are imposed upon it by the handicap of insufficient support from the local Jewish communities served. It is therefore worthy of note that the current issue of the American ORT Journal, published a front page open letter from David A. Brown, chairman of the American ORT's \$500,000 campaign, thanking the Anglo-Jewish press for its cooperation with the ORT campaign, lauding "the power and strength of the Jewish press" and deploring the fact that Jews in cities that have an Anglo-Jewish paper do not always appreciate "their debt to it for the important part it plays in the American Jewish scene."

As a veteran in Jewish communal life Mr. Brown has touched a sore point in Jewish life. Too many Jewish communities take their Anglo-Jewish publications for granted, expecting service and cooperation without offering anything in return. All Jewish leaders ought to manifest the same appreciation of the value of the Anglo-Jewish press that Mr. Brown does, for the Anglo-Jewish press is unquestionably a key force in American Jewry. It is time its service was recognized.

A POLITICAL NECESSITY

Much has been written about the problem of the German refugees in the last three years but seldom has it been so succinctly and frankly analyzed as in James G. McDonald's letter of resignation as League of Nations High Commissioner for German Refugees. Putting his finger on the core of the question, Mr. McDonald points out that the League and its member states must make efforts to remove or mitigate the causes which create German refugees. He proposes firm League intervention with the German government not only in the interest of humanity but because the refugee problem represents a menace to world peace and a potential danger to the interests of other countries.

To those who say that diplomatic proprieties forbid international interference in the domestic concerns of another country, Mr. McDonald quite properly says that "when domestic policies threaten the demoralization and exile of hundreds of thousands of human beings, considerations of diplomatic correctness must yield to those of common humanity."

To those who maintain that the refugee problem calls for philanthropic action, Mr. McDonald realistically answers that it calls for political as well as philanthropic solution and that it is up to the League of Nations to provide the political solution by tackling the problem at its source—in Germany.

These are constructive suggestions from the man who for more than two years has been devoting himself exclusively to this problem. He knows all the difficulties involved. Yet he is confident that if the League and its member states direct their moral authority toward a pacific and "determined appeal to the German government in the name of humanity and of the principles of the public law of Europe" intercession may meet with a hopeful response. The least the League of Nations can do is to try Mr. McDonald's suggestion.

Anti-Semitism Not a Political Factor in America

New York (WNS)—Nowhere in the United States is anti-Semitism as yet strong enough to be a political factor, Fortune Magazine declares on the basis of replies received in various parts of the country to the question: "Do you believe that in the long run Germany will be better or worse off if it drives out the Jews?" Conceding that "there is certainly propaganda at work tugging it (anti-Semitism) wider," Fortune employed the indirect method to determine the extent of anti-Semitism because it felt that "the usual questionnaire putting the question indirectly showed that people are almost 100 percent reluctant to voice an out-and-out racial antagonism."

The results of its poll on the above question were as follows:

Commenting on these figures, Fortune concludes that "Obviously, in no part of the country is anti-Semitism as present strong enough to count politically. The smallest amount was to be found in the Southeast and the West, where there are very few Jews. On the other hand in the Northeast, where 70 percent of the American Jewish population is concentrated, the percentage opposed to the Jews was only 15.1, and was actually less than that in the Midwest. Most significant answer is the 'don't know' answer, for it probably can be made only out of a complete dispassion about the whole subject. It is interesting that this balance wheel of anti-fanaticism, one way or another, is nowhere less than a quarter of the entire sample, except on the Pacific Coast, and not significantly less even there, that it outvotes anti-Semitism by generally more than a two-to-one ratio in a five-to-one ratio in the West. By size of place and by occupation, differences were negligible, except that farm hands were far out of line—20.9 percent being anti-Jewish."

Jewish Couple Obtain Judgement Against German Shipping Line

New York (WNS)—A judgment for \$7,000, awarded to a New York Jewish couple, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Fenster, against the North German Lloyd shipping company, by Supreme Court Justice McCallahan was upheld here by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court. The lower court ruled in favor of the Fensters last March. The case, dating back to 1921, two years before the advent of Hitler, grew out of a trip the Fensters took to Germany on the S. S. Europa. Two days out of New York the ship's officers insulted the Jewish couple and accused them of passing bad checks. When the Europa reached Bremen the Fensters were re-examined and held in custody for several hours but were finally released. On their return to America they filed suit for damages.

Mrs. Einstein Recovering from Heart Ailment

New York (WNS)—Rapidly recovering from the heart ailment which put her in Montefiore Hospital, Mrs. Albert Einstein, wife of the scientist, has left her sick bed. Although still in the hospital, her condition is very much better and she is expected to be able to return to her home at Princeton in a few days.

BOOK NOTES

By Esther Levine

"Discovery." By Richard E. Byrd. (G. P. Putnam's Sons.)

"Geographical discovery is still, as it always was, the brightest weapon in the explorer's armory; but in the new philosophy of exploration it is principally a tool for getting at something deeper. It attains the dignity of a science only when, rising above the superficial glory of a first penetration, it brings the apparatus of science to bear upon the 'unknown' for a truer understanding of problems."

When Admiral Byrd came back after his first trip to Little America he knew that sometime he must return. There were too many loose threads dangling. There was more work to be done. His expeditions have always seemed an answer to all the beside pessimists who shake their heads mournfully and say, "There is nothing left to discover." The second Byrd Antarctic expedition investigated 22 divisions and subdivisions of scientific research.

The problems facing any expedition are many. Chiefly, of course is the problem of raising money. The depression did not cause a flow of funds toward the Admiral and his assistants. They proved themselves prolific beggars and horrorers. Living, as most of the men who accompany him and supplies are easily obtainable, it is staggering to imagine that when these men arrived at their destination they would be "either prepared or sorry."

Not many people have realized Admiral Byrd's burdens. He took upon himself the responsibility and the debt of the expedition. Failure, whether his fault or ill fortune, meant bankruptcy or loss of reputation. Yet he has persisted, compelled by a strong love of adventure. He insists that he has never looked upon his doings as a "sacrifice for science."

"Discovery" is a fascinating book, whether it describes the painful details of unloading the ships upon an icy shore which had an alarming tendency to break loose without warning (it is not much fun to become part of an iceberg) or the rising of the sun after a six month stay.

Fifty-six men, all classes, types, training and dispositions living a nec-

essarily closely bound existence and forced into intimate contacts. True, compared with previous expeditions they lived in luxury but they had to face the same blizzards and frosts and winds as their predecessors. It may be easier to ride in a tractor than to run beside a dog team but the danger of going through crevices robs the experience of any real relaxation.

When Admiral Byrd went off to the weather base to study meteorological conditions he left certain instructions to the men which are illuminating. Besides the appointment of officers and a general review of plans and cautions about food conservation and fire hazards, he says:

"Every man in this camp has an equal right to be treated fairly and squarely and the officers are requested to hold this fact in mind." Undoubtedly, this attitude is responsible for Byrd's success.

One of the men sums up the general feeling of the group. "The memories that emerge now are how painfully long was how lonely were the hours when the moon bathed the earth with a light that must have ushered in the Dawn of Creation, how much you craved the sun and green vegetables, how stupid some of us were and how steadily fine were others, and how hardy the officers were."

"Discovery" leaves one with a sense of pride that man can dream and make a plan and endure innumerable hardships to complete that plan.

READING SUGGESTIONS

"They shall inherit the earth." By Mervyn Cullaghan. (Random House.) An absorbing story of a father and son who have been separated from each other. Reviewed last week.

"Illyrian spring." By Amy Bridge. (Little, Brown & Co.) Lady Kilinchel, a successful artist, runs away from her family to escape the important background into which they are forcing her. During her stay at Dalmatia she comes to a better understanding of herself and her difficulty. Perhaps there is too much emphasis on the architecture and archeology of the country but the story is well told and interesting even if you skip those passages.

IGOR GORIN, A SUCCESS

Six or seven years ago, Rabbi Jacob Sonderling, then Rabbi of Temple Beth-Israel, on his return in September from a few weeks stay in Europe announced to his congregation that he was bringing to this country for the high holidays a young Viennese Jew whom he had heard sing in Vienna and who would officiate as cantor at Beth-Israel.

The young man, Igor Gorin, then about twenty-one years of age, sang before the Niagara Street congregation for the Holy Days and to show its appreciation, the members of the congregation tendered him a testimonial concert at the Plantations Club in which he took the leading part as soloist. This concert attracted hundreds of the music critic of the Providence Journal in his column the next day predicted a glorious future for the young man.

Enriched in purse, Gorin returned to Vienna and continued his musical studies under the well known teacher, Professor Fuchs, and returned to this country for the Holy Days for the following few years spending probably five months of every year here. The young man was confident of his ability and his American concert debut was made at Jordan Hall in Boston under his own auspices. I remember very well this cold evening in the winter months when a score of us from Providence braved the elements and journeyed to the Massachusetts city.

Poor Audience

I regret to say that the concert was discouraging to all of us—Igor was nervous and as Boston music lovers do not patronize concerts by unknown artists, less than a hundred tickets were sold—but this did not deter our European friend and he journeyed to New York where after a period of much discouragement he finally received an audition by a New York concert manager which gave him an opportunity to become a member of the organization of the Radio City Music Hall then under the direction of the well known Roxy of radio fame.

After a year or two singing on Sunday mornings before radio audiences he travelled for a time with several secondary operatic troupes, meantime studying in the off season with well known operatic coaches . . . this past year he has finally come into his own when Dick Powell, well known movie star, announced one day that he would present his latest discovery on his "Hollywood Hotel" radio program which is heard over the Columbia Broadcasting System on Friday nights

and which is broadcast for local audiences over WEAN.

Creates Sensation

The young baritone immediately created a sensation and was signed to a long term contract and on Monday night a week ago Grace Moore, opera and movie star, invited him to appear with her on her broadcast as guest star . . . critics on Metropolitan newspapers are hailing him now as one of the great discoveries of the year and this is not all . . . possessed of a handsome appearance, movie scouts invited the young man to take a screen test and he photographed so well that Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer has signed him to a contract and he will soon star in a movie production to be released shortly.

I thought this narrative would be of interest to Providence people because it was here that Igor Gorin started on what surely seems to be a glorious career and the end is not in sight because after the radio and movies, there will be opera and friends of mine in the movie capital of Hollywood write me that he shows the possibilities of a Tibbett, Nelson Eddy and others . . . this true story surely bears out that the United States is the land of opportunity for one who has the ability and the fortitude . . . seven years ago an unknown and today known and heard by millions . . . such is the present story of Igor Gorin and I know that all his friends in Providence have a deep personal interest in him and wish him all the best.

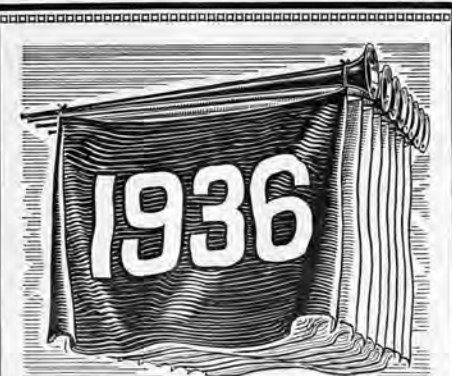

Roumanian Minister Says Gov't Will Crush Anti-Semites

Bar Association Votes to Oust All Jews

BUCHAREST (WNS)—The Roumanian government's determination to do everything in its power to suppress anti-Jewish riots and its dissatisfaction with the police, who have failed to end the riots, were expressed by Minister of the Interior Ingulescu at a conference of police chiefs from all parts of the country. Severely criticizing the police for their mild treatment of the rioters, Ingulescu warned that anti-Jewish rioters would receive no mercy from the government.

Ingulescu's attack on the police coincided with an unusual statement issued by Dr. Alexander Cuza and Octavian Goga, leaders of the anti-Semitic party, in which they repudiated the recent anti-Jewish incidents. They said such attacks were unnecessary because the party's anti-Jewish program could be carried out peacefully.

Statement Aims Fears
Ingulescu's statement has somewhat allayed the fears of the Jewish population, which feared that failure of the police to act rigorously with the series of anti-Jewish incidents during the past fortnight would lead to a nation-wide wave of anti-Semitic attacks. Already the Bucharest riots have had their effect in Jassy where nationalist students invaded the Jewish quarter and used force to break windows in Jewish stores. In Bucharest itself gangs of hoodlums are patrolling the main streets and molesting every pedestrian who cannot prove he is not a Jew. The situation here is so serious that Jews are afraid to show themselves in public. Theaters, restaurants, shops and cafes patronized by Jews are beginning to feel the effect of the absence of Jewish customers, who are remaining at home.

Meanwhile the Bar Association has decided on measures to oust all Jews from the legal profession within the next decade.

German Jews Not Aliens
Recalling that Jewish residence in Germany dates back more than 1000 years, Dr. Wise said:

"And what have we done there? Have we been peddlers, shoemakers, humble workmen who have contributed nothing to the life of Germany? I tell you, that with the passing out from Germany of Jewish intellectual leaders, the intellectual life of Germany is all but gone. Gone!"

"The universities are ceasing to be universities. And the 'Who's Who' of Germany is a sorry testimony to its intellectual debility."

In discussing the differences of position that the Jews occupied under the regime of the Czar and of Hitler, Dr. Wise said that in Czarist Russia the spasmodic programs were not favored by the intelligentsia; that even the soldiers who carried out ordered brutalities, once their own passions had subsided became penitent and tried their best to aid the stricken Jews.

Rabbi Rackovsky Speaks
Rabbi Isaiah Rackovsky, of Congregation Ahavati Shalom, Pawtucket, was the first speaker in behalf of the appeal. Joseph Smith, president of the Providence Zionist District, presented the speakers.

Jewish Colony Will be Ready in August

HIGHTSTOWN, N. J. (WNS)—Contrary to reports that the Jewish settlement colony at Hightstown has been abandoned by the Federal Resettlement Administration, John H. La Duke, resident engineer, who is directing the building of the project, announced that it would be ready by August 1, 1936, a month ahead of the original goal. Because of weather conditions work has been slowed up and the working staff out of 1,300 to 350, but construction will be speeded up after the first of the year. Foundations for 200 homes have already been laid, the sewer system has been installed and the construction of streets is nearing completion. Plans for building a garment factory where the colonists could supplement their earnings from agriculture have been abandoned, presumably because of opposition on the part of the needle trades unions. Homesteaders will get an acre of ground and pay \$500 down, the balance payable to the government in monthly installments.

The program consisted of the lighting of the Chanukah candles, recitations, and an operetta "Danny Bumps into Chanukah." The program was prepared by Nat Roy and Beatrice Gross.

"Captain Blood" and His Pirates at Majestic Today

Nazis Imprison Jewish Chemist; Seek Poison Gas Formula

LONDON (WNS)—Professor M. Wagner, a German chemist, who is half Jewish, now imprisoned for a Nazi cell fitted out a completely equipped laboratory in order to force him to complete his researches on Pulvergase, a powerful poison gas which can penetrate any gas mask, it was learned here from well-informed sources.

A native of Elberfeld, Professor Wagner was determined that his formula should not fall into the hands of the Nazis and he left his home secretly, bound for the Czech border. Just as he was about to cross the frontier he was captured.

When his identity was learned and the nature of his formula established, he was thrown into prison and tortured in order to extract from him a promise that he would complete his research and turn over his invaluable formula to the German authorities. The same source that disclosed Wagner's story revealed that the laboratory in which he is working was equipped with funds obtained through a credit with the Bank of England.
