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HITLER HAS BEE IN BONNET, SAYS SHAW

Hints Hitler May Have Jewish Blood

London (WNS)—Pillorying Hitler's anti-Semitism as "pathological, a craze, a complex, a bee in his bonnet, a hole in his armor, a hitch in his statesmanship, one of those lesions which sometimes prove fatal," George Bernard Shaw in the preface to a book of his new plays calls on the Nazi leader to abandon his anti-Semitism and hints that Hitler himself may be of Jewish blood.

"Herr Hitler is not a typical German," Shaw declares. "I should not be at all surprised if he were discovered that his very mixed blood (all our bloods today are hopelessly mixed) got fortified somewhere in the past by that of King David. He cannot get over the fact that the lost tribes of Israel expose us all to the suspicion (sometimes, as in Abyssinia, to the boast) that we are those lost tribes, or at least that we must have absorbed them. As it has no logical connection with Fascism or National Socialism and has no effect on them except to bring them into disrepute, I doubt whether it can survive its momentary usefulness as an excuse for plundering raids and coups d'etat against inconvenient liberals or Marxists."

MOSLEY ASSAULT ON JEWS RENEWED

Jeering Hecklers Drown Out Speakers

London (WNS)—Almost drowned out by thousands of jeering anti-Fascist hecklers, Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the anti-Semitic Fascist blackshirts renewed his political campaign with a speech at Albert Hall.

Placing himself on the side of conciliation with Germany, Sir Oswald, surrounded by uniformed guards, assailed Russia and France and decried Nazi Germany. A large portion of his frequently interrupted address was devoted to an attack on the Jews whom he accused of being "a force which dominates the press and the cinema, a force which commands the Red army and uses international Communism and international finance, a force which Fascism alone dares challenge."

Mosley's hecklers marched en masse to Albert Hall and although many of them were ejected by the blackshirts or prevented from entering by the police, enough of them reached the galleries to make Mosley aware of their presence.

Vienna Jewess Released from Prison by Nazi

Berlin (WNS)—After being held in prison for six months on a charge of being implicated in a mysterious treason case called "Schumann and Associates," Miss M. Faglicht, daughter of a Vienna rabbi, has been released and ordered deported as an undesirable alien. During her stay in Germany Miss Faglicht had worked as a Hebrew teacher in a Jewish center. None of the charges against her were proved.

Kills Jewin Pogrom; Pays Victim's Wife \$10,000

Warsaw—Stefan Kolczak, a Pole now residing in the United States, last week made retribution to a local Jewish family for his part in the slaying of the family's head during a pogrom in 1919.

Through a local attorney Kolczak paid \$10,000 to the victim's wife, Mrs. S. Meinfeld, and her four children.

After Meinfeld's death, Kolczak fled to the United States where he has since made his home.

Jewish Council Entertains on "Presidents Day"

"One million two hundred and twenty-nine thousand new people came on the unemployed list in the United States in January," Miss Alice W. Hunt told an audience which filled the vestry of Temple Beth-El last Thursday afternoon when the Providence Section, National Council of Jewish Women, observed its annual Presidents' Day. "This is the greatest increase in the past five years, so we are not out of the depression yet," Miss Hunt continued in her speech as News Commentator on local, national and foreign affairs.

"Business has dictated what we will do in this country for years," she continued, "and now again business men are interested in putting up a presidential candidate who will listen to what they have to say. The farm problem is still a problem." Miss Hunt asserted that one of the most enlightening things the Nye investigation in Washington had brought out was that

Understanding Will Cure Indifference, Says Bell

Joshua Bell, local attorney, in the following letter to the Jewish Herald, decides previous panaceas for Jewish indifference and outlines an educational policy which may, sometime in the future, produce the hoped-for conditions. In this, as well as on other debatable questions, the Herald invites correspondence.

"In the absence of knowledge, how can we expect a fine sense of discrimination?" Talud.

Editor Jewish Herald: "A good deal of printer's ink and even considerable venom has recently been poured over your columns in connection with the very few disappearing and some of our leaders over the ostensible indifference of our 'Croesuses' to the present plight of the Jewish people throughout the world, and especially to the rebuilding of our National Homeland, the only bright spot in the Jewish horizon."

"It is most unfortunate indeed that we must share the views expressed in your columns, for a careful observation of attitudes shown and excuses given during a campaign inevitably leads one to the sad conclusion that some of us have apparently become oblivious to their brethren's needs to such an extent, that in spite of the most terrible blows falling on our people's backs since the period of the infamous Crusades and the Middle Ages, they have turned a deaf ear and have refused to heed the call as long as they personally feel somewhat secure in the possession of their earthly goods. We can only differ from those who have registered their complaints in the methods prescribed by them for curing the existing evil.

ANNOUNCE MERGER OF ORT AND JDC

ORT's Fund Campaign to be Discontinued

New York (WNS)—A merger between the ORT and the Joint Distribution Committee has been arranged and the details and terms of the agreement will be made public shortly. It was learned on unimpeachable authority here by the Seven Arts Feature Syndicate.

Although neither the ORT nor the JDC have issued any statement on the merger, the Seven Arts has learned that the negotiations for the merger have been completed. It was also reported that a letter has been sent to all Jewish welfare funds and federations announcing that the ORT's \$500,000 campaign has been discontinued and that it will become part and parcel of the Joint Distribution Committee's \$3,500,000 campaign.

These facts confirm rumors current in the Anglo-Jewish press for the last few months. There is good reason to believe that when the merger is officially announced David A. Brown, for many years the number one man of the JDC's fund-raising machinery, will again be stamping the country in behalf of the JDC. Mr. Brown recently returned from a trip to Europe where he made a first hand survey of Jewish conditions in the countries he visited.

GIVE ONE MEAL ASKS JEWISH LABOR

Contributions Will Aid Fight on Fascism

New York (WNS)—April 23, the third anniversary of the suppression of the German trade unions, workers' cooperatives and other labor organizations by the Nazi regime, has been proclaimed by the National Jewish Labor Committee as a national day of hunger when Jewish workers throughout the country will be asked to contribute the price of one meal to a fund being raised to combat anti-Semitism and Fascism.

The celebration this year, as well as in other years, is the official opening of the campaign for the Jewish Workers' Institution in Palestine which are under the auspices of the Histadrut in Palestine.

A Passover Journal is published for that occasion.

Southern Co. Removes Swastika from Trucks

Memphis, Tenn. (WNS)—The swastika has been removed from the trucks and stationery of the Southern Express Company, K. O. Sample, general agent, informed the Memphis Hebrew Watchman. "We used the swastika long before the advent of Hitler," Mr. Sample said. "Of course, there was no connection whatsoever between our emblem and Hitler, but in order not to give offense to our Jewish friends, we have completely eliminated the swastika."

All of the companies' new trucks have been painted without the Nazi emblem and the old ones are being repainted so as to remove the swastika.

German Exports Continue Their Downward Trend

Berlin (WNS)—Continuing the downward trend manifested in January, German exports dropped off 8,000,000 marks during February, according to official statistics. The decline amounted to two per cent. In January the decline was 8 per cent.

St. Paul (WNS)—The distinguished service medal of the Cosmopolitan International for outstanding service has been awarded to Howard Kahn, editor of the St. Paul Daily News, by the St. Paul Club.

Slaughtering is Limited to Food Intended for Jews Only

Warsaw (WNS)—By a majority of only seven votes, the lower house of parliament approved the new kosher slaughtering regulations and sent it to the senate for final action.

As passed in the lower house the measure safeguards the practice of schechita but limits Jewish ritual slaughtering to such poultry and cattle as are intended for Jewish consumption. Kosher fowl and meat are to be sold in special stores to be set up for this purpose.

The law provides that schechita is legal in all towns where the Jews form more than three per cent of the total population. Elsewhere Jews may obtain permission to practice schechita upon presentation of petitions to the local authorities.

The lower house adopted the bill in its present form only after a bitter debate in which two amendments proposed by those who had drafted the original law which would have entirely outlawed schechita.

One amendment would have imposed a stiff tax on kosher meat and poultry and the other would have barred schechita in all towns and cities where the Jews numbered less than 15 per cent of the total population.

Approval of the bill in the senate is regarded as a foregone conclusion and it will become effective January 1, 1936.

Physician in Ireland Cures Childlessness

Dublin (WNS)—A report issued here by the Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland credits Dr. Bethel Solomon, prominent Jewish gynecologist, with the successful development of an operation which cures childlessness in women. Dr. Solomon's operative method is said to have enabled a number of women to bear healthy children. Dr. Solomon is a former president of the obstetrics section of the Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland and attached to the staff of the Rotunda Hospital.

Jewish Youth Aids Underground Movement

New York (WNS)—In response to the appeal of an important leader of the German Socialist movement who made his way secretly to the United States, the Young Circle League of the Workers' Circle has launched a campaign to raise a fund for the anti-Nazi underground movement in Germany. The funds to be raised by the Young Circle League among its membership, the trade unions and Jewish and progressive groups will be sent to the central organization of the underground body in Germany.

Tweaks Rabbi's Beard — Gets Broken Head

New York (WNS)—Joseph Hirsch's habit of tweaking the beard of Rabbi Abraham Green every time the rabbi passed Hirsch's pushcart on the East Side, had unexpected consequences for both venerable Jews. Tired of Hirsch's beard-tweaking, Rabbi Green hit him over the head with his cane. The blow fractured the skull of Hirsch, who is over 70, and caused the arrest of Rabbi Green on a charge of felonious assault. The two men have long been at odds over congregational affairs.

REBIDS BY OPENING HAND (Continued)

Continuing our discussion of rebids available to the one who has opened the bidding, let us today assume that the response by his partner was a double raise. That is, the responding hand raised the bid of one in a certain suit to three in the same suit. This double raise, as we previously explained in our column on responses, is FORCING TO GAME.

OPENING HAND REBIDS

1. The opening hand should bid four in the suit unless he wishes to try for a slam or unless he bids three no trump with requirements for such a bid. (see below). A try for a slam may not be made by using any of the conventions which will be explained under slam bidding except as briefly mentioned below.

2. Any bid in a new suit by the opening bidder is definitely a slam try. To do this the opening bidder should have at least four Honor Tricks or two strong two suiters.

3. Any raise beyond game may be given without honor trick requirements providing the distribution is freakish, but under such conditions, article 2 above should take care of such situations.

4. With balanced hand (4-4-3-2 or 4-3-3-3) and stoppers in at least two of the other unbid suits, you should bid three no trump holding less than 4 1/2 HT. Any bid of four or five no trump is construed now as the conventional slam try holding such requirements.

5. To try for a slam no jump is now necessary. Any bid of a new suit is an inferential force.

The above situations are then relatively simple. A double raise is forcing and neither partner can now drop the bidding until game is reached. It is up to the original bidder, upon receiving such a response, to indicate by his type of rebid the exact nature of his hand and to steer the bidding into the proper contract for game. THE HENDELS' ARE COMING!

Hadassah Launches Fourth Donors' Luncheon Campaign

Providence Chapter of Hadassah officially launched its fourth annual donors' luncheon campaign, with the appointment, at its board meeting on Thursday in the Biltmore Hotel, of Mrs. Saida Abrams, as general chairman. This will mark the second occasion that Mrs. Abrams is heading the project, having also directed last year's drive with great success.

Quota Increased According to announcements made, the local chapter's quotas have been considerably increased, in keeping with national Hadassah's policy to provide funds for their new undertakings—(1) the Youth Aliyah and (2) actual construction of the long planned Rothschild-Hadassah Hebrew University Hospital.

The Youth Aliyah settles German youth between the ages of 15 and 17 in Palestine. Prior to removing them from their native Germany, they are prepared by Hadassah for life in the new homeland. Then for two years, the young immigrants are maintained by their benefactors, while they train, with vocational guidance for either work on the soil or trades in the cities. All in all, the process of transplanting and maintaining these adolescents is a costly and lengthy one, and Hadassah's resources will be taxed to the limit, if it is to carry on, satisfactorily, the reclaiming of these young lives from the hopeless abyss into which Hitler has consigned them.

The Rothschild University Hospital, the medical center which is to crown Hadassah's work of health service for the past 24 years, seems well on the way toward realization. Dr. J. Leo of the Boston City Hospital for Joint Diseases, New York, returned just recently from Palestine, where he collaborated with the architect in planning the Jerusalem Medical Center. The latter will be built by Hadassah and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee, which is interested in adding a medical department to the Hebrew University. The new institution will be erected on a 25-acre plot on Mount Scopus, overlooking the City of Jerusalem. There will be three units of structures, each three stories high; a 200-bed hospital, a graduate medical school with complete laboratories, and a nurses' training school and residence, the latter to be known as the Henrietta Szold School of Nursing, as a tribute to the founder of Hadassah.

Luncheon Success Necessary Mrs. Abrams emphasizes to the membership, the particular need for making this year's luncheon venture a real success, in order that Providence may not lag behind other chapters in co-operating with national headquarters, in their new and tremendous responsibilities.

The luncheon is scheduled to take place at the Biltmore, on May 13.

During the regular business session, reports were given by Mrs. Louis Pomansky, who made an urgent plea to the crowded hall for additional donors to the Loyalty luncheon; by Mrs. David Kahanofsky on programs; and by Mrs. Maurice Fraeger on reservations.

have failed to contribute to the last United Palestine Appeal proportionately to their incomes, shall themselves become recipients of clarity. The addition of more papers in our midst will hardly be welcomed by any of us who cherish a genuine interest in the welfare of the Jewish people.

"In the second place, the method of "excommunication" proposed should most emphatically be discouraged; a member of our race and community who is so unfortunate as to lack genuine Jewish feeling and thinking cannot be nonchalantly removed

as a decayed tooth. Besides, history offers us abundant illustrations that the antiquated method of excommunication has never in the past brought the sinner to true and sincere repentance, unless he was judiciously shown his error, and has himself realized it.

Not on Pink Slips

"Not having had my name published among the high-salaried corporation officials, either on the eve of the campaign or afterwards, I can hardly be accused of seeking through these lines a motive for self-defense or of endeavoring to hold a brief for those who, apparently, are able yet have shown neither readiness nor willingness to do their full duty in the terrible hour of need.

"My chief and sole aim, in accordance with Spinoza's Golden Rule, is to neither condemn nor ridicule, but to understand. It is only when we earnestly try to comprehend and gauge the psychology of those individuals for whom it is most difficult to realize their full responsibility towards their less fortunate brethren, and who so miserably lack the glorious perspective involved in the rebuilding of the Jewish Homeland that we may be able to find the reason for their failure to open an attentive ear to the heart-piercing cry of their needy brethren.

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WHY THE SOFT-PEDALING

Jews are being killed in Poland. Pogroms of the same style and scope as in the darkest days of Czarist Russia were perpetrated in Przytyk and other towns. Visiting observers in Poland shudder at the systematic economic strangulation of Polish Jewry in progress ever since Poland was reestablished as an independent state. All this is undeniable and is based on uncontroversial data, facts and evidence from eye-witnesses. There is, however, a very strange aspect to this whole Polish-Jewish situation, and that is the absence of indignation against the Polish government.

The attitude of Jewish leaders throughout the world, including America, is that the Polish government is blameless to a great extent. Through the most astute diplomatic achievement the Polish non-Jewish intelligentsia and the Polish government officials have convinced the world that they are helpless to check physical violence against the Jews and that there is no remedy to cure the economic ills of Polish Jewry. There are too many Jews in Poland, cry these experts, and unless a substantial number emigrates every Jew will have to suffer.

Thus we are presented with the incredible picture of suave and polite conversation and fraternizing between Jewish leadership in this country and the representatives of the Polish government. To illustrate this point it might be mentioned that at a recent Jewish gathering called to discuss the terrible plight of East European Jewry, and especially Polish Jewry, the speakers were asked to soft pedal their descriptions of the Polish-Jewish disaster in order not to offend an official representative of the Polish government present at this affair.

These questions come to one's mind: why this tip-toeing? Why this underplaying of realities? Why this unaccountable fear of offending the Polish Government? Pogroms and economic strangulation can be stopped and checked by strong governmental measures. The Polish government cannot escape a large share of responsibility in the happenings against the Jewish population of Poland.

BOOK NOTES

Guest Reviewer

"Of Time and the River," by Thomas Clayton Wolfe. (Scribner's, 912 pp.)

Despite our mania for brevity, it is refreshing to wander along the kaleidoscope of scenes and experiences with Thomas Wolfe and to feel that we may stop to enjoy and fully appreciate the sensations evoked in us.

If we marvelled at the work of a young author in "Look Homeward, Angel," for Mr. Wolfe was only twenty-nine years old then, we cannot overlook the fact that he was merely thirty-five when this book was published. Thomas Wolfe was born in Asheville, N. C., on October 3, 1900. He holds an A. B. degree from the University of North Carolina and an A. M. degree from Harvard.

"Of Time and the River" is a species of imaginative autobiography. This "Legend of Man's Hunger in His Youth," to quote its subtitle, takes the hero, Eugene Gant, from the age of nineteen thru the age of twenty-nine years old. It comprises the later stage of his education, his first attempts at earning a living, and his struggle to find himself as an artist.

The scene or background of this narrative changes from North Carolina to the tragic realities and warped romance of New England, from New England to the aloofness of Oxford, from Oxford to the loneliness of an American's France, nevertheless it is a wholly American book and one of the most outstanding of our time.

Those who seek a well organized novel with a definite story or plot will be sadly disappointed—for no such coherence or unity can be found; only in so far as every moment of Eugene's life, for every one's life is arguably important. He cries in anguish, "Nothing is trivial. What you said and did to-day, the glass you gave a stranger, your purchase of an evening paper...your brief momentary thought of your grandfathers and of the kind of man he was, that sought glimpse of two lovers quarreling—all that is important, all that is gone, it is a part of time, it will never happen again."

We follow Eugene thru his years at Harvard, and then thru a period of indecision which is psychologically the finest part of the novel. His aspiration as a playwright are thwarted when, after weeks of waiting, he is informed that his play is rejected. As a last resort he turns to teaching. Anyone who has ever faced a classroom will more than enjoy reading of Eugene's experiences. No college professor could describe with greater devastating honesty his daily quaking before classes, his exasperation with their levities, his dread of the merciless student critic, who waited for him after every class period, "behind an ominous wink of glasses," and the advances of the feminine students.

Eugene dislikes teaching and cannot see the worthiness of it all, only in so far as it is a means to an end. He teaches only long enough to accumulate money for several months abroad. His observations of life in England make excellent reading. The same is true of some of his experiences in France, especially in the Paris diary which he quotes at length. After a period of lonely wandering he becomes involved with some slightly mad American friends and the novel closes with a series of fevered epistles that are both funny and tragic. Eugene does not, however, become one with the "lost generation" of American expatriates. He prefers to get his work done, to fulfill his mission. He has turned his back on France and is homeward bound when the book closes.

There is so much of interest any reviewer would want to say about this unusual novel, and also about its unusual author; but within my confines hardly an adequate account can be given of the thousand-page story of how a "passion-driven youth tried to tear all knowledge from the Harvard library, all experience from America, all wisdom from Europe, and to search out, in his twenties, the secret of the loneliness and the fascination of America."

Sinclair Lewis prophesied that Thomas Wolfe would become one of the "world's great writers." Consensus of opinion shares the belief that he represents promise, altho not yet rounded achievement.
