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THOUSANDS MOURN AT BURIAL OF RIOT VICTIMS IN TEL AVIV

PROV. CHOSEN FOR ZIONIST C'NVNTION

2000 Delegates Expected to Attend

With 3000 delegates expected to attend the national convention of the Zionist Organization of America, which this year is to be staged in Providence, July 4, 5, and 6, members of the local committee are arranging to link the celebration of Jewish Day, a part of the Tercentenary program, with the convention, it was announced today by Dr. Ilie Berger, temporary chairman of the convention committee.

Morris Margulies, national secretary of the Zionist movement, will visit Providence next week to aid local leaders in plans for the convention to be held in the Biltmore Hotel. He will confer with Frank Scollard and Joseph Schlossberg, councilmen, who are entrusted with plans for the Jewish Day program.

Professor Albert Einstein, exiled German-Jewish scientist, will be among the notables attending the sessions.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, internationally known Zionist, will come to Providence from his headquarters at Tel Aviv, Palestine.

With the national convention which will bring more than 2000 Jewish leaders from all parts of the United States and Europe will meet two other national Jewish organizations, the Masada, the Young Zionist organization and Histadruth Ivrit, Hebrew speaking guild.

Nazi Press Lauds English Jew for Olympic Stand

Berlin (WNS)—Journalism's "man bites dog" criterion of what is news was given a new twist here when the Nazi press praised a Jew. The Jew who attained this unusual distinction is Harold Abrahams of London, former English Olympic star, who opposed a resolution against British participation in the Berlin Olympics which was introduced at the recent convention of the British Amateur Athletic Association. The Nazi press said that Abrahams "showed good sense."

Non-Jews Advertise Their Support Of Boycott

Los Angeles (WNS)—The unusual spectacle of a non-Jewish owned store using paid newspaper advertisements in the daily press of Los Angeles to advance the anti-Nazi boycott was presented to Californians by Foster's, a prominent gift shop in the town of Westwood, near Los Angeles.

Foster's advertising copy said "HITLER!!! We Hold With Abraham LINCOLN. Therefore all merchandise of German origin must go . . . and remain gone!! That this disposal sale shall be completed with dispatch . . . every German piece in our extensive collection is offered at one-third off regular price."

At the same time George Fong, Chinese merchant, who is manager of the National Dollar Stores, announced that his firm refuses to handle German or Japanese goods because "it is our duty to refuse to purchase or sell Japan and German-made goods until such time as the Japanese and German governments can show human rights to civilization."

Arabs Issue Call for General Strike; Total Dead Now Reaches 23; 114 Wounded

Conditions Slowly Returning to Normal

Tel Aviv, April 21 (WNS-Palcor Agency)—With police in all areas reporting that the night passed quietly, without further resumption of the racial attacks that has already caused heavy losses in deaths and injuries, another Jew was added to the toll of dead as Isaac Rabinowitz succumbed during the night to wounds which he received in Jaffa yesterday.

A thorough check, insofar as records are available at hospitals, shows that the total is 18 Jews dead, 64 wounded, 5 Arabs dead, 48 wounded as a result of the attack on Jews in Jaffa on Sunday morning, starting the chain of disastrous events. It was also indicated that a total of 40 wooden huts, owned by Jews and Arabs in the Yeminite quarter of Tel Aviv and the Arab section in Maushiya in Jaffa, was razed by fire up until nightfall yesterday.

Many thousands took part in the funeral procession accompanying six Jews who died yesterday and who were buried in the municipal cemetery at 7 o'clock this morning. The victims are being buried in a common burial plot, adjacent to the common plot used for the Jewish victims of the (Continued on Page Three)

Demands Must be Met Says Arab Paper

Jerusalem, April 21 (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The Falastin, a leading Arab daily, today declares editorially that the necessity no longer exists for sending an Arab mission to London, in response to the invitation of Colonial Secretary Thomas. The Arabs must solve the Palestine problem on the spot, the paper says, by compelling England to accept their demands.

The Falastin reports that a committee of representatives of the Arab parties was formed at Jaffa and decided upon a general strike in Palestine until the Arab demands are granted by the Government. This committee, the paper reports, met the District Commissioner, R. E. H. Crosbie, and protested to him against what they called the Jewish onslaught on the Arabs. Mr. Crosbie is reported to have replied that his information was that the Arabs started the attacks against the Jews.

When several Arab shops opened for business this morning they were immediately forced to close under pressure exerted by Arab youths who marched about the town. Reports received here from Jaffa said that shops of the latter city remained closed, as they have been for the past two days.

Rolland Regrets That He's Not a Jew

Warsaw (WNS)—Regret that he is not a Jew because he is ashamed of his fellow Christians' attitude toward the Jews was expressed by Romain Rolland, famous French author and fighter for human rights, in a letter to friends in Poland which was published in the fortnightly journal, Obliczyna Dnia.

In his letter Rolland authorizes his friends in Poland to use his name in their efforts to combat anti-Semitism and pleads with the Polish intelligentsia not to permit the scourge of anti-Semitism to destroy them.

LETTERS REVEAL DIRTY POLITICS

Anti-Semitic Letters May Cause Campaign Issue

Washington, D. C. (WNS)—The text of the letters exchanged between W. Cleveland Runyon and Alexander Lincoln, leaders of the Sentinels of the Republic, anti-New Deal organization, admitted that anti-Semitism will be employed in the effort to defeat President Roosevelt during the coming presidential campaign, served notice on the American people that when Postmaster General Farley said that the coming election will be "the dirtiest" in American history, he was not exaggerating. The letters, as made public by the Senate Lobby Committee, which subpoenaed them from the files of the Sentinels, follow:

"Dear Mr. Lincoln: Tugwell, in his famous Los Angeles speech said:

"For the movement will go on in any case; it lies in the brains and the blood of a people bringing into substance the stuff of old racial dreams."

"Certainly, after that, not to mention the Jewish Brigade Roosevelt took to Washington, there is no reason why the real issue should be smothered any longer.

"This fight for the West Christian civilization can be won; but only if we recognize that the enemy is worldwide and that it is Jewish in origin. All we need here is money. It is pitiful when I see money put out to discuss foolish, trivial issues, while two of the principal publishers of the real (Continued on Page Two)

Nazis Expel Gypsy Band on Non-Aryan Charge

Budapest (WNS)—Because they were giving German musicians too much competition, 24 gypsy musicians were expelled from Germany on the alleged charge that they are non-Aryans. This was revealed when the gypsies arrived here. They indignantly denied that they are non-Aryans and insisted that they are "the purest and only true Aryans in Europe."

Center Players Sponsor One-Act Play Contest

Because of the existent lack of incentive for the creation of one-act plays, notwithstanding the number and excellence of little theatre groups in Rhode Island, L. Justin Huddish, of the Executive Board of the Center Players, an adult activity of the Jewish Community Center of Providence, today announced the Players' sponsorship of a play-writing contest open to all Rhode Islanders eighteen years of age or over with a prize of \$25 offered for the best short play submitted. Names of the judges will be announced shortly.

According to Mr. Huddish, the Center Players hope by this means to create interest on the part of hundreds of gifted Rhode Islanders in the writing of one-act plays which are considered particularly appropriate vehicle for the talents and capacities of little theatre groups and for which there is relatively little market notwithstanding the ever-increasing demand. Especially is this true, Mr. Huddish states, with regard to plays

devoted to Jewish interests or otherwise appropriate for Jewish theatre groups. He states, however, that the contest is confined neither to Jewish writers nor Jewish subjects and that the excellence of the product submitted will be the determining factor in the selection of the winning play.

Contest Regulations

There are but six rules which applicants are requested to keep when submitting manuscripts for consideration:

1. Contestants must be residents of Rhode Island and must have attained the age of eighteen.

2. Plays submitted must be entirely original, the work of the person submitted. They must be complete in one-act or at least twenty minutes actual playing time.

3. While plays of Jewish content or interest are especially desired, equal consideration will be given all entries regardless of subject matter or treatment.

4. Manuscripts should be typewritten. (Continued on Page Two)

CONTRACT BRIDGE

REBIDS BY OPENING BIDDER

Last week's column dealt with rebids when the opening bidder's partner responded with One of a suit. That is when the response was a simple (one-over-one) takeout. Today's discussion will concern rebids by the opening bidder when his partner has made a response of Two, but in a lower ranking suit (also a simple take-out). Do not confuse this with a jump bid. Since a response of two raises the bidding to another trick, the responding hand must be a little stronger than in last week's case. (A review of responses will confirm this.) The opening bidder may, therefore, govern his rebids with assurance that his partner has more stuff than just enough to keep it open.

CHOICE OF REBIDS

1. He will rebid his own suit.
- a. Bid two if holding a rebiddable suit.
- b. Bid two (semi-forcing) with a rebiddable suit and 4-5-5 HLT.
- c. Bid four with eight sure winning tricks and about 4 HT.
2. He will bid a NEW suit.
 - a. Of two, even on an unshaded bid-dable suit, if of lower rank than his original bid.
 - b. Of three with 4 HT with a 6-5 hand or possibly 5-4.
 3. He will raise partner's suit.
 - a. In a major, with AFS and an additional trick (honors or ruffing).
 - b. Two raises may be given partner with four trumps and another honor trick and a singleton; or with additional 1 1/2 HT and a doubleton.
 - c. In a minor, with AFS, 3 1/2 HT and a ruffing trick. A raise of a minor to four should be given only when eleven tricks are sure.
 4. He will bid two No Trump with 3 1/2 HT or, if holding 2 plus HT and stoppers in every suit. A Bid of three No Trump should show about 4 HT, balanced distribution and all suits stopped.
 5. He will make a forcing bid:
 - a. By a jump rebid in a new suit with 5 HT and a second bid-dable suit and at least eight sure winners, or with 6-7 winners and a partner's suit.

While the above requirements are practically similar when the response was a one-over-one, the opening bidder may now proceed with more assurance if his partner has made a bid at the range of two thereby indicating at 1 1/2 HT and a five card suit. Simple addition of the Honor Tricks of the combined hands and application of the 4-5-6 rule, plus an accurate knowledge of Playing Tricks will be an almost infallible guide.

ON CORRECTING FAULTS

We were pleased to note in the recent playing of Morris Cowen the absence of a few faults conspicuous in his earlier play. We mention them here because they are common to many bridge players and are of general interest to those who care enough about this game to be constantly on the alert for the overcoming of their weaknesses.

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15th St., JUST WEST OF B'WAY

We noticed the discontinuance of weak overcalls. Very many players feel that they are compelled to overcall with a bare minimum of 1 1/2 HT and such bids all too frequently result in disastrous sets. Proper overcalling will be discussed at length later.

In conjunction with the above, he learned the proper time for a sacrifice bid. We remember one hand in particular where he made a defensive overcall which we doubled in anticipation of a large set. By clever playing he went down but one trick for a loss of 100 points when we could have made game. Proper sacrificing is an art in the hands of good players, and suicide in the hands of the weak.

He has learned to detect psychic bidding. On one hand he held balanced distribution and expecting to play it at No Trump, we opened with a spade bid in an effort to avert a spade lead. Against Three No Trump, he made the brilliant and unusual lead of a low spade from a holding of six spades headed by the Ace-Queen tenace. Very daring! When Ann's King held, the cat was out of the bag, and a spade return allowed them to run six tricks before we got in.

So we recommend to all players that they observe their own particular faults and by diligent study and application, learn to correct their weaknesses. It makes for a most enjoyable game.

I wish you could have heard a Southerner tell me yesterday about his conversations with Southern Senators. They know the New Deal is Communist, but there must be an aroused public opinion to cause Congress to rebel.

"Therefore, the defect today is that the message is not being put over to the people. It takes money to do that; I have done a lot all alone. The other so-called issues are piffle now. Tugwell has stated the real issue. They are planning a breakdown which is necessary for the Communist dictatorship.

"The people are trying for leadership and getting it. Our leaders are asleep. The Sentinels should really lead on the outstanding issue. The old line Americans of \$1,200 a year want a Hitler."

May the Olympic Ship Sink is Sport Writers' Hope

Los Angeles (WNS)—In a stinging attack on the American Olympic Committee's campaign for United States participation in the Berlin games, Gene Coughlin, sports editor of the Los Angeles Evening News, offered to help in a campaign to raise \$175,000 or half the sum needed to send the American team to Germany, if he could be assured that the officials of the Olympic Committee and the "wandering athletes" who are willing to toss their pride and their religious independence just to get a boat trip to Hitler's land "don't come back."

Labeling Avery Brundage, president of the Olympic Committee, "as the type of fellow who has to be kicked down the road steps 10 times before he decides he is not welcome at the party," Mr. Coughlin predicted that the committee would be unable to raise the necessary funds.

How surprisingly similar do all anti-Semitic sects and parties evolve and then about-face! The (Endek) Nationalist Party in Poland is no exception. In an early meeting of the Polish Sejm (House of Representatives) one of the representatives of the Nationalist Party, Deputy Z. Berzewski stated that any citizen, irrespective of his origin, creed or nationality, must enjoy the same rights as a citizen of Polish Nationality. Today that just principle is discarded by that party as clearly shown by the recent disorders at the universities and in the smaller villages.

The government appears to be doing its utmost to prevent this group from getting out of hand, and as a matter of fact, has been throwing the perpetrators into confinement for fairly long terms.

riots of May, 1921.
An indication of the return of normal conditions was seen today when several Jewish-owned busses left Jerusalem for Tel Aviv and another group started off from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem. The firm action of police patrols and the military is said to have given reassurance to the communities.

Stories of bravery and daring on the part of Arab notables and merchants in Jaffa who went to the aid of their Jewish friends and clients in saving them from the fury of Arab attackers were revealed today as communications between the two cities began to assume normalcy. A number of Jews who were endangered by the mob were hidden away by these Arabs in their homes until the disturbances had subsided. They thereupon escorted their Jewish friends to Tel Aviv, thus saving many Jewish lives.

It was also discovered here that Jewish orderlies who had been placed to guard the Jewish community had also protected Arabs in distress, accompanying them to the Jaffa boundary line in order that there might be no possibility of attacks.

Reports received here of stories spread abroad about extensive conflagrations in Tel Aviv were quickly denied by officials of the all-Jewish city, who branded these stories as "absolutely false," after referring to the fact that only 40 wooden huts had been razed by fire.

Jews Undaunted

Jerusalem, April 20 (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The Jews of Palestine are not in the slightest daunted by the riots of the last days and they intend going forward at full speed with their economic activities. It was declared today in editorials published in the country's Hebrew press, "National discipline must be maintained and provocations must be ignored," the leading Hebrew daily declares.

"The Jewish community regards the Government as responsible for the restoration of the fullest tranquility." The Arab press had no editorial comment on the racial clashes of the last two days, contenting itself with giving the bare news.

At a late hour this afternoon, quiet was reported on the boundaries between Tel Aviv and Jaffa, as well as in the rest of the country. The 800 Jewish immigrants who landed at Haifa harbor this morning on the S. S. Polonia and S. S. Gerusalemme remained in Haifa, since a special train which was scheduled to take them inland did not leave as scheduled.

A late total of the victims of the two-day riots at Jaffa showed that a total of fifteen Jews is dead, with four Arabs reported dead. In addition to the three Jews killed during this morning's affray, two of the injured have also succumbed to their wounds.

The Jewish injured total 63 and the Arab injured, 20. A number of those injured received wounds which may lead to their death during the day. Two of the five Jews who died in this morning's riots were identified at the Tel Aviv Hospital as Yehuda Sinantow, 60 years old, a Yemenite, and pelig Levinsohn, an elderly man.

Jerusalem, April 20 (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A Jewish delegation representing the Vaad Leumi, the Kheilan Council and other Jewish bodies in Palestine called upon District Commissioner J. E. F. Campbell today regarding the disturbances of the past two days. The District Commissioner reassured the Jewish delegates that there was no cause for anxiety and urged that Jewish shops be reopened, promising the fullest protection. He declared that public security would be maintained.

Roumania Makes About Face on Anti-Semitism

Bucharest (WNS)—Following to the wide-spread protests by democratic forces at home and the opposition of public opinion abroad, the Roumanian government has decided to temper its friendship for the anti-Semitic movement, at least for the time being. Indicative of its about-face was the sudden ban on anti-Semitic demonstrations and efforts to root out Nazi organizations.

POLISH JEWS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

Time Bomb Causes Chaos in Jewish Quarter.

Warsaw (WNS)—Scores of Jews narrowly escaped a horrible death when a time bomb, set by anti-Semitic hooligans, exploded in the Jewish section of Ototyok, health resort city, and set fire to a whole block of Jewish houses. Fortunately the residents of most of the houses were not at home when the bomb went off. Those who were home had to jump from second and third story windows to escape.

The anti-Semites had not only planted the bomb but also cut all the telephone wires in the neighborhood. This is the third anti-Semitic bomb outrage in Ototyok in the last few months.

Holding Nazis and Communists equally to blame for the sanguinary riots in Lemberg, where 20 unemployed workers were killed when the police broke up a funeral demonstration, the Polish government has begun to crack down on all suspected Nazi and Communist organizations.

The Nazis were the first to feel the government's wrath when 30 members of the illegal National Socialist German Workers Party were arrested at Kattowitz. At the same time the government prohibited the wearing of swastika armbands by Polish Nazis on the ground that it is the symbol of a foreign nation. Police raids on Nazi headquarters uncovered documentary evidence of a Nazi plot to hand over Polish Upper Silesia to Germany.

Although the Lemberg riots were not anti-Semitic in origin, thousands of dollars worth of damage was done to Jewish property and four Jews, including Sarah Arzt, who was about to become a mother, were killed when the angry workers raided the Jewish quarter. Twenty-eight other Jews were seriously injured. Among those arrested after the police had restored order was Emanuel Scherer, a Jewish teacher.

Jew Killed in Hold-up Mourned by Whole City

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Israel Chazen, Jewish immigrant from Salonica, who was murdered on April 13 when a band of brigands staged a series of holdups on the Tulkarm-Nablus highway, was buried today as the entire city mourned his death.

All shops along the route of the funeral procession were closed. Groups of youths marched with blue-white flags and sang "Hatikvah" as they accompanied the funeral cortage. Dr. Israel Rokach, Acting Mayor of the city, spoke on behalf of the municipality at the funeral exercises.

During the procession police clashed with youths attempting to make a demonstration on account of the murder of Chazan. Several youths were injured by the policemen's truncheons.

A few British Jewish constables were stoned in the melee that followed. The police then fired into the air and the demonstrators dispersed. A preliminary investigation of the holdups on April 15 showed that the brigands were Arabs.

Earl of Harewood Likens Hitler to Gangster

London (WNS)—While the Earl of Harewood, King Edward VIII's brother-in-law, was comparing Hitler to a gangster, Premier Stanley Baldwin was calling on the Nazi leader to end his dictatorship in the interests of European peace. Speaking at the opening of a drill hall of the 214th Battery of the Royal Field Artillery at Duddersfield, Lord Harewood, the husband of Princess Mary, said "you will find it difficult to draw any other parallel to Hitler's methods than that of a gangster."

Premier Baldwin, addressing a meeting in his own constituency at Bewdley in Worcestershire, declared that peace or war in Europe rested with Hitler and he urged him to end his dictatorship to preserve peace.

Florida City, Fla. (WNS)—Morris Silverman was elected mayor of this town at the recent election, polling 120 out of 171 votes cast.

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THE PALESTINE LESSON

It is premature at this time to comment with finality on the recent riots in Palestine. Dispatches from Jewish as well as general sources agree, however, that 10 Jews were killed by Arabs and that two Arabs were killed by the police.

There are a number of versions as to the antecedents of this lamentable situation. Some claim that the murder of a Jew by Arab brigands and the subsequent mysterious killing of two Arabs set off the chain of incidents that were climaxed by the tragedy of April 19th. Others regard these preliminary murders as merely the pretext used by Arab politicians. To the serious observer of Palestine affairs, it becomes clear that the tragic incidents of April 19, 1936, belong to the chain of events milestoned by the riots of 1921, 1929 and 1933.

World Jewry bows in sorrow at the bier of the victims of the 1936 riots. The Zionist leadership, after the first shock, will go on with its work undismayed and undiscouraged. It would, however, be irresponsible if the Zionist leadership did not draw inescapable conclusions from these chronic disturbances in Palestine. They prove beyond question that Arab nationalism is on the ascendant. They further demonstrate, as David Ben Gurion in his confidential reports foreshadowed, that Arab-Jewish relations are reaching a danger point threatening the positions built up by the Jews in Palestine.

There is no doubt that the Zionist extremists, who have gone on clamoring for a Jewish state and for a ruthless Zionist policy against the Arabs, are much to blame for what is happening today in Palestine. These elements refuse to realize that the Arab nationalists are led today not only by native, uneducated politicians but that the heads of this movement are sons of rich Arabs who have acquired an intimate knowledge of European political strategy.

The Arab nationalist leaders are still using the same methods on the surface but it would be naive to ignore the fact that the organization of Arab opposition to Zionism is today 100 per cent more efficient than in 1929. The continually growing Arab nationalist movement is a factor in Palestine affairs which can no longer be ignored.

There will be, of course, heroic pronouncements from Zionist sources in connection with the recent riots. The Zionist leadership will have to make it clear to the world—and it will be justified in doing so—that the upbuilding of Palestine will not be slowed up for one moment because of Arab opposition.

Viewing the situation soberly one cannot repress the feeling that Dr. Chaim Weizmann's interview several years ago, the very interview which is said to have cost him the Zionist presidency, was a prophetic warning. In this interview Dr. Weizmann visualized Palestine as a binational state in which the Jews and Arabs, side by side, with equal rights, would work for the future of the country. This Jewish statesmanship is now more in order than ever.

BOOK NOTES

—Esther Levine

"The long exile." By Eugene Lohrke. (D. Appleton-Century).
 There has always been a controversy between the two schools of thought in literary circles—the school of plot and the school of character. The former cry: "Act! Do! Move!" The latter say: "Who cares what you do, but why do you do it?" Both schools have their defenders who wrangle fiercely with one another. Fortunately, however, is the reader who, with no axe to grind, takes the best from each method.

Thus, the unbiased reader can enjoy the fine bit of character analysis afforded for him in "The long exile." The action is extremely limited since it covers only part of one day in the life of Anton Gerhard. In the morning, Gerhard had cleared \$50,000 in a wheat stock transaction, but he was not altogether satisfied.

He felt vaguely that there was something wrong with a country that gave such unreserved opportunities for wealth to its people. Although in his native Germany he could not have stepped out of the class into which he was born, curiously enough, he felt more respect for the institutions of his own country than for the democratic principles which permitted him to exercise his talent for making money.

Anton Gerhard was an antecart by nature and by the force of his early environment. He enjoyed the money which had come to him, yet he resented the process which allowed men of whom he disapproved to take advantage of the same rules which led to his success.

This resentment, which was unconscious for the most part, led him to plan a life for himself and his family which should be rigidly outlined and adhered to without question. It was unthinkable that his wife should lead a life of her own. It was his rule that she be on the threshold of their home upon his return every evening, and the rule was obeyed implicitly.

On this particular day which should have been so satisfactory and was not, Gerhard was disturbed. First of all, he was annoyed by a beggar who bore a resemblance to a childhood acquaintance whom he wished to forget. On his way to Jersey from his New York office, he kept thinking of the past—his boyhood, his first meeting with his wife, his early struggles, the old grandmother who sat in the corner and cast a cold shadow on him. He loved his wife. Of that he was sure, but he realized how little she knew of him and how weak was the bond of understanding between them.

Their outlook, their upbringing, their philosophy, even their acquaintance of the wealth which had come to them differed. Outwardly there would be no conflict—probably there never would be. His wife's New England training had encouraged obedience and duty.
 Nevertheless, the situation irked him. He would not have put up with any show of rebellion, but, at the same time, he also wanted understanding. He would have liked to unbend, to have been liked warmly by his neighbors, to have been loved fearlessly by his family, but the events of that memorable day were to show him that some men had to follow the course of their nature, even when they knew that disaster lay at the end of that course.

Fourth Century Synagogue Uncovered in Jericho

Jerusalem. (WNS-Palcor Agency)—New light was shed upon Jewish synagogal customs in Palestine during the fourth century, A. D., by the discovery of the foundations of a Byzantine synagogue in the city of Jericho dating back to that time. The relic of the ancient Jewish house of worship was uncovered in a banana plantation during the harvesting. Among the special findings in the foundations were mosaics written in Aramaic characters which commemorated the donations to and the establishment of the synagogue. Decorations on the surfaces included the ram's horn, palm trees and the candelabra.

He took an active part in Jewish communal activities in Youkers, becoming the President of Temple Emanuel there. He also was active in the Masons, B'nai B'rith, Jewish Federation, and the Zionist Organization of America, of which he was a life member.

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RETURN FAMED ROGERS COMEDY

"A Connecticut Yankee" to be Seen Again

For the countless Will Rogers fans who have always maintained that "A Connecticut Yankee" was the greatest of the great comedian's pictures, there is good news in the announcement that 20th Century-Fox have re-released that rib-tickling comedy and that it is now at the Majestic Theatre.
