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Black Legion Exposed As Secret Anti-Semites

Movement Uncovered When Member is Arrested

Detroit (WNS)—Existence of a nation-wide, secret, terrorist organization pledged to resort to murder if necessary to carry out its avowed aim of warring on Jews, Catholics, Negroes, Communists, was disclosed here with the arrest of 16 of its members on the charge of having killed Charles A. Poole, a 32-year old WPA worker.

Described as "the strong arm squad" of the Ku Klux Klan, which was supposed to be moribund, the organization is officially called the United Brotherhood of America, but because of the black hoods with the insignia of skull and cross-bones worn by its members is popularly known as the Black Legion.

The cold-blooded killing of Poole was ascribed by the men under arrest as revenge for his having beaten his wife, a charge denied by Mrs. Poole. The real reason for Poole's death is believed to be the fact that he had revealed secrets of the organization. The fact that he, a Catholic, was married to a Protestant, may also have motivated the murder.

Suspect Anti-Semitism in Boston WPA Dismissals

Boston (WNS)—That anti-Semitism may be the reason for the dismissal of about 170 workers, mostly girls, from the Boston WPA Library Re-classification project, and that the State WPA administrator has promised an investigation is reported by the Jewish Advocate of this city.

The majority of those dismissed are Jews, and investigation has revealed that many of them are badly in need of work, so that the explanation given to one girl that those who were not in absolute need were chosen for dismissal does not hold water, the Advocate declares. An investigation by the Advocate shows also that comparatively few Jews were left in the library project.

Col. Thomas Sullivan, who is in charge of the WPA work here, denied that he knew of any anti-Semitism as a factor in the dismissals, but added that "the number of Jews on the WPA project is way out of proportion to the number of Jews in this city."

Sports Festival Planned to Rival Berlin Olympics

Paris (WNS)—An international athletic festival designed to rival the Berlin Olympic Games will be held at Barcelona, Spain, this summer at the same time that the Berlin games are in progress.

Sponsored by the Socialists of Europe, the Barcelona sports fete will be called the Workers' Games. Efforts are already under way to enlist the support of labor federations throughout Europe. The sponsors of the Workers' Games are counting on the aid of the new left wing French government which is expected to refuse the 1,800,000 franc appropriation needed to send a French team to Berlin.

France Bans Play Dealing With Hitler's Love Life

Paris (WNS)—After representatives of the ministries of the interior and education had seen a private dress rehearsal of the play, "Hitler," a dramatized version of Le Journal's sensational series of articles exposing the love life of Adolf Hitler, the play was banned in the interests of "politics and morals" and in order to "avoid diplomatic incidents."

The series of articles that inspired the play led to the suppression of Le Journal several months ago, following protests by the German embassy. Among the revelations contained in both the play and the articles is the fact that Hitler was once in love with a Jewess.

AUSTRIAN MINISTER HITS NAZI THEORIES

Says Fanatic Nationalism Greatest Enemy

Vienna (WNS)—Renewed hopes for an end of the anti-Semitic campaign here arose in Jewish circles when Hans Hammerstein-Eqardt, minister of justice in the new cabinet named by Chancellor Schuschnigg after the elimination of Prince von Starhemberg, Heimwehr leader, vigorously denounced Nazi race theories in a speech before the Pan-European Congress which is meeting here.

Germany And Italy Plan To Settle Jews In Ethiopia

New York (WNS)—A plan to settle 20,000 German Jews in Ethiopia is being negotiated by Germany and Italy, it was reported in a Berlin dispatch to the New York Times.

The proposed plan would be carried out under the existing German-Italian agreement regarding the transfer of Jewish capital from Germany to Italy. Several months ago Germany arranged with Italy to permit German Jews who wanted to go to Italy to take with them a limited amount of their capital. This capital was to be paid to the Jews in Italy in lire provided an equal sum was deposited in Germany with the Reichbank.

Few Jews have taken advantage of this plan because of the disturbed economic conditions in Italy. The Ethiopian scheme would be of great benefit to Germany because it would unfreeze large amounts of Italian lire held in Germany.

Reports of a plan to settle German Jews in Ethiopia were current a year ago when a representative of Emperor Haile Selassie discussed the matter with Jewish leaders in London.

Jewish Farm School Graduates Find Jobs

Doylestown, Pa. (WNS)—All of the 51 graduates of the 1936 class of the National Farm School, Jewish-operated agricultural training institution, have already found employment, it was announced here by C. J. Goodling, dean of the school. Dr. Goodling said that "more positions were offered than we could fill with our graduates. Not only that but the wages offered the young Jewish farmers are much higher than in the past three years."

Jewish Music Will Be Interpreted

"A nation with a song is a nation with a soul." Israel has always been a people of music with every phase of its life touched by song. The chanting of Psalms lightened the three annual pilgrimages to Jerusalem, the Psalter was the hymnal of the Second Temple, and in the Scriptures are many songs and a list of the string, percussion and wind instruments, even to a 10-pipe organ, which were used in the Temple service. Weddings, births, Brit-Milahs, each daily task—the lonely watch of the shepherd, the drawing of water from the well, planting, reaping, treading on the grapes, victories in war, all called forth song and dance.

Varying Moods of Music
The varying moods of the Jewish calendar have given modern cantors opportunities to embellish the traditional music, both in form and in spirit, so that the minor scale with its once forgotten but newly-revived quarter-tones is not always plaintive in character. Often the music is hummed by the choir in wordless ecstasy while the cantor interpolates occasional strains. All over the world we still hear this traditional music, the ever-living Shema and Adon Olam, a link binding polyglot worshippers into one great union of song.

In the sanctuary of the orthodox Jewish home were found the Z'mros or table hymns which made each week a religious offering. One week-days the 137th Psalm was sung as a daily reminder of the destruction of Jerusalem, but such sadness was forbidden on the Sabbath when the Sholom Alechem and the Locho Dodi rang out their welcomes to the Sabbath Bride.

Jewish Influences
Jewish music had a strong influence on the music of the Catholic Church, the Gregorian Chant having many strains reminiscent of the

R. I. TO ELECT SIX DELEGATES JUNE 2

Max Brauer, Nazi Exile is Guest Speaker

Election of a representative delegation for the World Jewish Congress to be held in Washington, June 13 and 14, will take place Tuesday evening in the Biltmore Hotel. Max Brauer, formerly mayor of Altona, Germany, now in exile from Nazi Germany with a price on his head, will speak before the representatives of R. I. organizations. R. I. will be entitled to six delegates.

Dr. Stephen Wise, president of the American Jewish Congress, has stated in an open letter, sent to organizations throughout the country, that "In no time in our history have so many heavy clouds lowered upon the house of Israel. It becomes necessary," he says, "for the ancient race to rally in the defense of their hard-won rights."

"The Jewish people, therefore, must present their demands for the recognition of their rights and claims to justice and equality to the enlightened people of the world."

All organizations that have not appointed delegates to the Tuesday night meeting are requested to have official members present who can participate in the discussion and elections.

Vladeck Leaves for Tour of Eastern Europe

New York (WNS)—B. Charney Vladeck, president of the American and ORT Federation has left for Europe on an extensive trip to Russia, Poland and other countries in Eastern Europe on behalf of the ORT. Mr. Vladeck will spend one month in Russia inspecting ORT colonies and cooperatives. He will also inspect the colonies and trade schools maintained by the ORT in Poland, Rumania, Latvia and Lithuania. Before returning to this country in September he will visit Palestine.

Jew Who Passed Himself Off as Nazi Unmasked

Berlin (WNS)—The lengths to which German Jews are being driven in order to earn a livelihood in Nazi-land were dramatically revealed when the Nazi press disclosed that a Jew by the name of Manfred Joseph had been passing as a Nazi for several years. Until his disguise was penetrated Joseph was getting along fairly well.

Tel-Aviv Forms Company for New Port

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—An unsuccessful attempt on the part of Arabs to bomb a cargo boat bound for the new Jewish harbor here yesterday marked the first violent reaction to the determination of Tel Aviv to become independent of the Arab port of Jaffa.

This all-Jewish city of 150,000 has taken definite steps to establish its own permanent port with the launching of a new company for maritime activities which will have a capital of approximately \$500,000. The founders' shares of the new company are being purchased by the Jewish Agency for Palestine and the Tel Aviv Municipality. Other shares will be offered for public subscription.

Commenting on a protest by the Jaffa Municipality against the unloading of ships at Tel Aviv the Davar points out that no protest was made when 16 Jews were murdered in Jaffa streets, but now protests because striking Arab boatmen did not succeed in starving the Jews of Tel Aviv. The curfew hours during which no one may appear on the streets have been extended to last from 5:30 P. M. to 5:00 A. M. for the neighboring Arab city of Jaffa, as a result of continued terrorism there.

A Tel Aviv Jew who was attacked by an Arab crowd in Jaffa was protected by an Arab noble, however, until police arrived to disperse the mob.

The director of the Ottoman Bank at Jaffa is reported to have threatened to close the accounts of Arab merchants who insist on continuing with the strike.

Demonstrations which took place over the week-end at Jaffa and other Arab cities were dispersed peacefully. Tel Aviv has been ordered excluded from the new regulation requiring all car drivers in Southern and Central Palestine to carry special permits bearing their photographs.

77 GRANTED RELIEF BY WELFARE UNIT

To Broadcast Program Over W J A R

At the monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Family Welfare Society held last Monday night at the Carpenter Memorial Building, North Main street, Miss Jessie Josowitz, executive director of the Society in her monthly report announced that for the first four months of this year the Society has been interested in 208 Jewish families granting relief to 77.

She also emphasized the fact that the Society's urgent need is not only for additional funds to enable it to render a great family rehabilitation service in the community, but also the opportunity of selection of its case load and distribution of its funds where it will be of the most far-reaching value.

Arthur J. Levy, president of the Society, presided.

The Society will broadcast on station WJAR Monday evening at 6:15 o'clock. The broadcast will be in the form of a skit depicting the many phases of its useful work.

Jews in Germany Must Build Own Public Baths

Berlin (WNS)—The determination of German Jews to re-orientate their lives in the Nazi Reich was evidenced by the Jewish community of Breslau, when it appropriated funds for the construction of a bath house for the use of the Jews, who have been barred from the public baths. The Berlin Jewish community has issued an appeal to Jews to give first consideration to Jewish lawyers when they have legal business to transact.

Technicians Appeal

Warsaw (WNS)—A group of unemployed Jewish technicians and chauffeurs have appealed to the Italian embassy here to send them to Ethiopia. The request was forwarded to the Italian government at Rome.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

DEFENSIVE OVERCALLS (Continued)

You have thoroughly mastered, of course, the minimum requirements for a defensive overcall. When the bidding has been opened you will recognize that your hand contains a defensive bid by the following three steps: first, you must hold at least 15HT; secondly, you must have a five-card or longer biddable suit; and finally, (and don't bid unless you have this last requirement) you must have sufficient playing tricks in your hand, so that if your partner's hand is absolutely trickless, you can't go down more than three tricks non-vulnerable or two tricks vulnerable.

MODIFICATIONS

At one-odd (a bid of one) a four-card suit may occasionally be bid if there is sufficient strength in the side suits. At three-odd the trump suit alone should contain at least four and preferably five winners. With sufficient winners, a non-vulnerable overcall should sometimes be made with less than 15HT in order to interfere with the opponent's bidding.

SAFETY FIRST

No overcall should be attempted unless the bidder is assured that the set, if he is doubled, will not be disastrous even if a partner's hand is worthless. All defensive bids are based on the "Rule of Two and Three." DO NOT BID UNLESS YOU HAVE WITHIN TWO TRICKS OF YOUR CONTRACT IF VULNERABLE OR THREE TRICKS OF YOUR CONTRACT IF NON-VULNERABLE. In other words, your sacrifice should not be more than 500 points.

A HERO FOR HEROES

A recent episode at which we were a witness created such a favorable impression that we repeat it for the benefit of all those who take a fateful delight in unceremoniously bawling out their partners for mistakes, either of omission or commission. The husband is the hero, and to our mind, made insignificant the historic episodes of Lord Chesterfield, Sir Gallahad, and Sir Walter Raleigh put together.

They were vulnerable and we were not. Our wife dealt and passed. He, at our right, made a significant demand bid in hearts and it came up to us. Our entire holding consisted of eight spades to the King so we essayed a preemptive shutout overcall of four spades. She squirmed a bit, bit her lips, appeared hesitant and very nervous and finally passed, as did all the others.

As play proceeded, she gradually

showed up with the Ace, Queen, Jack and deuce of spades and as they raked in trick after trick she became nervously conscious that she should have bid something. The silence at the table was ominous as the proverbial calm before the storm.

As the thirteenth trick was played, we endeavored to distract the minds of all by too loudly proclaiming, "Nice work, folks. Down six for a set of three hundred. Whose deal is it?"

He slowly picked up the ready deck and looked at her, she almost in tears. We pitied her, but felt helpless. Well, we are still trying to get over the shock at her remark in a low voice almost buttered with apology, "I'm sorry, dear, I should have known that you made a forcing pass." There's a man from whom we should all learn.

4,500 Immigration Quota Allotted for Six Months

Jerusalem (WNS—Palestine Agency)—The Palestine Government has announced in the Official Gazette that it is allotting 4,500 labor immigration certificates to the Jewish Agency for Palestine for the six-month period ending October 1st.

This represents an increase of 1,250 certificates over the schedule granted for the six-month period ending April 1st. This allotment includes 1200 certificates especially for German chulutzim on the basis of a special fund pledged by the Council for German Jewry, headed by Sir Herbert Samuel.

These 1200 certificates include permission for the entry of 300 married couples, thus making possible a total German Jewish immigration of 1,500.

Jews Have Rich Culture, Says Jewish Historian

"Jews have rich culture and traditions of which we as Jews must be proud," Israel Kadis of Cambridge, Mass., a prominent Jewish historian, declared last Thursday evening when he spoke at the annual Doner's dinner of the Junior Hadassah at the Crown Hotel.

LONDON POINTS FINGER AT ITALY

Papers Charge Italians Are Financing Arabs

London (WNS)—A point blank charge by the Daily Herald, Labor organ, that Italy has been financing Arab politicians in their fight against British rule in Palestine, has created a major political sensation here.

The Herald asserts that Italy sent at least \$25,000 to Arab leaders in Palestine, through secret agents and through the Arab nationalists in Syria. The Herald also stated that Italy had offered the Bedouins of Transjordan three dollars a day per man if they crossed into Palestine and looted Jewish houses and shops.

The Daily Express alleges that Leon Blum, new premier of France, had recently warned Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, that Italy was determined to make trouble for Britain in Palestine and Egypt.

Warsaw Police Arrest 100 Anti-Semitic Terrorists

Warsaw (WNS)—What is believed to have been a nation-wide plot to bomb Jewish restaurants and stores was frustrated here when the secret police raided a house in Warsaw and arrested 100 anti-Semitic terrorists and seized a large quantity of powerful explosives. The police say that the arrests will end the series of bombings of Jewish establishments and institutions.

Meanwhile the anti-Semites are resorting to new tactics in stir up the population against the Jews. Whenever the papers report an assault on Jews in some town the anti-Semites deny it and counter with a charge that the Jews assaulted Christian peasants.

Eddie Cantor Raises \$7000 for Youth Aliyah

New York—Eddie Cantor stepped off the Boston train at the Grand Central terminal, took a taxi to the office of Hadassah, the Women's

Zionist Organization of America, at 111 Fifth Avenue, handed over checks totaling \$3,250 and pledges amounting to \$4,025 to Mrs. Samuel J. Rosenstein, the national treasurer, waved away expressions of appreciation and hastened out.

The screen and radio star had been at a party in his honor given by Mr. Louis E. Kirstein, Boston department store head, and had told the thirty guests about Hadassah's work in transferring Jewish children from Germany to Palestine, known as the Youth Aliyah movement. He told them it costs \$360 to maintain and educate a child under the Youth Aliyah for two years. They at once contributed or pledged funds to sponsor 23 German children in Palestine. Among the largest donors were Mr. and Mrs. A. Lincoln Filene, who gave \$1800, representing a sponsorship of five children, and Mr. and Mrs. Kirstein, who pledged \$1180.

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Nahum Sokolow

Nahum Sokolow is dead. Great writer, philosopher, leader, diplomat and scholar, Sokolow will go down in history as one of the most versatile figures in Jewish annals.

He was the connecting link between all parties within the Jewish fold. He was at home with the strictly Orthodox mentality, with the radical element, with the assimilationists and with any imaginable type of Jewish thinking. He spoke all the languages of modern civilization and could converse and write with facility in more than eighteen languages, it is said.

An adjutant of Theodor Herzl, Sokolow went through every stage of Zionism, from the theoretical discussions of a Jewish Homeland to the Balfour Declaration, which he helped to make possible.

He was regarded by Jews and non-Jews alike as the sage of world Jewry. He was often compared as an intellectual, to Anatole France. His range of interests ran the whole gamut of human endeavor. Nothing was foreign to Nahum Sokolow who could write with the same unusual knowledge about a horse race in Paris as about a new interpretation of the Koran.

Nahum Sokolow will, however, remain in the annals of Jewish history as one of the builders of modern Hebrew literature, as the diplomat of Zionism from the days immediately preceding the Balfour Declaration until his death and as the interpreter of European culture to the Hebrew and Yiddish-reading elements of world Jewry.

To American Zionists, as well as to non-Zionists in this country, he personified the ambassador of Jewish culture and renaissance Jewish nationalism. There was nothing dashing or picturesque about this ever-young grand old man of Zionism. Yet, in his quiet and unassuming way he devoted the greater part of his life to a cause in which he never lost faith. He travelled hundreds of thousands of miles, spoke to millions of people and wrote millions of words to spread the message of Zionism.

Nahum Sokolow deserves to rest. May he repose in peace!

International Jewry

The American Jewish Committee, at a special meeting of its executive committee, has reaffirmed its opposition to the World Jewish Congress. The committee bases its opposition on what it calls "the international aspect" of such a gathering. It paints a most gruesome picture of this dangerous internationalism sponsored by the American Jewish Congress.

What are the facts?
The American Jewish Committee is pledged to defend Jewish rights throughout the world. Its leaders are in constant communication with the leaders of British, Polish, French and almost all other Jewries overseas. Morris Waldman, secretary of the committee, is now in Europe—not for a health cure, but for the specific purpose of taking counsel with various elements of European Jewry.

Secret Jewish international diplomacy is far more dangerous than open international gatherings on which anybody is invited to throw a strong searchlight if he so desires, and to which the whole world is permitted to listen in.

Various and sundry things have come our way this past week. Some new, some not so new; some meditative, some frivolous as a meringue.

For example, Kenneth Roberts turns from historical novels to take a not too gentle "slam" at those medical gentlemen who prefer to be known as specialists. Mr. Roberts' tonsils made a considerable disturbance in his life. And why wouldn't they, when tonsils are to blame for so many of our ills?

"Not only gout, quinsy sore throat, and swellings of various sorts, but loss of equilibrium, loss of memory, loss of appetite, colds, sleeplessness, irritability, fatigue, neuralgia, sciatica, dark spots before the eyes, that dragging-down sensation and other grave defects."

Oh, yes, ladies and gentlemen, "it must be your tonsils."

Siegfried Sassoon strikes a deeper note in his latest book of poems—"Vigils." Their meaning is frequently obscured by their mysticism.

There is disillusion, as when he writes of ex-service men,

"Whose swindled ghosts are crying from shell-holes in the past."

"Our deeds with lies were lauded, Our bones with wrongs rewarded".

Wistfully he looks back upon childhood and its strange "unwisdom" when we

"See with different eyes
From every day of our life
And find in dream disguise
Worlds far away—"

To walk in childhood's land
With trusting looks,
And truly understand
Youth's fairy-books—

This our unwisdom brings
Release which hears
The bird that sings
In groves beyond the years.

Clemence Dane (remember "Bill of Divorcement" which in the motion picture version disclosed a new satellite—THE Hepburn?) turns meekly in "Imagining about things she knows." Each of the nine tales in "Fate Cries Out" is based on people who lived once upon a time.

Particularly interesting is the story of the meeting of two queens—Vashti, who refused to come at the king's command, and Esther, who sought him out unbidden. It makes one pause and wonder: What manner of man was this king Ahasuerus who could command the love of two such women?

The dearly beloved of Benjamin Cobb is a story that proves how little we can know our neighbor, yet how quick we are to pass judgment upon him. "To bury the bodies when they come ashore... that's our business. But not to judge them, my dear, never to judge them; for we're not been on their journey, and we don't understand."

If the sentence of hanging seems over harsh for such a comparatively small error as that of Charles the "valiant little sailor," remember some more recent judgments—the youngsters who were sentenced to reform school for not saluting the flag, and countless others.

"My fat cries out,
And makes each petty artery in this body

As hardy as the Nemean lion's nerve."

Committee Attempts To Halt Congress

Adler Letter Calls for Quiet Campaign Against Congress

New York (WNS)—An eleventh-hour attempt by the American Jewish Committee to halt the World Jewish Congress was disclosed through a "confidential" letter by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the Committee, circulated among the American rabbinate. Dr. Adler's letter, which is said to have been mailed in hundreds of copies is marked "personal and not for publication."

It points to the World Jewish Congress "as a distinct menace." The highlight of this letter is expressed in a statement which says that the World Jewish Congress in Geneva this summer would be followed "by a call for Pan-Arabic congress which would bring in the Moslems of India and Persia."

Letter Follows
The complete text of Dr. Adler's letter written on official American Jewish Committee stationery, follows:

"May 20, 1936
"Personal and not for publication:

"I am venturing to approach you as I am some other Rabbis in the United States concerning the World Jewish Congress and from a point of view which I think you will understand cannot be presented in any public statement. Without considering whether you are affiliated with the Zionist Organization or not, or with the Jewish Agency, I trust that I may assume that you are interested in the welfare of Palestine and the security of the growing Jewish population there."

"I need not point out to you the present tense situation between Arabs and Jews in Palestine. If there should assemble a so-called World Jewish Congress in Geneva this summer, they would claim to represent the 16,000,000 Jews of the world. Such a meeting would, I have reason to believe, be followed by a call for a pan-Arabic Congress which would not only include the Arabs of Palestine but also of Egypt, Syria, Trans-Jordan, Iraq and Hedjaz. And it might also go even further and bring about a pan-Moslem movement which would bring in the Moslems of India and Persia."

"There are in my opinion serious objections to a World Jewish Congress from the point of view of the position of the Jews in Middle and Eastern Europe, but I am resting this letter mainly with regard to Palestine which has been, the last few years, the most considerable outlet for Jews migrating from Poland and Germany."

"If you agree with the point of view I hope that you will use your influence in your own community to persuade people to abstain from participating in the steps toward this congress. If its proponents cannot be persuaded to abandon the project, they may perhaps realize that in view of the tense situation in Palestine, the postponement of the proposed Congress is advisable."

"I do not advise public addresses or public meetings at which it would be inadvisable to advance the considerations I have mentioned above, but I do advise private meetings and conversations to minimize what I consider a real danger."

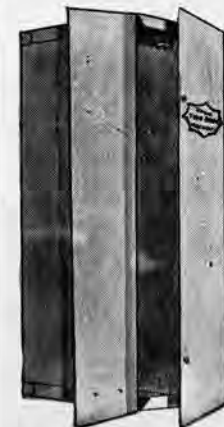

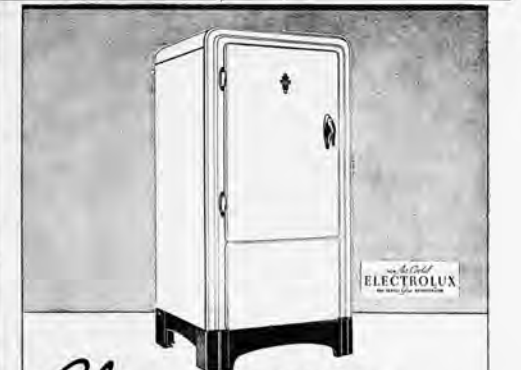

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Kosher Poultry Dealers Who Upset NRA Now Bankrupt

New York (WNS)—The first anniversary of the overthrow of the NRA by the unanimous decision of the United States Supreme Court finds Aaron, Martin, Alex and Joseph Schechter, the four famous brothers who appealed against the NRA code for the kosher poultry trade, broke and their father's house on the verge of being knocked down to the highest bidder by the mortgage.

The one-time successful wholesale kosher poultry dealers who became international celebrities on May 27, 1935 when the Supreme Court upheld their appeal from convictions by the lower courts for violating the NRA code for the poultry trade have since lost their business. The Schechters, who were once the heroes of the anti-New Dealers, are now 100 per cent for Roosevelt.

ROYAL COMMISSION SEEN UNWELCOME

London Times Cannot See Need of New Body

London, May 19 (WNS—Palestine Agency)—The general reaction in British political circles to the announcement yesterday in the House of Commons of the prospective appointment of a Royal Commission of investigation in Palestine was seen today to be unfavorable.

The London Times expresses a widespread view when it remarks that "it is hard to see how the new body can add anything of value to the reports of many predecessors." In its editorial today the Times says that everyone welcomes the statement that the High Commissioner is taking the necessary steps to end the disturbances, but expresses doubt over the announcement of another Royal Commission.

The British Government must disillusion the Arabs, the Manchester Guardian says editorially today, about their hope that they can obtain anything by disturbances. The Guardian welcomes the publication of the labor immigration schedule as showing there is no yielding to intimidation. Had the government taken any other decision, rioters would have been encouraged.

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No Pigs—Jews Find New Use for Whey

Jerusalem (WNS—Palestine Agency)—Because Jewish and Moslem dietary laws prohibit the eating of pork, so that practically no pigs are raised in Palestine, the country has long suffered a loss because of the wastage of whey, a by-product in the cheese industry.

This whey is, in other lands, used to fatten pigs, but here it was left to the ingenuity of the Daniel Sieff Research Institute at Rehoboth, under the direction of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, to find a use for the whey.

German-Jewish scientists who have sought refuge in Palestine have worked out a special process whereby the sugar in the whey can be fermented, and then, mixed with grain, makes a remarkably efficient and cheap chickenfeed in which the valuable whey vitamin is fully preserved. The Institute has also found a way of making pectin, a good basic material for jellies, out of the thick white pulp of oranges, and of crystallizing the fruit itself so that it becomes a solid essence which can be used to make a refreshing summer drink. Experiments with sunlight energy are also being carried on by German-Jewish savants there.

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Believe-It-or-Not---Strange Facts About Shabuoth

In the Middle Ages, on Shabuoth, the Jewish boy of northern Europe began his education. This occurred when the boy was five or six years old. At daybreak, he was brought to the synagogue by his father or by some pious and learned member of the community. There he met his teacher, who showed him a slate upon which was written the Hebrew alphabet backward and forward, and also the following three verses: "The law commanded us by Moses is the inheritance of the Congregation of Jacob," "And the Lord called unto Moses, and spake unto him out of the tent of meeting, saying," and "May the Torah be my daily calling, and God Almighty my helper." The teacher then read the names of the letters, and the boy repeated them. Then the slate was smeared with honey, and the child was told to lick it. This was done in order to impress upon him the sweetness of the Torah. The boy was then given a cake and an egg upon which were written verses praising the study of the Torah. The teacher read those verses, the child repeated them, and then he was given the cake, the egg and many other good things.

This interesting and picturesque ceremony clearly reveals the great and powerful love of the medieval Jew for Jewish education—a love that is unfortunately missing in the soul of the modern Jew!

The Jews of Morocco have the following very strange custom on Shabuoth: Around Mincha time, all—both adults and children—pour pitchers of water over each other. Of course, their holiday clothes are ruined—but that does not seem to worry the Moroccan Jews.

The famous King David, according to tradition, passed away on the festival of Shabuoth. Therefore, in Palestine on this holiday, we find many Jews flocking to the tomb of David, and reciting their Psalms.

Some believe that this great Hebrew ruler was also born on this important festival.

The ancient Sadducean sect—that sect that adhered only to the Mosaic law—maintained that Shabuoth should begin on the seventh Sunday after Passover. According to their view, Shabuoth would fall this year on Sunday, May 31—not on May 27, our Shabuoth date.

The Jews of Abyssinia also do not have the same date for Shabuoth that we have. They celebrate this holiday on the twelfth of Sivan—six days after our Shabuoth. It is interesting to note that among these Jews the twelfth day of each month is observed as a half-holiday—a reminder of their Pentecost which falls on the twelfth of Sivan.

Rabbenu Tam would surely have died, but, fortunately, there happened to pass by a knight with whom he was acquainted. The rabbi called to him and promised him a fine horse if he would only rescue him from the mob. The knight agreed—and thus Jacob ben Meir Tam, the greatest Talmudic authority of the age, was saved.

At the hobos' convention of the Union, Lazarewitz's efforts to place the organization on record as condemning Nazi persecution of the Jews was blocked by Jeff Davis, president of the Union, who offered Lazarewitz the vice-presidency at the next convention in St. Louis.

Synagogue, and the Jewish Messiahs' rim or boy chorists having their counterparts in the Catholic and Episcopal service.

Jewish music also influenced opera and oratorio. The 2nd act of Rubinstein's "Demian" is distinctly Jewish in theme development, and the bass solos in Goldmark's "Queen of Sheba" might have been written for the traditional cantor. Equally has other music influenced Jewish music. Modern cantors have introduced operatic roudlades and have even gone to sacrilegious lengths as when in France they sang the Kaddish to the air of the "Marseillaise." But the basic quality of our sacred music remains unchanged.

Communal Music

With this heritage of noble music which has but grown the richer with the ages, it is small wonder that Jewish composers have so notably influenced both vocal and instrumental music. Formerly a people of community song, the Jews at large have not followed this lead. We have forgotten old customs as we have tried to assimilate the habits of new countries, but we are returning to our choral singing as evidenced by the many Jewish choral groups throughout the country, among them the Providence Kadimah which, under Arthur Einstein's talented baton, is revivifying the glory of our Synagogal music, adding to it the intensely human Yiddish folk songs, and blending them with the best in modern music.

But such groups can flourish only if supported by public approval. Hear this fine chorus and your eyes will fill with tears at the half-forgotten strains of your youth; you will enjoy the humorous folk songs, and your Jewish heart will rejoice at this revival of Jewish music. This is an important development in our Jewish life for, in again finding our Jewish song, we shall again find our Jewish soul.
