Order Martial Law in Palestine

MACCABEES WIN SOCCER GAME, 6-0

30,000 Cheer Team in First Victory

New York (WNS)—While 30,000 delighted Jews cheered, the Maccabee soccer team, champions of Palestine, opened their tour of the United States with a smashing 6-0 triumph over an all-star team from the New York Football Association.

In as smooth an exhibition of playing as has ever been seen in this country, the blue-shirted players from Palestine completely outclassed the Americans. The teamwork and footwork of the Maccabees were superb and drew repeated salvos of applause. But for the beautiful playing of Joe Barkus, goalie of the all-stars, the Maccabees might have had three more goals.

Starring for the Palestine team were Imri Mausner, Iliya Westernman and Nathan Panz, each of whom tallied twice. At half time the score was 2-0, and in the second half the Maccabees scored almost at will. During the first half a minute of silence was observed in memory of the late Mayor Meier Dizengoff of Tel Aviv.

Before the game Dr. Stephen S. Wise was elected to honorary membership in the Maccabees. Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia kicked off the first ball. Proceeds of this and other games will go to the Federation of Polish Jews in America and the Maccabee Tel Aviv Sports Organization of Palestine.

New Nazi Restrictions on Jews Seen Beginning

Berlin (WNS)—The new Nazi law permitting the confiscation of real property is seen as a menace to Jewish property-holders here, and the fact that Jews are excluded from the new agreement providing for free entry of Germans into Austria indicates that the expected new restrictions on Jewish activities are already being inaugurated, according to informed observers.

The congress of Germans at Erlangen, which is being attended by 5,000 delegates from abroad, many of them citizens of other countries, has reaffirmed the Nazi stand against the Jews.

The official publication of the Nazi student group, in an attack on the Rev. Martin Niemöller, anti-Nazi Protestant pastor, declares that no one will be permitted to impede the Nazi war against the "Jewish Bolshevist Moloch."

Are Jews Worth Saving? B'nai B'rith Plan Outlined

I am constantly being made aware that I am a Jew. Every once in a while I get a pain; then I know I am a Jew. I am not like other people who do not suffer on account of their racial identity.

Moments of Forgetfulness
I have had moments of forgetfulness of being a Jew and have rejoiced in the comfort of being an equal man in the world. This was in the remote, happier times. In those times, I ever thought on the matter of being a Jew, it was to say, "Being a Jew is purely a religious identity and formal religion isn't my life."

Even yesterday when I picked up a certain newspaper and cast my eyes over the advertisements I was stabbed to the heart, as one might say. There was an advertisement of a hotel which let it be known that it solicited only Gentile patronage. This made my whole afternoon miserable.

To Address Hadassah

New York—The conditions under which Jews live in Poland, Russia and Germany will be the subject of an address by Mrs. Edward Jacobs, of New York, national president of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, at the twenty-second annual convention of Hadassah, to be held at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel, Philadelphia, Pa., from October 18 to 21.

Mrs. Jacobs has just returned from a four-month visit to Europe, where she conferred with Jewish leaders, attended a number of Zionist conferences and observed the life of the Jewish masses.

ASKS PROBE OF BLACK LEGION

Cleveland (WNS)—Condemning the Black Legion as a menace to American democracy, the American Legion convention called upon the Congress to investigate the activities of the secret order. Deportation of aliens engaged in espionage for a foreign government and the reduction of the present immigration quotas by 90 percent were also demanded by the convention, which offered its cooperation "to other recognized organizations in the United States who are active in the fight against subversive activities." A telegraphic plea from Samuel Untermyer, president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, urging the Legion to support the anti-Nazi boycott failed to come up for action.

Always Reminded

In fact, whichever way I turn I am being admonished by my pain that I am a Jew. If it isn't something that Hitler has just said, it is a sharp pain that I get from a friend who has just come from around the corner.

He tells me of something he overheard a certain lawyer say about Jews, or it is a speech he heard. In this speech there was no reference to Jews by name, but my friend has discovered subtle implications. I feel an anti-Semitic Poignard in my back.

Thus, I, the Jew, live by my pains these days. I never wanted to live so much as a Jew as now, what with all the enemies that encompass me. I am a vigorous, flaming Jew on account of my pains.

Justice Must Come
Sometimes I think about myself apart from anti-Semites. What will they do? (Continued on Page 2)

MEN'S CLUB WILL HEAR ELLSBERG

Beth-Israel Group Arranges Attractive Program

The Men's Club of Temple Beth-Israel will hold its opening meeting on October 12. The feature speaker of the evening will be Commander Edward Ellsberg, famous naval engineer, noted speaker and author of "On the Bottom", "Thirty Fathoms Deep," and "Pigboats". The program arrangements are in charge of Coleman Zimmerman, who is also vice-president. Other officers are Samuel R. Finegold, president; Maurice W. Hendel, treasurer, and Marshall Marcus, secretary.

Shoots Craps on Yom Kippur; Gets Jail Term

New York (WNS) — Magistrate Jacob Eilperin showed himself to be a zealous defender of the Jewish faith when he bitterly berated 10 Jewish young men arrested for shooting craps, on Yom Kippur. Nine of the Jews, who had been seized together with 8 Christians in a police raid, were let off with suspended sentences after they took a solemn oath to attend synagogue on the next Friday and atone for their sins. The tenth Jew, Abraham Abramowitz, was sentenced to two days in jail when he admitted he had never attended synagogue and had violated Yom Kippur by eating and drinking. "He's the worst disgrace I ever saw," the judge said of him.

Jewish Girl Attacked by Arab; Suspect is Held

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A new method of Arab terrorism is seen in the criminal assault of a Jewish girl in the colony of Hadar, who was attacked and then severely beaten by four Arabs as she was on her way to the colony's poultry yard to feed the chickens. Of four Arabs seized by police for complicity in the crime, the girl, now in a hospital, identified one, who was committed for trial. The other three men were released.

ARAB MAYOR OF NABLUS RESIGNS

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Mayor Suleiman Abdel Touqan of Nablus, has resigned from his office, which he had held continuously since 1925, after alleged ill-treatment at the hands of British troops. He also returned to District Commissioner Edward Keith-Roach the Order of the British Empire decoration which he received several years ago.

Mayor Touqan was said to have been kept under guard by British soldiers who demolished 45 houses in Nablus as the aftermath of heavy fighting, which claimed 45 Arab lives, in the district. While the demolition was going on, members of the Arab Higher Committee declared in a memorandum addressed to the British government, the Mayor was threatened with serious consequences if any of the soldiers were injured in skirmishes with the Arabs.

Born in Palestine in 1892, and educated in the Turkish schools at Beirut, in the 11 years of his mayoralty, organized the present water supply scheme of Nablus and constructed several roads outside the old city.

London (WNS-Palcor Agency)—An order-in-council authorizing Sir Arthur Wauchope, High Commissioner for Palestine, to delegate his powers to Lieutenant-General John Greer Dill, Supreme Military Commander of the British forces in Palestine, was published in the Official Gazette as the first step toward the proclamation of martial law in Palestine, designed to end the lawlessness that has gripped the country for almost 24 weeks.

The publication states that a new order has been brought into force by a proclamation of the High Commissioner, enabling him to delegate to Lieut.-Gen. Dill the power to make regulations for securing the public safety and defense in Palestine.

A further proclamation delegating power to Lieut.-Gen. Dill will be necessary, the order states, adding that the date of its issue will be decided by the High Commissioner in consultation with Lieut.-Gen. Dill. When the second proclamation is issued the Supreme Military Commander will have the widest possible powers, the order points out.

The holding in abeyance of the second proclamation, which will be virtually the declaration of martial law, is said in unofficial circles here to be due to negotiations still pending with the Arab leaders in Palestine.

Kosher Meat Bring Prison to German Jews

Berlin (WNS)—Accused of violating the ban on the importation of kosher meat, members of the Friedman family of Cologne have been sentenced to six months' imprisonment. The court refused to listen to their defense that they had not imported the meat but that it had been sent uncollected by a relative in Holland.

East is East, West is West But---Brothers Will Meet!

New York (Special Despatch)—East is East and West is West, but brothers will meet, if the HIAS, American Jewish's Immigrant Aid Service and its Missing Persons Bureau, can help it.

Thirty-two years ago, two sons of a Wilno Jewish family, Hitelesohn, left their parental home by their ways in the world. In 1894, the elder boy left for the United States; Mendel, the junior brother, immigrated to France. The West bound migrant went through the American melting pot and emerged as Sam Ettelsohn; the immigrant to France retained his original name and the original spelling of his family name Hitelesohn. For three decades all attempts on the part of both brothers to communicate with each other by the medium of the mails, failed.

Last month, Mendel Hitelesohn arrived in the United States as a visitor for the express purpose of locating his

long lost brother. Extensive inquiries and consultation of city and telephone directories, proved to be of no avail. But the man who crossed the Atlantic in search for his brother, finally applied to the HIAS for guidance. Last week, HIAS succeeded in locating Sam Ettelsohn in the Bronx.

Tears of surprise and joy rolled down their cheeks as the two long lost brothers finally met and embraced at the HIAS headquarters, 425 Lafayette street, New York City.

Jews Worried as Press Adopts Nazi Viewpoint

Rome (WNS)—Italian Jewry, long free from anti-Semitism, is now beginning to be seriously concerned over the anti-Jewish tone of the Italian press. Echoing the Fascista Regime, official organ of the Fascist party, which recently demanded that Italian Jews "prove" their loyalty to Fascism, Vita Italiana, another paper, declared that "Fascism must be anti-Semitism because Jews are the mortal enemies of Fascism." Other Italian papers demanded that the government suppress "Israel," the organ of the Italian Zionist Federation.

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EMIGRATION WON'T SOLVE PROBLEM

Says Lord Marley Before Members of ORT

New York (WNS)—Neither emigration nor any other single policy can solve the problems of European Jews suffering from persecution and oppression, but only the "ability of the Jewish people to take part in the industrial reconstruction of the world," Lord Marley, deputy speaker of the British House of Lords, declared in an address to a dinner of the American ORT Federation. Lord Marley urged the Jews to "pursue a policy of the greatest flexibility" and cautioned them to be ready to seize any opportunity for betterment that offers itself. Settlement of Jews from Poland and other East European countries in Birobidzhan by the ORT was proposed by Adolph Held, president of the Amalgamated Bank, who recently returned from a visit to Birobidzhan. B. C. Vladek, president of the ORT, said that neither Palestine nor Birobidzhan could absorb the mass of needy Jews in Eastern Europe and therefore they must be helped to improve their lot where they are.

come of it, the Jew after there are no more enemies to inflict pain on me and to remind me that I am Jewish? For I like to believe that a time of justice must come and I will be let alone. What will I have to live for, then, as a Jew? At present I am a living Jew merely because I happen to die at the hands of these contemptible enemies. This looks like negative, empty living. Is there nothing positive for which to keep on living as a Jew?
I am trying to save myself from my enemies, but for what? To what purpose should I, the Jew, survive? Is there anything in being a Jew except this pain? Is it worth while surviving merely to be preserved from one Hitler to the next?

It really doesn't seem worth while to keep on living for that, to have nothing to live by except pain, to have nothing to live for except to wring my hands in despair and to shake my fist against enemies.

Eager for Life
Since (at present) I am so eager for my life as a Jew, ought I not have a very good excuse for living? I look at my anxious friends who are so troubled about the destruction that seems to hang over their heads like a low cloud. In my optimism I believe they are going to be saved (since it can't happen here); but when they are saved, what will have been saved?
They will be a lot of dead Jews with nothing in their hearts (not even any more pain) to give them life as Jews. Are they worth saving? What for?

On Right Track
So, it seems that the final British is on the right track to make living Jews out of us who are worth saving. What is a living Jew? I should say he is one who doesn't need pain to make him feel Jewish.
He knows to what purpose he is a Jew. He is aware of the body of ideals which is Judaism. He is conscious of being a son of Prophets. He thinks of himself as an actor on a great stage of history and, as a veteran trouper, feels duty-bound to make a good showing.

He knows his story. It has to do with the pagament that runs back to Sinai.
As an old sufferer he does not make himself ridiculous by crying out his pain, as if the pain of the Jews was the only pain in the world. He has studied his pain and has found it has to do with the pain of the world and is not apart from it.

Must March in Front
He has come to the mind that if his pain is to be less, the pain of the world must be made less; that there is no justice for him separate from justice for all men. He (as one to whom has been handed down a body of social ideals) must go bravely with men who march toward a world more just and lovely. He must march in front with the banner of justice.

He walks with a high head, sure that he has something to live for. He is not the afflicted, timid Jew whom the blows of enemies keep reminded that he is a Jew. He seems a fellow worth saving.

Get Political Setback

When Voters Declare Themselves Against Anti-Semitism

Warsaw (WNS)—Forces opposed to the anti-Semitic National Democrats (Endeks) gained an absolute majority in the Lodz City Council, complete returns in the special election show. The anti-Endek majority was achieved through the election of 34 Socialists and six Jewish Socialists. Together these 40 councilmen will be able to outvote the 33 Endeks.

The election campaign was fought out on the issue of anti-Semitism and its result is widely regarded as a setback for the anti-Jewish forces. The special election was called because the Warsaw government had suspended the council elected at the last previous election because of its anti-Jewish policy. Since the suspension Lodz had been governed by a federal government commission.

Mosley Injured in Riot at Fascist Meeting

London (WNS)—Twelve persons, including Sir Oswald Mosley, head of the Fascist blackshirts, were injured in a riot that broke out in Leeds following a speech delivered by Sir Oswald. The latter was hit in the head by bricks and stones hurled by anti-Fascists. The meeting was held after the city council had refused to permit the Fascists to hold a scheduled parade, the route of which would have taken it through the Jewish quarter. Three persons were arrested after the police restored order. M. Thompson, Mosley's chief adjutant, was acquitted in a London court on charges of having precipitated a riot by an inflammatory address which caused a clash between blackshirts and Jewish war veterans.

London Paper Runs Straw Vote on Palestine Question

London (WNS)—In what appears to be an attempt to stimulate British public opinion in favor of Arab demands in Palestine, or, failing that, in support of a move to have Britain give up the Palestine Mandate, Lord Beaverbrook's pro-Arab Daily Express has started a straw vote on Palestine among its 2,000,000 readers. The following questions, to be answered with Yes or No, are on the ballot: 1. Are you in favor of the Arab demands in Palestine? 2. Are you in favor of Jewish upholding of Palestine? 3. If you favor neither side, do you believe England should give up the Palestine Mandate?

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BLAMES JEWS FOR EUROPE DISORDER

Fascist Warns Against World Congress

Rome (WNS)—Warning Italian Jews that unless they dissociated themselves from the World Jewish Congress and "from every connection with Jews in Russia, France and Spain" anti-Semitism would become an important factor in Italy, Roberto Farinacci, former secretary of the Fascist Party, assailed "the subversive influence of Jews" on European governments in an editorial in Regime Fascista, official Fascist organ.

Farinacci, who is a member of the Fascist Grand Council, declared that "from the monopoly enjoyed under the dictatorship in Bolshevik Russia, to the prevalence it has achieved in the Bolshevik government of France, the subversive influence of Jews is very evident as the cause of existing disorders."

Employing an anti-Semitic tone that has recently been heard with increasing frequency in Italy, Farinacci complained: "International Jewry is anti-Fascist. Never has a Jew uttered a word of admiration or gratitude for Fascism. On the contrary, moral and material aid is given by Jews to the popular front in France, to the Reds in Madrid and to the destroyers of churches under every social order. International politics of Jewry is being conducted contrary to the interests of those people of whom the Jews have been guests and from whom they derive their rights."

TEL AVIV TO USE GAS FOR HEATING

1950 Jews Reach Palestine in Two Days

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—For the first time in the history of Palestine this city will soon be enabled to use gas as fuel, as the local Municipality was reported to have leased a concession for installation of new gas works to Cloie Brothers, a British contracting firm.

The contractors, who are investing about \$2,500,000 in the new plant are also applying for concessions in other Palestine cities. Until now all Palestine has relied upon gasoline, benzine and other oils for heating.

1,950 Jews arrived in Palestine in two days; the majority are immigrants, who continue to enter the country for permanent residence despite the Arab campaign of terror.

500 British soldiers have reached Amman, capital of Transjordan, and are reported to be ready to co-operate with the frontier forces already there guarding the Palestine border.

The Dizengoff memorial forest, to be planted in honor of the late Mayor Meier Dizengoff, will be at Kiryath Anavim, Jewish colony in Judea, adjoining the Einstein forest, and will have 10,000 trees, the Jewish National Fund, sponsor of the memorial, announces.

LITVINOFF FLAYS NAZISM, FASCISM

Geneva (WNS)—Bitterly assailing Nazism and Facism, Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet Commissar of Foreign Affairs, told the Council of the League of Nations the entry into the League of any nation predicated on the principle of "racial and national inequality which describes all people except its own as sub-human."

Russia does not reply to insults in the traditional way "mainly because it wishes to leave to others the responsibility for all consequences of the breaches in elementary rules of behavior as between peoples," Litvinoff added, obviously referring to Nazi attributes at the Nuremberg conference.

Ask Aid to Maintain Religious Institutions

Istanbul (WNS)—For the first time since the World War the Jewish communities of Turkey have issued an appeal for aid to Jews abroad. In a formal communication the Turkish Jews asked the Jews of the world to help them maintain their religious institutions and schools which they can no longer support.

The appeal is a consequence of the government's action in confiscating the revenues of all religious communities. Although the Turkish Jews have been in difficulties for many years, they never sought foreign aid before because the Turkish government opposed it. It is understood that the close political friendship between Turkey and England has tempered this opposition.

WOULD OUST AUSTRIANS

Vienna (WNS)—A campaign to eliminate Jews from the Austrian film industry and from all positions in banking institutions has been started by the Morgenblatt, organ of Chancellor Schuschnigg.

Palestine Athletes

Palestine is on the athletic map. That is the verdict rendered by a cheering throng of 30,000 that acclaimed the triumphant American debut of the Maccabees, soccer champions of Palestine, after they had trounced an all-star aggregation by the score of 6-0.

Impressive as the score was, and complete as the victory was, the important thing about this triumph was the impression created by the athletic representatives of the Jewish Homeland. Playing a clean and fast game, and exhibiting both skill and courage, they showed the world that Jews, despite their ghetto background, can be as good athletes as any other racial group.

News dispatches from Palestine have been so loaded down with reports of disturbances, political developments and economic progress that little attention has been paid to the striking growth of sports in the Holy Land. The presence of the Maccabees in this country should serve to focus attention on this hitherto ignored phase of Jewish life in Palestine.

It will also be a fillip to sports in Palestine, where Jewish youth is pointing toward the 1940 Olympics. If the Maccabees are a fair specimen of Palestine's Jewish sportsmen then the athletic future of Palestine is assured.

Tragedy Brews

Things look dark for Palestine. With Arab defiance of Great Britain increasing, the adoption of more stringent military measures—a euphemism for increasing bloodshed—seems inevitable.

The extremists among the Arab leaders appear irreconcilable, and insist upon the stoppage of Jewish immigration, the banning of land sales to Jews and the establishment of an Arab nationalist State as their conditions for the restoral of peace to the Holy Land.

Obviously the Arabs will not be able to stand up against the reinforced British military garrison if, as is probable, Lieutenant-General John G. Dill proceeds in earnest against the terrorists who have been making Palestine a battle-field for the past five months.

It is equally obvious that the more moderate Arab leaders and their followers will suffer together with the extremists, and that for the Jews this will mean a tragic setback to their work of upbuilding.

No one, least of all the Arabs, therefore, can possibly gain anything from open warfare in Palestine. Let us hope that the Arab leaders will be able to reach some sort of compromise with their nationalistic convictions before such a compromise is forced upon them by Great Britain, which, after all, must consider also its obligations to the League of Nations, whose Mandate it holds over Palestine.

First National Purchases Prize Steers at Exposition

The grand champion baby beef steer and twenty-two other steers raised by boys and girls of 4-H Clubs were bought by First National Stores, Inc., at the annual 4-H beef auction held at the Eastern States Exposition at Springfield. This was First National's sixth consecutive participation in the auction.

During the Company's six years of supporting the 4-H beef raising project, its total purchases have aggregated 150 steers, including three grand champions. First National was the largest buyer at this year's auction. Customers have eaten over 100,000 pounds of the locally produced beef marketed in the neighborhoods where they have been raised.

Gladye E. Lawson of Bangall, New York, whose Aberdeen-Angus animal received the grand champion award, realized \$1,200 for her 960-pound prize.

RELEASE ONE OF 4 ARRESTED LEADERS

Berlin (WNS)—Rumors are current in Zionist circles here that the as yet unexplained arrest of four prominent Jewish leaders, three of whom are active Zionists, was in retaliation for criticism of Nazi policies by Zionist spokesmen at the World Jewish Congress in Geneva.

The release of Rabbi Emil Bernhardt Cohn, one of the three Zionists taken into custody by the Gestapo shortly after Rosh Hashanah, has weakened the strength of these rumors, but the fact that Rabbi Max Nussbaum, Benno Cohn and Dr. Franz Meyer are still under arrest continues to give concern to the Jewish community.

In some quarters it is still believed that they were arrested because of allegedly indiscreet remarks in Rosh Hashanah sermons.

Montreal Newspaper Suspends Publication

Montreal (WNS)—Le Patriote, one of the oldest of the weekly French-Canadian anti-Semitic sheets, informed its readers in its last issue that it is forced to suspend publication "because the Jews have prevented us from obtaining advertisements."

To a limited extent this is true because the Canadian Jewish Congress has repeatedly protested to firms whose advertisements appeared in Le Patriote. The real reason for the suspension, however, is the fact that Le Patriote could not compete with the newer anti-Semitic publications, which have gained readers because of their more militant attacks on Jews.

Weizmann to Launch Emergency Drive

London (WNS)—The Agency—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, has left for the Continent to launch an emergency campaign for \$1,500,000 for Jewish security purposes in Palestine. He will go first to Amsterdam, and thence to Belgium.

"The Government have made it clear that they will not be diverted from their policy by the shooting at British soldiers or terrorism and violence," Colonel Gore declared during an address here.

As additional troops prepared to embark for Palestine the Duke of York, Colonel of the Second Battalion, addressed his men at the Aldershot training camp, expressing the hope that they would show good behavior in their association with the Palestine civilian population, and there would uphold the traditional British good name.

Italian Jews Sever Ties With Coreligionists

FASCISM IS FIRST; RELIGION SECOND'RY

Press Demands Statement From All Jews

Rome (WNS)—Alarmed by the sudden outburst of anti-Semitic utterances in the Fascist press, the Jewish community of Milan has announced that it formally severs all ties with the rest of the Jews of the world. In a letter to Regime Fascista, official organ of the Fascist Party, the leaders of the Milan community publicly declare they have no links with world Jewry.

In an almost slavish tone the communication asserts that Italian Jews regard themselves as a religious group only and have no connections with world Jewry other than a common religious faith.

The letter also says that Italian Jews are thoroughly impregnated with Fascism and are uncompromisingly opposed to Bolshevism, and will forever remain grateful to Mussolini.

Commenting on this letter, the Regime Fascista expresses jubilation and calls on the other Jewish communities in Italy to issue similar declarations.

The action of the Milan community is a direct result of two attacks on the Jews by Roberto Farinacci, former general secretary of the Fascist Party, in Regime Fascista. In one of them he demanded that Italian Jews prove their loyalty to Italy by severing ties with world Jewry.

Mrs. Seigal will talk on "Portraits of the American Jew" by Gilbert Stuart. Her lecture will be illustrated.

Plans are being made for the New England Regional convention of the National Council of Jewish Women, for which the Providence Section will be hostess, to be held here Oct. 27 and 28.

Today I write in a light vein. And why not? Do not the prayers of Israel refer to the Feast of Tabernacles as Zman Simchasenu (season of our joy)? And does not Sacred Scripture declare thrice that we are to rejoice on the Succoth festival?

Mother Eve and Father Adam: What was the forbidden fruit of which Adam and Eve ate in that wonderful Garden of Eden long, long ago? You say an apple? Well, you should know that Abba of Acco, one of the sages of the Talmud, insists that it was an ethrog!

Relief for Toothache Sufferers: Recently, while sitting in a dentist's office, we picked up a dental book containing the following bit of interesting information, which ought to be of great help to those who are suffering with toothaches. Among the Polish Jews, it said, it is the practice, in case of toothache, to eat an apple which, fixed on the point of a lulab, has been roasted over an open fire.

For Expectant Mothers: In the days of the Talmud, strange to say, there was a belief that if a pregnant woman would eat ethrogim her child would be sweet-smelling. It is related in the Babylonian Talmud that the wife of King Sapor of Persia ate ethrogim during her pregnancy, and when she gave birth to a daughter the child's body gave forth such a pleasant odor that she was brought to the king whenever perfume was needed. Oh yes, there is one more thing expectant mothers must know, and that is: Among us Jews there is a widespread belief that if a pregnant woman bites into an ethrog she will bear a male child.

For the New-Born Babe: According to the strict Shammait, the famous opponent of the gentle Hillel, even a tiny tot must observe the mitzvah of dwelling in a succah. We are told that when his daughter-in-law gave birth to a boy on the Feast of Tabernacles he broke through the roof of the chamber in which she lay, so he could make a succah of it.

For Dreamers:

In case any of you ever happen to dream of an ethrog, and you are troubled, we wish to inform you that there is no need to be worried, because seeing an ethrog in a dream, according to the Talmudic sage Rav Joseph, means that one is "precious before his Maker." And in case you dream of that member of the Succoth bouquet known as the hadas (myrtle), we wish you to know that it also is a good sign. According to the above-mentioned sage it signifies that one's business undertakings will prosper, and if one does not have any business, then it means that an inheritance will fall to his lot.

Watch These Rabbits Perform: Rabbi Simeon ben Gamaliel, the Talmud tells us, would juggle with eight torches during the Succoth festivities in the Temple, throwing them in the air and catching them again. And Rabbi Simeon was not the only sage who could perform such feats. The Talmud, for example, also informs us that the scholar Levi would juggle with eight knives before the famous Jewish leader Judah the Prince, and that the scholar Samuel would juggle with eight cups of wine before King Sapor of Persia. And now that these venerable sages have concluded their performance, we too will conclude. A happy holiday to all of you!

Max Winograd Elected Secretary of Law League

FORMER CHICAGOAN WINS TEL AVIV POST

First American in High Palestinian Office

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcar, Agency)—The vacancy in the Tel Aviv Municipal Council caused by the death of Mayot Meier Dizengoff was filled by the choice of Nathan D. Kaplan, former Chicago lawyer and first American to receive a high office in Palestine.

The choice of a mayor was held up for the time being. Meanwhile Mr. Kaplan, who is president of the Palestine Trust Company, holds a post in the governing body of this all-Jewish city.

After coming to Palestine in 1927 Mr. Kaplan founded the trust company of which he is now the head. He has been active in literary and other cultural activities in this city, and was one of the prominent Jews who greeted a party of United States Senators upon their arrival here on a tour of inspection last month.

Mr. Kaplan was one of the founders of the Knights of Zion, the forerunner of the Middle Western Zionist Federation of the United States, and its president in 1914. He was also the leading spirit in the founding and direction of the Chicago Hebrew Institute.

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Rumor Hitler May Resign

Grand-Daughter of Jew Will Be First Lady of Anti-Semitic Germany

New York (WNS)—The possibility that the granddaughter of a Jew may become first lady of anti-Semitic Germany was envisaged when the Associated Press reported from Berlin that there is a widespread rumor that Adolf

Hitler may resign as chancellor and be succeeded by General Hermann Wilhelm Goering, whose anti-Semitism has always been much less violent than that of his chief. Frau Goering is the former Emmy Sonnemann, granddaughter of a brother of Leopold Sonnemann, founder of the Frankfurter Zeitung.

The Associated Press says that high Nazi circles are discussing a plan whereby Hitler would turn over all administrative functions to Goering while the Nazi dictator would remain Der Fuehrer, serving as "the moral voice of the nation." This arrangement, the correspondent declares, "was believed to be under consideration as a measure to free Hitler from routine duties of state and offer him the opportunity to formulate, unhindered, the policies and programs which Goering, in his part, would undertake to make effective."

PLAN HEBREW CHAIR FOR M. DIZENGOFF

Record Throng Attends Funeral for Mayor

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Permanent tribute will be paid to the memory of Meier Dizengoff, late Mayor and founder of Tel Aviv, by the Palestine Friends of the Hebrew University and by the Jewish National Fund. It is announced here. A chair will be founded in the Hebrew University to commemorate Mayor Dizengoff, and the National Fund will establish a new forest to be named after him. His name was also given to the first child born after his death in Tel Aviv.

Mayor Dizengoff left a modest estate, the major part of which has been bequeathed to the Tel Aviv museum, which he founded. His will, dated January 1, 1936, after being opened, was transferred to the Tel Aviv rabbiniate for validation.

Although the contents of the will have not yet been published it is reported that Mayor Dizengoff, who helped to acquire for the Jewish population great sections of the valuable real estate of Tel Aviv, had only a small sum at the time of his death. The Museum, to which he bequeathed the major part of his funds, represents the principal cultural achievement of his life, having been opened early this year with a splendid collection of various representations of Jewish art.

Brown Out to Avenge Last Year's Defeat by R. I.

Brown faced Rhode Island State College in the 25th meeting between the two institutions tomorrow afternoon determined to avenge last year's 13-7 upset by the Rams. In the 24 games that the two intra-state rivals have played, Rhode Island has scored only three times and has collected a total of 26 points to Brown's 424.

Fate, score, and records will have little meaning as this '36 Brown team faces the Ram, for Brown is determined to humble the Ram. While Brown has played one game against Connecticut State, Rhode Island has two games in her background, for she has met American International and University of Maine.

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Find Maccabee Souvenirs Are "Made in Germany"

New York (WNS)—Outraged by the belated discovery that miniature soccer footballs with blue and white ribbons sold as souvenirs at the Yankee Stadium during the game between the Palestine Maccabees and the New York All-Stars were made in Germany, the Joint Boycott Council, Dr. Alexander Rosenberg, vice president of the Maccabees Sports Organization, and the Federation of Polish Jews issued a joint statement attacking the concessionaires and warning American Jewry to be on the lookout for these souvenirs in other cities where the Maccabees are scheduled to play. The souvenir, all had the words "Made in Germany" stamped on them, but only close inspection revealed the mark, since an attempt had been made to scratch them out.

Orphans Win Strike for Return of Comrade's Body

Warsaw (WNS)—Children in a Warsaw Jewish orphanage scored a quick victory in an unusual strike. Learning that the body of one of the orphans who had died had been handed over to Jewish medical students for anatomical purposes, the entire orphanage went on a hunger strike. For 48 hours the children refused to partake of food, insisting that the body of the dead youngster be given a Jewish burial. Unable to end the strike, the officials of the orphanage obtained the body and buried it according to Jewish ritual.

Seamen Protest Nazi Conviction of Simpson

Washington, D. C. (WNS)—While seamen in American ports staged a one-day "sit-down" strike to protest the arrest and imprisonment of Lawrence Simpson, American seamen by the Nazi People's Court, the State Department announced that it was still looking into Simpson's case. Joseph Kane of the International Seamen's Union told Secretary of State Hull that the imprisonment of Simpson would make all American seamen "feel insecure" on entering German ports.

Seattle (WNS)—Calling the conviction of his son, Lawrence Simpson, an "outrage," John G. Simpson, 70-year-old father of the American seaman, declared here that he intends to continue the fight for his son's vindication.

Jew Slugged After Preparing for Yom Kippur

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The old city of Jerusalem, in a solemn mood as it prepared for the ushering in of Jewry's most sacred holiday, the Day of Atonement, was deeply stirred as Aaron Tsilig, 25-year-old pious Jew was attacked and badly beaten by Arabs as he left the ritual bath prescribed by Jewish tradition.

Synagogues throughout the country were looking forward to unusually large attendance at Yom Kippur services as the Jewish community goes to prayer to appeal for a respite from the 23-week-old reign of terror and violence that has held the Holy Land in its grip.

The 8th Jewish victim of the disorder was sent to his death at Victor Dwek, 25, was fatally shot while transferring goods from a store in the old city of Jerusalem. The identity of the sniper who poured the bullets into

Dwek's body was not immediately learned.

A government bulletin reveals that at least 47 Arabs met death or wounding in clashes with troops near Nablus and Hebron. A total of four British soldiers was also wounded.

Of 34 Arab casualties in the Nablus encounter, 41 were shot down by aircraft which had come to reinforce the royal Scots Fusiliers and the Lincolnshire regiment. At least three Arabs were killed in the fighting near Hebron in addition to an unknown number who were carried away by their comrades.

Simchath Torah Party Arranged at Beth-Israel

Concluding days of the Succoth festival will be observed at Temple Beth-Israel on next Thursday and Friday, with services each day at 9 o'clock. On Thursday, a Memorial Service will be recited at 10 o'clock. At 7 o'clock Thursday evening, a Simchath Torah party for the children of the Religious School will take place with Hakofoth and procession of the Torah. All children present will be given banners and goodies by members of the Sisterhood. An innovation this year will be a School Consecration and awarding of prizes for the previous year.

The Sisterhood will hold its first meeting of the season on Monday afternoon. A book review by Rabbi Morris Schussheim will be the feature of the program.
