KADIMAH CHORAL BEGINS SEASON

Following a second rehearsal held last Monday night, Mrs. Joseph Webber, president of the Kadimah Choral Society, announced that the organization would rehearse weekly on Monday evenings at Room 415 in the Hopkin Homestead Building, 357 Westminster street. These will be the permanent rehearsal quarters for the organization during the coming year, Mrs. Webber further stated.

Plans for its second season have already been formulated. Prof. Arthur Einstein will once again direct the choir. Now that the chorus has sufficient room in which to rehearse, Mrs. Webber said it is expected that a larger chorus than last year will be organized. There are still a number of openings for male voices, and those desiring voice trials need only appear at the rehearsal studio, or appointments may be made with Professor Einstein.

Last year the chorus numbered fifty voices; this year with its first successful season behind them, leaders of the organization feel certain that a larger chorus group will be presented at its next concert.

FUND CONTRIBUTIONS SHOW INCREASES

Work of Welfare Society Is Outlined

With the Providence Community Fund Campaign half over, team captains are reporting that the general trend is toward increased contributions this year. Although this is not so with all divisions, it is expected that the average increase will aid the fund in reaching its quota. It is hoped, however, that the fund will go over the top, so that the agencies will be able to get away from their "starvation" budgets.

Miss Jessie Josolowitz, Executive Director of the Jewish Family Welfare Society, when questioned concerning the activities of her group, offered the following information:

The Jewish Family Welfare Society as one of the five Jewish member agencies of the Providence Community Fund, is the youngest of the group, having been established some seven years ago. Since that time it has made rapid strides in establishing itself as a valuable and necessary communal agency.

Serves Jewish Families

The Society in the past year served 268 Jewish families, representing 1366 men, women, and children. These family groups have presented such problems as unemployment, ill health, behavior and personality disorders, old age, domestic discord and desertion. In each instance, a careful study of the situation is made, the contributing

Gets High Honor Poland Makes Demand For Treaty Agreement

Moscow (WNS)—Disposing of wild rumors that Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet Commissar of Foreign Affairs, was to be removed because of feeling against him on account of his being a Jew, the Soviet government honored him on his 60th birthday by conferring upon him the Order of Lenin, the Soviet Union's highest decoration. The Order was presented to Litvinoff at the Kremlin in the presence of the highest Soviet officials. Stalin himself pinned the decoration on Litvinoff's lapel.

Social Worker Dies

New York (WNS)—George M. Hyman, former executive secretary of Avukah and of the American Friends of the Hebrew University, is dead here at the age of 36. One of the best-known Jewish social workers in the country, Mr. Hyman had been executive director of the Syracuse Jewish Center, assistant registrar of the Hebrew University in Palestine and, at the time of his death, executive director of the Central Jewish Institute, Mr. Hyman was associated with the Hebrew University during the riots of 1929. In the absence of other officials he was in virtual charge and distinguished himself in defending the University against Arab marauders.

Warsaw (WNS)—The Polish government is demanding the right to determine which Polish Jews shall get immigration certificates to Palestine as the price for signing a transfer agreement with the Jewish Agency which would enable Polish Jews with capital to take their capital with them to Palestine in the form of goods.

Negotiations regarding the agreement have been going on for some time between Isaac Gruenbaum, member of the Agency Executive, and Polish officials, but it has not yet been signed. The Haint, Zionist organ, which disclosed Poland's demand, opposes giving the government any say in the allocation of certificates.

Pogroms Kill Two

Warsaw (WNS)—The renewed anti-Jewish terror in Poland claimed two more Jewish victims when Joseph Bercovitz and Israel Zindel died of wounds received in a shooting affray outside a Lemberg cafe. The two Jews were fatally wounded in repulsing an attack by a gang of anti-Semites. At Vilna nationalist students attacked Jews in the university and in the streets, seriously injuring many.

ARABS WILL FIGHT IMMIGRATION PLAN

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Arab leaders have given notice through an editorial in Falastin, Arabic Daily, that they would fight the efforts of Polish statesmen to stimulate Jewish immigration from Poland into Palestine. The warning against a further Jewish influx was provoked in Falastin by the conversations which Col. Josef Fleck, Polish Foreign Secretary has been having in London with Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden regarding the intensification of Jewish immigration from Poland to Palestine.

"Poland wishes to rid itself of the Jews who have been blood sucking and enthralling it," the Falastin asserts, adding "But the Arabs also do not wish the Jews to enthrall them. Therefore, we will continue our fight against Jewish immigration."

GRECE BANS HEBREW

Saloniki (WNS)—Teaching of Hebrew in the Jewish schools has been forbidden by the Greek government. Henceforth only the fundamentals of the Jewish religion may be taught.

Fear Anti-Fascist Law May be Two-Edged Sword

London (WNS)—While approving in general the objectives of the anti-Fascist bill introduced in the House of Commons under government auspices, liberal and labor circles here are reported to be seriously concerned lest a law aimed at curbing Fascism and anti-Semitism turn out to be a two-edged sword which could be used against liberals and workers.

The latter groups are especially aroused because the bill gives very much enlarged powers to the police which enable them to determine when public meetings and demonstrations may or may not be held. The National Council for Civil Liberties has convened an extraordinary meeting of its executive committee to decide on what should be done about this phase of the anti-Fascist bill.

The Board of Deputies of British Jews at its last meeting expressed satisfaction with the government's anti-Fascist bill but made it clear that the introduction of the bill would not be enough to meet the menace of anti-Jewish agitation.

All Jewish City Gets Loan From London

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—A loan of \$200,000 has been granted to this all-Jewish city by Barclay's Bank of London, it was revealed, with the report that additional sums would be made available to Tel Aviv by the City of London. The award of the loan by British banking officials was taken as an index of continued English confidence in the economic potentialities of Palestine. The loan was completed while the Arab general strike was still in progress. The sums being granted to Tel Aviv will be used for the improvement and beautification of this city of 150,000. Among the items upon which large expenditures will be made are those for water supply and drainage.

BRANDEIS NAMED HONORARY CITIZEN

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor)—This all-Jewish city of 150,000 souls paid its supreme tribute to Louis D. Brandeis, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, by electing him an honorary citizen of Tel Aviv on the occasion of his eightieth birthday. Less than 20 individuals have been awarded that signal distinction in the 26 years of the city's existence.

The only other American to have earned the honor is Miss Henrietta Szold, the 77-year old American social worker who is now head of the German Jewish children's settlement bureau of the Jewish Agency. The name of Justice Brandeis is now listed with that of the late Lord Balfour, General Jan Smuts and other world notables who have been elevated to honorary citizenship in the world's first all-Jewish city.

REFUGEE APPOINTED

Istanbul (WNS)—A German Jewish refugee has been appointed director of the new Turkish Art Academy by the Turkish government.

factors recognized and in the process of treatment conscious effort is directed toward a solution that will make for happier social and economic adjustment.

The Jewish Family Welfare Society is faced with the task of seeing to it that families should not be in material want. It helps to provide food, shelter, fuel, clothing and other essentials in living. It helps to coordinate many of the relief activities of voluntary philanthropic groups. Above all, it closely cooperates with all relief activities in the city, both public and private, which provide for Jewish families.

Rehabilitation Emphasized

Rehabilitation, helping people to help themselves, is constantly emphasized in the program of the organization. It considers as its responsibility helping members of the families under its care to take their normal place in society as independent, well-adjusted and self-respecting citizens.

The present Community Fund campaign is giving citizens of Providence an opportunity to serve their less fortunate brethren. They look to us for sustenance. We must not fail them. Maimonides, eminent Jewish philosopher of the Middle Ages, in naming his eight degrees or steps in the duty of charity has illustrated the modern trend in family welfare work.

He expresses it in the following manner: "the most meritorious of all, is to anticipate charity, by preventing poverty; namely, to assist the reduced fellow-man, either by a considerable gift, or a sum of money, or by teaching him a trade, or by putting him in the way of business, so that he may earn an honest livelihood, and not be forced to the dreadful alternative of holding out his hand for charity. This is the highest step and the summit of charity's golden ladder."

Legion Halted
 Warsaw (WNS)—Marching from Warsaw to Palestine without passports or visas, 1,000 young uniformed Jews were dispersed by police when they reached the town Fryk, nine miles from here. W. Rippel, organizer of the march, was arrested for refusing to obey police orders to turn back. The march, organized to call attention to the need for increasing Palestine Jewish immigration, was stopped on the ground that the Jews were endangering their lives and were not properly equipped.

NON-CONFIDENCE IN MAYOR IS VOTED
Government Appointee Hit by Labor Group

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Tel Aviv's complicated and embittered mayoralty situation was further entangled when a majority of the members of the all-Jewish city's municipal council voted a resolution of non-confidence in Israel Rokach, appointed to the mayoralty two weeks ago by High Commissioner Sir Arthur Wauchope after the council by a majority vote had chosen Moshe Chelouche, another councillor.

Prior to the meeting, Dr. Rokach had been appealed to not to accept the appointment from the High Commissioner on the ground that it was an interference with the city's autonomy. When the meeting opened, Dr. Rokach made a statement and accepted the government's designation as chief executive of Tel Aviv in succession to the late Meier Dizengoff. Thereupon

the laborite members of the council, backed by Felix Rosenbluth, representing the German settlers, and Mr. Chelouche, an independent, expressed non-confidence on the basis of a resolution that Sir Arthur's appointment endangered the city's autonomy.

The right to sign checks and the chairmanship of the port and other committees would also be removed from him by the resolution which was tabled for consideration at the next meeting of the council.

High Distinction

When the Nazis declare a ban on the works of a great Jewish author it is no longer news. But it is news when they consider the expulsion of a great and impeccably Nordic author from the fold of those whose writings may be read by "Aryans."

It is news not only in the sense that the classic "man bites dog" is news, but also because it indicates that the Nazis do not really believe in their own racial theory when it conflicts with their so-called philosophy.

In other words, a Nordic, no matter how unsullied his ancestry or how pure his blood, ceases to be a Nordic in the Nazi "racial" sense when he makes so bold as to doubt the validity of any Nazi tenet.

Sigrid Undset has been world-famous for more years than Hitler, and for far better reason. Not only readers throughout the civilized world have recognized her genius, but the Nobel Prize Commission chose her some years ago as the recipient of the world's supreme literary award.

What is more, the Nazis themselves have on various occasions pointed to her as a living example of the excellence of the Nordic race. But now she has had the temerity to suggest that not all the good in the world is concentrated in the people of the Northland; with the result that the Nazis are taking back every admiring word they ever uttered about her.

We doubt that this reaction in Hitlerland comes as a great surprise to Sigrid Undset. In fact, we should not wonder if she regards it as one of the highest distinctions she has ever received in her long and successful literary career.

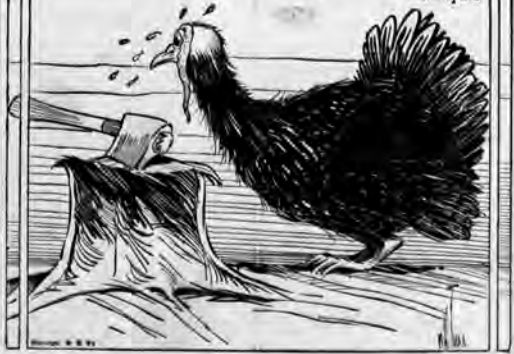

Recent Medicine Advances Review by Dr. Kramer

DR. MOSSINSOHN

On Sunday at 3:00 o'clock, Dr. Ben Zion Mossinsohn will address the first open meeting of the Providence Zionist District, at the Biltmore Hotel. He will speak on the present situation in Palestine.

Dr. Mossinsohn is a man who not only knows, but has lived his subject. Born in Russia in the late eighties, he early identified himself with the Zionist ideal and joined a group of fellow-students in going to Jaffa, Palestine in 1904 to become teachers. They wanted to begin molding the social and cultural aims and purposes of Jewish resettlement in Palestine. Dr. Mossinsohn and several of his associates founded the first major educational institute in Palestine, the Herzlia Gymnasium, of which he is the Principal today and of whose steady growth he has been the inspiration.

Because of his link with the Jewish National Home, Dr. Mossinsohn was called upon to stimulate the growth of Zionist sentiment throughout the world. The World Zionist Organization and Palestine Foundation Fund availed themselves of his knowledge, his fervor and his oratorical ability to send him to visit Jewish communities in Canada, Argentine, South Africa, England and the United States, to

which he has been a welcome guest several times during the past decade. At the World Zionist Congress held in Zurich in 1935 he was elected a Vice President of that biennial international gathering. He is one of the most influential figures in the so-called Center group of Zionists.
