ARRANGE EDUCATION DAY AT EMANU-EL

Israel S. Chipkin, director of the Jewish Educational Association of New York, will be guest speaker at the Annual Jewish Educational Day program to be held Tuesday at Temple Emanuel.

Mr. Chipkin is a lecturer at Columbia University and a contributor to many magazines. In order to achieve his two-fold aim of arousing the Jewish community to the importance of Jewish education, and to submit the large and varied educational program of Temple Emanuel to criticism, Mr. Chipkin will spend the entire day at Temple Emanuel. He will visit classes in the afternoon and will meet members of the school board and staff at a supper conference at 6:00 o'clock. Three demonstration lessons will be presented by Fred Weiser, Miss Esther Millman and Samuel Kessler between the hours of 7:30 and 8:15 o'clock.

Following the demonstration lessons, Dr. Joseph Smith, president of the Parent-Teachers Association, will introduce Mrs. Morris R. Grover, director of the nursery school at the Temple. She will show a technicolor movie of the school.

BEILINSON, NOTED EDITOR DEAD AT 50

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Moshe Beilinson, one of the chief editors of the Davar, Hebrew daily organ of the General Jewish Federation of Labor, died suddenly here at the age of 50. The Davar, which he edited, has the largest circulation of any Palestine paper, its influence among the Jewish population deriving from the fact that the Labor Federation embraces 100,000 people, or about one-fourth of the country's Jewish population.

Having been an active and influential journalist for many years, his colleagues had forgotten that he started life as a Doctor of Medicine, switching early to journalism when he went to Italy to found a Yiddish newspaper there.

Since his arrival in Palestine, Beilinson mastered the Hebrew language, in which he became as highly regarded for his powerful editorials as he was in the Yiddish tongue.

Woman is Jailed for Wearing Nazi Colors

Amsterdam (WNS)—Rigorously enforcing Holland's ban on the wearing of political uniforms, a court convicted a woman salesman of a Nazi magazine in Utrecht because she was wearing a black dress with a red collar. Black and red are the Nazi colors.

ROAD C'NSTRUCTION URGED BY SPEAKER

Dr. Mossinsohn is Guest at Open Meeting

Expressing the belief that the Jews were fortunate that all Palestinian disorders came in the summer and not in the rainy season, Dr. Ben Zion Mossinsohn, guest speaker at the first open meeting of the Providence Zionist District, held last Sunday at the Biltmore Hotel, urged that money be raised to build cement roads that will link the Jewish colonies and settlements. He further stated that facilitation of connections to these isolated spots would be possible should other disorder arise.

The meeting was opened by Joseph Smith, president. He introduced Mrs. Archibald Silverman, who installed the new officers, Philip Marcus, the new president, after his speech of acceptance, introduced the guest speaker.

The new officers of the organization are as follows: Philip V. Marcus, president; Hillel Hassenfeld, Maurice W. Hendel and Max Winograd, vice-presidents; Jacob S. Children desiring membership in these clubs may go to the nearest meeting place on Tuesday evenings.

Report Spanish Rebels Plan Anti-Jewish Laws

Paris—A special correspondent of the Paris Tageszeitung, of which Georg Bernhard is the editor, reports from Spain concerning the close connection of the Spanish rebels with the German Nazis and the anti-Semitic measures planned by General Franco, rebel leader. The correspondent declares that the Spanish government has disclosed the following information concerning the anti-Semitic intentions of the rebels, stating:

"We have just been informed that the authorities of the provinces occupied by the rebels have received a secret order which obliges them to establish within 48 hours special lists of all citizens of Jewish descent who are to be considered as suspicious individuals.

"General Franco has yielded to the pressure from certain sources of National-Socialist origin and declares to the German officers of his army that from now on no Jew will be permitted to occupy any public office.

"The foreign merchants and real estate owners of Jewish descent should not be affected directly by this policy but they will be subject to more strict supervision. The present control of all enterprises places the interest of 'economy of Fascist Spain' in the forefront above everything else.

Vladeck Praises Palestine; But Still Opposes Zionism

New York (WNS)—B. Charney Vladeck, president of the ORT Federation and general manager of the Jewish Daily Forward, returned from a visit to Palestine singing the praises of Jewish achievements there, and especially those of the Jewish labor movement, but reported that he is still opposed to Zionism. He said that the Arab terror had not halted Jewish progress in the Jewish Homeland and that he felt more sympathy toward Jewish achievements there, but added that he is "more convinced than ever that Zionism is a political mistake."

Kehillah Strikers Faint in Warsaw

Warsaw (WNS)—Scores of employees of the Warsaw kehillah who are on strike fainted on the picket line in front of the kehillah's office. They are striking for three and a half months' back pay. Several thousand children who attend the schools supported by the kehillah are preparing a demonstration in front of the kehillah's office as a gesture of sympathy with the strikers.

LEGION OF DECENCY HITS NAZI FILMS

New York (WNS)—A plea to the Catholic Legion of Decency to condemn all Nazi-made and pro-Nazi films in its "moral estimates of current motion pictures" has been forwarded to the Legion by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League in a letter to the Legion's executive secretary, Reverend Dr. Joseph Daly, from Mrs. Mark Harris, acting chairman of the League.

Urging cooperation between the two groups, Mrs. Harris declared that "we are aware, of course, that the Legion of Decency has an avowed aim to establish in the motion picture industry a set of standards of morality and decency higher than the standards now subscribed to."

Conversion, Intermarriage Curtail Jewish Population

Budapest (WNS)—Conversion and intermarriage are making heavy inroads into the Jewish population of Hungary, according to official statistics. In 1920 the Jews of Budapest numbered 215,000, while today this number has been reduced to 150,000. It is reported that last year there were 768 Jews who married out of the Jewish faith.

SIR SIMON REFUSES TO AMPLIFY CLAIM

Mosley Denies Statement; Asks for Proof

London (WNS)—Sir Oswald Mosley's Fascist blackshirts are receiving financial backing from foreign sources, Sir John Simon, Home Secretary, told the House of Commons. Although Sir John declined to amplify his sensational statement, it was learned from well-informed sources that his assertion was based on a thoroughgoing inquiry which disclosed a foreign link to the blackshirts.

Mosley immediately denied the charge and demanded that Sir John prove his assertion. Mosley also attacked the anti-Fascist bill now pending in Parliament, declaring it was "a frame-up against his followers."

The bill empowers the police to forbid public demonstrations in sections where such demonstrations may interfere with public order, and in the event the police cannot guarantee order they are authorized to forbid the demonstrations for stated periods. The act also strengthens the existing Public Meeting Act by giving the police increased power to curb attempts to break up meetings.

DEMAND GREATER SHARE IN POLICE

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The demobilization of three hundred super-numeraries, special police taken on by the Palestine Government during the disturbances, was made the occasion for a demand by the Hebrew press of the country that Jews be allowed a greater proportion in the police force of Palestine.

Those dismissed were in the Jaffa District, where the attacks started on April 19th. One hundred super-numeraries still remain in that area.

"The Jewish super-numeraries saved the country from heavy calamities," the Hebrew press asserts. "Now the strengthening of the Jewish element in the Palestine police must be assured, for the disturbances revealed that owing to its one-sidedness the police force was the weakest section of the Administration."

Jews Sell Two Leading Papers in Bucharest

Bucharest (WNS)—The Dimineatra and the Adevrul, Roumania's outstanding daily newspapers, have been sold by their Jewish owners to a Roumanian syndicate. The Jewish publishers decided to get out of the newspaper business because they could no longer endure the terrorist campaign of the anti-Semites, who repeatedly destroyed trucks carrying the papers and raided the publishing offices. Anti-Semitic circles here regard the sale of the two papers as an important triumph.

Rassenschande Trial Increase is Expected

Berlin (WNS)—An indication that trials for "Rassenschande," or racial pollution, will increase shortly and prosecution of Jews on this count will be more frequent is seen in the announcement of State Secretary Heydrich that enforcement of the Nuremberg laws is being discussed by the secret police, which he heads, and the Justice Ministry. The more rigid enforcement of "treason" laws also is being contemplated.

A Victim of Prosperity

This short narrative is based on the experience of one of our late Jewish physicians who had practiced medicine here for many years.

It was on a cold mid-winter evening shortly after the World War and during that great wave of prosperity when men, who had previously struggled for a bare existence, were moving into palatial homes, were driving about in costly motor cars and were dabbling in stocks, that let us call him, Dr. X, received a hurry call to a sick man in one of the old six tenement houses on North Davis street.

A hurry call—and when, dear friend, has a call for a doctor ever been other than a hurry call?—Dr. X quickly closed his desk, slipped into his big raccoon coat, lighted a cigar, dashed out of his office, threw himself into the front seat of his old Ford car and off he went—on another errand of mercy.

A knock on the door and a female voice from within answered: "Come in!"

Greeted by Patient's Wife

Inside, Dr. X was greeted by a shriveled up, little, old woman, the wife of the patient, and was amazed by the presence of a trained nurse in her snow-white uniform, standing at the door leading to the sick man's room. A trained nurse on a case on North Davis street!—And Dr. X, although he himself could not materially testify to it, was at last, most conclusively, convinced that he was living in an era of great prosperity.

The nurse stepped forward and after introducing herself to the doctor, proceeded to acquaint him with the nature of the case.

Children Send Doctor

"The old gentleman took sick with a bad cold about two weeks ago. His children immediately sent their doctor to look after him, and engaged me on the case. He is over his cold but is unable to retain food. He vomits everything that we are giving him," related the nurse.

"Doctor X!—My old friend—You, only you can help me," exclaimed the old man, his eyes sparkling with joy, when Doctor X entered his room.

Doctor X stood and beheld the patient; an old man with a long, silver-white beard and a black skull cap on a still whiter head, resting on a large, square, white pillow, in an old, white-enameled iron bed with big brass knobs on the posts. And as his doctor and looked at him he recalled having once been his family physician and household God.

Remembrances

But that was a long, long time ago, long before the World War, when that man's beard was still a raven black and when he, then a poor rag picker and the father of a large family of young children, lived on Kane street—that short, narrow, alley-like, unpaved little street which could not be crossed or traversed on a dark night without interfering with the freedom of assembly of its other, more numerous, small, subterranean, four-legged inhabitants.

Thanks to the war, this man's children were now very wealthy, were living in the most exclusively residential section of the city and were keeping their old parents in great comfort—on North Davis street.

Old Man Is Pleased

"Oh, my dear doctor! I have been begging my children all this time to send for you, for one of my kind, one who would understand me, but they, they—" said the old man, looking aside.

"That's alright, Mister Cohen. That's alright—till me what ails you now," said Dr. X as he sat down on a chair close to the side of the bed and took

Lipsky Celebrates His 60th Birthday Monday

GREEN PLEDGES AID AGAINST FASCISM

Says Workers Must Stand Against Dictatorships

Tampa, Fla. (WNS)—Warning labor that the workers of the world must "stand like a Rock of Gibraltar" in defense of Democracy, William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, told the annual convention of the Federation that the organization will continue its anti-Nazi boycott.

Bitterly attacking Fascism and dictatorships, Mr. Green said: "The church may fail, the chambers of commerce may be impotent and the civic leaders may lack the power to deal with the tyranny of dictatorial rule. But the trade union movement—at which dictators strike first—has the strength to prevent the rise of dictatorship any time and any place. Democracy in the keeping of trade unionism: And if freedom comes again to the nations now under an iron rule it will come through rebellion of the working people."

SCORES OPPONENTS OF PROBLEM TALKS

Rabbi Heller Hits Receding Faith in Judaism

New York (WNS)—Jewish lay leaders who seek to curb discussion of social problems from the pulpits of synagogues were attacked by Rabbi James G. Heller of Cincinnati in a sermon at the sixth annual convention of the northeast region of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

Deplored the fact that "life has departed from the synagogue," Rabbi Heller said that "our laymen are disturbed by the entry into it, in this guise, of the tragic and tumultuous life about us. Some contend that the synagogue is not the place for the prophetic message, that it should play primarily a priestly role, or, let us say, as one of my colleagues said not long ago, that it should stand for the eternal verities. I might pause to ask of what significance the eternal verities are to us if they cannot be read in the urgent, though temporal problems of the day?"

Receding faith in Judaism among American Jews was also denounced by Rabbi Heller, who said that "for us Jewishness has become nothing but a social relationship. We no more know how to pray and we have even forgotten how to weep and sing. From a kingdom of priests we have become a kind of traders. The ignorance of Judaism among our people is complete. Life has departed from the synagogue."

Author's Attack on Race Theories Angers Nazis

Berlin (WNS)—Angered because Sigrid Undset, famous Norwegian author and Nobel Prize winner, had bitterly attacked the Nazi racial theories, the Westdeutscher Beobachter is demanding an official ban on her books throughout Germany, and the elimination of her writings from German newspapers. "Frau Undset has betrayed the heartfelt hospitality she enjoyed in our cultural life," the paper said. "She did not deserve the veneration which was accorded her by wide circles of our people."

COMMISSION WILL HEAR WEIZMANN

Immigration Policies Are Studied at Session

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, who has just returned from London, will be the first Jewish witness to appear before the British Royal Commission, it was reported.

The members of the Royal Commission, which is investigating the administration of the League of Nation's mandate for Palestine, are touring various parts of the country. They will go north to the Lake Huleh region, which Jewish groups are now reclaiming after centuries of disuse.

They will then visit the Haifa Harbor, inspect the Nesher cement works and the generating plant of the Palestine electric corporation, managed by PinCUS Rutenberg, at Naharain.

It is believed that the Jewish witnesses will begin offering their evidence next week, after the problem of the acquisition, sale and availability of the Palestine land is brought up. The Jewish Agency for Palestine has indicated that it wants its witnesses to be heard publicly and not in private session.

No Jewish Issue Involved

An unfortunate tendency has made its appearance in American Jewish life of late. There are a number of Jewish men in public life who are laboring under the mistaken idea that Jewish leadership must tackle "the Communist danger."

These gentlemen are very much frightened by the activities of those anti-Semitic groups that make it a practice to use the words Communist and Jew as interchangeable synonyms.

Thus former Judge Joseph Proskauer, David T. Wilentz and many others have recently in their public addresses tried to prove that the Jews play a minor role in the American Communist movement and that such Jews as are Communists are traitors not only to America but also to Judaism. These same speakers then imply that it is the task of Jewish leadership to fight the Jewish Communists not only as opponents in the economic or political field, but as Jews.

Such an attitude is fraught with danger. The Communists in this free democracy of ours enjoy the status of a legal political party. Much as all of us might disagree with Communism as a form of government or a political philosophy, we have no business to inject the Jewish issue into this political struggle between parties.

It is just as ludicrous to make a special Jewish effort against Communists as it would be to make a specifically Jewish onslaught on any other political party. The fact that anti-Semites try to create the impression that all Jews are Communists is a poor excuse.

If we were to follow this line of reasoning we manoeuvre ourselves into the position of being obliged also to form a Jewish opposition against Jewish bankers and capitalists, for there are quite as many anti-Semites who attempt to have it appear that all international bankers and capitalists are Jews.

Facts speak for themselves. No intelligent American swallows any of this anti-Semitic propaganda about Jewish Communists or Jewish capitalists. If Judge Proskauer and those who agree with him want to fight Communism, more power to them. But let them keep off the Jewish issue. It does not belong in this purely politico-economic battle which they may and perhaps should fight—but only as Americans, and never as American Jews.

ARABS INSIST ON WAR-TIME PLEDGE

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The British Royal Commission will be called upon to give first consideration to the war-time pledge of independence which Great Britain is alleged to have given to the Arabs, it is reported. Arab sources say that the Arab Higher Committee, which has officially declared a boycott of the Commission's sessions, is preparing a memorandum in which Lord Peel and his associates will be asked to begin their hearings with a study of the agreement reached on July 14, 1915, between Sherif Hussein of Mecca and Sir Henry MacMahon, then British High Commissioner in Egypt. The Arabs maintain that the terms of this agreement, providing for the establishment of a large independent Arab state, precede the Balfour Declaration, issued by England on November 2, 1917, pledging her aid to the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine.

Rosenwald Fund to Help Hospital Insurance Plan

Chicago (WNS)—The Julius Rosenwald Fund has given \$100,000 to the American Hospital Association for a five-year study of voluntary hospital insurance and for the development of such insurance plans, Edwin R. Embree, president of the Fund, has announced. The study is to be conducted by a special committee headed by Dr. C. Rufus Rorem of Chicago and including Dr. Basil C. MacLean, Rochester, N. Y.; Dr. E. C. Buckler, Madison, Wis.; Dr. S. S. Goldwater, New York; and Mgr. Maurice F. Griffin, Cleveland.

Frankfurter's Father To Ask Mercy for Him

Salonki (WNS)—The father of David Frankfurter, Yugoslavian Jewish student who will go on trial in Switzerland on December 9th for the murder of Wilhelm Gustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, will send a plea to his son's judges to be merciful but will not attend the trial. This was revealed by Dr. Isaac Alcalay, chief rabbi of Yugoslavia, who is visiting here. Dr. Alcalay said that the elder Frankfurter, who is a rabbi, will condemn his son's deed.

Has New Job



JESSE LASKY

Hollywood, Calif.—In his new association with RKO-Radio Pictures Studios in Hollywood as a producer, Jesse Lasky, pioneer movie-maker, is heading his own unit and expects to have unlimited opportunities to continue his unbroken record as an outstanding fashioner of films. Recently the Pickford-Lasky combine was ended and Mr. Lasky was offered a position in practically every major film studio in Hollywood.

Jesse L. Lasky's colorful career in the films since its inception twenty-one years ago is comparable to a history of the motion picture business.

MUSSOLINI AIDS JEWISH STUDENT

Warsaw (WNS)—Thanks to the personal intervention of Premier Mussolini of Italy, Janiec Berg, Polish Jewish student, will be able to continue his studies in Rome. Berg has just received from the Italian dictator a sum of money and an invitation to return to Italy. He had previously studied at Rome, but returned to Warsaw when his funds ran out. During the recent anti-Jewish student riots at the University of Warsaw Berg wrote to Il Duce asking him for help. In reply Mussolini forwarded money and arranged for Berg to resume his studies in Italy.

Brown Closes Season With Colgate Game

Brown comes to the end of another road this week when the varsity eleven meets the high-powered Colgate Red Raiders on Brown Field in the annual Thanksgiving Day attraction. The Maroon will rate a heavy favorite to take the 21st game in a series that dates back to 1908. Colgate leads in the series with nine triumphs, Brown has seven, and four have ended ties.

FAMOUS PHYSICIAN DIES IN PALESTINE

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Dr. Joseph Stein, noted Jewish leader and physician, formerly President of the Palestine Medical Association, is dead here at the age of 73. Born in Bolognoval, Russia, Dr. Stein received his medical degree from the University of Kiev in 1890. He practised as a physician in Bolognoval and Velsawetgrad, Russia, until 1922 when he left that country to settle in Palestine.

Taking a large interest in Russian Jewish communal affairs, he was Chairman of the Municipality and Communist Council in Velsawetgrad until 1920. From 1920 until 1922 he was Chairman of the Municipal Council of Odessa. He was one of the pioneers in co-operative activities and one of the founders, in 1905, of the Jewish Territorial Organisation in Russia. An active Zionist, he was a delegate to several of the World Zionist Congresses and did much to stimulate early Jewish immigration to Palestine. He was the founder of two public clinics in Tel Aviv and, until 1932, head of the Doctors' Association in Palestine. He was a prolific contributor to medical journals and editor of *Arifufah*. Dr. Stein was also credited with a number of medical discoveries, both in Russia and in Palestine.

Nazi Decree on Foreign Securities Aimed at Jews

Berlin (WNS)—The new Nazi decree compelling owners of foreign securities admitted to trading on German exchanges to deposit them with Reichsbank is in part aimed at the Jews.

ITALIAN PRESS IGNORES EVENTS

Claims Zionism is Menace to Mediterranean Powers

Rome (WNS)—Aroused by what appears to be an organized press campaign to impugn their loyalty to the Fascist regime, Italian Jews are engaged in a series of nation-wide patriotic manifestations, in honor of the proclamation of Italy as an empire.

The Kehliah in Rome sent a rare old Torah Scroll to the Falasches of Ethiopia. Milan Jewry presented Mussolini with 100,000 liras for him to distribute to any charities he wants. In Turin the Jews prepared a richly ornamented album containing a proclamation of loyalty which they sent to King Victor Emanuel. The Jews of Modena sent a gold Torah covering to the synagogue in Addis Ababa. Large patriotic meetings were held by the Jews in Venice, Genoa, Verona, Padua and other cities.

The Italian press, however, has completely ignored these occurrences and continues to attack the Jews. Regime Fascists again declared that the Jews are the rulers of Russia. Vita Italiana asserted that Zionism is a menace to the Mediterranean powers and added that it had no faith in Italian Jewry's protestations of loyalty.

55 REPORTED DEAD IN MOSLEM RIOTS

Clash Follows Signing of Lebanese Treaty

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Street rioting between Moslems and Christians is raging throughout Ibrut after a night of terror and violence which brought death to 55 on both sides, it is reported here from the capital of the Lebanese republic.

The riots, said to be the most serious racial clashes since the war, are a climax of a period of tension and mutual provocation that followed the signing of the Franco-Lebanese Treaty, which had failed to accede to Moslem demands for the exclusion of Tyre, Sidon and Tripoli from the Lebanese Republic and their inclusion in Syria.

HUGE ARAB BANK PLANNED BY PEERS

British Lords Exclude Jewish Participation

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The formation of a huge Arab bank in Palestine by pro-Arab peers, including Lords Winterton, Lloyd and Beaverbrook, is reported by Al Liwa, Arabic daily.

The founders of the bank, which will be known as the "Panarab Corporation," are said to be English supporters of the Arab aspirations in Palestine.

The bank, when established, will have a capital of \$2,500,000, the Arabic organ asserts. No Jew will be allowed to participate in the bank, according to the terms of the constitution as described by Al Liwa.

The initiator of the scheme, who will be managing director of the bank, is alleged to be Sir John Chancellor, former High Commissioner of Palestine, whose term of office witnessed the 1929 riots here.

S. AMERICAN JEWS UNDER SUSPICION

Rebel Victory in Spain Means Fascist Regime

New York (WNS)—A triumph for Fascism in Spain would be followed by the establishment of Fascist regimes in Brazil and Argentina, from which the Jews in those countries would suffer heavily, it was declared by H. Leiwick, eminent Yiddish poet and dramatist, on his return from Argentina, where he represented the Yiddish writers of America at the International Pen Clubs Congress.

Revealing that Brazil is already governed under a quasi-Fascist regime and that Fascism is becoming popular in Argentina, Mr. Leiwick said that the influence of Spanish culture and literature in Latin-America would have important repercussions there if the Fascist rebels won in Spain.

Discussing Jewish conditions in Brazil and Argentina, Mr. Leiwick revealed that in those countries the words Jew and communist are synonymous. In Brazil Jewish immigration has been halted, while in Argentina Jews must obtain special permission for all meetings and even when such permission is granted the meetings are watched by police spies.

Frankfurter Trial Will Open on December 9th

Geneva (WNS)—Wednesday, December 9, has been set as the opening date for the trial of David Frankfurter, Jewish medical student from Jugoslavia, who shot Wilhelm Bustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, at Davos, last February. The trial is expected to last three days. A stir was created in liberal circles here when the Swiss authorities banned the sale of "The Murder in Davos," by Emil Ludwig. The book, which tells the story of the shooting, was being sold to raise funds for Frankfurter's defense. At the same time another book on the same theme sponsored by Nazis is being sold freely.

ARRANGE EDUCATION DAY AT EMANU-EL

Israel S. Chipkin, director of the Jewish Educational Association of New York, will be guest speaker at the Annual Jewish Educational Day program to be held Tuesday at Temple Emanuel.

Mr. Chipkin is a lecturer at Columbia University and a contributor to many magazines. In order to achieve his two-fold aim of arousing the Jewish community to the importance of Jewish education, and to submit the large and varied educational program of Temple Emanuel to criticism, Mr. Chipkin will spend the entire day at Temple Emanuel. He will visit classes in the afternoon and will meet members of the school board and staff at a supper conference at 6:00 o'clock. Three demonstration lessons will be presented by Fred Weiser, Miss Esther Millman and Samuel Kessler between the hours of 7:30 and 8:15 o'clock.

Following the demonstration lessons, Dr. Joseph Smith, president of the Parent-Teachers Association, will introduce Mrs. Morris R. Grover, director of the nursery school at the Temple. She will show a technicolor movie of the school.

BEILINSON, NOTED EDITOR DEAD AT 50

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Moshe Beilinson, one of the chief editors of the Davar, Hebrew daily organ of the General Jewish Federation of Labor, died suddenly here at the age of 50.

The Davar, which he edited, has the largest circulation of any Palestine paper, its influence among the Jewish population deriving from the fact that the Labor Federation embraces 100,000 people, or about one-fourth of the country's Jewish population.

Having been an active and influential journalist for many years, his colleagues had forgotten that he started life as a Doctor of Medicine, switching early to journalism when he went to Italy to found a Yiddish newspaper there.

Since his arrival in Palestine, Beilinson mastered the Hebrew language, in which he became as highly regarded for his powerful editorials as he was in the Yiddish tongue.

Woman is Jailed for Wearing Nazi Colors

Amsterdam (WNS)—Rigorously enforcing Holland's ban on the wearing of political uniforms, a court convicted a woman salesman of a Nazi magazine in Utrecht because she was wearing a black dress with a red collar. Black and red are the Nazi colors.

ROAD C'NSTRUCTION URGED BY SPEAKER

Dr. Mossinsohn is Guest at Open Meeting

Expressing the belief that the Jews were fortunate that all Palestinian disorders came in the summer and not in the rainy season, Dr. Ben Zion Mossinsohn, guest speaker at the first open meeting of the Providence Zionist District, held last Sunday at the Biltmore Hotel, urged that money be raised to build cement roads that will link the Jewish colonies and settlements. He further stated that facilitation of connections to these isolated spots would be possible should other disorder arise.

The meeting was opened by Joseph Smith, president. He introduced Mrs. Archibald Silverman, who installed the new officers, Philip Marcus, the new president, after his speech of acceptance, introduced the guest speaker.

The new officers of the organization are as follows: Phillip V. Marcus, president; Hillel Hassenfeld, Maurice W. Hendel and Max Winograd, vice-presidents; Jacob S. Rabinowitz, corresponding secretary; Robert S. Grant, financial secretary and Dr. Ilie Berger, treasurer. There is also an executive committee of fifty.

Samuel Kessler to Head Judea Leaders' Course

A Young Judea Leaders' Course was opened last Monday evening at Temple Emanuel under the leadership of Samuel Kessler. Those desiring to join this course may communicate with Mr. Kessler, Temple Emanuel.

Young Judea Clubs have begun activities at Temple Beth-Israel, Temple Emanuel and the Douglas Avenue Synagogue. Clubs consist of boys and girls ranging in age from ten to eighteen years. Several of the groups are now working on Chanukah programs to be presented during the Chanukah week. Children desiring membership in these clubs may go to the nearest meeting place on Tuesday evenings.

Report Spanish Rebels Plan Anti-Jewish Laws

Paris—A special correspondent of the Paris Tagblatt, a paper which Georg Bernhard is the editor, reports from Spain concerning the close connection of the Spanish rebels with the German Nazis and the anti-Semitic measures planned by General Franco, related to the correspondent, declares that the Spanish government has disclosed the following information concerning the anti-Semitic intentions of the rebels, stating:

"We have just been informed that the authorities of the provinces occupied by the rebels have received a secret order which obliges them to establish within 48 hours special lists of all citizens of Jewish descent who are to be considered as suspicious individuals.

"General Franco has yielded to the pressure from certain sources of National-Socialist origin and declared to the German officers of his army that from now on no Jew will be permitted to occupy any public office.

"The foreign merchants and real estate owners of Jewish descent should not be affected directly by this policy but they will be subject to more strict supervision. The present control of all enterprises places the interest of 'economy of Fascist Spain' in the forefront above everything else.

Kovno (WNS)—Boris Rata, prominent Jewish businessman, is among those arrested in Soviet Russia in connection with an alleged Fascist and Nazi plot against the Soviet Union. Rata is the manager of the Russian branch of a German perfumery factory.

The board of directors of the Jewish Home for the Aged had their last meeting of the season last Tuesday evening at the Home, where new officers and directors were installed.

Samuel Magid, president, reported plans for the coming year. Mrs. Samuel Deutsch presented a report on new applications. Dr. Leo Cohen reported on health conditions of the Home residents. Max Segal, chairman of the house committee reported for that body. Isaac E. Feinstein, superintendent of the Home, gave his report of last year's activities.

Vladeck Praises Palestine; But Still Opposes Zionism

New York (WNS)—B. Charney Vladeck, president of the ORT Federation and general manager of the Jewish Daily Forward, returned from a visit to Palestine singing the praises of Jewish achievements there, and especially those of the Jewish labor movement, but reported that he is still opposed to Zionism. He said that the Arab terror had not halted Jewish progress in the Jewish Homeland and that he felt more sympathy toward Jewish achievements there, but added that he is "more convinced than ever that Zionism is a political mistake."

Kehillah Strikers Faint in Warsaw

Warsaw (WNS)—Scores of employees of the Warsaw kehillah who are on strike fainted on the picket line in front of the kehillah's office. They are striking for three and a half months' back pay. Several thousand children who attend the schools supported by the kehillah are preparing a demonstration in front of the kehillah's office as a gesture of sympathy with the strikers.

LEGION OF DECENCY HITS NAZI FILMS

New York (WNS)—A plea to the Catholic Legion of Decency to condemn all Nazi-made and pro-Nazi films in its "moral estimates of current motion pictures" has been forwarded to the Legion by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League in a letter to the Legion's executive secretary, Reverend Dr. Joseph Daly, from Mrs. Mark Harris, acting chairman of the League.

Urging cooperation between the two groups, Mrs. Harris declared that "we are aware, of course, that the Legion of Decency has an avowed aim to establish in the motion picture industry a set of standards of morality and decency higher than the standards now subscribed to."

Conversion, Inter-marriage Curtail Jewish Population

Budapest (WNS)—Conversion and inter-marriage are making heavy inroads into the Jewish population of Hungary, according to official statistics. In 1920 the Jews of Budapest numbered 215,000, while today this number has been reduced to 150,000. It is reported that last year there were 768 Jews who married out of the Jewish faith.

SIR SIMON REFUSES TO AMPLIFY CLAIM

Mosley Denies Statement; Asks for Proof

London (WNS)—Sir Oswald Mosley's Fascist blackshirts are receiving financial backing from foreign sources, Sir John Simon, Home Secretary, told the House of Commons. Although Sir John declined to amplify his sensational statement, it was learned from well-informed sources that his assertion was based on a thoroughgoing inquiry which disclosed a foreign link to the blackshirts.

Mosley immediately denied the charge and demanded that Sir John prove his assertion. Mosley also attacked the anti-Fascist bill now pending in Parliament, declaring it was "a frame-up against his followers."

The bill empowers the police to forbid public demonstrations in sections where such demonstrations may interfere with public order, and in the event the police cannot guarantee order they are authorized to forbid the demonstrations for stated periods. The act also strengthens the existing Public Meeting Act by giving the police increased power to curb attempts to break up meetings.

DEMAND GREATER SHARE IN POLICE

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The demobilization of three hundred super-numeraries, special police taken on by the Palestine Government during the disturbances, was made the occasion for a demand by the Hebrew press of the country that Jews be allowed a greater proportion in the police force of Palestine.

Those dismissed were in the Jaffa District, where the attacks started on April 19th. One hundred supernumeraries still remain in that area.

"The Jewish supernumeraries saved the country from heavy calamities," the Hebrew press asserts. "Now the strengthening of the Jewish element in the Palestine police must be assured, for the disturbances revealed that owing to its one-sidedness the police force was the weakest section of the Administration."

Jews Sell Two Leading Papers in Bucharest

Bucharest (WNS)—The Dimocata and the Adversar Roumanian's outstanding daily newspapers, have been sold by their Jewish owners to a Roumanian syndicate. The Jewish publishers decided to get out of the newspaper business because they could no longer endure the terrorist campaign of the anti-Semites, who repeatedly destroyed trucks carrying the papers and riddled the publishing offices. Anti-Semitic circles here regard the sale of the two papers as an important triumph.

Rassenschande Trial Increase is Expected

Berlin (WNS)—An indication that trials for "Rassenschande," or racial pollution, will increase shortly and prosecution of Jews on this count will be more frequent is seen in the announcement of State Secretary Heydrich that enforcement of the Nuremberg laws is being discussed by the secret police, which he heads, and the Justice Ministry. The more rigid enforcement of "treason" laws also is being contemplated.

A Victim of Prosperity

This short narrative is based on the experience of one of our late Jewish physicians who had practiced medicine here for many years.

It was on a cold mid-winter evening shortly after the World War and during that great wave of prosperity when men, who had previously struggled for a bare existence, were moving into palatial homes, were driving about in costly motor cars and were dabbling in stocks, that let us call him, Dr. X, received a hurry call to a sick man in one of the old six tenement houses on North Davis street.

A hurry call—and when, dear friend, has a call for a doctor ever been other than a hurry call?—Dr. X quickly closed his desk, slipped into his big raccoon coat, lighted a cigar, dashed out of his office, threw himself into the front seat of his old Ford car and off he went—on another errand of mercy.

A knock on the door and a female voice from within answered: "Come in!"

Greeted by Patient's Wife

Inside, Dr. X was greeted by a shriveled up, little, old woman, the wife of the patient, and was amazed by the presence of a trained nurse in her snow-white uniform, standing at the door leading to the sick man's room. A trained nurse on a case on North Davis street!—And Dr. X, although he himself could not materially testify to it, was at last, most conclusively, convinced that he was living in an era of great prosperity.

The nurse stepped forward and after introducing herself to the doctor, proceeded to acquaint him with the nature of the case.

Children Send Doctor

"The old gentleman took sick with a bad cold about two weeks ago. His children immediately sent their doctor to look after him, and engaged me on the case. He is over his cold but is unable to retain food. He vomits every thing that we are giving him," related the nurse.

Doctor X—My old friend—You only you can help me, I exclaimed to the old man, his eyes sparkling with joy, when Doctor X entered his room.

Doctor X stood and beheld the patient; an old man with a long, silvery-white beard and a black skull cap on a tall white hat, resting on a large square, white pillow, in an old, white-named, iron bed with big brass knobs on the posts. And as he stood and looked at him he recalled having once been his family physician and household God.

Remembrances

But that was a long, long time ago, long before the World War, when that man's beard was still a raven black and when he, then a poor rag picker and the father of a large family of young children, lived on Kane street—that short, narrow, alley-like, unpaved little street which could not be crossed or traversed on a dark night without interfering with the freedom of assembly of its other, more numerous, small, subterranean, four-legged inhabitants.

Thanks to the war, this man's children were now very wealthy, were living in the most exclusively residential section of the city and were keeping their old parents in great comfort—on North Davis street.

Old Man Is Pleased

"Oh, my dear doctor! I have been begging my children all this time to send for you, for one of my kind, one who would understand me, but they, they—" said the old man, looking aside.

"That's alright, Mister Cohen. That's alright—tell me what ails you now," said Dr. X as he sat down on a chair close to the side of the bed and took

He hails from Rochester, N. Y. Was educated at Columbia University. Launched his journalistic career as editor of a Jewish weekly in his home town.

Was chairman of the Zionist Organization of America from 1922 to 1924, and president from 1926 to 1932. Is now honorary president of the Z. O. A. and the only American member of the World Zionist Executive.

His hobby is the movies. Whenever he has no meeting in the evening he attends a moving picture show or a good play. He still knows more about dramatic criticism than most of the scribes of the theatrical pages. He plays an average game of chess and has acquired the European art of finishing the evening in a restaurant where, over a cup of coffee, he gives his polemic gift and his sharp-witted faculties free rein.

GREEN PLEDGES AID AGAINST FASCISM

Says Workers Must Stand Against Dictatorships

Tampa, Fla. (WNS)—Warning labor that the workers of the world must "stand like a Rock of Gibraltar" in defense of democracy, William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, told the annual convention of the Federation that the organization will continue its anti-Nazi boycott.

Bitterly attacking Fascism and dictatorships, Mr. Green said: "The church may fail, the chambers of commerce may be impotent and the civic leaders may lack the power to deal with the tyranny of dictatorial rule. But the trade union movement—that which dictators strike first—has the strength to prevent the rise of dictatorship any time and any place. Democracy in the keeping of trade unionism. And if freedom comes again to the nations now under an iron rule it will come through rebellion of the working people."

SCORES OPPONENTS OF PROBLEM TALKS

Rabbi Heller Hits Receding Faith in Judaism

New York (WNS)—Jewish lay leaders who seek to curb discussion of social problems from the pulpits of synagogues were attacked by Rabbi James G. Heller of Cincinnati in a sermon at the sixth annual convention of the northeast region of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

Deplored the fact that "life has departed from the synagogue." Rabbi Heller said that "our laymen are disturbed by the entry into it, in this guise, of the tragic and tumultuous life about us. Some contend that the synagogue is not the place for the prophetic message, that it should play primarily a priestly role, or, let us say, as one of my colleagues said not long ago, that it should stand for the eternal verities. I might pause to ask of what significance the eternal verities are to us if they cannot be read in the urgent, though temporal problems of the day?"

Receding faith in Judaism among American Jews was also denounced by Rabbi Heller, who said that "for us Jewishness has become nothing but a social relationship. We no more know how to pray and we have even forgotten how to weep and sing. From a kingdom of priests we have become a race of traders. The ignorance of Judaism among our people is complete. Life has departed from the synagogue."

Mme. Schumann-Heink Had Jewish Mother

The obituaries didn't mention it, but the late Ernestine Schumann-Heink had a Jewish mother and a Jewish grandmother. Her mother's name was Goldman. The beloved singer once said proudly that "I know that much of the artist in my heart, much of my deep love for people, and the fire that is in me, I owe to my little old Jewish grandmother, God rest her soul!"

Two of Mme. Schumann-Heink's sons married Jewish girls. She was a militant supporter of the anti-Nazi boycott. Two years ago she appeared at a concert for the benefit of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League. She received a tremendous ovation after she announced she would sing despite letters from Nazis threatening her life. And incidentally, she was not born in Germany, but in what is now Czechoslovakia.

Nazi Buggies

Erich Rix, Czech-German refugee, in Detroit to address Deutsch-Amerikanischer Kulturverband (German-American Culture League), anti-Nazi German group, tells the story about a German worker in a baby carriage factory in Hamburg. His pregnant wife asked him to bring home a baby buggy, but some came.

The baby arrived, but still no buggy. . . . Hubby then explained that his factory only makes the different parts for the carriage but does not assemble completed product. . . . Smart wife suggests that he bring a different part home each day and then assemble it himself. . . . Agreed. . . .

The next Sunday Heinz was busying himself in the kitchen with the buggy parts and the impatient wife called from the bedroom: "Why does it take so long to get that thing together?" "I can't understand it," replied Heinz. "No matter how I manipulate it, no matter how I arrange the parts, the darned thing still turns out to be a machine gun."

Berlin (WNS)—Angered because Sigrid Undset, famous Norwegian author and Nobel Prize winner, had bitterly attacked the Nazi racial theories the Westdeutscher Beobachter is demanding an official ban on her books throughout Germany, and the elimination of her writings from German newspapers. "Frau Undset has betrayed the heartfelt hospitality she enjoyed in our cultural life," the paper said. "She did not deserve the veneration which was accorded her by wide circles of our people."

COMMISSION WILL HEAR WEIZMANN

Immigration Policies Are Studied at Session

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, who has just returned from London, will be the first Jewish witness to appear before the British Royal Commission, it was reported.

The members of the Royal Commission, which is investigating the administration of the League of Nation's mandate for Palestine, are touring various parts of the country. They will go north to the Lake Huleh region, which Jewish groups are now reclaiming after centuries of disuse.

They will then visit the Haifa Harbor, inspect the Neshar cement works and the generating plant of the Palestine electric corporation, managed by PinCUS Rutenberg, at Naharain.

It is believed that the Jewish witnesses will begin offering their evidence next week, after the problem of the acquisition, sale and availability of Palestine land is brought up. The Jewish Agency for Palestine has indicated that it wants its witnesses to be heard publicly and not in private session.

No Jewish Issue Involved

An unfortunate tendency has made its appearance in American Jewish life of late. There are a number of Jewish men in public life who are laboring under the mistaken idea that Jewish leadership must tackle "the Communist danger."

These gentlemen are very much frightened by the activities of those anti-Semitic groups that make it a practice to use the words Communist and Jew as interchangeable synonyms.

Thus former Judge Joseph Proskauer, David T. Wilentz and many others have recently in their public addresses tried to prove that the Jews play a minor role in the American Communist movement and that such Jews as are Communists are traitors not only to America but also to Judaism. These same speakers then imply that it is the task of Jewish leadership to fight the Jewish Communists not only as opponents in the economic or political field, but as Jews.

Such an attitude is fraught with danger. The Communists in this free democracy of ours enjoy the status of a legal political party. Much as all of us might disagree with Communism as a form of government or a political philosophy, we have no business to inject the Jewish issue into this political struggle between parties.

It is just as ludicrous to make a special Jewish effort against Communists as it would be to make a specifically Jewish onslaught on any other political party. The fact that anti-Semites try to create the impression that all Jews are Communists is a poor excuse.

If we were to follow this line of reasoning we manoeuvre ourselves into the position of being obliged also to form a Jewish opposition against Jewish bankers and capitalists, for there are quite as many anti-Semites who attempt to have it appear that all international bankers and capitalists are Jews.

Facts speak for themselves. No intelligent American swallows any of this anti-Semitic propaganda about Jewish Communists or Jewish capitalists. If Judge Proskauer and those who agree with him want to fight Communism, more power to them. But let them keep off the Jewish issue. It does not belong in this purely politico-economic battle which they may and perhaps should fight—but only as Americans, and never as American Jews.

ARABS INSIST ON WAR-TIME PLEDGE

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The British Royal Commission will be called upon to give first consideration to the war-time pledge of independence which Great Britain is alleged to have given to the Arabs, it is reported. Arab sources say that the Arab Higher Committee, which has officially declared a boycott of the Commission's sessions, is preparing a memorandum in which Lord Peel and his associates will be asked to begin their hearings with a study of the agreement reached on July 14, 1915, between Sherif Hussein of Mecca and Sir Henry MacMahon, then British High Commissioner in Egypt. The Arabs maintain that the terms of this agreement, providing for the establishment of a large independent Arab state, precede the Balfour Declaration, issued by England on November 2, 1917, pledging her aid to the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine.

Rosenwald Fund to Help Hospital Insurance Plan

Chicago (WNS)—The Julius Rosenwald Fund has given \$100,000 to the American Hospital Association for a five-year study of voluntary hospital insurance and for the development of such insurance plans, Edwin R. Emery, president of the Fund, has announced. The study is to be conducted by a special committee headed by Dr. C. Rufus Rose of Chicago and including Dr. Basil C. MacLean, Rochester, N. Y.; Dr. E. C. Hueker, Madison, Wis.; Dr. S. S. Goldwater, New York; and Mgr. Maurice E. Griffin, Cleveland.

Frankfurter's Father To Ask Mercy for Him

Salonik (WNS)—The father of David Frankfurter, Yugoslavian Jewish student who will go on trial in Switzerland on December 9th for the murder of Wilhelm Gustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, will send a plea to his son's judges to be merciful but will not attend the trial. This was revealed by Dr. Isaac Akalay, chief rabbi of Yugoslavia, who is visiting here. Dr. Akalay said that the elder Frankfurter, who is a rabbi, will condemn his son's deed.

Has New Job

Hollywood, Calif.—In his new association with RKO-Radio Pictures Studios in Hollywood as a producer, Jesse Laskey, pioneer movie-maker, is heading his own unit and expects to have unlimited opportunities to continue his unbroken record as an outstanding fashioner of films. Recently the Pickford-Laskey combine was ended and Mr. Laskey was offered a position in practically every major film studio in Hollywood.

Jesse L. Laskey's colorful career in the films since its inception twenty-one years ago is comparable to a history of the motion picture business.

MUSSOLINI AIDS JEWISH STUDENT

Warsaw (WNS)—Thanks to the personal intervention of Premier Mussolini of Italy, Janien Berg, Polish Jewish student, will be able to continue his studies in Rome. Berg has just received from the Italian dictator a sum of money and an invitation to return to Italy. He had previously studied at Rome, but returned to Warsaw when his funds ran out. During the recent anti-Jewish student riots at the University of Warsaw Berg wrote to Ben Duce asking him for help. In reply Mussolini forwarded money and arranged for Berg to resume his studies in Italy.

Brown Closes Season With Colgate Game

Brown comes to the end of another road this week when the varsity eleven meets the high-powered Colgate Red Raiders on Brown Field in the annual Thanksgiving Day attraction. The Maroon will rule a heavy favorite to take the 21st game in a series that dates back to 1908. Colgate leads in the series with nine triumphs, Brown has seven, and four have ended ties.

On November 25, 1907, Jack Russell held up a grocery clerk at the point of a gun and obtained \$34.50. He was subsequently apprehended and charged by the Grand Jury with armed robbery. . . . On April 13, 1921, John Russell was found probably guilty of embezzlement. John Russell was sentenced to a year and a day in State Prison.

On October 21, 1930 John Madison Russell allowed it to become known that securities which he had been selling were worthless. Purchasers of \$2,000,000 worth of his watered stocks and fake bonds which had been represented as gilt-edged realized that they had been swindled. . . . John Madison Russell's books were investigated for discrepancies in his income tax report and adjustment made. Mr. Russell left for an extended vacation abroad.

FAMOUS PHYSICIAN DIES IN PALESTINE

Tel Aviv (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Dr. Joseph Stein, noted Jewish doctor and physician, formerly President of the Palestine Medical Association, is dead here at the age of 73. Born in Bougopol, Russia, Dr. Stein received his medical degree from the University of Kiev in 1896. He practiced as a physician in Bougopol and Velsavetgrad, Russia, until 1922 when he left that country to settle in Palestine.

Taking a large interest in Russian Jewish communal affairs, he was Chairman of the Municipality and Communist Council in Velsavetgrad till 1920. From 1920 until 1922 he was Chairman of the Municipal Council of Odessa. He was one of the pioneers in co-operative activities and one of the founders, in 1905, of the Jewish Theoretical Organization in Russia. An active Zionist, he was a delegate to several of the World Zionist Congresses and did much to stimulate early Jewish immigration to Palestine. He was the founder of two public clinics in Tel Aviv and, until 1932 head of the Doctors' Association in Palestine. He was a prolific contributor to medical journals and editor of Harehuth. Dr. Stein was well credited with a number of medical discoveries, both in Russia and in Palestine.

Nazi Decree on Foreign Securities Aimed at Jew

Berlin (WNS)—The new Nazi decree compelling owners of foreign securities admitted to trading on German exchanges to deposit them with Reichsbank or other designated banks in part aimed at the Jews.

ITALIAN PRESS IGNORES EVENTS

Claims Zionism is Menace to Mediterranean Powers

Rome (WNS)—Aroused by what appears to be an organized press campaign to impugn their loyalty to the Fascist regime, Italian Jewry is engaged in a series of nation-wide patriotic manifestations, in honor of the proclamation of Italy as an empire.

The Kehillah in Rome sent a rare old Torah Scroll to the Falashes of Ethiopia. Milan Jewry presented Mussolini with 100,000 liras for him to distribute to any charities he wants. In Turin the Jews prepared a richly ornamented album containing a proclamation of loyalty which they sent to King Victor Emanuel. The Jews of Modena sent a gold Torah covering to the synagogue in Addis Ababa. Large patriotic meetings were held by the Jews in Venice, Genoa, Verona, Padua and other cities.

The Italian press, however, has completely ignored these occurrences and continues to attack the Jews. Regime Fascists again declared that the Jews are the rulers of Russia. Vita Italiana asserted that Zionism is a menace to the Mediterranean powers and added that it had no faith in Italian Jewry's protestations of loyalty.

HUGE ARAB BANK PLANNED BY PEERS

British Lords Exclude Jewish Participation

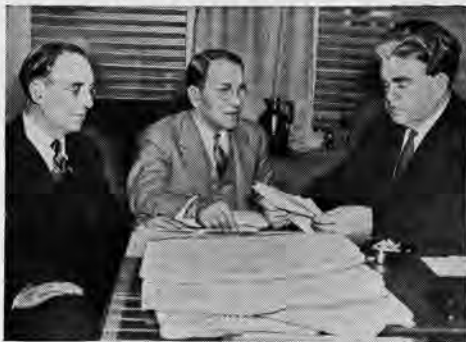
Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The formation of a huge Arab bank in Palestine by pro-Arab peers, including Lords Winterton, Lloyd and Beaverbrook, is reported by Al Liwa, Arabic daily.

The founders of the bank, which will be known as the "Panarab Corporation," are said to be English supporters of the Arab aspirations in Palestine.

The bank, when established, will have a capital of \$2,500,000, the Arabic organ asserts. No Jew will be allowed to participate in the bank, according to the terms of the constitution as described by Al Liwa.

The initiator of the scheme, who will be managing director of the bank, is alleged to be Sir John Chancellor, former High Commissioner of Palestine, whose term of office witnessed the 1929 riots here.

S. AMERICAN JEWS UNDER SUSPICION

Rebel Victory in Spain Means Fascist Regime

New York (WNS)—A triumph for Fascism in Spain would be followed by the establishment of Fascist regimes in Brazil and Argentina, from which the Jews in those countries would suffer heavily, it was declared by H. Leivick, eminent Yiddish poet and dramatist, on his return from Argentina, where he represented the Yiddish writers of America at the International Pen Clubs Congress.

Revealing that Brazil is already governed under a quasi-Fascist regime and that Fascism is becoming popular in Argentina, Mr. Leivick said that the influence of Spanish culture and literature in Latin-America would have important repercussions there if the Fascist rebels won in Spain.

Discussing Jewish conditions in Brazil and Argentina, Mr. Leivick revealed that in those countries the words Jew and communist are synonymous. In Brazil Jewish immigration has been halted, while in Argentina Jews must obtain special permission for all meetings and even when such permission is granted the meetings are watched by police spies.

Frankfurter Trial Will Open on December 9th

Geneva (WNS)—Wednesday, December 9, has been set as the opening date for the trial of David Frankfurter, Jewish medical student from Jugoslavia, who shot Wilhelm Bustloff, Swiss Nazi leader, at Davos, last February. The trial is expected to last three days. A stir was created in liberal circles here when the Swiss authorities banned the sale of "The Murder in Davos," by Emil Ludwig. The book, which tells the story of the shooting, was being sold to raise funds for Frankfurter's defense. At the same time another book on the same theme sponsored by Nazis is being sold freely.

so that we the people of this State may in family reunion and public meeting offer our heartfelt thanks to Almighty God for His guidance through the dark and rocky valleys of the depression to the shining and still waters of prosperity. We are thankful for the restored courage and faith of our people which has sustained our nation through the past troubled years; we are thankful that in a warlike and troubled world we are at peace with all nations; we are thankful that the brotherhood of man and mutual obligations of this brotherhood are more generally understood and acted upon not only by individuals but also by governments. Here in Rhode Island during the past year we have celebrated many of the glorious events in our history and are thankful for the renewed inspiration to public service we have gained therefrom.

Let us, however, not only offer thanks for what has bounteously been given us; let us also offer prayers for Almighty God's continuing aid to this State, our nation and to the world at large throughout the coming years. Let us also according to custom join in family reunions to strengthen our family ties, and at the same time remember those who are either without such ties or are unable to meet together. Let us resolve to do our share as citizens in a great democracy in placing the general welfare of our fellow men above private gain, and in elevating humanity above mere material prosperity.
