A. A. U. REBUKES PRO-NAZI FORCES

Brundage Candidate is Swamped by Mahoney

Houston, Tex. (WNS) — A smashing rebuke to Avery Brundage, chairman of the American Olympic Committee, and to the forces that favored American participation in the Berlin Olympic Games, was administered by the annual convention of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States when it elected Jeremiah T. Mahoney president over Patrick J. Walsh of New York, Brundage's candidate, by a vote of 199 2-7 to 127 4-7.

Mahoney resigned the presidency at last year's convention when the A. A. U. failed to vote against sending an American team to Berlin.

Less there be any doubt as to the real meaning of the crushing defeat of Brundage, whose handling of the Olympic team and pro-Nazi attitude on his return from Germany had created a storm of protest, the convention adopted Mahoney's recommendation to name Ernest Lee Jabucke as one of the delegates-at-large to the A. A. U. for 1937.

Rokach Deprived of Finance Chairmanship

TEL AVIV (WNS) — Tel Aviv's entangled majority situation reached a new high point when the majority of the members of the Municipal Council voted to deprive Mayor Isaac Rokach of the chairmanship of the finance committee, which he has held for many years and to turn it over to Moshe Chelouche.

The latter was elected Mayor of Tel Aviv by a vote of 8 to 7. But Mayor Rokach later received his appointment directly from the High Commissioner, in whom the power of appointment is vested.

HOLLAND INSISTS AGITATION STOP

AMSTERDAM (WNS) — Proposed to action by the protests of many members of the Senate against the increasing violence of the anti-Jewish campaign, the Dutch minister of justice informed Parliament in a written statement that he proposes a "more systematic prosecution of offenders."

Previously he had declared that "anti-Jewish utterances are punishable when expressed in an offensive form." The minister also indicated that the government was preparing legislation to curb the growing menace of Nazi disorders.

"Stand by King" Order Is Issued by Mosely

Sound Trucks Blare Opposition to Cabinet

LONDON (WNS) — Striving desperately to exploit the controversy between King Edward and his cabinet to advance the cause of Fascism in Great Britain, Sir Oswald Mosley, Blackshirt leader, has ordered his followers to utilize every opportunity to defend the King's cause.

Fences, walls, sidewalks and windows throughout London are being chalked with the words "Stand by the King!" under instructions from Mosley. Under the words the swastika appears. Word has also been passed out for all Fascists to circulate in small groups and to stir up public sentiment against the government. Although this campaign was supposed to be secret, a sound truck toured the West End area near the home of Queen Mary and broadcast this message: "Stand by the King! That is the message

of Sir Oswald Mosley and the British Union of Fascists at this time of crisis."

Blood Ritual Myth Revived in Lithuania

KOVNO (WNS) — The annual blood ritual myth which throws Lithuanian Jewry into a panic around Passover time has made its appearance several months early in the town of Japitkeh. The disappearance of a young Christian girl led to the cry that she had been slain by Jews for ritual purposes.

All the elements of a pogrom were at hand and the Christian populace was in an ugly mood when the girl returned, thus allaying the situation.

JEWIS MAINTAIN GUARDED SILENCE

Fear Palestine Position May Be Weakened

LONDON (WNS) — Although officially Jewish leadership here is maintaining a strictly guarded silence on the constitutional crisis created by King Edward's wish to marry Mrs. Wallis Simpson, Jewish spokesmen privately feel that the situation contains a number of possibilities that could easily affect Jewish interests.

It is pointed out that Sir Oswald Mosley, Blackshirt leader, who is capitalizing on the popular support for the King by staging public demonstrations in his favor and rousing public opinion against Prime Minister Baldwin, might conceivably be invited to become a member of a government friendly to the King should the present cabinet resign.

On the other hand, such militantly pro-Jewish leaders as Winston Churchill, Col. Josiah Wedgwood and Lord Marley are vigorously supporting the King. The chief fear of Jewish opinion here is that if the King should abdicate the British Empire would lose so much prestige that the Jewish position in Palestine might be weakened.

It is also felt that a demoralized British Empire at this critical moment in European affairs would impair Britain's effectiveness as a bulwark against Fascism and Nazism.

REPORT SEIZURE OF 250 RIFLES

Jerusalem (WNS) — Falcor Agency — The police of Lebanon confiscated a transport truck carrying 250 rifles hidden in flour sacks destined for Palestine Arabs, it was reported here from Beirut. The seizure was made near the Palestine border. The seventh Arab to be sentenced to death for participation in the recent disorders was condemned by the Court of Criminal Assize. He is a village from the vicinity of Nablus who was convicted of shooting at troops during the disturbances.

JEW'S PURCHASE LIVES WITH FOOD

Acute Food Shortage Forces Bargain

Berlin (WNS)—Virtual confiscation of the property of all Jews suspected of planning to leave Germany, which means all Jews, was decreed in a new law authorizing the Exchange Control Bureau to seize and administer the property and fortune of all persons intending or reported to be intending to settle abroad permanently.

Although prospective Jewish emigrants were already subject to a tax amounting to 25 per cent of the value of their property, the new decree empowers the authorities to sequester the property of all persons under the pretext that they may be planning to emigrate.

Food Shortage

Prague (WNS)—The food shortage in Germany is now so acute that Jews and other persons who find it difficult to emigrate may leave the country if they can turn over to the food control bureau substantial amounts of foreign fats and meats. Reports in the Czech press indicate that many German Jews are appealing to friends and relatives abroad to ransom them by sending them large quantities of food.

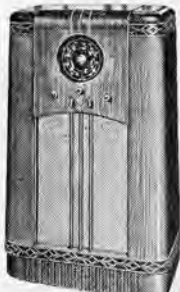

Five of Black Legion Get Life Sentences

DETROIT (WNS) — Convicted of killing Elias Coleman, Negro war veteran, on May 2, 1935, for "target practice," imprisonment for life was meted out to five high officials of the Black Legion by Judge Donald Van Zile in Records Court. The sentences were imposed on Charles Rouse, Roy Lorraine, Harvey Davis, Ervin D. Lee and John Bannerman.

The latter three were already under life sentence for the murder of Charles Poole, WPA worker, whose death uncovered the activities of the terrorist anti-Semitic and anti-Catholic organization. Arthur Luppe, commander of the Black Legion, and Frank Howard and Charles Baker are being held for a higher court on a charge of conspiring to kill Arthur Kingsley, publisher of a paper in suburban Highland Park.

THREE CANADIANS WIN HIGH HONORS

Regina, Canada (WNS)—A Jew was elected to public office in Regina for the first time when Louis Rosenberg, prominent educator and economist, was elected to the public school board at the municipal elections. Mr. Rosenberg, polled 5,025 votes, nearly double his vote in 1931, when he first sought the office.

Saskatoon, Canada (WNS)—J. M. Goldenberg, president of the Saskatchewan division of the Zionist Organization of Canada and president of the Saskatchewan Bar Association was elected to the Saskatoon school board, the first Jew to be so honored.

NEW YORK (WNS)—Invitations to foreign governments to participate in New York's 1939 World's Fair were extended by the State Department and are therefore beyond the control of the World's Fair Corporation, Grover A. Whalen, president of the Corporation, declared in a telegram to Samuel Untermyer, who had protested to Mr. Whalen against the extension of an invitation to Germany.

Spokesmen for the World's Fair Corporation pointed out that the State Department could not discriminate against Germany without creating international complications.

Africa Darkens

From the Union of South Africa comes disquieting news of an anti-Semitic flare-up.

Although anti-Jewish agitation is not uncommon there, its latest manifestations are beginning to give real cause for concern to South African Jewry. Until recently overt Jew-baiting was confined to such groups as the Grey Shirts and Nazi propagandists.

Now university professors, students and the influential Nationalist Party have taken up Jew-baiting. The raison d'etre of the sudden upsurge of anti-Semitism was the arrival of some 500 German Jewish refugees who reached Capetown just before the new immigration legislation came into effect. Enraged by this, the various anti-immigration groups staged mass meetings and adopted militant resolutions of protest.

If these meetings had been marked only by anti-alien hysteria there might be less reason for anxiety. Unfortunately, however, they were characterized by definite hostility to Jews.

A provincial congress of the Nationalist Party demanded the exclusion of Jews from membership. University professors declared that Jews are no asset to South Africa.

These incidents, together with the unification of other anti-Jewish groups into a South African National Gentile Fascist Party, indicate that South African Jewry is in for a taste of organized and militant anti-Semitism.

In Editorial Vein
"Logicians may reason about abstractions" wrote Macaulay, "but the great mass of men must have images." Try to visualize, if you will, a decrepit looking old Jew with a flowing white beard standing before a night-branched Chanukiyeh holding aloft a taper, like a steadfast star, the shammas. He is about to light those eight candles, one by one, from left to right.

He thinks of those encouraging words by which Mattathias painted the situation to his five sons just before his death: "For they trust in the multitude of their troops and in their army, but ye trust in the Lord with whom are strength and power to save by many or by few. And the power of the horse is a vain thing for deliverance, for deliverance is in the Lord's. Assemble yourselves, my sons, and he like one man and of one heart; and be zealous for the God of Israel, as your pious fathers were; and will the Lord be God of your strength, will pur the dread of you and the fear of you upon your enemies." . . .

It is twilight. The old man lights the first candle, at the same time singing forth in joyous vein—the blessing, "Lehadig netz"—the room lights up—the mission of Israel: To fill the world with light.

The old man bends forward once again. The shammas lights up the second candle. "Tasdek"—Justice: The symbol that gives strength to the weak and restrains the arrogant.

The third: "Tatokoh"—Righteousness: The peace that assures the maintenance of virtue, the safety and the sanctity of the home.

The fourth: "Tov Arin"—Benevolence: The spirit of helpfulness to the unfortunate and sympathy to the suffering.

The fifth: "Veyabavta Brecha"—Brotherly love: Uniting man in a realization of the common fatherhood of God—the desire to contribute to the happiness of fellowmen.

The sixth: "Sheves achim gam yaehad"—Cooperation: Bringing harmony to mankind's efforts and strength to achievement.

The seventh: "Chezed"—Loving kindness: The unselfishness that makes for loyalty and service to one's brother.

Once again the taper that serves as shammas goes forward—it is the eighth candle. "Emes"—Truth, the seal of God. The mission of Israel: To hold the banner of truth and to dispel ignorance—to uphold the seal of the living God.

And the shammas, that old Jew standing in front of those eight candles and lighting them has given light to mankind. He is the symbol of the Jew through the ages leading the way to light, justice, righteousness, benevolence, brotherly love, cooperation, loving kindness, to truth.

You, who failed to kindle the Chanukah candles, have missed all this. Perhaps you were not fit to be a shammas . . .

Max Fires Jacobs; May Lose Title Bout

New York (WNS)—Negotiations for a title bout between James J. Braddock, world's heavy weight champion, and Max Schmeling, German challenger, are expected to be called off because of the disclosure that the German

has broken off with Joe Jacobs, Jewish manager, who piloted him to the championship.

Informed that Schmeling had yielded the New York State Athletic Commission that no one in America had the right to act for him in making matches, boxing authorities advised that he must mount the end of Schmeling as a fighter in this country.

The anti-Nazi boycott has cut into the receipts of all of Schmeling's American fights, but Schmeling's associates cited his identification with Jacobs as proof that the fight was a bait, but how that he has apparently dropped the Jewish pilot Schmeling may be expected to feel the full force of the anti-Nazi sentiment.

POLISH STUDENTS CALL OFF STRIKE

Warsaw (WNS)—Howling to the government's threat to close all universities for a year unless anti-Jewish disturbances came to an immediate end, the anti-Semitic students have called off their strikes in all the universities.
