Two Jews Flogged for Defying Open Shop Law

Home for Aged Charity Ball Saturday Night

DECREE WOULD OUST MERCHANTS

Law Prevents Closing Stores on Sabbath

Rome (WNS)—The public whipping of two Jews and the imprisonment for three months of another Jew in Tripoli because of their defiance of a decree issued on November 14th ordering all shops to keep open every day in the week except Sunday was revealed by Nostra Bandiera, Triest Jewish newspaper, which reprinted the story from Avvenire di Tripoli, a Jewish paper in Tripoli.

The decree in question was intended to oust Jewish merchants from the newer section of Tripoli and force them to return to their old quarters in the older part of the city because, it is alleged, they had occupied so many of the best places in the city that it had taken on the appearance of a Jewish city.

PROTESTS IGNORED

Replying to vigorous protests by the Jewish merchants and the rabbinical council, Governor Italo Balbo announced that the Jews might remain open on Sunday and closed on Saturday if they went back to the old city.

Those who insisted on remaining in the new city must obey the law regardless of whether it conflicted with their religious scruples, he ruled.

As reported by Nostra Bandiera, most of the Jews affected moved back to the old city but a few defied the Governor and kept their stores closed on Saturday or kept open and refused to do any business.

WIFE OF FAMOUS SCIENTIST DIES

Princeton, N. J. (WNS)—Mrs. Albert Einstein, wife of the world-famous scientist and greatest Jew of his time, is dead here in the little home where she and Professor Einstein had lived since 1934.

A second cousin of the Professor, she was born in Ulm, Germany. Einstein's native town. First married to a merchant from Ulm, she divorced him during the war and married Einstein in 1917. She is survived by one of her two daughters from her first marriage, Frau Margot Marjanoff, wife of Dr. Dimitri Marjanoff.

Her other daughter, Ilse Kayser, died in Paris two years ago. Mrs. Einstein had been ill for two years, suffering from heart disease and diabetes.

3 RIFLES REPULSE ARAB MAURAUDERS

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—The story of an heroic repulse of an armed Arab band by an isolated Jewish settlement which had only three rifles with which to defend itself was brought to Jerusalem.

The Arab marauders surrounded Meshke Haotzar near Kfar Sabs at two o'clock in the morning and laid down a barrage on the farm houses from a distance of fifty meters.

The settlers, who had only three rifles in the village, could not summon help since the terrorists had cut the telephone lines. Finally, however, expert marksmen among the villagers succeeded in driving off the band following a full hour of shooting.

PALESTINE APPEAL PLANS CAMPAIGN

Jewish communal leaders here are planning a state-wide conference of all elements in the Rhode Island Jewish population for Sunday evening, January 3, at the Billmore Hotel to consider plans for organizing a state-wide campaign in support of the Drafted Palestine Appeal.

Many hundreds are expected to attend the meeting to listen to a report from Senator Royal S. Copeland of New York, who is to be the principal speaker at the conference. CENTER SPEAKER DISCUSSES TRENDS

Clifton Fadiman, New York editor and critic, and book reviewer for The New Yorker, gave an address before a large audience last Sunday night at the Community Center, dealing with the problems of writers trying to see American life as a whole.

The rapidity of American life makes it extremely difficult for writers to catch the scene and hold it long enough to put in on canvas, he said. It is equally difficult he believes for a writer to select a starting point, because of the confusion of the American scene.

An important trend in American literature in the next decade will be a revival of interest in the older religions, particularly Catholicism. The fact that writers feel a lack of spiritual and cultural values in American life is one basis for his prediction that interest in religious problems will be revived.

An appreciative audience asked many questions of Mr. Fadiman during the discussion period.

POLES, JEWS WAGE ECONOMIC WAR

Warsaw (WNS)—A state of economic warfare between Jews and Poles in Vilna and an organized anti-Jewish boycott in Warsaw and some of the small towns is keeping Polish Jewry in a turmoil.

Exploiting the tension resulting from the recent student riots in Vilna, the National Democrats, taking a leaf from the Nazis, are forcing Polish merchants to post signs in their windows that they do not buy from or sell to Jews. In self defense Jewish merchants have posted placards proclaiming a boycott against Poles. In Warsaw the National Radicals, anti-Semitic extremists, are pushing their efforts to stigmatize all customers of Jewish shops.

Pickets stand in front of Jewish shops and stick yellow tags on all customers entering the stores.

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PLEDGE WELSHERS SUED BY HOSPITAL

Outcome of Suit Will Decide Future Action

New York (WNS)—Jews who have reneged on pledges to various Jewish philanthropic and communal causes and Jewish institutions which have suffered from such repudiations are eagerly awaiting the outcome of a suit in New York's Supreme Court by an assignee of the Beth Israel Hospital Association against I. Gainsburg, New York attorney.

The plaintiff alleges that Gainsburg pledged \$5,000 in 1929 toward a \$2,000,000 campaign for the hospital and then broke his pledge.

Gainsburg's defense is the dual argument that his pledge was contingent upon the raising of the \$2,000,000 in 60 days, a condition which was not fulfilled, and that the hospital had no right to transfer his pledge to an assignee.

Renew Kosher Strife On Proposed New Law

NEW YORK (WNS) — New strife over the knotty question of kashruth appeared in the making when the general welfare committee of the New York City Board of Aldermen opened public hearings on a proposed municipal ordi-

nance to give exclusive control over kosher poultry slaughtering to the rabbinical-controlled Kashruth Association.

Spokesmen for the poultry dealers were united in opposing the ordinance, emphasizing that it would increase operating costs of dealers and add two cents a pound to the retail cost of kosher chickens.

They also argued that the law would create a monopoly by giving control to the Kashruth Association, which they claimed is not representative of all Orthodox Jewry. The Federal government also indicated its interest in the matter when C. F. Walker, district supervisor of the Department of Agriculture, said he would oppose the measure if it meant increased operating costs.

URUGUAYAN LAW HITS AT YIDDISH

Montevideo, Uruguay (WNS) —What is interpreted by the Jewish community as an official attempt to curtail the use of Yiddish has been made by the Uruguayan government through a new law forbidding in public meetings of publications the use of languages other than those taught in the public schools.

The law is regarded as a blow against Yiddish because Spanish, the country's official language, and English, German and Italian are the only tongues taught in the public schools. A ban on the importation of foreign Yiddish publications is also contemplated, the ministry of education announced.

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REMORSE MAKES MAN GO TO JAIL

Warsaw (WNS)—Stricken by remorse and deeply moved by the words of an examining magistrate who explained that the Jews were not to blame for Poland's critical economic situation, M. Panchuk, generally acknowledged to be Poland's most violent anti-Semite, created a sensation when he refused to aid in his own defense and insisted on being sent to prison to atone for his crimes.

Panchuk was accused of being the ringleader of a gang of anti-Semites that bombed the Jewish Children's Health Center in Grodno last year.

HOODLUMS ATTACK HADASSAH OFFICE

Furniture is Smashed; Two Nurses Hurt

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Three members of the Betar, youth division of the Revisionist organization, were arrested by police after a party of Betarim invaded the offices and smashed furniture of the Hadassah Medical Organization.

The young hoodlums broke their way into the building before the arrival of the staff, scattered the office files and removed the doors from their hinges. In the melee two nurses were hurt.

When Dr. Haim Yassky, head of the Hadassah Medical Organization, arrived, he demanded the withdrawal of the Betarim and refused any discussion unless an orderly delegation were appointed. The disturbance continued, however, until the police arrived and arrested three.

The cause of the attack was the demand of the Revisionists that they be employed on the construction of the new Hadassah Hospital, the medical unit of the Hebrew University on Mt. Scopus.

Census Will Reveal Status of Judaism

Moscow (WNS) — Guesses regarding the status of Judaism in Soviet Russia will soon be replaced by hard facts as the result of an order by the Soviet authorities for an immediate survey of religion among all the people. The survey will be based on answers to five questions, one of which calls for a yes or no reply to the question "do you believe in God?"

Panachuk, generally acknowledged to be Poland's most violent anti-Semite, created a sensation when he refused to aid in his own defense and insisted on being sent to prison to atone for his crimes.

Panachuk was accused of being the ringleader of a gang of anti-Semites that bombed the Jewish Children's Health Center in Grodno last year.

HOODLUMS ATTACK HADASSAH OFFICE

Furniture is Smashed; Two Nurses Hurt

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Three members of the Betar, youth division of the Revisionist organization, were arrested by police after a party of Betarim invaded the offices and smashed furniture of the Hadassah Medical Organization.

The young hoodlums broke their way into the building before the arrival of the staff, scattered the office files and removed the doors from their hinges. In the melee two nurses were hurt.

When Dr. Haim Yasky, head of the Hadassah Medical Organization, arrived, he demanded the withdrawal of the Betarim and refused any discussion unless an orderly delegation were appointed. The disturbance continued, however, until the police arrived and arrested three.

The cause of the attack was the demand of the Revisionists that they be employed on the construction of the new Hadassah Hospital, the medical unit of the Hebrew University on Mt. Scopus.

Census Will Reveal Status of Judaism

Moscow (WNS) — Gueses regarding the status of Judaism in Soviet Russia will soon be replaced by hard facts as the result of an order by the Soviet authorities for an immediate survey of religion among all the people. The survey will be based on answers to five questions, one of which calls for a yes or no reply to the question "do you believe in God?"

Unpaid Pledges

Jewish leaders of organizations plagued by the problem of so-called philanthropists who make substantial pledges of money and then renege for one reason or another are looking to a case now pending in the New York State Supreme Court to guide their future action.

The case grew out of a pledge of \$5,000 by a Jewish lawyer to a \$2,000,000 campaign of the Beth Israel Hospital. The money was never received, but the hospital assigned the pledge. Now the assignee is suing the pledger.

The latter contends that his pledge was contingent on the \$2,000,000 being raised within 60 days; this condition was not fulfilled. Moreover, says the defendant, the hospital had no right to assign his pledge.

This aspect of the case may prevent a clear-cut decision. It is possible that the court may decide that the assignment of the pledge was illegal without ruling on the pledge itself. Should this happen the value of the case so far as other Jewish organizations facing similar problems are concerned will be nil.

If, however, the court finds for the plaintiff we may see an epidemic of such suits against men who made substantial pledges to Jewish philanthropies and then tried to crawl out of them on various legal pretenses. It is about time that this type of giver was brought to book. Public opinion seems to be helpless. Perhaps the courts will have better luck.

ARAB BANDS RAID VILLAGES AGAIN

Report Brigands Are Chased By Troops

Jerusalem (WNS-Palcor Agency)—Reports of widespread attacks by armed Arab bands upon Arab villages and of wholesale robberies by Arab brigands are being received here as a result of the resurgence of violence in the troubled Holy Land.

Details are as yet unavailable concerning a rumored battle between an armed Arab gang and a detachment of British troops in the hills around Nablus. This was the district in which much of the violence during the recent disorders occurred.

In the vicinity of Safed, two Arabs have been murdered during the past two days. The first was killed at the home of a mukhtar in a village nearby, where an invading armed band slew a neighbor who was visiting the notable.
