Think about it now, or you'll have an unpleasant time next March when Uncle Sam demands his income tax. In order to prepare the tax-payer with necessary information to calculate his tax, the government has published pamphlets, available at banks or post-offices, which will approximate the amount you will have to shell out.

The 1942 income tax, based on 1941 earnings, will affect people who have never worried about income taxes. Hitherto, few returns on incomes below \$5,000 were checked in detail. But defense and war require everyone pay his legal allotment and Treasury inspection of all returns, no matter how small, is expected to be closer next year.

Archibald Silverman and Adolf Meller were elected chairman and vice-chairman, respectively, of the 1941 United Jewish Appeal, at a conference of organizations held last Sunday afternoon at the Jewish Community Center. The campaign will be officially launched with a dinner on December 7 at the Narragansett Hotel.

Judge Morris Rothenberg of New York, co-chairman of the national U. J. A. committee, appeared as guest speaker, and called upon local Jewry for sup-

Community Council Arranges Organization Conclave Sun.

A special conference of the Jewish Community Council has been arranged for 3 o'clock, Sunday afternoon, at the Jewish Committee Center. Herbert L. Cohen, president of the New England Region of Jewish Community Councils, will describe the organizing and the functions of the Bridgeport, Conn., Council, which has now operated successfully for seven years.

"We want to make it clear," a letter calling the assembly says, "that the purpose of this meeting is to discuss ways and means by which the many Jewish organizations of our community can be united with one another in order to bring about a united, strong and a progressive Jewish community life."

Votes \$50,000 For Scholarships

NEW YORK. — Hadassah this week announced the creation of a Louis D. Brandeis Scholarship Fund in \$50,000 to provide training in vocational fields for hundreds of young people in Palestine "immediately and during the post-war years of reconstruction which we know will follow an allied victory."

According to Mrs. David de Sola Pool, national president, the money will be spent at the rate of \$5,000 a year over a ten year period.

"We want to emphasize," the letter continues, "that this meeting will not concern itself with current fund raising efforts, and that it is not the intention of a Jewish Community Council to interfere with the independent workings of the different organizations that are affiliated with it."

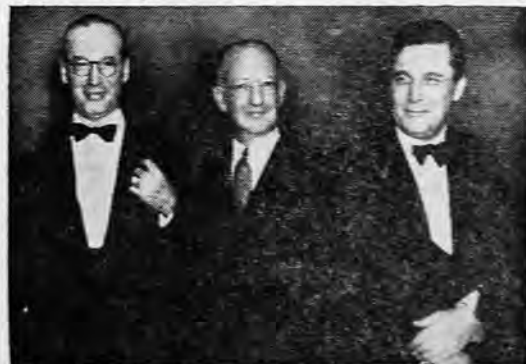

Nazis Condemn Five to Death

ZURICH. — Five Jews were condemned to death in an alleged clothing card swindle and two "Aryans" were sentenced respectively to eight and ten years in prison, it was reported by the pro-Nazi newspaper Neue Tag, published in Prague.

The Bulgarian newspaper Vesti carried a Nazi report of widespread persecution of Jews in Greece. The Axis newspaper reported that the Greeks were blaming the Jews for their country's plight.

40,000 Refugees Settle in Britain

LONDON. — Close to forty-thousand Jewish refugees have settled in Britain, according to an announcement made at a conference of Jewish Community leaders held a week ago in Manchester.

The primary purpose of the conference was to consider the formation of a unified synagogue organization in Great Britain; several speakers pointed out the increased necessity for co-ordinating Jewish activity in Britain.

Censure British On Jewish Army

LONDON. — Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, took the British Government to task for its failure to sanction the formation of a Jewish Army in Palestine despite its previous assurances that it would help establish such a military force, at a conference of leading Zionists.

Dr. Weizmann disclosed that in October, 1941, the British Colonial Secretary, reneging on promises made last March and in September, 1940, declared that the formation of a Jewish Army was not feasible at the present. Earlier it was revealed, Britain had pleaded that lack of "necessary equipment" made organization of a Jewish Army impossible.

Dedicate Tablet To Louis Brandeis

NEW YORK. — A bronze tablet was dedicated this week as a memorial to the late Louis D. Brandeis, associate justice of the United States Supreme Court, at the Wall Street Synagogue here.

The inscription on the tablet is: "Louis D. Brandeis, humanist, philosopher and statesman. Immemorably linked with the remembrance of the Jewish people. 1856-1941."

ACKNOWLEDGE AID

LONDON.—Acknowledging the aid of Jews in the defense of Moscow, the Russian press reports that Jewish officials, workers, students, writers, journalists and other professionals have joined the newly formed Moscow workers' defense battalions.

ESTABLISHES HOSPITAL
LONDON. — Mme. Ida Rubinstein, noted French Jewish actress, now a refugee in England, has established a hospital for wounded soldiers, sailors and airmen of Gen. Charles de Gaulle's "Free French" forces. The Russian-born actress was formerly a great favorite of French theatre audiences.

Jay Fidler, Brown Tackle, Potential All-American Star

There's a 19-year-old Jewish boy playing for Brown University this year, whose name has been mentioned as a nominee for all-American honors during this 1941 football season. Though all-star selections are not usually made until after the final whistle of the traditional Thanksgiving battles, one sports writer thought so much of this six foot three inch behemoth that he started plugging him about a month ago.

Jay Fidler is the boy's name. This 190 pounds of bone and muscle plays a bang up game at tackle—a position he has mastered since he first made the varsity eleven of his high school back in Brooklyn.

Fidler is at Brown on a scholarship that he won not only because of his athletic prowess on the baseball diamond, the gridiron and in sundry other arenas, but also because he is a brilliant student as well.

Tuss McLaughry, erstwhile football mentor at Brown who was tempted from the Providence campus by the more lucrative offers of Dartmouth College had this to say of Fidler: "Jay is the finest football tackle I've ever had the pleasure to watch. He's fast and alert and aggressive. He's brainy and powerful and is

seldom sucked in by the opposing team. Before Fidler is through at Brown, he'll be a national byword and a household figure. Keep your eye on Jay. He's the one man I'd like to take along with me to Dartmouth."

What Tuss said a year ago, the sports magazines and sports writers are saying today. And, it's interesting to note that Fidler has been approached by several Hollywood scouts. His resemblance to Ray Milland is a startling one and according to the scouts—any guy who looks like Ray Milland and who can play football like Fidler, is a strong bet to become one of Hollywood's favorite sons.

Jewish Survey, in analyzing the growth of anti-Semitism in Congress, sums the situation as follows:

Those that preach Americanism under false colors include the ex-liberals who want more fame and settle for cheap notoriety; there are the bigots who grovel at the feet of Coughlin; there are the petty and egoistic extremists who care little what damage they do as long as they are heard.

"As a Gentile I can weep. As a friend of the Jews I can give a word of advice. That word is fight. Let no attack go unchallenged. Let no slander go unanswered. Let no man in Congress (or anywhere) slander the Jews!"

The hush-hush policy of Jewish isolationists has proven a farce. It is time for a regeneration. The anti-Semites in Congress should be given a lesson in democracy so that they may know the meaning of America.

Judge Max Levy Of Newport, Dies

Judge Max Levy, 71, former justice of First District Court, and onetime State Senator and Representative, died on Wednesday at his home, 32 Ayrault street, Newport, following an illness of about six months.

Born in New York City in 1870, the son of Isaac and Anna Levy, he was educated in the public schools of Newport.

Before taking up the study of law in the office of former U. S. Senator William P. Sheffield and former Congressman William P. Sheffield, Jr., Judge Levy had served as stenographer clerk to the R. I. Supreme Court and the Superior Court. Subsequently, he was appointed a standing master in chancery.

Surviving him are his wife, Mrs. Irene Engel Levy; a son, Samuel H. Levy of Washington, D. C., and two daughters, Mrs. Milton C. Kay and Mrs. Barney L. Kay of Newport.

He was a member of St. Paul's Lodge, F. & A. M.; R. I. Lodge, I. O. O. F.; was past sacheem of Weenat Shassit Tribe, I. O. R. M.; belonged to the Spanish War Veterans and to the Congregation Jeshaut Israel, of which he was president for many years.
