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Synagogue Fund \$82,405; Committee Selects Architect

At a gathering of more than 200 workers of the Ahavath Shalom Building Fund Committee last Sunday night in the Synagogue, Archie Smith, campaign director, announced that \$82,405 had been raised to date. Of this amount approximately \$5,000 had been pledged during the past month, prior to the resumption of the campaign. The Synagogue plans to construct a modern Hebrew School and Synagogue on its new location on Koshambau avenue.

At a preliminary meeting of the building committee prior to the buffet supper which was served to workers, the committee conferred with Arthur Rosenstein, a Boston architect, who was instructed to draw a new set of plans combining certain improvements with sketches previously publicized. It is estimated that the cost of the proposed structure will be in excess of a quarter of a million dollars.

Wise Scores Deal With Franco

NEW YORK — The American Committee for Spanish Freedom says Stephen S. Wise, president of the American and World Jewish Congress, has labeled the reported deal between Isaac Weismann, former Congress delegate in Portugal, and Franco Spain to permit the reopening of Jewish synagogues and the entry of 2000 refugee children in Spain "repugnant" to Jewish ideals of democracy.

Wise, stating that fascism is the main enemy of Jews and the peace-loving people, said: "There can and must be no deals with the Franco dictatorship."

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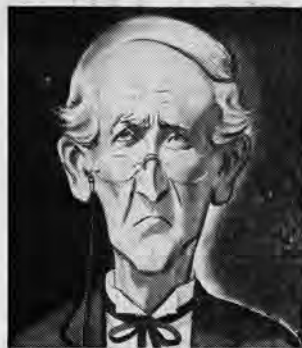

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MOST IMPORTANT ISSUE OF THE DAY--JEWISH EDUCATION

13 Questions Uppermost in the Minds of Jews Interested in Jewish Education

Q. 1 What is the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence?

A. 1 It is a Hebrew Day School.

Q. 2 In what way does a Hebrew Day School differ from other Hebrew Schools?

A. 2 It differs in this respect. Whereas the ordinary Hebrew Schools attempt to teach the Jewish child Hebrew knowledge in the evening, when the child has a tired mind after putting in a full day in public school, the Hebrew Day School ACTUALLY IMPARTS Hebrew knowledge to the child during the daytime while his mind is bright and fresh.

Q. 3 Are there many other Hebrew Day Schools?

A. 3 There is only one in R. I., the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence, but a great number of similar schools have been established throughout the United States.

Q. 4 How did these Hebrew Day Schools originate?

A. 4 American Jewry has awakened to the realization that a generation of Jewry has been brought up without adequate knowledge of its religious heritage, literature and history. This neglected generation has determined that its offspring shall not likewise be neglected and are therefore establishing Hebrew Day Schools throughout the country.

Q. 5 Are Hebrew Day Schools known by any other name?

A. 5 Yes. They are also known as Yeshivas or Parochial Schools.

Q. 6 What do these Hebrew Day Schools teach?

A. 6 They teach all public school subjects in addition to the Hebrew Language, History, Literature and Religion. The pupils are also taught the beauty of Jewish life and not to have an inferiority complex.

Q. 7 Why do many educators argue that a Hebrew Day School is more important than a House of Worship?

A. 7 Just as it is necessary that

one be a child before he reaches manhood, so it is necessary that we have schools where we can teach our children our religion, so that when they grow up they will know what a Jewish place of worship is and will enter and support them.

If we have Hebrew Day Schools, we will always have worshippers and places of worship. On the other hand, if we do not give our youth a Jewish, spiritual training, our Synagogues and Temples will become empty shells and the erection of new edifices will be a useless expenditure of money.

Q. 8 Of whom does the faculty of the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence consist?

A. 8 At present it consists of 9 teachers, each an expert in his field of pedagogy. The teachers of the secular department are all approved by the Director of Education of the State of Rhode Island and are former teachers of the Providence Public School system. If the enrollment keeps on increasing, as we expect it will, additional teachers will be necessary in the near future.

Q. 9 How do graduates of a Hebrew Day School compare with graduates of the Public Schools?

A. 9 Statistics show that the Hebrew Day School graduate surpasses the Public School graduate. Graduates of Hebrew Day Schools, in different parts of the United States, have attained high marks—in fact, the highest marks—in taking the Board of Regents or college entrance examinations. They are also to be found among the leaders in the professional and business world and have proved to be "good mixers".

Q. 10 To whom does the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence belong?

A. 10 It does not belong to any single Synagogue or Temple, but it is entitled to the support of all of them. It is a genuine community project, belonging to all the Jews of Providence and therefore should receive the full support of all laymen, spiritual and communal leaders.

Q. 11 What classes does the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence have?

A. 11 It has classes from kindergarten through Junior High School.

Q. 12 Why is the Lubavitcher of Providence conducting a fund raising campaign?

A. 12 It is conducting a fund-raising campaign because it has an expense of over \$500 each week to maintain the school, busses and furnish lunches. The present quarters are inadequate and it is intended to open a most modern school building which will be a pride not only for Providence Jewry but for the entire State of Rhode Island. This will cause a still larger expenditure of funds. At present the school is in dire need of funds with which to continue its work and its building program. The school is entitled to your full support.

Q. 13 Is the Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence a Rabbinical School?

A. 13 No. It is primarily a school for grammar and junior high school children, for boys and girls desirous of acquiring knowledge of their religion, literature and history.

CONCLUSION:

The Lubavitcher Yeshiva of Providence is an absolute necessity. It is here to stay as an established, recognized institution. An interesting fact, worth noticing, is that in the campaign now being conducted to raise funds for the erection of new Synagogues, the word "education" is being stressed and drummed into the ears of the public, an admission that (1) Jewish education is lacking; (2) Jewish education is essential and (3) that without Jewish education there will be no one to occupy the new Synagogues; (4) that the real source of education of our youth are Hebrew Day Schools.

The campaign to erect the new Synagogues should be supported, but the well from which we are to draw the new generation of worshippers, the Hebrew Day School, must likewise not be forgotten.
