Truman Considers Jewish Agency Plan for Palestine

WASHINGTON — A Jewish Agency for Palestine plan for the partitioning of Palestine by the creation of separate and independent Jewish and Arab States and early termination of the British mandate has had serious consideration by this Government and, with modifications, is understood to be included in President Truman's reply to Great Britain on the Morrison-Grady federation statement.

(Herbert Morrison is Britain's Lord President of the Council and Henry F. Grady headed the United at the London discussions from States Cabinet Committee deputies which the federation plan emerged.)

While no meeting of minds has been had or even attempted between the agency and the Cabinet Committee on the area to be included under the agency proposal it generally contemplates turning over to the Jews for development and settlement all of Galilee and Negev, the Central Jordan Valley and its continuous mountainous region.

In addition, the plan would turn over all of Samaria Province to the Arabs, with the port of Jaffa. It would leave open to negotiation the question of a corridor connecting Samaria and the port with other Arab regions, such as that of the Iraqi who would be expected.

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Pepper Demands Britain Surrender Palestine Mandate

WASHINGTON — Sen. Claude Pepper (D., Fla.), demanded this week that Britain surrender her Palestine mandate to the UN and that homeless Jews be admitted to the Holy Land, the U. S. A., Britain and France.

He urged that U. S. immigration laws be revised to permit entry of at least 100,000 European Jews here. He said Palestine could accommodate up to 300,000 Jews without destroying the Arab majority.

Pepper told a press conference that Britain's proposal to divide Palestine into Arab and Jewish states represented "an affront" to its responsibilities as a mandate trustee.

To Begin Solicitations After Labor Day; Emphasize Needs

Providence Jewry has shown its readiness to go all out on behalf of the less fortunate Jewish people overseas by adopting an \$800,000 goal for the 1946 campaign of the General Jewish Committee of Providence.

Alvin A. Sopkin, campaign chairman, announced this week that the official campaign dates will be from October 13th through October 31st. However, important preliminary meetings will be held well in advance of this time. An initial gifts meeting to spearhead the campaign will be held at the Ledgmont Country Club on September 12th. A mass meeting is scheduled for Sunday, September 22nd, at the School of Design Auditorium. Mr. Sopkin stated that because of the great task ahead of us it has been decided to make a very early start this year and solicitations will begin immediately after Labor Day. He added that he is confident that the people of Providence returning from their summer vacations will be ready to devote their full energies to helping their destitute brethren overseas. He said that in view of the momentous things that are happening in Palestine and the present uncertainties that prevail that the

Editorials

Britain's Bluff

In recent days spokesmen of the British Government and various speakers in the British House of Commons have "threatened" that if the United States Government does not agree to the British "Federation" plan for Palestine, Britain will turn over the Palestine Mandate to the United Nations and withdraw from that country.

It should be said in this connection that the retention of Palestine as a strategic base under the sole control of Britain is notoriously the principal aim of the British Government. By controlling Haifa, Britain also possesses the oil pipeline outlet to the Mediterranean. For these reasons Britain looks with disfavor on any proposal that would weaken its hold over Palestine or would result in Britain's having to share control with other countries.

In the circumstances, the impression which the statements from London seek to create—that Britain's control over Palestine is a burden of which she would like to be relieved, rather than an anxiously guarded privilege—is obviously incorrect. This talk about turning Palestine over to the United Nations is a meaningless bluff. Under the Charter, the future of Palestine will have to be decided by the United Nations in any case. But the provisions of the Charter are such that no decision can be arrived at by the United Nations without the consent of Britain which holds a double veto power—as the present Mandatory and as one of the Big Five.

Pending a decision by the United Nations, Britain can continue to do as she pleases in Palestine, and no decision can ever be reached unless it satisfies Britain. Therefore, the gesture of turning Palestine over to the United Nations, for all its appearance of unselfish withdrawal, merely ensures the continuation of the status quo for an indefinite period.

Deny Report DP's Delays Shipment of GI's Wives

MUNICH — A report published in the American press to the effect that the shipment of American soldiers' wives to Germany has been delayed because of the influx of displaced persons into the American zone, which has caused a "critical housing situation," was termed a "malicious lie" by representatives of the UNRRA and of voluntary relief organizations.

Army officers also condemned the report, emphasizing that by no stretch of the imagination could anyone visualize a situation where any American civilian, or member of the military personnel would wish to keep his family in the

camp occupied by displaced persons.

The report, which was credited to the U. S. Army in Frankfurt, apparently grew out of an announcement made in Frankfurt that a special Army board has been appointed to investigate the reasons for delaying the shipments of dependents from the United States. This announcement in no way blamed the displaced persons, or anybody else, for the shortage of housing accommodations.

Diamond Merchant Robbed of \$68,000

JERUSALEM — A diamond merchant in the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv was robbed this week of gems valued at more than \$68,000 when five armed men intercepted him on his way from a bank to his office in the same building.

Lynching Of Four Condemned By Jewish Council

ATLANTA — The committee on community relations of the Atlanta Jewish Community Council has adopted a resolution condemning the lynching of four Negroes in Walton County, Georgia. The resolution declared:

"Concerned with the good name and welfare of the State of Georgia, and desiring to join the voices of decency, the Committee on Community Relations of the Atlanta Jewish Community Council places itself on record as deploring and condemning the recent unprovoked attack upon the lives of four Negro citizens of Walton County, Georgia.

"We commend the efforts of our State and Federal officials in taking prompt action to apprehend those guilty. We urge that they continue their efforts until the guilty are brought to justice.

"We believe the time has come for all good citizens of Georgia to recognize that any violation of the sacredness of human life by mob action is a real threat and danger to the rights and privileges of every citizen."

Non-Fraternization Order is Lifted

JERUSALEM — The ban against British troops fraternizing with Jews and patronizing Jewish businesses imposed by Gen. Sir Evelyn Barker, British commander in Palestine, following the King David blasting last month, was lifted this week.

An official announcement by Lt. Gen. Sir Alan Cunningham, Palestine High Commissioner, revealed that leaders of the Palestine Arab Higher Committee have rejected the British invitation for a round-table conference in London.

DISCHARGE JEWS

JERUSALEM — All Jewish civilian clerks employed by military headquarters here have been discharged, it was announced this week. It was estimated that the order will effect several hundred persons, many of whom are veterans of the British forces.

Couple Who Survived Four Death Camps Married in U.S.

NEW YORK — A childhood romance salvaged from the tragedy of a separation that carried two Polish sweethearts through four Nazi slave labor and death camps culminated last week in a wedding ceremony at the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

The couple, Ben-Zion Berkenwald, 21 years old, and Rachel Silberberg, 19, were marked for execution when United States troops freed them more than a year ago from concentration camps like the ones in which almost all members of their families perished.

At the society's shelter, where they are living until they can find quarters of their own, the couple recounted how they cheated a fate that overtook millions like them and found a happy ending to a story reminiscent of Longfellow's "Evangeline."

Ben-Zion and Rachel grew up together along twisting Zgierska street in Lodz, Poland, where his father was a plumber and hers a storekeeper. After the German invasion the conquerors herded them into a ghetto with the rest of Lodz' Jews. On a June morning in 1943 Rachel learned that Ben-Zion had disappeared.

The youth had been taken to a labor camp near the city. He was transferred in October, 1944, to the notorious concentration center at Auschwitz, unaware that Rachel had just been seized and was imprisoned in the same place. But he did meet his father there, and together they were sent to Allen, near Hannover, where they labored 12,000 feet below the ground constructing German ammunition dumps.

At Allen the guards had orders to see that about fifteen prisoners

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Zionist Leaders Speak Defiance

PARIS — Berl Locker, British member of the Jewish Agency Executive, said this week the British action in declaring a ban on uncertified Jewish immigration to Palestine "won't stop the stream of immigrants."

"The British Government takes a very heavy responsibility by opening this new chapter of Jewish suffering," he said.

David Ben-Gurion, chairman of the Jewish Agency Executive, said "it is not yet sure that Mr. Bevin (British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin) should have the last word in history."

Force Britain To Keep Pledge

WASHINGTON — Rep. Emanuel Celler (D., N. Y.) urged this week that the U. S. A. withhold further money and credits from Britain "unless and until Britain keeps her Pledge under the (Palestine) mandate and allows Jews to enter their national home."

In a telegram to PM, the Representative labeled Britain's regime a "government of callous and soulless ministers." The U. S. A., he said, "must insist on the immediate entry of 100,000 Jews into Palestine. We must whiplash Britain into a sense of responsibility."

TO ABSORB 100,000
JERUSALEM — The Jewish Agency for Palestine has completed preparations for the absorption of 100,000 displaced Jews from Europe, it was reported by JNC.

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Non-Cooperation Policy Begun

Members of Gov't. Asked to Resign

JERUSALEM — Jews demonstrated and rioted in the streets of Jerusalem, Tel Aviv and Haifa in protest against the deportation of 1300 "illegal" immigrants to Cyprus.

Shots were fired by army patrols in all of Palestine's three main cities to restore order. The only casualties reported were in Haifa.

The national council for Palestine Jews decided in a closed meeting to enforce the "first stage" of a non-cooperation policy. As a result of this decision, all Jewish members of government advisory committees will be asked to resign and all relations between Jewish municipalities and government institutions will be severed.

JERUSALEM — The Zionist Inner Council decided this week to convene the World Zionist Congress somewhere in Europe in November.

need for raising our goal of \$800,000 is more urgent than ever.

The chief beneficiary of the greatest campaign ever tackled in this area will be the \$100,000,000 United Jewish Appeal for refugees, overseas needs, and Palestine. However, the General Jewish Committee has so broadened in scope that its one campaign contributes to 54 national and overseas needs representing over 100 important causes.

In spite of the summer heat, Mr. Sopkin has been busily engaged with building the foundation for the campaign, and the campaign staff under the direction of Joseph Galkin, is speeding ahead with preliminary preparations. Throughout the summer, Archibald Silverman, president of the General Jewish Committee, has been at the campaign office guiding the arrangements for the drive.

All leaders in the General Jewish Committee are confident that the goal can be reached but they are cognizant that it will take a supreme effort on the part of all, and unparalleled generosity in view of the tremendous needs. Mr. Sopkin stated that a minimum of 1000 men and women campaign workers will be needed in order to obtain proper coverage of the cards. He urged workers to volunteer immediately by contacting campaign headquarters at 203 Strand Building.

Mrs. Philip Dorenbaum, chairman of the women's division, reported that important announcements concerning the division will be made in next week's issue of the Jewish Herald.

5-Point Ultimatum Served on British

If Not Accepted, Fear Consequences

JERUSALEM — A five point ultimatum has been served on the British Government by Vaad Leumi (Jewish National Council) with the warning that if it is not accepted, no authority in Jewish Palestine will bear responsibility for the consequences. The ultimatum, adopted by Vaad Leumi and representatives of Jewish communities throughout Palestine at a plenary session here, demanded:

- 1) That the Government deny immediately all reports that it plans to blockade Palestine to keep out Jewish refugees.
- 2) That the Government take immediate steps to curb the intense anti-Semitic propaganda and agitation among British troops.
- 3) That the Government halt immediately all military operations, searches and curfews of Jewish cities and settlements which are regarded as a provocation and deliberate measure to undermine the economic position of Jewish Palestine.
- 4) That the Government cancel immediately the eviction of Jewish shops and commercial houses in Jerusalem and other towns which are also considered part of the attempt to destroy Jewish economy.
- 5) That the Government release immediately all detained members of the Jewish Agency Executive (Moshe Shertok, Bernard Joseph and Isaac Greenbaum), the chairman of Vaad Leumi (David Remez) and every Jewish settler summarily arrested and held without trial.

AN INTERESTING RECIPE FOR THE JEWISH HOME

BRAN GINGER SNAPS

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 cup molasses
6 tablespoons butter or other shortening
1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1 1/2 cups 40% bran flakes
Sift flour once, then measure. Add soda, salt and ginger and sift again. Place molasses, shortening and sugar in a saucepan and boil gently for two minutes, stirring constantly. Cool to lukewarm. Add flakes and mix well. Then add flour mixture and mix thoroughly. Chill until firm enough to roll. Roll 1/8 inch thick on a lightly-floured board. Cut with heart-shape cookie cutter. Place on a greased cookie sheet and bake in a moderate oven for 10 minutes. Makes six dozen ginger snaps.

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Germans See Charlie Chaplin Satire; Audience is Chilled

BERLIN — German film fans, who have waited for many years to glimpse Charlie Chaplin's "The Great Dictator," got their chance last week.

Hollywood's technique of a sneak preview brought the feature to the Berlin screen in a quiet neighborhood theatre, where the evening's billing was Ginger Rogers in "Kitty Foyle." A preliminary announcement from the stage that a switch had been made and that Chaplin's caustic burlesque of the Nazi regime would be shown instead was greeted with complete silence—which continued for extensive intervals throughout the unrolling of more than two hours of the superbly photographed slapstick and political satire.

Certain hilarious climaxes tickled Berliners almost as much as they did Americans and howls of laughter and even applause broke out at intervals. But impressions garnered by several American observers seated in the audience was that the customers, in traditional vaudeville parlance, were "sitting on their hands" in the majority of instances.

Candid opinions gleaned from anti-Nazi Germans who witnessed the showing added up to the fact that they believed the film should not be shown generally to German audiences. The basic reason that they advanced is that the current post-war eras are too grim and life too harsh for so graphic a review of the horrible phases of the past few years.

One half-Jewish girl when asked her response said promptly she was against further showings. The

sufferings of herself and her family during the era depicted, she confessed, had given her unpleasant twinges emotionally and she was confident it was no subject for Germans to see with any pleasure or profit.

An instant outburst of mirth throughout the house, however, marked the first appearance on the screen of the obese character impersonating Herman Goering, complete with chestful of medals and several chins. The famous scene in which Chaplin as "Hynkel" dances about the globe of the world, which finally explodes in his face, also touched off roars of appreciation. Possibly the most popular sequence of all was that of the terrified customer being shaved by an eccentric barber, also impersonated by Chaplin, each stroke of the razor keeping in perfect time to Brahms' Fifth Rhapsody. Another shriek of laughter arose when Hynkel addressed his rival and guest, Dictator Napolano, as "Benzino."

One of the most irritating phases of the film, according to superficial observation, was the gibberish utilized by Chaplin in mimicking Hitler's speeches, which hurt the Germans just as the massacre of English might hurt the British or Americans.

Jewish Medical Center to be Built

JCRA Selects Los Angeles Location

LOS ANGELES — The first national medical center under Jewish auspices in the United States will be established at Los Angeles, according to a decision adopted this week by more than 500 delegates attending the national convention here of the Jewish Consumptive Relief Association.

The plans discussed at the convention provide that the Los Angeles Sanatorium, operated by the J.C.R.A., is to be expanded from an institution specializing in tuberculosis patients to a medical center treating all types of disease. The budget for the medical center was set at \$7,215,000 to be raised and spent within two years.

The new center will contain a hospital equipped and staffed to diagnose and treat the various types of disease in a departmentalized set-up. In addition the center will include a medical school, a nurses school, and a research department. It will also participate in a national educational program for the promotion of good health.

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Mufti Favors a Bold Arab Policy

Extremists Demand Immediate Action

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt — Rumors of strong demands by Palestine Arabs, including Haj Amin Hussein, Mufti of Jerusalem, for a more vigorous policy in defense of Arab interests in Palestine filled the political atmosphere this week as the Foreign Ministers of seven member states of the Arab League convened to draft a common program for the proposed London conference on Palestine.

Nothing has been said directly, but there is evidence of a strong undercurrent of dissatisfaction and impatience with the moderate, deliberate and diplomatic course taken by the Arab League in its efforts to prevent Jewish colonization of Palestine and obtain the country's eventual independence as an Arab state.

Jamal le Hussein, vice chairman of the Palestine Arab Higher Committee, who has been in constant touch with the Mufti, the committee's chairman in exile, is widely reported to have forcefully expressed dissatisfaction. The Mufti, who is living in a private house in Alexandria and freely receiving political visitors, is understood to be asking all Arab leaders to concentrate their efforts on Palestine.

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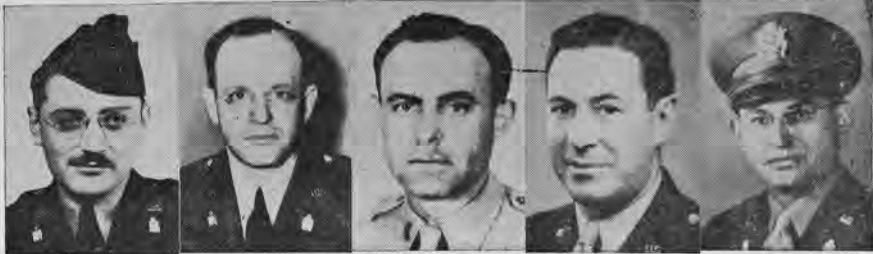
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Rabbis Assigned To Regular Army As Chaplains For First Time In History

died daily, and trucks made a weekly collection of the bodies. Three weeks before the arrival of American forces Ben-Zion's father was killed, and at the liberation he was one of forty survivors of the consignment of 1,050 from Oswiecim.

He made his way back to Lodz, with little hope of seeing Rachel again. But when he inquired at the Jewish community center, he learned that she was in the city and rushed to her for a reunion of which both had despaired. From Oswiecim, he learned, she had been sent to work in an aircraft plant at Freiburg and then, as the Red Army approached from the east, she had received the death sentence of a transfer to Mauthausen. A month after she reached that camp it was in American hands.

ROUTE RE-OPENED

PARIS — Information reaching Jewish leaders here says that the Sulzburg-Munich route used by Jewish refugees from Eastern Europe on route to the American zone in Germany is again open.

Monks Scores Palestine Closing

Says It Is War On Oppressed

NEW YORK — Challenging the validity of Britain's plans to halt unauthorized Jewish immigration into Palestine, Henry Monks, chairman of the interim committee of the American Jewish Conference, asserted this week that Jews held for deportation in Haifa were not "illegal" immigrants. "Their peaceful admission is just in terms of any code of human decency," he said.

"The seizure of vessels and the establishment of concentration camps for Jews in Cyprus, patterned on the Nazi practice, will not deter Jews from attempting to enter Palestine," he declared.

Terming the phrase "illegal immigrants" invalid, since it was based on the 1939 White Paper, Mr. Monks asserted that the British document violated the 1924 British-United States convention, which provided that no change in the Palestine mandate could be made without the consent of this country.

"The financing of Jewish immigration to Palestine, which Britain calls a 'conspiracy,' is in fact a rescue operation taking place in the clear light of day," he added.

The American Jewish conference represents sixty-three organizations in the United States.

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Curb Violence or Risk Disapproval of Zionism, Dorothy Thompson Warns

Dorothy Thompson, famed columnist and radio commentator who has shown her friendship for the Zionist cause by visiting Palestine and making innumerable speeches at Zionist rallies, has shifted ground apparently as a result of the King David military headquarters bombing by the Irgun Zvai Leumi, and advises U. S. Jewry to curb the revolutionary elements in Palestine or risk world disapproval of Zionism.

Because of the significance of her statement as an indication of widespread American sentiment about Palestine, her column is reprinted herewith:

The American Zionist organization will be compelled by the well-documented revelations of the British White Paper to exert decisive influence upon the policy of the Jewish Agency in Palestine. Otherwise, there will be defections of American Jews from the move-

ment and American and British non-Jewish support is likely to die away altogether.

Outside Palestine itself the most powerful Zionist movement on earth is in the United States among the 6,000,000 Americans of Jewish religion.

American Zionism claims to embrace a majority of American Jews, and possibly does. But it also has powerful adversaries among the most influential Jews of America. Or these, while otherwise sympathizing, oppose certain specific Zionist policies. In these times no Jew, quite understandably, is eager publicly to criticize other Jews. But sometimes in public and often in private many Jewish Americans express grave concern over phases of Zionist zealotry that might seem to give credence to the Hitlerian theory, productive of such awful woe, that the Jews, except in Palestine, are unassimilable to an "alien" civilization.

These Jewish Americans deplore. I think rightly, an argument which assume that in Palestine alone can Jews find a congenial home. They feel that the result of such an argument will be to fast doubts upon the millions of Jews whose sole oft-proven political loyalty—in any showdown—is to the country of their birth or adoption.

Such Jews, also, who have been working for the restoration of full legal and civil rights and the return of their stolen property to the remaining European Jews, charge the extremists in the Zionist movement with policies calculated rather to hinder than to promote this, and even to cause further displacements, in their zeal to create a situation insoluble except via Palestine.....

There are bitter factions within the Zionist movement itself, both in and out of Palestine. These are understandable amongst a people gathered from so many different backgrounds and civilizations. But the result of such factionalism is always the same—the leadership passes to the most ruthless extremists. All extremists foster friction until they can merge everything under their own minority banner. Faction curses Zionism

with the same dangers.

But American Zionism holds the purse strings of the movement. Without the flow of funds from the United States the whole experiment would break down. American Jewry is also, and especially since the tragic destruction of the German Jews, not only the economic but the intellectual elite of the Jewish people.

Yet it seemed to me, when I was in Palestine a year ago, that American Jews had far less effective control in the Jewish Agency than their character, abilities, or contributions justified, and that this adversely affected the administration. Armed conspiracies and nihilistic terrorism are the political instruments of oppressed peoples and are native to eastern Europe from which too many of the leading members of the Jewish Agency—or so it seemed to me—originated, bringing with them their political tactics, familiar to readers of the novels of Conrad or Dostoevsky. The agency was, I thought, too poor in men who knew from long personal experience the value of orderly processes. The extremists seemed to be pushing such men as Dr. Chaim Weizmann into support of all—or closing their eyes to—policies deeply distasteful to them.

Certainly, though violence breeds

violence, and the outrages are psychologically attributable to the terrible sufferings of the past decade, American and British Zionists must energetically extirpate it from the movement. For apart from its immortality, the Arabian world also understands the uses of conspiratorial violence and is fundamentally far stronger than the Zionists.

The American Zionists, who pay the piper, can if they unitedly will, call the tune.

Zionists on Jersey Farm Prepare for the Great Day

HIGHTSTOWN, N. J. — On a sprawling 208-acre farm near here, 38 youthful Zionists, who plan to go to Palestine to till the soil of the Holy Land on collective farms, are learning all the phases of their future livelihood.

The fledgling farmers, members of Hashomer Hatzair, which means Young Guards, average 23 years of age. They come from various parts of the U. S. A. and from a variety of walks of life. None has ever farmed before.

Their object is to learn all they can about collective farming, then migrate to Palestine by visa "or other means" and settle and work on collective farms there. Another objective, when they get there, is to aid and teach farming to refugee Jews from Europe.

There are three married couples in this group. Of 16 young men, 10 are war veterans.

The farm is owned by Hechalutz, a Zionist youth organization which fosters the idea of American Jewish youth going to Palestine to build it up. It has been in operation 5 years, but the number of its "graduates" is not revealed because some have managed to reach Palestine through the underground.

Of the 208 acres, 114 are cultivated. About half of them are devoted to the growing of apples, which is a money-producing crop. The rest of the acreage is split up into hay fields, pasture, chicken range and corn fields, as well as fields for growing 18 types of veg-

etables and fruit. Magina (Hilda) Shorr, who details the work assignments, explains that after a volunteer for the farm arrives, he does general farm duty for two months. He is then encouraged to specialize in some branch of farm work—handling and caring for the 4700 chickens and the daily yield of 900 eggs which the farm boasts; working in the dairy, caring for the 46 head of cattle which yield 320 quarts of milk a day; or caring for the apple orchard, vegetable garden or flower nursery, or working in the fields.

Miss Shorr says there is very little differentiation between the work of the men and the women. A girl may be seen driving a tractor or heaving bales of hay onto a truck; a man may be wearing an apron in the kitchen, doing housework or working in the collective laundry.

Under the farm's collective system, everyone, on arriving, throws his clothes and money into a general pool. New clothes for a week are issued every Friday.

The evenings are usually filled with Hebrew songs and dances. In addition, there are two classes in Hebrew weekly.

Cyprus Parties Protest Internment

LONDON — Leaders of various political parties on Cyprus met this week in Nicosia, capital city of Cyprus, to protest the reported British plan to intern visaless Jewish refugees on the island, it was reported here this week.

Another report from Cyprus said that a first batch of 500 Jews is expected there on Monday, with 2,000 more coming later in the week.

Constitution Is Not Factor in Decision

WASHINGTON — President Truman told his press conference this week that the question of the Constitution will not enter into American consideration of the British plan for the "federalization" of Palestine as the issue has nothing to do with the Constitution or treaties.

Picket New York British Consulate

NEW YORK — Carrying denunciatory placards and singing Zionist songs, a crowd, estimated at more than 3,000, picketed the British Consulate in the downtown financial district this week, demanding that Britain "open the gates of Eretz Israel to a decimated people." The picket line was led by a score of uniformed and bearded Jewish Legionnaires.

Cantor Mordecai Yardeni led the crowd in the chanting of the traditional Tisha B'Av "Kinnoth," the Lamentations. When the chanting was concluded, Elias Ginzburg, a leader of the Jewish Legionnaires, addressed a plea to the British authorities to transfer "the remnants of European Jewry to Palestine."
