Bilbo May Be Through

A lot of Americans have been irritated for a long time by the fact that, while Sen. Bilbo (D-Miss.) openly boasted that he belongs to the Ku Klux Klan and allowed leading and lower well. slurred Italians and Jews as well as Negroes, nobody seemed to be able to do anything about it.

But after the Republicans won the Congressional election, a series of inter-party maneuvers began which may put Bilbo out of political life.

The Republicans announced lang to use their majority to bar Bilbo from his Senate seat.

The Democrats raced to get ahead of the Republicans before they take over control of the new Congress. They pressed an investigation of charges that Bilbe won election by force and duress, and incited white men to use violence to stop Negroes from voting, They pushed a second investigation of suspicions that Bilbe accepted gifts from war con-tractors, including a Cadillae and 825,000.
