### Editorials

#### Bilbo May Be Through

A lot of Americans have been irritated for a long time by the fact that, while Sen. Bilbo (D-Miss.) openly boasted that he belongs to the Ku Klux Klan and stirred Italians and Jews as well as Negroes, nobody seemed to be able to do anything about it.

But after the Republicans won the Congressional election, a series of inter-party maneuvers began which may put Bilbo out of political life.

The Republicans announced plans to use their majority to bar Bilbo from his Senate seat.

The Democrats raced to get ahead of the Republicans before they take over control of the new Congress. They pressed an investigation of charges that Bilbo won election by force and duress, and incited white men to use violence to stop Negroes from voting. They pushed a second investigation of suspicions that Bilbo accepted gifts from war contractors, including a Cadillac and \$25,000.

It's an old democratic truth, that when there is healthy party competition in politics, it's the people who gain. So, it looks as if we might get rid of Bilbo at last.

## Mrs. J. S. Temkin Named Chairman

### Seek Clothing, Drugs and Food

Mrs. Jacob S. Temkin has been appointed chairman of the SOS collection it was announced this week by Mrs. Sidney Goldman, president of the Rhode Island League of Jewish Women. Mrs. Temkin succeeds Mrs. Irving J. Fain, who headed this program since its inception in Providence. Mrs. Philip Dorenbaum and Mrs. Herbert Cohen will serve as co-chairmen of the reorganized set-up. George Pullman will be in charge of shipping and transportation.

The SOS (Supplies for Overseas Survivors) collection is a special project of the Joint Distribution Committee to supplement its regular relief and rehabilitation activities in behalf of the 1,500,000 surviving Jews over Continental Europe. In Providence the program has been sponsored by the Rhode Island League of Jewish Women's organization with the cooperation of the General Jewish Committee.

Mrs. Temkin announced that plans are being made to get the SOS collection under way immediately so that the flow of supplies can be prepared for shipment overseas.

In the spring phase of the SOS collection, Providence succeeded in sending 21,468 pounds of clothing, canned goods and medicines to the JDC receiving center in Mt. Vernon, New York, where it was prepared for immediate overseas shipment.

Mrs. Temkin announced that a meeting of representatives of the various women's organizations in Providence will be called for next Wednesday at 2 o'clock at General Jewish Committee headquarters.

## "One Man's Opinion"

Jewish Books

The Jewish Book Month now being observed in many cities, revives the old discussion on the meaning of a Jewish book.

What are the characteristics of a book that put it in that category? Is it the language? Authorship? Content? Characters? What if some cultural society in our community decided to do something about Jewish Book Month, and was planning to arrange an exhibit of books, how would one go about including some and omitting others?

A volume on atomic energy written in Hebrew, a tome on the Psychology of Education in Yiddish, would these two appear on the exhibit? They could be admitted by the criterion of language and authorship, but the content is not necessarily Jewish.

"Peace of Mind," topping the lists of best-sellers these last few months, though written by a Rabbi, can hardly be classified as a Jewish book. On the other hand "David the King," written by a Protestant woman, has been a most monumental addition to the Jewish historical-novel literature in English.

Certainly, "The Forgotten Ally" ought to be included in the exhibit, though the author is of Dutch-American stock.

What would one do with "Wasteland," by Joe Sinclair, and Arthur Kober's Benny Greenspan stories now published in one volume? Written by Jews and dealing with supposedly Jewish characters, are they to be displayed

on the exhibition tables as Jewish books?

One could multiply instances that would only further harass the committee in charge of arranging our hypothetical book exhibit.

Certain books however unmistakably belong in the classification of Jewish books regardless of their language or authorship. On the occasion of Jewish Book Month, and also because the gift-giving season is on hand, I will deviate from the usual practice of treating only local community affairs in this column, and I will mention three books published during the year 1946. They are in my opinion fine examples of what is meant by "Jewish Books," and they are good books besides. Either one of the three is an ideal Chanukah or Christmas gift for people who like good books.

1. **The Old Country**, by Sholom Aleichem. This is a collection\* of short stories translated into English for the first time, from the writings of the great humorist whose stories have delighted Yiddish and Hebrew readers since the turn of the century. Sholom Aleichem has now been rediscovered for the English speaking world, and judging by the response of the critics to this volume, we can predict others to follow soon.

2. **Thieves in the Night**, by Arthur Koestler. A warm intimate tale of interesting young people in a communal settlement in Palestine, against the background of the English-Arab-Jewish conflict in the Holy Land. This book, more than anything I have read, throws light on the motives behind the struggles of the Jewish underground.

3. **Burning Candles**, by Bella Chagall. The wife of the famous artist Marc Chagall tells with great tenderness of the life in the little Jewish towns of Eastern Europe, now vanished forever. This life, so many of us knew, though materially poor, was spiritually rich and inspired the creative genius of Marc Chagall, whose 36 drawings are included in the book.

And by the way, are you aware of the existence of a Jewish Book Club? It is conducted along the same lines as all other book clubs, and the selections each month are made by a board of editors consisting of Ludwig Lewinsohn, Lewis Browne, and Paul Eldridge. "The Old Country" is given free to members joining the club this month.
