Gen. Clay Warns of "Official" Bias

FRANKFURT, Germany—Gen. Lucius D. Clay warned Americans in Germany this week that "official" criticisms of the Jewish people, whether by civilians or soldiers, would be severely punished.

The U.S. military governor in Germany told a press conference that he has "no sympathy whatever" for statements indicating "intolerance of any kind."

He said he had been told that several Americans here had been overheard making anti-Semitic remarks, and warned that he would take drastic action against any person making such statements "officially."

"If he's in the Army, disciplinary action will be taken," Clay said. "If he's a civilian, he will be asked to resign and will be sent home."

The general added that it would be difficult to discipline officials who speak against the Jews "privately or semi-officially."

Clay stressed his personal opposition to intolerance, and added that he "would be happy if everybody in the occupation knew just exactly how I do feel about it."

It was understood that one of Clay's top advisers had been guilty of anti-Semitic remarks, but the general did not direct his warning specifically to any individual.

Harry Greenstein of Baltimore, Clay's adviser on Jewish affairs, had predicted that the problem of the 85,000-odd Jewish displaced persons remaining in Germany and Austria could be solved by mid-1950.

Greenstein said he was sure that all Jewish DP camps would be closed by that date.

Israeli Engineer Is Technion Guest

Harry Krivitsky, who has fought with the U. S. Marine Corps and the Israeli Army, and Louis Rosenbloom, research engineer of the Polaroid Corporation in Cambridge, will be guest speakers of the Southern New England chapter of the American Technion Society Thursday at 8:30 o'clock at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel.

Mr. Krivitsky, a national hero in Israel and a recipient of the Latrun Citation, has received official commendation from Prime Minister David Ben Gurion for his actions in Israeli battles.

Mr. Rosenbloom will explain and demonstrate the newly-developed "Land Camera" which develops the printed picture almost immediately after the snapshot is made.

The American Technion Society works to develop technology and applied science in Israel through financial and moral support. Local chapter members include engineers and industrialists.

Scholarship Fund Accepting Applications

The Jori Scholarship Committee is now accepting applications for the academic year of 1949-1950. Now in its second year, Jori Scholarships for higher education were awarded during the past year to twelve young men and women of Jewish faith. Reports to date from the recipients of the scholarships are encouraging, and the scholarship committee is pleased at the progress made by these successful candidates who are attending colleges throughout the country.

Information bulletins have been mailed to over 150 organizations within the State of Rhode Island, and applications have already been received.

Established and administered by the Board of Directors of the Jewish Children's Home of Rhode Island, a limited number of scholarships are to be granted annually for education beyond the high school level. These scholarships are available to qualified Jewish youth of Rhode Island who might otherwise be unable to pursue their studies.

Benjamin Brier, chairman of the Scholarship Committee, reported that a number of interested people and organizations had made substantial contributions to the Scholarship Fund in order that as many as possible deserving candidates could be given assistance.

Arab Deputy Makes Friendship Appeal

Cheers Greet Dramatic Plea

JERUSALEM—Standing on the rostrum of Israel's new Constituent Assembly under a painting of Theodore Herzl, founder of Zionism, the Arab deputy from Nazareth made a dramatic appeal this week for peaceful relations with the Arab states. Applause rang out in the assembly hall for the first time since the meeting convened.

Wearing a black tasseled red tarboush and a dark modern business suit, the delegate, Amin Jarjoura, a prominent magistrate, said he fully realized the grave responsibility that rested on his shoulders and those of his colleague. He made no reference to the third Arab deputy who is a member of the Communist party.

He made a good impression on the members when he referred to the Constituent Assembly as "Knesset," which was the ancient Jewish Council after the return from exile. The name has been proposed for the Assembly in the draft constitution that is about to be adopted.

When he finished in Arabic his speech was translated into Hebrew and read to the Assembly.

The speaker stressed the view that Israel should strive for peaceful and friendly relations with the neighboring Arab states and should give an example to others in its foreign policy.

JTA, UJA Publicity Director Have Row

ATLANTIC CITY—The Jewish Telegraphic Agency filed a formal protest with the United Jewish Appeal against the action of Meyer Steinglass, UJA publicity director, who tore a JTA bulletin out of the hands of a UJA delegate and confiscated 250 copies of a JTA report at the national UJA conference here.

Jacob Landau, managing director of the JTA, sent his protests to Herman Weisman of the United Palestine Appeal, Dr. Jonah B. Wise of the Joint Distribution Committee and William Rosenwald of the United Service for New Americans.

Steinglass Got Mad

Landau said that Steinglass took the action because it contained a report which the publicity chief called "filthy propaganda."

He said he wished to register "an emphatic protest against the high-handed action" taken by Steinglass.

More About England and The Jews

"The guiding principles of Israeli foreign policy appears to be to do everything to please the U. S., to do nothing to offend the Soviet Union, and to do everything to fight the United Kingdom," states Prof. Norman Bentwich of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, in the London Jewish Chronicle of this week. "Nobody recalls that it was the British army and British endurance that saved the Yishuv and the Jewish National Home from utter destruction in 1942 when Rommel was at the gates of Cairo and Alexandria. The tragic incidents of Struma and Patria, on the other hand are remembered."

To these facts of Prof. Bentwich's, one who knows England might add a few others which are little known in this country. First, that Great Britain was throughout the 19th century the bulwark of Liberalism which had introduced and advanced the principle of equal rights for Jews wherever they lived. Second, that throughout the Victorian era, from the days of Sir Moses Montefiore to Lord Balfour, the British Government invariably intervened in behalf of Jews in Eastern Europe and North Africa whenever they were persecuted or underwent pogroms. Third, that until recently, Great Britain had less anti-Semitism than any country in the Western or Eastern world, including the United States and Soviet Russia. Fourth, that it was the British Government that gave the Balfour Declaration without which there would never have been a Jewish State. Fifth, that Great Britain, a small crowded island, plagued with the worst unemployment problem in its history voluntarily opened its doors and admitted 60,000 Jewish refugees from Nazi oppression from 1933 to 1939, a number far in excess in proportion to that of any country in the world. These refugees were not only given refuge and full equal rights, but the government actually financed a part of their upkeep for years until they could support themselves, because the Jewish community of England could not defray the entire expense as American Jewish organizations are now doing.

A mere enumeration of these facts shows that there has never been any real basis for hatred between Jews and the British, except transitory politics and extremist propaganda. Now, both of these have outlived their time with the establishment of Israel and its recognition by Britain.

Washington's Birthday

On Washington's birthday, an American's thoughts turn naturally to the foundation of our republic and to the great work wrought by the Founding Fathers.

Throughout a large part of today's world people cover in terror of secret police, political judges, and summary "justice". A few words laid end to end in the "wrong" order may cost a man his head; a political misstep can wipe out a whole village.

We Americans enjoy the priceless protections of due process of law. Our Fathers had the wisdom to guarantee us "certain unalienable rights," and to root these rights in the equal creation of all men by the unchangeable God.

"All men are created equal," they said, and "are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, (and) among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

If this be not true—wholly and entirely and literally true—our liberties rest indeed on shifting sands. Let us remember this during Brotherhood Week (Feb. 20-27). Remember it! Practice it!

"One Man's Opinion"

Grandfather telling of Brotherhood Week

"Tell me more about the time when you were young, grandfather."

"Let me see, my child. I have told you about the ice-box and how we had to put out a card in the window every morning so that the ice-man would bring up a cake of ice. I have told you about the street-cars and of the automobiles and how we had to pour gasoline into them or they would not run. And I have told you about the radio and how we could hear people talk and play and sing but we could not see them. And do you remember about the furnaces and how I had to go down the cellar wintertimes to throw in coal and to take out the ashes, and how I hated to do it?"

"That was funny, wasn't it?"

"Did I ever tell you of the special weeks we had in those days?"

"Special weeks? What is that?"

"Well, nearly every week of the year had some kind of a special name. For instance, we had a Drink More Milk Week, and a Eat More Apples Week, and Keep Your City Clean Week."

"What did you do on those weeks? Did you drink a lot of milk and eat lots of apples and clean the city all week long?"

"No, but we were told how healthy it is to drink milk and to eat apples and to keep the streets clean."

"And what did you do after the special weeks were over? Did you always drink more milk and eat more apples and were the streets always clean?"

"Well, some people did and some did not, some streets were kept clean and some were not."

"What else did you have special, grandfather?"

"We also had a Be Kind to Animals Week, and an All Men are Brothers Week."

"Why, grandfather?"

"Because some people were not kind to animals, and many people thought that they were better than others."

"Why did they think so?"

"Oh, there were people of white skin and people of dark skin living in the same city, and those who were born white were sure that they were wiser, and better, and more favored than those who were born dark. They would not sit with them in the same restaurant, nor live with them in the same house, nor would they call a doctor or a nurse with a dark skin to help them when they were sick. Some white people would not even want their children to go to the same school where the children of dark parents went."

"And so, on that special All Men are Brothers Week, we were told that it is not good to be that way, that the color of the skin does not matter, and that under the skin people are all alike. There are only good people and bad people, honest men and women and evil men and women, fair boys and girls and mean boys and girls. But the color of the skin does not make a man better or worse."

"And did the white people like the dark people all week long?"

"Some did and some did not. Many of us liked the colored people all the time, others never did. Not even on the special week."

"Did you like them, grandfather?"

"Oh, yes. I had many good friends whose skin was dark. There was James, the chef, who prepared my meals for me every day, where I worked. A finer man

and a kinder soul you could hardly wish to meet anywhere. And his meals were delicious because he liked his work and did his work honestly. The plate of vegetables that he prepared for me every day was as much a delight to the eye as it was sweet to the mouth. And before James I knew Mrs. Howard, the cook, who was spotless in her work around the kitchen, and was as fine mannered a lady as I have ever met. I never remember her raising her voice above a whisper to anyone, be it the highest in office or the humblest dish washer. And we all liked Sussie who came every Friday to help your grandmother to clean the house for Sabbath. Only sickness or bad weather could keep Sussie from coming Fridays. Though she was no longer young, she earned her bread by hard work, and her mind was as keen as that of a young woman. Her tongue could turn out a biting quip at the white people and their silly notions of being better and above all other races. And she was not afraid to speak her mind, either. And I knew a preacher who was also an ashman all week long because his colored church was too poor to pay him enough for his preaching on Sundays. And yet, his Good Morning, Doc, was the most cheerful one anybody ever called out at me on mornings when we met on our way to work. Many a cloudy early morning hour was made brighter because of his heart warming greeting."

"And where are the colored people now, grandfather?"

"There are no more white people and dark people now on earth, my child. We are all blue now. Our skin is as blue as the skies on a clear Summer day."

"How did that happen, grandfather?"

"That is a long story. Some other time I will tell you all about it. But it all happened long before you were born, when a scientist who was working on some strange gases in a secret laboratory in the desert, released the gas by accident. And when the gas spread over the face of the earth all people turned blue."

"And that is why, my child, there are no more special weeks now in which to tell people that the color of the skin does not matter. All people have the same skin, and there are no more white and dark skins on the bodies of men and women, boys and girls, ever since that accident."

Boosting the Grays' Stock



Anyone who has ever yearned for a municipal stadium in Providence and a professional ball club worthy of a city of this size cannot help but feel pride in the newly organized Providence Grays and their announced program. And since this column has repeatedly complained about the old, stand-pat regime on the part of the sports-minded citizenry, there would be no justice if it didn't shout about the rebirth of ambition and intention on the part of the new ownership.

It is not so much with the reorganization itself that I am concerned now, for that has been fully publicized for some time and an active campaign to sell stock in the club is under way. There is far more to the Grays' announcer program, however, than has heretofore been played up, and that is what I want to discuss today.

For instance, did you know that the club intends to pursue a policy of sponsoring the erection of a municipal stadium? And had you heard that the new president, Charley Pine, is working on the problem of getting Cranston Stadium's facilities improved for this season? Or that such a famous old-time player as Stuffie McInnis is being considered for the managerial post?

All these, and more, are important considerations with the ball club right now—and when you consider that just a few short months ago more than one stockholder was privately dubious of the prospects of Providence having a team at all this year, you begin to realize that progress is setting in to replace the cobwebs of decay to which we have been so long accustomed.

Regarding the negotiations with Stuffie McInnis, club officials may deny this story now. As I understand it, talks with Stuffie have been kept secret because of the Grays' reluctance to build up local hopes until some concrete agreement has been made. However, I am reliably informed that the former first sacker on Connie Mack's \$100,000 dream infield is being given serious consideration because of his talent for developing young players. Frankie Pytlak, former Indians and Red Sox catcher, is the most prominent aspirant mentioned to date. Frankie and Stuffie both are interested in the job. Pytlak, in fact, has written to Providence and expressed his desire to come here.

Whoever becomes manager for 1949, chalk one up for the sincerity of the Grays, who positively demand a man with major league background. This is not just for publicity purposes. Pine and Louis Pain and their associates feel that a major leaguer will do the best possible job of developing players and teaching heads-up, inside baseball. In addition, he may win the confidence of big league clubs which may send player talent to Providence as a result.

I am most pleased with the official announcement that the Grays will push for the building of a municipal stadium, either by the city or by private resources. That is the best news yet. Here is a sincere wish that they stick to that promise and that the goal is achieved. And that reminds me that two other civic groups have quietly begun talks about a stadium. The site being given most consideration is that near the old shipyard. More information on that score as I get it.

While the plans for their own

ball park are in the dream stage, the Grays are not content to use Cranston Stadium in its present condition. The club says it will insist on changes, such as installation of grandstand and a limited number of box seats, improved rest room facilities, an outside fence and moving back of the present short right field fence. Any such plans to make the spectator more comfortable merit praise.

Seek Big League Tie-up

Although the Class B Grays will be independent in '49, a major league tie-up is sought, and the World Champion Indians are still the most likely possibility. And if the Grays' administration has its way, Class B baseball is on its last legs here. It is hoped to move the city into a higher classification within a few years.

Not content merely to let matters take their natural course, the Grays are introducing something new to Providence—a promotional series aimed at improving attendance. We have all heard of the stunts pulled last year by Bill Veeck out in Cleveland. Well, the Grays will feature that sort of program, with Father and Son and Ladies nights, player contests.

RESOLUTION Expressing the Protests of B'Nai B'Rith Roger Williams Lodge No. 1184 of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations Against the Action of the Hungarian Government in Arresting and sentencing to life imprisonment Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic Primate of Hungary, Upon Suspicion of Plotting Against the Government.

Whereas, The State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations was founded upon principles of civil and religious liberty, "to hold forth a lively experiment that a most flourishing civil state may stand and best be maintained with full liberty in religious concerns" and

Whereas, Roger Williams, the founder of this state, fled from religious persecution to set up a state where one was permitted to think as he liked and to say what he thought without fear or persecution; now, therefore be it,

RESOLVED, That vigorous protests of the members of B'Nai B'Rith Roger Williams Lodge No. 1184 of the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations be and they are hereby ardently expressed against the action of the Hungarian government in arresting and sentencing to life imprisonment Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic Primate of Hungary, for alleged subversive activity and for defending the rights of his church and the faithful against unfair attacks of the unscrupulous determined to destroy the religious feeling of the people; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of Roger Williams Lodge No. 1184 be and he is hereby authorized and directed to transmit to the Secretary of State of the United States of America and to the Representatives and Senators from Rhode Island in the Eighty-First Congress each a duly certified copy of this resolution.

B'nai B'rith Plans Institute

So that the newly elected officers and new committee chairmen will be thoroughly grounded in the duties of their offices, the Southern Massachusetts and Rhode Island Zone of B'nai B'rith will hold its first institute on April 27 at Hope High School.

The institute idea was originated by Herb Levy of the District 1 office, who will attend with a large group of B'nai B'rith members to give each group of new officers all the information needed to do a good job.

Twelve groups will assemble in the school for a short talk, after which they will disperse to various classrooms for individual group instruction.

All officers, including board members and trustees of both the lodges and chapters in the area, have been invited to attend and their presence is urged so that they can get all this valuable information.

Dr. Allport Explains "Scapegoating"

Dr. Gordon W. Allport, distinguished professor of psychology at Harvard University, has written the fourth and most recent in ADL's series of Freedom Pamphlets. Entitled "ABC's of Scapegoating," the pamphlet analyzes this extreme, and often violent, form of prejudice resulting from frustrated individuals or societies which blame others for their own misfortunes or misdeeds.

Education, social change, and legislation are the chief methods recommended by Dr. Allport for combatting scapegoating. Educa-

tion can help immunize the individual against the acceptance of prejudice leading to a "diseased mentality," and laws can to some extent protect the victim from some discriminatory practices. But only social change, he writes, can remove the conditions that breed frustration and fear, which in turn spawn prejudice and violence.

"Our goal," declares Dr. Allport, "is not mere freedom from scapegoating. We are striving for a society in which positive respect and active cooperation will exist among all its members."

A Real Member Can't Discriminate

"How can you prove it?" asked the investigator.

"Why, I am a member of B'nai B'rith," replied the employer.

With no lodge or chapter in Fall River, Mass., the B'nai B'rith banner is carried by the David R. Radovsky AZA and Louise Waterman Wise BBG Chapters. The boys and girls are striving to fulfill as much of the Order's program as they are able.

There is a legend told about three horsemen, who were riding across a desert one night. As they crossed the dry bed of a river, out of the darkness a voice called, "Halt!"

They obeyed. The voice then told them to dismount, pick up a handful of pebbles, put the pebbles in their pockets and remount.

Then the voice said, "You have done as I commanded. Tomorrow at sun-up you will be both glad and sorry".

Mystified, the horsemen rode on. When the sun rose, they reached into their pockets and found that a miracle had happened. Formerly, the children at Oakland Avenue attended classes in South Providence. Transportation difficulties arose, however, and resulted in the establishment of the Oakland Avenue Talmud Torah. In order to make the school appealing and attractive to the children, Rabbi Goldstein has installed facilities for entertainment, including movies, outings, plays and prizes.

It was also announced that registration is now open. Parents who are interested are invited to call DE 6185. Rabbi Goldstein will be happy to talk with them and arrange for their children's entrance into the Talmud Torah. His personal attention to the needs and progress of his pupils is assured.

Lebanon, Syria Iraq to Negotiate

CAIRO, Egypt—Loufit al Hafar, deputy chairman of the Syrian Chamber of Deputies, said this week that as a result of discussions here among representatives of the Arab states, Lebanon, Syria and Iraq had decided to make acceptance of Dr. Ralph Bunche's invitation to negotiate for a definite Palestine armistice dependent on the successful outcome of the negotiations in which Egypt is now engaged.

By successful conclusion of the present negotiations, Loufit al Hafar explained that he meant a conclusion in accord with the United Nations Security Council's truce instructions of Nov. 4 and 16.

Responsible sources report that not only Lebanon, Syria and Iraq have decided to make participation in the armistice negotiations dependent on the conclusion of the present negotiations in accord with the Security Council's instructions but that the other states that received Mr. Bunche's invitation, with the exception of Trans-Jordan, had done the same there. It has been learned here

that Trans-Jordan has already accepted the invitation. However, feeling in Cairo against Trans-Jordan is intense and King Abdullah's action is interpreted as another example of his lack of solidarity with the Arab world.
