## Center Annual Meeting May 11

## Austerity Plan in Israel Opposed

TEL AVIV—The austerity program which has been proposed by the Israeli government is encountering opposition from various political groups, large segments of the public and a sizable part of the Hebrew press. Every one agrees some type of restraint is necessary to halt the spiraling cost of living, but there is criticism of the type of controls proposed.

Right-wing political organizations such as the General Zionists, have been declaring for the last three days, in the press and in addresses in the Knesset (Parliament) that the government's plan to control all industries and small workshops by a licensing system will mean the end of pri-

ivate enterprises and of foreign capital investments in Israel.

Mapam, the Left-wing United Labor party, has averred that the standardization of production and the industrial curbs proposed will throw hundreds of persons out of work. The Communist party is attacking the program because it does not include nationalization of imports.

In the three days since Dr. Dov Joseph, Minister of Rationing and Price Control, announced the impending austerity regime, the public has been responding, as in other countries in similar circumstances, by making a mass rush for goods which are to be prohibited.

Mr. Finkle, long active in affairs of New England Jewry, is a member of the General Committee of District Grand Lodge No. 1, B'nai B'rith; treasurer of the Central New England Council of B'nai B'rith; member of the New England Advisory Council of the Anti-Defamation League, and a member of the executive committees of the Jewish Home for the Aged, Miriam Hospital, Providence Zionist District and Camp Jori.

His term on the FEPC commission which takes office July 1 expires in 1952.

## Olympics Win In Bowling Tournament

Presenting a solid, well-balanced front that was just too much for the combined opposition, the Wm. G. Cutler Olympic Club rolled to an easy triumph in the second annual Herald Bowling Tournament Monday evening at the Casino Alleys. It marked the Olympics' second successive win and left them needing but one more tourney title to take permanent possession of the new Herald trophy.

The Olympics piled up a record 11 points, as compared to the three points garnered by Woonsocket B'nai B'rith, making its first appearance in the rolloff match, and two for Providence Fraternal Association.

Olympic teams took eight of the twelve strings and had the pin-fall points in three of the four divisions. Only in the A group did they fail to make a runaway, the champs taking only the middle string while Providence Fraternal picked up the other two. Surprisingly, Woonsocket's A team, losing all three strings, still took the point for total pinfall. Woonsocket's other points came from single wins by the B and D teams.

Individual honors were carted off by J. Smith of Providence Fraternal with a high three total of 352 and a single string mark of 127. Trailing him for high three honors were Sol Stein, Woonsocket, 344; Irv Levine, Olympics, 342; Howie Cohen, Olympics, 332, and S. Mack, Woonsocket, 331.

Other high single strings were made by Harry Woloff and Howie Cohen, Olympics, B. Robbins and Sol Stein, Woonsocket, all 123; Irv Levine, Olympics, 121; M. Kaplan and S. Mack, Providence Fraternal, 120.

The best team total was turned in by Woonsocket A's, which rolled 1571, compared to Providence Fraternal A's 1559, Olympic A's 1540 and Olympic B's 1538. The Olympics had 27 individual

## Domestic Jewish Charity is Growing

### Cavalcade Speaker



**RABBI DUDLEY WEINBERG**

Rabbi Dudley Weinberg of Temple Ohabei Shalom, Boston, will deliver a sermon at Temple Beth El next Friday in connection with the third annual American Jewish Cavalcade, it was announced this week by Irving Jay Fain, chairman of the Temple's Sabbath Eve committee.

Designed as a program of "religious rededication", as characterized by President Truman, the Cavalcade launched this year by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations will function through the entire month of May. Approximately 90 Liberal rabbis will visit nearly as many communities, spending two or three days in each speaking to congregations, sisterhoods, brotherhoods, interfaith groups and institutions of higher learning.

### Report Rise As

### Overseas Needs Drop

NEW YORK—Jewish communities throughout the United States are increasing their contributions for domestic Jewish institutions, and this trend will probably grow as requirements for Jews overseas diminish, S. D. Gershovitz, executive director of the National Jewish Welfare Board, said last week. Mr. Gershovitz spoke at a dinner at the Commodore Hotel.

"Jews are responding as generously as ever for foreign needs," Mr. Gershovitz said, "but they are spending increasing amounts on domestic installations. More than \$70,000,000 was raised in the United States during 1948 for construction of Jewish Centers, hospitals and other facilities, which, he said, is twice the amount raised for this purpose in 1947.

"With the emptying of the D.P. camps in Europe, the greater stabilization and security of the state of Israel and the setting of long range plans for servicing Jews in oriental communities overseas there is a strong likelihood that there will be a diminishing call for continuance of high goals for overseas purposes," Mr. Gershovitz said.

"Although the large sums hitherto raised through the emotional appeals of the overseas situation may not be matched after that appeal is reduced, many prognosticators confidently expect that the board mobilization of interest and manpower through national means and through greater local effectiveness in campaigning may succeed in retaining higher levels of giving to meet the more comprehensive and overall needs of the American Jewish community."


