## GJC to Have One Day Drive Sunday

### Calls for New U. S. Synagogue

NEW YORK—A recommendation that a new type of American synagogue, one that will be neither Orthodox, Conservative nor Reform, but a non-denominational, non-sectarian synagogue that will be patterned after the synagogue in Israel, should be established in this country, was made here by Rabbi Israel Tabak, president of the Synagogue Council of America.

#### Divide Ranks

Asserting at a public reception tendered him and 11 other Council members who recently returned from Israel that "American Jews are confused and bewildered by the multiplicity of religious causes and institutions and by the divisiveness in Jewish ranks," Dr. Tabak stated: "Now that there is one people of Israel, let there be one faith of Israel." American Jewry, he continued, "should do away with the denominationalism which is dividing us more and more painfully."

#### Waste of Effort

Rabbi Tabak also declared that the "competitive efforts in fund-raising for religious institutions, are not only a great waste of effort and expense, but are calculated seriously to jeopardize the future of Judaism in this country." Reporting that "Judaism in Israel is developing along new lines altogether," he said that studies are now being undertaken "to bring the ancient laws and traditions of Judaism into harmony with the new dynamic form of life which is now growing up in Israel."

### Israel and Syria Withdraw Forces

TEL AVIV—Both the Israel and the Syrian forces have fulfilled provisions of their armistice agreement, entailing the destruction of fortifications and withdrawal of troops beyond newly demarcated lines and the demilitarization of a central front strip, the Syrian and Israel delegates announced at a meeting of the mixed armistice commission held in Rosh Pina. This concludes an important phase of the agreement between the countries.

### Campaign Total Reaches \$770,000

More than 300 volunteer adult workers in the GJC's Men's Division are ready to swing into action for Sunday's community-wide "D"-Day canvass in behalf of the United Jewish Appeal and 54 other charitable agencies.

The "D"-Day solicitation of still unpledged donors to the 1949 campaign of the General Jewish Committee is expected to push the drive total up to the \$770,000 level as the campaign enters its waning weeks.

Workers will gather at the Narragansett Hotel Sunday morning for brief final instructions and a rally breakfast. Immediately thereafter, they will divide into automobile squads and call upon prospects in specified geographical districts of the city. By noon, it is expected that the canvass will be completed and more than 1000 additional names entered on the rolls of the GJC year book.

A plea to all yet-uncontacted donors to remain at home Sunday morning until a volunteer worker has called was made this week by Bernard Goodman, chairman of the special one-day canvass.

Goodman's statement further asked potential contributors to keep the following points in mind:

- 1) "Your one contribution serves almost 60 humanitarian causes that are dependent in whole or part upon General Jewish Committee allocations.
- 2) "You have this one big day to make your pledge but you may take several months to pay it, if you wish.
- 3) "A \$40 pledge represents but 10c a day to you—but to a newly (Continued on Page 9)

## Large Crowd Attends Hearing on Released Time

Jewish and Protestant leaders protested the proposed bill that Rhode Island public school students be released from regular school hours to go to their respective church schools for religious training at a meeting of a special commission organized to study the bill. The first public hearing took place Monday in a State House hearing room before a capacity audience.

The commission, appointed by Gov. John O. Pastore to study the bill and make recommendations, has already held a private hearing with school superintendents from various parts of the state.

Although most of the speakers were Jewish and Protestant leaders opposed to the bill, the few Roman Catholic speakers were uniformly in favor of the proposal.

#### Cites Freedom Guarantees

Fred B. Perkins, attorney and leading Universalist layman, said released time certainly, in his opinion, was contrary to the constitutional guarantee in this state that "no man shall be compelled to frequent any religious establishment whatsoever."

The Rev. John J. Kenney, a member of the commission, asked Perkins if he would oppose a law that was not mandatory that a child be compelled to attend religious classes during released time.

Perkins said he understood there were two types of laws, one a "dismissed time" law, under which "you send out the entire school at 2 o'clock on Tuesday, for example, and to the extent the state feels that religious affairs are important if a child voluntarily wishes to attend such religious classes, I would have no objection to that. I don't feel it would be too effective, but I can't object."

#### Wouldn't Oppose Dismissed Time

The bill introduced last year, Perkins said, was permissive only that if local school authorities and parents agreed to it, children should be released for religious classes. "But it says the pupil must either go to the religious classes, where attendance would be taken, or he would have to stay in the school building. That, I submit, is using the truant system to make sure a child doesn't play hookey from religious instruction."

### GJC to Resume Calendar Listings

Effective next week, the General Jewish Committee of Providence will resume its calendar of events for men's organizations which will be published weekly in the Community Calendar of The Herald. Organizations are requested to call GASpee 1-4111 and ask for the calendar secretary with whom they may list their meeting dates.

It was not the word "truant" in the law to which he objected, Perkins said under further questions, but to the whole idea of mandatory attendance.

Rabbi Bohnen asked that churches and synagogues use their influence to bring children to classes in increasing numbers but that they insist that the public schools remain completely apart from any such effort.

"I say this, not only because of my concern for democracy in political life but primarily because of my concern for religion and real religious education, not only for today and for tomorrow, but for the many tomorrows of the future."

**Debate Merits of "Released Time"**

A large proportion of funds raised for Jewish religious activities are expended on religious education, he said, but "we feel that religious education is safe for all only where complete religious freedom exists for all, and we are very jealous of our religious freedom in this state. . . . I am a member of a religious group which has known religious persecution in many ages and many lands. We have learned from sad experience that no faith or denomination can be trusted to be tolerant and understanding when it has achieved secular power. Regardless of how good its intentions may be in the beginning, it becomes corrupted through power. The only protection a minority can have is through the absolute separation of all the agencies of the state from sectarian influence . . ."

He prefaced his remarks by telling the commission that the group he represented saw no difference between permissive legislation and mandatory legislation.

**Women In Israel Seen Penalized**

NEW YORK—Women in Israel do not possess equal status with men, Mrs. Israel Goldstein, president of Pioneer Women, the Women's Labor Organization of America, said here recently. After a year in Israel Mrs. Goldstein, wife of Rabbi Israel Goldstein, former treasurer of the Jewish Agency, said that Israeli women were constantly battling to achieve full citizenship. Although there are 12 women in the Israeli Parliament, women are not getting equal representation, Mrs. Goldstein said. Divorce laws, medical care and old age pensions are one-sided and offer no adequate provisions for housewives, she said. One of the difficulties, Mrs. Goldstein believes, is the carry-over from the old Talmudic laws. Mrs. Goldstein voiced confidence in the Israeli organization, Moatzat Hapaolet, the Council of Working Women, comprising 80,000 members and serving as sister organization to Pioneer Women. She said it was the largest women's group there and dedicated itself to equal opportunities for women. However, she said, the organization must cope with such existing conditions as the divorce law. Only a man may go to a rabbi for a divorce. The woman can give her side of the case only as a defendant. This, Mrs. Goldstein said, is

a holdover from the old religious laws. In civil courts, property rights and rights to children revert to the men. "In inheritance laws," Mrs. Goldstein said, "while women here now get 50 per cent, there women can be forgotten." Women do not get equal pay for equal work, Mrs. Goldstein said. She was equally concerned with the fact that unless a wife is a working woman, she does not share in the medical care, old age pension and other benefits provided for the working man by Histadrut, the labor federation. Thus the housewife and her family do not get their share of benefits unless she is a working woman. The more reactionary elements in Israel, she said, consider Histadrut too influential. **NO ARAB REPATRIATION** For the time being, Israel is not inclined to repatriate Arab refugees nor to pay them compensation except within the framework of an overall peace, Gordon R. Clapp, chairman of the UN economic survey mission, told newsmen at a press conference. At the same time, David Horowitz, director general of the Finance Ministry, disclosed that the Israel Government has spent about 400,000 pounds for Arab resettlement and reemployment.

## In Bad Taste

It is a pity that the editor of "Commentary" has permitted a vulgar article in very bad taste to appear in its October issue on the Jewish East-Side.

The article entitled, "Adam and Eve on Delancey Street" by Isaac Rosenfeld, has aroused understandable resentment among the finer Yiddish writers. Mr. A. Glantz, the poet and critic of the "Tog" rightly saw in it a cheap, contemptuous presentation of the East Side Jews on the part of a snobbish, smart-alecky young modernist without taste. He wrongly described the article as typical of the "assimilationist Jews" attitude toward the East Side Jew, for "Commentary" has on several occasions published other articles on the same subject.

To most writers the most objectionable aspect of the article is the shocking pornographic language in which it is couched, a language which behoves the old Police Gazette rather than a magazine of the American Jewish Committee.

## Editor's Mailbox

October 26, 1949

Dear Sir:

I am a member of New York's Jewish Community, not that of Providence. However, as I get to read your Jewish Herald quite regularly I am prompted to write this letter commenting on Mr. Bernard Segal's column of September 23, and Mr. Isaiah Segal's reply in the October 7 issue.

Mr. Bernard Segal began his Sept. 23 article by asking that Zionists generally devote themselves to cultural rebirth, and in Providence in particular by joining forces to build the Community Center. For these thoughts and his final words, "wise enough to pay heed to the changing emphasis", I say bravo. It is time that our American Zionist groups de-emphasized their political dogma. This will allow for sufficiently concerted action to make for the successful cultivation of the American Jewish cultural Negev.

American Jewish Youth of today cannot and should not be expected to fit into the specific little categories in Zionist life that grew out of internal Jewish political, economic, and religious differences in Europe. Some of the groupings may be applicable to today's youth, but others may not. And, the enforced molding that goes on to make them so makes for negativism and bilbul in young minds. If the extremists in the Yiddishist camp and the Hebraist camp spent as much time in teaching this generation both languages and their respective bodies of thought as they did in quarreling with each other, how great would be the understanding of both those important philosophies in Jewish life!

### Starting from Scratch

Bernard Segal, however, in the midst of his call for united Zionist action in one area, support of the Community Center, delegates separatism to Talmud Torahs and Day Schools (if by implication only) by saying "certainly people of the Mizrahi philosophy in our city ought to be the primary backers of our own Hebrew Day School". He also speaks, with what appears to be more than nodding approval, of the Talmud Torahs and Day Schools set up by Zionist groups. I am sure that these groups are doing a worthwhile and

wonderful job. However, as we are starting from scratch what is to keep us from starting from a more ideal base? One of the greatest evils of our Jewish Educational System today is the non-standardized, hodge-podge picture it presents.

There are certain basic elements in Jewish learning and thinking across the ages which should be common ground for all children preparing to live in the American Jewish community regardless of the homes they come from. Unfortunately, Jewish groups involved in political dogma turn out Jewish children who are more strange to each other than to some of their learned Gentile neighbors. If my words are a little harsh it is because I speak from a heart bitter from seeing confused Jewish minds becoming estranged from the Jewish group.

### Jewish Education in General

On the other hand I turn to Mr. Isaiah Segal's plea for support of "Jewish Education in general, and our Day School in particular". I more than share Mr. Segal's love and enthusiasm for the Day School. However, I urge realism. Let us be content to say "Jewish Education in general". For, the Day School cannot and perhaps will never fulfill the needs of all the members of the Jewish Community. There are those who do not believe in parochial schools, there are those who are more orthodox than others, etc. And, not least among the problems which the Day School is not as yet prepared to face is that of the modifications needed in the double workload for children of varying I.Q.'s. Let the community be alert enough to see that no child who wants and is deserving of a Day School education is deprived of it for lack of funds, but we need not all be scholars.

## "One Man's Opinion"

In the Beginning

The year is many, many years from now, and things have changed considerably. People heat and light their homes with sun energy, and kill their enemies with a deadly ray from a distant star. Everybody carries a pocket size combination radio-television-telephone set, and ladies' hand-bags are equipped with an air conditioning device. Children get helicopters for Christmas, and the joke about the Bar-Mitzvah boy who exclaims in his speech "Today I am a fountain pen", has been changed to "Today I am a Cyclotron".

But many things have not changed at all. The Moon is still attending to the high and the low tides of the ocean, the stars are still distant and mysterious as ever, and children still ask questions.

And so, one evening as the family was out flying in the family plane, with mother and father in the front seat and Junior in the back, the little boy suddenly leaned over father's shoulder, asking:

"Daddy, who made the stars and the moon and everything? Who made them, Daddy?"

Because this, too, has not changed. Daddy is still expected to know the answers to all the questions. And just as they were in the days of the automobile, the daddies of the aeroplane are embarrassed by the questions of their children, and find refuge in sidetracking them.

"Be careful, Junior, keep quiet now. Better look down. We are now flying over New Boston. Yonder to your right, is Old Boston which was destroyed by an atom bomb during the last war."

And mother, always eager to come to the aid of father, adds: "Don't talk to Daddy now. Don't you see he is flying over an air-pocket now?"

But Junior, like the juniors of all ages, would not be put off by air-pockets and by sights of ruined cities.

"But do you know, Daddy? Do you know who made the stars and the earth? Do you, Daddy?"

Now, Daddy was a modern father and he took a course in Child Psychology at college, and he knew that children's questions must be answered if you want to hold their respect. He also took a course in Astronomy at college, and he knew of the Urey Theory of the birth of the earth which the great physicist, Dr. Harold Urey of the University of Chicago, revealed way back in the year 1949.

So daddy cleared his throat, glancing sideways at mother to come to his aid if things get tough, and he cleared his throat again to gain a little time, and he began:

### How the Earth Was Made

"In the beginning there was nothing of this earth but a cloud of dust. A huge cloud of dust floating in space. And the cloud of dust was dark, and cool, and whirling around. That was billions of years ago. But as the Sun passed through the cloud of dust, the temperature of the dust began to rise, and the cloud formed into a round ball. A round ball of dust circling around the Sun, getting hotter and hotter.

"When the heat of the ball was as high as 2000 degrees, the chemicals in the dust began to melt. First the iron dust melted, then the gold and silver dust melted, and even the sand dust melted because the heat was so

great. When the chemicals melted they trickled through the sand dust, deep, deep into the center of the ball. The whole ball was boiling now, rising, and falling, and splitting up, and caving in. "Seas of water filled in the holes, and mountains rose, and continents appeared and disappeared. Many more billions of years passed by, and the ball of dust cooled down again, and this is the earth where our home stands down below, and where we are now landing, because it is getting late, and it is time for little boys like you to be in bed."

And so the family returned from the evening ride in the clouds, and Junior was fed, washed, and put to bed.

But there was one more thing that was not changed even in the days of the Urey Theory. Little boys and girls still waited for their mothers to tuck them in and to tell them a story before their eyes were shut for the night.

And so mother sat beside Junior's bed in the dark room. She held his hand in hers, and she read to him softly from a picture book, by the light of the moon in the window:

### The Other Version

"In the beginning God created the Heaven and the Earth. Now the Earth was unformed and empty, and darkness was upon the face of the waters. And God said "Let there be light!" And there was light."

But by that time Junior was asleep, and his little hand lay warm and content in his mother's soothing palm. Mother tip-toed out of the child's room smiling to herself. Maybe it was wrong. Maybe she did something unbecoming a modern mother. But she was glad. She was glad that her child listened to words that are as old as eternity, and to a story of creation that was told to children everywhere, ages and ages before the days of Dr. Harold Urey, of the University of Chicago.

arrived immigrant to Israel it represents at least a subsistent diet for an entire month.

4) "Sunday's 'D'-Day canvass rightfully may be termed one day of giving to make Jewish life worth living!"

Assisting Goodman as "D"-Day co-chairmen are Bertram L. Bernhardt, Paul Chernov, Archie Fain, Merrill Hassenfeld and Nathan Samors. All are veteran GJC workers who have devoted considerable time and effort to perfecting final plans for Sunday's streamlined solicitation.

Meanwhile, in other GJC divisions, "coverage" was the theme for the drive's remaining weeks.

"Maximum generosity and thorough coverage will spell the difference between success and failure of our 1949 campaign," pointed out Archibald Silverman, GJC president, and Alvin A. Soppin, drive chairman.

"Every unsolicited card, every dollar we fail to receive quickly at GJC headquarters means needless waiting, suffering and death for someone in Israel.

"The one important job that remains to be completed is that of covering all outstanding cards. In most cases, these potential donors are merely waiting to be asked.

## Israel Diary

By RUVAIN KLEIN

(Following are final excerpts from letters written by Ruvain Klein, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Klein, who is in Israel on a scholarship granted by the Rhode Island Zionist Region, to his parents in Providence. The letters are in Hebrew and have been translated by Mr. Klein.)

September 16th

Our second tour was a very interesting one. We went to Emek Jezreel. You would never believe such a place existed. There is much to see there. Wherever you look, there's a kibbutz. We went from Bet Alpha to Nahalal and from Nazareth to Dalia; from north to south and from east to west. Everywhere are kibbutzim; and each kibbutz full of Jews who are farmers. In America a Jewish farmer is a rarity, but here it is an accepted fact. We found thousands of good Jewish farmers; they make money and provide the country with food. From Mt. Tabor we looked down on a valley which had been entirely in Arab hands till the war. Not a single village exists there now. The place must now be settled by us. There is room enough to settle thousands of Jews, but no Jews to settle in it. Millions of dunams and none to occupy them. Tell this to the Zionists of Providence. Their children ought to come out here and settle on the land. If not they—who shall come?

## Williams vs Kell



For reasons already explained in this space several times, I always shy away from comments on major league baseball and similar subjects—well, almost always, for here is a story that I don't recall having seen in the daily press, although I've been watching for three weeks; which makes it fair game for me. It concerns the batting championship of the American League for 1949, which apparently was lost by Ted Williams to George Kell.

Before going on, let me state

that it is no concocted tale, having appeared in at least one New York paper, one Detroit paper and the Sporting News, which really gave it a big play. At least, it has an aura of authenticity about it, which is considerably more than can be said for some stories.

'Twas on the afternoon of Sunday, October 2—that blackest of days, that unmentionable day in Boston Red Sox history—the day they lost the pennant. Of lesser significance was the batting title race between The Thumper and Kell. I imagine it wasn't very much on Ted's mind that day, but Kell had other ideas on the subject, and so did his manager and teammates.

It was late in the game between the Indians and Tigers, and the report had come in that the Sox had lost and that Williams had gone hitless in two tries. Kell, in the meantime, had made two for three and some quick figuring revealed that he held a fractional lead over the Thumper in the unofficial averages. The Tigers immediately swung into action.

### Takes No Chances

A vote of his teammates, with Manager Red Rolfe concurring, resulted in the opinion that Kell should not go to bat again and jeopardize his chances at the crown. The proposition was put up to George and he agreed to sit out his title—not to bat again if his turn should come up.

The ninth inning rolled around, and with two out there was a possibility that Kell would come to bat. Rolfe selected a pinch hitter, rookie Myron Ginsberg, to do the honors and Ginsberg went so far as to select a bat and get on the top step of the dugout ready to step into the on deck circle. The game, and the season, ended before he could go up to hit, and so an incident was avoided. It would have been an incident, too, for Boston fans rightly would have howled had Kell forfeited a time at bat to preserve his lead over Ted.

The intent to coast in was there, however, and Kell obviously was willing to win the easy way, which certainly is not to his credit. I have never been accused of harboring violent Red Sox sympathies, and this may come as a shock to some of my friends and acquaintances, but I hope that when the official averages are checked Williams is returned the winner. On the basis of this story I feel he deserves it.

### Ted Is Different

The Kid himself is made of sterner stuff. Back in 1941, when he was battling to become the first American League .400 hitter in many years, Williams came into the final day of the season shy a few points of his goal. A double header was on tap and in the opener the Thumper blasted the ball all over the lot and picked up enough points to go well past .400. Between games it was suggested to Ted that he sit out the second

game and preserve the spectacular figure. But in the tradition of a real pro Williams refused to quit and placed his mark on the line in the second game. As it happened he picked up about five more points and wound up with .407, 11 points higher than the mark with which he had started the day.

The guy deserved the greatest credit then, and he deserves the batting title now; for, even though Kell won, it honestly, his willingness and intent to pass up a time at bat to beat Williams does not reflect honor and credit on him. I hope Ted wins.

### No Football League

It turns out, now that it is too late, that the boys wanted a touch football league this season. I say too late because November is no time to start organizing a league. A meeting was called for last Sunday, but if anyone showed up I didn't hear about it.

It was at the softball banquet that I was approached by two groups of fellows and asked to organize the league. Even that was a pretty late time to get started, but I would have done it, except for a siege of illness.

So I'll take the blame for this season, but I'll add this promise. Next year, knowing what the football sentiment is, we won't wait till the softball league has wound up its playoffs before getting started. The plans will be made


