Nine from City Attend Conclave

Faced with what was termed "a period of extraordinary crisis," the National Conference of the United Jewish Appeal—meeting at Atlantic City last weekend—adopted a figure of \$272,455,800 representing the "essential, minimum requirements" during 1950 to finance immigration and settlement programs in Israel, overseas rehabilitation, and refugee aid in the United States.

The statement of needs, highest in UJA history, was pinpointed by a resolution, concerning American Jewry's responsibility, pointing out that "the part other Jewish communities in the world may play in meeting these requirements is very limited."

An accompanying resolution urged UJA contributions in 1950 to be based "on a scale commensurate with the minimum needs of its constituent agencies" as represented by the \$272,455,800 figure.

A nine member delegation from Rhode Island was numbered among the 1600 representatives and observers attending from all parts of the country. It consisted of Archibald Silverman, local General Jewish Committee president; Joseph Galkin, GJC executive director; Mrs. Abraham Perceley, Miss Edith Sporer, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur I. Darman, Mrs. Daniel B. Miller, Miss Gertrude B. Tarnapoi and Paul Robin.

Mr. Silverman addressed the Conference's plenary session on behalf of the Providence agency and presented Henry Morgenthau, Jr. with a \$100,000 check as an additional payment on the GJC's 1949 allocation to the UJA. The advance was made possible by a bank loan, based on pledges already received.

Drafted for his fourth term as general chairman of the UJA, Mr. Morgenthau told the Conference: "We American Jews are giving" (Continued on Page 8)

U. S. Army Probes Grave Excavation

MUNICH. — The American Military Government in Germany conducted an investigation of the opening of a mass grave at the Dachau concentration camp by German workmen of a contracting concern which was using the soil thus obtained for commercial purposes.

An AMG spokesman recently announced that the grave had already been ordered closed. He laid responsibility for the desecration of the site, at which was found a Star of David, on the Bavarian Government. He added that Bavaria had been warned three times in the past year or so to provide adequate care for the mass grave which is believed to contain the remains of 2,000 victims of the Nazis.

In New York, a telegram of protest was earlier sent to John F. McCloy, American High Commissioner for Germany, by Justice Meir Steinbrink, chairman of the Anti-Defamation League, and Frank Goldman, president of B'nai B'rith, against the excavation of the grave.

B'nai B'rith Honors McGrath

BOSTON—Attorney General J. Howard McGrath this week pledged "to make the protection of civil rights a reality and not a sham" and added that he would do all in his power "to prevent the shameful discrimination now existing in our economic system, with respect to employment, business and the professions."

Speaking before Amos Lodge B'nai B'rith, which awarded him its annual Citation for Outstanding Service, he declared:

"Our defense of individual rights by law is unassailable proof that an individual man can live within the bounds of a great government without fear. . . . Neither the rantings and ravings of the demagogues, the racketeers, the hate purveyors and others who threaten to destroy our very liberty and very freedom by the importation of foreign ideologies can deter us from our course if these principles of our democracy are sacredly preserved and effectively protected."

He paid lengthy tribute to B'nai B'rith which "has always manifested your complete approbation and support for the principles I have referred to," and traced in detail the history and activities of B'nai B'rith from its founding 106 years ago to its present eminence as the largest Jewish mass membership organization in the world.

"The vast scope of your activities indicate that after a century of endeavor you are stronger, more influential and bigger than ever before," he asserted.

"Your organization obviously has been much in the forefront in the battle against race prejudice and discrimination. I must emphasize, however, that the war on bigotry and anti-Semitism is not exclusively a Jewish responsibility; it is a task for all men. To be sure B'nai B'rith has focused attention of our Government and all men on the injustices perpetrated on many of our citizens; nevertheless it is the duty of all good men who treasure their freedom, to act effectively to eliminate such injustices.

"I, as the head of the Department of Justice and the Chief Law Enforcement Officer in this country, pledge you this day that I shall do everything I can to enforce all the Federal laws at my command, and all that Congress will deem fit to give me in the future, to the very limit in routing and stamping out all those who would exterminate our priceless liberties."

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

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Specialist To Help DP Boy See New World

NEW YORK—United Service for New Americans this week brought together two Polish Jewish D. P.'s who desperately need each other—a nine-year-old partially blind youngster who wants to see and a veteran eye specialist who wants to rebuild lives shattered in the Nazi maelstrom.

Among the 1,167 displaced persons of all faiths who arrived from Bremerhaven on the Army transport "General McRae" was Sigmund Eisenberg, an intelligent, sensitive little boy who began losing his sight seven years ago.

Actually, at that time Sigmund had nothing to see and possibly did not want to. He was hiding out with his mother in an underground cave near the Polish town of Brody. The Nazis had recently murdered his father and were searching for additional victims among the remaining Jews in the area. It was the summer of 1942. The Nazis were riding roughshod over Europe and there was really nothing for sensitive little eyes to see.

The medical reports—Sigmund saw a doctor five years later in an American Military Government hospital—said that sand had filtered into the lad's eyes and this, coupled with a serious vitamin deficiency, had caused almost total loss of sight. The medical report was written by Dr. Edmund Carter Rosenhauch, a displaced person himself, who had been made head of the eye clinic in the AMG hospital.

A former Professor of Ophthalmology in Munich, Dr. Rosenhauch, too, had fallen victim to the Nazis. His experiences, especially a daring leap from a sealed train taking him to Auschwitz, continued to haunt him. To go on living, he felt he had to help some of the others rebuild their lives. It was then that he met Sigmund.

The boy was seven years old. He had been hiding in caves from 1942 to late 1944. Then there was a series of D. P. camps. His vision

was getting progressively worse. He was unable to move about alone.

"He was such a nice little fellow and I wanted to do everything for him," Dr. Rosenhauch said this week. The doctor devoted himself to the boy. After a few months Sigmund showed slight improvement and began to walk by himself. He no longer needed his mother to guide him.

At that point Dr. Rosenhauch's long-awaited opportunity came through. He could leave for America and an opportunity for a new life. When he left the Feldafing D. P. Hospital, he told Sigmund's mother to keep in touch with him and gave his New York address. This was late in 1947.

Following some initial difficulties, Dr. Rosenhauch established offices in New York City. He never could get Sigmund out of his mind. Several days ago he learned from United Service for New Americans, which provides for the reception and resettlement in this country of Jewish DPs, that the boy was coming to this country. He offered immediately to treat the youngster.

Doctors are traditionally conservative and cautious. But this was a special case. When U. S. Immigration officials asked questions about the boy's condition, Dr. Rosenhauch said that with proper care—with loving care—Sigmund would be able to see the new world.

The first visitor Sigmund had in his new land was Dr. Rosenhauch. They met at the Hotel Marseilles in New York City, the reception shelter of United Service for New Americans and embraced each other warmly. Treatments will begin this week.

The national reception and resettlement programs of United Service for New Americans are financed through the \$250,000,000 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal.

8 UJA Minimum Needs Set as \$272,455,800

(Continued from Page 1) notice to the world that we are back of the State of Israel to the end. We are so deeply involved in this enterprise that for anyone to hesitate to do his utmost to assure the lasting, permanent success of the State of Israel would be the height of personal and collective folly."

Community representatives presented checks totalling \$5,900,000 to Morgenthau for this year's drive, bringing to approximately \$110,000,000 the sum raised thus far in 1949.

(Note: Many large communities, such as Providence and Boston, who launched their drives late this Fall, are not included in full in this \$110,000,000 total. It is expected that complete returns for 1949 from all communities participating in the nation-wide UJA drive will bring the final figure to a substantially higher level.)

Here, in Providence, Alvin A. Sopkin, GJC campaign chairman, this week stated that "intensive mopping-up activities are now underway in a determined effort to terminate the local drive within the next few weeks."

Close to \$850,000 has been raised to date in the 1949 drive, he said. He appealed to unsolicited donors to contact GJC offices and list their pledges, and to workers to "complete coverage of cards at once."

The 1950 financial objective of the UJA was earmarked as follows: \$209,559,800 for large scale settlement and development in Israel by the United Palestine Appeal; \$44,512,000 for the Joint Distribution Committee's program in European and Moslem countries, and \$18,384,000 for the refugee adjustment program of the United Service for New Americans.

The Conference provided for the appointment of a special committee to recommend quotas to local communities "so that, through the combined labor and generosity of American Jews, we may safeguard and consolidate the achievements in the regeneration of our people."

Foreign Minister Sharett credited the United Jewish Appeal as being "the prime agent" of Israel's accomplishments during the 18 months that have elapsed since its founding as the first democracy to emerge from the ashes of World War II.

Dr. Nahum Goldmann, chairman of the American section of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, appealed to the conferees not to allow local communal needs to deflect them from continuing large-scale support to Israel.

"World Jewry will be judged by Israel's future success or failure," he warned. "It would be deplorable if, in this critical situation, a lack of devotion on our part were to bring about the ruin of Israel's efforts to date."
