Passover Holiday Starts Wednesday

The eight day festival of Passover will be ushered in by the Jewish community of Rhode Island with the traditional first Seder on Wednesday evening. The holiday will continue with the second Seder on Thursday and will be concluded at sundown on Thursday, April 17.

Families observing the customs of the holiday will gather around the Seder table on Wednesday, and Thursday evenings to sing the "Hagadah"—relating the story of the liberation of the Children of Israel from bondage in Egypt—and tasting of the bitter herbs and other preparations to remind themselves of the suffering of their ancestors before their deliverance by Moses.

Following is a summary of synagogue and temple services planned for the holiday week:

Congregation Sons of Jacob

Rabbi Morton Berkowitz will conduct Wednesday services at 7 A. M. An evening service will be held at 6 o'clock.

On Thursday, the program includes services at 8:30 A. M. and evening services at 6 P. M. Friday morning services will be at 8:30, with a sermon by the rabbi at 10:30.

A model Seder will take place Sunday at 10:30 A. M. for the children of the Sons of Jacob (Continued on Page 3)

Other officials who will participate in the ceremonies are Stanley Leib, president of the school council, and Aaron Klein, educational director of the religious school. Rabbi Eli A. Bohnen will give the invocation and benediction.

Morris Espo, vice-president of the temple, is chairman of the committee arranging the ground-breaking program.

Third Seder Next Sunday

The 26th annual Third Seder, conducted under the auspices of the Labor Zionist Council of Providence, will be held on Sunday, April 13 at 6:30 P. M. in the Narragansett Hotel.

Yehuda Harry Levin, press attache of the State of Israel Embassy in Washington, will be the principal speaker. The program will include a concert by Uri Zifroni, tenor of the Israel Opera Co., and Ben Basenko, interpreter of Jewish and Hebrew folklore and humor.

Basenko is director of public service programs for Station WYVD in New York and conductor of that station's "Voice of Israel" program. He has just returned from Israel.

Reparation Talks Begin In Formal, Cold Atmosphere

THE HAGUE—The reparations talks opened here in a cold and formal atmosphere. When the Israeli delegates entered the conference room to find the Germans already present, there was no handshaking or any other form of greeting. The Israeli delegation head introduced each member of his group by naming him and at the same time, pointing to him. Then the Israeli delegation head handed the Germans his credentials.

The Israelis' opening statement was made in English and at the end of it a copy in German was handed across the table. The German opening statement was made in German with the Israelis

receiving an English translation. When the statements were completed the Israelis remained behind for several minutes while the Germans left. The atmosphere was "very tense and uncomfortable as far as we were concerned," an Israeli spokesman pointed out.

Practically the same procedure was followed by the delegation of the Conference on Jewish Material Claims Friday afternoon, except that the tension of the morning session was not present in the afternoon. The Israelis are staying at Wassenaar, while the Germans are at a hotel in the Hague and there is no contact between them when the conference is not in session.

Red Daily's Face Red after Poem Tricks it into Attacking Stalin

NEW YORK—The Morning Freiheit, Communist daily, was tricked into publishing a poem attacking Stalin and calling him a murderer.

The poem, called "The Enemy" was in the form of an acrostic, a composition whose first letters spell a name. Discovery of the hoax created quite a sensation. The New York Times headlined the story "Red Freiheit's Face Red" while all the Yiddish papers gave it front page coverage.

The Freiheit reacted to the incident by blasting the "warmongers and reactionaries" and by reminding its readers how the Soviet Army liberated the Jews from Hitlerism.

The poem, by one David Viler, reads:

S atanically laughs the enemy in wild joy,
T ears and madness regale and amuse him,
A feast of butchered sons and daughters
L ures him, radiates his mien,
I anus — two-faced foe
N ourishes on his atomic weapon
T alking of peace with the coquetry of a harlot,
H e is capable of
U ndermining body and soul with leprous sin,
G hastliness, extinction and madness.

Day School Plans Emergency Drive

An emergency, one-day campaign to solicit funds for the Providence Hebrew Day School will be conducted this Sunday, according to an announcement made by Archie Smith, president.

The drive will have as its slogan "SOS—Save Our School."

The campaign was adopted at a meeting called Monday evening to discuss the school's present grave financial position. The funds that are received as a result of Sunday's solicitation will be used to "keep the Day School in operation."

Volunteer solicitors—including parents, members of the board, and friends—will meet at 9 A. M. at the Hebrew Day School for their instructions and assignments. Team captains with cars then will drive the workers to their respective sections of the city to begin their rounds.

Smith pointed out that the reason behind the crisis is the Day School's scholarship system, whereby free tuition is provided for children who come from families that are unable to pay for their Jewish schooling.

Group Seeks Israel Oil Concessions

JERUSALEM — Negotiations were begun here between a Swiss-American-Israeli group of oil prospectors and the Israel government for concessions for exploratory drilling for oil. The success of the negotiations will hinge on the proposed Israeli oil exploitation bill which will be submitted shortly to the Knesset.

The prospectors' group is headed by Dr. Walter Fehr, noted Swiss oil expert and geologist who was formerly chief geologist for Royal Dutch Shell and who prepared a general oil survey of Israel during 1938 and several years thereafter. The group has already formed an Israeli corporation headed by B. Federmann of Haifa.

Myerson Dinner Raises \$155,000

INDIANAPOLIS (AJP) — The pot boiled over this week in the first head-on open clash over co-ordination of efforts in behalf of Israel by the Israel Bond drive and the United Jewish Appeal with both sides claiming a victory in the torrid dispute.

The battle over Bonds vs. UJA was climaxed with a dinner here Sunday night which BIG spokesman reported raised \$155,000 in bond purchases. Considered by veteran observers as a test case in the operation of Bond and UJA campaigns on the local scene, the violent dispute here centered about opposition by members of the board of the local federation to plans by Israel Bond leaders to sponsor a BIG dinner which they claimed would adversely affect the UJA—Jewish Welfare Federation Campaign.

Members of the federation board voted earlier by a 34-1 count to oppose the Myerson tribute if sponsored under Bond auspices. Instead, they urged that her appearance be under the sponsorship of the UJA—Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign. Spokesmen for the federation said that the Bond drive had offered to hold the meeting under joint sponsorship, but that they had refused.

Key Bond personnel, utilizing newspaper ads, radio and television, waged a widescale campaign to publicize the Myerson meeting.

The dispute which began with the early planning for the Bond dinner continued to the day of the actual meeting.

These are the latest major highlights of the sore spot:

1. Spokesmen for the Israel Bond drive reported "a record-shattering turnout of more than 850 persons" attended the Myerson dinner, adding that the attendance "far exceeded that of any previous function of the Jewish community of Indianapolis."

2. Local welfare fund sources claimed that "local residents were convinced following the meeting that the result vindicated the complete local unity maintained in the face of the national challenge."

3. A rally held at the Temple Beth El by welfare forces the Friday night preceding the Myerson dinner heard wires read from Edward M. M. Warburg and Dr. Joseph Schwartz, UJA leaders, in support of the local body's stand. The rally was addressed by Rabbi William Greenfield, Julian Freeman, Federation president and others.

Myerson told her audience that Israel Bond dollars were urgently needed to assure economic independence for the Jewish State and at the same time urged a generous response to the Indianapolis Jewish Federation Campaign in order to aid in the reception and care of new immigrants to Israel.

GETS FEDERAL POST

PITTSBURGH—The judges of the United States Court, Western District of Pennsylvania, have appointed Harold Levine, an active member of the Jewish community, as a United States Commissioner. Levine is former counsel to the Pittsburgh Housing Authority and has held a number of legal posts with the federal and state governments.
