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GJC Women to Conduct "M-Day" Sunday Jessel To Address GJC Initial Gift Event

Workers to Meet at Narragansett Hotel

"M-Day," the big one-day fund-raising event of the Women's Division, General Jewish Committee of Providence, which climaxes the 1952 drive in behalf of the United Jewish Appeal and many local charities, will be held this Sunday, Oct. 26, starting at 9 A. M.

The 400 workers from all parts of Providence will gather at the Narragansett Hotel for breakfast and a short briefing. They will then be driven by members of a specially organized motor corps to various parts of the city, where they will ring the doorbells of all the Jewish women in the city and ask for contributions to the GJC.

This event, which originated with the Women's Division of Providence, has become famous nationally and has been copied all over the country.

The M-Day Committee is headed by Mrs. Burton Finberg, chairman, with Ira Blum in charge of the motor corps.

Women of the Cranston Jewish Center who are working on the M-Day drive in conjunction with Providence women are headed by Mrs. Joseph Potemkin. The Cranston group will meet at Lindy's on Reservoir Avenue for breakfast and briefing, and then conduct their activities for this point.

Mrs. Archie Fain, general chairman, and Mrs. Finberg urge all Providence women to remain at home Sunday morning and welcome the M-Day workers who call so that all cards may be covered at once.

Browdy Criticizes New Leaders

NEW YORK—Criticism of the new administration of the Zionist Organization of America for allegedly failing to honor commitments and continue projects undertaken by the organization was voiced here by Benjamin G. Browdy, former ZOA president, addressing the annual conference of the Brooklyn Zionist Region. Browdy referred to the plans adopted recently by the Extraordinary Conference of the ZOA and said he missed any "continuity between the work done under the old administration and the work planned by the new administration."

Difficulties Spread Anti-Semitism

MELBOURNE — J. Redapple, president of the Australian Jewish Council, warned here last week that "increasing economic difficulties throughout the world, including Australia, have accelerated the spread of anti-Semitism which now finds its expression in the desecration of Jewish graves and the dissemination of fresh batches of anti-Semitic literature." He charged that "many scurrilous anti-Semitic leaflets, published in England, Sydney and Melbourne, are being distributed in factories and in working class suburbs where unemployment already is threatening many homes."

Steinbrink Resigns B'nai B'rith Post

CHICAGO—Justice Meier Steinbrink of Brooklyn, N. Y., announced his retirement today as national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. He has held the post for the past six years.

Addressing the League's 39th annual meeting, now in session here, the 72-year-old Jewish communal leader asked that his name be withdrawn from consideration for continuance in office "in favor of a younger man."

In his final report to the national commission and to the several score delegates in attendance here, representing ADL regional boards throughout the nation, Justice Steinbrink traced the growth of the League during the postwar years, citing them as "an exciting and progressive era in the development of ADL."

Schedule Annual Affair Nov. 9

The almost legendary George Jessel, one of America's most gifted after-dinner speakers, will highlight the Nov. 9 Men's Division Initial Gifts Dinner of the 1952 General Jewish Committee fund-raising campaign. Alvin A. Sopkin, GJC president, announced this week.

The affair—which will touch off a whirlwind drive among the male Jewish populace of greater Providence in behalf of the United Jewish Appeal and two-score other local, national and overseas agencies—is being held at the Sheraton-Biltmore hotel.

Sidney A. Kane, chairman of the Initial Gifts Committee, revealed this week that Oved Ben-Ami, famed mayor of the Israeli port city of Nathanya, will share the billing with Jessel at the Nov. 9 affair.

Ben-Ami, one of Israel's leading industrialists and city planners, who is described as the new state's "One-Man Chamber of Commerce," is now engaged in a five-week tour of key American cities in connection with the UJA Fall drive for \$35 million for emergency aid to Israel. He is the "father" of Israel's multi-million dollar diamond industry and a founder of its recently-created cement industry.

Jessel, who ranks among the nation's top showmen, is a veteran personality of stage, screen and radio. Because of his countless banquet appearances, he is often referred to as the "Toastmaster General of the United States."

To the American public, Jessel today probably is best known as a highly successful Hollywood film executive—who produced such hits as "When My Baby Smiles At Me," "The Dolly Sisters" and "Meet Me After the Show."

To Jewish philanthropic circles, however, Jessel's greatest claim to fame could well be his active support of numerous welfare causes. Last year, for example, he made 20 speeches at United Jewish Appeal gatherings at which more than \$10 million were raised.

Only last month Jessel returned from a three-week fact-finding survey mission in Israel and European countries, in order to prepare himself for an extensive speaking tour in behalf of the UJA's Fall and Winter campaigns.

In Israel, he visited reception centers, housing projects, rural colonies, medical institutions, work camps and desert settlements. And, in his own words: "I talked to Prime Minister Ben-Gurion, Israeli workers, businessmen, industrialists, old settlers, new immigrants, youths in the Army—in fact, to everybody I could!"

During his travels in Israel, Jessel and his 11-year-old daughter Jerilynn took time out to play the leading roles in a motion picture short which will be used to help raise funds for Israel in its fight for economic stability.

Because of his deep interest in Israel since the founding of that democracy in 1948, Jessel has been mentioned by many sources as a possible future choice for United States Ambassador to Israel.

At present—sandwiched in between his UJA appearances—he is completing plans for his first picture as an independent film producer, "Rip Van Winkle," which will star Jimmy Durante.

Four concerts in Providence and a larger orchestra—were highlights of a report on the Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra plans for this season announced this week by president Irene L. Mulick. Ten musicians were added to the orchestra making a total of approximately fifty players.

The dates and soloists for the series include Jesus Marie Sarroma, well-known piano virtuoso, on December 2; Marguerite Piazza, TV and Metropolitan Opera star, on January 27; the nation's foremost woman violinist, Carroll Glenn, on February 24, and the Brown-Pembroke Chorus plus the University of Connecticut Mixed Chorus on April 7. The orchestra is once again under the direction of Francis Madeira.

Series subscriptions are now being taken in the new Philharmonic offices at 49 Westminster Street and brochures will be mailed out this week.

Violinist Carroll Glenn has distinguished herself as the only artist to win all four major musical awards in this country and has earned recognition in three national magazines as the outstanding young artist of the year.

Sklar To Head Conference Panel

The Rhode Island Conference of Social Work announced this week that Nathan E. Sklar, executive director of the Jewish Family and Children's Service, will be chairman of a Conference Panel devoted to the topic "Is a Family Court Needed in Rhode Island?" at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel on Friday, Oct. 31.

Judge David Jacobs of Meriden, Conn. editor of the Connecticut Bar Journal, will be guest speaker. Panel discussants are Dr. Henry Babcock, Butler Hospital; Lawrence Cole, director, R. I. Child Welfare Services, and Maurice Hendel, legal consultant to Governor Roberts.

The Family Court idea has been recommended by the American Bar Association in conjunction with related professional groups, and such courts are now in existence in Ohio and New York State. The purpose of the Court is to have specialists assist the Judge in cases involving family situations, as it is the contention of the Bar

Association that many cases coming before Family Court might benefit from counselling services which could prevent family break-up and extended litigation. Usually social workers and psychologists, and occasionally psychiatrists, are selected to work in the Family Court.

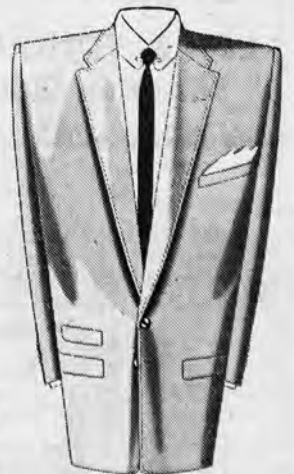

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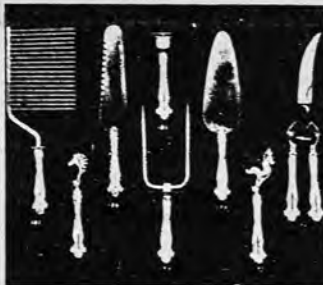

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Cash proceeds for the United Jewish Appeal totalling \$18,150,000 came forward here at the final session of the UJA's emergency National

Leadership Conference to give the Appeal better than 50 per cent of the \$35,000,000 it is seeking in the last three months of 1952.

The more than \$18,000,000 in checks also brought the UJA's cash income to \$64,000,000 for the first nine and a half months of the year.

Edward M. M. Warburg, General Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, termed the \$18,150,000 cash proceeds "all the more astonishing and unprecedented for coming just four weeks following our first announcement that we would seek \$35,000,000 in the last three months of 1952."

"American Jews," Mr. Warburg declared, "have shown again their steadfast devotion to the United Jewish Appeal as it seeks to strengthen the people of Israel, to save the homeless and the oppressed, and to fortify democracy in many parts of the world."
