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Israel Negotiates for Canal To By-Pass Suez

BOSTON — Israel has opened negotiations with Britain and France for the construction of a canal to by-pass Suez, an official of Israel's largest economic organization, the Histadrut, told a Boston press conference.

Itzhak Haskin, treasurer of the 600,000 member labor organization — which also runs a third of Israel's industry — also disclosed that the Israelis have completed an 8-inch pipeline from Elath, on the Gulf of Aqaba, to Haifa, on the Mediterranean, which will supply Israel's domestic needs. A 32-inch pipeline, to serve European nations, will be constructed soon, he explained.

Mr. Haskin, who left Israel late last week, expressed the view that Egypt's economic condition is becoming so grave it imperils the rule of Dictator Nasser.

Regarding the military and political situation in the Middle East, Mr. Haskin said:

1) Israel expects that the United States will prevent Egypt from military re-occupation of Gaza;

2) If the United States is unable to keep the Egyptian military out of Gaza, Israel "will take necessary military action" to protect herself.

3) Israel is quite certain Saudi Arabia can take no military action to seal off the Straits of Tiran, nor will Nasser dare. Should an attempt be made to close the straits, which control the entrance to the Gulf of Aqaba, Israeli warships are prepared to take necessary action to keep them open.

Praises Rise Of Religious Activity

NEW YORK — The Synagogue Council of America has honored former Senator Lehman for his "unswerving . . . devotion to his country and its ideals."

"If divorced from life, religious ideals would become mere platitudes," Lehman said, accepting the second annual award of the organization at its general assembly at Columbia University. "Religious feeling must be expressed in deeds."

Rabbi Emanuel Rackman, of Congregation Shaaray Tefilah, Far Rockaway, Queens, urged "government recognition" of the Jewish Sabbath, Saturday.

Pointing out that Washington allowed Jewish soldiers to observe the Sabbath, Rabbi Rackman said: "There is no reason why the religious convictions of Jews cannot be recognized in the military establishment."

Executive Director of Bureau To Head Annual Tour of Israel

Alter Boyman, president of the Bureau of Jewish Education, has announced that Dr. Harry Elkin, executive director of the Bureau, has been invited to head the annual tour of Jewish educators to Israel in the summer of 1957.

The tour, which is sponsored by the American Association for Jewish Education and the Department of Education of the Jewish Agency, is designed to provide Jewish educators with an opportunity to acquire first-hand knowledge of Israel. The program includes the study of all aspects of Israeli culture through lectures, seminars and guided tours to important places of interest.

Mr. Boyman stated that the invitation came to him from Dr. Judah Pilch, executive director of the American Association for Jewish Education.

At the forthcoming meeting of the Board of Directors of the Bureau on April 9, all the necessary discussion and action relating to this project will be undertaken.

To Lift Ban on Travel to Israel

WASHINGTON — The United States soon may lift its 4-month-old ban on travel to Israel and three other Middle Eastern countries.

Officials said today the ban will be lifted according to present plans as soon as Israeli troops are withdrawn from Egyptian territory.

Travel to Israel, Egypt, Syria and Jordan was barred by the United States when hostilities broke out between Israel and Egypt last fall.

Israeli Industry Gains Rayon Plant

NEW YORK—In celebration of his seventieth birthday, Israel Rogosin, head of Beaunit Mills, Inc., U. S. industrialist and philanthropist, this week announced the establishment of a \$20,000,000 rayon plant in Israel, which will be the largest American-financed industry in the country.

Mr. Rogosin made his announcement at a dinner given in his honor last Monday by the State of Israel, at which Ambassador and Mrs. Abba Eban were hosts. The new rayon plant, according to Israel Minister of Trade and Industry, Pinhas Sapir, "will es-

Ask U. S. Drop Security Program; Let Existing Laws Do Job

NEW YORK — The American Jewish Congress this week urged the government to consider dropping its security program and relying on existing criminal and civil laws to do the job.

In requested recommendations to the Commission on Government Security, the AJC noted that the security program was initiated as an emergency measure a decade ago, and said:

"The time for a complete re-evaluation is long overdue. The commission should now consider whether the evils flowing from the program outweigh its benefits."

Enumerating the various "evils" in the present program, AJC said:

"The Federal Employees Security Program reflects an almost unreasonable and unsound quest for absolute safety. It fails almost entirely to recognize the personal rights of those citizens who are government employees.

"It has impaired the morale of

the federal service. It has discouraged highly qualified citizens from offering their services to the government."

The AJC memorandum admitted that discontinuance of the program would involve some risks.

"If these risks are substantial," it added, "then obviously the injustices and the infringements on civil liberties that even the best security program entails must be accepted as a necessary price for the nation's security."

The group added, however:

"But the fact that there is some risk in dropping the program is not in itself sufficient reason for continuing it. History has shown that the quest for a riskless security is futile and that democracy is more likely to survive and grow if it willingly accepts some risks in order to preserve unimpaired as far as possible the sole reason for its existence — the protection of the people's liberties."

11 Israelis Go on Trial In Killing of 47 Arabs

JERUSALEM — Eleven Israeli border police went on trial charged with killing 47 Arab villagers on Oct. 29 in a curfew incident near Kafr Kassem close to the Israeli-Jordan border.

Defense attorney Max Kritzman demanded that the president of the court-martial, Col. Benjamin Halevy, be replaced because he had discussed the trial with the Israeli Chief of Staff, Gen. Moshe Dayan.

Kritzman said this disqualified Halevy because the chief of staff was superior to the judge and might himself be called as a witness. The court decided that Kritzman should call Dayan to testify on the alleged conversation.

The trial, which has been postponed twice, is expected to last two months.

The killings took place the night of Israel's invasion of Egypt when the villagers inside Israel violated a curfew. The incident was disclosed in Parliament on Dec. 12 by Premier Ben-Gurion who called it a "terrible occurrence."

U. S. Urged To Admit Jews Fleeing Egypt

WASHINGTON—Three Republican Senators urged the Attorney General, Herbert Brownell Jr., this week to take emergency action to permit the immigration of a "reasonable number" of Jewish refugees from Egypt.

The request was made in a letter by Senators Irving M. Ives and Jacob K. Javits of New York and Clifford P. Case of New Jersey.

They wrote that 12,000 Egyptian Jews had been forced to flee because of "persecution by the Egyptian Government" and asked that Mr. Brownell make use of the parole provisions of the immigration law to admit some of them to this country.

At President Eisenhower's direction, thousands of Hungarian refugees were admitted on parole last fall after Russia crushed the Hungarian freedom revolt. Legislation now is pending in Congress to let these refugees become permanent residents.

The Senators told Mr. Brownell that the number of Jewish escapees from Egypt "who have families here and would seek admittance to the United States is relatively small — not over 5,000 at the largest estimate."

JERUSALEM—More than 24,000 immigrants arrived in Israel in the last four months, Yehuda Braginsky, Jewish Agency member, reported recently.

Jewish Agency activities in immigration and resettlement of newcomers in Israel are financed by the United Jewish Appeal.

Stern Won't Play 2nd Fiddle to Cricket

MIAMI BEACH—Violinist Isaac Stern called a halt in a concert here because of interference by a real cool cricket.

Stern, who has given concerts all over the world, including Russia, said it was not cricket to have two soloists on one program.

Onstage in the Miami Beach Auditorium last night, Stern halted after completing the first movement of Brahms' "Violin Concerto in D Major," whispered briefly to conductor John Bitter, then turned to the audience.

"Ladies and gentlemen," he

said. "When I took this engagement I understood I would be the only soloist on the program. Now it appears that I have a competitor — a cricket.

"I am sure that you'll enjoy the music more, and I would enjoy playing for you more, and we will enjoy the music better together without this disturbing influence."

Stern pointed with his bow at three potted palms at the right of the stage. Then while the audience buzzed, he and Bitter walked off-stage.

Three attendants came from the

wings and listened attentively their heads cocked, to find out which palm harbored the source of irritation. A tympanist came over to lend an ear, too.

Unable to find out where the cricket was doing his bowing, the attendants, at the direction of the tympanist, lugged all three palms out of the building to the sidewalk.

Stern and Bitter returned to the stage. Bitter raised his baton. Stern raised his bow. And with a flourish, they launched into the second movement — "Allegro Sans Cricket Obbligato."

France--Israel's Best Friend

There is no formal treaty of alliance between Israel and France. Nevertheless, both in spirit and in fact, the French Republic is a full-fledged ally of the the Republic of Israel

It cannot be said that this was a case of "love at first sight." In the early stages, the French attitude towards Israel was rather standoffish. In November 1947, France cast her vote in favor of partition. But in May 1948, when the United States, Soviet Russia and a string of other states recognized the new state immediately or very soon thereafter, Paris withheld recognition. It was not before the beginning of 1949 that a *de facto* acceptance was finally granted, followed by a *de jure* recognition a few months later. Yet the growing aggressiveness of Arab nationalism, threatening both Israel and France, led to increasing realization of the basic community of interests between the two countries and of the necessity for closer cooperation. In 1950, a \$15 million credit was extended to Israel, making France second only to the United States in granting long-term loans to Israel. In November 1954, an agreement was reached on cooperation in the use of atomic energy for peaceful purposes. In May 1956, a treaty was concluded providing for the import of French books into Israel in the amount of 100 million francs.

The acid test of French-Israeli friendship came however in the fall of 1955, when the Soviet-Egyptian arms deal compelled Israel to look frantically for modern aircraft to counterbalance Egypt's Soviet-delivered MIGs. France was the only country which answered Israel's call. The Mystere jets and the anti-tank weapons shipped by France saved the situation.

The significance of this assistance can hardly be overestimated. In the course of the last half-decade, Israel has been pathetically friendless on the international scene.

French cooperation is proving itself most effective indeed. France was the only country which stood by Israel in the vote against the anti-Israel resolution adopted by the United Nations on January 19 by a vote of 74 to 2 (Israel and France with 2 abstentions (Cuba and Costa Rica). Ambassador Guillaume Georges Picot valiantly defended Israel's stand. France also cast her vote against the first of the two resolutions accepted by the United Nations on February 2 (calling upon Israel to withdraw behind the 1949 armistice lines) and abstained on the second (which, in vague terms, spoke of the UN Emergency Force taking positions along those lines).

The Jewish State would undoubtedly profit from a wider circle of alliances. But the political tete-a-tete with France is in no way embarrassing. France is a great, trustworthy and generous ally of whom Israel has every reason to be proud.

So We Went To Miami

Now we can face our friends without apologies.

"How about that trip to Florida you won? Aren't you going?"

"What are you doing here? You are supposed to be in Miami."

"What are you doing here? This is the best time of the year in Florida."

We would offer excuses and make promises, and walk around feeling guilty. Here we are with two free plane tickets in our pockets and we still walk the streets of Providence.

But now we have been in Miami, and have returned, and we have the evidence to prove it. Tanned faces, peeling noses, and a few more strands of silver around the temples, the souvenirs of Miami Beach.

It was our first trip Southward, and our first lengthy flight by plane. We could not escape marveling at the miracles in transportation that came to pass in our own days and in our lifetime. My wife and I were brought up in the horse and buggy days, and that was not so long ago. In our youth we knew no other way of getting about than either on foot or by horse. The peasants in the backward villages would come to the fair in their ox carts, and we felt very superior to them. They were primitive, we were advanced. We rode horses at the speed of ten miles an hour.

And here we are having breakfast in the clouds over chilly New York and arriving in time for lunch in sunlit Miami!

Great miracles indeed! But on that same day a Navy Jet flew the West-East route across the country in five hours. That put us back in the horse and buggy days in the eyes of the Jet flyers.

It was our first trip South and we were excited about seeing palm trees, and orange blossoms, and bananas in their homeland. So far the nearest we have ever come to a palm was in hotel lobbies, and the oranges were always in crates, and the bananas we ate would not be recognized by a monkey who knew it before it was picked and hauled to the markets of the North.

We were like the city child who never saw the cow that gave the milk and the chicken that laid the egg.

Before long we were to fill our eyes on palm trees, and we touched young oranges on the branches, and we spotted wild orchids in the everglades.

But before that we saw people. A grandfather came to meet his 10-year-old granddaughter from New York, and as he waited for her baggage to be brought from the plane, he beamed at the bewildered child:

"We will take you to the races tomorrow."

And he rattled off the horses scheduled to run, as one lists attractions of a show.

"It's against the law, but we will manage," he winked at the amused colored porter.

He was a typical Miami Beach grandfather, as he is generally

pictured in fiction. Brown of skin, heavyish around the waist line, Bermuda shorts, multicolored short sleeved shirt, long cigar between bejeweled fingers, loud laughter, and even louder sport car.

But in the evening of the same day we walked behind another grandfather and his grandson. They were promenading leisurely on the narrow sidewalk, and we slowed down to their pace, and we heard the old man ask:

"And where do you daven?"

"Oh, we have a Minyan in the Yeshiva," assured the youth, and he elaborated on the manner in which the students of the Yeshiva gather for prayer morning and evening in the small chapel, with a cantor and reader of their own.

The grandfather was a thin man, in a black wide brimmed hat, and a long snow-white beard merging with the neatly curled locks by the sides of his ears. He wore a long black Capote, and white stockings, and he walked serenely beside his teen age grandson. And he seemed to us so exotic in the glitter and clatter of the Hotel Avenue. But he was in deep harmony with the brooding palms under the starry skies, and the breeze from the sea took pleasure in playing with his beard and flowing garment.

He, too, was of Miami Beach, though not so typical.

We were to meet them later, the two worlds by the shores of Miami Beach.

The Jews who spoke excitedly about the hot tips on the next horse race, and the Jews who spoke sadly about the race riots in some parts of the South, and of cross burnings very near Miami Beach.

The Jewish women who blossomed out in mink Taleisim after sunset, and the Jewish Womer who listened to music and read

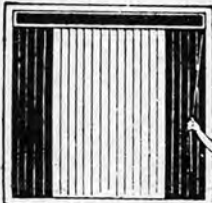

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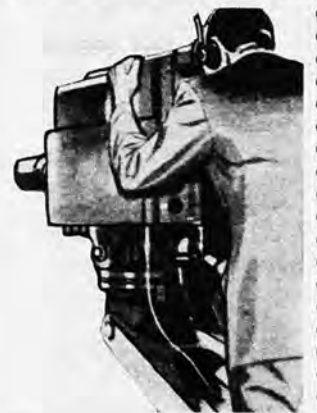

College Daze

Did you know that Brandeis University tosses away half its football potential every year?

It's a fact. The Waltham campus is dedicated primarily to scholastics, not athletics. And while the fast-growing school welcomes athletes, and is developing gradually into a full class New England power, it will not sacrifice its ideals in order to build up its sports program. As a result, many fine athletes who cannot keep up with their studies are dropped. As far as the football team is concerned, this amounts to about 50 percent of the potential . . . ANNUALLY!

Did you know that many midwestern and southern colleges will provide a football scholarship for any boy, sight unseen, who weighs at least 200 pounds?

It's a fact. Out in the area where football is king, and just about a way of life, it is very easy for a good football prospect to get a free ride through school. A 200 pounder invariably is considered a good prospect.

Did you know that a football scholarship can provide a very nice living for a boy who wants to go to college?

It's a fact. A lot of schools — some of them not too far distant from Rhode Island—provide good jobs (that's usually easy), plenty of spending money, even free apartments for the married men.

These and other interesting facts you can pick up, not by purchasing the latest edition of the Farmers' Almanac, but by getting in on a discussion of football in these United States with Irv Nelson, head coach of Mt. Pleasant

High School, R. I. football champs for 1956.

The average high school coach is through worrying about his seniors as soon as the football season is over. His thoughts are of the lettermen who will return to him next season, and of the freshmen and junior varsity prospects he can count on.

With Irv Nelson it is different. Irv worries about his seniors until he has them safely enrolled in some prep school or college. Quite often, that takes some doing, since many of his football proteges are hardly what you would normally call college material. Yet, this dedicated man, who is determined that every one of his boys get the best possible chance to make something of himself, says, simply but proudly:

"I haven't failed yet."

It is a wonderful experience to listen to Coach Nelson explain his problems in getting some of his boys into college. The tales are amusing, often outright funny. That each story is interesting is an understatement of prize proportions.

But there is more than entertainment involved. You come away from a session with this man inspired, sobered by the realization of the tremendous personal effort he puts forth in time, money and concern for his boys. You can't help being deeply impressed by the extent of his research and other activities in behalf of his players.

But most of all, you come away — well I do, anyway — thanking God for this man, and wishing there were hundreds more like him to be placed in charge of our youth in such a critical and formative stage of their lives.

Because of his determination to get his boys into college, Irv Nelson has become a walking encyclopedia of football scholarships, and he has amassed a wealth of knowledge about lesser known (and virtually unknown) institutions of higher learning (you should pardon the expression) and their scholastic standards, at least as far as football players are concerned.

There is the western college, for instance, that will take a high school football star, and give him the full scholarship treatment, provided only that he has finished in the top two-thirds of his high school class. Now wait a minute. Read that again. The top TWO-

THIRDS of his class, I said. This does not mean much scholastically. As long as the boy has finished a shade above the bottom third, he is eligible.

One of Coach Nelson's star players couldn't qualify for this school. He had the poor luck to be rated in the bottom ten percent of the class. Yet, the coach got him into college with a football scholarship.

It is mostly a matter of knowing your way around, writing to the smaller schools, getting tips from other coaches, from your own men who have gone to these schools—and from the schools themselves, since they are always on the prowl for football players.

The requirements often are ridiculously easy. As Nelson puts

it, the football players have to take such difficult courses as basket weaving, flower arranging, sewing, woodworking, and the like.

There are colleges that merely require a high school diploma "or its equivalent", whatever that means. Others make their requirements as few and as meaningless as possible, as long as the candidate is a football player.

Irv's personal postage and telephone bills run high during his drive to place his boys. He leaves no stone unturned, no college undiscovered, until every man is enrolled somewhere.

Often, with the smaller kids who normally would attract no attention, mostly because of size, the coach has an additional head-

ache. He frequently gets such boys enrolled on a trial basis. If the boy comes through on the football field, he gets the scholarship; if not, he is dropped.

Not long ago the Mt. Pleasant coach negotiated with Boston University in behalf of one of his players. Size-wise, the BU coach was not impressed. Knowing Irv Nelson, and trusting his judgment, he reluctantly agreed to give the boy a chance. How did the youngster make out? Why, he merely became the quarterback and the captain of the freshman team.

Which brings up one of the feature reasons for Nelson's success in getting his boys into school. As close as he is to his players, Irv will not misrepresent their ability and talents to any school. He will not recommend any boy, however worthy, if he does not feel the boy can make good at that particular school.

His theory is simple. If he gave his endorsement to a youngster who didn't deserve it, and if the boy flopped, the ef-

fect might be damaging on those who might follow in other years. The college that was once burned would not be easily inclined to take another Nelson recommendation.

As matters now stand, his judgments are accurate, his appraisals sound, his opinions respected. As such, he is a good "scout" for the colleges that are looking for talent.

These are just a few of the highlights from one period of listening to Irv Nelson. The man is vastly entertaining, especially when he recounts some of his own experiences as a professional football player. That story we will discuss at a later time.

Meanwhile, it is a pleasure to note that such a man, who is so devoted to the welfare of the boys under him, has also come up with a state championship. Who says that nice guys don't win?
