Israeli Officials Fear British Swing To Arabs

JERUSALEM — Israel officials here fear that Britain only a few months ago a co-belligerent in the fighting against Egypt, is swinging back to a firm pro-Arab policy.

The fears arise from the decision of two major British oil firms to end their marketing operations in Israel. The decision, revealed earlier this week, is interpreted as a partial surrender to Arab pressure for an economic boycott of Israel.

Say Profit Gone

The two companies—British Petroleum and Shell Oil—said they were disposing of their sales organizations in Israel because the operations had become unprofitable.

Officials have pointed out, however, that Israel had always been ready to pay a little more for oil because of its vital importance to the economy, and that the price was reviewed every six months. The last review was completed about a week ago, they said, and the British firms said nothing then about making the operations more profitable.

Fear Others May Go

Observers here saw the oil firms action as having the encouragement of the British government. They feared the Conservative regime was returning to the strong pro-Arab policy of Ernest Bevin, Foreign Secretary under the postwar Labor government.

The Israelis are worried now that other British firms operating in this country may follow suit, further weakening the national economy.

Appoint Dr. Miller Head Of Division

Dr. Henry Miller, a specialist in internal medicine, has been named chairman of the Physicians Division of the 1957 campaign of the General Jewish Committee, it was announced today by Joseph K. Levy, general campaign chairman, and Dr. Nathan Bolotow, coordinator of the physicians and dentists for the forthcoming fundraising drive. Other appointments in the Professional Division, will be announced soon.

Statesmen Discuss Arrest Of Seaman

WASHINGTON — Israel Ambassador Abba Eban discussed the Suez Canal and the Aqaba Gulf issues, including the arrest by Suez authorities of an Israeli seaman removed last week from a Danish freighter, in a lengthy meeting with Christian A. Herter, Under Secretary of State. Eban described the meeting as a very comprehensive exchange of views on the position in the Middle East. He said it was one of a series of talks and he hoped to see Dulles before his departure for Jerusalem for consultations. The ambassador will leave on August 9 or 10 and return September 7 or 8.

Eban is now seeking a complete picture of views on the Middle East and he anticipates a broad discussion with Dulles, not on day to day matters, but on a broader survey of questions.

Maritime Topics

The talk with Herter included maritime topics, including the case of Raphael Eylon, the Israeli seaman seized aboard the Danish ship "Brigitte Toft" by Egyptian authorities at Port Suez. Eban said he considered the removal of his countryman a violation by Egypt of the 1888 Suez Convention. He said ships of all nations have the right to transit through Suez and, therefore, all sailors. He said Israel's action was being taken through the UN Secretary General. Among matters Eban will take up in Jerusalem will be plans for the coming meeting of the UN General Assembly.

Discover New Grass At Center In Israel

KFAR VITKIN, Israel — The dramatic discovery of a new grass at Neurim, the Rural Vocational Center here, may solve the problem of how to convert 380,000 dunams of sandy wastes along the Mediterranean coast into productive pastureland, Mrs. Julia A. Dushkin, chairman of the center, announced. Neurim is operated by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, and Youth Aliyah, the international agency for the rehabilitation of homeless Jewish children.

"The new grass is hardy, withstands trampling by animals and grows back within six weeks," Mrs. Dushkin explained.

Publish Account Of Nazi Offer To Trade Jews For Trucks

COLOGNE—A detailed account of the Nazi offer in 1944 to "trade" 1,000,000 Hungarian Jews for 10,000 American heavy trucks, as well as developments which followed this offer, is presented in a book published here entitled "The Case of Joel Brand."

The book, which is equipped with a documentary annex, was written by Austrian physicist Alex Weissberg in close cooperation with Joel Brand, on whose memoirs it is based. Brand, Jewish intermediary in the monstrous wartime "Jews for trucks" deal, which constituted one of the most fantastic interludes in the Nazi extermination program was born in Transylvania, grew up in the German city of Erfurt and after Hitler's advent moved to Budapest, where he started a knitting mill. His father had founded the Budapest Telephone Company, his grandfather was postmaster of Munkacs in Carpatho-Ruthenia and at the end of his life built the "Hungarian Houses" in Jerusalem.

Together with Dr. Israel Kastner, for whose killing in Israel earlier this year three persons are currently being tried in a Tel Aviv court, Joel Brand was under the

Nazi occupation of Hungary among the top leaders of the Zionist Emergency Council for Relief and Rescue in Budapest. The Council, which was instrumental in helping many Jews escape, evolved into a headquarters of Zionist underground activity in the course of the war.

Certain Gestapo leaders, who had already engaged in profitable "business transactions" by saving Slovakian Jews from the gas chambers in return for considerable cash payments, approached the Council in Budapest with similar proposals in 1944. Brand negotiated with such notorious SS chieftains as Dieter von Wisliceny, Kurt Becher and Adolf Eichmann, the top specialist for "liquidating" the Jews of Europe. He contacted the Jewish Agency representatives in Istanbul and, with their encouragement, flew to Turkey on a Nazi courier plane for a two-week mission.

While en route to Jerusalem to confer with Moshe Shertok, then a member of the Jewish Agency executive and later Premier of Israel, Brand was arrested by the British and held in custody at Cairo for several months.

Britons Demand Apology For Abuse

LONDON — Despite a strong protest from the Board of Deputies of British Jews to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to animals over statements in its annual report which have anti-Semitic overtones, the Society has not withdrawn or apologized for its abusive references to shechita, Elsie Zeitlyn, chairman of the shechita committee, reported Wednesday to a meeting of the Board.

A section of the Society's report, dealing with the abuse of cattle transported from Ireland to Britain by truck and the subsequent slaughter of two animals in a truck, declares: "But their end

was a more merciful one than that which awaited their fellows who were destined for a Jewish slaughterhouse."

To the Board's protest, which noted that such a passage if not designed deliberately to fan anti-Semitism "tends to exacerbate relations between Jewish and non-Jewish citizens in this country," Lord Merthyr, chairman of the Society's council, merely expressed regret for the form of the report but refused to withdraw or apologize for the offending reference. He invited the Board to send representatives to discuss the matter further, if they desired. The invitation has been accepted.

Polish Jews Living In Fear, Member Of Parliament Testifies

PARIS — Gerard Skok, a member of the Polish Parliament, charged in testimony before a parliamentary committee that the Jews in Poland were living in fear and insecurity because of the wide-spread prevalence of anti-Semitism in the country, according to a report received here from Warsaw.

Mr. Skok testified that only ten of fifty known anti-Semitic incidents had been brought to court attention and that in half of them the perpetrators received extremely insignificant sentences. The witness was reported to have blasted the "too mild" punishment that is being meted out by Polish courts to participants in anti-Semitic incidents.

He also testified that Jewish insecurity has mounted as a result of the practice of Polish families to move into Jewish homes before their owners had emigrated from the country.

At the same time Mr. Skok re-

vealed that more than fifty per cent of the Jews left in Poland are manual laborers. About twenty per cent are employed in state controlled industries and institutions.

Rabbi To Press Orthodox Union

NEW YORK — Dr. Solomon Schonfeld, presiding rabbi of the Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations of Great Britain and the Commonwealth, arrived here this week with "every expectation" of uniting American Orthodox Jewry to his group.

At Idlewild Airport after a flight from London, Dr. Schonfeld said he was confident a world union of Orthodox Jewish congregations could be formed after congregations here joined.

He said he was here to obtain formal agreements from congregations and to discuss organizational details of world union.

"I will inform them that the world body will in no way interfere with the autonomy or independence of American Orthodox Jewry," Dr. Schonfeld said. "On the contrary, it will enhance it.

"The union is conceived not mainly as a counterweight to the powerful world union of liberal and Reformed Judaism. Its main purpose is to be constructive."

Dr. Schonfeld said the union had 100,000 members, with 100,000 European Jews agreed to join.

If American congregations join, membership would reach 2,000,000.

To Depict Life Of Col. Marcus

HOLLYWOOD — A movie telling the life story of Col. David Marcus Brooklyn-born West Point graduate who was killed leading Israeli troops against the Arabs, will be filmed by a new company, Academy Artists Productions.

Cinematographer Lee Garmes has purchased the screen rights to the story from the widow of Col. Marcus, who once was assistant U. S. attorney and later New York Commissioner of Correction.

'Yankee Mechanic' In Israel Enjoys His Work Very Much

TEL AVIV — Social historians have often drawn attention to the broad spread of inventiveness among artisans of earlier times in America. Yankee mechanics were often tinkers and gadgeteers, forever devising shortcuts and ways of saving labor.

One of Israel's many current "Yankee mechanics" is Moshe Burger of Tel Aviv. Not long ago he invented a machine accessory that makes possible the manufacture of sixteen parts in the time that it took to make one. Moshe Burger enjoys being a machinist. "I like to concentrate on the work I am given and I like my work very much in general," he says.

But despite these modest expressions, he is part of a groundswell of interest in things mechanical that is on the rise in Israel. The Israel patent office is a busy government bureau, registering an increasing number of inventions each year, many of them by skilled workmen like Moshe Burger.

He is still young, only 24. His apparently native talent was awakened at an ORT school in a DP camp in Germany in 1947-48. He writes: "It was after all ORT which gave me the foundations of my profession. I studied for two years at the ORT School in Hofgeismark, near Kassel in Germany. My teachers—Wahrhaftig, Singer, Bachrach and others all in Israel now."

Moshe was a lad of about 14 or 15 when he entered the ORT

school. There he received his basic education. That is why he speaks with so much feeling about this experience. The facts of his biography, as he tells them, are as simple as they are a testimonial to human fortitude. "I was born in Auschwitz. At the outbreak of World War II, we succeeded in escaping from Poland to Russia and reaching Siberia. At the end of 1945, we came to Poland. From there we went on to Germany.

"In Germany, I learned that ORT had opened vocational training schools and that one could learn various trades there. I met the teachers and discussed with them which profession I was most suited for. I am grateful to you for showing me the right road."

That the young manhood of Moshe Burger is unexceptional, only indicates the depth of the European tragedy. And like 30,000 other DP's who were trained by ORT in the DP camps, he is now a part of Israel's skilled labor force. With the skills he learned, he is building his new life.

East German Film Hits Anti-Semitism

BERLIN — An East German film company has produced a motion picture on a theme of pre-Hitler German anti-Semitism, "Incident in Benderath," which has been entered in the famous Edinburgh Film Festival scheduled for later this summer.

The movie is based on Curt Corrinth's play, "Trojaner," which was a wide popular success throughout Germany from 1927 until 1933 when Hitler banned it.

Theme of the play is the fight of a high school student, the only Jew in his class, against malicious discrimination from one of his teachers. The boy demands a public apology from the teacher. Supported by his high school friends, the boy continues his fight until the teacher is dismissed. The story ends on the idea that neither the real cause of the incident nor the fear of the Jewish student and his family have been removed.

Following a run in East Berlin theatres in 1955 and 1956, the play was rewritten by Curt Corrinth, its original author, to suit it to current conditions in West Germany. Critics said it was much more objective than the work of most East German writers supplying the East German play market with propaganda serving the interests of the puppet Communist regime.

Fifty Americans Settle In Israel

NEW YORK — The stream of American Jews to Israel, to settle permanently, to supply American "know-how" and to be of personal service in the agricultural colonies is continuing at a steady pace, the Jewish Agency reported this week. Fifty American Jews, professionals, middle class settlers sailed on the S.S. Zion this week.

One group of volunteers, under the auspices of the Agricultural Work-Study Project in Israel, will spend a minimum of one year working in Israel's agricultural settlements. Their purpose is to contribute to the welfare of the State by helping to raise the essential foods which the growth of the population requires. About 80 percent of these volunteers remain in the country. Another group consists of pioneers who intend to become members of cooperative settlements in the Negev.

Agricultural Plan Would Aid Economy

JERUSALEM—A new four-year agricultural development plan to provide 3,000,000 man-days of work annually was presented to the Zionist Actions Committee by Levi Eshkol, head of the Jewish Agency's agricultural department. Mr. Eshkol said that completion of this plan would also aid Israel by contributing 42,000,000 pounds worth of crops each year and save the economy \$13,000,000 in agricultural products it must now import each year.

Kibbutz Needs Workers

The Agency's experiment in placing newcomers to Israel in existing collective settlements rather than throwing them on their own has proved to be most satisfactory in its initial phases, he reported. Mr. Eshkol, who is also Israel's Minister of Finance, asserted that placement of immigrant families into existing facilities is cheaper, provides the newcomers with skillful instruction during their settling—in and learning period and pays off in early crop returns for Israel. He stated that the kibbutz network throughout Israel still needs thousands of agricultural hands.

Increased Arable Land

The agricultural director disclosed that the huge Huleh swamp reclamation project when completed, will add 27,000 dunams (nearly 7,000 acres) of arable land to Israel and will provide 250,000 work days annually for settlers on the new land. The Huleh region will produce about 5,000,000 pounds worth of crops annually and its industrial crops will be the foundation for the industrialization of Northern Israel, Mr. Eshkol asserted.

He revealed that the agency has only set up 11 new agricultural settlements in the past year.

14,000 Young People

There are some 14,000 children and young people in Youth Aliyah institutions and training centers, Moshe Kol, director of the child rescue and rehabilitation movement, reported to the Actions Committee. He reported that Youth Aliyah, which has sheltered some 85,000 children since its inception, is expanding its activities.

Mr. Kol said that agricultural training would help turn a sizable portion of the next generation towards farming as a life's work.

RAPS SPIRITUAL GULF

Addressing dedication ceremonies at the ZOA House of an auditorium named after Abraham Goodman, ZOA leader, and of a garden to bear his own name. Dr. Emanuel Neumann president of the ZOA charged that the trend initiated by Israeli leaders would lead to the emergence of two philosophies, an assimilationist philosophy for Jews in the Diaspora and a Canaanite philosophy for the Jews in Israel. The Zionist movement, he said, would combat both trends as inimical to Jewish unity and existence.

Pakistan Leader Urges Arabs To Accept Israel's Existence

WASHINGTON — A significant future role for Pakistan in the Arab-Israel situation was indicated here in the wake of detailed conversations involving Prime Minister H. S. Suhrawardy and President Eisenhower. The two leaders discussed the roles their nations could play in bringing Arab-Israel peace.

Prime Minister Suhrawardy revealed last week on a national television program that he was

"afraid there is no other alternative" but for the Moslems to accept Israel's existence as a fact of life. He said, "The Israel problem has got to be solved if we are ever going to be certain about peace in the Middle East. I think that it is the duty of all persons of goodwill to do whatever they can in bringing about the solution."

Outlining what Pakistan and the United States could do, the Prime Minister said "they could bring the two parties together; they could try and reason with them." He suggested that the United States could act as an individual mediator. He thought that Pakistan would also be willing to be a mediator. He admitted that Pakistan has opposed recognition of Israel.

Urges Arab Agreement

Suhrawardy said he thought "that the creation of Israel was wrong. But after all," he added, "there is Israel, and everyone realizes there must be an agreement between the Arab world, between the Arab nations that represent the existence of Israel, and Israel itself. Now an agreement of this nature connotes that they recognize the existence of Israel, that they recognize that if there is an agreement between the two parties, then one of the parties is not exterminated."

He said he was "afraid there is no other alternative" than for him to advise all Moslem nations to accept Israel as a fact of life.

(In Israel, Premier Suhrawardy's statement that he is willing to act as mediator between Israel and the Arabs received a mixed reaction. A Foreign Ministry spokesman said it represented progress inasmuch as it indicates that a Moslem political leader sees the necessity of advising other Moslem leaders to recognize the existence of Israel.)

Zionists Split On Party Identification

JERUSALEM — The eleven-year-old Confederation of General Zionists, the world body of central Zionist parties, has split up over the question of the identification of its parties abroad with either the Progressive or General Zionist Parties in Israel.

Mrs. Rose Halprin, acting chairman of the Jewish Agency executive in the U. S., is the spokesman for one faction which includes the Hadassah and other parties. Dr. Emanuel Neumann, president of the Zionist Organization of America, is spokesman for the other group which is led by the ZOA. According to the conflicting claims of the two groups, it would appear that each has control of the Confederation's apparatus and the other has been excluded.

Identification Charged

The Halprin-led faction charged that the ZOA group had identified itself with the General Zionist Party of Israel. Dr. Neumann, for his part, charged that the Hadassah and its group had identified itself with the Progressive Party. What thoroughly confused the issue was that each faction claimed that it represented a long list of Zionist organizations in Western Europe and Latin America. Actually, these groups have already split up among themselves and are polarized in some cases around two separate frameworks.

Mr. Holland, president of the General Commodities Corporation in Providence, is active in the Boy Scout movement and has participated in United Jewish Appeal drives for many years. He was chairman of the one-day drive for the Men's Division and has accepted this position for the 1957 campaign.

Mrs. Louis Cokin is chairman of the Women's Division and Mrs. Morris Pritsker has accepted the chairmanship of the Women's Division one-day drive.

Final plans for the 1957 drive will be completed at an executive board meeting to be held Tuesday at the home of Mr. Holland at 34 Wilcox Avenue, Pawtucket.

Jew Wins Right To Change Name

BERLIN—Because "a Jew may rightfully feel threatened when his racial affiliation becomes known" he has the right to adopt a less Jewish-sounding name, it was held here by the Administrative Court in a ruling reprimanding the local police chief for having rejected an application by a Jewish resident to adopt a new name.

The complainant was a Jewish innkeeper who operates a tavern in the working class suburb of Neukoeln whose request for permission to change his name was turned down by the Police Department.

The change-of-name applicant claimed that he was in fear of anti-Semitic outbursts by his customers because of his name.

Announces Building Of New Ritualarium

Refugee Influx Causes Crisis

NEW YORK — The people of Israel have responded to the current Jewish refugee crisis by putting aside all questions of their ability to absorb more immigrants, and to save lives are taking in newcomers 'at a feverish rate,' Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, executive vice-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal reported last week, following a recent visit to the young state.

"By the end of July Israel's people will have welcomed almost 60,000 new immigrants in seven months and must plan on finding room for 6,000 to 7,000 monthly for the remainder of 1957," Rabbi Friedman told 150 leaders of the UJA of Greater New York.

Rabbi Friedman declared that new Jewish refugees for 1957 are expected to total at least 120,000 persons who must be resettled in free lands. The refugee total includes 17,000 Jews who fled communist Hungary in last winter's general uprising, more than 24,000 Jews driven from Egypt; some 40,000 Jews who have emerged to date from areas of tension in Eastern Europe and North Africa; and 40,000 expected from most of these areas in the next five months.

'Desperate Battle'

"Because they once more put the need to save endangered lives above considerations of national well-being, the people of Israel find themselves also engaged in a desperate battle to ward off a great economic crisis," the UJA leader told the group. He added, "Only prompt and full aid, particularly through the UJA, can provide the thousands of housing units needed for the newcomers, can speed agricultural expansion and settlement and accelerate the process of turning needy immigrants into useful, established citizens earning their own way."

Rabbi Friedman reminded his audience that July 18 marked the 10th anniversary of the arrival of the refugee ship Exodus 1947 into Haifa harbor. Seized by the mandate authorities, the Exodus was prevented from bringing several hundred Jewish refugees as settlers to Palestine. "One reason why Israel's people keep their doors open today is because they remember when they were kept closed by others."

The immigrants from Eastern Europe, who account for more than half of the 60,000 newcomers in 1957, constitute a magnificent asset for Israel, Rabbi Friedman reported. "As a group this influx is marked by a high percentage of trained and skilled people, scientists, engineers and other professionals, master mechanics and technicians.

Yadin Urges Jordan To Make Scrolls Available For Study

JERUSALEM, Israeli Section—Gen. Yigal Yadin, former Israeli Chief of Staff, urged Jordan today to make available for study "thousands of Dead Sea scroll fragments in their possession."

Gen. Yadin spoke at the opening of Hebrew University's "Treasure House" on the second day of the Congress of Jewish Studies here. Some 300 historians and scholars from all parts of the world are attending.

All seven of the Dead Sea scrolls in the possession of Israel were put on permanent public display in a subterranean vault at the new Hebrew University campus west of Jerusalem.

The scrolls, found in a cave near the Dead Sea in 1947, first were identified as the "oldest known Bible manuscripts" by Gen. Yadin's late father, Prof. Eliezer Sukenik, an archaeologist of Hebrew University. Three of the scrolls were acquired for the university by Prof. Sukenik. The four others were bought for \$250,000 by the late Samuel Gottesman of New York.

Gen. Yadin resigned from the Israeli Army in 1952 to study for his doctorate. He is now an archaeologist at Hebrew University.

"We on our part have published the full text and facsimiles, partly with comment, of all seven

scrolls now in Israel," he said.

"While the scrolls in Israeli hands are serving as the raw material for hundreds of scholars the world over, who gain from them new information in their respective studies, whether these refer to religious, historical, linguistic or other subjects, the Jordanians so far have published only one of the manuscripts found in the first cave and nothing at all from finds in other hiding places in the desert area on the western shores of the Dead Sea."

Foods to Remember

Cantaloupes should be well covered with aluminum foil or placed in one of those transparent bags which contain potatoes at most food shops. It helps keep melon odors from contaminating other foods, especially dairy foods. But who doesn't enjoy a chilled melon dessert during summer? So, next time you want to serve a dessert that is easy to prepare and captures the appetites of young as well as old, try the following:

FILLED CANTALOUPE RINGS

Cantaloupes cut into 1-inch thick rings, seeds, and other skin removed.
Chilled fresh or frozen berries of any kind (strawberries, blueberries, etc.)
Mayonnaise, sweetened to taste with brown sugar
Mint leaves for garnish
Place a prepared cantaloupe ring on a bed of shredded lettuce on an individual salad plate. Just before serving time, fill the ring with berries, add a tablespoon of sweetened mayonnaise and garnish with fresh mint. For Milchig meals, combine sourcream with mayonnaise and sweeten to taste, for topping these filled rings.

SUMMERTIME LEFTOVER CHICKEN DISHES

Suggestion No. 1:
1 cup finely shredded cooked or broiled chicken
1 cup drained shredded canned pineapple

1 cup finely cut celery, leaves included
¼ cup slivered almonds
¼ cup salad dressing (French or Mayonnaise)
Shredded lettuce or lettuce cups

Combine all ingredients in the order listed and form into 4 to 6 balls with a large spoon. Serve on lettuce shredded or in cups.

Suggestion No. 2: Add 1 hard cooked egg to each cup of shredded cooked chicken. Put through food chopper. Add 1 tablespoon chopped mixed pickle relish per cupful of the mixture and serve in a mound on a bed of shredded lettuce, watercress or any other salad greens. Garnish with red radish roses, green pepper rings or strips, tomato wedges and/or cucumber rounds. Pass the French dressing or catsup and crackers or toast points.

Suggestion No. 3: Combine equal portions of cooked chicken shreds with finely diced boiled beef tongue. Add diced celery, cucumbers, fresh pineapple and enough mayonnaise to make a fairly compact mixture. Serve on lettuce with a garnish of fresh pineapple wedges or spears and bits of parsley for color contrast. Good with potato chips, potato salad or macaroni salad.

Add this culinary cue to your collection:

FAT-FREE FRUIT SALAD DRESSING

2 egg yolks
2 tablespoons sugar or honey
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 egg whites, beaten stiff with a few grains of salt
½ teaspoon grated lemon rind
Cream yolks with sugar or honey and stir in lemon juice, combining well in the top of a double boiler over hot water. Stir constantly while cooking till thick. Remove from heat. When cool, fold in the beaten eggwhites and grated lemon rind. If too thick for your taste in dressings, add a little orange juice. For an added thickening plus added calories, stir in some sourcream and use on cottage cheese salads . . . yummy!

Assures Equality Of Tunisian Jews

TUNIS — Tunisian Premier Habib Bourguiba reiterated again last week that his government will guarantee the equality of Tunisian Jews with their Moslem fellow citizens and expressed his understanding of the basic necessity of maintaining Jewish life in Tunisia under the leadership of Tunisian Jews. Bourguiba made his statement to A. L. Easterman, political director of the World Jewish Congress.

During a lengthy conversation which covered a range of domestic and external questions affecting the status of the Jewish community in this country, Bourguiba said he and his government hoped that Tunisian Jews would make a maximum contribution to the development and consolidation of this country. He noted that Jewish nationals of Tunisia had always received the fullest protection of the state which would not, under any circumstances, tolerate any form of discrimination against them.

In connection with this point, Easterman expressed the World Jewish Congress' deep appreciation for Bourguiba's public protest last fall against the Egyptian Government's victimization of Tunisian Jews in Egypt together with other Jews residing in that country. Tunisia was the only Arab country to protest Nasser's anti-Jewish measures against its Jewish nationals.

Histadrut Plans Summer Celebration

Alter Boyman, Max Berman, Arthur Korman and Israel Resnick are the Rhode Island members of the Annual Histadrut Outing Committee which will plan the organization's 22nd Summer Celebration, it has been announced by Dr. Louis Silver, chairman of the New England Histadrut Committee.

The week-end, which will be dedicated to the State of Israel and its population, will take place from Friday, August 23, through Sunday, August 25, at the Workmen's Circle Camp in Framingham, Mass.

Gurion's Son Wins Three-Month Trial

TEL AVIV—A three-month libel trial, with Premier David Ben Gurion's son Amos as the complainant, ended here this week with a court finding of guilty against the defendants on three of the six libel counts.

The action was brought by Amos Ben Gurion, Tel Aviv's deputy police chief, against four individuals and a volunteer civic organization he accused of falsely imputing to him corruption in office. The four, publishers of a pamphlet called "Danger Threats From Within," and the organization, Hashurat Hamitnadvim, were fined 5000 pounds and costs.

The count on which the defendants were found guilty were: that the complainant Ben Gurion had used his influence to quash a case against a friend, that he kept his friend informed of the investigation that was being made of him and that he kept on associations with the man knowing that criminal proceedings had been instituted against him.

The attorneys for both sides, among some of the country's top legal minds, were reported to have submitted in evidence some 500 exhibits. In a sixty-page finding, the court reprimanded Ben Gurion for being involved in private business while holding a civil servant status and for striving to influence public opinion in his behalf during the trial.

FIND MORE SCROLLS

LONDON — The discovery of new Dead Sea scrolls was announced here by G. Lankester Harding, former director of antiquities in Jordan, who ten years ago announced the first finds of ancient Biblical scrolls.

Addressing the annual meeting of the Palestine Exploration Fund, Mr. Harding said some "magnificent" fragments of scrolls had been found in caves. Among the manuscripts, some of which had not yet been unrolled when Mr. Harding left Jordan, are part of the Book of Leviticus in an ancient Hebrew script, a translation of the Book of Job in Aramaic and the book of Psalms.

Organizations Urge Committee To Cancel Departure Bonds

NEW YORK — Major Jewish organizations last week urged the Judiciary Committee of the United States House of Representatives to approve a pending bill which would cancel departure bonds posted by aliens who have since qualified as permanent residents.

Adopt Resolution On Soviet Jewry

VIENNA — A resolution calling attention to the treatment of Jews in the Soviet Union and urging world public opinion to speak out against the liquidation of Jewish institutions in that country was adopted here at the concluding session of the fifth congress of the Socialist International. The resolution was introduced by the French delegation. Dr. S. Levenberg, director of the Jewish Agency office in London and a Mapai member, told the congress that "we are deeply disturbed about the enforced assimilation policy carried out towards the Jewish population of the Soviet Union." He pointed out, however, that he was raising the question on purely humanitarian grounds, and that he wanted to keep this issue from being involved in the general East-West conflict.

In another, special resolution, the congress called for the Arab states and Israel to meet in a peace conference—without prior commitment and to reach a settlement based on sovereignty and territorial integrity of all the states concerned. It further urged freedom of passage of the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba for the ships of nations including Israel. The Socialists expressed their appreciation of the constructive achievements of Israel under the Socialist leadership of the Mapai Party. Introduced by the British Labor Party, the resolution called for economic development of the Middle East under UN auspices. The Jewish Socialist Bund and the Japanese Socialist Party representatives abstained.

The American Jewish Congress, the Jewish Labor Committee, the Jewish War Veterans of the U. S. A., the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, and the United Synagogue of America joined in a statement to this effect, which was transmitted to the House Judiciary Committee by the National Community Relations Advisory Council.

Some 280 persons, who originally came to the United States as rabbis, students and visitors, would be affected by the legislation. Each of these had been granted asylum from religious persecution. All were required, in U. S. immigration law, to post bonds to guarantee their departure upon expiration of their visitors visas. Although they have all been granted the right to reside permanently in the United States by special legislation, the bonds that they posted have technically been forfeited by their failure to leave the United States in accordance with the terms of their original admission.

Thus, the Jewish organizations contend, to require payment of the bonds "is in reality to punish resident Americans for availing themselves of opportunities offered by our immigration laws and to exact a forfeiture of new arrivals who are hardly situated economically to withstand such unmerited penalty."

The Immigration Service maintains that it lacks power to alter the conditions upon which the immigrants originally entered the United States.

Israel Government Prepares New Bill

JERUSALEM—A national Sabbath observance bill, which may provoke sharp differences of opinion, will be presented to the Knesset, Prime Minister David Ben Gurion has promised religious party members of his Cabinet, it was learned recently. Justice Minister Pinchas Rosen, whose ministry drafts most bills, is reported to have refused to prepare a Sabbath bill because his Progressive party considers such legislation an infringement of freedom of conscience. Premier Ben Gurion then asked the Ministry of Religious Affairs to prepare the draft.

The anticipated struggle, it was stated, hinges on whether the proposed bill will simply legislate a status quo of local option on Sabbath observance which varies widely from city to city, or seek to require strict observance on a nation-wide compulsory basis. It was predicted that if the bill merely confirms present practice, as the Mapai party wishes, the Or-

thodox elements in the Government will fight it. A nation-wide compulsory measure was considered certain to evoke fierce resistance from Israel's non-Orthodox majority, possibly causing a flare-up of the smoldering "kulturkampf" between the Orthodox and non-Orthodox populations.

WARNS ISRAEL LEADERS

LONDON — The Moscow Radio in an Arab language broadcast has accused Israel of "provocative acts of aggression" on the Syrian border and simultaneously warned Israel's leaders that "there are powers which are capable of making them abandon this policy of intimidation."

QUITS COMMUNISTS

TORONTO — Soviet discrimination against Jews has brought about the resignation from the Communist Party of Sam Lifshitz, former editor of the Canadian Jewish Communist newspaper.

Israel Fares Well In American Poll

WASHINGTON — A survey of American public opinion by Elmo Roper demonstrated that "dramatic events of the past year—including armed invasion of Egypt by the Israel Army—have not lost Israel the sympathetic understanding of a majority of the American people."

The survey revealed that anti-Israel sentiment is more intense on the East Coast than in the Far West. However, only 5% of persons polled throughout the nation said they had a low opinion of Israel while another 14% said that while they could understand Israel's difficult position in general they did not think well of her.

Farmers Friendly

A national total of 11% expressed a high opinion of Israel. But the significant bulk of the cross country study—44%—said that although Israel had done some things disapproved in general she is thought well of. Only 26% said they did not know how they felt toward Israel. Compared with opinions expressed about England and Egypt, Israel fared very well.

It was found that rural areas are friendlier to Israel than big cities. In the nation's great metropolitan centers, the pro-Israel feeling runs only two and one-half to one favorable; in rural areas it runs more than three to one. The pollsters considered this somewhat surprising.

Leonard Lyons tells this story in his column, "The Lyons Den," in the New York Post:

"Milton Berle's 11-year-old daughter, Vicki, told him she'd attended Billy Graham's meeting at Madison Square Garden. 'And, Daddy,' the youngster added, 'I went up on the stage, too' . . . 'Alone?' asked Berle . . . 'No, said Vicki. 'There were 200 others on the stage with me' . . . Berle asked what she was doing on the stage. The child said: 'He asked for sinners—and I came up.'"

GERSHWIN EPISODES

In the same column, Lyons relates these episodes about George Gershwin:

"This week George Gershwin's friends marked the 20th anniversary of the day that death cut short the most brilliant career in modern American music. George White told of hiring Gershwin as a rehearsal-pianist, and then signing him to write the second 'Scandals' at \$75 a week. Andre Kostelanetz told of asking Gershwin how many tunes he wrote each day, and the composer replied: 'Oh, about 15. That way I get the bad ones out of my system.'

"Rhapsody In Blue" was introduced on the West Coast by Tosha Tolces, soloist for the Hollywood Bowl orchestra, who wrote me: 'I rushed to New York to meet Gershwin, to have him teach me the Rhapsody. I'd never played jazz. Gershwin was delighted, but said he couldn't teach me because he wasn't a teacher. I told him all he needed to do was walk around, listen, and if it didn't sound right, to holler. He did that.'

"Gershwin once asked Maurice Ravel, in Paris, to give him lessons in serious composition. 'No,' said the French composer. 'It's better to be a first-class Gershwin than a second-class Ravel.' He also asked Igor Stravinsky for lessons, and Stravinsky said: 'No, you teach ME.'

"Irving Caesar, who has a new Coral Album, 'And Then I Wrote,' played and lost heavily in an all-night poker game, and determined to break even. Gershwin was composing a song in the next room. Caesar would leave the game only to join Gershwin at the piano and supply a line for a melody, then return to the game until the composer needed another line. 'If I'd have been a winner in that poker game,' said Caesar later, 'I'd never have gotten my name as a lyricist on Gershwin's Swanee.'

"During the 'Porgy and Bess' rehearsals Rouben Mamoulian, the director, spoke of a 'fugue.' The composer challenged him to define it, and Mamoulian said: 'A fugue is a musical composition in which an original theme is repeated and initiated.' Gershwin told him: 'No. A fugue is a musical theme which keeps coming in and in and in, while customers keep going out and out and out.'

"He admired Oscar Levant's talent and said it was talent only because Levant wouldn't practice enough. 'The difference,' Levant replied, 'is not in our practicing. It's just that you're a genius and I am not.' One night Oscar stayed late after a Gershwin party, ignoring the hints that it was time to go home. Gershwin yawned, put on pajamas, but Levant stayed. At 5 A. M. Gershwin brought Oscar's hat and coat into the kitchen, where Levant was munching a sandwich, and told his last guest of the night: 'Oscar, I'll pardon you for eating and running.'

"Sonya Levine, the screenwriter who knew him well, tells of the day Gershwin, in the midst of rehearsing a new show, was told distressing news: the lady he was wooing had just eloped. 'Well, I'm certainly glad I'm in the middle of rehearsals,' said Gershwin. 'Otherwise I'd be terrible upset.'

"His brother, Ira, said that when George needed money quickly, his agent, Archie Selwyn, reported difficulty in getting him a Hollywood job: 'They all say you've become highbrow—concert pieces, and now an opera, 'Porgy and Bess.' At Selwyn's suggestion Gershwin wrote him a letter to show to RKO: 'Dear Archy, I have written hit popular songs before, and I will write them again. I am NOT a highbrow.' With this proof in hand, RKO signed him."

Lewis Complains About Menu Only

PHILADELPHIA — Pride in his Jewish heritage and Orthodox background was voiced at the Ashbourned Country Club by comedian Jerry Lewis, who said that his Italian wife has lighted candles on Sabbath eves during their thirteen years of marriage and that she was "happy that our three boys will be Bar Mitzvah."

Accepting an award for his contributions to Jewish causes, Jerry Lewis mentioned that his only complaint about his marriage to an Italian derived from a culinary dilemma. "We have only one interracial problem," he confided. "She likes ravioli and I like gefilte fish."

Britain To Release Last War Criminals

BONN—The last three German war criminals still in British custody will be set free within the next few weeks, it was reported here recently. They are being held in the war-crimes prison at Werl, where the British Army has for some time used but a single wing. The prison will be returned to German administration at the end of the month.

There are still 24 war criminals in American custody and three in French hands. German military circles and veterans organizations here, who insistently demand the immediate release of all war criminals like to advance the argument that it is intolerable for German soldiers to work with NATO and the West "as long as dozens of comrades-in-arms are incarcerated in our own country by the same foreign powers who seek our cooperation." Actually, only two of the 28 residual war criminals were members of the German armed forces, including the sole member of the military SS who has not yet been freed. After their release, almost all war criminals receive from the federal treasury the compensation due "belatedly returning PW's."

Mediation Is A Possibility

The vision of an Israeli-Arab peace has in the past been as evasive as the ghosts which are supposed to haunt respectable English castles. Efforts at direct talks as well as mediation, have been launched a number of times, but have all proved to be illusory.

During the past two weeks, however, there have been more and more encouraging signs that that elusive specter may at last be caught and pinned down. First, there was the report that Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru had tried to persuade Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser to take a less belligerent attitude toward Israel over its claim to a right of way through the Suez Canal and the Gulf of Aqaba, and had offered to act as a mediator in the Israeli-Arab dispute.

Second, there was Pakistani Prime Minister Hussein S. Suhrawardy's statement in the United States that he was prepared to mediate between Israel and the Arabs even though he regretted the creation of the Jewish state.

Third, there was the statement by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles at a press conference last week that the U. S. might take a less prominent role from now on in trying to solve the Israeli-Arab conflict and that certain nations he did not name might now be able to play a more useful role in this regard.

Israel has been trying ever since the end of the War of Independence, to meet the Arab states at a peace table, so that the Arab attitude of belligerency could be renounced and a permanent settlement concluded. As Premier David Ben Gurion told an Egyptian journalist last year, he was willing to meet Nasser any time at any place to discuss peace.

The Israeli Government, however, has never liked the idea of mediation, holding that direct man-to-man talks would be easier to handle. Nonetheless, the door has not been closed to mediation.

Although neither Nehru nor Suhrawardy have ever been friendly towards Israel, the fact that they may be available as mediators should be welcomed both by Israel and world Jewry. Both have been leading proponents of the Arab cause and if either or both should act as liaisons for an Israeli-Arab settlement, it would be a big step toward an easing of tensions in the Middle East and an even bigger step toward a most-welcome peace.

Certainly Israel has much to gain and little to lose if a concrete mediation offer were to be made. Although the problems which have thus far impeded a settlement are complex, they are by no means insoluble. At the very least, a solution by mediation is worth a try.

Extorts Money By Promising Use of Supernatural Powers

TEL AVIV — Practicing sorcery sounds like a medieval story. In the 20th century sorcery is usually associated with Darkest Africa. If it appears in modern Israel, one can be sure that some extortion of money from primitive immigrants is involved.

The Tel Aviv district court is now hearing the case of 45-year-old Rabbi Ovadya Barti who is charged with extorting money under the claim of benefiting his client, Meoded Barzilai, a merchant and owner of several movie houses, with the aid of supernatural powers. Rabbi Barti came to court after long judicial arguments during which he was first "exiled" from his village of Aquir, then detained and later released on bail.

The first question put to the victim was, how could he believe in Rabbi Barti's contacts with alleged Supreme Beings. The reply was rather unexpected: since he believed that a king is due to be crowned in Israel, why, then, should he not be the king? "Who does not want to be king?" the victim asked.

During the court hearing Meoded Barzilai described how he met Rabbi Barti and how this became an acquaintance of several years during which he paid the Rabbi something like 11,000 Israel pounds—the equivalent of about \$6,000.

It started in 1952 when Barzilai's wife was very ill. Rabbi Barti was called in to try his cure. He took a piece of paper and after burning it, a few lines appeared on it "signed" by the Archangels: Raphael, Gabriel

and Michael. The message stated that a talisman was to be found on the roof. This was found and properly smeared with the blood of a chicken. But it did not help Mrs. Barzilai's illness.

Barzilai went to the Rabbi's village for another prescription and again he was shown a "message" from the three Archangels stating that a treasure "hidden since the days of Creation" awaits discovery by Barzilai who should pay 1,800 Israel pounds to Rabbi Barti's wife who was, according to the Rabbi, the Angels' treasurer. The money was placed under a stone in Barti's yard and under the same stone a receipt was found later. When Barzilai wanted to keep it, he was warned by Rabbi Barti to burn it. All receipts would be forwarded to him on "Judgment Day."

There was of course no treasure and when Barzilai started asking questions, Rabbi Barti produced another "letter" from the three Archangels saying that the Crown of Israel was to be redeemed and be bestowed on Barzilai. Under this pretext Barzilai was asked to forward to the treasurer — Mrs. Barti — various sums of money which in the end amounted to thousands of Israeli pounds.

When Barzilai became restive he was given a number of parcels, containing "the King's Robes," but was warned not to open them before two years had passed. Later, another parcel was sent to Barzilai "from the Archangels" mailed from Tiberias Post Office. Unintentionally, he

Gives Advantages of Being Jewish

Being a Jew has its advantages, though a good many people find it difficult to believe.

They are very important in identifying the Jewish character, and in giving the Jew a certain sprightliness and zest for living that is noticeably felt in every society of which he is a part.

The Jew possesses an advantage in living dangerously.

History shows him that his people has been expelled from some country or other more than 200 times in the past 2000 years. With this knowledge and with the added problems that face him he quickly learns the limits of tolerance in his social order. He learns how to bear his wounds and to surmount his ob-

stacles.

It is the minority status of the Jew that has given him a questioning spirit in his outlook on life.

Questioning Spirit

The war colleges of the nations may well admire Israel's military prowess in defeating the Arabs who threaten its existence. But the Jew in Israel is far more concerned about the loss of human life—Arab as well as Jewish life. His Bible reveals the background of his thinking.

The Jew has been in the forefront of the exploration of mind and spirit in western civilization. Because of his isolation he has developed an inquiring nature which has proved of such great

benefit to mankind.

Moral Courage

It is an advantage to be a Jew because he often possesses moral courage in a world of conformity, inner freedom in the midst of physical limitation. It takes a great deal of strength to dwell apart from the mass psychologically or physically, to hold reservations about the mass outlook that is so often mistaken for wisdom. The Jew has been doing this for centuries.

Where Jews live there is apt to be ferment, scientific progress, higher living standards, the struggle against despotism and corruption. Where no Jews live there is often backwardness, illiteracy, poverty and authoritarian government.

Where Jews live one is apt to find rebellion against stagnation and the urge to enjoy the fruits of the earth in freedom. Where no Jews live one will more readily find decay and feudalism.

Avoid Mass Hysteria

It is an advantage to be a Jew because the Jew is not likely to be subject to the mass hysteria that so often limits the growing and maturing of the body politic. Since he is himself so often the victim of persecution and discrimination he knows the dangers of generalizing about other human beings and their traits.

Sense of Humor

The struggle of the Jew for survival over the long centuries has given him a sense of humor. There is no humor quite like it because it is blended of sophistication, realism and skepticism over the confident assumptions of more powerful men. He can laugh at himself as well as at the world. This trait has given him sanity and balance in melancholy times.

On Side of Right

It is an advantage to be on the side of right, as it is an advantage to be on the side of the inevitable winner in the struggle between good and evil. It matters greatly to the modern Jew who, under freer conditions, is still confronted by the unfinished task of building a social order where every man shall dwell safely under his vine and fig tree and there shall be none to make him afraid.

Of Marilyn and Managers

Remember the recent photograph of Marilyn Monroe kicking off the first ball at the soccer game between Hapoel of Israel and an all-star American team? Yielding to an infrequent impulse to pun, I suppose everyone got a kick out of that one. But you may get even a bigger boot out of the rest of the story.

It seemed that the Israeli team would need a mascot for the big game, scheduled for the ninth anniversary of the founding of the Jewish State. The task of selecting an appropriate mascot fell to Judge Samuel Leibowitz of New York. The Judge, with a good sense of values, thought at once of the glamorous Marilyn, who, as Mrs. Arthur Miller, and married by a rabbi, yet, had become fair game (this is said dryly) as an outstanding personality of the Jewish community.

Whereupon the Judge cabled to the Hapoel team, mentioned his choice, and asked if she would be a suitable mascot for their big game.

Came the reply:

"As athletes we would like to meet the Brooklyn Dodgers, but as men we would like to make the acquaintance of Marilyn Monroe."

At a time like this, the soccer team could think of the Brooklyn Dodgers? (Who dey?) Alas, I fear me that these boys have had too much combat fatigue.

Scorn and Sympathy

I find myself feeling admiration, sympathy and scorn, respectively, for certain major league managers, as the season hits the two-thirds mark. It is amazing to me that the sports writers who cover the big league scene, and who live right in the middle of the forest, can't see the trees. To date they have ignored the subject.

For example, if you were balloting today for National League manager of the year, would your choice be Birdie Tebbets, in whom Rhode Island has a personal interest? Or would it be Alston of Los Angeles, or Haney of Milwaukee, or Hutchinson of St. Louis? Would it be one of these? Then we disagree — and most emphatically.

My choice is Mayo Smith of

But cold fact says that here is a club hanging in there despite the handicap of its former ace, Robin Roberts, taking a regular turn and getting plastered just as regularly. What might this club do if it only dared to forget Roberts' reputation and move someone else into his spot!

And the names of some of these Phillies! I never heard of half of them; yet the manager has molded this collection of veterans and rookies, with the accent on the latter, and has them playing on even terms with the Braves and Los Angelinos (Dodgers to you,

And incidentally, American Leaguers Greenberg and Comiskey might do well to study the Phillies at closer range. The Cleveland and Chicago magnates are currently waiting that the Yankees ought to be forced to give up all their promising rookies via an annual baseball draft—all this in order to abolish the Yankee dynasty and prevent the ruination of baseball, you know. Comiskey

even includes the Dodgers with the Yanks as serpents in the diamond Garden of Eden.

The Phillies' reply comes in the way of performance. They have proved that all good rookies don't sign with New York or the about-to-be-transplanted Brooks; that there are plenty of good rookies to go around; and that one team by its dominance is not ruining the game — not in the National League, at least.

New Yorker Helps Dutch Students

DELFT, the Netherlands — Nathan Straus of New York gave a student housing foundation \$10,000 today as an expression of his "respect and gratitude" for Dutch aid and hospitality to "the victims of Nazi terror."

In the audience, as Mr. Straus presented his gift, was Otto Frank, one of those victims whose personal tragedy has been told by his teen-age daughter, Anne, in her world-famous "Diary of a Young Girl."

After hiding in Amsterdam for two years, during which Anne wrote her diary, the Frank family and four other Dutch Jews were seized by the Gestapo and shipped off to concentration camps. Only Mr. Frank survived.

"The kindness shown by the people of the Netherlands to the victims of the Nazi terror has touched me personally because of a personal circumstance," Mr. Straus declared. "Otto Frank, the father of Anne Frank, is one of the oldest friends I have in the world, our friendship dating back to the time when we were both students at Heidelberg University in 1908 and 1909."

Fund-Raising Drive Opened

The gift by the New York philanthropist and president of radio station WMCA, followed by only a day the opening of an international fund-raising drive by the newly formed Anne Frank Foundation. The first aim of the foundation is to restore the building in which the Frank family hid and to establish it as a memorial to "the ideals left to the world in the diary of Anne Frank."

Mr. Frank, who is now devoting much of his time and energy to furthering international friendship among youth groups, said in Amsterdam yesterday that he hoped the dilapidated house and loft building, unoccupied for years, could become a center to which students or other young people traveling through the Netherlands might come for recreation, reading and the exchange of ideas.

Mr. Straus' check for student housing has, in effect, already been spent. The result is a restored three-story dwelling on a

tree-lined canal a few hundred yards from the Delft Technical High School. Traditional on the outside, but modern within, the new residence for twelve students now bears a bronze plate over the door proclaiming it "Nathan Straus Huis."

Speaking briefly at the presentation ceremony, Mr. Straus recalled that the Netherlands had offered compassion from the time of the Spanish Inquisition to the rise of Hitler.

"As a Jew and as a profound believer in the dignity of men," he said, "I cannot forget these events. The world cannot forget them. The qualities symbolized by the people of the Netherlands are those needed today, as they were needed yesterday, and will be needed in the world of tomorrow."
