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## Send Supplies Of Kosher Food For Jewish Marines In Lebanon

NEW YORK — The naval task force of the U. S. Sixth Fleet that landed American Marines in Lebanon carried supplies of kosher food and religious materials and literature furnished by the National Jewish Welfare Board it was announced at JWB headquarters here. The food supplies and religious materials are part of the stocks shipped by JWB to all American naval vessels for use on the high seas during Rosh Hashonah, the announcement said. JWB is the government-authorized agency for serving the religious and welfare needs of Jewish personnel in the U. S. armed forces.

The Jewish Welfare Board also reported that Chaplain Manfred Rechtschaffen, the only Jewish chaplain with American forces in the Mediterranean, who is on duty with the Air Force at Ankara, Turkey, has received an emergency shipment of Jewish religious materials and kosher food supplies. Chaplain Allan Blaine, on duty

with the Army at Munich, from which point an airborne group of the 24th Infantry Division was airlifted to the Middle East, sent along with the Jewish men in the unit a large portion of his own Jewish religious and kosher food supplies.

Jewish personnel among the Marines who embarked from bases in North and South Carolina and Virginia to reinforce those already in Lebanon were also supplied with religious materials and kosher food supplies by Jewish chaplains in those areas. Navy Chaplain Charles D. Mintz at Norfolk bade Godspeed to men taking off from Norfolk and auxiliary chaplain Jerome Tolochko did the same for those who left from Camp LeJeune and Cherry Point. JWB Armed Services Committees at Norfolk, Jacksonville, N. C., New Bern, N. C., and Greenville, S. C., mobilized quickly to aid the families of men called to active overseas duty on a few hours' notice.

## Committee Favors Enactment Of 'Fair Sabbath Law'

NEW YORK — The American Jewish Committee recently published a statement, issued by its president Irving M. Engel, favoring the enactment of a "fair Sabbath law" which would make it legal for observant Jews to keep their business enterprises open on Sundays, if they are closed on Saturdays for religious reasons.

The AJCommittee president also suggested that an Interfaith Advisory Commission be formed of representatives of the major religions to "explore, investigate and consult jointly and constructively" on the possible methods of Sabbath observance legislation. A report by such a commission, which would take into consideration the diverse needs of the various groups, could then serve as a basis for reasoned and effective legislation," Engel pointed out.

Predicting that the Sabbath observance legislation is likely to be an issue in a number of states across the country in the future, Engel warned of the danger of community conflict wherever this issue will arise. He expressed the belief that the creation of an Interfaith Advisory Commission can bring into harmony differences between contesting groups and make conflicts unnecessary.

### Cites Supreme Court

Engel referred to the recent more stringent Sunday closing law adopted by the New Jersey Legislature and the defeat of a bill for fair Sabbath law in New York. He

emphasized that the present statute provisions as to Sunday observance could not be based on religious considerations. He argued that since under the American Constitution there is no state religion, no state can legislate a religious Sabbath.

The AJCommittee leader cited an 1896 U. S. Supreme Court decision which described the fundamental theory behind Sunday laws. "Opinions may differ, and they really do differ, as to whether abstaining from labor on Sunday is a religious duty; but whether it is or not, it is certain that the legislature has prescribed it as a civil duty."

### Insure Day of Rest

It follows therefore, Engel argued, that present Sabbath laws are designed to insure at least one day of rest and recreation and to further the physical, moral and mental well-being of the population. This, rather than a religious consideration, is the essential basis upon which Sunday observance legislation rests, he pointed out.

"In the selection of Sunday as the chosen day of rest we can assume that the states have not violated the constitutional restriction against religious preference but have merely acted to accommodate the majority — who observe Sunday as the Sabbath. Therefore, as a matter of simple justice and fair play — and to avoid any suggestion of religious preference — should not a similar

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## Israeli Ministry Plans Issuance Of Disputed Cards

JERUSALEM — The Ministry of Interior has announced that it has issued orders throughout the country for registering applicants for identification cards in accordance with the new regulations to which the religious bloc objects, and as a result of which members of the United Religious Party resigned from the Cabinet.

Under the new regulations, children of non-Jewish parents are registered on the new identity cards as Jews, provided both parents request such registration. The new rules also permit any adult to designate himself as a Jew providing he declares himself Jewish "in good faith."

The Ministry's announcement, which adds that additional instructions will be issued "in due course," follows reports that implementation of the new rules have been suspended pending a report by a new Cabinet committee headed by Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion.

The Prime Minister's office confirmed an earlier report that Mr. Ben-Gurion had sent a letter to former Minister of Posts Joseph Burg, offering a move whereby the Religious Party Ministers might return to the Cabinet. Dr. Burg is one of the resigned Religious Ministers. However, the contents of the letter to Dr. Burg were not disclosed. It is understood that the Interior Ministry's latest move will be challenged in the Cabinet.

# WJC To Send Delegation To USSR For Discussion

GENEVA — The World Jewish Congress will send a delegation to Moscow to discuss the situation of Soviet Jewry provided that the talks are on a high level.

Addressing 90 members of the Congress' world executive meeting in the Maison Juive here, Dr. Maurice L. Perlezweig, of New York, said that the global Jewish body was "ready to send a responsible and representative international Jewish delegation to Moscow to discuss the problems of Soviet Jewry" if it knew that the talks would be "on a level with the necessary authority to give them practical significance."

Dr. Perlezweig, head of the WJC's Department of International Affairs, revealed that "frank and friendly conferences" had been held with Soviet diplomatic representatives in America, Europe and Israel. He said that in these meetings a plea had been pressed for the grant to Soviet Jewry of the same facilities in the field of religious and cultural activities as are available to other religious and ethnic groups.

Turning to North Africa, Dr. Perlezweig, in his report to today's session, said that friendly and co-operative relations had been maintained with Tunisia and Morocco which "gave promise that the unresolved problems relating to the structure of the Jewish community and the right to emigrate would be solved on a basis of goodwill."

The refusal of the governments of Morocco and Tunisia to be drawn into the policies of "destructive and aggressive nationalism on which the regimes of certain neighbouring Arab countries are based" was lauded by Dr. Perlezweig who also praised Moroccan and Tunisian "action in safeguarding the equal rights and

opportunities of their Jewish citizens."

The New York Jewish leader commented that refusal of responsible Tunisian and Moroccan leaders "to practise discrimination against religious or ethnic minorities was an expression of a larger policy designed to substitute international friendship and internal reconstruction for the policies of expansion and militarisation which prevail elsewhere."

Dr. Perlezweig expressed the disappointment of the Jewish world in the failure of the United Nations, on account of the attitude of "certain great powers", to adopt a Covenant of Human Rights which "would place the sanctions of the international community behind implementation of the rights embodied in the Universal Declaration."

While the UN had made an important contribution in this field, the adoption of a binding instrument which had been under discussion for years was not yet even in sight.

Dr. Perlezweig deplored this failure because human rights were being denied or abridged in many parts of the world and "countless human beings" were subjected to unnecessary and avoidable suffering. The outstanding example of

# Reports That 72 Countries Have No Anti-Semitism

GENEVA — Seventy-two of the 115 countries in which the world's total Jewish population of about 11,827,000 lives are free from overt anti-Semitism, according to a survey issued by the World Jewish Congress. In the remainder, anti-Jewish feeling ranges from social bias to restrictive governmental measures.

The survey was prepared for WJC's five-day meeting which was held here last week. About 70 Jewish leaders from more than 20 countries participated.

In establishing the world's Jewish population at 11,827,000, the study reports that 78 percent are located in three countries: the United States (5,200,000), Russia (2,000,000) and Israel (1,760,000). More than half — 5,987,000 — live on the American continent; 3,214,000 in Europe; 1,959,000 in Asia; 603,000 in Africa and 64,000 in Australia.

Figures for some of the other major communities are: Algeria, 130,000; Argentina, 400,000; Brazil, 110,000; Canada, 241,000; France, 250,000; Great Britain, 450,000; Morocco, 200,000; Rumania, 200,-

000 and the Union of South Africa, 110,000.

Nations, lands and territories listed by the WJC as being free from overt anti-Semitism include: Peru, Venezuela, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, Ethiopia and New Zealand. The Jewish population of the 72-bias-free lands is only 16 percent of the Jewish in the world. The remainder live in countries where anti-Jewish sentiments or anti-Semitism are still manifest to a greater or less degree.

In Afghanistan where a one-time community of 5,000 has dropped to about 400 in a decade, the report states: "There has always been severe discrimination against Jews, who have been regarded as infidels and therefore second-rate subjects of the Shah." Iraq is reported as preventing Jews from going abroad; Egypt's remaining 15,000 Jews — 24,000 were expelled in 1956-57 — live in an atmosphere of "tension and animosity." Libya's 4,300 Jews "experience considerable difficulties in obtaining passports for traveling abroad" and in the Sudan, "the Jews do not maintain relations

with foreign Jewish organizations."

In the United States, the survey finds, "anti-Semitic organizations and publications have declined since the war but there still are a number of both. Anti-Jewish bias on the social level is still extant; in the economic field it is diminishing, although not in all areas. There is also "social bias against Jews" in Britain although "anti-Semitism has traditionally been weak . . ." but "there exist some anti-Jewish organizations and publications."

Anti-Semitic tendencies persist, the report states, in almost all the Jewish communities behind the Iron Curtain. Czechoslovakia's community of 15,000 Jews suffers repressive measures; pro-Israel elements were arrested in 1957; Iraq and political activity has been stopped and Jewish participation in the Government and the Communist Party "has been wholly eliminated."

In both Hungary (80,000 Jews) and Poland (25,000) anti-Semitism is punishable by law, but in both countries it persists, as it does in Rumania.

# Complete Survey In Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS — About 34 per cent of the 19,112 Jews of Minneapolis now live in the suburbs, it was learned as a result of comprehensive Jewish population survey.

Of these, 28 per cent live in a suburban development which hardly existed 22 years ago when the last Jewish population survey was made.

The survey, conducted by the Minneapolis Federation for Jewish Service, also showed a substantial increase in the Jewish population of the midwest city from 16,280

Jews in 1936. The largest concentration of Jewish people continues to live in the northern part of the city, a total of 7,312 Jews or 38 per cent.

Of all know Jewish households, 76 per cent were reported as claiming synagogue membership.

Of the 5,263 children in the 5 to 17 year bracket, 55 per cent receive some Jewish education, one-day-a-week schools, 39 per cent attend more than one day a week and 2 per cent attend the Torah Academy, an all-day school.

Nearly half of all Jewish adult men and 35 per cent of all Jewish adult women in Minneapolis have had one or more years of college education.

## Urge Elimination Of Realtors' Bias

MONTREAL — The board of directors of the Montreal Real Estate Board, in a letter to all members of the trade association, has urged the elimination of discriminatory listings by all real estate dealers.

The letter, signed by Marcel R. Audette, board president, pointed out that the directors resolved unanimously to deplore the practice of accepting listings which carry discriminatory restrictions and to make every effort to end acceptance of such listings.

The Real Estate Board's action was occasioned by a letter from Monroe Abbey, chairman of the national executive of the Canadian Jewish Congress, who noted that acceptance of discriminatory listings was, "apart from the strict canons of morality," an "offense against democracy."

## Canadian Jewish Doctors Increase

MONTREAL — The number of Jewish physicians and surgeons in Canada increased more than eight times in 30 years, from 120 in 1921 to 972 in 1951, the Canadian Jewish Congress reported here on the basis of its study of the Jewish population. Women physicians, who numbered three pioneers in 1921, had increased tenfold by 1951.

Ontario had the largest number of Jewish physicians in practice in 1951, 325. Quebec was a close second with 308 and Manitoba was third with 150. One in every five Jewish doctors was in practice in towns and cities with populations of fewer than 100,000.

accommodation be extended to those who in good conscience believe the Sabbath ought to be observed on a day other than Sunday and actually do keep their businesses closed on that day?" Engel asked.

### Hits Jersey Law

"Denied such equal consideration by the laws of New York and New Jersey, an appreciable segment of the population of these states is compelled to refrain from business on two days — Sunday and their own Sabbath, he continues. He goes on to point out that many states, to avoid discriminating against any religious group, have adopted what has come to be termed a "fair Sabbath law." Such laws exempt from the Sunday closing requirement those places of business which are closed for religious reasons on another day of the week — provided that public worship on Sunday is not disturbed.

Thus, the intention of the Legislature to provide a day of rest is served without requiring greater sacrifices of one religious group than is required of others, Engle states.

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# Technion To Chart Wind's Energy

HAIFA — The only wind tunnel in the Middle East located in the Aeronautical Engineering Laboratory of Technion-Israel Institute of Technology here, will soon be the scene for a series of tests to chart the future course of experiments in the use of the wind's energy for the production of electric power.

J. Frenkiel, who for the past five years has been supervising the study of Israel's wind in all parts of the country, explaining that "the importance of developing wind energy is obvious in a country such as Israel where energy-producing fuels must be imported at great expense."

Frenkiel, who conducts his work on the premises of Technion through an arrangement with the Research Council of Israel, said that an essential prerequisite for his revolutionary experiments is the availability of "complicated measuring instruments which can be kept in a condition of constant calibration and accuracy."

The experiments which Mr.

Frenkiel has been conducting are designed to utilize the power of the wind to set up large generators to supplement Israel's electrical network, establish medium-sized generators to augment diesel units in agricultural settlements, and to initiate small generators for isolated communities.

Beginning in 1953, extensive research was launched into the possible practical utilization of Israel's wind power. Wind velocity measuring devices have been established in 20 different parts of Israel, including Eilat and the upper Galilee.

To date, it has been established that the strongest wind velocities in Israel are in mountain regions, unlike other countries where the strongest winds prevail along the coast. In Eilat there are sustained wind velocities which make the harnessing of power from the wind a distinct reality in the early future.

The new series of experiments which Mr. Frenkiel has launched, following the receipt of grants from the Ford Foundation and the Palestine Electric Corporation, will seek primarily to determine the structure of winds, the problems of gusts, and the influence of topographical shapes on the wind's flow.

The only engineering institute in Israel, the Technion is located in Haifa and has a student body of 3,000.

## To Break Ground For Study Center

NEW YORK — Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin of Maryland sailed for Israel recently aboard the Constitution to address the convocation of groundbreaking exercises in Jerusalem for the American Student Center, a project of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America.

Gov. McKeldin, honorary national chairman of the Committee for the Student Center, also received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from the Seminary at the ceremonies. The governor said he was "honored" to be asked to speak.

He credited "the spiritual and cultural ties" of American Jews to Israel for the planning of the American Student Center and similar projects in Israel.

progress. "In Israel Separate Sephardic lists of candidates for the Knesset" (Israel parliament) had disappeared in the last elections.

Dr. Schwartzbart said that there were "many signs that interest in Jewish affairs" was growing and deepening in many countries and he said that the Organisation Department would do all in its power to keep affiliated communities informed of developments in the Jewish world.

the denial of human rights, he went on, was "the obduracy of the Rumanian Government in refusing to answer pleas of many organizations in all parts of the world to facilitate the reunion of families in the countries of their choice." Thousands of Rumanian Jews had in past years left for Israel in the expectation and on the understanding that their close relatives would follow. For many months not more than the merest trickle of emigrants — nearly all aged and sick — had been allowed to leave. Thousands remained separated from their children and even husbands from wives.

"We hope the Rumanian Government will speedily bring this human suffering to an end by allowing Jews who desire to do so to rejoin their families."

Dr. Perlzweig's pessimism concerning the U. N. was repeated by Dr. Nehemiah Robinson, Director of the WJC's Institute of Jewish Affairs, in a new publication, "The Universal Declaration of Human Rights," made public here. The volume is dedicated to the tenth anniversary of the adoption of the Universal Declaration.

In a preface, Dr. Robinson deplores the fact that in the past six years "no progress has been made in the field of the observance of human rights in the world." If anything, he added "There has been a retreat in this area."

Robinson expressed the view that failure to implement the Declaration was not due to any defects in it but rather to the fact that more than a decade is needed "to achieve any real results in the fight against century-old hatreds, prejudices and biases."

Dr. I. Schwarzbart, Director of the WJC's Organisation Department, submitted a report to the session on the global body's contacts with affiliates and representative organizations in more than 60 countries.

He said that one of the major problems to be solved by the WJC was the "rift" between the Sephardim, numbering 1,800,000, and the Ashkenazim, now about 10,300,000.

"This is one of the main concerns of the WJC," Dr. Schwarzbart said, adding that a complete solution of the problem was a long way off, but there had been some

## Foods to Remember

Whether you have a fishing enthusiast in the family or buy your fish at the market, it's always a welcome precaution to have some cooked and ready-to-serve on hand in the refrigerator these hot days in July. We like the following recipe for an old family favorite because it keeps for a week or more and retains its tempting taste.

### FAMILY STYLE

#### SWEET-SOUR FISH

3 1/2 to 4 pound fish (trout, pike, halibut fillets or any other firm-fleshed fish of your choice)

Salt as directed below  
Cold water to cover  
1/2 cup cider vinegar  
1/2 cup dark brown sugar  
1/4 cup light or dark seedless raisins

1 lemon, sliced thin, seeds removed  
12 gingersnaps (about 1/4 pound)  
6 bay leaves  
6 peppercorns  
1 large onion, thinly sliced

Fillet fresh fish and cut into serving portions or finger lengths of filleted fish of your choice. Sprinkle with salt and let stand in a glass bowl, covered with aluminum foil, in the refrigerator overnight. Rinse in cold running water and drain well or pat dry with paper towels. Arrange fish portions in a pot large enough to prevent crowding and add enough cold water to cover. Cook at moderate heat, allowing 10 to 15 minutes boiling time after skimming. Add salt to taste and then the vinegar, brown sugar, raisins, lemon slices and gingersnaps and cook 10 minutes longer at reduced heat—just enough to bubble lightly. Add the bay leaves, peppercorns and thinly sliced onion and cover pot. Let stand till cool.

Lift the onion slices off first into a glass casserole or other covered container in which you plan to keep the fish in the refrigerator. Arrange the cooked fish portions over the onion slices then turn the rest of the contents over carefully, slowly. There should be enough to cover the fish portions. The lemon slices may be distributed or lifted out and discarded. We like them left in and used for garnish. Or, strain the liquid combination over the fish portions if you prefer. Cover and store in the refrigerator till serving time. Use raw carrot curls and parsley for garnish. This amount should serve 10 to 12.

1 cup evaporated milk, chilled  
3 cups tomato juice, chilled  
1 cup crushed ice  
1 tablespoon lemon juice

## Diplomat Tells Jews To Abandon Zionism

PARIS — A warning to Tunisian Jews to abandon "Zionist tendencies," coupled with a threat to expel all Jews either affiliated or having relations with Zionist organizations, has been sounded by Tunisian Secretary of State for Justice Ahmed Mestri in an interview with Le Monde, one of France's leading newspapers.

At the same time the Tunisian official said his government would permit Jews to leave the country for settlement in Israel or elsewhere.

A dash of salt  
Combine in the order listed and serve in tall glasses. Serves 4 to 6, depending on size of glasses.

### MOCHA PARFAIT FOR DESSERT

6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate bits  
1/3 cup water  
1 tablespoon corn syrup  
A dash of salt  
A dash of cinnamon or nutmeg  
2 egg whites  
1/4 cup sugar

Combine chocolate bits and water in top of double boiler over boiling water till melted. Stir in corn syrup, salt, and cinnamon or nutmeg and remove from heat. Set top of double boiler in cold water to cool faster. Beat egg whites, adding sugar gradually till satiny in texture. Fold into the cooled chocolate mixture. Chill in the refrigerator while preparing the cream mixture as follows:  
Beat till stiff

1 cup heavy cream  
1 tablespoon instant coffee or substitute  
1/4 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed

A few drops of almond extract  
To serve, spoon alternate portions of each of these mixtures into tall parfait glasses after chilling thoroughly. Serves 6 to 8.

## Disputed Swimming Pool Sold

JERUSALEM — The newly-built swimming pool in this city in which men and women will be allowed to bathe together has been sold to a group of kibbutzim affiliated with the Histadrut branch in Jerusalem, it was announced here.

The private promoters who built the pool, which has created an international furore under the continued attacks and riots of the ultra-Orthodox members of the

Neturei Karta sect, said that they sold the recreational facility because of the trouble caused them by Orthodox elements and the repeated protest demonstrations.

The promoters are owners of two hotels in this city. In the course of the dispute, the rabbinite withdrew kashruth seals from the hotels while zealots marched up and down in front of the establishments enlisting public sympathy for their cause. The former owners of the pool expressed their hope that with its sale they will have removed doubts about their personal religious Orthodoxy.

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## Rumanian Diplomat Expelled By Israel

JERUSALEM — The Israel Foreign Ministry has announced the expulsion of Stelian Perianu, the Second Secretary of the Rumanian Legation, apparently in retaliation for the expulsion by Rumania of Joseph Vered, Second Secretary at the Israel Legation in Bucharest.

The Israel Foreign Ministry communique said that the Rumanian Minister was called in and informed that the Israel Government had proof that Perianu had "most seriously violated diplomatic usage by maintaining contact with Israel citizens in matters affecting the security of the state." Perianu was asked to leave Israel within three days.

Vered was declared persona non grata by the Communist satellite government on charges of having persuaded Rumanian Jews to migrate to Israel and of having advised them how to leave. The Israeli Charge d'Affaires denied the Rumanian charges and submitted a strong protest about the expulsion order.

The Vered expulsion was the second in two weeks by a Soviet satellite, Poland having ousted Jacob Barmor, Second Secretary of Israel in Warsaw. It was reported that in view of the generally good Israel-Polish relations, the Israel Government was not planning to expel any Polish diplomat in retaliation.

## Israel Reds Riot Near U. S. Embassy

**TEL AVIV**—Three persons were injured and 13 arrested here during a communist demonstration in front of the American Embassy.

Strong detachments of Israeli police cordoned off the Embassy and ordered the 100 communists to disperse. When they refused, the police charged and scattered them. The 13 leaders arrested included the daughter of Dr. Moshe Sneh, communist deputy in Knesset. The communists shouted: "Away with the American warmongers."

In Nazareth, the all-Arab town, communists held a meeting to celebrate the Iraqi army coup of last week. Communist propaganda, exploiting the Iraqi development and subsequent American and British action in the Middle East, has stepped up in intensity in the Arab villages of northern Israel.

## Netherlands Queen Guest of Ben-Zvi

**THE HAGUE** — Queen Juliana, her husband Prince Bernhard and Netherlands Premier Willem Drees were guests at a dinner last week tendered at the Israel Embassy by Israel President Itzhak Ben-Zvi, who is now visiting this country. The Premier and Mr. Ben-Zvi discussed the situation in the Middle East. The Israel President invited Dutch resistance leaders to visit Israel and meet again Jewish friends in the war against Nazism, many of whom they rescued from the Nazis at danger to their own lives.

## Interpol Police Arrest Dr. Eisele

**MUNICH** — Dr. Hans Eisele, former Buchenwald concentration camp physician who fled to Cairo when it was revealed that he was responsible for murdering at least 200 Jews during the Nazi reign, was arrested by Interpol police in Cairo recently.

Meanwhile, Max von Decker, Bavarian State Prosecutor, has been suspended from office as a result of Dr. Eisele's escape from Germany. Minister of Justice Willi Ankermueller, who suspended von Decker announced that Dr. Eisele's arrest in Cairo had been requested by the Federal Bureau of Criminal Investigation. Government authorities believe it is possible that the United Arab Republic may consent to Dr. Eisele's extradition.

Before his arrest, according to information received here, Dr. Eisele made contact in Cairo with Johannes von Leers, a former Nazi propaganda writer who had himself converted to Mohammedan-

ism and is reportedly propaganda chief to Egypt's President Gamel Abdel Nasser.

Minister of Justice Ankermueller conceded that, in his opinion, the judiciary department, and the police, was responsible for Eisele's escape. Dr. Ankermueller called the Eisele case "the most unfortunate failure and the greatest scandal in the German judiciary since the war."

The Minister said that, when he looked into von Decker's dossier, following his suspension, he made the "startling discovery" that von Decker had been a member of the Nazi Party since 1931. Von Decker was reinstated to office, the Justice Minister found, because he had held no office in the Nazi Party and because persons who had been persecuted by the Nazis had vouched for him.

## Ghanian-Israeli Affairs Reviewed

**ACCRA, Ghana** — Ghanian-Israeli affairs were reviewed in the National Assembly recently in a formal message to the body from the Governor General opening the session. The message reported plans for the setting up of a Ghanian Embassy in Israel and spoke of Israel arrangements for providing the new African Commonwealth with technical advice for development projects.

Also, the message reviewed the partnership arrangements under which the two countries had established the Ghanian-flag Black Star Lines and said that a nautical college was shaping up along lines recommended by Israeli experts.

## Founder Of 'Ulpan' Visits United States

**NEW YORK**—"Everybody, even those who do not know the alphabet, can learn Hebrew in under 100 hours," said Dr. Mordecai Kamrat, consultant on adult education for the Israel Ministry of Education, on his arrival here to acquaint American educators with his teaching methods and to set up intensive seminars for Hebrew and allied subjects.

Such seminars are known in Israel as "Ulpanim."

Dr. Kamrat is in the United States at the invitation of the department of education and culture of the Jewish Agency. He established the first Ulpan in Jerusalem in 1949 to teach the new immigrants Hebrew rapidly.

Today scores of Ulpanim, employing methods developed by Dr. Kamrat, exist in Israel.

## 2,122 Hungarians Settle In Israel

**NEW YORK** — A total of 2,122 Hungarian revolt refugees found permanent new homes in Israel, the Inter-Governmental Committee for European Migration reported last week.

The organization, in disclosing that the last of the Hungarian refugees would be on their way to new homes by the end of 1958, did not give a breakdown on the number of Jews among the 9,000 who registered with the ICEM for resettlement.

## Yeshiva Students Prefer Sciences

**NEW YORK** — In announcing the Fall opening of a new \$100,000 teaching and research center for undergraduate physics students, Dr. Samuel Belkin, president of Yeshiva University, stated last week that the establishment of new physics facilities was necessitated by a sharp increase in the number of undergraduate students majoring in the sciences.

He pointed out that nearly 70% of last year's freshman class and a similar percentage of the September, 1958 entering class of Yeshiva College, the university's college of arts and sciences for men, plan careers in the pure and applied sciences.

The new facility has been made possible, said Dr. Belkin, by a gift from Herman Gerofsky of Brooklyn. It was to be called the Herman Gerofsky Physics Center and will contain five laboratories.

## Fear Breakdown Of Law In South

**WASHINGTON** — There should be no great surprise at recent synagogue bombings in the South because resistance to Federal law by state officials invites "a complete breakdown of law and order," a spokesman for the American Jewish Congress testified recently before a House judiciary subcommittee.

Sanford H. Bolz, Washington representative of the AJCongress told the subcommittee that "the bombings are an inevitable result of this official irresponsibility." He said: "No one should be greatly surprised at the recent outrages against Jewish places of worship in Nashville, Miami, Jacksonville, Birmingham and elsewhere by a group calling itself the "Confederate Underground."

According to Bolz, it may be that this group represents only the extreme lunatic fringe hating all minorities "yet there can be no doubt that these dynamiters believe, in their distorted minds, that they are following a line of action suggested to them by their state governments. They have been repeatedly told by high authorities that it is appropriate and desirable to flout the law whenever doing so will frustrate desegregation."

**Polish Jews Face New Joblessness**

VIENNA — Unemployment is increasing among Jews in Poland and at least one of the reasons is "anti-Semitic discrimination," according to a report in the issue received here of the Yiddish-language newspaper Die Folkshtimme, published in Warsaw.

As a result of recent "disorganization of the Polish economy," the newspaper states, "Jews are being affected like all others, but another factor affecting Jews is the frequent discrimination by anti-Semitic individuals in certain enterprises and institutions. "Such individuals it is reported discriminate against Jews "on the pretext" that Jews can find employment in the newly-established Jewish cooperative workshops.

In the same report, Die Folkshtimme praises the work of ORT which, it declares, has provided vocational training in recent months to nearly 2,000 Jews. Many of those trained by ORT, however, are finding it difficult to obtain jobs, the report implies. ORT's vocational training program are a beneficiary of the United Jewish Appeal.

Die Folkshtimme warns that the present unemployment among Jews, and the fact that more Jews are now turning to "fly-by-night" occupations, may reverse the post-war trend which saw an increasing number of Jews in useful occupations. The article implies that a large percentage of the Jews repatriated in the last 18 months from the Soviet Union engage in these "fly-by-night" occupations.

**Israeli President Visits Brussels**

BRUSSELS — Israeli President Yitzhak Ben Zvi and his entourage arrived here recently for an official state visit, following a three-day stay in Holland.

Prince Albert, Camille Juymann, Foreign Minister, and M. Rafael, Israeli Ambassador, greeted the Israeli President.

President and Mrs. Ben Zvi visited the International Exhibition and the Brussels Municipal Hall and were guests at a reception tendered by the Israeli Ambassador. Ben Zvi attended synagogue services in Antwerp.

(At the Hague Ben Zvi and Netherlands Premier William Drees discussed the Middle East situation at a private meeting.)

**American To Head Technion Faculty**

NEW YORK—Joseph G. Zeitlen, a leading American civil engineer and soil mechanics expert, has been appointed dean of the Faculty of Civil Engineering at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa, it was announced last week by David Rose, president of the American Technion Society. Zeitlen, a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, came to Israel in 1953 under the auspices of the United Nations Technical Assistance Board.

**POLES ATTEND**

GENEVA — For the first time since 1948 delegates from Poland attended the meeting of the World Jewish Congress executive which opened last Wednesday. In addition to the three observers from Poland, representatives of the Central Board of Hungarian Jewry, are attending as full delegates.

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## Jewish Immigration To Israel Falls To Low Level In 1958

JERUSALEM — During the first half of 1958, the rate of Jewish immigration to Israel fell to one of the lowest levels in the 10 years since statehood, Seth S. King reported in the New York Times last week.

Only 8,534 newcomers were admitted to the state by July 1, according to King, who stated that if the projected average of 1,200 a month continues for the rest of the year, the total will reach only 16,000 making 1958 second only to 1953, when immigration reached the low point of 11,000.

A new tightening of restrictions on the movement of Jews from areas that were expected to yield high numbers, including Poland and Morocco was cited by the Times reporter as the immediate cause of the slowdown.

### Economic Factor

King mentioned as a secondary factor "Israel's desperate need for a quiet period in which to prop up her overstrained economy and complete the absorption of the

180,000 immigrants who have poured in since 1953."

He related that Jewish Agency for Israel officials had expected to bring at least 40,000 Jews to Israel earlier this year and later adjusted their estimate downward. He pointed out that over half of this year's arrivals have come from North Africa and the Middle East, with the highest percentage from Iran. The rest have come principally from Eastern Europe, especially Poland.

"Although the current decline in immigration is a disappointment both to the Israeli Government and to world Zionists, it at least is giving the Jewish Agency, which plans and finances the immigration, a chance to attend to a load of unfinished business," King declared.

He stated that the agency expects to spend \$44 million on the development of settlements and made an additional \$11 million available for small building loans.

Approximately \$70 million of the \$122 million the Jewish Agency intends to spend in Israel this year is expected to come from United Jewish Appeal funds.

### STILL PRACTICING

FRANKFORT — Dr. Hermann Pook, a dentist who, under the Nazi regime initiated the S. S. project of utilizing gold teeth taken from murdered Jews and other concentration camp victims, is now practicing dentistry openly in West Berlin and is on a dentists' panel of the government-conducted Health Insurance Services, the Frankfurter Rundschau revealed.

In 1947, Pook was sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment by an American military court, but he was released four years later for "good behavior." Later, a denazification court cleared him as "not having been connected with National Socialism."

## Sen. Flanders Hits Policy On Israel

WASHINGTON—Sen. Ralph E. Flanders (R-Vt.) urged Congress to "face up to the heart of unrest in the Arab Middle East" by discouraging U. S. aid and gifts to Israel, according to an Associated Press dispatch from the nation's capital.

Flanders, who will leave the Senate this year, announced that he is introducing a resolution which states, among other things, that "the unrest in the Arab world is caused primarily by the forcible occupation of Arab land by the government of Israel."

The Vermont senator's resolution advocated a U. S. Treasury investigation of tax-free contributions by U. S. citizens to the United Jewish Appeal and other Israeli fund-raising efforts. He also came out in favor of U. S. aid to help Arabs "who were dispossessed of their lands."

Flanders also said the U. S. should resume food packages and other aid for Egyptian school children.

## Congress Criticizes Passport Proposal

WASHINGTON — Administration proposals which would make "the exercise of the right to a passport dependent on the will of the Secretary of State" were criticized by the American Jewish Congress.

Phil Baum, senior staff counsel of the Congress, said that the United States, alone among the free nations of the West, put serious restrictions on the freedom of travel.

Mr. Baum urged that "discretion to withhold passport should be exercised only to detain fugitives from justice, persons under indictment and free on bail, and generally those who seek to escape legal obligation."

## Calloway To Star At Warwick Theatre

Catfish Row and some of George Gershwin's best-known music, such as the enduring "Summertime," and "Bess, You Is My Woman Now," will distinguish the Warwick Musical Theatre for one week, starting next Monday evening, August 4.

Cab Calloway, a top performer in all branches of the entertainment field for well over twenty-five years, will recreate his role of Sportin' Life. Calloway will head a company composed of performers most of whom were included in the history-making "Porgy and Bess" world tour, which included countries behind the Iron Curtain and Russia. The tour was part of the President's International Cultural Exchange Program, which is administered for the State Department by The American National Theatre and Academy (ANTA).

Generally regarded as America's foremost folk opera, "Porgy and Bess" is the tale of the crippled beggar named Porgy, and of his joys and sufferings in Charleston's Negro slum called Catfish Row. The story has been considered a classic since first told in Dubose Heyward's novel in 1925. The Theatre Guild presented it as a play in 1927 and the musical finally reached Broadway, under Theatre Guild sponsorship, in 1935. However, the first production only achieved mild success and it wasn't until it was revived by Cheryl Crawford and John Wildberg, in 1942, that it received its just acclaim.

## Zionists Meet In South America

BUENOS AIRES — The first South American conference of the World Organization of General Zionists, the movement co-chaired by Mrs. Rose Halprin and Dr. Israel Goldstein, closed here with a call for Latin American General Zionists to affiliate with the movement and to rally in support of its policy of non-identification with political parties in Israel. The conference also decided to organize a Latin American Confederation of parties in sympathy with these aims.

Among the 102 delegates who participated in the parley were representatives from General Zionist organizations in Uruguay, Brazil, Chile, Peru and Bolivia, as well as Argentina. Also represented were the pioneering movement Hanoar Hazioni, which has been effective in gathering chalutzim for Israel in Latin America, and various university youth groups. Dr. Goldstein and Judge Louis E. Levinthal, a member of the executive of the world organization, attended.

After the parley and prior to his departure from Argentina, Dr. Goldstein paid high tribute to the Zionist and Jewish cultural aspects of life in the Jewish community of Argentina. He stressed the great respect of the Jewish community, attributing this state of affairs to the extensive unity demonstrated within the community.

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### Medical War Crimes

The British Medical Association have decided to convey to the German authorities their distress at the reinstatement of doctors guilty of war crimes. Their decision comes at a moment when German public opinion has been deeply stirred by the terrible details revealed in the recent trial of Martin Sommer, "the hangman of Buchenwald." But Sommer was simply a former S.S. guard, remarkable only because he was more brutally sadistic than others.

Most of the decrees which produced murder and torture on an indescribable scale in Nazi concentration camps started as administrative acts. They were worked out by men sitting at their office desks, behind files and rubber stamps. These were the bureaucracy of murder, but they did not do any killing themselves. At the end of the day, they closed their files and went home to their families, often without ever seeing their victims.

But the Medical Society last week spoke of those who personally carried out their ghastly decrees, who were qualified medical practitioners and who, as doctors, were prepared to engage in those gruesome practices on prisoners which were called experiments. Some of these have managed to re-establish themselves as doctors in the Federal Republic, and have even been able to obtain compensation for "war losses" from public funds and loans to build up a new practice. One of them, Dr. Eisele, whose name appeared again in the Buchenwald case, managed to evade arrest and to get to Cairo. But the British Medical Association, quite rightly, are not concerned with the question of punishment. All they did was to state the incontrovertible view that men and women who have perverted and dishonored their professional qualification by these criminal acts cannot be allowed to practise as doctors again.

Many Germans will share the distress of British and American medical men, and there is, therefore, hope that the appeal will be heeded.

### Paper Charges Maine Resorts With Discriminatory Practices

PORTLAND, Maine — The charge that discriminatory practices against Jews are widespread among summer resorts in Maine was made by the Portland Telegram. The charge was based on personal investigations of the situation by a reporter.

The newspaper article quotes a Maine travel official as saying that "most resort owners are scared to death that if they allow Jews in, some of the regular clients who have made up the backbone of their business for years will go. It is true too that some Maine operators are rabidly anti-Semitic, but they are in the distinct minority."

The paper pointed up the inadequacy of the current anti-discrimination law in Maine which prohibits discriminatory advertising, but does not prevent actual discrimination. A bill to expand the law was defeated in the State Legislature in 1953. In contrast, it stressed the successful operation of anti-discrimination laws in all New England states except Maine and New Hampshire.

The investigation of the situation by the paper was conducted on the basis of tests undertaken by Dr. Benjamin Zolov of Portland, state chairman of the Anti-Defamation League, and data gathered by the New England Regional office of the League. The article quotes Dr. Zolov on the results of six calls made to Maine resorts after July 4, in which the categoric question as to whether Jews were accepted as guests was asked. The answer in each case was "no." Further checks bore out the figures of a survey showing that 63 percent of Maine resorts discriminate against Jews.

ADL officials, commenting on the exclusionary policies of so large a group of Maine resorts, said it is a "problem that Maine officials must face up to if they are to protect the important resort industry of the State." At the same time, Dr. Zolov revealed that Jewish leaders are planning a state-wide conference on the problem in Portland on Sept. 21.

### Two States Ignore Jewish Protests

LOS ANGELES — The Los Angeles Jewish Community Council said assurances had been received from the Board of Education that no Jewish child would be penalized for absence on the opening day of fall public school term, which coincides with the first day of Rosh Hashonah. The statement said that Ellis Jarvis, superintendent of School, and the Board had "earnestly sought" to avoid the conflict, but that efforts to change the date of school opening proved unworkable.

Under arrangements worked out between the Board of Education and the Jewish Community Council, no Jewish child is obligated to report on the first two days of Rosh Hashonah. Representatives of the Board of Rabbis and of the Community

Relations Council expressed "deep regret" to school officials about the conflict of dates, but they refrained from insisting on a change in the school calendar because the Jewish leaders felt such a demand would endanger the Jewish community position opposing religious encroachments on state decisions.

NEW ORLEANS—Despite Jewish protests, the Louisiana Senate passed a bill requiring all primary elections in the state to be held on Saturday. The bill was passed in the closing hours of the 1958 session of the Louisiana legislature.

The Senate had earlier rejected this measure, but under pressure from the administration and despite strong opposition by a group of senators the bill was passed.

## Israeli Writer Discusses Rise Of Colored Imperialism

I am disinclined to use the word "colored" in order to divide mankind into White and non-White segments. Such differentiation is not scientific. It is contemptuous of the part played by many peoples in the history of cultures and civilizations and is primarily the result of that racial discrimination which has produced such extreme manifestations as Nazism, and the consequent decimation of entire nations.

### Editor's Mailbox

To the Editor:

Not long ago you published a letter of mine regarding the Vaad Hakashruth. Subsequently many of my friends, who were pleased at its constructive and conciliatory tone, asked me why I didn't go a step further and make suggestions regarding improving the Vaad Hakashruth.

As a matter of fact this was uppermost in my mind when I wrote the previous letter. The reason I didn't make any suggestions is because I was not sufficiently informed regarding the operations of the Vaad.

I believe that the suggestion of I. Segal that we get the ball rolling is in point, providing that all suggestions be made B'emuna (with sincerity).

I submit the following, which in my humble opinion, I believe to be of a constructive nature.

1. That all the orthodox and conservative congregations be members of the Vaad.
2. That the governing body of the Vaad shall consist of only strict adherents of the Kashruth laws.
3. That there be strict supervision by competent supervisors, who themselves are strict adherents of the Kashruth laws.
4. That on any controversial question of Kashruth resort shall be had to the Beth Din of Boston or New York.
5. That the Vaad render an annual financial report, to be published in the Jewish Herald, the expenditures to be itemized.
6. That a certain percentage of all surplus money, at the end of the year, shall be distributed to local charities, such as the Miriam Hospital, Home for Aged and the Hebrew Day School. — This would act as an incentive to pay the little extra that kosher meat costs over non-kosher.
7. That there be an annual meeting to which the public shall be invited and where a report for the past year shall be given, and where constructive measures for the future can be taken.

I am only a mere layman. The public, no doubt, would prefer that the communal leaders and the rabbis come forth with their suggestions and not stand in the background. Let's hear from them.

But a strange psychological transformation has taken place, during the decades following World War II, as to the scale of values applied to the Whites and to colored peoples. The inferiority complex of the colored races, so characteristic of the colonial era, has become, — in our period of emancipation and of rising new states in the formerly colonial regions,—an outspoken superiority complex, immunized against any criticism by the White man. Actually, the Whites themselves seem to have bowed to this new fashion of "anti-colonialism" . . .

Furthermore, the behavior of White nations is being condemned today not only by a cohesive block of colored races, but by the White themselves as well. In fact, things not usually permitted to Whites are somehow allowed to colored peoples. In any event, the conduct of colored nations is not being censored by the Whites to anything like the same extent as the behavior of their own states and governments.

When the government of Tunisia turned its territory over to the Moslem Algerian terrorists as a base of attack against a neighboring country, French Algeria,—France did not dare bring her rightful complaint to the United Nations, although the conduct of the Bourguiba government obviously imperiled the peace of all countries concerned. On the other hand, after the French Army counter-attacked on the Algerian-Tunisian border and bombed the gun-positions from which Tunisian fire was directed at the French—there was an immediate explosion of damning criticism and hysterical accusations, not only by representatives of Tunisia and delegates of colored nations, but by the Big White Powers as well. (Even some circles in France herself joined in the chorus.)

We may note here that there is no essential difference between this particular condemnation of France and the protests against Israeli "aggression" voiced in the U. N. Security Council during the Sinai campaign.

Contrariwise, the same standard does not seem to apply in the case of "colored" governments. Thus, for instance, Communist China has become a colonial empire: a Red Peking is ruling now Manchuria, Tibet, Mongolia—all countries inhabited by ancient peoples who have their own peculiar history, who have striven for national independence, and who have achieved such independence in the past. Today these very nations are subject to the imperialistic and colonialistic rule of Mao-Tse. Yet who dares call the regime of China's "People's Republic" by its proper name: the name of a colonial empire?!

India, too, is a great empire. The rulers of Delhi dominate some two hundred peoples who speak their own particular languages and who even had their own kingdoms and states, until the British conqueror fused them all into one Raj. For the past few years, many separatist national movements have come into being in various large provinces of India. But the Delhi government has "liquidated" all such aspirations, often harshly so, even using brute force in the process. Yet who would dare proclaim Nehru a colonialist, an oppressor of freedom seeking peoples?

Another example is Indonesia, an archipelago embracing many

large islands populated by many diverse races of man. The peoples living there have no common historic past. What unifies them to a certain extent is the fact of their having been under Dutch rule during the colonial period. Now, the Indonesian government,—which cannot properly govern its own islands, and is trying to put down, by fire and sword, the recurrent rebellions of Sumatra, the Moluccas, etc., etc., — has nevertheless laid claim to a part of New Guinea ruled and developed by Holland. Historically, racially, culturally, or in any other respect, there are no legitimate grounds for Indonesia's claim. Yet the fact that this preposterous demand has been pressed by a "colored" government against a White nation suffices to provide it with wide support throughout the world.

The most striking example of "colored" imperialism in our time is, no doubt, furnished by Nasserism. Nasser's official doctrine aims at a forcible unification of all lands which were, or are said to have been, under Arab domination a thousand years ago. Thus, all the many and diverse countries extending from Morocco to the shores of the Indian Ocean are to be ruled . . . from Cairo. This is the empire which Nasser so brazenly seeks to create. He openly proclaims his goal — but he has the cheek of stating that this aggressive operation is not imperialistic at all; that it is a movement of so-called "national" liberation!

In this manner he has created, with the aid of the military junta in Damascus, a Federation of Syria and Egypt, which boils down to an annexation of Syria by Egypt.

More recently, he has tried — without much success — to subvert also Lebanon . . .

Immediately thereafter, he has started a campaign to press his demands for a "Federation of the Nile Valley", — meaning the swallowing up of the Sudan by Egypt . . .

Thou shalt have not two weights nor two measures, says the Bible.

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

**A Pitiful Plight**

Since two and two make four, it would seem a good bet that if the Dogs do alter the playing area to present more ideal field conditions for 1959, then they will thumb their noses at Chavez Ravine forever, pocket the millions they were supposed to be ready to pour into the construction there, and set up permanent headquarters in the big bowl.

There will be one grossly distasteful phase of this proceeding, if it does transpire. The Coliseum will demand from O'Malley for 1960 and thereafter, double the Dodgers' present rent, and all the income from the food concessions.

This is not good — but right now O'Malley can not be fussy. And with an expected \$2 million attendance, it isn't to be sneezed at.

**Sartorial Splendor**

Beneath the rough exterior of today's major leaguer lies a pure heart and a colorful display of underwear. Casey Stengel wears flaming red shorts with the Yankee monogram stitched on them... Hank Soar, Rhody's top umpire, puts on his uniform over a T-shirt that advertises "City of Pawtucket"... Mickey Mantle plugs Grossinger's with his, while one of the Yanks has a T-shirt with an imprint of one of Yogi Berra's business operations.

In baseball circles they are snickering over that recent Senate investigation of the game. All the witnesses called to Washington are making at least \$60,000 per year. Says Joe DiMaggio: "What can (men like these) say? Baseball has given them fame and wealth. My suggestion would be to talk to the men and the players

in the minors, maybe those who don't have it so good."

Joe could have added that the stars of the game represent the tiny minority of baseball's overall operation. It would seem the Senate Committee might have thought of that too. Or maybe they just wanted to get a personal lesson in Stengelese — and a few autographs.

Among the U. S. Senators who come out to the ball park quite often to see the Washington club is John O. Pastore, who is considered a real fan.

**Progress Report**

Andy Cohen, this column's candidate for "first Jewish manager in the Big Leagues" still is flying high at mile-high Denver, the Yankees' farm. Despite his precarious lead of only 1/2 game, Cohen may be turning in his greatest job. His team has been riddled by injuries all season, with as many as four of his eight regulars out for long stretches, occasionally at the same time, and his best pitchers gone to the majors. Yet, he has had his club in first place all year. That's the kind of job that merits praise. Andy sure isn't doing himself any harm.

**Ball Parks and Home Runs**

A leading statistician recently compiled the results of a survey on home runs in the various big league parks. Some of the facts are surprising. For instance, the record years for homers in Fenway Park is the second highest in the American League. The year was 1950, the total number of homers 167, of which Bosox hitters had an even 100.

(The league record is Kansas City — 180, in 1955. At the other extreme is Baltimore, with only 74, in 1956.)

Yankee Stadium's record year was way back in 1938, nine years prior to the earliest record year of any other team. That year the Bronx ball park had 156 balls

hit into the stands, with the murderous Yanks of those days of Gehrig, DiMaggio, Dickey, et al, smashing 112.

As you might suspect, the survey reveals that the bandbox parks have the most home runs, the larger stadiums the fewest. The homers come the thickest and the mostest in places like Cincinnati, New York (Polo Grounds), Brooklyn, Pittsburgh and Kansas City. And it proves that the National League has the shortest fences.

**Jackie Was Lunging**

Sometimes the best jokes are the ones you can tell on yourself. This one still makes me chuckle.

A couple of months ago, I took in a Red Sox-White Sox game at Fenway Park. Boston won a thriller that day, but Jackie Jensen, who hadn't been doing much for more than a week, looked awful. He fouled out, struck out, grounded out, etc. And I noticed something!

## Israel Stays Calm In Midst Of Crisis

JERUSALEM — Israel is calm in the midst of the Middle East crisis. While all here, including tourists, are watching the situation as it is reported in the press and on the radio, there is an absolute lack of excitement or concern, the population apparently being certain that the Government is handling the situation competently.

Tourists are staying on and, in fact, there were reports from travel agencies here and in Tel Aviv that some tourists have ordered extensions of their scheduled visits. Of 1,600 foreign youths who are here as part of a Jewish Agency youth study tour, only one received a request from his parents back home to leave — and this youth stated he has notified his parents that he prefers to remain here for the duration of his tour. Seven hundred of the youths are from the United States, the others having come from Canada, England, France, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland and Scandinavia.

An indication of the calmness of the atmosphere is the fact that a capacity audience of 3,000 jammed the concert hall of the Tenth Anniversary Exhibition here.

## Suspended Employees Reinstated

WASHINGTON — The law of the land is not what Senator McCarthy wanted to force upon it, but something entirely different, the United States Court of Appeals decided when it ordered the last six individuals who had been suspended from their Fort Monmouth jobs reinstated.

These six had been suspended since 1953 and 1954 and had been the rear guard of the Seven Year War which has been fought by the New Jersey attorneys Harry Green and Ira Katchen. The attorneys were finally successful in their efforts when they lodged their cases into the Federal courts and after losing in the lower court appealed to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

### Reinstated Scientists

The six who were reinstated were Melvin Morris, a physicist of Little Silver, Carl Greenblum, an engineer of Red Bank, Harold Du-

core, engineer of Long Branch, and a woman, Bernice Levine, typist-secretary of Lakewood, all of N. J. The other two who were ordered reinstated were Aaron H. Coleman, electronics engineer of New York and Hyman G. Yamins, a scientist of Newton Highlands, Mass. Yamins was represented by Attorney Markell.

The court's order means that the six will also secure back pay of \$180,000 against which however the government will secure a credit for whatever sums the individuals have earned during their suspensions.

### Organizations Duck

Green commented that they didn't get a nickel of aid from any of the National Jewish Organizations.

Two Jewish organizations attempted to give what aid they could to the attorneys Green and Katchen. Those two organizations are the Jewish War Veterans and the American Jewish Congress.

### Hail Decision

Will Maslow of the American Jewish Congress said "We hail the decision. It is a welcome vindication of the position we have been taking from the beginning. It also demonstrates the crying need for a thorough-going revision of the Federal Internal Security Program."

### Heroic Lawyers

The Fort Monmouth suspendees were not wealthy. They were salaried employees. Attorneys Green and Katchen donated their legal services and dug down into their own pockets at times to buy food for their clients. When attorneys Green and Katchen approached the American Jewish Committee and the B'nai B'rith to do needed investigative work, they were turned down by both groups, said the Newark, N.J. Jewish Ledger.

### 35 of 40 Jewish

In the days when the Fort Monmouth probe was much in the news, the New York Post reported that of 40 suspended or declassified, 35 were Jews and one a Negro. One electronics engineer at Monmouth was scored because he "favored the leftist policies of Max Lerner," another because, when he was 12 or 13, his mother had enrolled him in the Young Pioneers of America.
