

Charge Jewish Women Make 'Pet Project' of Medical Fund Raising

BOSTON — "Earnestly devoted Jewish women" in Boston were said to be giving "disproportionate support" to medical fund-raising campaigns to a degree that "a situation of ghettoization" has developed in some of the campaigns.

The problem was reported by the Jewish Community Council of Greater Boston, which said that the "ghettoization" referred to the fact that "the leaders and contributors" in such "single disease" fund-raising efforts "are predominantly Jewish although the disease is common to Jew and Gentile."

The report said that the situation was "much more serious in Boston than in other cities" and added that recognition had been developing that such situations were undesirable.

"When these drives become pet projects of Jewish women there is a slackening of general community interest and participation," the report stressed. Jewish women active in fund-raising were urged before participating in such campaigns, separate from the United Fund, to determine whether the funds were actually needed.

Swedish Premier To Open Congress

STOCKHOLM—Prime Minister Tage Erlander of Sweden will open the ten-day Plenary Assembly of the World Jewish Congress which will be held in Stockholm Aug. 2 to 12.

In addition to a large American delegation there will be delegations from Canada, Argentina, Peru; other Latin American communities, Israel, Europe, Asia, Africa and Australia.

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Professor Contends Shintoism, Judaism Have Much In Common

NEW YORK — Shintoism and Judaism have many basic things in common, according to the noted Japanese professor Chikao Fujisawa, who teaches Oriental Political Science and Philosophy at Nippon University.

Dr. Fujisawa has been lecturing before various political, religious and economic groups in the greater New York area on the traditional faith of Japan and its relationship to Judaism.

Presenting historic facts from the writings of ancient Japan, Dr. Fujisawa contends that there is a much closer relationship between Hebraic and Japanese beliefs than most people realize.

Among the many similarities, the Japanese scholar cited: 1. The stress on the sanctity of the family; 2. The importance given to ancestors; and 3. The rejection of the Christological idea of original sin and the acceptance of life on earth as the true paradise.

Interviewed by the AJP reporter here, Dr. Fujisawa revealed that despite Christian missionary activities in Japan, very few Japanese sincerely accept Christianity.

On the other hand, he pointed out that while the Japanese are not converting to Judaism in the tens of thousands as had been rumored, they nonetheless feel a strong affinity for Judaism.

State Department Flatly Denies Possibility Of Defense Aid

WASHINGTON — A Defense Department spokesman conceded the possibility of defense aid to Israel, but the State Department flatly denied such a consideration in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee testimony.

In the course of hearings on pending Mutual Security legislation, Charles H. Shuff, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Military Assistance, was asked whether he considered the judgment involving the exclusion of Israel from U. S. defense assistance to be sound.

Shuff replied "I would have to wait until the end of 60 days to really factually answer that question because it may be that Israel and the Department of State may negotiate a military assistance grant agreement during the course of that fiscal year. I don't know whether this will happen."

After an "off the record" discussion deleted for security reasons, the transcript indicated Mr. Shuff agreed that barring any new developments the existing non-military programs for Israel were sound.

William Rountree, Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, also testified. He told the committee "I would say quite frankly that we have not considered the extension of military assistance to Israel."

The issue of military assistance for Israel arose after Sen. Wayne

Morse (D-Ore.) pointed out that Arab states were receiving U. S. munitions grants, but Israel was not. The Oregon Democrat raised the question of "discrimination" against Israel because of State Department concessions to the Arab attitude. He said "Israelis are supporting a military establishment that costs her so much more than one would consider to be a fair percentage of her national budget. If she were some other country, she might be considered qualified for defense support."

Sen. Morse told the committee of Arab threats "to wipe Israel off the face of the map" and said "inflammatory statements that are constantly being made by many of the Arab countries don't augur very well for peace in the Middle East."

Mr. Rountree replied that "highly inflammatory statements were made 'by both sides' and 'our programs in the area cannot always be predicated entirely upon what is said or what is not said in this inflamed situation. But I think we have to proceed on evaluation of what are the real intentions of the people concerned and in the light of what is regarded to be in our best interests."

Denying Sen. Morse's assertion that by refusing defense support to Israel the State Department discriminated, Mr. Rountree said "I would be very surprised indeed if the Israel representatives themselves felt that Israel had been discriminated against. Indeed I find it often the case that friends of Israel in the United States are more sensitive to particular aspects of United States-Israel relations that the official representatives of the Israeli Government."

Soviet Union Enters Argument On Ship Seizing

JERUSALEM — The USSR last week, for the first time since the latest flareup over Israel cargoes in the Suez Canal began, entered the argument with a radio propaganda attack on the United States.

The Soviet Union charge on Radio Moscow was that the United States was secretly supporting Israel at the expense of the UAR. Radio Moscow said that the United States "fully supports Israel and encourages it to exert pressure" on the United Arab Republic "but it is anxious that no one should get wind of this."

Radio Moscow said that the United States was afraid to act openly because "this would nullify the results of the propaganda campaign designed to convince the Arabs that the United States has truly friendly intentions toward them." The broadcast added a warning that the present Suez dispute "can develop into an armed Israeli attack against the UAR."

Meanwhile, Egyptian authorities were reported to have issued strict orders to Egyptian shipping plying the coastal route to Lebanon and Syria to avoid approaching Israeli territorial waters. Egypt evidently feared that Israel may retaliate against the stoppage of the Inge Toft by seizing any Egyptian vessel encroaching upon Israeli waters, even if the encroachment is unintentional.

Until recently, the Israeli practice has been to halt Egyptian ships penetrating Israel waters, releasing the ships after an investigation into the circumstances of the encroachment. Two weeks ago, however, Israel seized the Egyptian freighter Abdul Karim which is still being held by Israel, presumably pending the outcome of the Inge Toft case.

REQUEST SPACE-STATION

TEL AVIV — The Israeli Astronautical Society has requested American authorities to set-up a space station to track satellites here, Moshe Arens, president of the society, declared here last week. The proposal is being studied in Washington.

Student Scheduled For Examination

CLEVELAND — A 15-year-old high school student with a genius-level I.Q. was scheduled for psychiatric examination after his four-student nazi-style Bund was charged with breaking into and vandalizing a Cleveland Israel Bond office.

The four youths, all of whose names were withheld, were accused of destroying mail, slashing an Israel flag and smearing swastikas on the walls of the Israel Bonds office. Juvenile Court Judge Margaret Spellacy said she would not sentence the four youths until the leader was examined by a court psychiatrist and the other three completed writing essays on good government.

The four youths tried to distribute anti-Semitic literature among their 3,000 fellow students at Collingwood High School. It was this material which led school officials to investigate and to act against the four "Bundists."

The leader, who has an I. Q. of 148, admitted he had made up a death list which included President Eisenhower, financier Cyrus Eaton and other notables. He told Judge Spellacy the group intended to "get rid of all the Jews and communists." He said he had made 300 threatening telephone calls to the Israel Bond office he and his companions, who addressed him as "The Fueher," later vandalized.

The Coming of 10-Pins

It is not exactly news that ten-pin bowling is coming to Rhode Island. The word has been out for some time now about the planned introduction here of the bowling game that is the most popular sport over most of the country.

Mostly, what is known up to now is that the first local emporium containing ten-pin bowling is now being erected at the Shipyard in Providence, and that the bowler uses a big heavy ball with finger hole control, and gets only two shots per box, or frame.

But this information, fascinating as it is, does not even begin to scratch the surface of the giant ten-pin bowling plant located right in the middle of Harborside Industrial Park.

"Ten-Pin Lanes", as the new bowling establishment is to be called, is the latest of the many projects sponsored by Melvin Berry, creator and developer of Harborside Industrial Park. The target date for the official opening is mid-August, about six weeks from now.

It's Big
Everything about "Ten-Pin Lanes" is big, and we might as well start off with the two biggest single items — cost and size.

When the lanes are opened to the public, the cost of the project will have reached, and probably exceeded, \$1,100,000! That's right — more than a million dollars!

And for those of us who can't count that high, there is another breathtaking figure in the number of lanes being built into the new plant. No less than 44!

The building itself is nearly a hundred yards wide, and will have two main entrances along this width, and an entrance on each side.

There will be men's and women's shower rooms and locker rooms, with accommodations for 400 men and 200 women. Also, a restaurant and a cocktail lounge, and a supervised nursery, where the girls can park the youngsters safely and conveniently on bowling afternoons. And closed circuit television, which will permit the viewing of the bowling action (and the nursery) from various parts of the building. There are so many features of construction that to mention them all here would take away most of the space that must be devoted to the bowling.

Before we get into the sport itself, it should be noted that the vocabulary at "Ten-Pin Lanes" (Continued on Page 7)

will be slightly different. At the Shipyard there will be no "alleys" — only "lanes". And the ball doesn't go into the "gutter" — rather, into the "channel".

The Magic Brain

Surprises there are galore. First, each of the 44 Brunswick automatic pinsetting machines is equipped with a magic brain that does away with the pushing of buttons when a rack of balls is desired. The "magic brain" works on a cycle of one game without any human reminder, regardless of how many Keglers are using a particular lane. It sweeps pins away when sweeping is necessary, and it racks up the balls when none is left standing. The mere act of rolling a ball down the lane is all that is needed to activate the machine.

Each lane has individual control,

but all 44 lanes will be controlled by one operator sitting at a control desk. He will turn on the power for each lane that is to be used, and he will know at a glance how many games have been played at any lane.

For league bowling, there will be the Tel-E-Score, an electronic camera-like device that shows the scores on a "scoreboard" screen seven and a half feet above the foul line. This device is a miniature TV set, which looks down at the scoresheet on the table at the rear of the lane, and projects the figures on to the screen for all to see. No crowding around to see who is doing what. The spectator, and the members of other teams, can tell what is going on at any lane merely by checking the screen over that particular lane.

Optional for league play too is the Tel-E-Foul, an electric eye affair that will ring a bell and

flash the number of the lane at which the transgression has been committed, whenever a bowler violates the foul line.

Equipped with the latest sound-proofing system, "Ten-Pin Lanes" will be even more quiet because of the new subway for returning balls. The familiar rumble of balls rolling along the track will not be in evidence. Balls will be seen only when they pop out beside the bowler, ready again for use. And at the rear of the subway "station" is an electric hand dryer.

Measured to A Ball!

Of particular interest to this observer is the method of selecting the right ball for bowling ten pins. The new lanes will have a gadget called "custom-matic", which, if I have it right, is a ball with various positions of finger hole control. Human hands come in unlimited sizes — large, medium, small, dainty, ungainly, etc. Ob-

viously, the finger holes that would be suitable for a large hand would not do for a small one. At "Ten-Pin Lanes" the kegler, after determining his proper grip — which set of finger holes is correct for him — simply checks the number of the right combo on the custom-matic, and looks for a ball with that number whenever he bowls. Imagine that — getting measured to a bowling ball!

Ten-pin bowling balls, by the way, weigh from ten to sixteen pounds. The most comfortable weight also must be determined.

There will, of course, be free

instruction at "Ten-Pin Lanes", in the proper bowling procedure.

Under the system described to this column, there will be ample room for open, as well as league bowling, on any night.

There is more — much more — but no more room in this allotted space. Manager Jack Ward, ST-1-7000, can answer all questions.

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

Jewish Students In The Midwest

Jewish fraternity boys are frat men first and Jews second. On soft spring nights, they wear the uniform of Bermuda shorts, crew cut, and open boyish face. Their handshake is hearty, their manner earnestly masculine. I had occasion to visit a court party (a raucous, slam-bang affair in which three or more fraternities, adjoining each other on a court, pool forces — and noise — on Saturday night). It was a somewhat dismaying demonstration of fun.

What about interdating and intermarriage? There is some, of course, although not as much as the anxiety about it would suggest. There is a curious disjunction between the habits of the boys and of the girls. As one would expect, the latter tend to be more conservative, with a wary eye on the long haul of marriage and family. Most sorority girls are prepared to forego the strange fruit of gentile dates. The fraternity boys, however, regard dates with Christian girls as part of their college fling. They make the comfortable assumption that Jewish girls will be there waiting when it is time to settle down. It is conventional, for example, for Jewish fraternities to team up with gentile sororities in certain social events.

There are some wry footnotes to all this wayfaring. The prevailing folklore is that Jewish boys seek out gentile girls because they are, presumably, more accessible than Jewish girls. (This is very likely adolescent braggadocio rather than hard fact.) Similarly, gentile frat boys characterized Jewish sorority girls as "wild." They were actually reacting to the darkness and vividness of the Jewish girls. In a world so pervasively blond, Jewish girls are compellingly exotic.

The Greek-letter societies are now convulsed by the crisis of the "1960 clause." This requires all fraternities and sororities to eliminate discriminatory clauses from their charters by 1960. The purpose, of course, is to bring to an end segregated organizations. Some gentile fraternities and sororities are prepared to end their existence. Others will become democratized.

I spoke with some gentile fraternity boys and was struck by the persistence of old canards about Jews, e.g., pushy, obnoxious, etc. There is a poignant irony about this. My observation was that the Jewish fraternity boys were too determinedly all-American boys, their Jewishness under wraps. Apparently, it takes more than winning intra-murals to dispel the old demons. But it

is only fair to point out this this hostility is not shared by all gentiles. In the course of this discussion, some other gentile boys looked aggrieved. "Wait a minute," one of them said, "that isn't the way I feel about it." As if to underline the point, a group of boys disengaged themselves from their own party and visited a Jewish fraternity party. One of the campus intellectuals, on another occasion, remarked sadly about the anti-Semites at the university: "Well, it's their loss."

The toxic center of poor Jew-gentile relationships is in the off-campus residences for women. Along Langdon Street, sandwiched between fraternity and sorority houses, are a few dozen residence halls for women. These handle the overflow from dorms. Because until recently, in-state students had preference for dormitory space, out-of-state students usually found themselves in these residence halls. Unhappily, there has been a marked tendency towards self-segregation on the part of Jewish girls. Why? The reason is simple. They want to meet Jewish boys, and the latter gravitate towards the "Jewish" residence halls. In a pattern reminiscent of the suburbs, gentiles move out as the Jewish majority increases. And so the very features which attract New York and Chicago students to Wisconsin are lost.

Insulation is one consequence. "We don't have conflict between Jews and gentiles," a dean observed, "because their paths simply don't cross." They seal themselves off socially, and classes are large and impersonal. Nor does the dialogue of ideas, which is muted these days, throw Jew and gentile into spirited interaction.

Unfortunately, the closed Jewish circuit has excited suspicion and distaste. Being Jewish is equated with a New York origin and with money. Nor is this mere backwoods mythology. Jewish girls, particularly, have exhibited poor judgment. They have concentrated in some of the more lavish residence halls. One of these looks for all the world like a Miami Beach hotel with its massive white masonry beetling over the lake and a giant lobby with outsized modern furniture. "You see," a girl explained defensively, "we get lots of extras here, like lunch and laundry. When you get down to it, it's not really more expensive than other halls." To outsiders the costs are steep enough to provoke malicious comment.

ONLY IN AMERICA

The Famous Blue Back Speller

Two hundred years ago there was a fellow born who did us all a great favor. His name was Noah Webster and what he did was to write the first American dictionary. Webster was born up in West Hartford, Connecticut, and for a man who was about to help out the language, he chose a singularly appropriate birthplace. It was in Hartford that the first Constitution was written and the first Constitutional Government served. The Constitution of the State of Connecticut antedates the American Constitution by more than one hundred years. Webster grew up in glorious company. Whether he thought of himself as part of, first, a native American government, and then a native American language, I don't know. He was a flamboyant man at times, at times a cranky and severe man. All this is understandable.

New England is a cold place to live in the wintertime, and on top of that Webster lacked typewriters, an office staff, and an army of Ph. D.'s to do elementary research. And in 1828 America was still America. No one wrote a dictionary and just let the royalties roll in. No sir, Webster's

book, which he called *An American Dictionary of the English Language* was in two volumes, and by 1845 dictionary selling had become a big business. Immigrants by the thousands started to pour into this country and constituted an eager market. Public school education was blossoming. There was a great dictionary war, like the gas wars we have today. The publishers cut rates, used all the advertising gimmicks possible, even gave away free soap.

Webster finally won over a few imitators. He won because he had assembled the famous *Blue Back Speller* which came into use in many of the schools and made his name synonymous with the new American language. An empire had been born. The dictionary became the standard equipment of every home and Webster owed his fame to the immigrant population, the public school, and the commercial opportunities both of these presented. But what of himself? How much did all three of these owe him? A great deal. Webster was a patriot, and an intellectual.

The English, however, have never been too happy about Web-

ster's dictionary or his pronunciations or his spellings. For instance the English say "shed-ule" instead of "schedule." Webster's reasoning was simple. If you say "shed-ule" for schedule, then you ought to be consistent and say "shule" for "school." You can see the confusion this would lead to. Webster decided there had to be a standard for pronunciations and there are many of his suggestions we are only now beginning to include.

The British are proud of English and thought we were trying to do two things to it: deface it and surpass it. Neither was true. The words that suited the English country gentleman did not suit the mass of immigrants here or the pioneer. We were adding words constantly to our language from foreign countries, words which were in general use: like *donnybrook* which means a fight and which Webster's dictionary will tell you came from the Donnybrook Fair where there are always fights; or "schnorrer" which means beggar and which derived from the Yiddish word for a musical instrument which Jewish beggars carried on their backs. The English say that this rule lets slang creep into the language, but there is nothing wrong with slang. The word "blizzard" was slang, bad slang, for a heavy snowstorm. Or it was slang up until 1888 when everyone was thankful for it.

The only place where I sympathize with the English is that I think we ought to keep rock 'n' roll at home.

Moroccan Jews Told They Must Be Integrated In Nation

PARIS—Jews in Morocco are told they must be "integrated completely in the Moroccan nation" and that "it would not be to their benefit to have one leg here and the other one with the Zionists who drove out the Arabs" from Palestine, in a warning issued by Allal el Fassi, leader of the conservative wing of the Istiqlal Party.

In a statement published in the Moroccan press, the Moroccan leader comments on the recent arrests of Jews in Morocco and on the desire on the part of some Jews to emigrate from Morocco to Israel. The statement reads:

"A letter from an anonymous group of Jews asking for our help has reached us. This letter speaks of the torture of several Jews who had been arrested on their way to Israel for having used false passports. The authors of the letter also note that the affinity of Jews to Israel is the same as that of Moslem Arabs to Mecca, and they ask us to intervene on behalf of the detainees.

"We are against the unjust treatment of Jews or of any other person. We regard Moroccan Jews as citizens sharing with us the same privileges and duties. On the other hand, the authorities concerned have denied the allegation of maltreatment. It should also be borne in mind that commerce in Morocco is a monopoly in the hands of Jews, who use their activities in local political associations as a means of ingratiating themselves with the officials who are in charge of issuing commercial licenses.

"Nevertheless we demand, as a matter of principle, that justice be meted out to everyone. But

as to allowing Jews to act as agents for foreign countries, no one could tolerate such a state of affairs, even from the standpoint of justice, and even if it were for the benefit of a Jewish State, particularly in view of the fact that Morocco has not extended recognition to the State of Israel. It is, therefore, the duty of all citizens to maintain no ties whatsoever with the State of Israel.

"Drawing a parallel between Israel and Mecca is inaccurate. The latter is, in fact, a religious center of pilgrimage, whereas the immigrants to Israel come as settlers to bolster the numbers of those whom Ben-Gurion is mo-

bilizing to attack the Arab states as he did, with the collaboration of France and Britain, in the Sinai campaign.

"Moroccan Jews must be integrated completely in the Moroccan nation. It would not be to their benefit to have one leg here and the other one with the Zionists who drove out the Arabs. In spite of all that they did, we ask the authorities to treat them according to law and justice. We assume that the majority of Jews are in full agreement with us, and that only in the eyes of foreign agents does non-encouragement of emigration look like persecution."

THOSE NIGHTS AT SHOR'S . . .

It was 19 years ago that Toots Shor entered his brand new restaurant and struck his customary pose — the pose of all his contemporaries during those somewhat mad years — standing with hands in pockets, his fingers clutching at the bankroll. But he'd spent his last dime on the new establishment. In fact, he'd walked from his home, for lack of fare, and the phone company had just shut off service because the bill was unpaid.

The "bankroll" he clutched in his pocket was just a wad of paper. Last week the restaurant closed. It will be torn down and become the site of the Zeckendorf Hotel. And as he points out the site of the new Shor's, on W. 52nd St., the bankroll in his pockets will be real — part of the \$1,500,000 he received for surrendering his lease. He'll be operating on the very spot where he'd once worked as a greeter, at Leon and Eddie's—part of a career as bouncer in the speakeasies and as owner of the tavern he'd lost in gambling sprees.

Nineteen years have passed, a full generation marking his rise from bouncer to millionaire, years in which his place became the capital of American sports and a second home to so many. Years crowded with fabulous memories for many including those of us who kept the records of the times.

Whisky, and not a dog, is man's best friend — has been Shor's credo. He really believes that everything in this world can be improved if you drink a glass of whisky. When a doctor warned him to cut down on his drinking, Shor said: "I see more old bums than old doctors." He described his Bloody Marys as "Uncle Tootsie's Tomato Surprise." He confided his reactions on the day he opened his place: "That's my whisky and nobody's gonna tell me I've had enough." He said: "What a great customer I'd make if this weren't my own joint."

Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of Penicillin, once requested his autograph. He joined Frank Sinatra and Morton Downey in singing "Happy Birthday" to Jimmy Walker — who couldn't hear them because Toots' bellowing drowned out the other voices. He discouraged Elsa Maxwell as a customer: "Who needs her? She's always on a diet, and she doesn't drink."

His favorite "insult," reserved only for favorites, is "ya crum," (Continued on Page 11)

A DECADE OF DEFICITS ENDS

Last Tuesday, June 30, the U. S. Treasury formally closed the books on the decade of the '50's. While to us 1959 still has six more months of life, to the Treasury this is the end of the fiscal year, the end of the decade.

What a story of monumental inconsistencies, upside-down relationships has gone into our books.

For mind you, during this decade a Republican has occupied the White House most of the time, and such proud financial conservatives as George Humphrey and Robert Anderson have run the U. S. Treasury.

During this decade our economy has been in the greatest prosperity ever known and today incomes, profits, production, sales, etc. are zooming to unprecedented heights.

Yet, in the 12-month period which ended Tuesday the government has chalked up the biggest peacetime budget deficit in all our history — a deficit estimated as close to \$12.5 billion.

In this entire decade the government has achieved only three years of budget surpluses — one under former President Truman and two insignificant ones under President Eisenhower in 1956 and 1957.

In these 10 years the government's new borrowing has raised the national debt to a record of near \$286 billion, and the annual bill just for debt interest has soared from \$5.7 billion to \$8.6 billion.

In these deficit-dotted '50s we've carried the heaviest tax load in the nation's lifetime, and we now pay in annual taxes twice as much as we put aside in personal saving. This turns upside-down the relationship between taxes and savings prior to World War II.

And even these startling facts don't tell the full story about the '50s, for this decade marks the third in a row of huge deficits.

In the past three decades the government has had only six years of surpluses; the other 24 years have been soaked in red ink. Since 1930 our national debt has skyrocketed 1,800 per cent.

Going all the way back to 1789, you'll find no record comparable to this. From 1789 to 1930 our government had 93 years of budget sur-
